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



FROM ZIMBABWE TO ARKADELPHIA

A sophomore was recently overheard telling a freshman about the origins of the majority of students at Ouachita. "There are a lot of people from Arkansas, Texas, and Zimbabwe."

While there are actually only 9 Zimbabwean students currently on campus, their level of involvement has indeed made them visible and well-loved members of the Ouachita family. According to Education USA, which is associated with the US State Department, Ouachita has one of the highest populations of Zimbabwean students in the country!



Ouachita has historically had ties to Zimbabwe through OBU alumni serving with the IMB. Bud and Jane Fray, followed by Jerry and Barbara Schleiff invested decades of their lives in what was then Rhodesia. The paths of Sharon and Ian Cosh frequently intersected with both families. Two years after the Coshes were married; they immigrated from Zimbabwe (formerly Rhodesia) to South Africa for 4 years before coming to Ouachita as international students in 1984 on Bud Fray's recommendation. The Frays returned to the States in that same summer of '84 to serve as

Missionaries in Residence at Ouachita and to this day continue to be dearly loved mentors in Ian and Sharon's lives.

The ties between Zimbabwe and Ouachita have remained strong through the years. Through meaningful connections in churches and active recruiting, Arkadelphia has become "a great place to call home" for many Zimbabwean students, and Ouachita has helped to become their family away from home in very troubled political times. We are proud of the current students for their engagement on our campus.

ESL PROGRAM CELEBRATES 23 YEARS!

This fall, we have 9 ESL students from 7 different countries!

Some students come to OBU as exchange students with the goal of improving their English during their time here. Others go through the ESL program on their way to becoming degree seeking students. We celebrate the many positive ways that the English as a Second Language program has been contributing to the Ouachita family and the community of Arkadelphia for the last 23 years!




NEW ESL ENDORSMENT

An exciting point of collaboration with the Huckabee School of Education is a new endorsement for teaching English as a Second Language.

By participating in four online courses that cover multicultural issues in the classroom, second language acquisition, methods of teaching second language learners, and assessment, students can satisfy requirements for ESL endorsements for teachers in Arkansas

These courses can also be used towards a Christian Studies degree with an emphasis in Missions as well as towards an International Studies minor.
