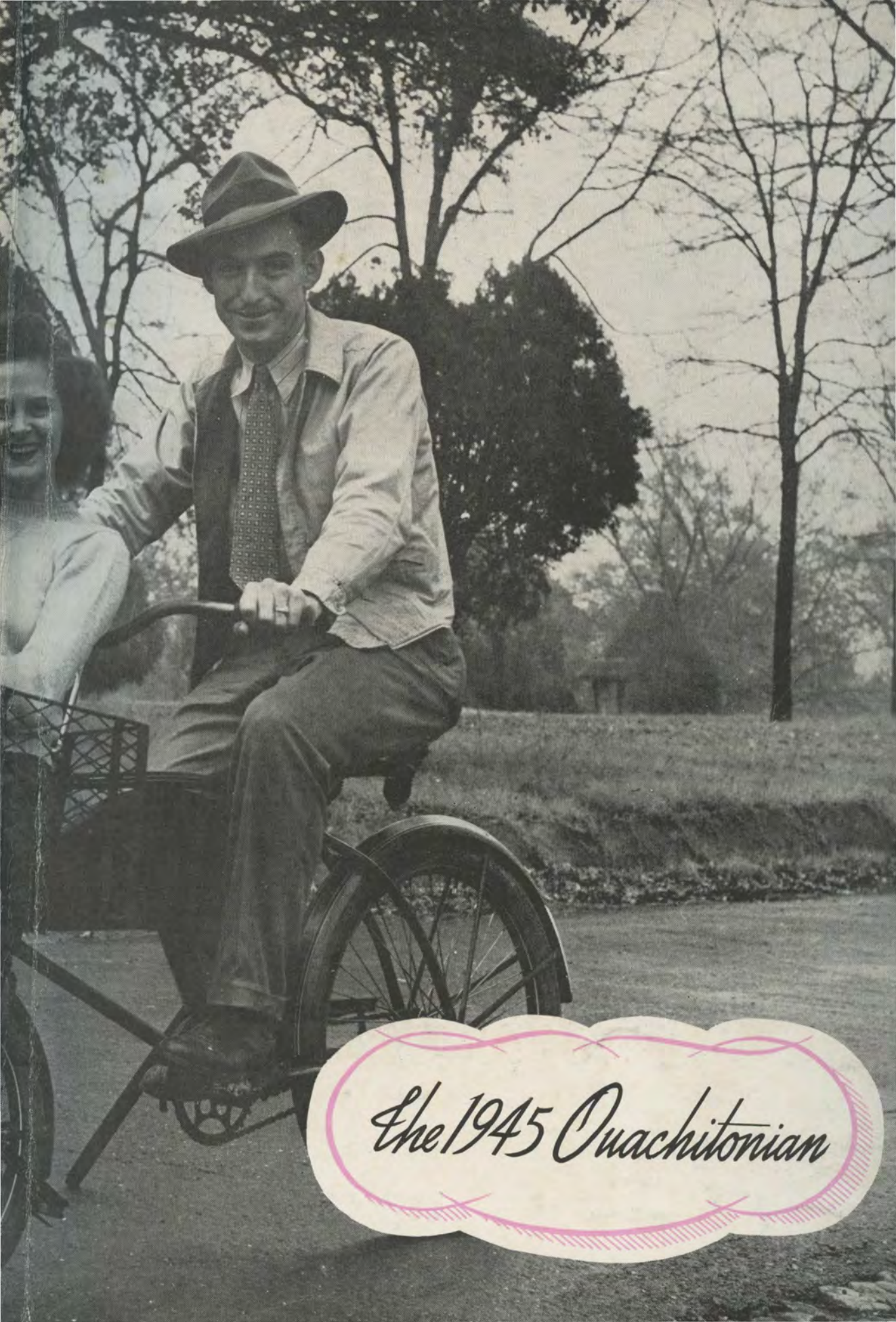

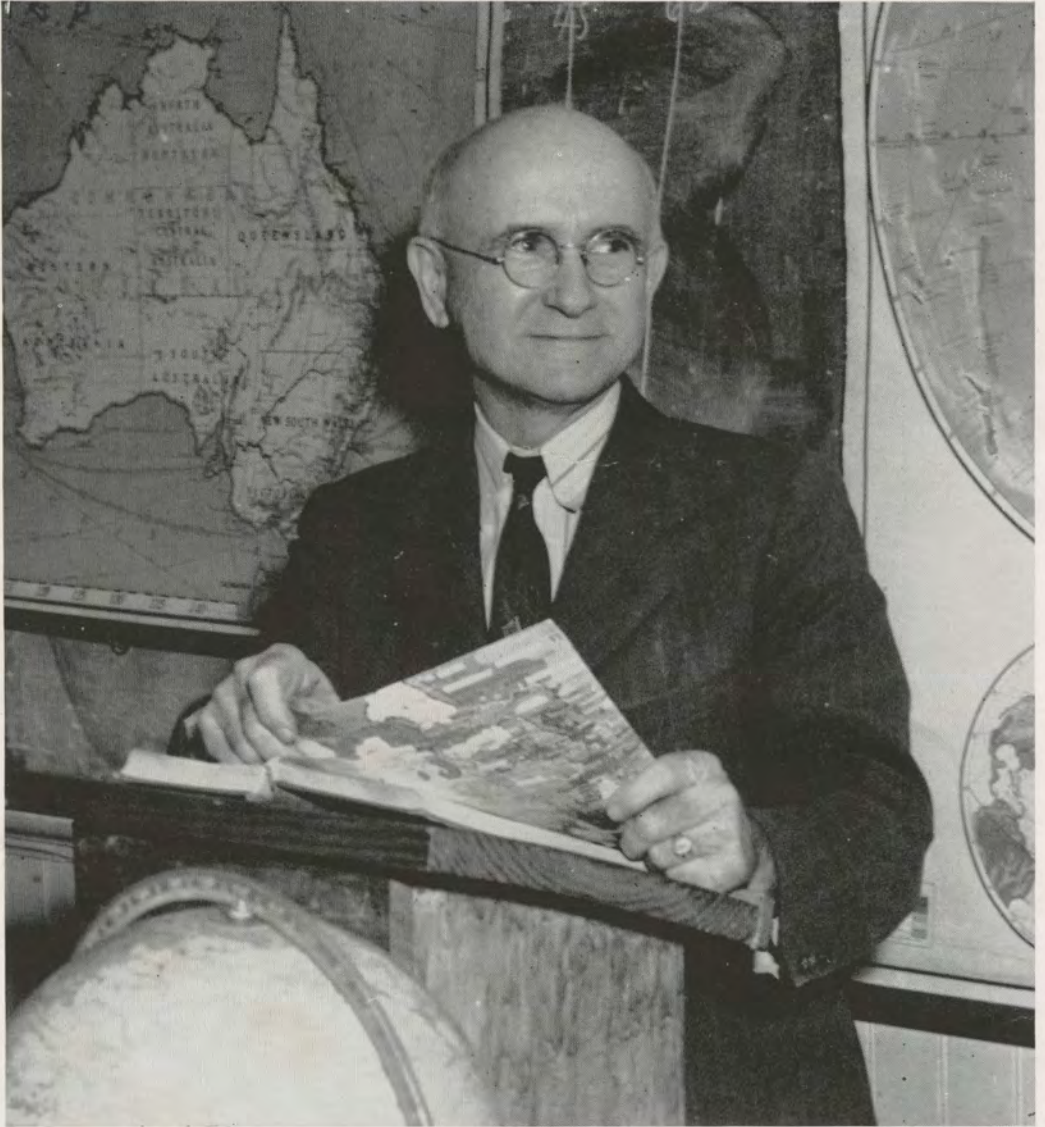
FOREWOR
