#### Constitution.

#### ARTICLE I.—NAME AND OBJECT.

SECTION 1. The name of this body shall be: THE ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION.

SEC. 2. The object of this Convention shall be to preach the Gospel throughout our State and to evangelize the world; to aid by appropriate and Scriptural means our destitute and feeble churches; to supply the State with books and tracts best calculated to inculcate the doctrines and ordinances of Christ and to stimulate missionary effort; to encourage ministerial and Christian and general education; and to gather and preserve denominational statistics.

#### ARTICLE IL-MEMBERSHIP.

SECTION 1. The Convention shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this constitution and which desire to co-operate with this Convention, and shall be entitled to seats upon presentation of their proper credentials, or satisfactory evidence of their appointment.

SEC. 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for every fifty members, or major fraction thereof, above one hundred.

#### ARTICLE III.—AUTHORITY.

SECTION 1. This Convention shall never exercise any authority whatever over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the constitution of any church or with the exercise of its functions as the only coclesiastical body, but will always cheerfully recognize and uphold the absolute independence of the churches.

#### ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a President, and two Vice Presidents, two Recording Secretaries, a Treasurer, a Statistical Secretary, and an Auditor, who shall be elected annually by ballot, provided, however, that any officer of the Convention may be elected by acclamation if no objection be made; and all officers shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected; and, provided, further, that no one shall be elected to succeed himself to the office of President more than twice consecutively.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the deliberations of the Convention, and to discharge such other duties as are usually incumbent on the presiding officer of deliberate bodies. He shall appoint all committees, unless the Convention shall otherwise determine, and in his absence one of the Vice Presidents shall fill his place.

- SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretaries to keep a fair record of the proceedings of the Convention, and to file and keep in order all papers deemed important to be preserved.
- SEC. 4. Officers shall be elected as soon as the names of messengers shall have been enrolled.
- SEC. 5. All the officers of the Convention shall be elected by a majority of all the votes cast.

#### ARTICLE V.—BOARDS.

SECTION 1. The Convention shall elect the following boards and parts of boards:

- (1) The Missionary and Sunday School Board of the Convention, which shall consist of twenty-one brethren from the State at large, and one brother from the bounds of each Association in the State, who shall be elected annually, on account of their business ability, consecration and wisdom, seven of whom shall constitute a quorum; and the meetings of the board shall be held quarterly. Its duties and powers shall be to prosecute the Mission, Sunday School and Colportage work of the State. It shall report its work annually to this Convention.
- (2) The Board of Trustees of Ouachita-Central System of Colleges and Academies, one-third of which shall be elected annually.
- (3) The Board of Trustees of the Arkansas Baptist Orphans' Home, consisting of nine members, three of whom are to be elected annually.
  - (4) A Board of Ministerial Education, to consist of seven members, to be located at Arkadelphia, Ark., and to be elected annually.
  - (5) A State Central Committee of nine women, whose duty it shall be to distribute literature, and to encourage women and children in systematic giving to missions.
  - SEC. 2. The Executive Board shall elect a Missionary Secretary to work under the direction of the Board, and they shall employ other agencies, such as general missionaries and evangelists, office help, and any means such as tracts, etc., which in their judgment may inure to the most speedy and rapid evangelization of our State and the world. However, the Convention in session may elect the Missionary Secretary when it is deemed wise.

#### ARTICLE VI.-MEETINGS.

'ine Convention shall meet annually, "if God permit," on Thursday before the third Sunday in November.

#### ARTICLE VII.—UNALTERABLE.

This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Convention, two-thirds of the members voting concurring in the measure, except Article III, which shall remain forever unalterable.

#### ARKADELPHIA, ARK., November 19, 1909.

- 1. The Arkansas Baptist State Convention was called to order this morning at 10 o'clock, in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church. President W. E. Atkinson requested F. F. Gibson of Fort Smith to lead the devotional exercises.
- 2. Upon motion it was ordered that the Secretary's roll of messengers at this hour be made the basis of organization, and that the Convention proceed to organization

Whereas, Believing that God has committed a great trust to the Baptists of Arkansas in caring for the orphan children, and realizing that we have not yet, by any means, met this responsibility; and have failed to give the Orphans' Home the support it deserves; and believing that this carelessness comes from the fact that we do not have an opportunity to observe the Home in its work, therefore be it

Resolved, First, that this Convention appoint a committee of nine, who shall dispose, of present property, shall consider the advisability of removing the Orphans' Home to a more central and accessible location.

