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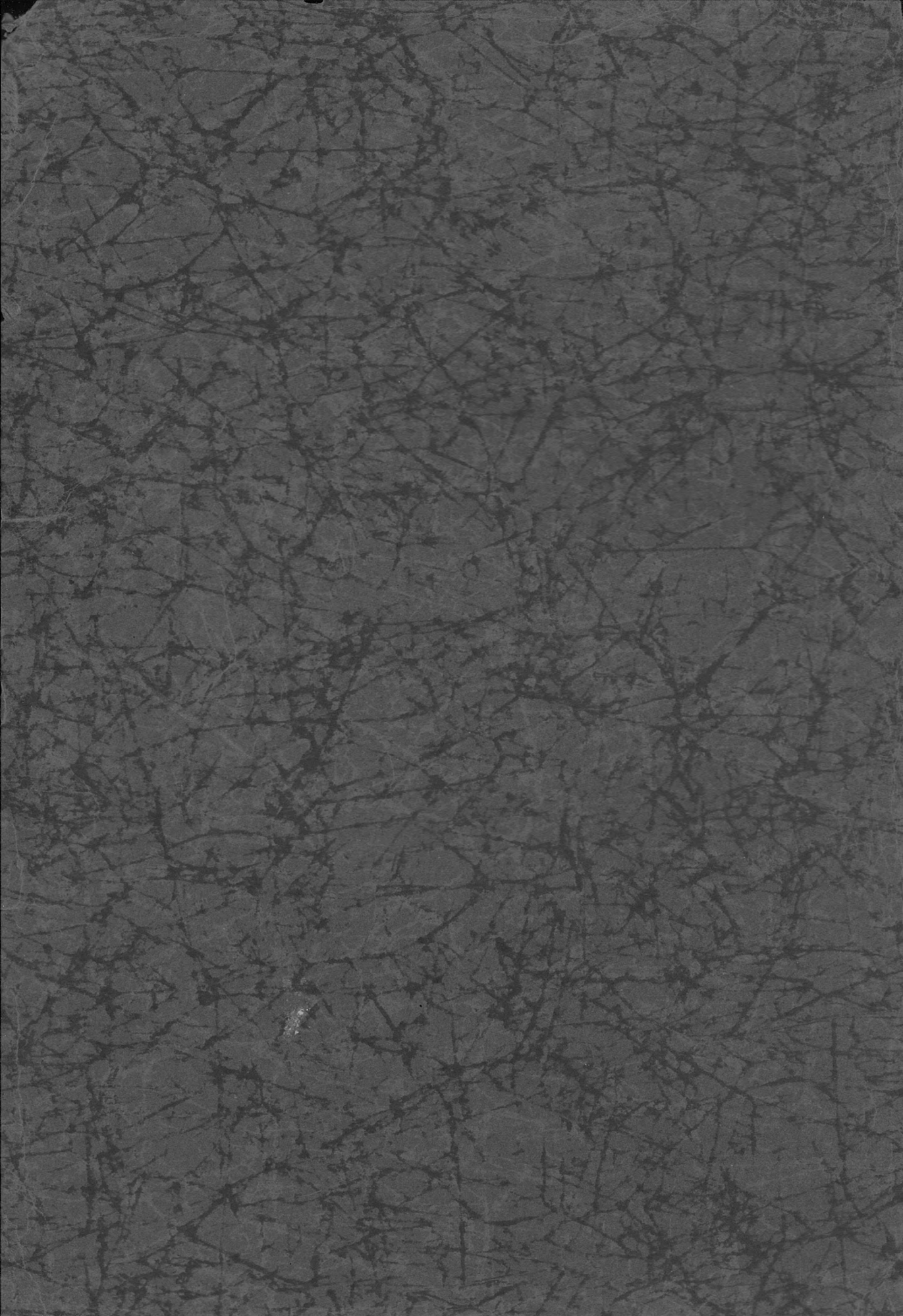

