'81-'82 enrollment second highest in OBU history

Ouachita is enjoying the second highest enrollment in the school's 95-year history with 1,686 students registered for fall classes, according to Dr. Daniel R. Grant.

The number was surpassed only once in the mid-sixties when the count included nursing school students. The present enrollment figure is a one percent increase over the same period last year, with 85 percent of the students living in school housing.

Class totals include 505 freshmen, 382 sophomores, 286 juniors, 298 seniors, 133 graduate students and 82 special and extension students.

Ouachita students come from 31 states, 20 foreign countries and 71 of Arkansas' 75 counties. Counties sending the most students to the Arkadelphia campus are: Pulaski-203, Clark-148, Jefferson-66, Hempstead-64, Garland-56, Saline-52, Union-52, Ouachita-40, Sebastian-38, Hot Spring-37, White-35 and Lonoke-30.

Major projects are completed by maintenance

The Ouachita Maintenance Department stayed busy all summer with multiple projects designed to ready the campus for the fall semester.

Bill Harkrider, Ouachita maintenance director, and Dr. Ed Coulter, vice president for administration, programmed 12 major projects for completion by the end of August, with numerous smaller projects also on line. The list included:

- Enlarging and beautifying the parking area behind Conger and O. C. Bailey dormitories.

- A 152-room renovation of Daniel dormitory, including new hall tile, new fire extinguishing equipment, replacement of some drapes, carpentry, plumbing, electrical work and repair/replacement of all wooden doors.

- Heat pumps for the apartments of the eight dormitory head residents, allowing for heating and cooling apart from the major systems.

- 400 new backs and seats in Mitchell Hall auditorium.

- New decorative blinds for Frances Crawford dormitory.

- Rebuilt a walk-in freezer in Birkett Williams Dining Hall and changed rooftop mechanical apparatus to ground-level for maintenance.

- Aluminum bleachers at Rab Rodgers Baseball Field and Freeman-Dunklin Tennis Center.

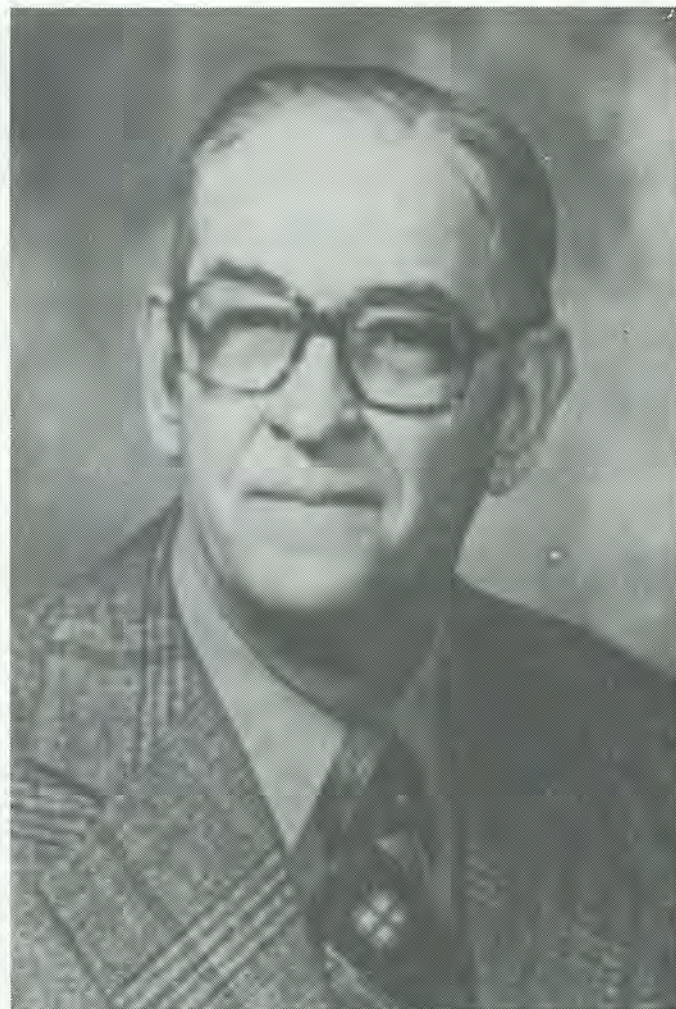
- 32 new windows in Conger men's dormitory.

