CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I .- NAME AND OBJECT.

Section 1. The name of this body shall be: The Abkansas Baptist State Convention.

Section 2. The object of this Convention shall be to preach the gospel throughout our State and to evangelize the world; to aid by appropriate and Scriptural means our destitute and feeble churches; to supply the State with books and tracts best calculated to inculcate the doctrines and ordinances of Christ and to stimulate missionary effort; to encourage ministerial and Christian and general education; and to gather and preserve denominational statistics.

ARTICLE II.-MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. The Convention shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this constitution, and which desire to co-operate with this Convention, and shall be entitled to seats upon presentation of their proper credentials, or satisfactory evidence of their appointment.

Section. 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for every fifty members, or major fraction thereof, above one hundred.

ARTICLE III. - AUTHORITY.

Section 1. This Convention shall never exercise any authority whatever over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the constitution of any church or with the exercise of its functions as the only ecclesiastical body, but will always cheerfully recognize and uphold the absolute independence of the churches.

ARTICLE IV. -OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a President, two Vice Presidents, two Recording Secretaries, a Treasurer, a Statistical Secretary and an Auditor, who shall be elected annually by ballot, *provided*, however, that any officer of the Convention may be elected by acclamation if no objection be made; and all officers shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the deliberations of the Convention, and to discharge such other duties as are usually incumbent on the presiding officer of deliberative bodies. He shall appoint all committees, unless the Convention shall otherwise determine, and in his absence one of the Vice Presidents shall fill his place.

Section 3. It shall be the dut; of the Recording Secretaries to keep a fair record of the proceedings of the Convention, and to file and keep in order all papers deemed important to be preserved.

Section 4. Officers shall be elected as soon as the names of messengers shall have been enrolled.

Section 5. All the officers of this Convention shall be elected by a majority of all the votes cast.

ARTICLE V.-BOARDS.

Section 1. The Convention shall elect the following boards and parts of Boards:

- (1) The Missionary and Sunday School Board of the Convention, which shall consist of twenty-one brethren from the State at large, and one brother from the bounds of each Association in the State, who shall be elected annually, on account of their business ability, consecration and wisdom, seven of whom shall constitute a quorum; and the meetings of the Board shall be quarterly. Its duties and powers shall be to prosecute the Mission, Sunday School and Colportage work of the State. It shall report its work annually to this Convention.
- (2) The Board of Trustees of Ouachita-Central System of Colleges and Academies, one-third of which shall be elected annually.
- (3) The Board of Trustees of the Arkansas Baptist Orphans' Home, consisting of nine members, three of whom are to be elected annually.
- (4) A Board of Ministerial Education, to consist of seven members to be located at Arkadelphia, Ark., and to be elected annually.
- (5) A State Central Committee of nine women, whose duty it shall be to distribute literature, and to encourage women and children in systematic giving to missions.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall elect a Missionary Secretary to work under the direction of the Board, and they shall employ any other agencies, such as general missionaries and evangelists, office help, and any means, such as tracts, etc., which in their judgment may inure to the most speedy and rapid evangelization of our State and the world. However, the Convention in session may elect the Missionary Secretary when it is deemed wise.

ARTICLE VI.-MEETINGS.

The Convention shall meet annually, "if God permit," on Friday before the third Sunday in November.

ARTICLE VII.—UNALTERABLE.

This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Convention, two-thirds of the members voting concurring in the measure, except Article III, which shall remain forever unalterable.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The body assembled at 2 o'clock. Prayer by J. J. Haynes. By motion, the greetings of this body were conveyed to the Texas Baptist Convention, through S. B. Calloway.

J. J. Hurt presented the report on Publications.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATIONS.

The basis of all good and permanent work must be information. Before sending out his disciples our Master taught them the principles upon which the new Kingdom was founded and gave them the laws which would govern its extension. Every preacher and every

religious leader must be, first of all, a teacher. And the wise teacher uses all the means at his command for the instruction and enlightment of those who learn of him.

The greatest work ever given to the sons of men is the task of evangelizing the world. So great a work calls for not only great teachers of doctrines and methods, but it also calls for great agencies for teaching. Of all such agencies there is none more powerful than the printed page. It becomes the solemn duty, then, of every pastor and religious worker among us to see that our people are well supplied with sound, helpful, religious literature. It is not enough that we read our Bibles. God's word gave the trumpet call to duty and the Son of God gave us marching orders. The forces of righteousness have rallied and the great world-conflict with sin is on. The man or woman who cares not for the news from the front, who is not eager to hear how the battle goes at home and abroad, must be indifferent as to the result, and will surely make a sorry soldier at home. God's word gives instruction and orders, but tells us nothing about the progress of the battles in modern times. This information is supplied us by religious monthlies and weeklies, and, under God, the obligation rests solemnly upon us both to take and read these publications, that we may know the amount of work accomplished, the amount to be done, and the forces available for doing it. From such reading there will come information, inspiration, and consequently a more efficient service.

We recommend, for information as to Foreign Missions, the *Foreign Mission Journal*, a monthly published at Richmond, Va., the subscription price of which is 35 cents per year. For information as to the work of our Home Mission Board, we recommend the monthly, "Our Home Field," published in Atlanta, Ga., and for 10 cents a year.

We cannot too strongly urge the necessity of our own Baptist Advance in every Baptist home of Arkansas. We believe it is absolutely impossible for any Baptist man or woman who does not read this paper to render the best service to his or her church. And we, therefore, would lay upon the heart of every pastor, with all possible heaviness, the duty of seeing that his people subscribe for and read the Advance.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHANS' HOME.

We, your committee, beg to report that the work of the Home has been retarded the past year an account of the long continued illness of our former financial agent, Bro. W. W. Gardner, and the collections have not been sufficient to meet the current expenses. Bro. Gardner has done excellent service, for which he is due the appreciative gratitude of the brotherhood.

