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

MINUTES

OF THE

Thirty-Fourth Annual Session of the Gainesville Missionary Baptist Association

Held With Union Grove Church, Greene County, Arkansas, October 24, 25, 26, 1904

OFFICERS: Moderator, J. D. J. Faulkner, Crowley; Clerk, R. H. Dudley, Piggott; T. L. B. Thorn, Treasurer, Gainesville

The next session will be held with Pleasant Grove Church, Finch, Greene County, Ark., Commencing on Friday before the Fourh Sunday in Oct., 1904.

PROCEEDINGS

Union Grove Missionary Baptist Church, October 24, 1903; Saturday, 1st day. As announced in the closing session of 1902, Elder J. S. Rogers appeared and from the later part of St. John 4, 35, preached the introductory sermon. A more eloquent, forceful and feeling sermon is rarely ever heard, and the success of the Thirty-Fourth session of the Association is largely due to the interest aroused by this matchless discourse.

The body then adjourned until 1:30 for dinner, which had been prepared on the ground. Benediction pronounced by Eler J. H. Wade.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment; and the former moderator being absent, the clerk, Brother Henry Holcomb, called the body to order. Whereuvon, on motion of Brother W. J. Johnson, Elder J. D. J. Faulkner was made temporary modertor. Roll of churches having representation in the body was called for and twenty-nine responded. (See statement.) On motion the body went into permanent organization, resulting in the election of Elder J D J Faulkner, of Crowley, moderator, R H Dudley, of Piggott, clerk, and Elder T L B Thorn, of Gainesville, treasurer. After the permanent organization was completed, those elected asked that the entire Association bow and pray for their faithful, earnest and efficient performance of duty.

Petitionary letters were called for and one responded, as follows: Wanderer's Home, and on motion was received and messengers seated.

Visiting brethren and corresponding messengers were invited to seats, and responded as follows: Elder Thomas Williams, Jonesboro, R L Williams, Jonesboro, Elder I O Siler, Walnut Ridge, Elder J M Huddleston, Paragould, Elder A B Bohannan, Paragould, Elder W W Gardner, Monticello, Elder Harvey Beauchamp, Little Rock, and W G Johnson, Walcott.

The moderator appointed Elders E D Cooper and J S Rogers reading clerks. The letters of the various churches represented were passed to the reading clerks and by them read and filed with the clerk.

The appointment of the following committees was announced: Divine Service, Elder G H Faulkner and the deacous of Union Grove church: Arrangements, J A Smith, V A Phillips and J B Walden; Ministerial Education, J S Rogers, Henry Holcomb and James Denniston ; Foreign Missions, E D Cooper, J H Wade and Tom Rogers; Home Missions, E J Teague, J S Newsom and JT Tyler; State and Associational Missions, LA Russell, J J Burton and W R Underwood; Sunday Schools, Ovid Wilcockson, Chapel Rogers and W J Johnson; Temperance, TLB Thorn, MB Wright, JA Hooks and HH Cole; Publication, D L Fitzgirald, H B Wright, G H Faulkner and Henry Holcomb; Orphan's Home, J S Rogers, W W Gardner and Will Russell; Prayermeetings, J P French, Frank Burton, Geo. Kirby and F M Wimberly; Pastors and Churches, W W Yopps, Oscar Hammetts and Frank Brewer; Obitnaries, B A Johnson, Will Gossett and J H Wade; Finance, V A Phillips, Minton Hancline and G W Hopper; Ministers and Postoffices, W J Nicholas E A Barton and Joe A Thompson.

The following resolution was introduced by V A Phillips and unanimously adopted : Be It Resolved :

First, we will not tolerate those who come among us and try to stir up strife and division. Second, That no report

which has for its purpose the endorsement of the State Convenvention or General Association be considered by this body.

The committee appointed on divine service made the following report:

Elder J S Rogers would conduct Sunday School mass meeting at 10 a.m. on Sunday the 25th

Elder J T Tyler would preach at 7:30 p.m. Sunday the 25th.

After the messengers were assigned homes, upon motion, the body adjourned until 7 p. m. Benediction by I O Syler.