- New carpet in the Flenniken Drawing Room.

- Modernized two handball rooms in Rockefeller Field House.

- Completed renovation of Blake dormitory begun in 1980.

- Substantial maintenance work in OBU-owned apartments and trailers.

Trustees exceed million-dollar goal

The Trustees-Former Trustees segment of The Ouachita Centennial Advancement Campaign is well past its goal of \$1 million and is on its way toward reaching its challenge goal of \$1.5 million, according to Roger Harrod, OBU's Vice President for Development.

At the same time, the Faculty-Staff drive, which began officially November 9, had by the next day reached \$58,000 toward a base goal of \$125,000, with only 13 percent of the

pledges received. Other Campaigns being planned include those for the Arkadelphia area, the Development Council and the Alumni.

Phase I of the OCAP Campaign is seeking \$4 million each for a new health, physical education and recreation building and a new auditorium plus a \$500,000 increase in the level of annual operating support.

Nine Academic Enrichment Grants awarded

The Paul and Virginia Henry Academic Enrichment Grants have been awarded for the 1981-1982 academic year at Ouachita with a total of \$6000 being offered.

This marks the sixth year that the University and Mr. and Mrs. Henry of Batesville have jointly endowed the program.

The proposals are submitted by faculty members on a competitive basis for innovative programs related to any phase of instruction, including such items as off-campus experiences for the students, supplementary equipment purchases and interdisciplinary studies. The grants are not intended for faculty research projects, but are for "student-related" activities, said Dr. Goodson.

According to Dr. Goodson, the proposals are reviewed first by the five-member awards committee and by sources outside the University with final awarding left

to OBU President Dr. Daniel R. Grant. Recipients of the grants are expected to submit reports of completed projects to the committee.

This year, the committee awarded nine different grants to faculty members. The grants were not to exceed \$1000.

Mike Arrington's Arkansas history class will attend the annual meeting of the Arkansas Historical Association at Hot Springs in April due to a grant of \$900. Arrington is an assistant professor of history.

The music history class of Dr. Thomas W. Bolton, assistant professor of music, will travel to the Dallas Museum of Fine Arts and the Kimbell Art Museum in Fort Worth. While in Dallas, they will attend two operas presented by the Metropolitan Opera of New York City. The \$1000 grant will also include a new slide projector and slides for the School of Music.

With a \$1000 grant, 10 science students and two faculty members will utilize the National Center for Toxicological Research at Jefferson, for a two-week mini-course on toxicology.

Dr. Tom Greer, assistant professor of philosophy, and Dr. Jim Berryman, professor of religion and philosophy, will undergo a study project related to various lifestyles in the lower South entitled, "Lifestyles of the Ark-La-Miss." An extensive field trip in the tri-state area will take place in May of 1982. The \$1000 grant will aid in defraying the expenses for the trip.

Dr. Paul Hammond, chairman of the church music department, was granted \$1000 to take church music students to New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary in conjunction with a study of hymnology during the spring semester of 1982.

Bryan Harmon, assistant professor of mathematics, received a \$1000 grant for the Mathematics Department to purchase a micro-computer system in conjunction with the formation of a science/computer "club."

Donna Hutchison and Ted Barnes of the Art Department were awarded \$860 to take a group of students to visit museums and galleries in the Dallas/Fort Worth area.

A \$900 grant was awarded to Dr. Randy Smith, assistant professor of psychology. He proposed to take a group of about 16 students to the annual convention of the Southwestern Psychological Association in Dallas, Texas.

To finance the beginning of a computer research/education center in McClellan Hall, \$1000 was granted to the Political Science Department.

In search of a subject

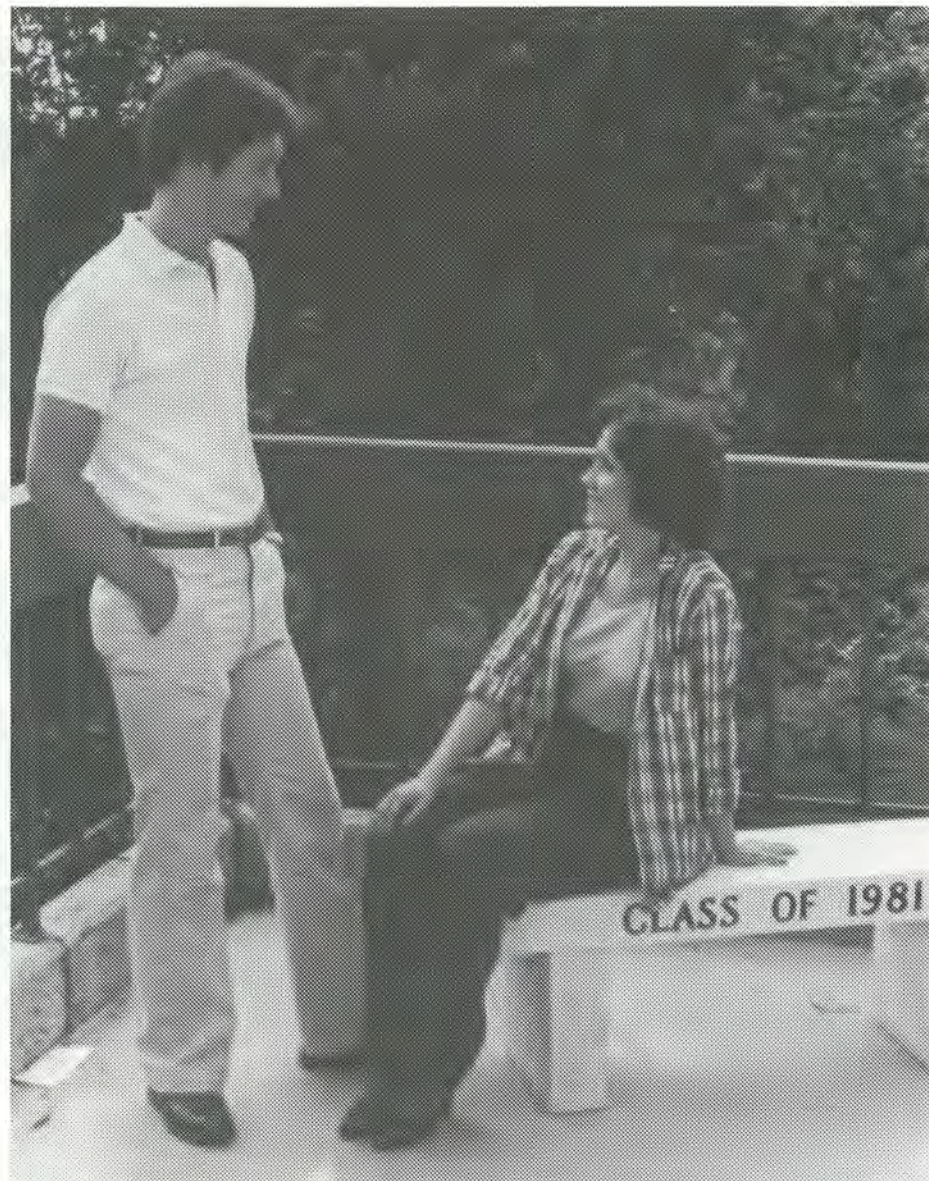

Ministerial student receives first Bayless scholarship

Gary Wise of Hot Springs, a junior religion major at Ouachita, is the first recipient of a newly-established endowed ministerial scholarship fund at the school to be known as the Dr. O. L. Bayless Ministerial Endowment Fund established by Second Baptist Church of Hot Springs.

The endowment fund is named for a former pastor of the church who was guest of honor at the establishment of the \$25,408.97 scholarship fund during a church service in November, 1980.

Ouachita has turned this fund over to the Arkansas Baptist Foundation for management. The annual income derived from it will be used for scholarships for minis-

terial students with preference going first to those students coming from Second Baptist Church, and then to other students from Central Baptist Association.

President Daniel R. Grant of Ouachita expressed his confidence that "Gary Wise is the first of a long list of deserving ministerial students who will be helped to receive a Christian education, while honoring an outstanding Baptist leader like Dr. O. L. Bayless."

Wise will receive \$1,240 from the scholarship fund which will pay the balance of his room, board, tuition and general fees after other forms of student assistance are figured.

