## PROCEEDINGS.

The introductory sermon was preached by Eld. I. U. H. Wharton from 1st Corinthians. Subject, Christ Crucified, the Wisdom and Power of God unto Salvation. The preacher earnestly and ably entertained the large audience present. At the close of said service recess was had for one and half hours and a bountiful repast was enjoyed on the premises, after which the Delegates present from the various Churches assembled, and were called to order by I. U. H. Wharton and proceeded to temporarily organize by calling Bro. H. T. Hawkins to the chair and B. W. M. Warren to act as clerk. The chairman called for letters in the hands of the delegates from the churches composing the Association, and the names of delegates were recorded as per statistical table.

In order to a permanent organization of the body a motion was made to suspend the rules and elect a moderator and clerk by acclamation, which resulted in the selection of Bro. H. T. Hawkins, moderator, and B. W. M. Warren, clerk.

A call was next made for petitionary letters, when one was presented by Green Grove Church by Eld. B. C. Green and received into fellowship with the body.

On motion and second the order of business of the last session of the body was adopted.

On motion the question of establishing a school of high order in the bounds of the association was suggested by Eld. J. G. McCain which was referred to the committee on Ministerial Education.

By motion adjourned to half past eight o'clock, Monday, a. m.

#### SABBATH EXERCISES.

Owing to constant rain the contemplated Sunday School mass meeting was omitted. Preaching at 11 o'clock a. m. by Eld. M. D. Early, from Matt. 12, 21st. The service was indeed a precious Spiritual feast. At the close of the service a collection was taken for State Missions, amounting to \$19.45. At 2 o'clock p. m. the stand was occupied by Eld. J. P. Everette from Gallatians 4, 20th. who ably and zealously presented the Gospel to an appreciative audience. At night Eld. S. T. Cobb faithfully presented the truths of the Gospel to the people at Calidonia and at the same hour Eld. M. D. Early preached the truth at Blanchard Springs, the health resort of Union county.

Monday, 9 o'clock a.m., still raining and the Moderator being absent, the body was called to order by the clerk, prayer conducted by Eld. Early, at the close of which Eld. J. R. Hughes was called to the chair by the clerk.

By order of business the report of committees were called for. Committee on Ministerial Education made their report, and no motion to adopt, after some remarks, said report was laid upon the table subject to call.

The Moderator Bro. H. T. Hawkins made his appearance and took his seat.

On Sabbath Schools made their report, on motion to adopt its importance and necessity was ably discussed by Bro. A. C. Jones and J. R. Hughes. See appendix B.

Committee on Publications made their report. On motion to adopt the claims of the Baptist State papers of Arkansas and Louisiana was ably and earnestly presented by Eld. M. D. Early, J. P. Everette, J. R. Hughes and J. U. H. Wharton. See Appendix C.

Committee on Documents made their report, adopted. See Appendix D.

Committe on Foreign Missions made their report, on motion to adopt was discussed by Eld. J. P. Everette, Sam'l Cobb and M. D. Early.

The Executive Board was instructed to turn over \$23.40 to the Corresponding Secretary of the State Convention, \$8.50 for Foreign Missions, \$5.30 to be expended in buy ng books for Bro. B. C. Green; \$2.70 sent up by the ladies aid society to Home Missions.

On motion, adjourned to meet with Salem Church, near Mt. Holly, on Saturday before the second Sabbath in September, A. D., 1887.

### APPENDIX A.

On Ministerial Education. This subject has been presented annually to this body for a number of years, and for years past with beneficial effects. The denomination are to-day reaping a rich harvest from the seed sown by Liberty Association; and the question now presents itself to us. With such encouragement before our eyes, shall we so far forget our duty to the beloved Master and the Baptist family as to cease our efforts in this behalf? Are we poorer to-day, my dear brethren, than when we

educated our revered Bros. Venable and Jameson, or has our love abated to Him who is the wisdom and power of God unto our salvation? I trust not, I believe not. We only need to have our zeal stirred to that temperature which the importance of the subject demands at our hands. It is useless for us to urge upon this intelligent body of Baptists the necessity of an educated ministry. We know you feel and realize the overshadowing importance of this necessity; and what we desire is to induce you to act in the premises, so that the denomination and world may reap the benefits of what you feel and know on this vital question.

Your body have referred to us a matter of very grave importance, namely: The propriety of establishing within our bounds a school of high order. While we realize the many advantages which would result from such action on our part, we fear the unusual financial stringency which exists at the present would render such an undertaking impracticable, and in lieu thereof we recommend your body to lend all the aid in he pewer to the Baptist college eetablished by our State Convention at Arkadelphia.

oath School is neglecting an important duty. Second, that a Christian church not engaged in this work is depriving itself of a great privilege.

Your committee on Foreign missions respectfully submit the following: We believe it is the duty and should be the earnest and constant purpose of those who have the blessed Gospel of Christ to give it to those who have it not. We believe that every true christian upon earth has a sincere desire for the salvation of his fellow man, and when the subject is properly and intelligently placed before him, and an opportunity given, will promptly and cheerfully take a part in doing what his heart so earnestly desires, and God's word so solemnly commands. We believe that it is our duty as christians to carry the gospel to all nations and kindreds, and tribes; to preach it to every creature in the wide world of whatever name, nationality, race, color, creed or condition according as God has given us the opportunity and means. Your committee believes that God does give special and precious opportunities to His people when they are willing people, ready to obey His commands; that He prepares the fields and calls such laborors as are fitted for each particular field; that He has specially and wonderfully blessed the Baptists of Arkansas in the efforts they have made for a few years past, not only to carry the gospel to every portion of Arkansas, but also to other nations. The contributions of the Baptists of Arkansas, to the cause of foreign missions has exceeded the sum of \$1,000 per annum for the past three years, and besides this increase of contributions for one State, to the work of preaching the gospel to all nations. To encourage us to greater efforts in this work, we have to stimulate us to greater zeal the cheering fact that we have a noble missionary preaching in West Africa who went from Arkansas. Shall not our prayers and contributions follow him to help sustain him in his glorious work? The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention ask the Baptists of Arkansas to contribute \$1,500 to the work of the gospel in foreign fields. churches of this Association should take an active part in raising the amount asked for by the Board at the last meeting of our State Convention. This association was pledged for \$100 for foreign missions by her representatives, your committee apprehend that not more than half of the pledge has been redeemed. We recommend that the ministers and churches make an earnest effort to raise the remainder by the 1st of November, and forward the same to Dr. H. A. Tupper, Richmond, Va., or to Eld. J. B. Searcy, Dardanelle, Ark.

The State board has had in its employ fifteen missionaries, all of whom have been faithfully at work in their several fields, and it affords us pleasure to state that their labors are being great ly blessed, and from these fields we are already receiving funds with which to prosecute the work in other destitute fields. The board has one mission within the bounds of this Association, to wit: Camden. Here the board is paying \$150. We rejoice in the success thus far attending our efforts in the spread of the gospel throughout out beloved State. There still remains much to be done ere we can fill the fields now destitute and calling for help. board is praying to be able another year to put at least fifty live men in the field to build up for the Master. Brethren this is our work; the Master says occupy till I come. Will we do this? For this we pray. We, therefore, recommend that the pastors and delegates here assembled, pledge themselves to present the claims of this great work from time to time during the next year to the churches comprising this association, and do all in their power to secure for the work the sum of twenty-five cents from each member. Some, perhaps, may not be able to pay the above amount, many others can pay more, and so we hope this amount can be We recommend that the churches adopt some secured. systematic plan by which the interests of the work can be advanced in our association.
