

OFFICERS.

ELDER M. D. BOWERS, Moderator, Pocahontas, Ark. ELDER CHAS. T. ARNETT, Clerk, Mammoth Spring, Ark.

Next session to be held with Pocahontas Church, Pocahontas, Randolph County, Arkansas, commencing on Saturday before the fourth Sunday in Septemter, 1902. ing arrived for the election of permanent officers to serve for the ensuing associational year. It was moved and seconded that the present moderator and clerk be elected by acclamation. The motion prevailed.

A call was then made for the reception of messengers from the corresponding sister associations, to which the following brethren responded and were given a hearty welcome, and invited to seats with the body, in its deliberations, to wit: Rev. J. L. Brown, from Independence association; Prof. W. L. Buck, Independence association; Rev. E. T. Lincoln, State Line association; Rev. B. T. Holford, White River Valley association. (See Appendix II.)

On call for reception of visiting brethren, Elder Kime of the Arkansas Baptist; Elder W. W. Gardner of the Arkansas Baptist Orphans' Home; Elder R. C. Medaris, State Evangelist; Elder D. E. Hunt, Powhattan, Ark., and Elder S. H. Clements, of Spring River Association being present, upon invitation to sit with the body their names were enrolled. (See Appendix III.)

On call for letters from churches petitioning for admission into the Association, a letter was presented from Buffalo church, Sedgwick, Ark. On motion, the church was received into the Association and the names of her messengers were enrolled. (See Appendix I.) This church had been received into the Association at its meeting one year ago, provided that their letter and report be sent in at once, but as they failed to send them in, the matter went over to this session. The moderator then appointed Bros. W. M. Raney, A. D. Peacock and J. C. Penn, the messengers from Jerusalem Church, as committee on Divine Service.

The next business in order was the reading of the annual circular letter. Bro. Chas. T. Arnett having been chosen last session for this purpose, proceeded to read the same, upon the subject of: "The enmity of the natural heart, a main cause of the want of ministerial success." After remarks of encomium and praise by several of the brethren, on motion, the letter was unanimously adopted and ordered printed in the minutes

of the Association and the brother requested to furnish a copy to the Arkansas Baptist for publication. (See appendix XII.)

The committee on Divine Service announced that Bros. J. F. Butler, and E. T. Lincoln would preach at night at 7:30 and Bros. Holford and Hunt af 11 o'clock Sunday.

Upon motion, the moderator appointed as a Sunday school committee, Bros. Chas. T. Arnett, J. W. Tibbles and T. J. Moore, (see Appendix IV,) who were requested to make their roport by 9:30 Sunday a. m. and to take charge of and conduct a Sunday school rally. He was granted further time for the appointment of the other committees.

Upon motion, which was carried, the regular order of business was suspended for the purpose of electing time and place for the next session of the Association, for the one to deliver the introductory sermon, and to write the circular letter. Bros. Medaris, Kime and Brown were appointed to hold the election, which was then held, and Pocahontas, was chosen as the place, and Saturday before the 4th Sunday in September, 1902, as the time. Bro. J. F. Butler was chosen to preach the introductory permon, with Bro. R. B. Bellamy as alternate. Bro. R. B. Bellamy was chosen to write the circular letter.

Announcements were then made and after prayers led by Bio. Kime, the body adjourned until Sunday morning, September 22.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 22.

The Association reassembled at 9:30 a. m. The moderator, Bro. M. D. Bowers, read as a Jesson, the 150th Psalm. Prayer by Rev. D. E. Hunt.

Reading of the minutes of the previous sessions was deferred until Monday morning. The moderator then announced his appointments, for the remaining committees. (See Appendix IV.)