Debate program may be 'strongest ever'

"The purpose of debate is to teach college students the skills involved in research, logical arguing, and the ability to express themselves clearly and forcefully in advocate, or life situations," said Roy Buckelew, chairman of the Ouachita Speech and Drama Department and sponsor of the forensic and debate teams at OBU.

Buckelew said there were around 20 people involved in the forensics team at Ouachita and one half of those were on the debate team. The remaining members participate in individual events such as speaking and oral interpretation.

The teams this year have received strong support from President Daniel R. Grant. "This type of administrative support is very important in any kind of successful program, combined with the fact that Dr. Grant, himself, is a former college debater while a student at Ouachita," said Buckelew.

"This year's debate team has the potential to be the strongest Ouachita has ever had and we hope the beginning of a very sound and strong educational program," Buckelew said.

The approach that will be taken this year will mainly be for members to participate at their own pace, since some may only be part-time. Buckelew doesn't anticipate much difference from last year's team under then sponsor Dr. Bob Derryberry. He did say however that there would be more competing and considerably more activities than last or any year. "All in all, it will be a very ambitious program," he said.

Indeed it will be, with the team participating in or observing in some 16 tournaments throughout the year, ranging in location from Manhattan, Ks. to Shreveport, La. to Houston, Tx. Recently, debate team members went to observe "one of the biggest and best tournaments in the country" in Oklahoma City, Ok. For many, it was a first time to observe debating in any form and was in turn very profitable.

The national debate topic the teams will be presenting in tournaments is "Resolved: That the Federal Government should significantly curtail the powers of

labor unions in the United States."

Buckelew said that the debate or forensics teams were open to anyone interested, no matter the major. He said, "Debate is mainly for those interested in majoring in law, politics, or the ministry, or just for those interested in scholarly debate. The program builds confidence or helps in learning to express oneself well."

In order for a student to participate completely, Buckelew said they must: 1)

be prepared to spend considerable time in preparing their cases; 2) be able to research a subject thoroughly; 3) be willing to work with their partners; 4) make as many weekend trips as possible to the various tournaments; and 5) possess the ability to think on their feet and organize their thoughts quickly and logically.

Team members this year include: Dwight Magnus, a freshman, and Drew Shofner, a junior, both from Del City,

Ok.; Bertram Barnes, a sophomore from Benton, and Jay Curlin, a junior from Fort Smith; Mark Hicks, a sophomore from Greenwood, and Tona Chambers, a freshman from Monticello; Criss Colclasure, a junior from North Little Rock. Also participating are Anita Warren, a senior from Arkadelphia, and Steve Russell, a freshman from Del City.

Nadine Marshall, a junior from Arkadelphia and a member of last year's debate team, will be in charge of research for the teams. Shofner, also a member of last year's team, will act as special student assistant, working with the teams in the areas of research and planning cases for tournaments.

Buckelew is a graduate of Oklahoma Baptist University, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, and is nearing completion of a Ph.D. degree in communications from the University of Southern California. He has been a pastor for more than 20 years in Oklahoma, Texas, and California, and for the last two years has been the Director of Public Relations at Oklahoma Baptist University. At Ouachita, he is the chairman of the Speech and Drama Department and Assistant Professor of Speech.

The fall schedule for the Ouachita orators is: Southwestern Missouri State University in Springfield, Oct. 23-25; Louisiana State University at Shreveport, Nov. 6-7; ASCA Student Congress at Little Rock, Nov. 8-10; The University of Houston and the Houston Baptist University, Nov. 20-24; and the Oral Interpretation Workshop at Petit Jean Lodge, Dec. 4-5.

The spring schedule is: practice debates with the University of Arkansas at Monticello, Jan. 10; the University of Texas at Arlington, Jan. 15-17; the University of Central Arkansas at Conway, Jan. 28-30; the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville, Feb. 13-14; Southeastern State University at Durant, Ok., Feb. 19-20; ASCA Speech Festival at Little Rock, Mar. 5-6; Kansas State University at Manhattan, Ks., Mar. 26-27; and Pi Kappa Delta Regional Tournament at Hammond, La., Apr. 1-3.

Berryman elected to Civitan post

Dr. Jim Berryman, Professor of Religion and Philosophy, was named President-Elect of Civitan International at its 61st annual convention, meeting in New Orleans this summer. He will serve as the organization's president beginning October 1, 1982.

