THE ARRANSAS BAPTIST SFATE CONVENTION held its Third Anniversary with Mount Bethel Church, Clark County, commencing Friday, Oct. 4th, 1850.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. Franklin Courter, of El Dorado, from John, in chap, and part of the 30th verse: "He must increase!"

The sermon was an unusually logical and scriptural production.

The Convention was then called to order by the President—Rev. Jesse Hartwell, D. D.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DESTITUTION.

The destitution in many portions of our State is truly lamentable. Not only on the East side of the Arkansas River, are the people perishing for lack of knowledge; but within the bounds of our Airssionary opperations there are many who seldom hear the words of Sternal life. Your Committee have reason to believe that there are persons living within our bounds, forty years old, who, never heard one of our order proach. There are many small churches, that will in all probability, become extinct as churches, unless they receive ministerial aid. Along the south-eastern boundary of our field of lubor, there is great destitution, and it is believed that the people would gladly receive our Missionaries.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The subject presented to our consideration, is one of vital importance, and should rouse the feelings of every child of God. When the Gospel was first preached to the Grecians, or heathen, (Acts, II, 20.) Barnabus saw "the grace of God, and was glad, for he was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost. success of the Gospel should produce the same effect till the end of time.

During the past year, events prosperous and afflictive, have attended this field of labor. Sickness and death have thinned their ranks. Several of the Missionaries have been compelled to return home, and leave the heathen to perish in their ignorance. Others have been called away by death, and bave entered into their Among these is to be counted that great and excellent man ADONIRAM Juneon, so long and familiarly known as Missionary in Burmah, who died April 12th, 1850, and was buried in the "illimitable sea." While we mourn his loss we have reason to bless the God of grace that he was so long spared, and that his labors were so successful. Though we have been called to mouru, we have been made to rejoice over the number of immortal souls that have been brought to the knowledge of the truth, through the self-denying labors of those who remain in the Light is spreading—the word of truth is being circulated, and the knowledge of salvation is proclaimed among those who have long sat in darkness, and the shadow of death. Though we in our infancy are not able to do much to advance this blessed cause, yet we may unite our prayers to the great Head of the Church for its advancement, and, by learning what is done by our brethren, may rejoice with them, and praise our Glorious Redeemer.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE CONDITION OF OUR COLORED POPULATION.

Your Committee are to some extent acquainted with the deplorable condition ofmany of our servants, especially in the the south-western part of our State, there are many of them who are almost entirely deprived of hearing the Gospel preach-We also know that many of them do, and others doubtless would gladly hear the word of life if favorable opportunities were afforded. They often seem deeply impressed with the worth of their immortal souls. From the best information that we can obtain, in the absence of your Missionary to the colored population on Red River, we believe his labors have been blessed. We would therefore recommend that this field be occupied.

Your Committee would further recommend that each Church appoint a Committee of three or more brethren, to attend the meetings that may be held with their respective churches, for the benefit of this much neglected people; and also, that we use our influence with masters, to obtain for their servants, the privilege

of attending the house of God as often as practicable.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE BIBLE CAUSE.

Without the Bible, no people have ever yet been christianised; and while our own State is in many parts destitute of the word of Life, the question as to the duty of christians in supplying this destitution, may well arise in our Conventional Meetings. In vain may churches be collected together, in vain may the sacrament be dispensed, and in vain may the Missionary go forth, proclaiming the glad tidings of salvation, if the people have not the word of God which they may read at their own firesides.

On the other hand, supply the people with the Bible, let them read it at home, and let their children be taught its sacred truths in the domestic circle, and the Minister is very materially aided in prosecuting his work. But how is this destition to be supplied? Bible Societies, auxillary to the American and Foreign Bible Society, have accomplished more in this respect in other States, than any other means, which have hitherto been adopted to accomplish the same end.

We therefore most earnestly recommend to our churches to form Bible Societies, and procure from some convenient depository, the necessary books, which may through these auxilliary societies be distributed as the destitution demands. We make these suggestions not merely to be read, but we ask brethren as they love the word of God, as they desire the salvation of sinners, and as they wish to see the cause of religion prosper, to adopt this or some other efficient plan for destributing God's eternal truth.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The great importance of early religious instruction, seems to be admitted by all

evangelical christians.

Ignorance, is no longer regarded as the mother of devotion. But on the contrary, experience teaches that ignorance engenders infidelity, and leads to every form and degree of vice and immorality. Conscience possesses power to restrain in proportion to the light of truth in the mind. Although it must be admitted that the Gospel is the great means, that God has ordained for the conversion of the world; yet, private instruction is fully authorised by the sacred Scriptures, and is equally as important and necessary as public proaching.

