Dr. Grant became president of Ouachita College in 1933 and served untiringly until 1949 when he became President Emeritus. During this time he raised enrollment and educational levels threefold. On November 4, 1951 Dr. James Richard Grant, "after he had served the counsel of God in his own generation, fell asleep and was laid with his fathers". Dear Ouachitonian:




