## "TCBY"

### How Frank Hickingbotham cashed in on a great idea

Back in 1981, Frank D. Hickingbotham ('54-'56) of Little Rock had "put his hay in the barn," he said, by selling his food manufacturing and restaurant interests for an undisclosed but obviously comfortable amount and "was looking for something to do on my way to the golf course."

So it was that he and his wife, Georgia, were enjoying a light lunch in a low-cal restaurant in Dallas' Nieman-Marcus department store.

"Here," said Georgia, "try this yogurt. It's good."

"No," he replied, "I don't like it," recalling the tart, rather tasteless products found in refrigerated sections of supermarkets, health stores and delicatessens. But after more prodding, he relented and tried his wife's yogurt.

And liked it. No, he loved it. It not only tasted good, it tasted like a great idea.

Not a man to stand idly by when a great opportunity arises, Hickingbotham asked the restaurant manager for the name of the manufacturer of the surprisingly tasty yogurt, found out that the firm was located in the Dallas area and made contact with the owner.

"I'm thinking about opening a yogurt store in Little Rock," he said. "Will you supply the product?"

"Sure," the owner replied.

This was in 1981, remember, a year of economic depression and hardly the time to be starting a new business. But on the other hand, Hickingbotham was aware that America had gone bonkers about dieting, weight loss and physical fitness.

Not to worry, Frank said.

Returning to Little Rock, he opened his store on Rodney Parham Road and named it "This Can't Be Yogurt." Today his company — now called "TCBY (The Country's Best Yogurt) Enterprises" — operates 160 stores in 31 states and net income increased 527 percent for fiscal 1984. He expects to open another 65-85 stores by the end of this year and 200 more in 1986. TCBY, in short, has become the largest company of its kind in America and the nation's only publicly owned retailer, franchiser and manufacturer of frozen yogurt products. As an interesting footnote, he bought out the original manufacturer, placed him on the TCBY board of directors and is building an additional manufacturing facility at a cost of \$4 million.

Less than four years after it started, TCBY is in its own three-story headquarters building in Little Rock and the company's third 3-for-2 stock split was paid in May. In fact, TCBY was ranked fourth among 560 new stock issues price in appreciation last year.

Now that his venture has paid off so

handsomely, won't he admit that he was sort of frightened at first?

"Not really," he said, grinning broadly. "I was in a position to do it and it never entered my mind that it wouldn't work. But," he admitted, "I never expected it to be this successful."

Who would have thought, for example, that Alaska, of all places, would be a profitable market for frozen yogurt? Yet when TCBY opened its store in Anchorage during a raging blizzard, yogurt sales set a national record.

What can he say?

The reasons behind TCBY's success are

simple, he answered. "We have a super group of people, a great product and a good purpose, which is to provide a healthy, nutritious, low-calorie product that satisfies the sweet tooth without guilt."

Convinced of God's guidance in the success of his company, Hickingbotham is a firm believer in the value of Christian higher education. Because of this, he has become a major benefactor in Ouachita's development program.

"I am grateful for everything that has happened," he said, "and happy that I can make educational opportunities available to Ouachita students."

## Dr. Marion 'Bud' Fray appointed to W. O. Vaught Chair of Bible

Dr. Marion G. "Bud" Fray, a longtime Southern Baptist Convention missionary to Africa, has been appointed to the newly funded W. O. Vaught Chair of Bible at Ouachita.

He and his wife, Jane, are currently serving as missionaries-in-residence at Ouachita during the 1984-85 academic year while on furlough from South Africa. Fray has also served as interim pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church in Little Rock, which endowed the Vaught chair in honor of the retired pastor.

OBU President Dr. Daniel R. Grant said Fray will become chairman of the department of religion, succeeding Dr. Vester Wolber who has served in that position for 27 years. Grant said Fray will also direct a new Center for Christian Ministries at Ouachita and "will help in determining the structure and function of the Center."

Grant said, "I am tremendously gratified that we have been able to secure a person of Bud Fray's stature, experience and training. His world view and insights will challenge our students as well as the churches whom we serve."

A 1951 graduate of Ouachita, Fray earned a bachelor of divinity degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in



Fort Worth, Tex., in 1956 and a doctor of theology degree in 1967 from the same institution.

After serving as a pastor from 1951 to 1957, he and Mrs. Fray were missionaries to Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) from 1957 to 1974 and in Johannesburg, South Africa, from 1974 until the present. During this time he has been missions administrator, serving as associate to the director for southern Africa for the SBC.

He is married to the former Jane Dawley of Arkadelphia. They have three sons, Jerry, Jon and Jeff, and one daughter, Carol.

## \$100,000 scholarship for voice given by Mrs. Blanche Jones

Blanche Jones of El Dorado gave a helping hand to her alma mater by establishing a \$100,000 scholarship fund for voice students.

Mrs. Jones, a 1919 graduate of Ouachita in Arkadelphia, presented a check in that amount to OBU President Dr. Daniel R. Grant and Roger Harrod, vice president of development at the school. Grant and Harrod accepted the money on behalf of the Ouachita Baptist University Foundation, a non-profit organization.

Mrs. Jones, who majored in voice at the college, designated the funds for Ouachita voice majors, with preference given first to those students from El Dorado and second to those from Union County. Duke Allison Jr., National Bank of Commerce senior vice

president and trust officer, said the funds will be distributed to the students based on need.

While she did not pursue a musical career after graduation, Mrs. Jones said she wants to give others the opportunity to do so.

"Mrs. Jones' gift can help a lot of students from this area," Allison said, adding that the fund will benefit Ouachita voice majors for many years to come.

John M. Shackelford Jr., of the Shackelford, Shackelford and Phillips law firm, also attended the check presentation.

When asked why she chose to donate the funds, Mrs. Jones replied, "Why, because that's my alma mater. I graduated from there nearly 65 years ago this spring."

## Two Ouachita students win 1985 Truman Scholar honors

David Lamar Paschall of Pine Bluff, a sophomore political science and accounting major at Ouachita, has been named as Arkansas' 1985 Harry S. Truman Scholar, the first OBU student to ever win the honor.

Pat Patterson of Rogers, also a sophomore political science and accounting major at OBU, was named as Arkansas' first alternate to the award. Arkansas is the only state to have a winner and a first alternate from the same school.

In addition to being from the same school, Paschall and Patterson are roommates.

The Truman Scholarship provides up to a maximum annual award of \$5000 to cover tuition, fees, books and room and board. The scholarship is awarded on a merit basis each year to college students who show potential for leadership, academic ability and an outstanding potential for a career in government. The student must be a junior in the 1985-86 academic year, have a college grade point average of at least a 'B' and be in the upper fourth of his or her class.

The Truman Scholarship, established in 1975 by the Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation, is the official federal memorial to President Truman.

OBU President Dr. Daniel Grant was first contacted about the selection by the Truman Scholarship Foundation. Dr. Grant serves as chairman of one of 13 Regional Review Panels, which does not include Arkansas. "Having been actively involved in the selection process of recipients in other states, I am well aware of the outstanding qualities of the students who are chosen for this prestigious award," Dr. Grant com-

mented. "This reinforces our appreciation of David Paschall and Pat Patterson and the recognition it brings to our campus."

Paschall and Patterson were selected as OBU's nominees by a committee of the Ouachita faculty and were then approved by the entire faculty. The two were then named as state semi-finalists and were interviewed in Kansas City, Mo., on March 12 by a Regional Review Panel, composed

of prominent scholars and public officials. Two persons from each state were then recommended in rank order for selection as Truman Scholars. Paschall and Patterson were Arkansas' two choices.

Dr. Hal Bass, associate professor of political science at OBU, called the Truman Scholarship competition "intense." "For one school to sweep the state, providing both the winner and the alternate, is truly remarkable," Dr. Bass said. "We're very proud of David and Pat for the honor and recognition they have brought to Ouachita."

Paschall said that being named the Truman Scholar will help in two ways — financially and in future aspirations. He explained that being associated with the organization that gives the scholarship will help with his job search after graduation from OBU. His plans for the future are to attend law school and eventually practice private law or corporate law. He added that he would also consider entering the political arena on the state level.

At Ouachita, Paschall is a member of the College Republicans. He is a 1983 graduate of Watson Chapel High School. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Paschall of Pine Bluff.

## Dr. Tom Greer appointed to newly funded Anthony Chair of Bible and Humanities

Dr. John Thomas Greer has been appointed to the newly funded Clarence and Bennie Sue Anthony Chair of Bible and the Humanities at Ouachita, upon the approval of the University's Board of Trustees.

A gift of \$300,000 was given to Ouachita by the Anthonys to endow the chair. The Murfreesboro residents are long time supporters of the school, with Mrs. Anthony a current member of the Board of Trustees, her husband a former trustee and a current member of the Development Council.

Greer has been serving as Assistant Professor of Philosophy at Ouachita and a coordinator of the humanities program at the school. He joined the faculty in 1977.

Greer graduated from Louisiana College with a major in speech and a teaching minor in English. He received a bachelor of divinity and a doctor of divinity degree from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. He also holds a master of arts degree in English from the University of Evansville in Evansville, Kentucky.

Greer is a native of Arcadia, Louisiana,



and following graduation from Louisiana College in 1958, he was employed as a teacher of English in the Rapides Parish School System.

He was also on the faculty of Oakland City College in Oakland City, Indiana, from 1968 to 1975, after which he entered the University of Louisville for post doctorate work.

## BSU spring break mission in Missouri and Indiana

Fifty-five Ouachita BSU Choir members spent March 15-22 in Missouri and Indiana as a part of their spring break mission program, under the leadership of Mark Baber, Ouachita BSU director.



The 1985 winners' average grade point average was 3.942 (out of a possible 4.00 system), with 62 ranked first in their classes and 27 having received National Merit Scholar recognition, according to the Department.

## Revised tax credit still 'a good deal'

Contributions given to Ouachita would benefit Arkansas taxpayers for the 1985 and 1986 income years because of Act 740, which was recently amended by a special session of the General Assembly and signed into law by Governor Bill Clinton.

The original act would have provided a 100 percent Arkansas income tax credit for gifts to Arkansas colleges and universities of up to \$200 for persons filing single returns, up to \$400 for couples filing jointly, and up to \$5,000 for corporations. However, because of widespread concern that the state's coffers would be seriously depleted because of persons choosing to take advantage of the credit, the governor called a special session in June to amend this law and to deal with other matters.

It now appears that rather than a 100 percent tax credit, 33 percent will be available to our donors, up to \$100 for individuals, \$200 for couples, and \$1,000 for corporations. It is still a good deal! A "tax credit" (even for 33 percent of actual gift) is better than a "deduction," because the credit comes right off of the actual tax liability itself. The deduction simply reduces the amount of taxable income. Furthermore, the "deduction" for your gift to Ouachita continues to be available on your federal returns, so your gift to Ouachita in 1985 and again in 1986 will cost you less than in previous years.