We commend the action of the Board of Trustees in its wise selection of Bro. O. T. Finch as financial agent of the Home, and recommend that he be given entire control of the collection of all funds; that the churches be asked to heartily receive and co-operate with him and contribute largely to the cause; and that all moneys be sent to him at Little Rock; that he receipt for the same, and make quarterly reports of same through the Baptist Advance, and that he also turn over all such moneys to the treasurer of the Board.

We also recommend that the Nominating Committee be instructed to name three efficient business men living outside of Monticello and community to fill the present vacancies on the Board.

We further recommend that the financial agent be permitted to

take a free will offering now to help meet the deficiency caused by Bro. Gardner's prolonged illness and meet the needs of the approaching winter.

MORNING SESSION.

By motion, J. J. Hurt was requested to send the greetings of this Convention to the Virginia Convention.

Ross Moore read the report of the Committee on B. Y. P. U. Work:

In submitting this report, your committee desires to express its gratitude that there has been during the past year such a marvelous growth of sentiment and interest throughout the State favoring this work. Many of our churches, with open eyes for the vision of better things, have not hesitated to employ it as a legitimate instrument for the increased usefulness of the young people.

The B. Y. P. U. sprang from a need of some kind of organization which would inspire and foster a more effectual work among the boys and girls in our churches. Not to usurp any function of the church, but to train and develop an army of workers for the church, with the thought of work for all, and all for work. We desire to stress the fact that many of our churches need increased facilities for the spiritual education of the young, not something visionary, but something that is practical,—not necessarily new thought, but an old thought in a new setting. This need, we believe, is largely met in a well organized and well regulated B. Y. P. U. It furnishes a splendid opportunity to promote personal reciprocal interest and to stir a youthful activity, which, if wisely trained and encouraged, may never cease.

There is a constant demand for progressive churches—those which are thoroughly alive to the needs and possibilities of the day. That church which, by its offices, deepens the moral life of its young people; that supplies hope, joy and inspiration; that leads to God and duty; will most assuredly be progressive and will, to a certain extent, meet her requirements. But immeasurably great is the responsibility of the church which insists on everlooking the claims of the young and shall fail to meet this obligation.

We would suggest that our young people use both the B. Y. P. U. magazine "service," and more especially the B. Y. P. U. quarterly, published by the Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tenn. This excellent quarterly can be had in quantities of two or more at the rate of six cents a quarter.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATE MISSIONS.

H. L. Winburne read the report of the Committee on State Missions:

Your committee reports as follows:

We desire first of all to record our profound thankfulness to God that His blessings have been so graciously poured out upon the work of State Missions. Our work has broadened and deepened until Arkansas Baptists are coming into a masterful denominational subconsciousness, and the awakened and unified hosts are making glorious war upon sin. From every quarter comes the cry, "We be brethren," and the Spirit of Jesus Christ is moving mightily upon us for greater things. God speed the day when our hearts shall thrill to a common inspiration, our lips run over with a common mead of worship and praise, and our footsteps mark the high rhythm of a common campaign for the salvation of Arkansas to the glory of our God.

The report of the Executive Board will give a tabulated statement of the work done. It is unnecessary for us to do more here than to give expression to our feeling of joy in the growth of the work. heathen world cries to us for light. The homeland waits for our ministry of healing and salvation. These splendid enterprises are inseparably bound up with the work of State Missions. Arkansas for Christ means hope for America and the world at large. as our inspiration, and the will of God for our impulse, let Arkansas Baptists do greater and larger things this year than ever before in all our history.

Following is the report of the Missionary and Sunday School Board, presented by J. F. Love:

REPORT OF MISSIONARY AND SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Brethren and Sisters, Messengers of the Churches of Jesus Christ—Gathered, as you are, in the fifty-seventh annual session of this Convention, to recount the mercies of the Lord, review the year's work and to counsel concerning future duties, we, your Missionary and Sunday School Board, appointed a year ago to a stewardship which expires with the adoption of this report, bring you greeting and invoke upon you the blessings of God, the presence of His Holy Spirit in your devotions and His guidance in your deliberations.

Another year's work has been added to the foundations of the fathers. With grateful hearts we can report that, looking for support to the churches which sent you here, more men have gone forth this year preaching Jesus and the truth as it is in Him than have gone in any previous year of the long and glorious history of the Convention; that these have been more widely and strategically scattered throughout our destitute territory; that they have done more work; that you have again repeated your record of paying every dollar of your obligations; and that the Lord has bestowed His favor upon the work more abundantly than ever, and more lost ones have been constrained to turn from sin to the Savior than it has ever before been our pleasure to report to an annual meeting of this body. We pause to say that this harvest of precious souls is our chief joy and crown as we review the year's work.

At the meeting of the Convention in Pine Bluff a year ago, the Executive Board of the Convention and the Sunday School and Colportage Board were consolidated. At our December meeting due deliberations were taken to render effectively operative the conjoint and simplified organization. Accordingly, Bro. J. F. Love was reelected missionary secretary, and to him was committed the care of the enlarged work of the consolidated boards, including the keeping of a separate set of books for the Sunday School and colportage de-Bro. Harvey Beauchamp was elected Sunday School and partment. colportage secretary and his duties were "to prosecute the work of organizing Sunday Schools, Sunday School teacher-training, and otherwise improving Sunday School conditions in the State, and take collections for Sunday School and colportage work." At a special meeting, held December 28, 1904, Bro. Beauchamp resigned his office to accept a field secretaryship with the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, in which he was permitted to continue his helpful relation to our work. While the labors and responsibilities of our missionary secretary were thus increased, there resulted a great saving of the funds of your Board, since in his new position Bro. Beauchamp's salary and expenses were paid by the Nashville Board.

At the regular December meeting, in keeping with the action taken by the Convention, Bro. S. L. Holloway was elected a missionary of this Board, his salary and expenses to be provided by the American Baptist Publication Society, of which he is the State representative in our co-operative work. It was also resolved that such other missionaries as should be agreed upon by the Society and your Board, should, with Bro. Holloway, make regular reports to the office of the Board. These reports will be found below.

