STATE MISSIONS.

Eld. J. N. Hartley submitted the following report on

Our state board, last December, elected Hen. W. E. Atkinson, of Little Rock, corresponding secretary. He has faithfully discharged the duties incumbent upon him, notwithstanding the fact that he has had many obstacles to remove. We believe that he has, by his earnest efforts, broadened the visions and increased the missionary zeal of Arkansas Baptists. He was elected to this important position by the Baptists of Arkansas, and he being our servant, (for Christ's sake) we believe that we should heartily and enthusiastically support him and the great work which he represents.

The state board has assisted several weak churches to support a pastor. Brethren C. W. Strickland, W. A. Clark, Frank White, W. B. Holland, E. J. A. McKinney and others have been employed for a few weeks by the board to labor in destitute fields, and we are glad to state that the Lord graciously and abundantly blessed their labors.

We believe that the efforts of the board to reach the masses, and to inform the brotherhood of the alarming destitution in our state, will bear much fruit to the honor and glory of God. We believe that our watchwords should be, agitate and educate.

Our board has received, from all sources, about \$2,400, which is far below areasonable contribution to this great work.

All the plans which the state board have for nulated and adopted have failed to produce perfect harmony or unity of action. Therefore, we recommend to this body that a special committee of seven brethren be appointed to draft plans setting forth their ideas as to how state mission work should be conducted, and that said resolution be presented to state convention as the sentiments of this body.

We further recommend the wide-spread dissemination of sound Baptist literature. In this last respect, Baptists should emulate the zeal of their pedobaptist breturen, who fill the homes with their doctrinal catechisms and tracts.

As exponents of the truth, as taught by Baptists, we recommend the Arkansas Baptist, the Foreign Missionary Journal, the Home Field, the Southern Convention Literature, the Baptist Gleaner and the Western Recorder. While the last-named paper is not published in the state, we still feel constrained to give it our hearty recommendation, both on account of its power as a defender of the truth and because of its loyalty to the memory of J. R. Graves, as the great exponent of Baptist faith.

At 7:30 p. m. Eld. W. A. Clark preached a good sermon, on the subject: "Evidences of Regeneration," dwelling at length upon these questions: "Can you call God Father? Do you have any rest from your sins? Do you desire the salvation of others? Do you ever enjoy praying? Are you willing to obey God's commands? Can you forgive trespasses? And do you love the brethren?" After a general hand-shake by the Christians, a number of sinners came forward for prayer. The body then proceeded to business. The committee on ministerial education reported as follows:

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Morality and spirituality are essential requirements for a gospel preacher; but they are not all. Aptness to teach is another essential element in a preacher; and to natural aptness, needs to be added correct knowledge of things to teach, as a basis upon which to apply his natural aptness. God demands of His servants the acquirement of this knowledge. The unlearned are called, but they must learn. Jesus called fishermen from Galilee's shores, but for three years they were His pupils, His learners, His disciples. When God called for Israel a leader, "he was a man learned in all the wisdom of the Egyptians." When He wanted a Paul for the Gentiles, He took him from Gama iel's feet. Today He

wants preparation, and the best preparation possible, to every one of His called servants. He does not require of us more than our ability; but He does require that much. There was a time when it was beyond our ministers to get more than a common school education, if even that; and God blessed, and is still blessing those faithful old soldiers in preaching the gospel. But will His blessings be showered so copiously upon young preachers of equal ability if they do not take advantage of their enlarged opportunities? We believe not; because, neglect on their part to improve would be unfaithfulness to Jesus. For some, we, as an Association, have made opportunities, which have been improved. Now, others of great promise are needing our support. Shall we give help, and enhance their opportunities to increase their abilities—and, hence, their obligations? We especially recommend Eld. J. N. Lawless, a brother of great promise, and now in Ouachita College, to be continued the beneficiary of this body during the continuation of his studies in Ouachita College.

The committee on Orphan's Home reported as follows:

ORPHAN'S HOME.

The Baptist Orphan's Home is a creature of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. In 1894 Sister Hannah Hyatt Gardner, realizing the great need of a home in which to gather our orphan chiidren, to feed, clothe, educate, and train for Christ and business, gave eighty acres of land, on which was erected a six-room brick building. In this small building there are twenty-six children. The managers of the home cannot receive the many who need the home, on account of no room.

This Baptist institution and the helpless children within her walls are wholly dependent on the denomination for support. We must build. We cannot go further without more room. There are now twenty-six children in three rooms.

The board of trustees have dedided to erect a four-thousand-dollar building, consisting of sixteen rooms, which, no doubt, will be ample room for several years to come. They now have two thousand dollars on hand; and they turn, with prayerful hearts, to the great brotherhood, asking and expecting two thousand more, that they may finish the building in course of construction. It is the policy of the board not to create debts.

The matron of the nome, Sister Gardnes, gives all her time and attention to the home, without compensation.

We recommend that each church in this association take at least one collection during this associational year for our Orphan's Home.

HOME MISSIONS.

BRO. MODERATOR:—We, your Committee on Home Missions, report as follows:—The territory including, as it does, the destitute portions of the entire South, with Cuba and Porto Rico, has in it a number of large cities, in which the needs are great, besides the needy country districts.

New Orleans, for example—a city of 300,000 inhabitants, has in it 55 Baptist churches, of which ALL are white but 52, and of the other three but one is self-supporting. In Cuba, the field is white with ripening grain, and almost nothing being done, for the lack of funds, whilst in Porto Rico there is practically nothing going on.

We recommend that one Sonday in November be set apart by the churches of this association for a sermon on home missions and a collection for this great work.

Your committee would recommend that the members of this association preach against, pray against, vote against and work against the whisky traffic. Hoping that the time will come when every member of our association will be openly and outspoken against intemperance.

We would further recommend that we totally abstain from narcotics and all other things injurious to ourselves and our fellows.
