PROCEEDINGS.

The Grand Prairie Baptist Association convened with the DeWitt Baptist Church, Friday, October 26th, 1900, at 7 p. m.

The body was called to order by the Moderator, R. H. Parker. Hymn 196, Gospel Songs, was then sung by Church choir and congregation. The Moderator then declared the Association in session. Prayer by Dr A. J. Barton. Elder H. Y. Morris, the appointee to preach the introductory sermon, not being present, Elder N. G. Williams, alternate, asked to be released, which was done, and Eld. W. W. Gardner, Agent for Orphans Home, was selected in his place.—Hymn 188, Gospel Songs. Reading lesson and prayer by Bro. Gardner. Theme of discourse: Prayer.

Committee on Devotional Exercise was then appointed by the Moderator: Bros. W. L. Cole, E. J. McCuin, with Pastor and Deacons of this Church.

A collection was then taken up for Orphans Home. Mrs. J. F. Park, \$5.00. In the midst of the collection, prayer was offered by Bro. Barton. Collection for Orphans Home: pledge, \$5.00; cash, \$0.40. Adjourned to meet Saturday 9 a. m.

SATURDAY MORNING.

Saturday morning, Oct. 27, 9:30, the body come together. Sang hymn, "How firm a Foundation." Prayer by Bro. A. H. Soekland.

Letters from the churches were then called for, and the following named Brethren appointed Reading Clerks: E. L. McHaney and J. H. Wofford. The Letters were presented as called, and Messengers were enrolled as follows:

Petitionary Letters were then called for and none presented.

The body then proceeded by ballot in electing Officers for the ensuing year. The ballot was first cast for Moderator, resulting in the election of Deacon R. H. Parker, Moderator. Then, by motion,

which carried, the Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer were all voted for on the same ballot, resulting in the election of Eld. I. Z. Kimbrough, Vice-Moderator, Eld. N. G. Williams, Clerk, and Bro. A. H. Soekland, Treasurer.

The body was then declared organized and ready for business.

The Committee on Devotional Exercise reported that Dr. A. J. Barton preach at 11 a. m. The body then took recess until 2 p. m.

At 11 a. m., congregation come together for preaching and sang hymn, "I Know in Whom I Have Believed." At conclusion of song, Bro. Routh offered prayer. Dr. Barton then read the 3rd chapter of Phill. Hymn, "Happy Day," was sung by congregation. Bro. Barton's text was, Phill., 13th and 14th verses, and preached a very interesting and instructive sermon on Sanctification.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

The body reassembled in the meeting house. Prayer by Eld. I. Z. Kimbrough. The roll of Churches was again called and the following Churches presented Letters, and Messengers were enrolled:

Petitionary Letters were again called for. Hebron Church presented petitionary letter. The letter, with its bearers, was received. The Moderator for the body extended the right hand of Associational fellowship to its Messengers, and their names are here enrolled: Bros. J. H. Trussell and Robert Bradbury.

Bro. A. J. Barton was then invited to seat in the body and made welcome by the Moderator.

It was found that the Standing Committees appointed at Hazen failed. The Moderator appointed new Committees to report at this session of the body:

Report on State Missions was called for, read and adopted. Bro. A. H. Soekland spoke, recommending the report. Bro. Barton then presented State Missions in a lengthy speech, giving in detail the work as conducted by the State Board, for the information of the Association. Adopted without change.

Eld. R. P. Lucado, a visitor, was received and seated in the body.

Committee then reported that Dr. Barton preach to-night. Adjourned to 6:30 p. m.

SATURDAY EVENING, 6:30.

Congregation come together to hear a sermon by Dr. A. J. Bar-

ton. Sang hymn 299, G. S. Prayer by Eld. R. P. Lucado. Singing again by congregation. Prayer was then offered by Eld. N. G. Williams. Third chapter of John was read by Eld. Barton. Congregation then sang, "How Firm a Foundation." Elder Barton then delivered an excellent discourse from John 3:16. After sermon, hymn, "More Lové to Christ," was sung by Church choir.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 28.

Sunday, 11 a. m. The Association come together for the preaching; choir and congregation sang hymn 221, G. S. Prayer by Elder R. P. Lucado. Eld. Lucado then read a part of the 2d and 4th chapters of Ephe. Prayer was then offered by Eld. R. F. Routh. Elder Lucado then preached a very interesting and instructive sermon from Ephe, 4:1. At the conclusion of the sermon, pledges on the part of many of the brethren and sisters to do more for the Master, to try to live nearer the Cross the next year, that the Gospel be not hindered and that God's name be glorified in us, manifested by giving their hand to Bro. Lucado.