He has served as local club president, Lt. Governor, Chaplain and Governor of the Ozark District, Vice President of Zone 8, and Governor-Elect Training Academy Instructor. Civitan International is an association of over 1,000 service clubs in seven nations.

Berryman holds the Club Honor Key, Special Club Service Award, Outstanding Lt. Governor Award, District Honor Key, and an International Honor Key.

New all-weather track ready to go

Ouachita recently joined the ranks of schools with an artificial surface outdoor track when OBU graduate Charles Jackson of Little Rock led a successful \$70,000 fund-raising drive for the installation of a ME-2 surface at A. U. Williams Field.

Jackson, a former athlete for the Tigers, pledged \$25,000 of the total amount and helped the Ouachita Development Office to obtain additional funding for the project.

"There is no question that Ouachita now has an all-weather track because of the generous gift from Charles Jackson and because of the contacts he made in helping us to secure the additional funds," said Roger Harrod, vice president for development at OBU. "Certainly the Uni-

versity appreciates each gift that was made to the track fund, but clearly Charles Jackson was the man with the vision."

Ouachita's new outdoor track surface was installed by Powell Moorhead, a well-

known contractor of outdoor track surfaces from Indianapolis, Indiana.

The new track surface replaces an old red cinder track originally installed in the stadium in 1960.

\$10,000 O.S.F. scholarship endowed

A \$10,000 endowed scholarship in honor of the late Joseph F. and Grace Bone Synder of Hot Springs has been given to the Ouachita Student Foundation, according to Carol Roper, OSF director.

The scholarship will be awarded in the amount of \$1,000 per academic year to an

outstanding junior or senior OBU student who is deserving in academic standing, financial need, and achievement and service to the institution.

The award will be presented during Tiger Traks Weekend next April.

Blind graduate hired for Disney World 'first'

Becky Henry, a 1980 graduate of Ouachita with three bachelor's degrees, and a trainee at Arkansas Enterprises for the Blind in Little Rock, learned this fall that dreams can come true. Sometimes they just take a while.

Even in her dreams, though, she would have been amazed to learn that in October 1981 she would be the first blind person to be hired in a professional position by Disney World of Orlando, Fl.

Her fairy tale began when Disney World personnel heard about AEB's computer programmer course. After examining the program and the performance of its employed graduates, Disney World officials notified AEB that they were interested in hiring blind computer programmer trainees, with the stipulation that they must be college graduates. Becky was the only person eligible in the current class that graduates this November.

From this point on, Becky recalled that everything happened so quickly that it hardly seems real. The excitement of her first commercial flight and her first trip to Florida was veiled by a tenseness of the approaching interview. Once off the plane, she was interviewed by six different people from various departments, including the data processing department manager. The same afternoon, she flew back to Little Rock, having seen only one attraction at Disney World—the Hall of Presidents.

She does remember being so excited about the trip that she couldn't eat dinner the night before or breakfast before her flight. By lunchtime, she was famished and expected to get a sandwich or something because she was on a lunch flight. But the flight attendants ran out of food before they got to her seat. Then at Disney World, the people who met her assumed that she had lunch on the plane.

"I kept looking down at my stomach and hoping it would be quiet until the interviews were over," said Becky, whose intelligence and good looks don't overshadow her sense of humor.

Three weeks later Disney World called to tell her that she had been hired as a programmer/analyst trainee. Her work begins as soon as a braille terminal is set up in Orlando. After she got the job, Becky was notified by the Arkansas Office for the Blind and Visually Impaired that the state would purchase a Braille Link, a paperless braille terminal, for her to use on the job.

Blind from birth, Becky has light perception and a limited amount of objective perception. She attended the School for the Blind in Little Rock, leaving an im-

pressive record. She was student body president her senior year and valedictorian of her senior class, and was named most likely to succeed.

Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Henry, two brothers and one sister live in Waldo, Ar.

Following graduation from Ouachita with degrees in psychology and sociology, secondary education/social studies and choral music education, Becky returned to Little Rock where she would have bus transportation, to spend six months looking for a job. She learned that jobs in her educational fields were scarce, and when they were open, they went to sighted people first. She was even willing to be underemployed in a secretarial or other position available.

About that time she heard about AEB's computer programmer course and decided to try it, knowing that the job market in computers was good and knowing that she had always had an interest in computers.