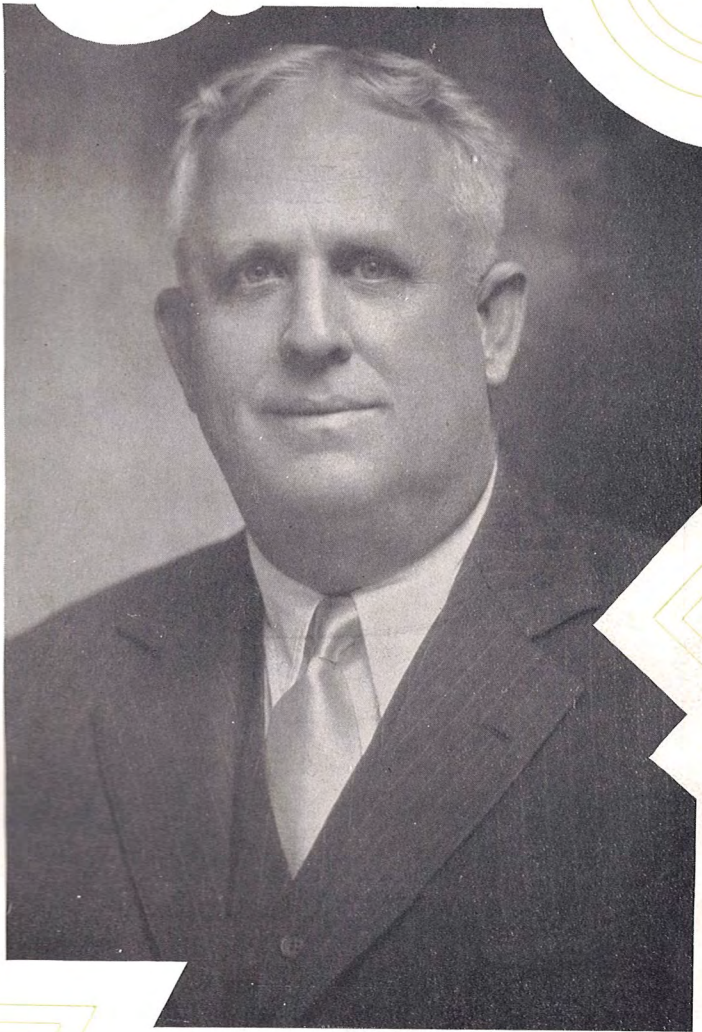


DEDICATION

Mr. W. N. Adams was elected as a member of the Ouachita Board of Trustees at the age of nineteen. From that time until his removal to New Orleans in June, 1929, he served continually as an active member of the Board.

For a period of fifteen years Mr. Adams was President of the Board. During that time Ouachita eliminated the Preparatory Department and strengthened the College of Liberal Arts; Cone Bottoms Hall and the College Dining Hall and the Athletic Stadium were erected. Before his retirement the endowment was more than half a million dollars and Ouachita was admitted to membership in the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

With appreciation for the untiring efforts and constructive plans and lasting achievements of this devoted and ever loyal Ouachita friend the 1930 Ouachitionian is gratefully dedicated.

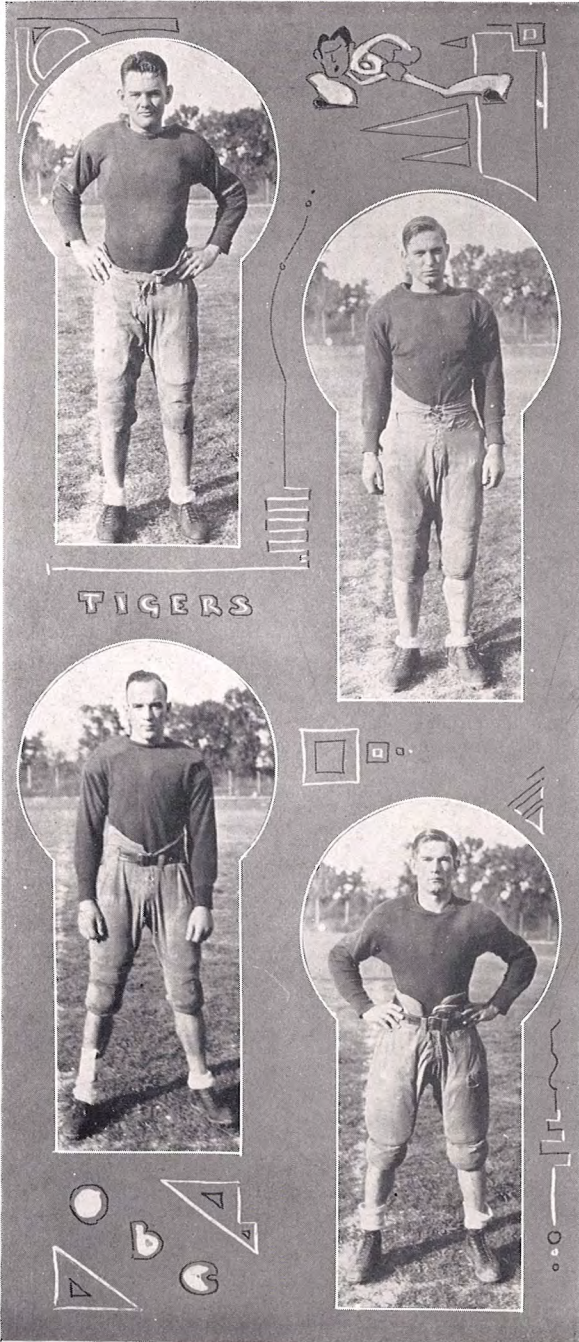
EVANDER MOSLEY . . . Guard

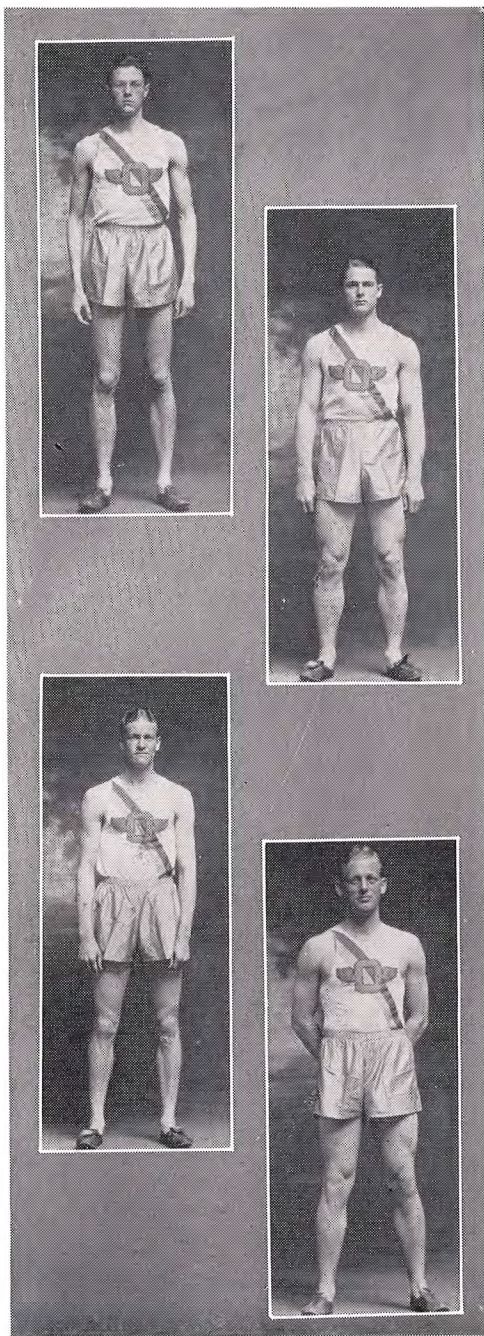


TRACK

The track season of 1930 for Ouachita was the most successful in the history of the college. The Tiger track team was the recognized champion of Arkansas. The trackmen defeated the following schools in dual meets: Texarkana Junior College, University of Arkansas, College of the Ozarks, State Teachers College, and Hendrix-Henderson. At Clarksville the Tigers won the State College meet with $56\frac{1}{2}$ points, to $34\frac{1}{2}$ for their nearest competitors. Led by Captain J. Raymond Baine, the Tigers of 1930 are the first to bring the track championship of Arkansas to Ouachita.

Four new records were set by the Bengals. The most notable were Rankin's record of 9.9 seconds in the 100-yard dash, and Swaim's mark of 198 feet 9 inches in the javelin. The 880-yard relay team cracked its old record in this event, bringing it down to 1 minute 30.7 seconds. The mile medley relay team lowered the old record, held by Hendrix-Henderson, over six seconds, to place a mark of 3 minutes 41.2 seconds.

The Tigers proved that they were by far the best track team in the fastest meet ever held in Arkansas, and they should be even better next year.



J. RAYMOND BAINÉ . . . 2 Years
Captain

Baine is the Captain of the first Ouachita track team to win the State Championship of Arkansas. His is a broad jumper of the first magnitude, jumping to first place in the State meet, and is a member of the record holding mile medley relay team. In several dual meets he ran first in the mile and halfmile, but he did not enter these in the state meet. Baine has been a great leader and will be greatly missed next year.

CURTICE RANKIN . . . 2 Years