The great obligation of training children "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord," rests mainly upon parents; and God will doubtless hold them accountable

for the faithful performance of this highly important duty.

Yet Dear Brethren, in the abscence of parental instruction, where parents manifest no regard for the souls of their tender offsprings, has not a way been fully opened by the introduction of the Sunday School system, by which we may bring even little children to the blessed Savior; and will not God hold us accountable in some degree for their instruction. If for withholding temporal blessings, Christ will say to those on the left hand, "Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did it not to me;" how shall those escape who withhold the Bread of Life.

In view of the incalculable benefits and blessings which have already been realised by individuals, communities and even our common country, by Sunday School instruction; every christian must be convinced that the blessing of God has in a most signal manner attended the labors of Sunday School teachers. In no way can christians more effectually promote the cause of religion, and give permanency to our free institutions, than by engaging heartily and prayerfully in Sunday Schools. We therefore recommend the subject to the consideration of our brethren and fellow-citizen, generally.

It gives your Committee pleasure to close this brief report, by stating that the "AMERICAN SUNDAY SCHOOL UNION" has recently established a depository in New Orleans; also, that Rev. S. Stevenson expects to keep a general supply, of

books at Arkadelphia, Ark's.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE DISTRIBUTION OF BOOKS.

It is impossible to estimate fully the influence of religious books upon the morals of a people. They are one of the principal auxiliares, of which we can avail ourselves, in promulgating the Gospel; especially are they necessary to counteract the baneful influence of "light reading," which has already flooded our country, and which tends to skepticism, and consequent immorality. It is to be regreted that there is no general supply of religious books kept in any part of this State.

Your Committee would therefore recommend that the Convention as early as practicable establish a Deposit of Standard Evangelical works, at some suitable place, and especially, with some suitable person; also, that during the summer and fall, reveral persons be employed as Colporteurs, for the purpose of supplying the great destitution, which exists in this department of our missionary enterprise. It is confidently believed that in this way, very much good might be accomplished, at little or no expense to the Convention.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON AGENCIES.

After collecting all the information that time and circumstances would permit, your Committee would most respectfully suggest that the efforts of at least one

agent is demanded by the interests of the Convention.

We would also recommend that our missionaries be constituted sub-agents, to represent the interests of the Convention, wherever and whenever they may think it expedient; also, that they be authorised to take up collections and obtain sub-scriptions for the support of the Convention in her efforts to extend the word of life, to the destitute of our own State and country.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We regard the education of our Ministry an object of primary importance, in the great plan for the evangelizing of our State, being second only to the supply-

ing of its destitute sections, with the word of life.

The peculiar truths of our denomination have arrayed against them, much of the learning and wisdom of the world, and the contest will ever be an unequal one, between error supported by intelligence, where truth is unaided by education.—The one is enabled to propigate error under the cloak of truth, while the other is not able to strip it of its borrowed covering and expose the sophisms upon which it is based. Besides, high intellectual culture and moral dicipline, but the better prepares its possessors to proclaim the great truths of the Gospel to a dying world; we therefore recommend to the associations and churches, either singly, or conjointly, to afford the means of education as far as they are able, to their young brethren, whom they have set apart to the Ministry.

In view of the great importance of the subject, your Committee further recommend, that a committee of five members be appointed by your honorable body, to submit a plan at your next sessian, by which the iniatory steps in this great work may be taken up, and our denomination be supplied with a Seminary for the educa-

t on of her Ministry.

REPORT OF COLPORTEUR TO EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Beer Brethren — It will be remembered that, in addition to my agency, I was appointed Colporteur about the first of June, to supply the vacancy made by the resignation of Wm. B. Knight. Much could not be accomplished in the short space of four months, even with a good supply of bocks. But it is due to myself to state, that I only received books to the amount of about seventy dollars from Bro. Knight; and although I immediately ordered about five hundred dollars worth from Nashville, Tenn., I did not receive half that amount from that place.

Owing to my limited time, after having been thus disappointed, I was unable to obtain a full supply of books. Thus, you see, I have operated under very unfavorable circumstances; yet it will be seen by reference to Appendix to this Report, that I have sold \$562,36 worth of books; and that the Convention will real-

ize a clear gain, on said sales, of \$115,28.

AGENT'S REPORT.

Dear Brethren — I have ever felt incompetent to the great work which you have assigned to me, as your agent. It was with reluctance and fearful misgiving the twelve months ago, I accepted your appointment. Since that time I have devoted myself entirely to the interests of the Convention, and am pleased at being one to say, that, notwithstanding many circumstances and prejudices have operated a unit our Missionary enterprise, I feel confident that it is growing in the affections of Gcd's people, as well as increasing its means of operation.

