>00< THE HOME MISSION BOARD HELD IT'S ANNUAL MEETING

last week in Atlanta. In the opinion of the brethren who have been members of the Board for some time it was the best meeting in recent years. There was a sane spirit of optimism that prevailed throughout the meeting. Dr. Lawrence and his co-workers presented a complete picture of the work and possibilities of the Board at the first session. Some of us as Board members got a new vision as to the place and importance of the Home Mission task. There was brought to our attention the startling fact, that in the Southland there are twenty-two million people above eleven years of age who never darken the door of anybody's church. That the local churches as a rule were not touching these millions and it was demonstrated these unchurched and unchristian millions furnish the greatest challenge Home Missions has ever faced.

Under the efficient leadership of Dr. J. B. Lawrence, the principle of our indebtedness has been reduced almost \$700,000 since 1929. And this in face of the fact that the depression has reduced tremendously the receipts of the board. A satisfactory policy has been worked out with our creditors and under this policy we will in a few years be relieved of this tremendous burden of debt. The budget for missionary operations has been increased so that this year we are putting thirty-two new Home Missionaries in the field. \$150,000 was set apart in the budget for the administration and operation of our mission work. This is the largest budget that we have had for some years.

It was the most harmonious and optimistic, and yet at the same time sane and sensible denominational board meeting I have attended in a long while. We seemed to have turned the corner and are on our way to a better day.







THE PLACE

Ferncliff is a beautiful little resort about seventeen miles west of Little Rock. Cottages are arranged around a beautiful lake, hundreds of gallons of pure mountain water pour over the dam all the time. Each cottage is equipped with running water and shower baths, beds, etc.

THE PLAN

A registration fee will be paid in advance to W. M. U. Headquarters (if providence hinders one from coming this fee will be refunded) and the meals are paid for as eaten. Meals will be served cafeteria style. One can make his meals little or much. A safe allowance is 25 cents per meal.

GENERAL INFORMATION

HOW TO REACH FERNCLIFF. Everyone is expected to get to the grounds themselves. However, those who come by train or bus who desire free transportation out from Little Rock may go to Second Baptist Church, Eighth and Scott Streets, by 4:00 on the opening day of camp and someone will take you out. This will be free if you notify Miss Hutchison that you expect this transportation. Otherwise the charge will be \$1 each way for this transportation. Those coming by car will drive out the Twelfth Street Pike, following pavement until it ends, continue straight ahead for about three miles to Ferndale, a small store in the fork of the roads, take the left-hand road for about one-half mile, and there is camp.

EXPENSES. A registration fee of \$1.25 for Y. W. A's, and \$2.00 for G. A. and R. A. Camps is to be sent in to Miss Margaret Hutchison 407 Federal Bank and Trust Bldg., Little Rock, ahead of time. This covers all expenses except eating. That will be paid for as each meal is eaten. Should anyone be providentially hindered from attending camp, the registration fee will be refunded. Register soon.

THE CAFETERIA. This is a new feature to camp. Meals will be served cafeteria style. Everyone chooses what he wishes to eat and pays for it then. A safe average per meal is 25 cents. Allow

at least that much or more for eating. We suggest G. A.'s and R. A.'s allow themselves \$4.50 or \$5.00 for meals. They may come out for much less, however. The savings is their own, Y. W. A.'s had better allow themselves \$1.75 for meals. They, too may come out for much less. The Y. P. Secretary will help the younger campers to choose wisely and economically wholesome, well-balanced meals.

RECREATION. There is a splendid lake in which to swim. Life guards will be on hand during every swim period. No one will be allowed in the lake except under supervision. Two-splendid, well-conditioned tennis courts, horseshoe pitching, croquet, treasure hunts boxing, stunts hiking, and games of all sorts furnish the time with wholesome fun.

CAMP NURSES. There will be a Camp Nurse at both the Y. W. A. and G. A. Camp. They are from the Baptist State Hospital.

WHAT TO BRING. Two sheets, towels, soap, own to let articles, thin blanket, pillow and case if desired, camping clothes and shoes, bathing suit, your own recreational equipment such as tennis rackets, baseball gloves, balls, kodak, BIBLE and PENCIL. Parents may write you at Ferndale, Arkansas, care Baptist Camp. Mail takes a day longer to get there than to Little Rock, so allow this extra time.

—In the past twelve lessons based on the thirteen last chapters of the first Gospel we have Matthew's record of the last year of the life of our Lord upon earth.