Resolved, Second, that this committee shall be empowered to receive bids or offers from different localities desiring the Orphans' Home.

nesolved, Third, that the State Board be empowered to act for the Convention in this matter, and this committee be instructed to report to it.

It was discussed by F. P. Turner, financial agent of the Home, and by Charles Haycock, of Pine Bluff.

The following resolution was offered by J. P. Hemby, of Monticello, and discussed by him:

Whereas, The Orphans' Home was founded and established by the Baptist people of Monticello, and with money and property donated by them for this purpose, without any outside help; and

Whereas, These same people offered and tendered the Home thus founded and established to the representatives of the Baptist churches of Arkansas for their fostering care and support, with the mental understanding in themselves, and expressed in article one of the articles of Association, that the domicile of the institu-

tion should forever remain and abide at Monticello, Drew County, Arkansas; and

Whereas, Much has been said in private and in the public press about moving the institution to some other locality, to the embarrassment of the management, and to the detriment of the Home, be it therefore

Resolved, First, that it is the sense of this Convention that all such discussion is unwise in that it handicaps the management, retards the progress and hinders the development of the institution.

Resolved, Second, that it is the purpose and intention of this Convention to keep faith with the people who founded and established the Orphans' Home at their expense, by allowing the Home to forever remain at Monticello.

nesolved, Third, that in view of the fact that the representatives of the churches. in convention assembled, entered into covenant with the people who founded the Home to support and protect the institution, it is the sense of this Convention that the churches so covenanting should more licerally and promptly carry out their end of the agreement.

It was discussed by J. P. Hemby. J. G. Lile, of Magnolia, moved that a committee be appointed to hear advocates of both resolutions, and to report recommendations to the Convention at a later hour. The chair appointed on the committee J. G. Lile, F. F. Gibson, M. P. Watts, Charles Haycock, J. H. Black.

S. E. Tull, of Pine Bluff, presented the following report of Committee on Orphanage, and submitted also report of the Orphanage Board and the Orphanage

Treasurer:

#### ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

We, your Committee on Orphanage, desire to make our report very brief and very much to the point. It is our opinion that the time has now come for the Baptists of Arkansas to come to the rescue of the orphan children who are placed in our hands by the misfortune of the death of their parents. This part of our work has not had its part of our patronage. The cause is such that it will be supported if the people are given an intelligent opportunity. The orphanage work needs publicity. It needs to be raised to its proper dignity as a denominational enterprise. We deem it not necessary to speak in this report of the merits of this most noble cause. God is demanding definite and worthy effort now on behalf of our churches in support of this cause, from the fact that so many children are now being brought to our Home. We respectfully ask reference to the report from the official board for statistics regarding the year's work done at the orphanage, and the number of children there.

We trust that the question of the permanent location of the Orphanage will be settled at this sitting of the Convention. Let

this Convention instruct the Orphanage Board to keep a man in the field, who shall give such publicity to tne orphanage work that every Baptist church in Arkansas shall be enlisted in its permanent support.

#### BOARD'S REPORT.

We, the Board of Trustees of the Arkansas Baptist Orphans' Home, would submit this our annual report for your consideration, to-wit:

We had at our last report 68 children in the Home, we have now 102, an increase from our last report of 34 children. We have adopted out of the Home 3 children, 2 children have become of age and have been dismissed, 4 children have died, 22 children have professed faith in Christ, and 21 children have been baptized since our last report. Our orphanage school closed on the 16th day of June, 1909, with 75 pupils, and opened again on the 28th day of September, 1909, with 85 in attendance. Miss Fern Christian of Little Rock, Ark., is our principal teacher. Professor Williams, our superintendent, helps in the teaching when not engaged otherwise, and some of the girls in the Home assist in the teaching. Miss Christian is a lady of strong character and well fitted in every respect for the position that she fills, and the Board considers that it has indeed been very fortunate in securing the services of such a worthy and competent person. Ella Mae Summers and Dora Miller, two girls of the Home, were assistant teachers last year, and also pupils. They are both now in Central College, but not at the expense of the institution.

Sister T. J. Neeley, after having done a great work, resigned as matron of the Home the first of September, and the Board employed Prof. J. N. Williams, formerly principal of Friendship Normal Academy at Star City, Ark., and his wife as superintendent

and matron of the Home.

The crop on the farm was a failure this year, but we have the place better stocked now, and as we have a superintendent to direct and assist, we hope to farm more successfully another year.