The hour having arrived for the consideration of the Sunday School work, Bro. Chas. T. Arnett, as chairman of the Sunday School committee read the report. (See Appendix VIII.) A motion was then made to adopt the report and discharge the committee. Bro. Ch.s. T. Arnett, then spoke to

the motion, first reading from the 6th chapter, 6 9 verses of Deut, and the 54th chapter and 13th verse of Isaiah, for the pur pose of showing the authority for Sunday schools. He insisted That Sunday School work is not a childish institution, but is one of the mightiest agencies of the churches for all, and that su perintendents and teachers in Baptist Sunday Schools should be Christians, for the example of these officers have much to do with the lives of the pupils, and in bringing them to Christ. It is very hard for a dancing teacher to look one of her pupils in the eye, and ask if they are ready to give their heart to Christ, or a whisky-drinking superintendent to talk to the pupils about their salvation.

Bro. D. E. Hunt endorsed the report heartily and spoke of the great good that Sunday Schools were doing in putting good literature into the hands of the people. Bro. Kime said it was his desire to give his hearty approval and endorsement of the report; he spoke of the cuties of Pastors toward the young people, and especially in Sunday School work. He called attion to the difference in the churches having schools and those not. How it helped them not only spiritually, but financially. Bro. Hodge spoke along the line of the greatness of this work, and its instrumentality in his own conversion. Bro. Tibbles. told of his work in the past year, how he was stimulated to it, by the report on Sunday School work at last session, of this. Association of the churches being so dilatory in their duties. This year, he was able to come up with a report of a fine, wellconditioned school with over 125 members, and 21 conversions from it.

The hour of 11 having arrived, the time set for preaching, the Sunday School work was postponed until 1:30 p. m.

The committee on divine service reported that Bro. Chas. T. Arnett had been selected to preach at 3 o'clock p. m.

Bro. Holford then took charge of the meeting, and called upon Bro. N. R. Townsend for prayer, after which he preached a grand sermon, full of power, pathos and spirituality from the 4th verse of the 60th Psalm, "Thou hast given a banner to them that fear Thee, that it may be displayed because of the

truth." He said that in opposition to this banner of truth and love washed in the Blood of the Lamb, stood the arch fiend, under the blank banner of hell, and that every one who had put on the armor of God, should be ready to go forth to combat the power of evil and sin, in the name of Jesus Christ and with His pirit our work for his cause should be aggressive and progress-That what we need are men and women true and earnest in this work of God. He also said in this connection that a shurch with preaching only once a conth, and without a prayer moeting or Sunday School was like the moon that shines but mee a month. He preached to Jerusalem church thirty-five vours ago. Bro. Hunt in closing the services stated that it was under the ministry of Bro. Holford that he began his ministry and that the name of Bro. Holford appeared upon his credenthats. Services were then closed with the singing of the song, "When the roll is called up vonder,"

Notice was then given that there was a bountiful supply of provisions, etc., on the grounds for everybody.

RECESS.

1:80 p. m.—On re-assembling prayer was offered by Bro. Hodge. The committee on divine service reported that Bro. N. R. Townsend had been selected to preach at 7:30 p. m. to be followed by Bro. R. B. Bellamy.

The Sunday School discussion was then resumed by Bro. J. O. Penn. He said he was heartly in accord with the report, and all its recommendations. He told of his experience the mut year in Sunday School work, which we hope, may prove helpful to others, in inspiring them to go work. Bro. J. F. Hutler in his remarks emphasized the grand work done by Mt. View and Union churches in their schools the past year. showed how it had not only revived the churches but the entire community. Bro. Marshal fully endorsed the report and told of the work done by his school. Bro. Jno. P. Webb favored the report and spoke in behalf of the "one talent persons." Hro. W. W. Gardner then closed the discussion. He said he had heard more talk today on Sunaay School work than he had eyer in his life before, in any association, state convention of Southern Baptist convention, and he hoped that it would not end in talk, but, that what had been said and dene would so encourage all, that next year every church in the Association would be able to report a good healthy, zealous school. The report was unanimously and enthusiastically adopted. (See Appendix VIII.)

Bro. Kime announced that churches desiring to start school would be furnished literature free, either by the Sunday School board of the Southern Baptist Convention, or the American Baptist Publication Society. Bro. Arnett then announced that The Baptist Evangel would present to the church showing the largest percentage of gain in membership, during the year 1902, a fine banner. A recess was then taken for ten minutes.

The time having arrived for preaching the audience was called together by the singing of the hymn, "Standing on the Promises." Prayer was then offered by Bro. E. T. Lincoln, after which that grand old missionary hymn, "From Greenland's Icy Mountains," was sung by the whole congregation. Bro. Chas. T. Arnett then preached from the following texts: Psalms 24-1; Dent. 10-14, and 1 Cov. 10-26 upon the subject of Missions and the duty of God's children to give liberally of their means, for the promulgation of the gospel and the salvation of souls. After the sermon Bro. Kime invoked the biessing of Almighty God upon the Association. Upon motion unanimously adopted, Bro. Arneit was requested to have his sermon published in full in the Arkansas. Baptist, for the benefit of the Baptist hosts of Arkansas. A recess was then taked until 7:30 p. m.

At this hour the body reassembled and after singing, was led in prayer by Bro. R. B. Bellamy. Bro. N. R. Townsend read the 11th chapter of 1st Corinthians, regarding church ordinances and the reception of the Lord's Supper. He then seselected as a text the 41st verse of the 2d chapter of Acts. His subject was the Lord's Supper." This was a very strong door trinal sermon and placed before the people in very plain

terms, the Baptist belief in what is usually termed close communion. The sermon was well received by the people, and many praises expressed for such grand truths as set forth by the brother. He said that the design of the Lord's Supper was for two things, viz; first to show forth the Lord's death, and 2d, Till He come. He said that the Lord's Supper was not instituted as a feast of good fellowship or as a memorial of those partaking of it but as a memorial of our Lord Jesus Christ, hence only one thought should be in the minds of the participants; the broken body of Christ and His shed blood, for the remission of sins-our individual sins, not those of our neighbor, nor those of a neighboring church. We should follow the practice of the apostles, they first taught, second the people received the word with gladness; third were baptized; fourth honored their profession; fifth observed the Lord's Supper; sixth attended prayer meeting and took upon themselselves the duties and obligations of the Christian life. Bro. Bellamy then s, oke to the people along the same line clin hing the argument as it were, of Bro. Townsend. After prayer by Bro. Holford, adjourned until Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

MONDAY SEPTEMBER 23, 1901

Moderator, Bro. Bowers, fread for the morning lesson 29 verses of the 15th chapter of Acts. Prayer by Bro. R. B. Bellamy. The roll was then called and the following messengers responded to their names. (See Appendix I)

The Clerk then read the minutes of the 21st and 22nd which upon motion were adopted. On renewal of call for reception of letters from churches; letters from Hardy church were presented and read and the names of their messengers and alternates were enrolled. (See Appendix I.)

Bro. W. M. Johnson, a messenger from Big Creek church was present, and stated that the clerk for some cause had failed to send their letter, but upon his return home he would send it to the clerk of the Association. Upon motion, his name was ordered enrolled with the messengers, (See Appendix I) and the clerk was requested, to enter upon the Minutes, the report from said church when received.

On call for visiting brethien, Bro. N. R. Landers, from Independence association, responded and was invited to sit with •the body, and his name was enrolled. (See Appendix III)

The report of the committee on the state of the church submitted its report, which was read and on motion adopted. (See appendix VIII, sub division 2.)

The committee on destitution submitted its report, which was adopted. Brothers T. C. Mahan, J. F. Butler, E. T. Lincoln and D. C. Lee spoke to this motion asking that, the territory of this Association in Randolph county be more clearly defined. (See Appendix VIII, sub division 3.)

The committee on orphans' home was read and after discussion by Bros. W. W. Gardner, f. C. Mahan and J. F. But ler, it was adopted, and a collection was then taken up for the Home amounting to \$21.15. (Appendix VIII, sub. 15.)

The report on Associational missions, was then called for and read, and after a lengthy discussion by Bros. N. R. Townsend, Chas. T. Arnett, T. C. Mahan, J. F. Butler, C. Hodge. R. C. Medaris, J. M. Applegate and Jno. P. Webb, the report was adopted. (See Appendix VIII, sub 5.)

RECESS FOR DINNER.

The body then took a recess until 1:30 for dinner, of which there was a bountiful supply upon the grounds, and which seemed to be greatly enjoyed by the people.

At 1:30 p. m.—Upon reassembling, Bro. R. C. Medaris made an appeal in behalf of Pocahontas church for contributions to buy chairs. Pledges were made for \$16.25.

The committee on State missions presented their report, which after spirited discussion by Bros. N. R. Townsend, Chas. T. Arnett, T. C. Mahan, D. E. Hun', Elder Kime, J. F. Butler and J. W. Tibbles was adopted. (See Appendix VIII, sub division 6.)

The clerk then read the report on home missions which was unanimously adopted without discussion. (See Appendix VIII sub division 7.)

The report on foreign missions was read and adopted without discussion. (See appendix VIII, subdivision 8)

The committee on education, presented their report, which was adopted after discussion by Brother N. R. Townsend, Arnelt, Moore and Butler. (See Appendix VIII, sub divis. 9.)

The report on Baptist literature, was read, and discussed at length by Bros. Kime, Medaris, Mahan, Hunt, J. C. Penn, Webb and Holford, after which it was adopted. (See Appendix VIII, sub division 10.)

The committee on prohibition presented their report, which was unanimously adopted. (See appendix VIII, sub 11.)

The committee on correspondence reported; report adopted. (See appendix VIII, sub division 12)

The committee on finance reported and the report was adopted. (See Appendix VIII, subdivision 13.)

The secretary and treasurer of the associational board reported and his report was adopted. (See appendix 9.)

The associational missionary filed his report which was read, and adopted. (See appendix XIII.)

The committee on ministerial directory presented their report which was adopted. (See Appendix VIII, sub division 14.

The report of J. H. Townsend, the associational clerk, was presented for the past year which was adopted. (See Appendix X.)

The query of Pleasant Hill church, "What does it take to constitute a Baptist Sunday School," was answered as follows:

A Sunday School under control of a regular Missionary Baptlet church is a Baptist Sunday School.

The following resolutions were presented read, and adopted as follows.

- 1. Thanking Jerusalem Church for its hospitalities during the present session.
- 2. Authorizing the printing of the minutes of the proceedings of the present session.
- 8. Recommending prominence of Sunday School work be given in our Fifth Sunday meetings.
- 4. Thanking Sunday School Board Southern Baptist Convention and State Mission Board for donations and courtesies during the year.

5. Making The Baptist Evangel and Prohibition Tocsir, the official paper, for associational matters, during the year. (Appendix XI.)

On motion the moderator was instructed to appoint messengers to corresponding sister associations; messengers to Arkansas Baptist State Convention; one messenger to Southern Baptist Convention; five members of the associational mission board; one member of the state mission board. [See Appendix V.]

A motion was made and carried that \$10 be appropriated from any funds on hand, belonging to the associational mission fund for payment of work done by Bro. N. C. Danner.

A motion was then made and carried that the clerk of the board pay Bro. C. Hodge balance due him.

Miss Bessie Anderson from Pocahontas church turned over to the clerk \$1.05 for ministerial education, to be sent to Rev. J. K. Pace.

A resolution was presented and unanimously adopted, to appoint all committees, before adjourning, to hold over until next session [See Appendix XI.]

The moderator then appointed the following standing committees. [See Appendix XVI.]