NIGHT SESSION, 7 P. M

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. L. A: Russell failed to appear and E D Cooper was called upon by the committee to preach at the night service. As usual Brother Cooper preached a very excellent sermon; profundly eloquent, logical and spiritual.

On motion the body adjourned until 9:30 Sunday the 25th. Benediction by J T Tyler.

SUNDAY. 9:30 A. M. SECOND DAY.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment; present as on yesterday. And after devotional exercises, Sunday school mass meeting was conducted by J. S. Rogers; and many very valuable points brought out by the different speakers who discussed the subjects. Following this the committee on Sunday schools made their report, which was as follows:

The various avocations of life demand a strict adherence to the doctrines and precepts of God. The awakening of man to a higher sense of the grave duties and responsibilities imposed upon him by Omnipotence, readily conspires to explain the growing necessity of youthful training along sound gospel lines. The crying need of the church of the present century is for the maintenance of an auxillary, capable of imparting to the youthful minds a pure unbiased knowledged of Jesus Christ. Undoubtedly the Sunday school has played an important part in the fostering of this knowledge and the carrying out of these righteous intentions.

To secure further the numerous benefits hitherto desired from the Sunday school, we, your committee, would recommend that the numerous churches maintaining said schools; should concern themselves first in procuring a sound Baptist literature (such as published by the Sunday school board of the S. B. C. or A. B. P. S.,) and the rendering of every effort possible for the furtherance of the work. We would further recommend that the various churches composing Gainesville Association use their best endeavors to maintain good Sunday schools for all children or grades.

Brethren, our churches will not grow, our people will not be instructed, our children will not be brought up as they ought to be unless we maintain a Sunday school from Association to Association We further urge our pastors to get our churches that have no Sunday schools to organize them at once and that they encourage the work by their presence, and by their visit to members. We would urge also that our schools select well qualified teachers who will be regular and prompt in attendance. Respectfully,

At 11:30 W W Gardner preached a very fine sermon from Matthew 1, 21; after which a collection amounting to \$42 70 was taken for Associational Missions. On motion the body adjourned until 2:30 for dinner. Benediction by W W Gardner.

EVENING SESSION, 2:30 P M

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. And after singing and prayer, I O Syler of Walnut Ridge preached one of the most eloquent and scholarly sermons ever heard, from Genesis 5, 24. Body led in prayer by J S Rogers, after which a collection was taken for the Orphans Home amounting to \$31 18.

On motion the body stood adjourned until 7:30. Closing prayer by J D J Faulkner.

NIGHT SESSION, 25, 7:30 P M

The body met and after singing and prayer, Elder J T Tyler, that consecrated and Godly man, preached the most feeling sermon of the session, from the latter part of 22d verse of the 1st chapter of Mark. At no time during the meeting was there manifested so great an interest as was had after this sermon. The moderator urged all committees to report promptly Monday morning. Benediction was pronounced by J T Tyler, and body adjourned to meet at 8:30 a. m. Monday, 26.

8:30 A M MONDAY, THIRD DAY

The body met promptly at 8:30 and after being led in prayer by J H Wade, resumed business.

The clerk read the proceedings of Saturday, the first day, which was accordingly approved.

On motion J H Renfro was seated as a correspoding messenger. The committee on Pastors and Churches made the following report:

We have twenty-nine churches reported by letters and messengers and twenty report Sunday schools, showing an increase in Sunday school work of twenty-one per cent over last year. We wish to recommend that all the churches organize Sunday schools and maintain same next year. We find that the churches are living beneath their privileges and obligations in regard to Sunday schools and prayermeetings. We find that there is not a church within the bounds of the Association that has a paster for more than one-fourth time. We believe that there are churches in our Association that need and are able to support a pastor for one-half time, and should do so. We further find that the salary of many of the pastors is entirely to low. It should be sufficient for his support, so that he could devote his entire time to the work of the Master. We therefore recommend that the messengers of the different churches try to awaken a greater interest and liberality in this line; that our pastors may be better prepared to do the work. We further recommend that this Association assist any church that needs assistance in supporting a pastor. Respectfully submitted,