- 1. Confessing and Following Christ (Lesson 1) involves the deity, the church, the death, and the Lordship of Christ. Jesus was the Son of God The Son of God was the founder of the church. The founder of the church was our atoning Saviour. The atoning Saviour is our living and reigning Lord.
- 2. The Child and the Kingdom (Lesson 2) presents the little child in the midst of the disciples and the Lord's blessing of the little children. From the child and the d'sciples we learn that the purity of childhood furnishes the model for the man. The child and the world show that the peril of childhood involves a woe to the foe. The child and the Father implies the d'vine protection of childhood. The child and the Saviour show that the presentation of childhood invites the benedictions of the Lord.
- 3. Jesus Teaches Forgiveness (Lesson 3) impressing upon us the principle, the parable, and the program of forgiveness. Constant forgiveness of a brother is the divine principle laid down. Contrasted forgiveness of servants is the divine illustration given. Conditioned forgiveness from the Father is the divine program marked out.
- 4. Our All for the Kingdom (Lesson 4) emphasizes the power of God and the reward of sacrifice. The peril of riches was exhibited in the rich young man who was shown to be a slave to wealth. The power of God is exhibited in the disciples of Jesus who had left all to follow him.
- 5. Christ's Standard of Greatness (Lesson 5) is taught during an episode in which we glimpse the sorrowing Saviour, the two ambitious disciples, and the indignant ten. Promotion by salvation is the achieve-

- 6. Jesus Acclaimed as King (Lesson 6) brings us the record of the triumphal entry into Jerusalem. The disciples prepared for the triumphal entry, The multitude joined in it. The city was startled by it. He came into his own but they received him not. Let us make Christ our king.
- 7. Christianity and Patriotism (Lesson 7) were emphasized by Jesus in the Temple in his answer to certain captious questions designed to entrap him and discount his teaching. One was the political question of paying tribute to Rome and another was a theological question of differentiating divine commands. The discussion of the poll tax due to Caesar emphasizes the duties of good citizenship. The discussion of the great commandment in the law of Moses magnifies the spirit of good citizenship.
- 8. The Future of the Kingdom (Lesson 8) was described by Jesus in the Temple, stressing vigilance in the parable of the Virgins. Folly and wisdom in preparation were manifest before the bridegroom startd. Folly and wisdom in writing were shown by the virgins while the bridegroom tarried. Folly and wisdom in reward were evident when the bridegroom came.
- 9. The Last Judgment (Lesson 9is pictured by Jesus in concluding
 his sermon on "The Last Things."
 There is the gathering of the nations
 before the throne. There is the approval of the righteous and the sentence upon the wicked. Finally, there
 is the separation for eternity.
- 10. Jesus in the Shadow of the Cross (Lesson 10) made his prediction of apostolic stumbling on the way to Gethsemane. The pressure of sorrow weighed heavily upon him as they entered the Garden across the brook Kidron, The prayer of submission was offered in the midnight solitude of the Garden. The perfidy of betrayal was exhibited in Judas who led the armed squad to the gate

MOTHERS OF MEN

Rev. C. C. Young

General Lew Wa'lace, long time governor of New Mexico, in book Ben Her says: "God could not be every where, so he chose to create and cradle mankind in the arms of a mother's love." means that the ministry of a mother's love is superior to that of angels or other divine beings.

Just recently I read a true story of a family in a peculiar situation. A boy of the home had dropped out of sight ten years before (as often happens) and had just returned a

disreputable wreck. He went out bright and clean and had returned soiled and blighted with the mess and muck of sin. The father was sullen about the boy's presence in the home: the brothers and sisters were silent in their anger, but the mother had a song of joy in her heart over the return of the lost boy. In fact the home would have been a madhouse and almost a murderhouse, except for the mother's restraining influence in love.

Ships That Go To Sea

About 50.000 ships sail the seven seas and they all go out with hope of reutrn. In the old days, about two thousand were lost every year but not so many now, due to wireless and radio. So the mothers of men send their sons out as ships to sea with hope of return but many of them are swallowed up as if by some great monster, though not so many as twenty years ago, due to better means of communication and identification.

The mother of John Quincy Adams sent her son out as a ship to sea. He was the second president of the United States and he himself became the sixth president. Near the end of his long career, he said: "All that I am, my mother made me!" Grover Cleveland' mother sent her son out as a ship to sea. came high sheriff, district attorney, mayor of Buffalo and twice president of the United States. In the midst of one of his campaigns, he wrote to an older mother: "O how, I wish our mother was alive, for her prayers always gave me strength."