Curt is the fastest man ever to run in Arkansas. He broke the 100-yard dash record of 22 years standing to run the distance in 9.9 seconds. Rankin won first in the 220-yard dash in the state meet, and was anchor man on two of the relay teams. In dual meets he handled the discus and shot. He is the most versatile track man in Arkansas.

JOHN PALMER . . . 2 Years
Captain-elect

John is the hurdler you read about. He does the high and low hurdles in exceedingly fast time. He tied for first in the 220 low hurdles at the state meet, and ran a fast race in the highs. Ouachita should win another state championship under the leadership of Captain Palmer.

BOB MOORE . . . 4 Years

Big Bob throws the javelin like a mighty Greek. He won first in every dual meet except one. He was off at the state meet or he and Swaim would probably be holding a joint record. Bob lends great moral support to the boys to spur them on to greater efforts.

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WAYNE SWAIM 1 Year

Red threw the hammer in high school for a new state record, and now in his first year at college he throws the javelin 198 feet 9 inches for a new mark. This record compares favorably with those of the best of javelin throwers, and will stand only long enough for Red to get another shot at it. The big man from Lonoke is expected to great deeds in the next three years.

STEED ROUNDTREE 1 Year

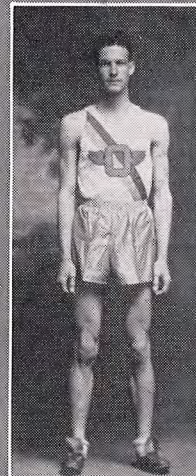
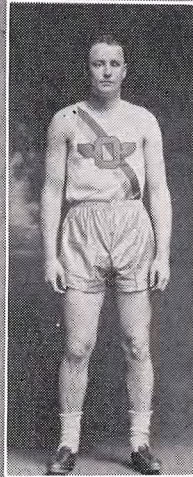

TEDDY JONES 3 Years

Teddy has had three eventful years on the track at Ouachita. This year he ran fourth in the low hurdles, and ran a fast lap in the mile relay. He can be depended on to place in whatever event he enters. Teddy is one of Ouachita's best athletes.



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JIMMIE HALLETT . . . 2 Years
