The Arkansas Baptist State Convention held its fift anniversary with Mine Creek Church, Hempstead County, commencing Saturday, Oct. 2d 1852.

The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. Allen M. Scott, from II Kings X chapter and part of the 15 th verse-"Is thine heart right?" An inquiry well suited to the times; and impressively presented "to those who heard the discourse.

The Convention was organised with Rev. E. Haynes, Vice President in the Chair, and Rev. S. Stevenson Secretary pro tem.

## REPORT ON BIBLE REVISION,

Your committee are deeply impressed with the importance of the task devolving on them. We regard the struggle which the advocates of Biblical truth are now making, to give the pure, and unadulterated word of God to the world by a new and faithful revision of our common version of the sacred scriptures, as one fraught with interests to the church of Clirist, of no common magnitude. We regret to find many professed christiaus; and many intelligent Baptists, too, who are opposed to the measure.

Your committee beg leave to say, that ns individuals, as mombers of the church of Curist, as Ministers of the Gospel, as lovers of the truth, we have for many years, felt the need of a faithful translation of the sacred Scriptures. We have viewed the subject with due seriousness : "we tave examined it in all its attitudes, we have weighed the arguments alduced both for and against it, and we are more than ever convinced, that the cause of truth requires it.

The scriptures were written by various writers, at various times, and in different languages. Those languages have fallen iuto disuse, or rather, havo long since ceased to be used as spoken languages. The Bible has been translated several times into the English language, but such have ever been the circumstances attending the trauslations, and those engaged in it, that no faithful Engtish version has ever yet, been given to the world. Various words have been left untranslated, the meaning of which the mere English scholar can have no just conception. To know what thoy mean, he must consult 'comnicintators, and Biblo dictionaries, or refer to protessors of Divinity. As regards many persons none of thoso aids are attaimable.

Your committee regret, that, restricted as we aro to the limits of a short report, we cannot, for the want of space, more than himt atthe prominent fea-

Iures of this important subjeet. However that we may illustrate the truth of the position last assumed, viz: that many words in our common version have been left untranslated, and that individual who is not versed in the original language, must necessarily be at a loss for the true meaning, we beg leave to present one or two examples. Our Saviour, Mat. v. 22, says "And whosoever shall say unto his brother, Raca shall be irr danger of the council ge." The word Raca is left untranslated. It means in plain English "thou vain fellovothen, we ask, would it not be better for it to be translated, and not lef ns an unmeaning word in the book of Divine Truth? This passage if translated would read "And whosoever shall say to his brothers thou vain fellow, shall be in danger of the council?" Afgain, 1 Cor. xvi, $22 . \mathrm{v}$ "Ifany man love not the Lord Jesus Christ, let him be anathema. Maranatha." The last two words have been left untranslated, and are, therefore, unintelligible to the unlearned.There is no good reason why these words should not have been rendered into plain, common English; thus, "If any man love not the Lord Jesus, let him be accursed, whom the Lord accurses." We have not space for more instances; suffice it to say, that there are hundreds of such instances. The friends of rovision, desire that every word shall be renderad into plain English.

Not only have hundreds of words been left untranslated, but in other instances improper, and decidedly incorrect translations have been given. Of this there is no doubt-in fact, the learned of all denomination are agreed in this respect. Then, we ask, why not rectify those errors? Do wee not owe it to the cause of trntll? Do we not owe it to the church of Christ? Would we permit a common school book, containing manifest errors to bo placed in the hands of our children? Do we not require our text books to be correct in all respects? Then, what good reason can any one adduce, why the Bible, the book of books, the poor man's friend. the cliristim's guide, should not be given in pure, chaste, plain, good English. The friends of truth have nothing to fear from such a translation. Those who are in error themselves, and have either not disfovered their crror, or are too prond in heart to recant, and wish to lead others into like errors, may, and no douot will, oppose this great and good work.

All evangelical denominations, werbelieve-are disposed to give the word of God to heathens, by faithfully translating the sacred scriptures into their own language. Why not give it to our own people? why not translate it into our own language?
Perhaps it may not be improper in this place, to remark that the enterprize of this nature now before the world, is not so mnch a translation as a revision. The present version is to be used, and its plirnsealogy adopted, wnless evidentIy at variance with the intention of the saered pensman. We beg leave further to add, that this measure is not, and ought not to be denominational in its character. Christinns of all names. have been invited to engnge in it. And there is no good reason why all shonld not unite in it. If the present version is defective, surely all ought to be willing to have the defects removed; and if not defertive, the friends of Biblical truth, have nothing to apprehend from its undergoing the scrutiny of the learned.

As a Board, we have adhered rigidly to the principle of creating no debt.We believe that debt would be the destruction of our Convention. We regret that we have not been able to affect any thing, but as we have no means, it could not be reasonally expected of us. Wo hope that the next year will be more prosperous than the last, and that something inay be done to adrance the causc of our Redeemer on earth.

## ADDRESS.

## PROV. I, 23. "Tarn you at my reproof."

Dear Brethren: It becomes my duty in behalf of this Convention, to present once more for your prayerful consideration, the claims of Domestic Missions ; or rather, the claims of the Gospel at home.
It is gratifying to know that the time is past, whan intelligent christions, deny that "they that preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel," (I Cor. 9, 14,) -that those who "sow unto your spiritual things" should "reap your car nal things." Yet while it is most heartily admitted that the minister should be supported and the bread of eternal life should be sent to those who are perishing; too many professed followers of him who 'though lie was rich yet for your sakes became poor," do practically say to their minister-pas-tor-shepherd, be ve clothed and be ye fed. Instead of enabling the man of God to give himself "continualty to prayer and to the ministry of the word," complaints, objections and criticisms, come thick and fast, if they ate not interested and edefied by monthly sermons prepared at the plowhandle, in the school room, or on an ox cart.

Burdens greivous to be borne are thus laid upon the servants of the church.
And what are the consequences? The heart of every truly pious christian sickens at the contemplation. For who among the followers of the blessed Saviour can see churches languishing and dying for want of a pastorflocks being scattered abroad for want of a shepherd, almost whole countics in a destitute condition, and devoted ministers seeking other fields of lnbor, where they may give themselves wholly to the work; without exclaiming in the language of the Prophet, "Oh that my head were waters, and mine eyes a fountain of teare, that 1 might wcep day and night for the slain of the daughters of my people."

Faithfulness becomes the people of God. Indeed we must not suffer sin upon a brother. I am therefore disposed to speak with plainness and candor. Our cliristian obligations must be met here or hereafter. That day is near at hand which will try mens souls. "But who may abide the day of his coming? and who shall'stand when l'e appeaseth? for he is like a refiner's fire." (Mal. III, 2.)
When the great enemy of ine Gospel Mission fails in arousing direct opposition to the plan of redemption his object is secured with equal certaintv.
by raising objections to the means used or cven by quieting conscience inte practical indifference. Conscience may be quieted, excuses may be multiplied, objections may be raised, and the herald of the cross may seek a competent support elsewhere; but how shall we escape if we neglect so great sal-vation,"-(Heb. 2, 3,) if we neglect in our prayers and most hearty co-operation, to support and spread abroad to earth's remolert bounds, the gladsome news of redeeming love.

And now dear reader, does the inquiry berin to rise in thy heart by grace remewed, "Lord what wilt thou have me to do ?"

If so, we would invite youtprayerfit consideration to the claims of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention; the legitimate offspring of tho Baptist denomination in South Arkansas. It was brought forth with prayers nnd tears-with joy and gladness. It was truly a child of promise. Fond anticipations were cherished by many a pious heart, in its future usefulness. Bnt alas! its mother has almost forsaken jt , even. in infincy, and it is In t to dromp and pine away for want of necessary support. But there are still some who feel a deep interest in our infant Convention. Whose prayers and tenrs ascend to a throne of grace in its behalf. The ardent and incrensing interest manifested by those who were present at the last anniversary. inspires the the heart with fresh hopes for the fature. God has not furgolton his penple. "For the earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lorrd, as the waters cover the sea, ${ }^{\bullet}$ (Hab. II, 14.) Arkansnis will be supplinh with the Gospel. All things are now ready. No seas to crnss-no native lanal to forsake-no hostile despot to interdict-no foreign langunge to enenumper -no heathen projudices to remove; but the Macedoninn cry is heard in every county in the State. A voice from Heaven is heard-"go zenrk toritay in my vineyard." May I not again ask, how shall we escape if we negloct such a plain and pressing duty. What woe do must be done quickly. The writer and the reader of these lines will soon meet at the jurgment sont of Christ. If faithful, God himself shall wipe all tears from our cyes. ## [11] <br> CONSTITUTION.