Comes the committee on Ministerial Education and make the following report:

The time has passed when it was a question whether a minister of the gospel ought to be educated. The educational advantages of our faithful old fathers iu Israel were very much limited, and yet God blessed their work, and we bonor them for their work. But with the advantages we now have we cannot expect God's richest blessings unless we make good use of our opportunities. Morality and spirituality are the first qualifications of a good gospel preacher, but to these we must adda well trained mind. It certainly requires an educated intellect to understand and present clearly the greatest of all truths-God's Word. "Aptness to teach," says St Paul, "Is an essential requirement in a preacher." And this aptness can surely be heightened by mental training. Jesus taught his preachers, the apostles, three years before he felt that they were prepared for the great work. To lead Israel to the promised land, God called a man "learned in all the ways of the Egyptians." He calls the unlearned, but he expects them to learn. It ought to be a telling rebuke to us, that in some parts of the country the churches are advancing more rapidly than the preachers. Te meet the demands of this day, our preachers must be educated. Men and women of intelligence are in the congregation. Who shall be in the pulpit? We are proud of the young ministers we have. Those who are not in school should be encouraged to go: while those in school ought to be encouraged to continue. We would urge all our young preachers to attend Outhita college, and if possible, the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. In Ouchita we have Ed Cook, while in Paragould we have Ovid Wilcockson, Dailas Faulkner and Chapel Rogers; we must help these brethren. We would recommend that a cash collection be taken and that pledges be made by the churches and individuals present for this purpose. We would urge that the pledges be made much larger than usual, that we may encourage as far

as possible the preaching of the saving gospel of Jesus Christ,

The committee on Foreign Missions reported as follows:

Foreign Missions is a very important and extensive part of our work. It is God's will that all nations hear the gospel and that all christians share in the privileges and duties of giving the message of life to the perishing of our race. Practically, we are redeemed that we may reveal the Redeemer. It is a source of thanksgiving to us that God has opened wide the windows of heaven and poured out bountiful blessings upon our work the last year. The number of baptisms on the foreign field last year far exceeded any former year, aggregating 1.790 persons The contributions of our home churches indicate a marked increase of christian activity on the part of the people. It reached the encouraging amount of \$218521.62 A larger number of churches and a greater proportion of members are giving than, perhaps, ever before. Many individuals are contributing enough money to support a missionary; and the mission cause, so dear to the Son of God, is being remembered by the generous, God-fearing and man loving baptists of our land. Our force of workers on the foreign field is growing rapidly, there being at present 319 employed by the Southern Baptist Convention; 127 missionaries and 192 native assistants. But what are these, among so many, who know not the true God? Dear brethren, behind us is the command of Christ, before us is a rich harvest field and the workers on foreign fields continue to call for more workers. Will any brother or lover of the great Redeemer say I do not believe in foreign misssions? Respectfully submitted,

In 1894 Hannah Hyatt gave the church at Monticello, Arkansas all her real estate, 80 ac res, upon which to build an Orphans Home for all the destitute orphans of the state. There has been enrolled in all 68. 6 have died and 5 have grown up and gone out into the world upon their own responsibility, taking with them their church letter, leaving now in the Home 57 children. Fifteen of these have been baptised and are now members of the Baptist church at Monticello. 16 of the number enrolled are from Greens county, a larger number than from any other county in the state. In the past year the home has done well and we feel grateful for it. We hope that the coming year it may continue to succe d in the great work, and we all pledge our hearty support and help in making this one of

MISSIONARY'S REPORT

Dear Brethren: I herewith submit the following report for the time I have worked as Missionary for the Association. At the request of the board I have devoted one-fourth of the time to work at Brighton; also preached at Bertig and Big Island until April 20, when the board employed me for full time at \$45.00 per manth:

Miles travalled, 1095; sermons preached, 134; religious visits, 384; baptised, 6; prayers in homes, 79; number conversions, 42; Sunday schools organized, 5; number of meetings assisted pastor in, 9; baptised from these meetings, 36; meetings held in destitute places, 5. Supplied the following places: Jones Hage, Brighton. Bertig, Walls Chapel, Evening Star and Bock Springs.