The mother of Abraham Lincoln, though hard pressed by poverty and with little help from her husband, sent her son out as a ship to sea and he returned with a valuable cargo. He lived a short life but it cast the longest shadow in the nineteenth century. While president of the United States, he said: "All that I am or ever hope to be, I owe to my angel mother." This is the origin of the phrase "angel mother," he being the first man who used it in that connection, though millions had felt it.

The mother of Benjamin West sent her son out as ship to sea. As a boy artist, he painted a picture and his mother kissed his cheek, saying:: "Benjamin, you'll be a greater painter some day," and he fulfilled her mother-love prophecy. Almost the same story is told of James Whistler whose painting his mother was first sold for hundred dollars now could not be bought for a million.

Imagine, if you can, the mother of Jesus and the mother of Judas Iscariot meeting face to face sometime after Pentecost, which is entirely possible. The mother of Judas might well have said: "We both sent sons out as ships to sea. Your son went out with hope and returned with a valuable cargo but mine was lost as the victim of his own sins and hands. Besides that, my son betrayed yours. O will you forgive men and love me, for I am lone-ly and bereft." And Mary could

well have said: "There is nothing in YOU to forgive, for you did your best, and certainly I'll love you." Then the curtain goes down on the drama of the ages, with two sobbing women embraced in each other's arms. Their heart sore sympathy is far superior to what an angel could gave either one, and general Lew Wallace was right when he said: "God could not be every where, so he chose to create and cradle mankind in the arms of a mother's love."

The Arkansas Fact-Finding Tribunal has announced the conclusion that rates for residential and commercial electric service in Stuttgart should be reduced 9 per cent. Stuttgart petitioned for a reduction of 20 per cent.

The Tribunal's finding was announced after an investigation requiring several months, and which included survey, inventory, appraisal and study of a large part of our system and our operations. The Tribunal's finding is not warranted by the facts or the record. A rate reduction is not justified at this time. With the possible exception of some farm products, prices on everything are up. A comparison will convince that nothing has come down so much as in cost in past two decades as electric service. In the past, as business increased and unit costs decreased, due to higher efficiency, we made repeated reductions, so that today rates are 59 per cent to 74 per cent below pre-boom prices. With volume and revenues down and with operating costs and taxes up cortainly a rate reduction is not justified. revenues down, and with operating costs and taxes up, certainly a rate reduction is not justified.

Rather than become involved in litigation with any of the communities we serve, and in accord with our policy of doing for all whatever we do for one, we are going to put into effect the reduction for residential and commercial service in all towns on our interconnected system in Central, Southern and Eastern Arkansas, effective with bills for July service, payable in August.

We are doing this for 3 reasons:

- To demonstrate our wllingness to co-operate to the fullest extent possible in whatever is considered best for all concerned, and to avoid controversy at a time when there should be peace and harmony among the people and institutions and communities of the State.
- To make fair test of the declared statement that people would use more electric service if rates were
- 3. To do everything we can to promote national recovery by stimulating business and buying in the communities we serve, by inducing merchants and others to make full use of the possibilities of one of the greatest selling forces and builders of morale . . . electric illumination.

These rates will be the lowest ever made in Arkansas by a tax-paying institution. (More than 11 cents of each dollar paid us for service goes for taxes.) At these rates, there should be great increase in the use of electric refrigerators, ranges, and other convenient and economical electric equipment. Electricity at these rates is so cheap that none can afford to deny themselves the convenience, economy and comfort possible through the use of electric fans, refrigerators, ranges, cleaners, mixers, lamps, and the numerous other servants which take drudgery out of housekeeping and put more profits into stores and other commercial establishments.

- 1. Central College has been operated by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention for about 40 years.
- 2. It has trained hundreds and hundreds of girls and has won many of them to Christ and to the Baptist faith. Last year there were 164 students, with 37 graduating.
- 3. It is a school where Christ, the Bible and Prayer have major places. There is always a distinct Christian atmosphere in the school.
- 4. During the last year the school has paid operating expenses, has added improvements worth about \$13,000, paid the teachers up to date and owes less than \$1,500. An old debt of

\$47,000 has also been settled in full.

- 5. The College is a standard junior college for girls,—fully accredited, being a member of the North Central Association.
- 6. The College has no endowment. In lieu of this the State Convention has authorized it to conduct a campaign during June to supplement its income, and thereby remain a standardized school.