A resolution was presented, read and adopted, thanking the moderator and clerk for their faithful service at this session.

It was moved and seconded that the body adjourn to meet with Pocahontas church, in Randolph county. Arkansas, on Saturday before the Fourth Sunday in September, 1902. After prayer led by Bro. N. R. Townsend, the entire audience joined in singing, "God Be With You Till We Meet Again." During the singing the brothers and sisters extended to each other the parting hand, and as the tears rolled down the cheeks of many, all fully realized, that many of them would never meet again, until they meet in the New Jerusalem, around the great white throne, where throughout the ceaseless ages, all will join in unending praises to the Lamb that was slain.

4. SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your committee on Sunday Schools respectfully and prayerfully report as follows: Upon examination we find that of the 30 churches making reports, 16 only have maintained Sunday Schools during the past year, a gain however of four churches over 1900. The churches which have maintained schools the past year are Hopewell, Ebenezer, Black Rock, Evergreen, Imboden, Walnut Ridge, Mt. View, Walnut Grove, Union, Shiloh, Pocahontas, Pleasant Hill, Alicia, Calamine, Bold Spring, Swifton. We

find that the baptisms in these churches amount to 119, while the church-14 in number reporting no schools, have had only 58 baptisms, thus proving conclusively that churches, that are interested in the teaching of the children are the most prosperous, therefore it behooves every child of flad to be about his Master's business. The Sunday School is an indisnameable phase of the church in Christian work, in the white harvest fields home and in all lands. Brethren let us be true to our opportunities, there is no doubt God will make your sarvice helpful to others, if you will unly make a determination to obey his command, "Go teach all nations." Children and youth are in an unformed condition. They are open to influence. They are responsive to our touch. We can to a good degree make them what we will. Brethren, there is a real need to the churches of the benefit of this work, just to think that there are 32,000 Baptist thurches and only 16,000 Sunday Schools in our great country. And what is that humiliating deficiency, but a divine voice to each person calling themselves Christians? What is it but a new call to you and a convincing argument for the crying need of this great work especially in our own Association. And this demand should ever remain as "frontlets mfore our eyes," to shame us and to inspire us with Christly zeal and enthuslasm till there is a Sunday School in every church, using not a compromise literature either but Baptist inculcating Baptist doctrine and Bapthat principle. Evidences of Sunday School usefulness abound everywhere. The fruits of the work, as gathered by the churches have been so shundant and abiding in character, so intensely good and so extensively bupeficial to the culture of the home, the college, society, and the world minerally that the influence of it cannot be overestimated. The Sunday achool is a missionary education. Its threefold service of teaching, savlow and training all for Christian work has a charm all its own. It is said In missionary history and literature that the majority of ministers in, America received their first impressions of religion from Sunday Schools and that nine-tenths of the missionarys of Great Britain and this country to heathen lands, received their missionary impulses from it. We would recommend that in addition to the literature of the Southern Baptist Conwantion that Sunday Schools adopt for primary classes some good illustraand chart. Another great help to Sunday Schools is the Home department, where those who are not so situated can be induced to study the lowerns at home, at the same time the assemble schools are studying it. the greatest, most encouraging and helpful things about the Home department, is that it encourages Bible reading and Bible study. There are other objects, but this is the great one. Everybody studying the lible means the world for Christ, The Sunday School like the Christ we live will destroy the schools of in quity, the march of crime, and the works of the evil one. It will save our land from its enemies, alve light to those who sit in moral darkness and spiritual death, and guide the feet of American youth and maidens of every section into the ways of purity, temperance, and virtue. 15. ORPHANS HOME.