This co-operation of both the Sunday School Board and the Publication Society with Arkansas Baptists in their work puts within reach of all our people sound Baptist literature for their Sunday Schools and the Biblical training of the young. This should be and is a strong bond of union among us and makes co-operation in this department of our work easy for all who are interested in training the young in a knowledge of God's Word.

At the same meeting four general missionaries were elected, namely, Revs. J. F. Little, J. F. McNemer, W. A. Freeman, A. B. Bohannon. Of these, the two first named have continued through the year, doing a most excellent work, while Bro. Freeman, because of impaired health, resigned a few months after his election, and Bro. Bohannon, after a weary battle with disease, was given his crown before he had assumed the duties of his office. Enough experience has been gained to satisfy your Board that this character of work ought to be enlarged, if men can be found who possess the peculiar qualifications for it.

On the 20th day of December our Bro. James P. Eagle, whom a year ago you elected to membership on this Board, quit the scenes of his toils and his triumphs for the joys of the home on high. We recommend that in his memory a special service be held next Sunday afternoon.

SPECIAL MENTION.

As an expression of our high appreciation we record here our acknowledgement of the generous and substantial help given by the Sunday School Board at Nashville. It has donated this year to the work in the State \$1,120 in books ond \$100 in cash, besides paying for the printing of 10,000 copies of the Board's report of last year and 20,000 copies of Governor Eagle's "Valedictory." It has also given first quarter's literature free to all new schools applying for it. The Home Board has continued its generous policy of giving to Arkansas \$5,000 in cash for mission work, not including help given to some of our churches, enabling them to erect houses of worship. The Home and Foreign Boards have paid the usual \$300 each on secretary's salary.

As a friend and agency in our work, the Baptist Advance should receive special mention. Its directors and former editors have been the constant friends of our work. We are glad to note that all our Baptist people are learning to recognize the Advance as the true friend of the denomination in the State. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men who, at great personal sacrifice, have built up, sustained and preserved to Arkansas Baptists a State paper, and one which in its policy maintains a high spiritual tone, a sound doctrinal position, and more and more fulfills its mission as an acceptable news medium and organ of communication for all our people. So important to Arkansas Baptists and their interests is this paper that when Bro. J. J. Hurt resigned the editorship in August the missionary secretary consented to add to his already multiplied duties that of temporary editor in association with Bro. E. J. A. McKinney. While increasing the burdens of your servant, this has been a means of larger efficiency in We commend the Advance to all our people and bespeak his work. for it a more loyal support.

THE WORK BY DEPARTMENTS.

The work committed to your Board has comprised four depart-

ments of missionary activity and benevolence. We will briefly review each.

1. Foreign Missions. There was raised during the last Southern Baptist Convention year, which ended May 1, 1905, \$4,988.63 for Foreign Missions, a gain of \$231.12 over the best record we ever made before, and this in the face of the prolonged rainy season, which covered much of the period set for Home and Foreign Mission collections. One thing, however, gave us an advantage over adverse conditions and enabled us to make this splendid record. Acting on the suggestion adopted by this body last year, we began shortly after the Convention to agitate the matter of Christmas offerings for Foreign Missions in our churches, Sunday Schools and societies. Not a few responded to the suggestion. We again recommend these Christmas offerings and hope that our churches and auxiliary organizations will co-operate heartily to make this beautiful service a success.

The best gift Arkansas has given to Foreign Missions this year is two splendid young missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. James S. Compere. This devoted son and daughter of Arkansas, our own brother and sister in the closest bonds of love and fellowship, call us to more self-sacrificing devotion to Foreign Missions. And with all our needs at home, we join the fervent Compere in praying the Lord of the greater harvest to send forth other laborers from our midst.

2. Home Missions. Every year magnifies in the minds of informed and serious lovers of our homeland this distinct field of Christian missions. The threatening army of immigrants, the growth of national and religious evils, the entrenchment of the saloon, and other defiant enemies of the nation and the churches, bring home to the Christian and patriotic hearts this cause of Home Missions, and make our faithfulness to it a test of our love for Christ and country. The South and Southwest are to be the most important part of this great land. The gospel of Christ is the chief factor in making it a goodly heritage for our children. Southern Baptists at large have no more direct and effective agency in their possession than the Home Mision Board for dealing with this tremendous problem which God has given to us more than to any other people the ability to solve. The use of this agency by our fathers more than any other made for us our present opportunity in the Southwest. Their palsied hands have left it to us with which to affect the years that lie before, lengthen their influence and fulfill their hopes.

We are glad to report the growing loyalty of our people to this department of our work and its agency, the Home Mission Board, as is evident in the fact that during the last Southern Baptist Convention year, May 1, 1904, to May 1, 1905, Arkansas gave in cash \$3,327.20, which was \$338.29 more than the State ever contributed to this work in any previous year. We hope this amount will be greatly increased before the first day of May, 1906.

3. Sunday School and Colportage. Who has ever exaggerated the power for good of the Sunday School and the printing press? The two great teaching agencies of the world are the school and the printed page. The Sunday School and Christian literature fulfill this office for Christianity. The Sunday School and colportage department of our work indicates our denominational effort to organize and make efficient Sunday Schools and to distribute good literature. As in other respects, so in this, we have faced great difficulties in our work the past year. The almost, if not quite unprecedented rainy season in the spring and summer put our colportage wagons out of use.

The quarantine regulation later in the year interfered with the itinerany of our workers and the shortness of crops has made it difficult for them to sell their books during the closing months of the year. Nevertheless, the following facts will show that this department of our work has been successful and is in good condition:

All old accounts have been settled in full, all bills for the year have been met promptly, and we now have to the credit of this department the following items, without outstanding obligations of any sort:

Books on shelves, selling price\$5	2,646.60
Books in hands of Colporters, selling price	2,650.74
Bills receivable	194.81

Further information concerning this department of our work can be gotten from "Statistics of Missionary Labor."

