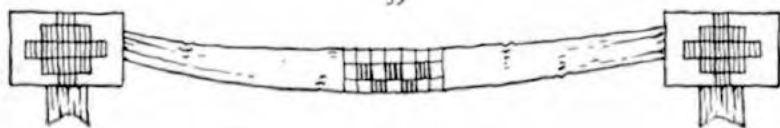
With all our liabilities, we have in our midst some who excel in athletics and others who lead in literary achievements.

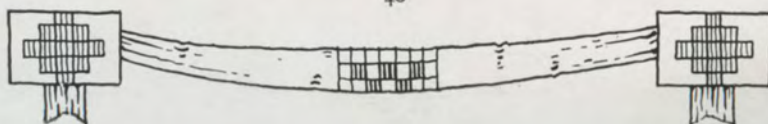

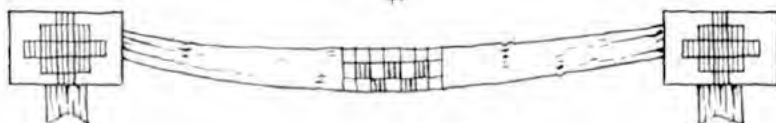

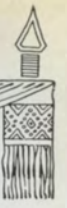

On September 20, 1922, there came to Ouachita College the largest number of freshmen known in the history of the school. It is true, as of all freshmen, that they were green, but all green things grow.

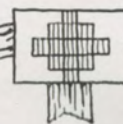
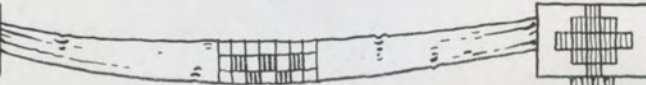
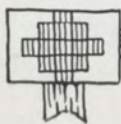

In the years to come, we expect to uphold the standards of Ouachita as the Class of 1926.



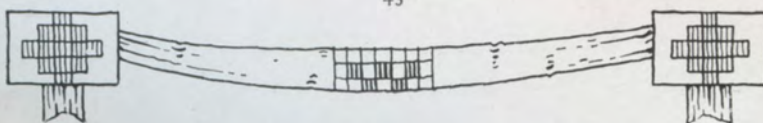

The Ouachita Signal

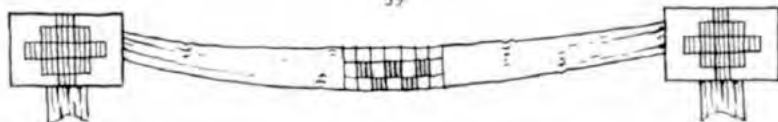

Hillie Dean has been acquiring information and sharpening his wits for four years in college. At last he has decided to try his skill in the forensic arena and has been successful in his initial efforts.

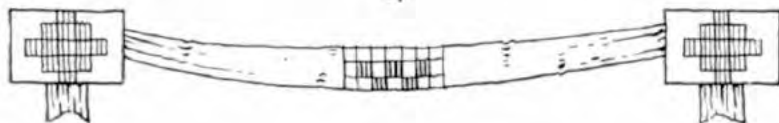

These victories shall continue, through the combined efforts of our debaters and supporters.



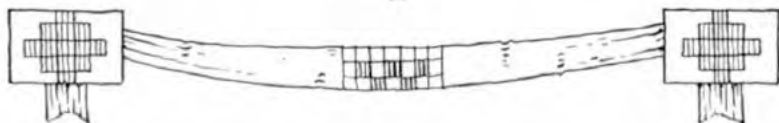


Volunteer Band

Our first game was with the Monticello Aggies, worthy opponents because of their team work and gameness. The score was 20 to 0 in favor of the Tigers. As usual, all of the promising new material was given a tryout in this preliminary game of the season.

The following week on October 14th, we played the Razorbacks of Fayetteville. Great preparations had been made by University of Arkansas supporters for an overwhelming victory over the team that had put up such a stubborn fight the preceding year. All of you remember what happened. The Tigers swept them clean off their feet, scored a touchdown in the second quarter and another in the fourth quarter. At the close of the game the Razorbacks were sliding on their haunches, a mere foot or two from their goal. The score was 13 to 7. The university's touchdown was the result of the very fortunate completion of two or three long forward passes and an on-side kick.

On October 19th, our Tigers appeared in Little Rock again, this time against the Little Rock College team. The Tigers won, 13 to 6. For some unknown reason the appearance of the Tigers against this team is usually the poorest showing of the season, and this year was no exception.

The next game was played with Texas A. & M., against the team that had beaten the famous "Centre" the year before. The score was 19 to 6 in favor of the "Aggies." This was the only defeat of the season, yet it carried no sting, for the excellent showing made against a school with larger and superior resources, was itself a victory.

