The Artist

For over three decades, American jazz pianist Joe Utterback has delighted audiences in the United States and Europe with his astonishing virtuosity and deeply personal music-making. A native of Hutchinson, Kansas, he received classical training at Wichita State University and the University of Kansas, where he earned his Doctor of Musical Arts degree. Since his first jazz gig at the Golden Chance Saloon in 1962, he has been heard regularly in concert and in jazz clubs in major jazz centers of St. Louis, Kansas City, San Francisco and New York City.

Utterback's piano style was influenced by such keyboard greats as Bill Evans, Oscar Peterson, Art Tatum and Erroll Garner, and his book, "The Jazz Piano Style of Bill Evans," is a standard reference work. He also counts among his favorites jazz musicians Sarah Vaughan and Charlie Parker.

As a jazz educator, Dr. Utterback founded the jazz piano program at San Francisco State University and currently teaches at Sacred Heart University in Fairfield, Connecticut.

Since 1989, Utterback has built a large catalogue of jazz-influenced compositions which have received over 600 performances in 19 countries. His works for piano, organ, voice, chorus and chamber ensembles have won numerous ASCAP awards and are published exclusively by Jazzmuze, Inc.

In 1995, Joe Utterback recorded a compact disc of improvisations on Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess," released by Connoisseur Society.