The co-operative work with the Sunday School Board and the Publication Society has been without friction and has yielded large and gratifying results. The generous gifts of the Sunday School Board already referred to have increased your Board's efficiency in this department. We esteem the institute and other work of Brethren Beauchamp and Holloway of the highest importance and advise pastors and others to make more frequent use of their services.

State Missions. Here we touch the heart of the missionary question as it engages the thought of our people. State Missions arouses the warmest enthusiasm and marks the highest point of our missionary achievement. We have set our hearts on giving the gospel to the destitute in our State as we have not set it upon anything else. Our chief troubles have arisen because of our effort to do this, and yet this work has become our crown, is becoming the rallying point of interrupted confidence, and shall soon, we verily believe, be the ground of a happy reunion of our Baptist forces in the State. Arkansas Baptists are coming to a great conviction that they want Arkansas saved and that they want the honor and the reward which rightly belong to those who do this glorious work. The fact that notwithstanding the short crops and the heavy losses which have befallen many of our people, they have not retrenched, but have advanced in their gifts to this object is a strong testimony to their growing love and devotion for it. Brethren and sisters, your unfaltering loyalty in the face of personal loss and discouragement has filled us who have watched you with gratitude and admiration. It may be said in a general way of the secretary's work that he has traveled about 10,000 miles, raised large sums of money to pay other missionaries, administered the business of the mission and colportage rooms, ordering, receiving and shipping the books, conducted a large correspondence, written voluminously upon missions and other subjects connected with our work, including editorial work on the Advance for several months of the year, and has held several revival meetings, delivered more than 200 sermons and addresses, which labors and results are not included in the statistics, although so good an authority as Dr. T. T. Eaton declares that the work of the secretary is as truly mission work as that which is done by any other man.

We write it down, then, that we have had the greatest year in

the history of Arkansas Baptist State Mission work. But figures represent the grossest estimate of our service for God. These statistics as gratifying as they are, do not show the year's progress, nor sum up its best results. The cessation of strife, except an occasional outbreak, and that usually the work of some one who cares little for the real weal or woe of our people, the great wave of peace and fellowship which has rolled over the State, the turning of many to our work, and the cordial welcome which they have found, are among the untabulated but priceless triumphs of the Spirit of God among Arkansas Baptists the past year. "They shall see eye to eye when the Lord shall bring again Zion." All hail, brethren, of "one Lord, one faith and one baptism." The common ties are too many and too strong to be broken and love is too irresistably constraining for Baptists to be kept asunder.

J. W. Conger presented the report of the Board of Ministerial Education:

A REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We record with gratitude to God the continued manifestations of His grace towards us in this department of our work. Our thankfulness is so great because we believe this work to be fundamental in the life and progress of the denomination. No church can well rise to a place of usefulness and experience higher than that of its pastor. No pastor of rich experience and trained powers can long minister to a church, however dead, without drawing it nearer to his own plane of life. In short, we feel with increasing clearness, that the pastor is the key to the situation in church and denominational life. All history emphasizes this fact. In training the future pastors of this and other states we feel, therefore, that the Convention laid its hand upon the vital point in a wise and efficient policy. Ministerial education is back of all our present prosperity and the measure upon which we may base our hopes for future usefulness.

During the last Convention year there have been fifty-one different individuals and organizations that have contributed to this work; twenty-five churches, four associations, nine Ladies' Aid Societies and thirteen individuals. This classification is instructive and interesting, inasmuch as it shows the trend of our thought.

It is noticeable, also, that the number of contributors this year has been smaller than last year. The aggregate of contributions is also smaller.

One feature of the work, mentioned last year, is re-emphasized by the cash book this year, namely: The country churches are waking up to the need of ministerial education and are contributing in larger numbers, while the larger town and city churches are for the most part negligent along this line. It is cause for profound gratitude that so many new contributors are being added year by year. It may be a cause for careful thought and some anxiety that so many of our

ments of missionary activity and benevolence. We will briefly review each.

1. Foreign Missions. There was raised during the last Southern Baptist Convention year, which ended May 1, 1905, \$4,988.63 for Foreign Missions, a gain of \$231.12 over the best record we ever made before, and this in the face of the prolonged rainy season, which covered much of the period set for Home and Foreign Mission collections. One thing, however, gave us an advantage over adverse conditions and enabled us to make this splendid record. Acting on the suggestion adopted by this body last year, we began shortly after the Convention to agitate the matter of Christmas offerings for Foreign Missions in our churches, Sunday Schools and societies. Not a few responded to the suggestion. We again recommend these Christmas offerings and hope that our churches and auxiliary organizations will co-operate heartily to make this beautiful service a success.

The best gift Arkansas has given to Foreign Missions this year is two splendid young missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. James S. Compere. This devoted son and daughter of Arkansas, our own brother and sister in the closest bonds of love and fellowship, call us to more self-sacrificing devotion to Foreign Missions. And with all our needs at home, we join the fervent Compere in praying the Lord of the greater harvest to send forth other laborers from our midst.

2. Home Missions. Every year magnifies in the minds of informed and serious lovers of our homeland this distinct field of Christian missions. The threatening army of immigrants, the growth of national and religious evils, the entrenchment of the saloon, and other defiant enemies of the nation and the churches, bring home to the Christian and patriotic hearts this cause of Home Missions, and make our faithfulness to it a test of our love for Christ and country. The South and Southwest are to be the most important part of this The gospel of Christ is the chief factor in making it a great land. goodly heritage for our children. Southern Baptists at large have no more direct and effective agency in their possession than the Home Mision Board for dealing with this tremendous problem which God has given to us more than to any other people the ability to solve. The use of this agency by our fathers more than any other made for us our present opportunity in the Southwest. Their palsied hands have left it to us with which to affect the years that lie before, lengthen their influence and fulfill their hopes.

We are glad to report the growing loyalty of our people to this department of our work and its agency, the Home Mission Board, as is evident in the fact that during the last Southern Baptist Convention year, May 1, 1904, to May 1, 1905, Arkansas gave in cash \$3,327.20, which was \$338.29 more than the State ever contributed to this work in any previous year. We hope this amount will be greatly increased before the first day of May, 1906.