Her decision proved to be an important one. The nine months of intensive training with seven hours of class work each day and up to 30 additional hours after class each week was worth the effort.

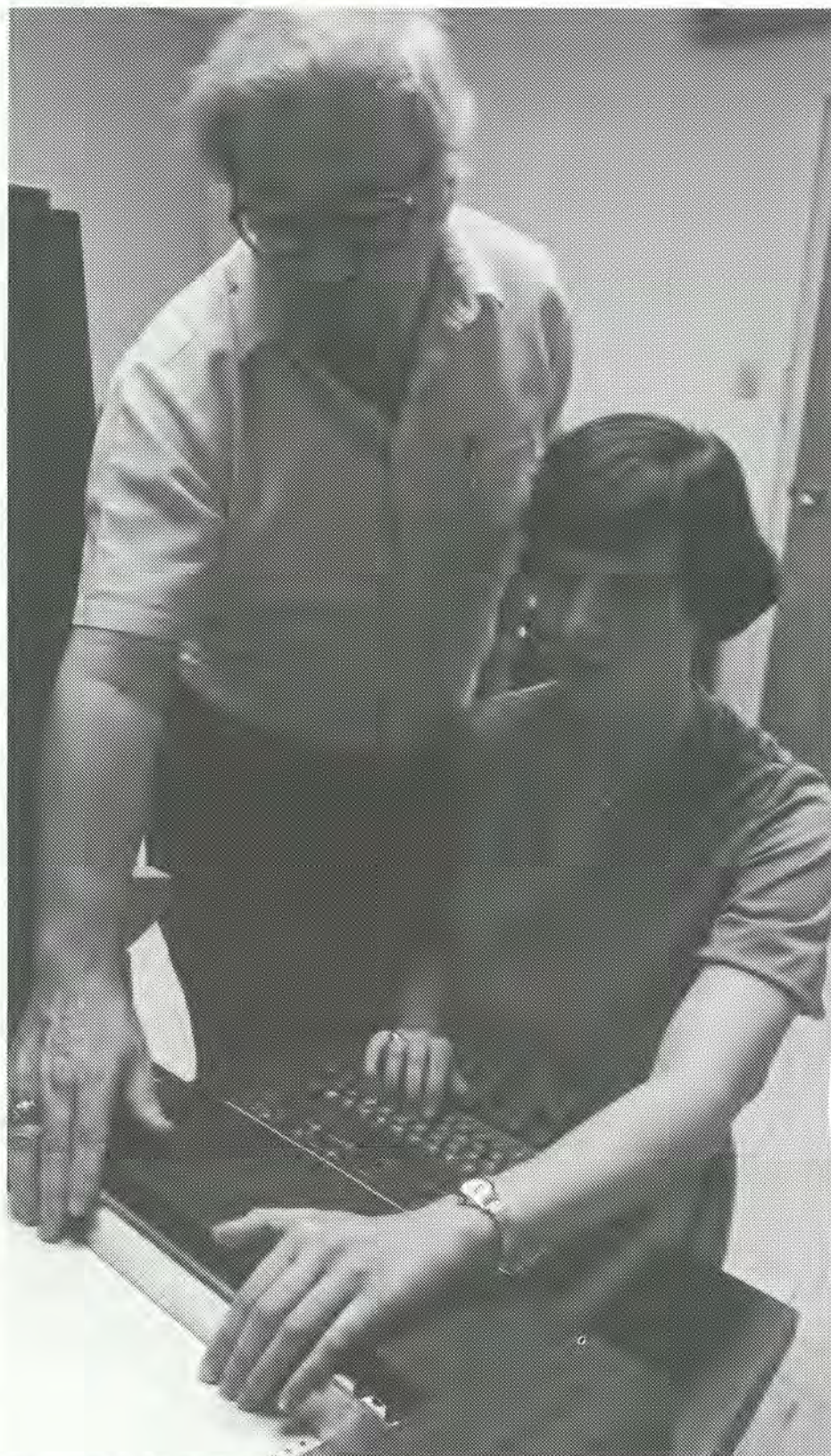
"I look on this job opportunity as a career," said the 26-year-old, explaining her goals. "I would like to study more advanced programming. For a blind person, this field is great. I don't see any reason why a blind person couldn't compete as well as anyone else in computers."

