# Professors, Where Are You Leading Us?

MESSRS. John C. Bennett and Reinhold Neibuhr are cognoscente of the uttermost magnitude. Dr. Bennett is president of Union Theological Seminary in New York, and Dr. Neibuhr is professor of Christian Ethics at the same recondite institution.

These are men who know and who know that they know. They are men who influence the men who influence us. Take just one example.

In September these mentors of American Protestantism let forth a blast against the "bigots" who are opposing Senator Kennedy for the presidency of the United States on account of his religion. In the same peroration they let it be known that they have become so emancipated from anti-Catholicism that they are actually campaigning to get Senator John F. Kennedy elected President.

The impact on upper echelon intellectuals was instant. No sooner had this bombshell exploded on the front pages than the liberaler-than-thou *Christian Century* was observed to be shifting its accent away from the Catholic issue to other issues in the campaign.

The shock waves of the Bennett-Neibuhr detonation reached all the way to this intellectual apprentice who has held Neibuhr in awe ever since a seminary prof said that Neibuhr's *Nature and Destiny of Man* was at least the second greatest theological treatise ever written. (Whereupon this writer purchased the tome but was unable to penetrate its erudite abstruseness.)

Now comes to the writer's desk *Christianity and Crisis*, the Neibuhr-Bennett opinion sheet, for Sept. 19 in which Savant Bennett bemoans "The Roman Catholic 'Issue' Again" in a page-one signed article.

Dr. Bennett's words are most beguiling. He writes, "If we thought that a Catholic President would be guided by the American hierarchy in its single-track and reckless anti-communism in foreign policy we would oppose him from the start on that issue. American Catholicism has its own one-sidedness here that needs correction from the more balanced attitude of the Vatican, which is influenced by its concern for Catholics behind the Iron Curtain and its greater sensitivity concerning the consequences of nuclear war. It must be recognized that there is no official Catholic foreign policy that would or could be imposed upon a Catholic President by any Church authority."

Our phobias thus foiled, we turn the pages of *Christianity and Crisis* to an article entitled "Collapse in the Congo: the Price of Paternalism." Our eyes fall on a passage from the pen of George W. Carpenter, veteran of 25 years in the Belgian Congo.

After discussing two other factors in the blow-up of the Congo Dr. Carpenter writes, "The third element in the structure of power was the Roman Catholic Church. It, too, supported the *status quo*. From 1923 to 1948 a convention with the Vatican entrusted a monopoly of official education in Congo to the Catholic missions. Although after 1948 Protestant schools also became eligible for subsidy, the Catholic system was able to hold its lead, especially in teacher training and secondary education, and most notably in the establishment of the first Congo university as an affiliate of Louvain. The involvement of the Church in political matters was a matter of common knowledge, and in the eyes of many Congolese a common scandal. A considerable number of young men, of whom President Kasavubu is one, became disillusioned with the Church even while studying for the priesthood, abandoned their studies, and joined national liberation movements."

Would you have us believe, Dr. Bennett, that the Vatican which secured a monopoly of official education in the Congo would not like to do the same thing in America? Would you contend that we have nothing to fear from a President under the discipline of a church that everybody knows gets involved in political matters everywhere?

Are you and your liberal colleague, Dr. Neibuhr, willing to take the responsibility for leading us less enlightened clods to gamble with our American heritage by electing a Roman Catholic president? ■

## Pulaski Association Approves New Fund

PULASKI County Association has voted to establish a \$50,000 fund for the purchase of building sites for new churches, the money to be raised through the sale of bonds. The new plan was approved unanimously at the recent annual meeting of the association, at South Highland Church, Little Rock.

According to Lee I. Dance, superintendent of missions for the association, the new bond program will help to solve the problems of relocating existing churches of the Little Rock metropolitan area which, for one reason or another, need to move to more desirable locations, as well as helping new churches to organize.

Mr. Dance estimates that approximately 20 Baptist churches will need to re-locate in the association within the next 25 years. During the same period, it is expected that 56 new churches will need to be established, he said.

The Pulaski Association program for the future includes long-range plans for the establishment of an institutional ministry, good-will centers, seven-day programs in underprivileged areas, recreational programs for all age groups, and "a rejuvenated and expanded religious education program."

"The opportunities for service are rapidly increasing and the spirit of optimism demonstrated in the recent Association meeting indicates the people are ready to meet the challenge," said Mr. Dance.

J. Richard Perkins, pastor of Gaines Street Church, Little Rock,

was elected moderator; J. C. Myers, pastor of 1st Church, North Little Rock, vice moderator; Betty O'Pry, secretary to Superintendent Dance, clerk; and W. Dawson King, Little Rock, treasurer. ■

## Otto Whittington, Jr. Dies Unexpectedly



A HEART attack claimed the life of Otto Whittington, Jr., 45, well known Arkansas Baptist layman, at Pineville, La., Oct. 6, where he had served for the past four years as educational director of 1st Baptist Church.

The son of one of Arkansas' all-time great Baptist pastors and evangelists, Mr. Whittington was born at Conway and reared in Little Rock. He was graduated from what is now Central High School, Little Rock; from Ouachita College; and received his theological education at Southwestern Seminary, Ft. Worth.

Funeral services were held at 1st Church, Pineville, Oct. 8, with Dr. Houston Smith, pastor, in charge, assisted by Dr. Robert Lee, executive secretary of the Louisiana Baptist State Convention. A graveside service was held at Roselawn Memorial Park, Little Rock, with Dr. W. O. Vaught, pastor of Immanuel Church, Little Rock, and Dr. Paul Roberts, pastor of 1st Church, Little Rock, in charge.

Mr. Whittington is survived by his mother, Mrs. Otto Whittington, Little Rock; his wife, the former Miss Martha Mashaw, of Camden; an adopted son, Max, 11; and two brothers and two sisters: Marsh Whittington, Clovis, N. M.; Omar Whittington, Washington, D. C.; Mrs. Paul Allen, Little Rock; and Mrs. Phil Koegler, San Nicolas, Argentina. ■

POLLSTERS indicate that the Presidential race between the two major candidates is running nip and tuck. But indications are that there is one powerful American bloc which will be "riding high in the saddle" regardless of whether the next President is Nixon or Kennedy. We refer to the liquor industry.

*Liquor Industry  
Picks the Winner*

According to a lengthy paper from The National Temperance League, Washington, D.C., under date of September, 1960, the liquor industry is backing both candidates, working "so adroitly and persistently that some of its most skilled employees have succeeded in making themselves *persona grata* to officials in high government positions, even including the presidential candidates themselves."

The NTL stresses that the liquor traffic is bi-partisan and that it supports both parties with campaign contributions and seeks the closest possible liaison with leaders and rank and file politicians of both parties. As evidences of the power of the liquor industry in recent national politics the paper points out:

1. Congress has refused for years to enact any law to ban the advertising of alcoholic beverages on radio and TV and other interstate media.
2. Even when sub-committees of both the Senate and the House approved bills (in the 86th Congress) to ban liquor on planes, as a safety measure, no action was taken by either house.
3. The liquor industry was successful in getting Congress to extend the tax-free bonding period on whiskey in storage from 8 to 20 years.
4. The Boggs Bill (H.R. 7123, 86th Congress), which would give those in trade or business, including the liquor business, the right to deduct lobbying costs as a business expense, but which would deny tax deduction for lobbying expenses of organizations and groups interested in the same legislation or election but *not engaged in business*, passed the powerful Ways and Means Committee of the House and will be in a strategic position to become law, in the 87th Congress.
5. Acceptance by the White House of \$6,000 worth of free California wines, with the promise by the suppliers of free replacement as the original stock is consumed. ■

*Oil and Worship*

RECENTLY a friend of mine took me on a tour of an oil field and pointed out the ramshackle, frame building of a rural church with three or four oil wells on its property.

What difference had it made when this little church "struck oil"? The first thing that happened, my friend reported, was a business session at which the church members readily agreed to close their membership and to apportion the earnings of the wells equally among the members.

Not only did the church refuse to take in any new members, I am told, but it became a little FBI spying on itself for the slightest evidence that could be used to "church" (turn out of its membership) any of the wayward brothers and sisters. For every time the church excluded a member, there was more of the oil kitty to be apportioned to those who remained.

Well, it is obvious that the church never "wasted" any of its new income on its building. And it would be a pretty safe hunch that its offerings for missions never showed any material increase. For when the interest of the members in the church became a vested interest, the church's business became a commercial enterprise and the Lord's business went out the doors, windows and cracks.

But income from oil wells on church grounds is not the only interest of or in churches which can plummet to the level of a mere vested interest.

We place a great value on church attendance. But nobody attended the stated services better than the Scribes and the Pharisees. And the Lord reveals that many of these were hypocrites. (But, don't stay away from church because there are so many hypocrites in the church—there is always room for one more!)

Psychiatrists tell us that once in a while you will find a man or woman who is overly active in church circles purely for what it does to his or her ego.

It is a well known fact that a respected church affiliation is a real asset here in America to business and professional people and to office holders and seekers.

Really, what is our chief interest in our church membership, attendance and participation? Some of our reasons might not be any more pleasing to the Lord than those of the church which quit the Lord's business for the oil business.

## Foreign Board Votes \$12,400,000 Budget

IN its annual fall meeting Oct. 11-12, the Foreign Mission Board heard reports of progress from its work in 45 countries of the world, looked at need and opportunity for enlarging its program, and voted measures of immediate strengthening and expansion. In summary, the Board:

1. Adopted a budget of \$12,399,123.66 for 1961, an increase of \$1,000,229.79 over that of 1960.

2. Appointed 15 missionaries, bringing the appointments for the year to 109 and the total number of active foreign missionaries to 1,463.

3. Strengthened administration arrangements for Latin America by dividing the area into four "fields" and naming field representatives to serve in a liaison capacity between the various Missions (organizations of Southern Baptist missionaries in given areas) and the area secretary, Dr. Frank K. Means.

Rev. Horace Victor Davis was named representative for Brazil; Rev. Charles W. Bryan for the area of Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, and the Bahamas (and any other mission fields which might be added in the Caribbean area in the future); and Rev. William M. Dyal, Jr., for the area made up of Argentina, Chile, Paraguay, and Uruguay. Representative for the fourth area, made up of Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Costa Rica, and the Baptist Spanish Publishing House in El Paso, Tex., will be named later.

4. Authorized appointment of several missionary couples to serve in new African nations which have emerged from former French territory.

5. Approved entrance into Uganda, with the understanding that personnel from the Baptist Mission of East Africa may be sent there as soon as visas can be secured.

6. Adopted a goal of 160 missionary appointments in 1961.

This is in keeping with the Board's schedule of increasing the number of appointments by 10 each year, looking toward a total of 1,800 missionaries under appointment by the end of 1963.

7. Elected Dr. John D. Hughey, Jr., missionary to Europe, as president of the Baptist Seminary, Ruschlikon-Zurich, Switzerland, to succeed Dr. Josef Nordenhaug who becomes general secretary of the Baptist World Alliance Nov. 1. Dr. John D. W. Watts, also a missionary, was elected dean of the seminary.

8. Called attention to the urgency for missionaries trained and experienced in religious education to fill needs in a number of countries of the Orient.

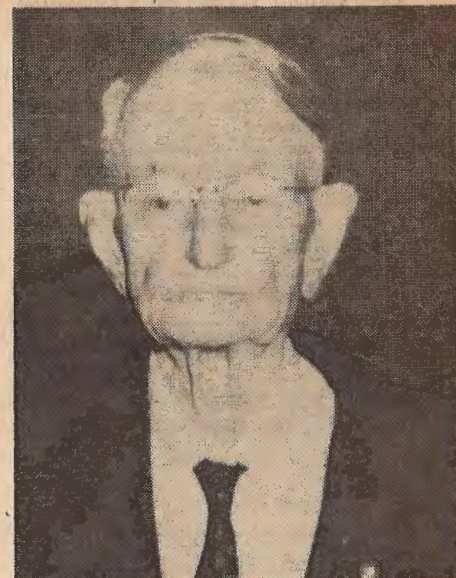
9. Requested continued prayer for missionary nurses to share in the opening of medical work in Thailand and for evangelistic crusades to be conducted in Hong Kong and the Philippines this fall.

Compton and Jane Luther Compton, both of North Carolina, appointed for Chile; Joseph Richard Estes, Kentucky, and Helen Trout Estes, Tennessee, for Europe; John E. Ingouf, Louisiana, and Glenn Green Ingouf, Alabama, for Indonesia; E. William Mueller, Missouri, and Agnes Southern Mueller, Texas, for Liberia.

Also, Rennie Sanderson, Mississippi, appointed for Japan; Hobson L. Sinclair and June Garrott Sinclair, both of Kentucky, for Thailand; H. Cloyes Starnes and Mary Jo Bumgarner Starnes, both of North Carolina, for Korea; and Michael H. Wilson, Ohio, and Catherine Spillman Wilson, Kentucky, for Taiwan (Formosa).

Dr. Estes is pastor of First Baptist Church, Bowling Green, Ky., and Dr. Sinclair, a dentist, is a deacon and chairman of the church's finance committee. This

# Yugoslav Women Have Determined Outlook

Belgrade, Yugoslavia —(BP)

— I smile as I think of the energetic Baptist women of a century ago who, in spite of discouragement from their menfolk, began our Woman's Missionary Union.

They were determined, inspired pioneers who used their feminine gifts to further missionary endeavor.

The Baptist women of Yugoslavia find themselves in a similar pioneer position today.

Twelve years ago, there was no women's work in Yugoslavia. Today there are women's unions, a monthly paper, conferences, and women seminary students.

Mrs. Elizabeth Flugge, of Germany, president of the European

Baptist Women's Union, visited women's conferences and rural churches in Yugoslavia. At times transportation was by horse and buggy. Once her party was carried, one by one, to the train station on the back of a motor bike.

Baptist hospitality overwhelmed her. She wondered where the crowded families slept when she remained overnight. One night she slept in a room with a family of five, and during the night the baby cried and another child fell out of bed.

The leader of one little church had a real conflict with his conscience because, by Paul's words, women are to be silent in church. Yet his church's guest was a distinguished woman visitor from the European Baptist Woman's Union.

After a long discussion, he agreed Mrs. Flugge might continue (after the meeting had already lasted an hour and half).

She avoided the pulpit and carefully chose Bible passages about women, trying to make the men feel it was the women who were "getting a lesson". The leader thanked her after the services, admitting that during her talk he had a new thought revealed to him from the Bible.

The women were inspired to increase their missionary projects, meetings and activities. The Yugoslavian women now realize they are not a small group of weak women, but a part of a great fellowship of Baptist women that reaches over Europe and around the world. ■

ATLANTA — (BP) — Language work among the more than 60 nationalities of New York City will be started in January by the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board.

Dedicated to "the true spirit of Christian hospitality," this cookbook includes more than 500 recipes contributed by wives of more than 180 prominent Protestant ministers as their proven favorites for entertaining groups of all sizes and on all kinds of occasions and at moderate costs. American cooking is represented at its best, in Appetizers; Salads; Soups; Meat and Fish Dishes; Vegetables; Eggs and Cheese; Breads; Beverages; Dressings; Sauces and Preserves; Snacks; and an array of Desserts and Pastries.

**The Old Testament**, Illustrated by Marguerite de Angeli, Doubleday, 1960, \$6.95

Mrs. de Angeli has chosen thoughtful selections from the King James Version of the Old Testament for this attractively illustrated volume for children. She drew on her personal experiences of a visit to the Bible Lands in planning and producing the illustrations. The text was arranged in historical sequence under the direction of Dr. Samuel Terrien of Union Theological Seminary. This is a most attractive volume, with many full-page drawings in color.

**The Magic Power of Emotional Appeal**, by Rog Garn, Prentice Hall, 1960, \$4.95

In his chapter on "Your Personality and Persuasion," Mr. Garn suggests twelve ways for "Successful Daily Communication": 1. Ask questions; 2. Tell people what they want to hear; 3. Remove the "I" pronoun wherever possible; 4. Jibe at yourself—not at your audience; 5. Include every listener when you speak; 6. Never underestimate your listener's intelligence; 7. Appreciate others; 8. Don't "pick" on a previously-proved "sore-spot"; 9. Listen more attentively; 10. Smile more; 11. Relax emotionally; and 12. Emphasize your Emotional Appeal more than appearance.

One of the basic premises of this book is: People don't think, they feel. That is why, the author insists, that an appeal to the other fellow's emotions gets far better results than an appeal to his reason. Well, perhaps there is a place for emotions and intellect.

**Stewardship Sermons**, by Charles M. Crowe, Abingdon, 1960, \$2.50

The author of the twelve sermons constituting this book is pastor of Wilmette Parish Methodist Church, Wilmette, Ill. He outlines the scope and meaning of stewardship and emphasizes its importance to the Christian faith. Much original, human-interest material is used, including stories of people who have found new meaning in life by the giving of their time, talents, and possessions. ■

## Graham Spanish Meeting Example To Churches

ATLANTA —(BP)— The success of the Billy Graham Spanish Crusade in New York City should encourage Baptist pastors and evangelists to hold similar meetings.

This was the opinion expressed by Loyd Corder of Atlanta, secretary of the language group ministries department of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board, following his attendance at the New York revivals.

More than 43,500 were reported to have attended the three Graham-led services, at which more than 1,000 made decisions.

"Billy Graham has shown what any Baptist pastor or evangelist can do by way of a bi-lingual ministry," Corder said. "The program of his services in this Spanish-American Crusade was practically identical with the program he uses in all his crusades, except everything was interpreted." ■

## South Carolina Acts On Building Proposal

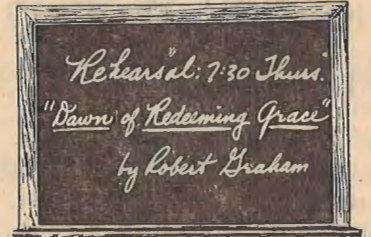
COLUMBIA, S. C. —(BP)— The South Carolina Baptist Convention will act next month on detailed proposals for a new \$584,000 state headquarters building.

The convention's general board will also propose a budget goal of \$3,350,000, an increase of \$100,000 over the 1960 goal.

# Our Response To God

Lesson Texts: Psalm 1; Romans 12:1, 2

October 30, 1960

JESUS must have read the first Psalm many times. He is the perfect example and embodiment of the truly blessed man. In the Beatitudes, He used the word "blessed" to identify the transformed and happy life. To that extent, the Sermon on the Mount could be considered an enlargement upon the theme of the Psalm that we now consider.

The Psalm is also a lesson in contrasts. The righteous and the rewarding result of that type life is mentioned. The wicked and their woe is brought to the reader's attention in unmistakable fashion. Both kinds of life are lived in different responses to God. In this lesson, let us look at the two responses to the Lord and as we look later at Romans 12, the requirements of the best life will be seen.

## I. Righteous Response (Psalm 1: 1, 2, 3, 6a)

More verses of this Psalm are given to the blessed, righteous life than there are to the discussion of the ungodly. In three and one half verses, a wide range of subjects are mentioned as having to do with the righteous response to God. The negative aspect of such a life is the entire first verse. It is so easily understood and so wisely discernable that to explain those mighty words seems only to detract from the text of the lesson. Suffice it to say that evil counsel or advice or influence are the natural result of one's association with evil things and evil men. Another "not" for the blessed righteous man is for him to refuse the "seat of the scornful". This

phrase may mean many things to many people but at least the righteous man is not one who is self-righteous, always gauging the conduct of others by his own life. Destructive criticism of others may imply a self-righteous attitude on the part of the critic. As Christians, our constant refusal to be self-righteous and our eternal vigilance against that conduct will aid us a great deal in pointing others to the truly blessed life of Jesus Christ.

The positive side of the righteous response to God is that the daily portion is God's Word. "His delight is in the law of the Lord; and in His law doth he meditate day and night." This is another way of saying that "man shall not live by bread alone but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." Jesus made the latter statement in reply to Satan in the wilderness temptation experience and would to God that we could reply to Satan in that same way when he would seek to rob us of our daily devotional times with our God. To use another famous quotation (this time from a song), our daily prayer should be like this: "Bread of heaven, feed me till I want no more." If this "bread" is our daily fare for awhile, we will not only delight in it but we will not be able to do without it.

Verse three tells of the excellency of the righteous response. "He shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water . . ." The Lord will prosper such a life saith the Psalmist. C. H. Spurgeon, the famous preacher, had some fitting words for this passage: "The Lord's trees are all evergreens. No winter's cold can destroy their verdure; and yet, unlike evergreens in our country, they are all fruit bearers." Needless to say, the righteous response is a yielded life to God who gives unto

that life daily increase and eternally lasting qualities of joy and influence.

## II. Rebellious Response (Psalm 1:4, 5, 6b)

An ungodly life is a rebellious life. Sin has as one of its definitions, "rebellion against God." The Psalm writer drives home the point that the rebellious life is the result of a totally different response to God by saying, "The ungodly are not so." The result of the ungodly would be expected to differ also from the righteous life. Whereas the righteous life is likened to a productive tree, the ungodly life is compared to "the chaff which the wind driveth away." Such a marvelous figure of speech should teach everyone to shun such a shallow life and such an unacceptable response unto God. Also nothing is mentioned about the ungodly caring for God's word. The righteous response was total delight in the words of God. The ungodly do not participate in the pursuit of God's teachings unless they desire to isolate a passage of scripture and thus justify some of their own folly. Is it any wonder that the Psalmist asserted, "Therefore the ungodly shall not stand in the judgment . . ." In short, that is one test that the ungodly will definitely fail — the test at the judgment bar of God. Why will the righteous "enter into the joy of their Lord" and the "ungodly . . . perish"? The reason is simple: The righteous accept the Lord's way but rebellious (ungodly) reject the Lord's way. Even the "way of the ungodly shall perish!" By that phrase, we are taught that the unrighteous life leaves no lasting contribution in the world.

## III. Righteous Requirements (Romans 12:1, 2)

Most anyone who is acquainted at all with the book of Romans knows more familiarly the passages in Romans 12:1-2 than perhaps any other. Some have called this a "Charter for Christian living." It is truly that and more. If this passage is consulted often, it can well be the thermostat that



will keep us at an acceptable spiritual temperature. The word "acceptable" is used in both of the verses which point out the righteous requirements for a righteous response unto God. Because of the word "acceptable" the requirements of these verses about the Christian life, like the tithe in stewardship, should be regarded by all as the "at least" or minimum. One can build the maximum Christian influence, with the Lord's help, upon a sure foundation built by meeting these minimum requirements outlined in Romans 12: 1-2. If we present our bodies daily as a living sacrifice unto God, we will not conform to the world's standards. If we renew our minds daily by seeking God's word and way, the transforming power of God will then use our testimony in the transformation of other lives about us. It is not only acceptable to do these things but it is our "reasonable service" unto the Lord.

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## **Polite Thief Strikes Large Memphis Church**

MEMPHIS, Tenn. —(BP)— A robber with big ambitions had to settle for practically pocket change when he was unable to get into the safe at Bellevue Baptist Church here.

George Rush, administrator of the 9,000-member church, was victimized of \$13 when the thwarted thief turned on him.

Church officials theorized the crook, unfamiliar with the church's method of handling money, had high hopes of getting some of the church offering of \$12,000 gathered six days earlier. However, it had been taken to the bank a few minutes after it was collected.

The crook, who held his hand menacingly in a paper sack, tried to force Rush to open the safe but accepted the administrator's plea that he didn't know the combination.

Rush reported the thief, reeking with alcohol and furious at the small amount of loot, apparently simmered down on the way out for he politely held the door open for a Negro janitor to enter.

Pastor of the church is Ramsey Pollard, president of the Southern Baptist Convention. ■

## **Oklahoma Secretary To Lead 1961 Tour**

OKLAHOMA CITY —(BP)— Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma meeting here approved their executive secretary leading a Bible study tour of the Holy Land.

They also voted to permit Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, to borrow up to \$750,000 to construct its new chapel.

T. B. Lackey, the convention's executive head, and a leading Oklahoma City pastor — H. H. Hobbs — will conduct the tour next June and July. The 32 persons in the party will visit Rome, Egypt, Lebanon, Jordan, Syria, Israel, Greece, Paris, London, and Scotland.

They will be gone about a month. ■

# **Tennessee Tax Board Sustains Exemption**

NASHVILLE —(BP)— The Tennessee State Board of Equalization ruled here that religious and education groups won't have to pay taxes on \$6 million worth of property assessments.

The tax board upheld the exempt status of the lands, for which the city of Nashville has been seeking taxes. The decree knocked from the rolls a city assessment of \$4.7 million against holdings of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The board would have had to pay city taxes amounting to about \$140,000 had the city tax levy been valid. Other taxes, which would probably have followed, would have increased this to perhaps \$250,000 a year or more.

There was no immediate indication if the city has the right to appeal, or if it would appeal even if it can. Next in the sequence of

appeals are the state courts of Tennessee.

The tax levy, which caught the Sunday School Board by surprise 10 months ago, had been fought by the Baptist agency on grounds that "the power to tax is the power to destroy."

Agency leaders have expressed willingness to discuss with city officials a voluntary payment for city services, such as fire and police protection, but they flatly rejected the idea of a mandatory tax.

The city of Nashville's tax effort created a chain of reactions within Southern Baptist life. It prompted the Executive Committee of SBC to consider moving its offices from Nashville, although the tax issue was not a major factor in the reasons offered for considering the move.

The city's tax levy also led to a study of the tax-exempt status of all church and denominational-ly-owned lands. The study was conducted in September by the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs in Washington, D. C., at its annual religious liberty conference. ■

## **Eskimo Church First In Jubilee Revival**

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — (BP) — An Eskimo Baptist church in Anchorage, Alaska, was the first church in the Southern Baptist Convention to qualify for a certificate in the Baptist Jubilee revival plan.

The announcement came from Vernon Yearby of Dallas, Tex., associate director of the division of evangelism of the denomination's Home Mission Board. Yearby has just returned from leading an evangelistic crusade in Alaska.

The Baptist mission, with Mike McKay as pastor, fulfilled the requirements which include following details of the revival plan book: inauguration of a spiritual growth program, and prompt reporting of results.

High attendance during the meeting was 55 in Sunday School, and there were nine professions of faith with seven additions by baptism. Herman Mauch of Norfolk, Va., was the evangelist.

The certificate of participation will be given the church at the Alaska Baptist Convention Oct. 25-27. ■

## **Two New Churches Formed In Panama**

BALBOA, Canal Zone —(BP) — Two new churches were constituted in Panama, according to L. D. Wood of Balboa, Canal Zone, who is superintendent of Southern Baptist mission work in the area.

In Playon Chico on the San Blas Islands, a church with 66 charter members became the fourth organized church on the islands. There are 40 missionaries on seven of the 20 islands off the Panama coast. Other islands are asking for missionaries but none are available; says Wood.

A mission for Americans in Gamboa, Canal Zone, constituted a new church with 32 charter members and called their mission pastor, James Nelson, as pastor. Cocoli Baptist Church in the Canal Zone sponsored the group as a mission. ■



## Beacon Lights of Baptist History

### Baptists Blamed

BAPTISTS and Quakers were blamed for bringing the wrath of God upon the New England states in the 17th century.

The Rev. Increase Mather and others honestly believed that the destruction of life and property by the Indians, from 1676 onward, was God's hand of wrath against the acknowledged church for failure to exterminate these sects.

Because of this, Dr. Mather moved the assembly to convene a Reforming Synod. First, they kept a fast in the churches followed by the Synod in Boston, Sept. 10, 1679.

Two questions were proposed at this meeting: (1) What are the evils which provided God's judgments on New England? (2) What may be done to remove these evils?

The synod answered the first question by convincing themselves that they constituted the true church of God. Men had set up their threshold beside God's threshold. Quakers and Baptists were false worshippers in their sight, and had set up churches in opposition to the churches of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Such religious groups had no right to administer holy things — baptism and the Lord's Supper. An altar had been set up over against the Lord's altar — as in the Old Testament days. They thought that full testimony should be made against such. God's displeasure would be felt until such was done.

The second question was in the same spirit. On Oct. 15, the General Court approved the aforementioned. Accordingly, all persons were enjoined in their respective capacities to diligently seek a reformation on the part of all affected by Quaker and Baptist teachings. They believed that only as they did this would God's anger be averted and his blessings obtained.

### 'Churches Wide Open', Cuba Baptist Reports

ATLANTA — (BP) — "Churches of all denominations are wide open and hold all the services they have ever held," Herbert Caudill of Havana, Cuba, declared in a mimeographed statement received here.

Caudill, director of Southern Baptist Home Mission Board activities on the western half of the island, prepared the paper to "keep the record straight."

It was dated Sept. 15 and was more than a month late in reaching home mission offices in Atlanta.

"We have not been persecuted nor has anyone else as far as I know," he said. "Cuba is more orderly than in 1933 when the Machado government was overthrown." The Caudills have been in Cuba for 30 years.

A statement by out-spoken Editor John Hurt of the Georgia *Christian Index* triggered the Caudill paper. Hurt had commended Roman Catholics in condemning the Communistic regime in Cuba.

"Baptists can sympathize with Roman Catholics in Cuba for we have experienced the cruel lash of persecution under Roman Catholicism as well as under Communism," Hurt wrote in a backhanded editorial of sympathy.

However, Caudill did not appreciate the double meaning of the *Index* editor's satire, since he did not feel the Catholic Church has fought Communism in Cuba but it is simply "a case of (wanting to get) back the subsidies that it received" from the previous government.

"I have been very close to the situation and have yet to hear of one specific case of anyone being persecuted for being a Catholic," Caudill wrote. ■

### Choctaw Indians Get New Missionary

ATLANTA — (BP) — R. L. Meford of Liberty, Miss., will become general missionary to the Choctaw Indians at Philadelphia, Miss., Nov. 1. He replaces Victor Kaneubbe, missionary to the more than 3500 Choctaws in Mississippi for three years.

### Utah, Idaho Hold Regional Meeting

BOISE, Idaho — (BP) — Southern Baptists in Utah and Idaho now feel the regional program presently used meets the needs of this pioneer area. Messengers from churches in the two states came close to organizing a separate state convention last year.

At the recent regional fellowship meeting in Boise, they had only praise for the present work and did not contemplate the organization of a state convention in the near future.

Churches in the states are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Arizona, but are regional missions committee serves in an advisory capacity in recommending allocations for mission work. This has given the area a direct voice in mission efforts in the area. The committee is elected at this annual meeting. ■

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