3. Sunday School and Colportage. Who has ever exaggerated

3. Sunday School and Colportage. Who has ever exaggerated the power for good of the Sunday School and the printing press? The two great teaching agencies of the world are the school and the printed page. The Sunday School and Christian literature fulfill this office for Christianity. The Sunday School and colportage department of our work indicates our denominational effort to organize and make efficient Sunday Schools and to distribute good literature. As in other respects, so in this, we have faced great difficulties in our work the past year. The almost, if not quite unprecedented rainy season in the spring and summer put our colportage wagons out of use.

The quarantine regulation later in the year interfered with the itinerany of our workers and the shortness of crops has made it difficult for them to sell their books during the closing months of the year. Nevertheless, the following facts will show that this department of our work has been successful and is in good condition:

All old accounts have been settled in full, all bills for the year have been met promptly, and we now have to the credit of this department the following items, without outstanding obligations of any sort:

We esteem the institute and other work of Brethren Beauchamp and Holloway of the highest importance and advise pastors and others to make more frequent use of their services.

4. State Missions. Here we touch the heart of the missionary question as it engages the thought of our people. State Missions arouses the warmest enthusiasm and marks the highest point of our missionary achievement. We have set our hearts on giving the gospel to the destitute in our State as we have not set it upon anything else. Our chief troubles have arisen because of our effort to do this, and yet this work has become our crown, is becoming the rallying point of interrupted confidence, and shall soon, we verily believe, be the ground of a happy reunion of our Baptist forces in the State. Arkansas Baptists are coming to a great conviction that they want Arkansas saved and that they want the honor and the reward which rightly belong to those who do this glorious work. The fact that notwithstanding the short crops and the heavy losses which have befallen many of our people, they have not retrenched, but have advanced in their gifts to this object is a strong testimony to their growing love and devotion for it. Brethren and sisters, your unfaltering loyalty in the face of personal loss and discouragement has filled us who have watched you with gratitude and admiration. The field of our usefulness in the work of training men called of God to preach the gospel is broadening every year. This year your Board needs not less than \$100 per month, and we recommend that the Convention provide for this in cash and pledges sometime during the meetings.

In this connection, S. B. Calloway read the report of the Committee on Ministerial Education:

The root-idea of education is the forging and shaping of an instrument for use. The sculptor's chisel is an instrument for cutting and carving of the marble into forms of beauty and symmetry. Education is to the mind what the sculptor's chisel is to the marble. The angel is in the unhewn marble; an Angelo's chisel only brings it out. Education is the development of the faculties for use. Ministerial education is the development of the preacher for God's use. Education does not make the preacher, but only develops and trains the man whom God has called into his service. Duty to God demands then that the preacher seek that preparation which will best fit him for the most efficient service. He must study to show himself approved unto God, a workman that needth not to be ashamed, or else doubt should be cast upon his call if he assume the responsibilities of the ministerial office and refuse to do all in his power to reach the highest possible intellectual and spiritual attainment and fitness for his work.

We therefore recommend that each pastor and church encourage their young preachers to go to Ouachita College and the Southern Baptist Théological Seminary, and give them the financial assistance they need as far as possible. We also recommend that a collection for the support of ministerial students now in Ouachita College be taken at this hour.

J. W. Conger read the report of the Board of Education:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

To the Arkansas Baptist State Convention:

The members of this Convention will recall with much sadness the feeble health of our beloved brother, Jas. P. Eagle, one year ago. His last short talk in the interest of Ouachita College, for which he had been working and praying for the past twenty years and which always found his liberal response in times of financial embarrassment, will be remembered by many of you. It was not long after the Convention until our Heavenly Father called him to rest. Suitable resolutions were passed by this Board and transmitted to his relatives and a Memorial Service was held at Ouachita College during the commencement exercises, at which time Dr. E. Y. Mullins, of Louisville, and Hon. W. E. Atkinson made suitable addresses. Your Board of Trustees feel an irreparable loss in the passing of this beloved brother.

Academies:

We are glad to announce the unparalled success of all four of the academies in our Affiliated System. They have efficient and wise principals who are devoted to the success of our denominational enterprises. All of them have sacrificed and deserve the gratitude of our people throughout the state. During the past year these academies have enrolled more than eight hundred pupils, under about thirty teachers. The total value of the property at present would not fall below \$60,000. These academies are out of debt, with the exception of \$2,700 indebtedness on Bentonville Academy and \$1,000 on Magazine Academy. Some equipment has been added at each school and the property of each has been kept insured by its repective principal. These schools are wisely located and are becoming great missionary centers in their respective sections.

Central College:

Central College has been prospeous during the past year. The total number of matriculates was one hundred and twenty-seven, the number of boarders being fifty-six. The total indebtedness is \$14,033. The value of the property is \$60,000. Through the kind offices of the women of Conway, a Cottage Home Association has been formed which affords an opportunity for students to take a course in College at a minimum cost for board. We commend President Rivers and his excellent corps of teachers to the denomination as worthy of confidence and support. Central College is worthy of our full sympathy and should receive a large share of our patronage.

Ouachita College:

The past year has been the most successful during its history of twenty years. There was an enrollment of four hundred and sixtynine, of whom four hundred and eight were boarders, representing eleven states and fifty-nine counties in Arkansas. There were thirty teachers in the faculty. There were forty-three graduates from the regular College courses and from the Conservatory.

It seemed to be necessary to make provision for an enlarged Science department and plans were put on foot to erect a two-story, eight-room building. This work was accomplished and a beautiful Science building is now occupied. Chemical, Physical and Biological

Laboratories are installed and one of the rooms used for a museum. We are especially under obligation to Prof. Irwing H. Buckminster, who made the plans and superintended its erection, giving his services during the summer months. Several of the teachers contributed much of their time in the erection of this building without cost to the College.

The total amount received from the Jas. P. Eagle estate was \$12,160 in cash and the surrender of a note of \$1,000 held by him against Ouachita College. Of this amount \$1,500 was appropriated for the erection of the Science building and the remainder was applied to the indebtedness of the Institution. The total indebtedness is now \$33,500; \$20,000 of this is held by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, bearing 5 per cent interest, and will be due September 1. 1907; \$7,000 is held by the Citizen's Bank and Trust Company, of Arkadelphia, bearing 7 per cent interest and is due November 1, 1908; \$6,500 for fixtures and apparatus, bearing interest of 8 per cent, is past due. The total amount of interest on these Ouachita debts is \$2,080 per annum.

Finances:

It will be seen that the total indebtedness of all the schools is approximately \$50,000. The heavy interest on the indebtedness of all the schools, amounting to about \$3,500, has been growing from year to year. The various Executive Committees of the Board have endeavored to keep the indebtedness as low as possible. Certain improvements had to be made at each school from time to time, and but for the immediate friends of the institutions all of the schools would have been seriously embarrassed. Many friends have not only given liberally, but have individually become responsible for the various amounts due in the banks. H. F. Vermillion was engaged for a period of about six months as Financial Agent. He collected in cash \$1,388, and in pledges and notes \$6,087, but some of these notes and pledges were given upon conditions which forbid our realizing on them at present.

Plan of Co-Operation:

We have appointed a Campaign Committee to plan and carry forward a campaign for the payment of our debts and the endowment of Ouachita College. They are to proceed at once to the selection of some man to lead in this great work. This, however, will come to naught unless some step can be taken which will unite our people in this effort and secure definite co-operation. To this end we recommend that this Convention request the Missionary and Sunday School Board of this Convention and this Campaign Committee to confer with the view of agreeing upon the best plan of co-operation for accomplishing this object, and we recommend that a special period of two months be set apart for this work, and that our churches and pastors be urgently requested to join in the campaign and make their Mission and Educational collection in harmony with the plan that shall be adopted by the State Board and Campaign Committee; and that the Baptist Advance be requested to do everything in its power to foster this enterprise. We furthermore suggest that the editor of said paper, who has always been in full accord and hearty sympathy with this work, be requested to set apart a page for the purpose of educating, enthusing and enlisting our people in this work.

We have selected J. H. Kitchens, C. E. Neely, John Ayers, S. H.

Campbell, and John J. Hurt to serve as members of this Board for the next three years and ask your approval of this action.

W. T. Amis presented the report of the Committee on Education:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Fort Smith, Ark., Nov. 18, 1905.

Never a time in the history of the Convention has there come an hour so momentous as this in the consideration of education. Through the years this Convention has been called upon to seriously ponder the educational situation and to respond promptly and liberally to the crying and fearfully pressing needs, but never before have our educational institutions stood in a more precarious financial condition than at the present. This is true for at least three reason: The general indebtedness of our schools has increased by reason of large obligations assumed in taking over the various academies and adopting them in the affiliated system. Although a large property interest has, by this system, been acquired, yet in some instances a small indebtedness has accrued to the Convention, and this body must be sensible of its obligations to meet every financial exigency in respect to these academies.

In the second place, large and necessary improvements have been made in the schools, especially in Ouachita and Central Colleges, to meet the demands of an already growing fastidious and almost scrupulous school public. It is readily recognized that a school of today cannot conduct itself based on methods of ten years ago. The matter of equipment, the demands of scholarship, the methods of campaign, and the cost of general maintenance, all of these things must be taken into consideration by this body as we face this question.

A third thing we are called upon to take into account is the equipment of other schools. We can talk all we wish to of Baptist loyalty and denominational pride, as a means of creating Baptist support and patronage, but we come to you tonight with the firmly settled conviction that the question of honest merit will carry the day in nine homes out of ten, and if we cannot show that our schools meet the popular demands for higher education, we will inevitably lose out in the field of competition.

How can we hampered and humiliated by debt, meet other schools in the race for patronage. When they have every material advantage of us. We give it to you as the prophecy of those who have surveyed the field that unless relief comes, and that speedily, we are going to have a crisis in our schools, all the more fearful because of its enormity. Let us sound in your ears this night a solemn warning. We have talked education for years, but we have never, as a denomination in the state, touched the fringe of the garment of personal sacrifice. There are individual exceptions.

But we pause to ask, after all, is it worth the while? We wish to say that what our denomination is today in the State is, in a large measure, due to the mighty influence and power which have come from our schools. Twenty years ago we had a humble folk in number, only about 40,000; today we have more than 85,000. Twenty years

ago there was no one to point with pride to a classic hall dedicated to God for Christian education; today there are scores that rise up in every part of this great State and point with pride to our two great colleges and to nearly a half dozen eminently worthy academies. Twenty years ago not a denominational enterprise; today nearly a quarter of a million dollars invested in institutions upon which this convention lays its hand of benediction and praise. Twenty years ago there was not a preacher that knew the Shiboleth of our State except as he had caught it in the venacular; today the sires and sons of our Alma Matres proclaim the message of our Savior in all the State and in the states beyond, and that, too, we may humbly claim. with credit to themselves and the institutions that have sent them forth. Our institutions are the rockbed and we may say the granite foundation of the principles in which we believe and for which we The history of the denomination is indissoluble sealed in the lifeof the school. The evangelization of the State is in the heart of Christian education, and the success of the church is in the embrace of the denominational college and academy.

The State school educates, the Christian college trains; the State school honors Christianity, the Christian college embraces Christianity; the State school looks upon ethics as a system, the Christian college teaches it as a life; the State school puts emphasis on material power, the Christian college blends the spiritual and tne material, with the spiritual in the ascendency. There is no question at all as to the place of our schools in the denomination. They are essential to our cause in Arkansas. At this point there is no room for doubt or for a moment's hesitation.