In the last 10 years Disney World has hired 65 blind persons, but she will be the first professional blind member of the staff, which consists of about 17,000 employees. The only questions in the interviews that dealt with her blindness concerned her feelings about being the only blind person in the computer department and her ability to find transportation to and from work. Becky said neither of these areas would pose a problem for her.

Her parents, naturally, were concerned about her moving so far away by herself. But the move doesn't frighten Becky.

"I just look upon this as a new adventure," she said. "All my mobility and personal management skills are good, so I can manage. Of course, my parents are also excited for me. It's just kind of hard to believe. All my life I always wanted to have a real exciting career. I never really dreamed—I mean I dreamed—but I never thought I'd find something like this."

AEB, sponsored by the Lions Clubs, is a private, non-profit rehabilitation center for blind and visually impaired individuals that has served more than 4,700 people since its beginning in 1947.

Student spends summer in archeological 'dig'

Karen Wallace of Bryant, Ar., a Ouachita senior, spent one of the more unusual vacations last summer at an archeological dig in Southern England with cold, foggy weather as a backdrop for her holiday fun.

For five weeks, Karen was involved in a program called, "British Archeology Summer Seminars and Excavation," along with 16 other students from the United States. The archeological excavation was sponsored by The Association For Cultural Exchange in Cambridge, England.

Six of the students chose a digging site called Claydon Pike, near Fairford, in Gloucestershire. They lived in tents, dug all day long, and went to the pub at night where Karen says everyone laughed at her Pepsi while they drank their "bitters" or beer.

"I have always been interested in Archeology and had taken Biblical Archeology and Medieval Germanic Literature classes, but I got interested in Celtic people and their way of life by reading their folklore," Karen said.

Everything about the trip involved firsts for Karen. She had never flown before, yet made all of the flight connections on her own, she had never been on a train, but still braved the busy stations, and digging at an archeological site was a first, also.

"The first few days of digging," Karen explained, "I worked with a shovel and helped dig a 30-foot by four-foot deep trench. After that, I began using trowels and brushes and eventually we found things from bones, knives, spearheads, pottery, loomweights, and parts of a grinding wheel, to coins. "One coin had the head of Constantine on it, which was really exciting because it dated the site," she said. Everything discovered was cleaned, catalogued, and given to a museum for display.

Karen chanced upon the opportunity to dig at the archeological site quite by accident. "I saw a little notice on the bulletin board outside of Betty McCommas's door, and she sent me to Dr. Joe Nix who had helped a student get funds for an archeological dig before," she explained. With Dr. Nix's help, Karen received an \$800 grant from the honors program at OBU and \$800 from private sources, which gave her enough for her ticket and the excavation program.

The people were different from the average OBU student, Karen said, and they were hard to get to know because they were so reserved. "But once they saw you were an American student," she explained, "they opened up some, and they are really nice people. They laughed at the way I talked, but it took me quite

a while to understand them, also, especially the people from Liverpool!" she went on.

The food took some getting used to because it was so bland; nevertheless, Karen says she gained 10 pounds. "The sun would come up at 4:30 and I didn't have to get up until 8 a.m., so I would lie in my tent and eat pastries called "McVities Home Wheats" with milk chocolate icing. I even thought about sneaking some back home with me, but I ate them on the way back instead," she laughed.

As Karen looked back on the trip, she reflected that she learned a lot about the Iron Age and the Celtic people and broadened her horizons through experiences like a trip to the London Museum where she saw things she had only seen in textbooks, and says all of it will help in her independent study at Ouachita.

Archeology still holds quite a bit of interest for Karen, but she says many workers in that field are out of work and it doesn't look as promising a career as she would like for it to.

Karen went on to say, "My advice to students wanting to do something like this is to not be afraid of travel. Anywhere you go in the world, you are going to meet nice people, and it is so worthwhile."

CLASS NOTES

1910

Mrs. N. M. Campbell (Arkadelphia Morton, f.s.) of Dumas, Ar., attended Ouachita from 1906 to 1910, but lacked just 12 hours of graduation. She taught school for 39 years, however, on the strength of her OBC education.

Her continuing interest in, and loyalty to Ouachita prompted the decision to name her an "honorary" Gold Tiger on Mother's Day, May 10, in a ceremony at the morning worship service. Dr. Greer reports it was a moving experience, honoring the widow, who, with her superintendent husband, had pioneered in the schools of New Mexico.