We have built a two-room hospital building, which was absolutely necessary in order to separate those who had some kind of infectious disease from the others. We have also built a school-house, which was also a necessity on account of the increased number in the Home. We had to take the school room in the main building for a sleeping room.

The children are getting the very best of religious and moral training. They attend Sunday school and church services regularly, and as you will see from the number that we report who have professed faith in Christ, that this training is having its effect. The children also have the very best training in their literary studies. We have not more than half enough room to take care of those now in the Home like they should be cared for, and we have applications almost every week to take others.

We note with pleasure an increase in the receipts of the Home

the past year. Our receipts last vear were \$6,181.47. This year they are \$8,273.09, but we report with regret the fact that the increase in money has not been nearly equal to the increase in children to be cared for. However, the wealthier churches and wealthier people of our State are turning to our orphanage and aiding it as never before. We hail this as the dawning of a new

and better day for this department of our general work.

We are sorely handicapped for want of means. We pray that the Lord will put it into the hearts of those who are able to contribute more liberally to the support of this great work, that the poor children of the State may be cared for and trained in a manner that will reflect credit upon the denomination that has the Arkansas Baptist Orphans' Home under its fostering care and

protection.

Brother F. P. Turner is still our Financial Agent, and we feel that he has done his utmost to enlist the sympathy of the people of the State in this work and that his heart is indeed in the work.

We feel that we have done the very best we could for the Home

with the amount of money that we have had to do with.

The names of the trustees whose term expire with this Convention are: R. L. Hyatt, Walter Wilson and Rev. N. C. Denson.

#### CONCERNING BUFORD CHILDREN.

One John Buford, who formerly lived in Mississippi, and who belonged to the fraternal order known as the Woodmen of the World in that State, and had an insurance policy in this order for the amount of \$1,000, moved to the State of Arkansas and died here, leaving four orphan children, without any one to care for them and no property. The matter was reported to the Orphans' Home Board, who promptly sent for them and placed the children in the Home, where they are getting along nicely and are well pleased, and are learning fast. The Board had an administrator of the Buford estate appointed and made application for the amount of his policy, but it seems that as the policy was made payable to the children, it was necessary to have guardians appointed instead of an administrator. In the meantime the proof of his death, etc., was properly made, and the clerk of the Woodman lodge in Mississippi came to Monticello to confer with the Orphans' Home Board orphans' Home, as that was their native State, and have guardians for them appointed in that State to collect the money coming to them from their father's policy. The Board told him that under the rules and regulations given us by the State Convention, we could not do that, without the consent of the said Convention, but promised him that we would have the matter brought before the Convention for action.

Since then we have had guardians appointed for the children and have made application for the money coming to them, fearing

that delay might cause them to lose the money.

The children do not want to go to Mississippi, but desire to remain in our Home, and the Board thinks it better for them to remain, but that it might carry out its promise to bring the matter before the State Convention, at its last regular meeting appointed Brother Chas. Haycock as a committee of the Board to bring the matter before the Convention, or before the Committee on Orphans' J. W. KIMBRO, · Home.

Secretary Orphans' Home Board.

On motion the Convention authorized the trustees of the Orphans' Home to collect insurance due to the four Buford children by the Woodmen of the World, and to retain them at the Home in Monticello.

The report was adopted.

11. The following resolution was offered by J. B. Searcy, of Little Rock, and, on motion, was adopted:

#### SANITARIUM.

Whereas, There is situated on Lincoln avenue, Little Rock, a beautiful block of ground two squares north of the Union Depot, upon which stands a four-story brick building, now being used as a hospital, with some sixty rooms, well equipped and furnished with all things necessary for a Sanitarium, with bath tubs, lava-tories and sinks, heated with hot water by a new and up-to-date

plant, and lighted with electricity.

This splendid property is conservatively valued at \$85,000, is offered to us for \$50,000, only some \$10,000 of which is to be paid February 1, 1910, and all deferred payments are only to bear 6 per cent per annum interest.

The hospital has been running in full blast for two years, iswell organized and well advertised, is well furnished and equipped

with everything necessary for good management; and Whereas, A number of brethren in Little Rock, after carefully examining the property and everything connected with the proposition, unanimously instructed J. W. Conger, Ben Cox, L. L. Abbott, R. G. Bowers, and J. B. Searcy, to take an option on the property until the 30th of this month, that the Convention might carefully consider the proposition in the light of all the facts at hand: therefore.