The Tigers played their next game in Starkville, Miss., with Mississippi A. & M. Though the score was a tie, 7 to 7, the Tigers showed their superiority over one of the leading teams of the South in every department of the game. It was even published by a Mississippi press that the A. & M. was forced to exert every power in order to tie the score, which, by the way, they succeeded in doing in the last few moments of the last quarter.

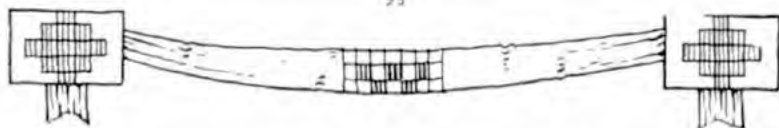
The score of the next game was 14 to 7, with the Tigers at the big end. It was played in Arkadelphia with the Arkansas College "Panthers." A slow start was the reason for the visitors' only touchdown.

The next game was staged in Arkadelphia on a wet and slippery field, with rain falling most of the time. The "Bulldogs" furnished the opposition, and while they never threatened our goal, they put up a stubborn defense that was contrary to the "dope." The Tigers won 14 to 0.

Of course the "big" game of the season was with the Henderson Brown "Reddies" on Thanksgiving day. Both teams were game and about evenly matched. All that could be said about that glorious battle would be very inadequate. Suffice it to say that our Tigers emerged victorious, with a score of 8 to 0. As a result, the Tigers are again football champions of Arkansas.

One of the most noticeable qualities of the 1922 team was its ability to put forth all that was required of it at the crucial moment. It was a team with a large supply of available reserve strength. The record made by this team upholds the high standards set by previous Ouachita teams. Each individual merits the greatest praise, and let us not forget the best coach in the South, who whipped these men into a winning combination.

But to the end of this reverie and on to the future. Good luck, coach! and future Tigers! May the fame of your achievements and the standards of this institution ever be raised by your untiring efforts.