The Arkansas Baptist Orphans Home has 80 acres of land, a good home to which additions have been made, and is now caring for forty-three children There is no indebtedness, and the policy of its board is to allow none. The policy of the house is to retain its inmates to the age of 18 years or over before placing them in other homes. We believe the home finding policy far better, and deplore the present management to that extent. We believe heart and sole in this work and recognize its claims upon every Bap tist but if a judicious plan could be adopted by which children would be placed in good Baptist homes where they would receive real home life, it would be better for them, and at the same time enable us to help many more at the same expense. We recommend that our Association petition the State Convention to change the policy of the home so that the children coming under its control shall be placed in good Baptist homes as speedily as they can be found willing to receive them to the end, that a greater number of orphans may be cared for with the same means, and that our orphans may thus have actual home life and training as other children.

APPENDIX XII.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

The enmity of the Natural Heart, a Main Cause of the Want of Ministerial Success.

The office of the christian ministry might seem to command a successful issue of the work. It is the "ministry of reconciliation," when the offended party stoops to make the first evertures of peace, and sends his embassadors to beseen by them and pray the rebels in his stead "be ye reconciled to God," 2 Cor. V. 18-20. Such a display of disinterested condescension, infinite humility and compassionate tenderness might have been expected to give resistless efficacy to the message. The rich fruits of everlasting love are brought to the door of those who are most deeply interested in it and whose need of the blessing is inexpressibly great. Such a promulgation of mercy given to men in guileless igonorance and urgent need would meet with a ready and universal welcome. But here it meets with a resisting medium. The avenues of approach are barred against its entrance, and the success is limited within comparatively narrow bounds. By the terms of the commission, it is "pre ched to every creature," Mark 16, 15, but the disproportionate effect reminds us of the solemn and sententious declaration, "many be called but few chosen." Mat. 20 16. If indeed we were as "many which corrupt the word of God," if we would lower its requisitions to a worldly standard or to a corrupt heart, we should "have our reward" Gal. 1 7-10. (purchased indeed at an infinite cost) in the praises of men. But if "as of sincerity as of God, in the sight of God, we speak in Christ" 2Cor. 2 17, renouncing the hidden things of dishonesty; not walking in craftmess, nor handling the word of God deceitfully, but by manifestation of the truth concerning ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God, we must not wonder to hear it repeated, I hate him for he doth not prophesy good concerning me but evil. 1 Kings 22.8. Nor is this opposition confined to the world, so called. In the professing church a revulsion against the truth of God as a whole, marks the same principle of resistance to the practical cuffice ment of christian doctrine. And indeed whoever pricks the conscience of his hearers closely, without producing repentance, will soon find them either absentees from his ministry, or unwilling listeners if not open opponents. Thus a ministers whole course is a struggle against the mighty current of sin flowing out of that restless bias of the natural heart which upon the highest authority is declared to be enmity against God. (Rom. 8 7.) This hindrance therefore to the reception of the gospel must not be placed to the ministers account. Ignorance, eccentricity, inconsistency, want of conciliation and address, will indeed be an occasion of calling forth this enmity. A defective exhibition of the spirit of the cross greatly aggravates the offense of the cross. But it must be remembered, that the ministration of the gospel from an angel's mouth would stir up the natural principle of degenerate man. What could be conceived more attractive than the combination of dignity, humility, patience and love that marked the ministry of the Son of God? Yet was it universally despised and rejected. His doctrine was most offensive, to the natural

judices of the unbumbled heart. His general statements were listened in with interest of curiosity and the desire of "hearing some new things," but their personal application to the consciences of his hearers-the cerwill reproach of his cross, the relinquishment of all that was held dear, Illis service—the prostrate submission required for the reception of truth -- all combined to produce the "murmuring among themselves;" the complaint of the intolerable "hardness of his sayings," and the resolulittlen to abandon their temporary profession. (John 6 24, 26.) The inale apposition existing between the substance and the object of the minlatry, offers therefore a material impetiment to ou, success. We speak to whose attention is already preoccupied, whose affections have been long preengaged and whose "bearts are hardened through the deceitfulof sin," the truth therefore never comes in contact with a sincere and heart. Enmity is the concentrated essence of man's depravity.