Resolved, That this Convention now appoint a committee of five brethren to examine this proposition and report their findings and recommendations to this Convention at the earliest hour prac-

ticable.

The chair appointed on the committee: R. F. Tredway, H. C. Fox, W. T. Amis, S. E. Tull, Jno. J. Hurt.

12. The report of the Tri-State Hospital Board was read by T. T. Thompson as follows:

#### TRI-STATE HOSPITAL BOARD.

In keeping with a resolution passed by the Convention at Fayetteville in 1908, the State Mission Board and the Hospital Board held a joint meeting at Little Bock December 1. After organizing the two bodies into one, the hospital proposition was duly and prayerfully considered, with the final and full agreement reached that the Hospital Board put a man on the field for the purpose of raising the proposed \$25,000, it being understood that said agent should do his work in conference with the representative of both the Mission and Educational boards. The Hospital Board elected T. T. Thompson to take the field, which he did, engaging for three months, or until a suitable man could be found totake the place. At the expiration of the three months, no one being found for the field upon whom the Board could agree, and seeing the necessity for more vigorous effort in the campaign, the agent resigned his church March 1 to give undivided attention to the hospital interests. A campaign was made without interruption until June 1, at which time the Board of Education, through Rev. R. G. Bowers, made a proposition to the Hospital Board asking that they suspend the active work for the hospital and loan them the time of their agent until the meeting of the Convention in November, which proposition was accepted and the agent enlisted under the direction of the Education Board in the effort to free our schools from debt.

Up to the time of the suspension of the work the interest among the people was constantly increasing, and some seven thou-

sand dollars had been pledged.

The General Committee met in Memphis November 8, at which time they decided to make great effort to break ground before the last of December, this year. The plans are completed and in the hands of the Building Committee, who now need cash for the mammoth enterprise.

- 18. The report of the Ministerial Board was read by H. L. Winburn, as follows:

#### BOARD OF MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We record with joy the continued blessings of our Father upon another year's work in your great department of Ministerial Education. Surely nothing that we have in hand can be of more far reaching and fundamental value than this. The education and training of men for the work of preaching the gospel, administering the affairs of churches and leading the hosts of the Lord in

worthy ways to worthy enterprises is at the foundation of our denominational life and progress. President Mullins has well said that "ministerial education involves all our church and denominational problems." There is no sign of the times that is more freighted with hope than the present awakening along this line among our Arkansas Baptists. This awakening has shown itself in an increase along all lines.

During the last scholastic year there were 37 ministerial stu-dents in Ouachita College. Of this number 25 received financial help from your Board. The class-room work and general deportment of our beneficiaries was fully up to the average of past years,

and, in some particulars, a distinct advance.

At the opening of school this year there were many evidences that we would face the necessity of enlargement. At the same season last year there were 30 students for the ministry. This year there are 53. At the same season last year there were 19 beneficiaries of the Board and applicants for help. This year there are 26. This shows a net general increase of more than 60 per cent. The percentage of increase is not so great as last year, but the actual number is greater. At the rate of increase the last two years has shown, it will be less than five years when we have a hundred ministerial students in our institutions of learning each year. For this enlargement of the work we are devoutly thankful.

We offer here a feature of the report that is not customary with us. Inasmuch as the question of the value of our investment in young men is sometimes raised, we have thought it well to collect statistics to show the work of our men for just one vacation period. Please remember that these figures are the work of 21 of the 53 ministerial students who are now in Quachita College. and represent their work for the summer vacation period:

Churches organized, 5; meetings held, 78; sermons preached, 874; professions of faith, 788; additions by baptism, 640; total

additions, 842; Sunday Schools organized, 7.

Compare this record with the work of any 21 average pastors in the State and the relative value of our investment in ministerial education, from the point of view of results immediately gained, will be settled finally. Compare it with a whole year's work of the same number of average pastors, and the showing will still be such as to make the discerning rejoice in the work of our ministerial students. But immediate results are perhaps the smallest part of the value of this great work. They are, as related to the ultimate values, about like the sprouts a man would chop down, while grinding his axe, in order to see how the edge was coming on.