In the light of the foregoing, the committee wish to make the following recommendations:

In the first place, we wish to express our hearty accord with the report of the Board of Trustees in recommending a period of two months during the year to be given to the campaign of education, this period to be decided upon by the Board of Trustees and the Executive Board of State Missions. We feel that the time is here for us to give a large place in our system of collections to education.

In the second place, we recommend the further close, compact and sympathetic union of all our educational matters. To the end that the greatest efficiency may come to the efforts of the campaign committee.

In the third place, we recommend that a page in the Baptist Advance be put at the disposal of the campaign committee for the purpose of dissemination of information and the creation of sentiment and interest in matters educational.

In the fourth place and lastly, we recommend that a finanacial agent be put in the field at the earliest date possible for the purpose of lifting the debt from our schools. It is not possible for the committee to over-emphasize the importance of this point in this report. Relief must come, and there is no way for us to secure it than to create a flame of enthusiasm and interest in education through the dominant leadership and personality of some man of God. This committee humbly begs through your sympathetic approval, cheerful and hearty support, to lay the leadership of this great educational campaign in the State upon the heart of the much beloved president of Ouachita College. And we most respectfully and prayerfully urge him to accept the responsibility, assuring him here and now our most cordial, liberal and hearty support in his endeaver to save our schools.

For twenty years he has stood as a mighty power for God and Christian education in this State and has made a record unequaled in the history of Christian education in Arkansas, and having, as we believe he does, the undivided love and support of all our people throughout the State, we cannot refrain from expressing the conviction that he, above all men in our midst, is the one to lead the campaign for Christian education in the ranks of the Baptists of this State.

J. S. Rogers presented the report of the Committee on Foreign Missions:

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The first thing that this committee would recommend to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention is that a glory-cloud of genuine heart-praise ascend to God for the 2,231 baptisms on the foreign fields last year. The Great Commission, which is really the Great Permission, is being executed by man and blessed of God as never before since our Lord ascended to glory. The Lord has done and is doing great things for us, both in papal and pagan fields, whereof we ought to be exceedingly glad!

we ought to be exceedingly glad!

Last year at Pine Bluff Dr. Conger led the Convention in prayer to God for fifteen new foreign missionaries from Arkansas, and God has partially answered by calling two of Arkansas' very choice spirits, Bro. and Sister J. S. Compere, who have gone to Africa. Fail not to pray for these two who have gone and to pray that the remaining thirteen may have a vision and awake to GO. Nearly 90,000 Baptists we have in Arkansas, and only seven missionaries on the foreign field—less than one missionary for every 12,000 Baptist souls who say the Commission was given to us! When will these "dry bones" arise and "look on the fields white unto harvest?"

But we are not altogether heedless to God's call and command. Last year we gave approximately \$5,000 to foreign missions. The

20,000 churches in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention gave \$283,415. This year the Foreign Mission Board asks us for \$7,000, an increase of 40 per cent, and under God we can, we will give it. The rightful gratitude of Arkansas Baptists, if it could find expression in giving, would press us to contribute \$10,000 to the great cause of our Savior on the foreign field. It is well that Arkansas Baptists especially remember that all the expenses of the Board at Richmond are less than 6 per cent, and for all expenses everywhere less than 10 per cent. So that more than ninety cents out of every dollar given reaches the missionary. No mere secular business is managed on so small a per cent. Our foreign mission work is a successful business enterprise launched from heaven and managed on business principles. In the language of another, we say, "Brethren, we are on no fool's errand; we are engaged in no faltering enterprise; we are working for no failing Sovereign!. We are laboring together with God!"

The report of the Board to the Southern Baptist Convention in May gives a helpful and inspiring account of its forward movement in the last ten years. We repeat the items here:

We have doubled our giving and our mission force in ten years, but God has quadrupled his giving in saved souls and working force on the fields. As our liberality swells and multiplies, men and women of God all along the line cry, "Here am I; send me." The gratifying proof of this is shown in the fact that during the last Convention year exactly fifty new missionaries have gone out, depending on us to "hold the ropes."

"The morning light is breaking." The shafts of holy light are smiting the darkness of sin that shrouds this dying world. Our King expects every man of us to do his duty this day in this regard.

"Will we meet the greatest issue of the age?" May God help Arkansas Baptists, in person and purse, to rise up in their Christian might and take their rightful place in the running march for the redemption of groping millions!

U. S. Thomas presented the report of the Committee on Home Missions:

Our work through the Home Mission Board is one that ought to enlist the sympathy and support of every Christian man and woman within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention. And it should especially come to the heart of every Baptist in Arkansas. It is a work that has in it great possibilities. The results are most gratifying when we see it is building up for our country a better citizenship, better churches and making better preachers. The great

problem of the foreign mission field is answered in the home land. The territory of operation is large, and the work is difficult; but our Home Board, with its faithful, consecrated secretary and coworkers, is meeting the demand.

The work of this Board is being effectively carried on among the mountaineers, the foreign population, the American born citizen in our cities and large towns, among the negros, Indians, the destitute sections of our western counties and in Cuba with the new fields of Panama and the Isle of Pines.

The cry comes up from all these lost souls saying, "Save thyself and us"

The Home Board has heard this cry and is hastening to carry the bread of life to this multitude of unsaved. This Board assists the State secretaries in their work and goes beyond their limit and preaches the gospel to those as yet unreached.

Arkansas Baptists must have a hand in this great work. The Convention would again commend the Home Board and pledge itself anew to assist in the prosecution of this work of our Lord.

The following resolutions were unanimously and enthusiastically adopted by the Kansas City Convention:

Resolvec1, That it is the sense of this Convention that the Home Mission Board should greatly enlarge its work during the coming year, and the churches should contribute to this part of our work \$250,000 to sustain the advance.

Resolved, That the Home Mission Board be requested to apportion the \$250,000 according to their best judgment, and ask the several states to raise the amounts named.

We recommend that we, the Baptist State Convention of Arkansas, accept this recommendation and agree to try to raise the \$8,000 asked us.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL AND COLPORTAGE LOARD.