Aat. 1. This society shall we styled the Red Rizer Regular Baplist Edueation Society.
Arr. 2. The object of this society shall be the cuucation of ministers of the Gospel of the Reguler Baptist chatirch.
Akr. 3. In order to become a beneficiary ofthis society, the candidate must be a regular licensed or ordaincd minister of the Gospel, in gooll standiug in some Baptist church: He must be also arproved by at board ol managers or a committee-herealiter to be named.
Art. 4. Any person may become a member of this society by contributing one dollar annually to itsfands.
Art. 5. The ofticers of this society shatl be a Presidentr. Wiec President, Secreiaty, 1reasiter, and five managers, who shall be ex-ollicio members of the board, any three of whem shall constitute a quorum for business. They shall meet as often as circumstances may require; and transact all such business generally entrustrd to such Joards. They sball make an annual report to the socicty of ant their proceedings in wrting. The Presildeng shall be elec= ted aninually by the members jptestrit, in"sucti way as they may think proper. Hc shall preside over the deliberations of the socieiy at its annual meeting, and in his absence the Vice President, and in the absence of either, such person as the society shall think proper. The Decretary shall kecp a just account of the proceedings of the society in a bcok kept for the purpose, free fos tho inspection of any of the members an any time. The Treasurer shall hold the funds of the society subject to the order of the board or the society. He shall give bond and security for all moneys coming into his hands (if required) by cither a majority of the board or society.
Abr. O. The society shall hold annual meetings at the time and place of the meeting of the Red River Association of regular Baptist, or at such other times and phaces as the society may deem propor.
'This constitutiou may be amended or altered by a two third vote, at any annual meeting.


## GONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This body shall be styled the Arfansas Baptigt State Convention.

Arr. ©. The Convention shall be composed of delegates from Baptis: Assiciations, churches; and individual contributore, who are members of the Baptist Church in good standing.

Arr. 3. Associations shall be entitled to five, churches three delegates to the convention.

Art. 4. It is distinctly understond, that this convention shall have no ecclesiastical jurisdiction, nor even act as an advisory council, nor in any way interfere with the constitation of any Church, or Association.

Art. 5. The primary objects of-this convention shall be: to supply the destitute regions within its bounds, with the unadulterated Word of Lifo, and a living ministry, and to aid by appropriate and scriptural means, all destitute and feeble churches; and also supply the community with such books as may be approved by this body, and as may be thought best calculated to communicate information as to distinctive doctrines and ordinances of the Gospel of Christ, as received by our denomination. The convention may whenever consistent with the condition of the treasury, adopt means for tho

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adrancement of education, and also for the cause of Foreign Missions.
Ari. G. The convention shall, at its annual meetings, elect a President and Recording Secretary; who shall perform the duties usually assigned such officers, during the session.

Art. 7. The convention shall amnully elect a President, two Vice Presdents, Corresponiding Secretary, Treasurer, and ten or more Munagers, who, together, shall compose the Excentive Committee; five of whom shall constitute a quorum. The Executive Committee shall transact all busin ees during the recess of the convention, and distbure the funds; shall fill al! vacancies in its ownody, and subuit a report of their proceedings at each regular meeting. Each mernber of the buard shall be, ex-officio, a member of the convention.

Art. 8. The annual session of this convention shall commence on Friday before ihe first Sabbath in October, of each year.

Art. 9. This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the convention, two-thirds of the members present concurring therein, except the fourth article, which shall ever remain untouched:
