The Association proceeded to the election of officers. On motion the regular method of voting was suspended and the clerk ordered to cast the unanimous vote of the Association for Bro. W. P. Fletcher for Moderator, which was done and he was declared elected. M. E. McBride, temporary Clerk, was elected Clerk. Bro. J. T. Walker was unanimously elected Treasurer for next Associational year.

The Associational Mission Board submitted the following report which was adopted:

Report of Mission Board.

Bro. M. E. Hudson entered the Association Mission work Oct. 16, 1900, having been elected by the Association as Missionary for the ensuing Associational year. The work was begun by Bro. Hudson under most favorable conditions. His work was laid out by the Board for the fall and winter months among the most destitute churches and locations. Through him we had arranged to locate every church building and organization of each denomination within the bounds of the Association. From this information we had hoped to be able to present a map of the territory embraced and the destitution and needs of Baptist Missionary work; and to otherwise carry out as fully as possible the recommendations made at our last meeting. On the 1st of March, 1901 Bro. Hudson resigned his position without notice to the Board. The following are extracts from his report to us: From October 16, 1900 to March 1, 1901-Miles traveled 1017, days of service 128, families visited 129, sermons preached 37, Sunday Schools organized 3, churches organized 1. He did not state the places of organization of either the Sunday Schools or church. He reports further that he had visited several of the weakest churches and endeavored to strengthen and build them up. He reports collected on the field in cash \$14.10. It is to be be hoped that in the future no Missionary employed by the Association or its Board, will leave his work or resign without first giving ample notice and procuring the consent of the Board in order that his place may be properly filled. When Bro. Hudson resigned we were in his debt. The churches had not responded to our calls for aid. The Board was without means. Had he continued in the work we would have borrowed the money to meet our immediate demands, but after his resignation we

did not attempt to fill his place until the 16th day of June, 1901, we employed Bro. W. A. Crutchfield for half or more of his time at \$40 per calendar month. We refer to his report for time given to the work.

Bro. R. P. Bain, pastor of the Lonoke church, preached ten sermons to the Bayou Meto church as Mission work; assisted Bro. McKinney at Wattensaw in eight sermons; and Bro. J. P. Eagle at Caney Creek, seventeen sermons.

Your committee on Obituaries beg leave to submit the following report.

Since the last meeting of this association Dr. A. B. Miller one of our oldest and most useful ministers has been taken from among us and is now resting from his labors.

Bro. Miller was born in Kentucky in 1835. He entered the ministry at the age of eighteen years and his life was given to the preaching of the Gospel-to carrying the glad message of Salvation to the lost and to strengthening and comforting those who had believed. About ten years of his labor has been in Arkansas. Seven years as Pastor of the Second Church and three years as Pastor of Immanuel Church, Little Rock, of which he was Pastor at the time of his death. He was a strong consecrated servant of God. On the 9th inst, the master called him up higher where he will enjoy through all eternity that rest that remains to the people of God; let us emulate his virtues and be as ready as he was when the master calls for us. His companion sister Annie W. Clark Miller a most devoted christian worker, after months of anxious watching at his bedside, was so prostrated by illness that she knew not that her devoted husband had passed to his great reward, until she joined him there three days later—she having passed away Oct. 12th; at the time of her death the was a most zealous member of Immanuel church and also a member of the Womans State Central Committee on Missions. We recommend that a page of our minutes be set aside and suitably inscribed to the memory of Bro. and Sister Miller.

Report of Committee on State Missions was read, discussed and adopted as follows:

Your committee to whom was referred the subject of State Missions, submit the following report:

For twenty years and more the State Convention, through its Board has been making efforts to evangelize the state; more than forty of the churches in the county seats have been assisted in the support of their pastors. Churches in many other cities and towns have been assisted.

Associational Missionaries have also been helped, and general and local missionaries have been employed. Through these means many of our weak churches in the country have been reached and helped. For years the work has been growing, indeed a great work has been done. Last year's work was the best up to that time. This year's bids fair to be better than last.

There are many destitute fields, which need help, and cannot be adequately helped by Associational Boards; in these fields the Board of the State Convention has a large opening for work.

We recommend that the State Convention elect or direct its Board to elect a General Missionary whose duty shall be to do the correspondence for the Board, to solicit contributions from individuals and churches, and do evangelistic work. All to be done under direction of the Board.

That the salary of the General Missionary shall not exceed the sum of twelve hundred dollars per annum and actual transportation.