1918

Hawkins (Joyce Shackelford) of Foreman, Ar., received the Arkansas Church Musician of the Year Award for cities of less than 25,000 population, from the state Federation of Music Clubs at its annual meeting in Little Rock. 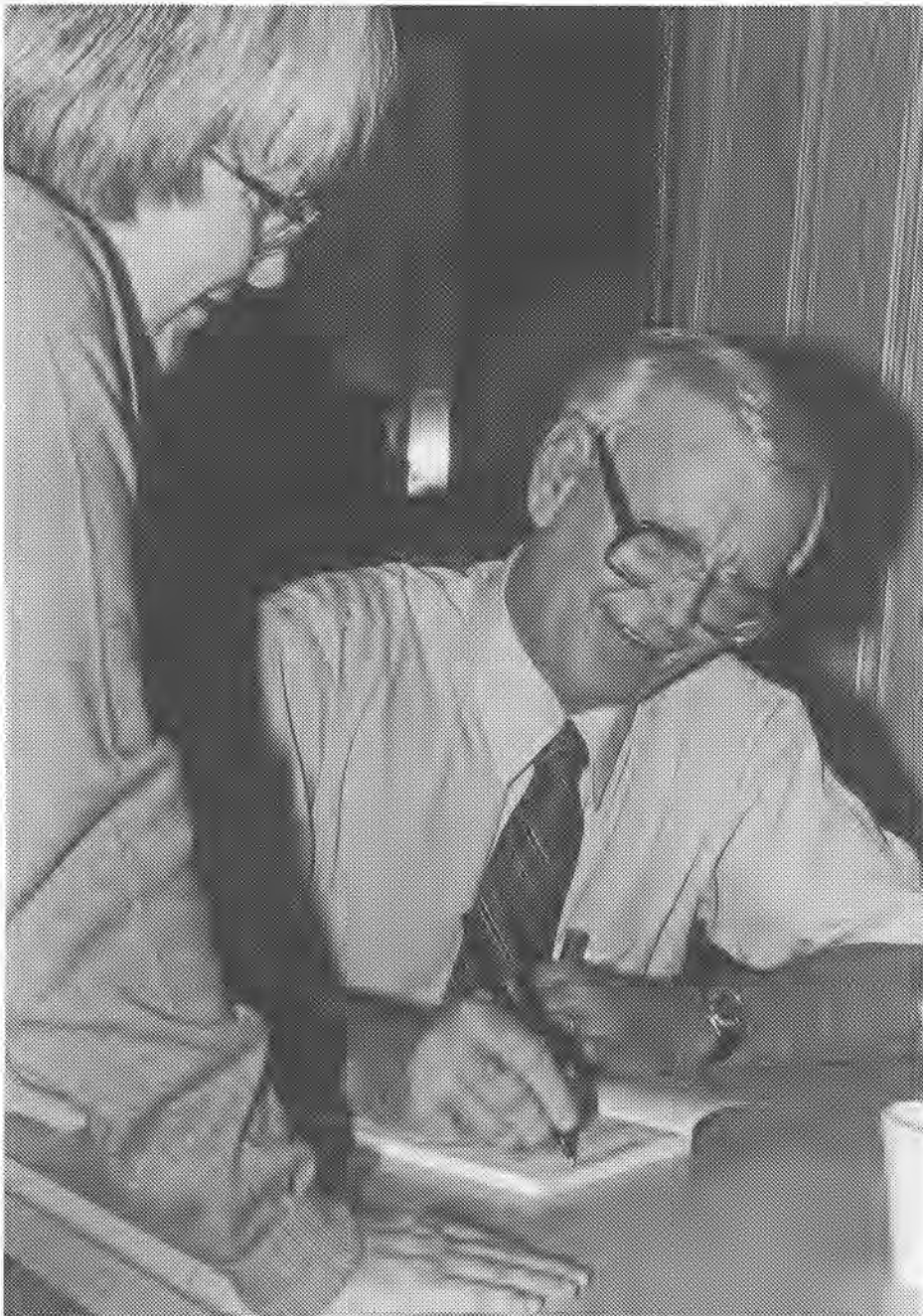
1963
