Good Neighbor Policy

Pan Americanism is both a policy and tendency. It may be described as a tendency more or less pronounced, of the republics of the New World to associate together in a neighborly way for mutual understanding of common aspirations and interests and their realization. The greatest of these common aspirations is peace. The American republics look to themselves and their common counsel for leadership. In this sense Pan Americanism may be considered as a complement to the Monroe Doctrine. The object of the United States foreign policy toward South America is to wipe out the distrust and to reach a common understanding.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt hit upon the happy phrase, "the good neighbor," to characterize this Pan American policy. The spirit of it is for non-American nations, hands off the New World; for the United States also, hands off Latin America. The "good neighbor policy," at first greeted as a mere phrase, bore rich and friendly fruit at a conference at Montevideo in 1933. The old feeling of suspicion and resentment vanished before the proven sincerity of the Good Neighbor of the North.

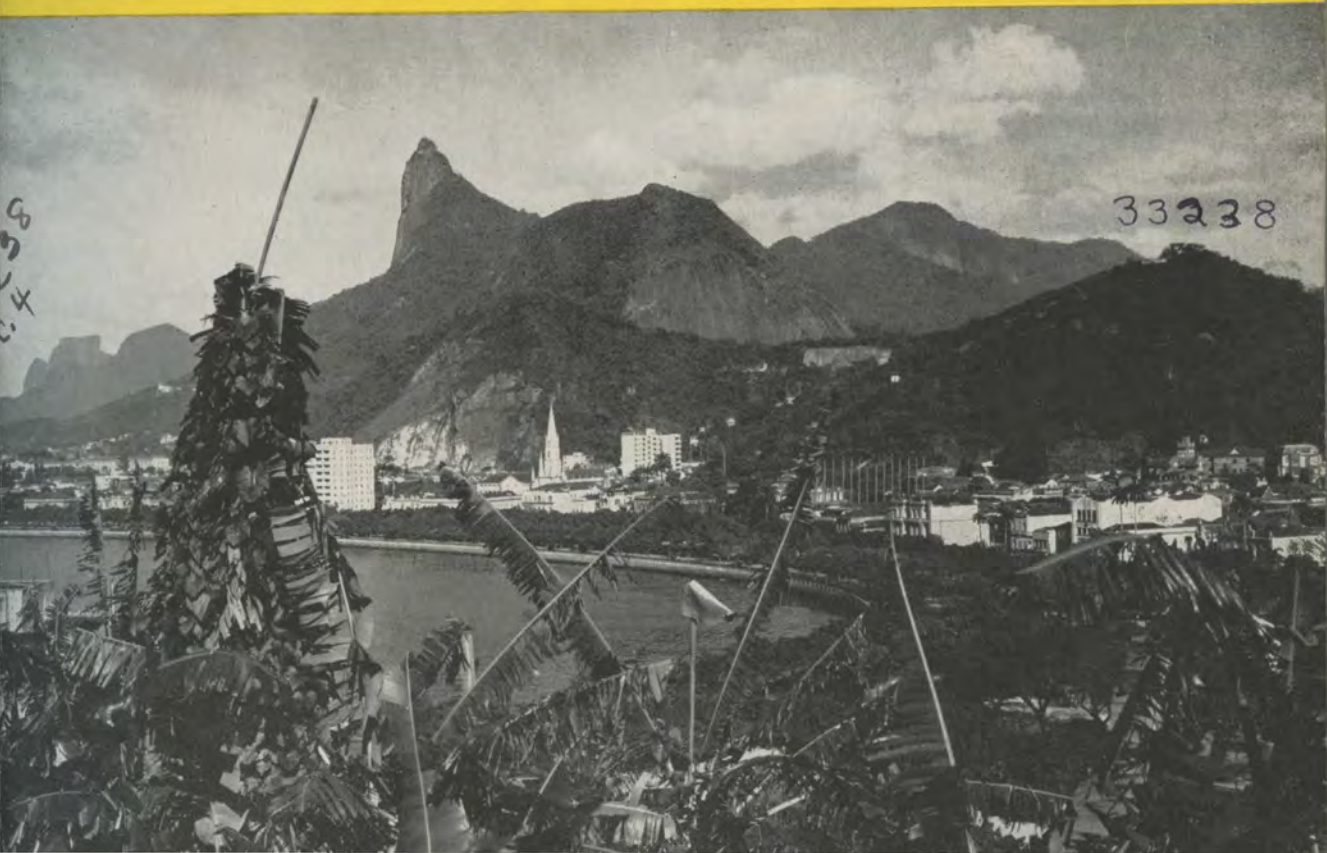
The

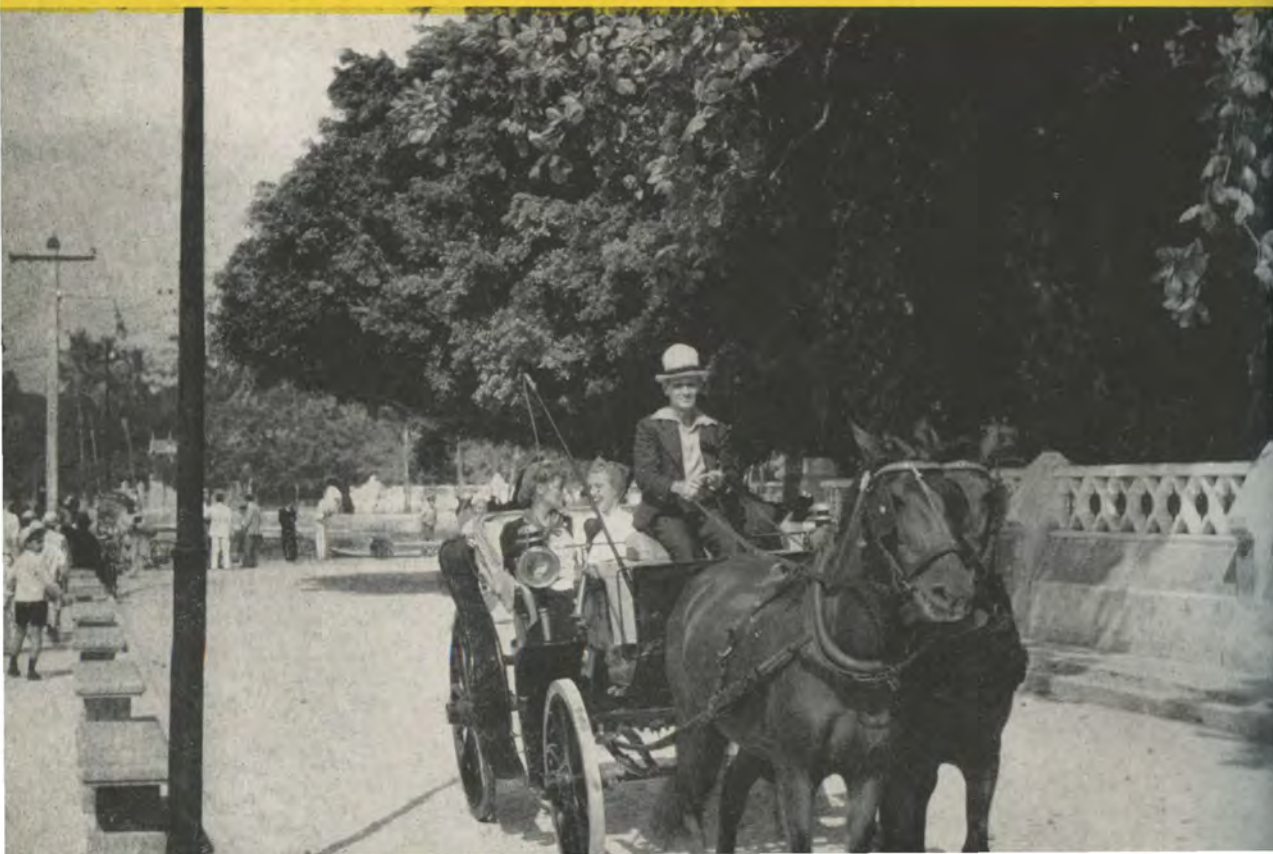
The

Botafoga Bay opens the world to the exotic atmosphere of the most social and commercial important city of South America, Rio De Janerio. The natural surroundings are of exceptional beauty and distinction. Sugarloaf Mountain at the harbor's entrance rises above the crowded central part of the metropolis. On the opposite side are rugged mountains soaring to the peak of Corcovado, which forms Rios most distinctive landmark. On its summit there was erected in 1931 a 130-foot statue of Christ, which may be seen far out to sea. Travelers sense the beauty of this land as they catch a first glimpse of the world-famed harbor.



The

countries of South America are large and extremely varied. Great differences in climate, race, and cultural backgrounds make life different in one part of the continent from that of another. Cultural lags which are greatest where social contacts with the rest of the world are fewest and most difficult have added to the heterogeneity. One who travels throughout South America is passing from one culture area to another, and with little exaggeration it might be said, from one epoch to another. This great continent has a great many undeveloped resources; cultural, natural, religious, educational, and economic. There will be no sacrifices involved in our trying to give them the aid of our experiences in bringing forward these for their benefit.



The

United States should shoulder the obligations placed before them by the exigent needs of our Latin American neighbors. These needs are many—better communications and industrialization, more to eat, national integration, cultural development, homogeneity, opening up of the back country by roads and aviation, communications and education. Latin America's lands of the future? Yes, if the obligations are shouldered without mercenary measures and if the aid we send is accepted only in a trusting neighborly way.

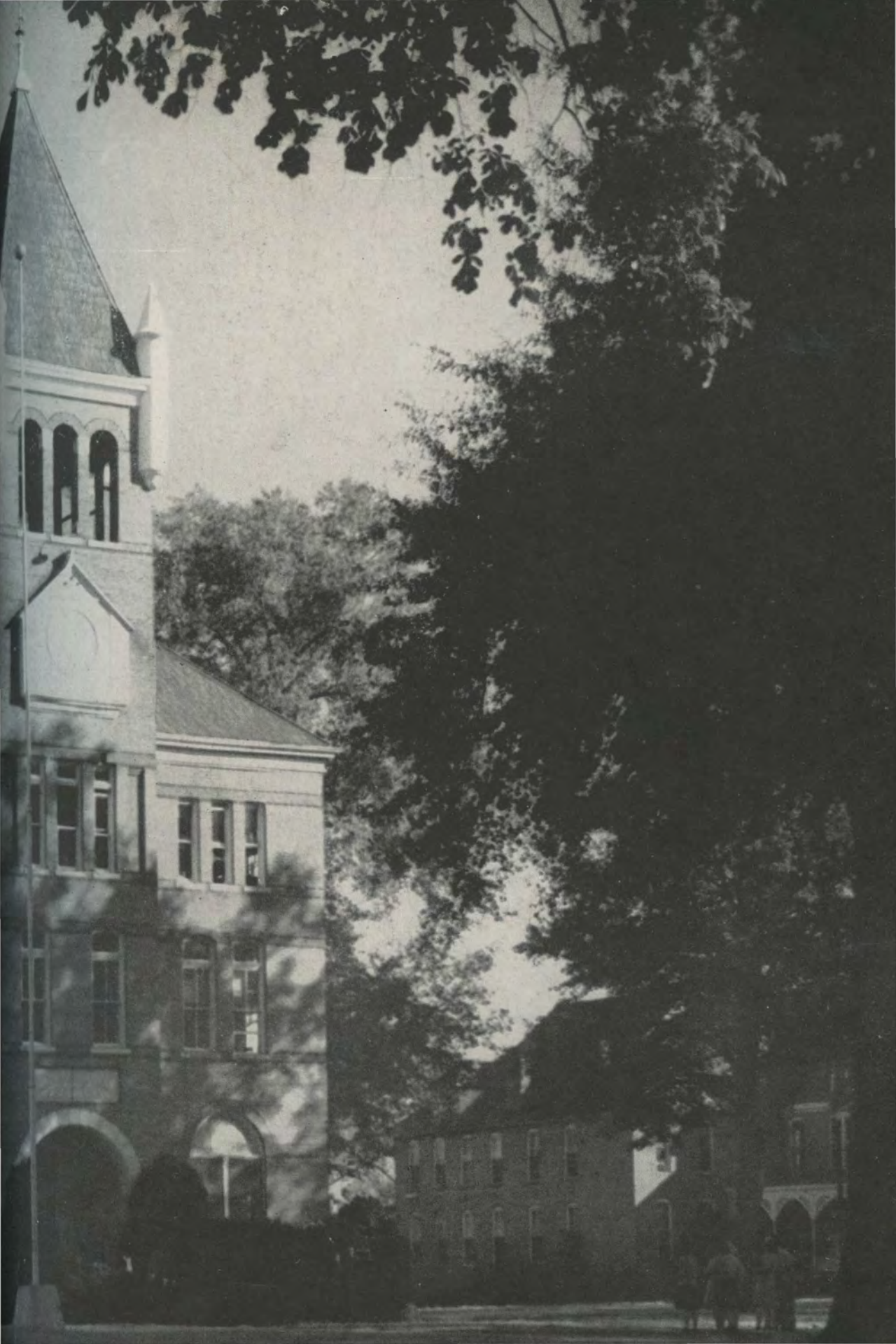


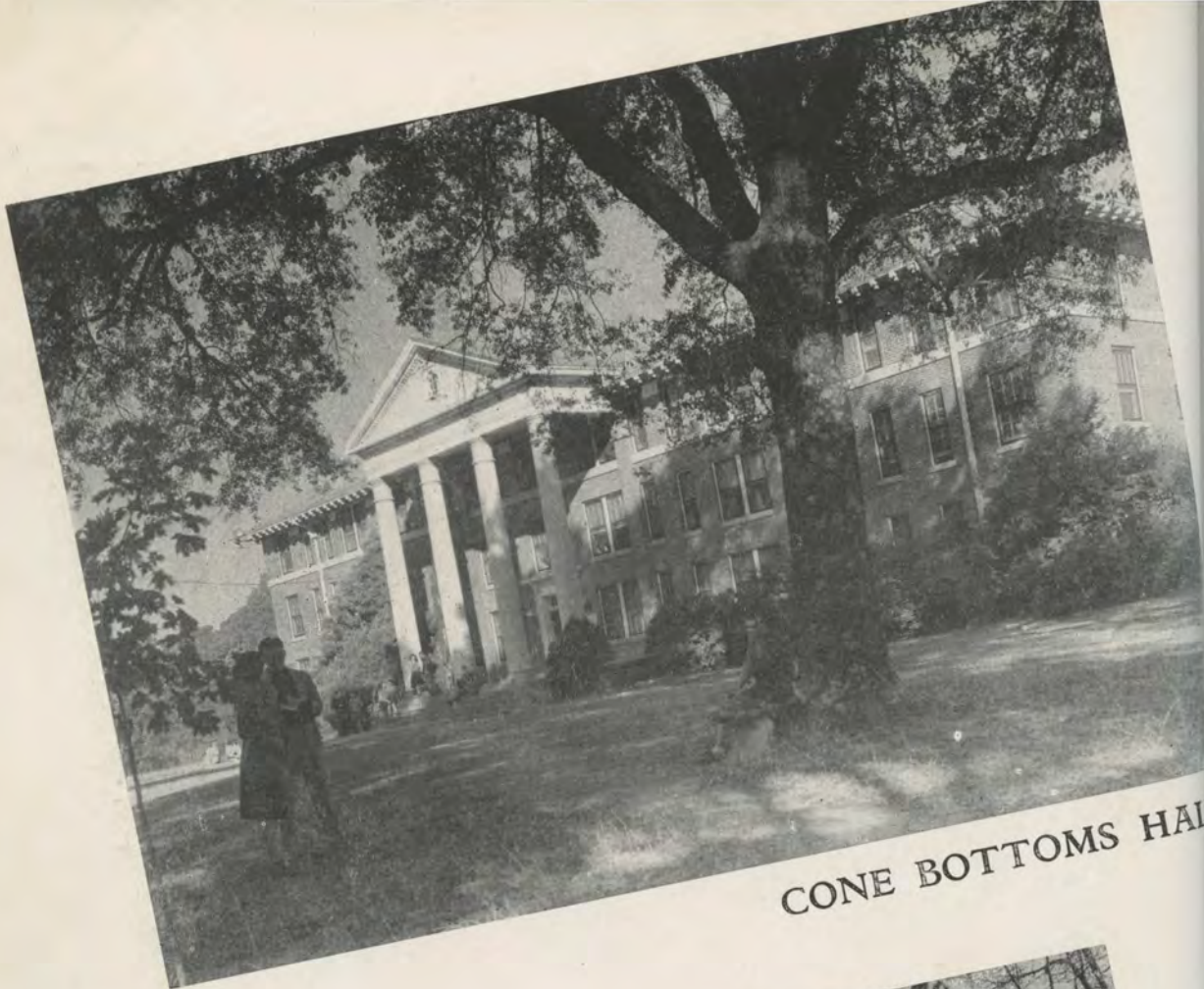

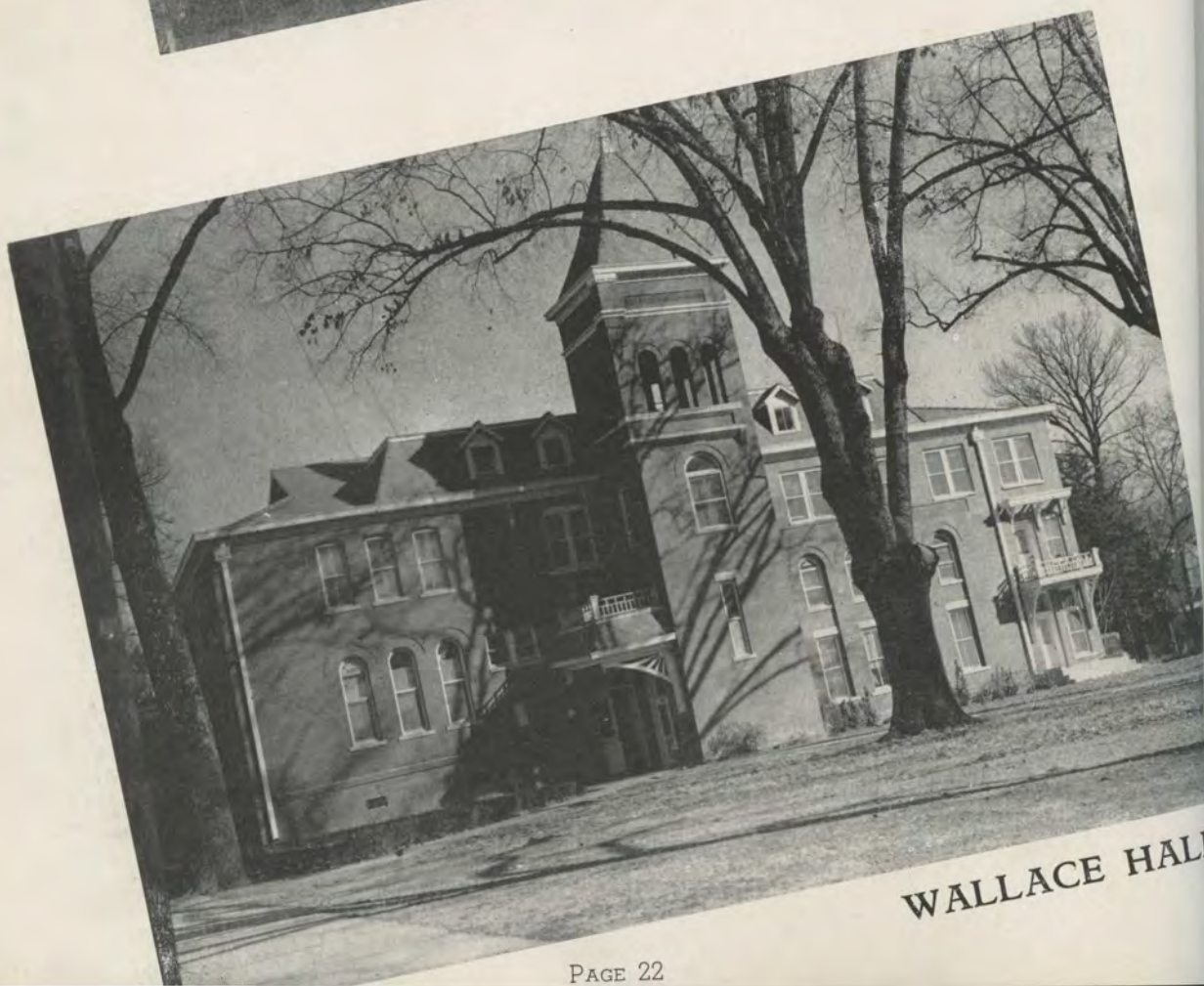
“Ouachita”