The Sunday School and colportage work has grown to such gigantic proportions, the opportunities and responsibilities are so wonderful, that we stand in awe of the fearful consequences that await us, as individuals, as Christians and as a denomination, if we fail to take advantage of the situation and discharge our whole duty in fostering this great enterprise. When we consider first that fully 85 per cent of all accessions to the Baptist churches come strictly from the Sunday Schools; second, that the future of the denomination and churches depends upon the children in the Sunday Schools of today, we can begin to grasp the situation that confronts us and the magnitude of this work. Again, when we realize how many churches there are over our great State which have no Sunday Schools and who are neglecting their opportunities, our hearts go out in pity for them, and the communities they represent. Fully realizing the conditions which confront us, we most earnestly urge our State Convention, through its Board, or in any way which in its wisdom it may elect, to take immediate and effective steps to foster and push this great work of establishing Sunday Schools, and to send out as many colportage wagons as possible with the view of having a Sunday School and denominational literature in every community in our great State.

We heartily commend the splendid work done this year under the supervision of your State Board, aided so successfully by Brethren Beauchamp and Holloway, and our colporters.

In conclusion, we say, save the children of Arkansas, and the problem of State evangelization will be solved.

Whereas, we believe that in all probability Mr. Martin has been providentially directed to the South with his great wealth for the accomplishment of good;

Martin Educational Fund, and we earnestly pray that this philanthropic movement may be blessed of God to the elevation of the negro race through a well trained, educated ministry, and also to the education of white people residing in sections of the country incorporated in the plan.

The following resolution was read by W. T. Amis and adopted.

Be it the sense of this body that in the future, at the opening of the Convention, the presiding officer be requested to deliver an address, in which he may recount the blessings and favors of God during the year past, and to forcast in his own mind the Baptist outlook in the State.

Resolved, That the very hearty thanks of this body is hereby extended to the pastor and members of the First Baptist Church of Fort Smith and the people of Fort Smith for their unstinted hospitality, and to the different denominations of Fort Smith for the use of their houses of worship on Sunday and at other times; to the newspapers for their kindly mention of our meeting, and to the railroads for their courtesies granted to our messengers and visitors.

Adopted.

Motion was carried that the secretaries have printed 2,500 copies of the minutes and that \$25 be allowed each of the three secretaries for their services.

W. E. Kimbrough read the report on Colored Work, which follows:

Your Committee on Colored Work regret that they are unable to make any definite report of work done among our colored population during the past year by our Convention. We note with pleasure, however, the work of our Home Mission Board in behalf of the colored people of the South through the labors of Rev. A. J. Barton, and commend this work as worthy of the sympathetic support of our people. We commend also the work of Rev. J. A. Booker and his associates at the Arkansas Baptist College at Little Rock, and recommend that our preachers visit this school whenever possible. We also recommend that our pastors and missionaries preach and lecture for our colored people as they have opportunity.

Fort Smith, Ark., Thursday, Nov. 16, 1905.

The second annual session of the B. Y. P. U. Convention was called to order at 7:30 p. m., by O. J. Wade. After devotional exercises, led by Ben Cox, the following officers were elected: O. J. Wade, President; Ress Moore, First Vice-President; Ben Cox, Second Vice-President; Sam H. Campbell, Secretary.

By motion, W. T. Amis, J. J. Hurt and S. L. Hollo. way were elected as a nominating committee.

H. L. Winburne read the report of the Executive Committee.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF ARKANSAS B. Y. P. U.

With gratitude we record the continued blessings of God on our Arkansas Baptist work in general, and upon the B. Y. P. U. of the State, along with other phases of denominational life. In this, our first annual report, we would call attention to the untried possibilities in the work of the union. It is not an extra-ecclesiastical organization, nor is it un-ecclesiastical. It is an organization within the church and aims at the fullest development of church members during the years of youth when they are most easily formed and reformed. By pursuing devotional inspirational and cultural lines of work and study, the union is aiming at strength in the fundamentals of individual and church life.

1. Organization and Progress:

During the last year an imperfect State organization has been devised. It is the aim of the union to bring together the young people of our State. To do this, a thorough organization is necessary. We expect, as we go further into the work, to develop a smooth and efficient organization. In the State already a large number of unions have been organized. We cannot give the number for lack of reliable information. We have seen and felt a general spirit of progress in the work, whereof we are glad.

2. Summer Assembly:

At the request of two hundred different brethren of the State, we undertook this year to hold a Summer Assembly for Arkansas Baptists. There was a wide-spread and hearty interest in the movement. Prospects were most flattering for a great and successful meeting. A splendid program was provided and arrangements were made to accommodate three hundred people in a well appointed camp at Brown Springs. The rains came and the floods descended and we were literally waterbound. In spite of the floods, the camp was filled to overflowing with eager Baptists, intent on an outing and a Bible Institute. We cannot tabulate the meeting. It is impossible to report the real results of it. The following is a statistical report as far as it is posible to give one:

3. Recommendations:

We recommend that the Arkansas Convention of B. Y. P. U., in order to further the interests of our work and advance the cause of Christ and Christian culture among us, adopt the following outline of policy:

- 1. That the B. Y. P. U. Convention appoint an Executive Committee composed of nine who are actively engaged in Union work, whose duties shall be those usually devolving upon executive committees of deliberative bodies.
- 2. That a field agent be employed for three months in the year, whose duty shall be to push in all ways possible the work of the Union in the State.
- 3. That the Convention hold its next summer assembly at Arkadelphia.
- 4. That the State B. Y. P. U. Convention meet annually at the summer assembly.
- 5. That the Unions of the State pursue, as far as possible, the Christian Culture Courses, as outlined and taught in our national organ, "Service."
- 6. As to the total indebtedness of the Union, we wish to say that it would never have been incurred but for the extremely bad weather conditions of the Assembly work. We are confident of its liquidation by the close of the next assembly. We therefore recommend that the Unions of the State assume the debt and authorize the payment of the same by the assembly commttee.