Report of committee on Home Missions adopted as follows:

Committee on Home Missions.

During the past Convention year the Home Mission Board had 811 Missionaries who baptized 6,671 persons and organized 162 churches and expended on houses of worship \$82,542.75. These workers organized 511 Sunday Schools and assisted the States of Alabama. Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Missouri, Mississippi, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and Oklahoma and the Indian Territory. The Board collected for this enterprise a total of \$86,964.68. Co-operative work has been done among the negroes, and much was accomplished in the famous mountain regions and on the frontiers. Cuba and our foreign population have been encouraged. The Board invites friendly criticism and asks for larger and better co-operation on the part of the Baptists of the South.

A great calamity came to the cause of Home Missions, in the death of the Sec'y., Dr. F. H. Kerfoot. He fell at his post. A great and good man, stalwart in his manhood, of the finest business and executive ability and with a pure, true heart; he was a power in the pulpit, on the platform, in the counsels of his brethren and among Christain people everywhere. After long time in prayer, the Home Mission Board requested Dr. F. G. McConnell, of Lynchburg, Va., to take the office of Secretary. He has accepted and enters at once upon the discharge of his duties. The prospects were never better, and we join all our brothers and sisters in

prayer to God for success in Home Mission efforts for the salvation of our countrymen.

We are glad to report that the S. B. Convention authorized our Board to enlarge our force by twenty five new Missionaries. We are sorry that at present, only five of these have been secured.

In the last four and a half months, our people have given \$30,000.75—\$3,156.24 more than last year, which is an increase of about 14 per cent. for the same period.

We are greatly encouraged, when we remember how God has been with our Missionaries in China, preserving their lives and giving them special protection. Some important fields are opening to us as never before.

Prayers, sympathy and contributions should be encouraged as much as possible.

Your committee on Colleges and Schools beg leave to submit the following report:

In these days of running to and fro when knowledge is greatly increased on the earth, the importance of proper, suitable, useful education cannot be over estimated. The wise man said: "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it."

In and out of the churches there is a manifest disposition to educate the rising generation. Schools of all grades are scattered everywhere, and multiplied thousands of children of this happy country of ours are found in school every day. And while the common school system is commended as deserving our cordial and enthusiastic support, colleges and schools for the more thorough and extensive education of our young people, boys and girls, are an absolute necessity, and we refer with grateful pride to the fact that such schools are now in successful and commendable operation in our state.

First, there is Ouachita at Arkadelphia, with that grand man, Prof. J. W Conger, and his noble assistants, in charge, who have already succeeded in making Ouachita College one of the best and most successful institutions of learning in the southwest. The present session has opened with much larger attendance than ever before, and the school is better equipped for work. The out look for their noble institution is exceedingly bright and full of encouragement.

Central College, at Conway, with Prof. Rivers and

his faithful corps of assistants, is represented as being in a prosperous condition, and the prospects for greator and more enlarged prosperity are full of encouragement. This school is centrally located, well equipped for work and it has a bright and hopeful future.

We are very sad to report Mountain Home College in peril. Many of our brethren throughout the state think that this property ought to be redeemed. We recommend that this Association do what she can toward helping in this matter.

We your committee would especially and heartily commend these institutions as worthy of the fullest and most cordial support of our Baptist people. And as our young people are most likely to make their homes here in Arkansas, it would be far better to educate them in our own home institutions, and we urge that our efforts be concentrated upon these schools.

CONSTITUTION

- ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be called the "Caroline Baptist Association," and shall be composed of Baptist Churches representing themselves by accredited Messengers. Its object shall be to provide missions, education and Sunday Schools.
- Art. 2. Every church belonging to this Association shall be entitled to three Messengers, and every church having over one hundred members shall be entitled to an additional Messenger for each additional fifty members over one hundred.
- Art. 3. The session of this Association shall be annual, at such time and place as shall be appointed by the body.
- Art, 4. Any Baptist Church of the same faith and practice may be admitted as a member of this Association, upon expressing a desire, through Messenger and letters, to work in fellowship with us.
- Art. 5. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot at each annual session, and continue in office until their successors are elected. A majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to elect.
- Art. 6. This Association has no power to control or in any way interfere with the independence or rights of the Churches, but may advise, when asked by a Church through its letter to the Association, and it may withdraw its fellowship from any Church known to walk disorderly.
- Art. 7. This Association may correspond by letter and Messenger with other representative bodies of our denomination.

- Art. 8. In the absence of any officer of this Association his place shall be filled pro tempore, by viva voce election.
- Art. 9. The Association may, from time to time, adopt such rules and bylaws for its government as may be expedient, not inconsistent with this Constitution.
- Art. 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any regular session by the vote of two thirds of the Messengers present in favor of the proposed amendment.

Amendment No. 1. This Association may provide means to aid in the support of their aged, infirm, needy and superanuated ministers who have devoted their lives to the ministry, and who have been engaged in their last regular ministerial work for at least one year within the bounds of the Association. The Association may appoint a Board and adopt such bylaws and regulations as will be necessary for carrying out the provisions of this amendment.

BY-LAWS

For Direction of the Board on aid to Superanuated Ministers.

Section 1. The Association shall appoint a Board on Aid to Superanuated Ministers, consisting of three members, which board shall be located in or near the same locality. Said board shall hold office from the time of appointment until the annual session of the Association. Should a vacancy occur on said board the majority may select a member of any Missionary Baptist Church, a member of this Association in good standing, to fill such vacancy. The board shall organize once a year by electing a president, secretary and treasurer. Said board shall provide such stationery as will be necessary for their use as a board and any other necessary

expenses that may be incurred in carrying on the work intrusted to them, and shall be paid out of the funds in their hands; and they shall be required to make a report to the Association each yerr of all moneys received and disbursed.

- Sec. 2. The board provided for in Section 1 of these bylaws may raise means through the churches of this Association, or raise contributions from other sources and in such manner as will be legitimate. They may purchase lands, make improvements under direction of this Association. The title to such lands shall be made to the Moderator of the Association and his successors in office.
- Sec. 3. The Association shall at its annual meeting decide who shall be placed upon the list of Superanuated Ministers and direct what amount of aid shall be furnished by the board, and decide whether or not such beneficiary can labor in the ministry, and, if so, to what extent. Provided, that if some minister, within the bounds of Caroline Association, who may come under the provisions of the constitution of this Association, may from continued sickness of himself or his family, or for other good and sufficient causes, become a charge upon the community in which he may at the time reside, the board may render such aid to such ministers as the circumstances may require or their ability will admit of. Provided, further, that for good and sufficient cause the board may discontinue their aid to such ministers and report their action to the Association at its next session.
- Sec. 4. The board provided for in Section 1 of these bylaws shall in all cases, where it is possible, work in harmony with the mission board of this Association in supplying and giving work to such infirm or super-

anuated ministers as they find such ministers are capable of performing. And in no case will this board be permitted to make pledges beyond their financial ability as such board, nor shall they involve the Association in debt.

Sec. 5. The Board on Ministerial Education shall aid such ministers as are adopted by the Association for education to the extent of the funds in their hands. Loans shall be made to such ministers, and their individual notes taken to the President of the board of education and his successors in office, with interest at 6 per cent from due until paid. The board shall not loan more than sufficient funds to meet the actual needs of such beneficiaries and not more than will be necessary for five months at any one time. They shall divide the funds in their hands in equal proportions as the demands of the beneficiaries may require. And the board shall provide such stationery and printed matter as will be required to carry out the requirements of the Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Abridged from Pendleton's Church Manual

- 1. We believe that the Holy Bible, written by men, divinely inspired, and full of unmixed truth, is a perfect rule of faith and practice. 2 Tim. 3.16.
- 2. We believe in one God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Gen. 1:26. 2 Cor. 13:14.
- 3. We believe that man, once holy, fell by voluntary transgression, from that happy state, and is now utterly void of holiness. Gen. 1.26, 3:17.
- 4. We believe that sinners are saved by grace alone. Eph. 2:8-9.

- 5. We believe that men are justified by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Gal. 3:6-29.
- 6. We believe that salvation is free to all who will accept the Gospel. Isa. 55:1, John 7:37, Rev. 21:6, Rev. 22:17.
- 7. We believe that, except a man be renewed by the Holy Spirit, he is not qualified or prepared for the Kingdom of Christ on earth, or to enjoy his glory hereafter. John 3:3-8.
- 8. We believe that repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are duties of every one who hears the Gospel. Mat. 3:2, Acts 18:31.
- 9. We believe that election is the eternal purpose of God, by which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners. Rom. 8:30.
- 10. We believe that sanctification, begun in regeneration, and ever progressive, is the process by which we are made to partake of God's holiness. John 3:6, 2 Thes. 2:12.
- 11. We believe in the preservation of the saints, that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation. 1 Peter, 1:5.
- 12. We believe that God's law is the only, the eternal and unchangeable rule of His Church and moral government. 2 Tim. 3:16-17.
- 13. We believe that a Church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, united in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel, observing the ordinance and obeying the laws of Christ, and that its officers are pastors and deacons. Acts 2:41-47, 1 Tim. 3:2-8.
- 14. We believe that Christian baptism is the immerson of a believer in water, by a properly qualified administrator, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Matt. 28;19, Mark 16:16, Romans 6:3-4.
 - 15. We believe that only such as have been prop-

erly baptized and received into the fellowship of a regularly organized Baptist church should partake of the Lord's Supper. Matt. 26:26-27, 1 Cor. 11:20-23.

16. We believe that the Lord's day or Christain Sabbath should be devoutly observed, and sacredly devoted to religious services. Mark 16:9, Acts 20-7, 1 Cor. 16:1-2, Heb. 10:25.

17. We believe that civil government is of divine appointment, and that the governors of states and nations should be obeyed, when the laws they seek to enforce do not conflict with the Gospel.

18. We believe in the future resurrection of the

dead. Dan. 12:2-1, 1 Thes. 4:16.

19. We believe in final judgment; and that, in that day, the righteous and wicked will be separated forever. Acts 17:31, Matt. 25:32-33.

20. We believe that the righteous will be happy forever in heaven, and the wicked miserable forever in hell. Matt. 25:34-46.

Thanking God for the light we have received, and for the revelation of Jesus which we now enjoy, and hoping that God, for Christ's sake, has pardoned our sins, and having been baptized on a profession of our faith in Christ Jesus into the name of the father, Son and Holy Ghost, we do, this day, before God and the world, and with deep joy and great solemnity, enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We therefore covenant and agree, that, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, we will walk together in love and Christian fellowship. We promise to labor for the advancement and final triumph of the Church; to sustain her worship by attending the house of God and supporting the ministry; to guard her ordinances, enforce her discipline, and defend her doctrine.

We also pledge ourselves to walk circumspectly in

the world; to be honest, just and faithful in our business relations; and, as God may give us help, we promise to live righteous and holy lives.

We further promise to watch over each other in brotherly love; to visit the sick; to pray for each other and the world; to aid the poor and needy, and to perform such other kind offices as may be well pleasing in the sight of God.

RULES of DECORUM

- 1. The daily session of the Association shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.
- 2. All exceptions to the decision of the Moderator shall be by appeal to the body, whose decision as expressed by a majority of the vote, viva voce given, shall be final.
- 3. In case of a tie vote, the Moderator shall give the casting vote, and he shall not be allowed to vote in any other case.
- 4. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speaking as other members, but when rising to speak shall call some other member to the chair.
- 5. No member shall speak but once on the same subject, more than twenty minutes at a time, except by leave of the Association, provided the mover shall have the privilege of opening and closing the debate on his motion or resolution.
- 6. But one member shall speak at a time, and if more than one rise to speak at the same time the Moderator shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 7. Any member desiring to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, and in speaking shall confine himself to the subject under discussion, and no one shall use any disrespectful or discourteous language, calculated to wound the feelings of any member, or to

disturb the harmony of the body, and the appelation of "Brother" shall be used in every reference to a member of the Association.

- 8. No member of the Association shall absent himself without leave of the chair, and the chair shall grant no such leave except for reasonable cause.
- 9. It shall be the duty of the clerk to make and present faithful records of the proceedings of the Association, and to procure and supervise the printing and distribution of the same among the churches.
- 10. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all moneys accruing to the Association, to pay out the same upon the order of the Clerk, or, if Home Mission fund, upon the order of the Secretary of Home Missions, and to report his receipts and disbursements. But the Clerk shall draw no order upon the Treasurer except for appropriations previously made by the Association.
- 11 Committees shall be appointed by the chair, unless otherwise ordered by the Association.

tional Missions. 2. State Missions. 3. Home Missions. 4. Foreign Missions. 5. Colleges and Schools. 6. Ministerial Education. 7. Temperance. 8. Sunday Schools. 9. Obituaries. 10. Woman's Work. 11. Literature. 12. Correspondence. 13. Orphans' Home. 14. Nominations. 15. Finance.