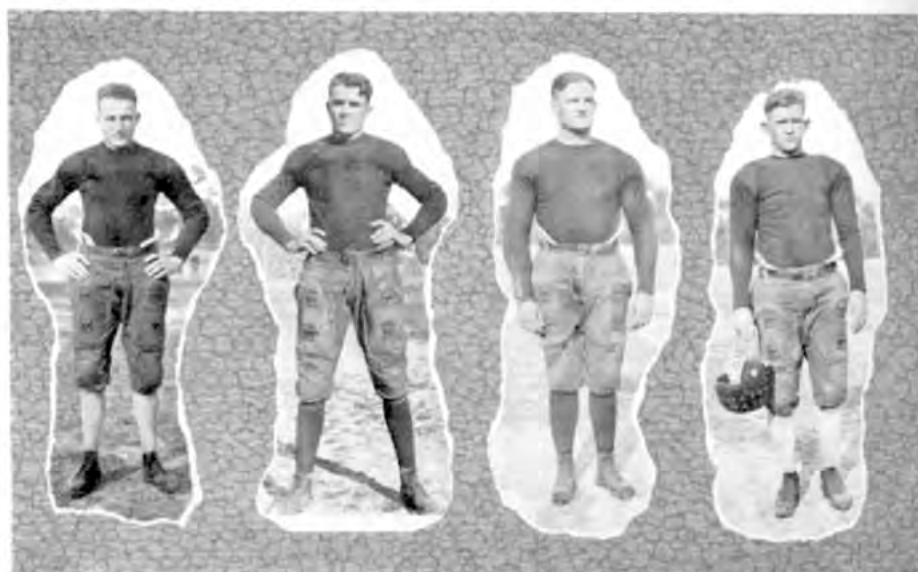
NEIL CARGILE End

CAREY SELPH Quarterback

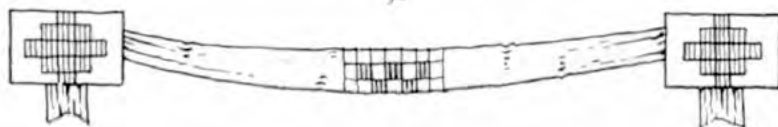

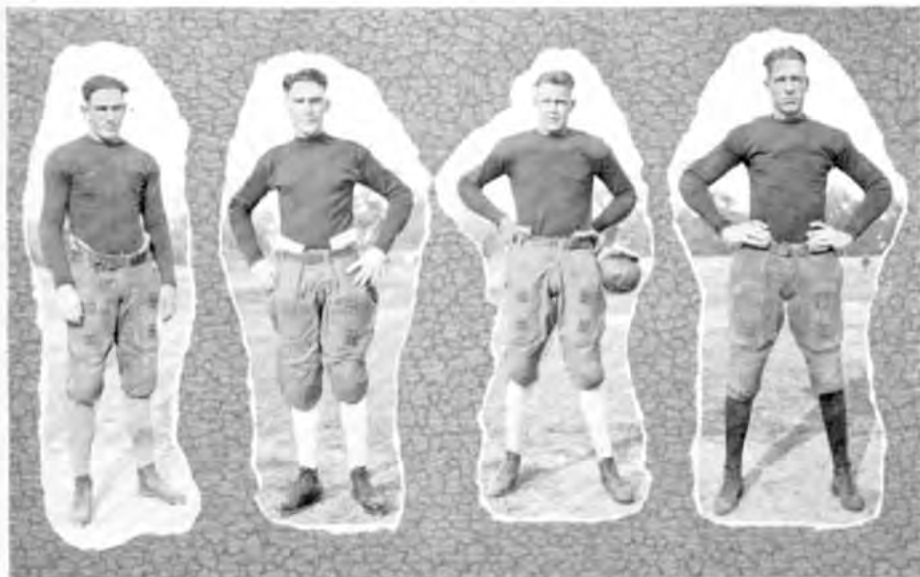
WILLIAM I. WALTON Half and Quarter

CLAYTON BOWERS Guard

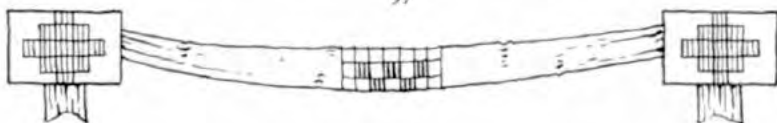

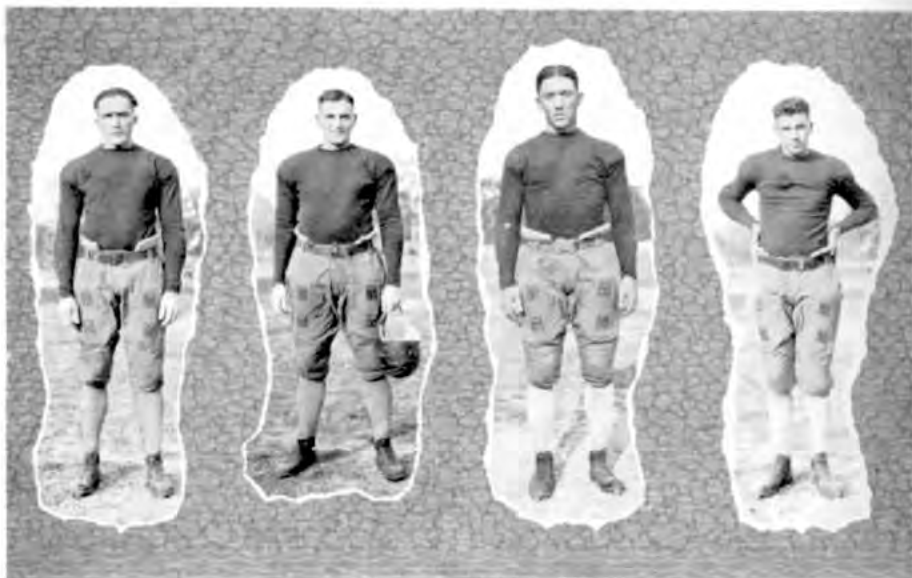
DALE SCOTT Tackle

DAY CAMPBELL End

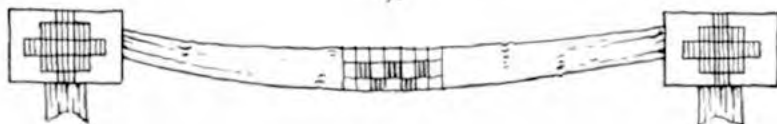

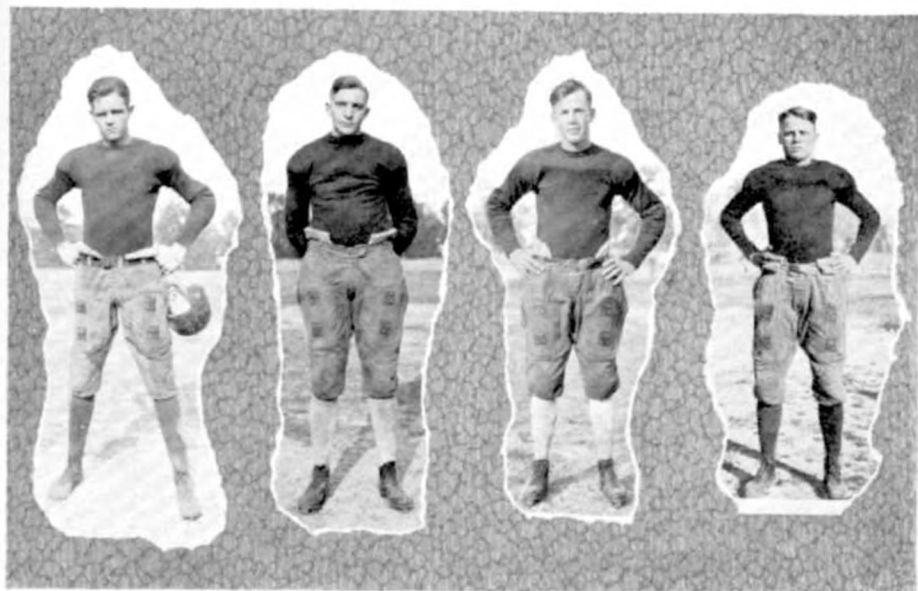
MERVING PERRY Fullback

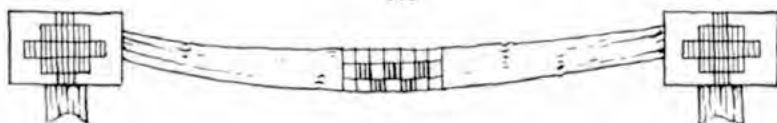
Tigerettes

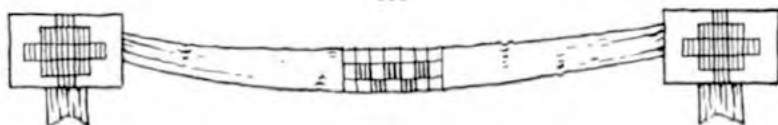

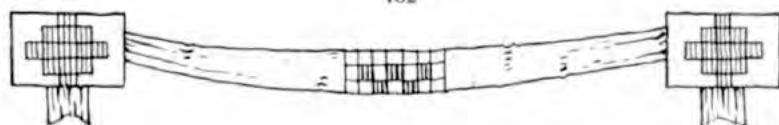

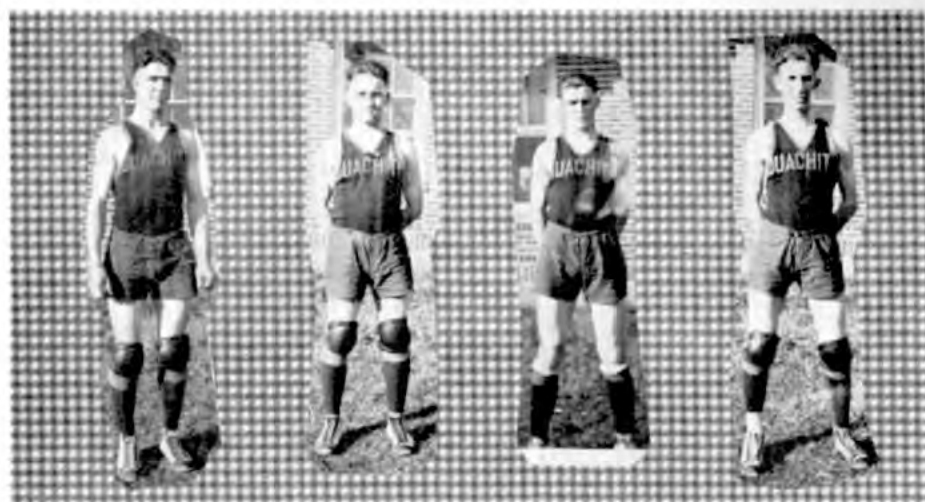

NOBLE CHAMBERS *Forward*

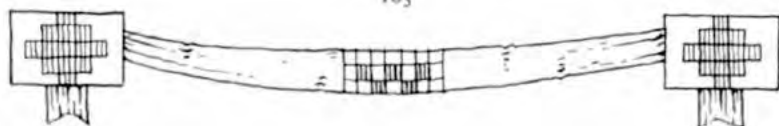

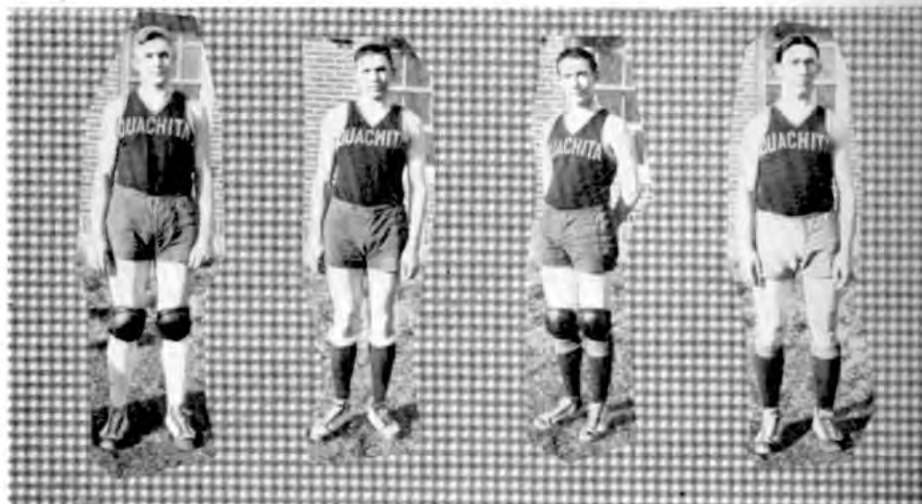
ROBERT COLE *Guard*

PALMA HUNTER *Center and Forward*

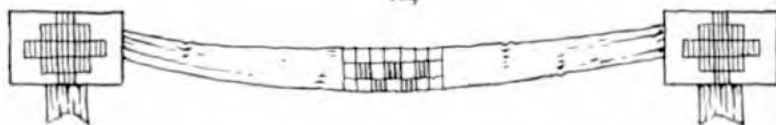

Baseball Prospects for 1923

At the close of the 1922 season, the Ouachita Tigers were the baseball champions of Arkansas, and from the present outlook, things are favorable for another winning team. Although several letter men were lost through graduation, there is a wealth of material from which to choose their successors.