The extensiveness of my field of labor, together with the protracted rains during the winter and spring, have rendered it impossible for me to visit all the churches within our bounds; yet I may not be thought egotistical, by stating that, even though I have been encumbered with the Colporteurage, during four months, I have traveled over two thousand miles, visited churches in seven counties, and encever and wherever God, in His providence, has afforded an opportunity. I have, also aided in the constitution of two Churches, and baptised four persons. It has not been my object, so much to obtain money, as to secure the sympathies and prayers of our brethren, in behalf of the great work now before us, and inspire them with

confidence in the operations of the Convention.

Various causes have operated against the objects of my agency, among which are, a general pecuniary embarrassment; a lamentable coldness and apathy on the subject of religion; the circumstances connected with the exclusion of several prominent ministers of the Gospel; and, especially, the manner in which Missionary funds have, in some cases, been collected and expended, aside from the operations of the Convention. With these, and many other obstaeles to encounter, and in view of my limited acquaintance among the brethren, I have not deemed it prudent to urgently solicit private contributions, or public collections. Yet it will be seen, by reference to appendix to this report, that I have collected \$555,10; and, including the efforts of the present meeting, have obtained subscriptions to the amount of \$1,181.00. We have now on our subscription list, near \$3,000.00, \$720.00 of which will come due annually.

But it is a matter of regret that many who have subscribed, do not properly regard the "advice" of the Apostle to the Corinthians; for in speaking upon this subject, he says, "This is expedient for you, who have begun before, not only to do, but to be forward a year ago. Now therefore, perform the doing of it; that as there was a readiness to will, so there may be a performance also out of that which ye have." We have not enough however, on our subscription list, were it

all collected, to prosecute vigorously the great work before us.

Many facts demonstrate, that the time for earnest, efficient effort, has arrived.—
The labors of our Missionaries, are gladly received by the "common people."
Their views of scripture doctrine, of church order and government, are generally approved.

From almost every part of our State, the "cry for Gospel light," is heard.

"They call on us in words direct; or in their notes of wee— Obey, ye saints, your Lord's command—Go preach my Gospel, go."

God has opened the way, has given us every possible encouragement in his word, and now calls upon us to "go in and possess the land."

Shall we not then, Dear Brethren, double our diligence, remembering that, "they that be wise, shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness, as the stars forever and ever." Could the convention, but obtain the small sum of one DOLLAR a year from each one professing to be a Missionary Baptist, in South Arkansas. over two thousand dollars would be annually expended in promulgating the blessed Gospel among our destitute citi-Eternity alone would develope the happy consequences of such an expendi-But alas, many who profess to be laboring in the vineyard of their master, seem to be digging in the earth and hiding their Lord's money. Most of our churches are asking for more ministerial labor, while many of our most acceptable preachers, find it necessary to labor elsewhere for a support. Not one perhaps, within our bounds, obtains a support from churches-none are released form "serving tables," and enabled to give themselees "continually to prayer, and to the ministry of the word." How long, Dear Brethren, shall these things continue? The languishing condition of many churches, together with multitudes who go the way that leads to death, answer, how long?

May God of his mercy impress our minds with the obligations that rest upon us;

and enable us to realize the unspeakable privileges that we enjoy.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Exect tive Committee of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention respectifully press the following report of their labors during the Conventional year, closed. Owing to the fact that the brethren constituting our body by your sparcel ed, and we, therefore, believe it would be better to have the number les.

Fire. Ste. on, who was appointed General Agent, at your last Annual Session, has made his report, to which we refer you for particulars of his labor; but we cannot forbear an eqpression of approbation of his general course, as agent.—With many and very serious obstacles to retard the work assigned him; he has accomplished much, and greatly promoted the interests of the Convention.

Bro. B. L. Wright, our Missionary to the Colored Population on Red River, has labored indefatigably nearly the whole year. The difficulties with which he has had to contend, might well have intimidated one less bold and devoted, but his motto seems to have been "onward." His reports present the most flattering accounts of success. He has failed to attend this meeting; by reason of illness; yet we learn from the most reliable sources, that he has baptised over thirty willing converts; and but for his illness would probably have baptised many more; for others have professed a hope in Christ, and only wait a suitable opportunity of following their Savior, in his appointed ordinance. We also learn that many White persons have become very much interested, and will probably aid the Convention, should Bro. Wright's appointment be renewed.

Bro. Wm. Hardage was appointed; to attend Little Missouri Church, in Clark County, and reports that owing to high waters, and other obstacles he, has only attended about one third of the year. This church that had not for several years been blessed with the preached Gospel, or sent her delegates to the Association,

has this year been represented in the Association and Convention.

Bro. Wm. H. Wyatt, a Missionary of the Board, also reports eighty-four days labor, in the service of the Convention, during which time he baptised twelve persons; aided in the ordination of two deacons, and in the constitution of one church.

Bro. J. Matchet, another Missionary of the Board, reports four months' labor in the North-western part of our State, during which time he baptised twenty-six

persons, and aided in constituting one church of twenty-six members.

Bro. J. Y. Lindsey, another missionary, reports the most flattering prospects in the field in which he has labored. He has baptised twenty-five persons, one of which was a minister of the Methodist order. He also supplied two churches, and assisted in ordaining two deacons. He met with many persons who had never heard a Baptist sermon in the State, and was frequently greeted with the most

earnest solicitations to break to the people the bread of life.

We have thus in a summary way stated a few items in the operations of the board. With what profound feelings of gratitude to the great Head of the church should we review the brief history of our Convention, organized under very unfavorable circumstances; with foes without, and foes within; with a vast uncultivated field before us, and our implements all in disorder, we commenced the work, relying on God as our helper. Our third annual session has rolled around, and reports of success are still cheering. We are fast getting possession of the land, "yet there remaineth very much land to be possessed."

Dear Brethren let us remember the good things the Lord has bestowed upon us; and let us "come up to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against

the mighty."

Should we not seek out those who are impressed with a call to the ministry, and aid them in the cultivation of the talents which the Lord has given them? Let us say in conclusion that energy and union, alone are wanting on our part. Let the churches but consentrate their efforts in the good work, and very soon the "desert will blossom as the rose." Finally brethren we say, go on; think of these things; talk of these things; pray for Divine guidance, and may the Lord of Sabbaoth be your God, is our cincere prayer for his name sake.

Comstitution:

- ARTICLE 1. This body shall be styled the Arkansas Baptist State Conven-
- ART. 2. The convention shall be composed of delegates from Baptist Associations, churches, and individual contributors, who are members of the Baptist Church in good standing.
- ART. 3. Associations shall be entitled to fixe, and churches to three, delegates to
- ART. 4. It is distinctly understood, that this convention shall have no ecclesiastical jurisdiction, nor even act as an advisory council, nor in any way interfere with the constitution of any Church or Association.
- ART. 5. The primary objects of this convention shall be: to supply the destitute regions within its bounds, with the unadulterated Word of Life, and a living ministry, and to aid, by appropriate and scriptural means, all destitute and feeble churches, and also supply the community with such books as may be approved by this body, and as may be thought best calculated to communicate information as to the distinctive doctrines and ordinances of the Gospel of Christ, as received by our denomination. The convention may, whenever consistent with the condition of the treasury, adopt means for the advancement of education, and also for the cause of Foreiga Missions.
- AET. 6. The convention shall, at its annual meetings, elect a President and Recording Secretary, who shall perform the duties usually assigned to such officers, during its session.
- Ast. 7. The convention shall annually elect a President, two Vice Presidents, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and ten or more Managers, who, together, shall compose the Executive Committee; five of whom shall constitute a quorum. The Executive Committee shall transact all business during the recess of the convention and disburse the funds; shall fill all vacancies in its own body, and submit a report of their proceedings at each annual meeting. Each member of the board shall be, ex-officio, a member of the convention.
- Azz. 8. The annual session of this convention shall commence on Friday before the first Sabbath in October, of each year.

Ast. 9. This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention, two-thirds of the members present concurring therein, except the fourth article, which shall for ever remain untouched.

The committee to whom was referred the subject of drafting a constitution for the convention, having examined and compared several of similar character, have agreed upon the above; all of which is most respectfully submitted.

RULES OF DECORUM.

- 1st. The convention shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- 2d. The President shall preserve order, and decide in all cases relating to deco-
- . 3d. Any member not satisfied with his decision, may appeal to the convention on the same day, but at no other time.
- 4th. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise to his feet, and respectfully address the chair.
- 5th. The President, when addressed by a member for permission to speak, shall signify the same by naming the person or otherwise.
- 6th. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject, or use words of personal reflection.
- 7th. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered, unless withdrawn by the mover.
 - 8th. No member shall retire without leave of the President.
- 9th. No member shall speak more than twice on the same proposition, without permission of the convention.
- 19th. The President shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as other members, provided he first fills the chair with some other member; but shall vote enly in case of a tie.