A collection for Associational purposes to be used during this year: Cash, \$7.26. Adjourned to 3 p. m.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON.

The body reassembled at 3 p. m. Moderator R. H. Parker, absent. Eld. I. Z. Kimbrough, Vice Moderator, filled the chair. Prayer by Bro. A. H. Soekland. Report on Sunday Schools was called for, presented and read by the Chairman for Committee. Talks by several brethren. The report was amended and adopted. Committee on Preaching then reported that Elder Lucado preach to-night at 7 o'clock. Adjourned until 9 a. m., Monday.

SUNDAY EVENING.

Sunday, 7 p. m. Services began by Song Service. Prayer by Eld.

Lucado. Congregation then sang, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." Elder R. F. Lacado then preached a sermon from Rom. 14:7.

Report on Publications adopted without change.

Report of Finance Committee, by motion, given further time.

Report on Temperance read and adopted.

Report on Home Missions adopted.

Report on Orphans Home adopted as read.

No Correspondence from Sister Associations and none appointed.

To State Convention: Eld. D. S. Cannon, Eld. I. Z. Kimbrough, A. H. Soekland, J. H. Merritt, J. M. Thompson and Sister Ola Luckett. On motion, delegates to Baptist State Convention go uninstructed.

Time and place of next meeting was taken up. Rising Sun and

Center Point were put in nomination. By vote of the body Center Point was elected as the place of the next meeting of this Association. Time of meeting, Thursday night before the 4th Sunday in October, 1901.

Eld. H. Y. Morris was elected to preach the Introductory Sermon. Eld. I. Z. Kimbrough, alternate.

Eld. I. Z. Kimbrough was elected to preach the Missionary Sermon. Eld. B. F. House, alternate. Recess taken until 1 p. m.

MONDAY AFTERNOON.

1 p. m. Body come together. Sung, "Come Thou Fount." Prayer by Bro. L. E. Thomas.

Bro. H. B. Dudley was elected delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Resolved, That we as an Association endorse the work of the State Mission Board, and that we assure Dr. A. J. Barton our hearty support or co-operation.

I. Z. Kimbrough's resolution unanimously adopted.

The Clerk was ordered to have 500 Minutes published and draw on the Associational Treasurer for the money to pay the balance over that he has in hand, and that the Minutes be distributed among the Churches according to membership of each Church.

A resolution was adopted allowing the Clerk \$10.00 for his services, to be paid out of treasury.

APPENDIX.

“A”—SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools would report and recommend the same to all Christian people.

We find from the reading of Church letters a distressing dearth of Sunday Schools throughout the bounds of the Association. Only seven Baptist Sunday Schools in all this vast territory of over a thousand members, and two of these are Union. This ought not to be. We entreat every Church to organize and re-organize and urge the older members to go to the Sunday School with their children, because we believe many dear souls have started on the Straight and Narrow way in the Sunday School, and that the Sunday School is an incentive to Church members, and that the Missionary spirit so necessary to the cause of Christ is taught there.

We also recommend the careful selection of Teachers. Let them be Christians every time and firm in their convictions. Then we know the minds of the children will receive no wrong impressions. We believe the Sunday School is to the child's mind what the day school is to the practical knowledge of every day life. We would recommend our own Southern Literature and the Literature of the American Baptist Publication Society.

"E"—HOME MISSIONS.

We are glad to report that our State Mission work is in a prosperous condition. At the call of the State Board our Brother, A. J. Barton, an Arkansas boy, late Assistant Corresponding Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, has come back to our State and is now giving himself to the work as Corresponding Secretary. In addition to these, has had two evangelists in destitute places in the state, doing a much-needed work. Owing to the fact that most of the Churches that at all delay their contributions till near the end of the year, the Missionaries have had to wait for their salaries. But we are glad that at the present time the receipts are rapidly increasing, and present indications inspire the hope that we shall go to the Convention without debt. We recommend that we record our gratitude to our heavenly Father for His grace and blessings upon the work. And that we assure our State Board of our continued sympathy and support in the conduct of the work, and that our Churches be affectionately urged to make regular contributions to this great work to the end that the gospel of our blessed Saviour, as understood and held by the Baptists, may be effectually preached in every corner of our great and beloved State, and that thousands of the unsaved within our bounds may be brought to Christ.