Coach Jennings will be free to direct the team unhampered since he has refused to sign a contract in organized baseball for the coming year, and with eight letter men as a nucleus, a fast, aggressive team should be developed.

The 1923 squad is captained by "Hoss" Montgomery, who was the 1922 unanimous choice for all-state catcher. This is his third year and it is expected to be his best. He is a steady receiver, a dependable hitter, and his arm of steel mows down would-be base stealers "a la Schalk."

Sam Dardnne, Jr., was considered one of the best pitchers in the state last year. His "jump ball" makes him feared by rival batsmen. This is Sam's last year with the Tigers, and present indications point to a successful one. He is one of the team's heaviest hitters and is used in the outfield in many games.

Day H. Campbell is Ouachita's other ace pitcher, and like Dardnne, completes his college course this year. His dazzling speed and uncanny control makes him a safe bet in a pinch. He is also a student of opposing batsmen and fields his position perfectly. Like Dardnne, he is occasionally used in the outfield because of his ability to hit.

Frank Turberville is a natural first baseman and fields his position fast and accurately. He leads the squad in base stealing and is the hardest worker on the team. Frank has one more year on the team and will probably be the mainstay next year.

Harry Slade cavorites around the hot corner, and although he is not fast, he fields his position well and his dependable arm cuts down base runners at first without respect to person. His big bat often plays an important part in bringing victory to the Tigers. This is Harry's last year in Ouachita, and he leaves a vacancy that will be hard to fill.

Edgar Dardnne has heretofore acted in the role of relief pitcher, but promises to gain a regular berth on the twirling staff this year.

Bill Walton is our only outfielder left of last year's squad, but his speed and judgment of fly balls assure us that his position will be well filled this year.

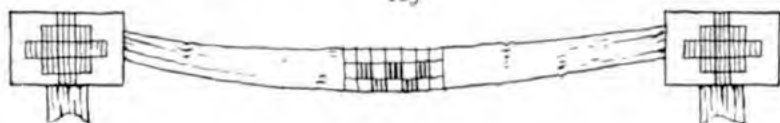

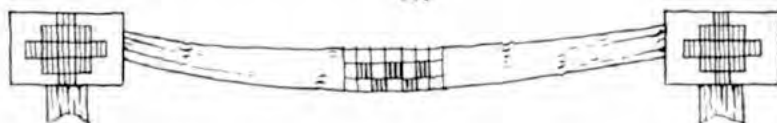


Tennis

Reserve Officers' Training Corps

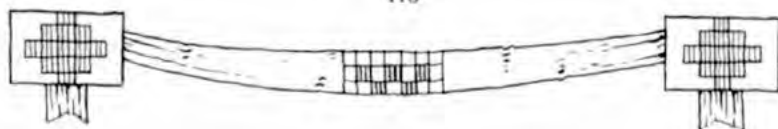
