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The Caddo River Missionary Baptist Association met at liberty Church according to agreement, the 10th day of Sepmber A. D. 1892.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elders D. T. Driggers and D. Bright, from 2nd verse 2nd ch. of 1st. Cor. Iosing prayer by Eld. J. H. Collins. Adjourned until 3 p. m.

At 3 o'clock p. m., the body came together by singing. The Moderator (Eld. J. J. Hughes) read the 16th hymn, "Evergreen" and 52nd Psalm, and after singing offered prayer. The dy now being ready for business the letters from the various

churches were called for. Brethren J. N. Wasson, D. S. P. Black and Eld. J. H. Collins were appointed to read the letter from the following named churches: Caney Valley, Mt. Zion New Home, Antioch, Mt. Ida, Macedonia, Providence, Valley Mountain Home, Union, Black Springs, Forrest Hill, Salem Pleasant Valley, Mt. Pisgah, Mt. Moriah, Bethel, Bethlehem Mt. Pleasant, Liberty, Valley Grove and one new church, vizion Hill, received.

The body next went into the election of officers. Result Eld H. L. Wasson, Moderator, Eld. E. Wright, Clerk and W. F. Willis Treasurer. A. R. Chitwood, John Welch and the messengers of Liberty Church were appointed a preaching committee. Visitors were invited to seats. Corresponding messengers were called for. Response: Bro. J. A. Chitwood was received from Buckvill Association. Bro. E. R. Box from Ouachita Association, and Bros. J. N. Dean and J. W. Jefrey, also Eld. H. C. Ridling, from Red River Association. The body sung No. 4 Evergreen, "Must Jesus Bear the Cross Alone," The Moderator offered prayer and we adjourned, to meet on Monday, the 12th, at 8 o'clock a. m.

The committees were appointed intervening by the Moderator. Monday at 8 o'clock a.m., the body came together. The Moderator read the 6th chapter of Ephesians and after singing of many voices, he offered prayer.

ABSTRACT OF FAITH WITH SCRIPTURAL REFERENCES.

ART. 1st. We believe in one true and living God, the

Word and Holy Gost. 1st John 5th and 7th, John 1st chapter 1st, 2nd and 3rd verse, 1st Tim. 3rd ch 16th verse.

2nd. We believe that the scriptures comprising the old and the new testaments, are the word of God, and the only rule of our faithful practice, 2nd Tim. 2nd ch. 15th and 16th v. 1st Peter 1st ch. 15th v. Rom. 15th ch. 4th verse.

3rd. We believe in the doctrine of election according to the foreknowledge of God the Father through sanctification of the spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesu-Christ. 1st Pe. 1st ch. 2nd verse.

4th. We believe in doctrine of original sin by the foll of Adam. Gen. 3rd ch. 6th and 7th verses, Ps. 57th 6th Rom. 5th ch. 12th and 14th verses.

5th. We believe in man's incapacity by his own frewill and ability, to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature. Isaah 1st ch. 5th and 7th vs. John 6th ch. 44th v. Eph. 2nd ch. 1st verse.

6th. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, by the imputed righteousness of Christ only. Jer. 23rd ch 6th v. Rom. 4th ch. 22nd 24th vs. 1st Cor. 1st ch. 30 verse

7th. We believe that the saints shall be preserved in grace and never fall finally away. Ps. 89th 31-35 vs. Heb. 8th ch 10-11 vs. John 10th ch. 28th verse.

8th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's supper are the the ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects of baptism and that immersion is the Apoltolic mode. Mark 16th ch. 15-16th vs. Acts 2nd ch. 42nd v 1st Cor. 11th ch. 22-26th vs. Acts 8th ch. 38-39th vs. Rom 6th ch. 3-4th verses.

9th. We believe in the ressurrection of the dead; and in a general judgement, and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal. John 3rd 28-27 vs. 1st Cor. 15th ch 22-23rd vs. Rev. 20th ch. I2-14-15th vs.

10. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel, but one who is regularly

presbyter. Math. 28th ch. 19-20th vs. 1st Tim. 3rd ch.

11th. We believe that none but regularly baptised, memhave a right to commune at the Lord's table. Acts 2nd 11st v. 18th ch. 8-IIth verses, 1st Cor. IIth ch. 23-24th ve.

12th. We believe that the Lord's day should be observed day of rest, and religious devotion. Ex 20th ch. 8th v. 20th 7th v. Rev. Ist ch. 10th verse.

The committee appointed to revise the constitution

ARTICLE 1st. This Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union; not excling three members from each church until they number me hundred, then one for each hundred over that number. Which delegates on producing their letter shall be entitled to the theorem. The letter must state their appointment, as delegates. The number baptised, received by letter, dismissed by letter, unluded, restored and total in fellowship.

ART. 2nd. The members thus chosen and convened, shall be denominated, The Caddo River Missionary Baptist a polistion, being composed of Sundry churches in the state of Mansas, who shall have no power to Lord it over God's heritage; nor to have any eclesiostical power over the churches. Referring the right to withdraw from any church acting discovered.

ART. 3rd. Churches in this union that fail to represent themselves at one session will be expected to state the reason of their failure at the next session.

ART. 4th. The Association when convened shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum, which she is authorized to frame and amend according to her own views.

ART. 5th. Churches known to be sound in the faith and otherwise orderly may be admitted to membership in this Assolution upon presenting either a petititionary letter or a letter

ART. 6th. The officers of this Association shall be moderator, clerk, and treasurer, who must be delegates to the Association, and chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present. Said officers shall hold their respective office until their successors are elected.

ART. 7th. It shall be the duty of Moderator to see that the rules are strictly observed, and take the voice of the Association on all subjects legally introduced, and he shall have all the privileges of other members provided the chair be filled but in no case shall he vote, unless the Association be equally divided: Then he shall cast the deciding vote. Provided further that the Moderator may call a meeting of this Association all any time if necessity so require, for the good of the Association

ART. 8th. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this Astociation to keep a regular file of the printed minutes of each session of this body.

ART. 9th. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and handle all monies paid over to him for the use of the Association, subject to her order and pay over the same according to her directions.

ART. 10th Each church in this Union who sends mond for printing minutes, shall be furnished with the minutes of each session.

ART. 11th. Every querry sent up by a particular church must be included in her letter certifying that she has endeavored to reconcile it but failed. In such case the Association shall take it under consideration and the voice of the majority shall be considered an advisory answer which shall be entered on the minutes.

ART. 12th. Any church in our Union having a preached whom she deems worthy of ordination, shall call a presbyter of ministers from sister churches to officiate in the work—never theless where ministerial aid cannot be had conveniently, on

mister may ordain a descon and constitute a church with the

ART. 13th. This Association shall have a fund supplied woluntary contributions of the churches, which fund he paid over to the committee on finance—this committee all be appointed annually—whose duty it shall be to receive the funds of the Association and dispose of them monthly to order and make at every session a fair and circumstal report, of their proceedings.

ART. 14th. The Association shall not adjourn any session all all the business shall have been finished, except in extra-

ART. 15th. The Minutes of every session shall be read corrected if necessary, and signed by the Moderator before Association retires.

ART. 16th. The Association shall in all cases be governed majority of the members present.

ART. 17th. We will not receive or hold in our fellowship member or church who holds a membership who has never baptised by a baptist.

ART. 18th. Amendments to this constitution may be body at any session of this body when a majority of the mempresent think it necessary.

ART. 19th. The Association shall have power to adjourn uch further time and and place as it may think proper,