During a part of the year Brother Otto Mathis was our field agent, and did us good work. Not a little of the increase of the work this year is due to his faithful agitation and prayful work last year. He resigned work with us some months ago to take up the pastorate at Sulphur Rock. Since his going we have had no man in the field. We believe that the field work pays handsomely. If in no other way, it pays in the number of students for the ministry who are induced by the agitation to come up to our schools

The pressure for funds this year will be much harder than ever before. An unusually large number of men have come to us with practically no financial resources. It will be absoluely necessary that we furnish the means for them to live on, or else they will have to quit school and go home. Just now, when our prayers seem to be in process of being answered, when men are coming and offering themselves in larger numbers than ever before, it will be a double calamity for us to have to turn any away. Many have been praying that God would give us the men. This dearth of students for the ministry has been felt all over the land. You went to the right source for help and prayed the Lord of the harvest to thrust forth men. He is doing so, in larger numbers than ever before. It is now our plain duty to enlarge our giving to this department of our work and sustain the men God has given us. This year we will have to increase the financial part of our work about 50 per cent over last year's estimate. We ought, by all means, to have \$300 per month, or \$3,000 for the school year, to rightly meet the growing demands of this work.

We reported last year that the policy of the Board had been changed so that an applicant for help would have to have the official endorsement of his church, both in written documents and in financial help. This policy has worked well, and is gradually being extended to every man whose name comes before us. We expect to continue it until the ground shall be fully covered. In this way we make it absolutely impossible for the Board to squander denominational funds on unworthy applicants unless such applicants shall have the connivance of their home churches. We cannot, of course, go back of a church's action.

Another change is being gradually worked into our policy. The Board expects to secure regular reports on the class-room work and general deportment of its beneficiaries, and these reports will weigh much in their judgment of the worth of an applicant for help.

We invite full discussion of all the policies of the Board, and will welcome suggestions looking toward the betterment of the

In closing this general report, before coming to tables of statistics and recommendations, we desire to raise a question for your consideration. In view of the general dearth of students for the ministry and in view of the command to pray that the Lord of the harvest may thrust forth more laborers, why may we, as churches and pastors, not exercise the usual Bible duty in the case of this prayer? Why may we not make a sane and aggressive campaign of ministerial evangelism and try to help answer our own prayers? It it be said that the call to preach is of soverign grace, the answer is that the call to salvation is as much so. Yet we exert our best efforts to bring men to decision and acceptance of salvation. Why should we not lay the work of preaching the gospel upon the hearts and consciences of our young men and urge them to decision in this matter as well as the others? In the mind of your Board, although some of its members have been guilty of the same thing, the idea that a man should refuse to obey God's call to preach as long as he can keep out of it, is on a par withthe idea that one should refuse God's call to be honest as long as he can keep out of it.

The deficit for this year is much smaller than usual, for the simple reason that we have refused to pay the last month's appropriations to the beneficiaries. This would amount to about \$200, and ought to have been paid two weeks ago. But there was nothing to pay it with, so we did not pay by overdrawing at the bank as we did last year. If the overdraft had been made the deficit would have been upwards of two hundred dollars. This amount is due the boys now, and they need it—some of them need it desperately. In view of all the facts set forth, we recommend—

(1) That a cash collection of at least \$200 be taken at once

to cover the present bills due the students.

That we enlarge our subscriptions and pledges to this work for the year by at least 50 per cent, which would necessitate

a collection in pledges amounting to \$3,000.

(3) That a campaign of enlightenment and enlistment bepushed throughout the year, looking toward bringing 100 ministerial students to Quachita College by or before the next Convention meeting.

(4) That every church in sympathy with the work of ministerial education, and in touch with this body, place this great work on its regular calendar of collections and make an offering Submitted by

at least once a vear.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial Education was read and discussed by Tillman B. Johnson, of Texarkana, after which a collection for the work amounting to \$3,200 in cash and pledges, was taken, and the report adopted.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

The report of the Board on Ministerial Education presents a great need. The supreme need of Arkansas and of the world is instruction in the Word of God. Such instruction is possible only by those who are trained to that end. An educated ministry is therefore absolutely essential as God's instruments in proclaiming His truth. Our educational institutions must be provided with means by which they can train to the highest degree possible to them, those who seek their advantages. We urge the study of that report, and we recommend that our appeal to the Baptists of Arkansas be so insistent that we shall soon be able to provide at least \$10 monthly, instead of \$7.50, as at present, to those in actual. need of such amount. (Signed)

# REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY AND SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD FOR THE YEAR ENDING OCTOBER 31, 1909.

With happy hearts, your Board brings this report to the Convention. God has done great things for you and us this year of our Lord, 1909, whereof we are all glad. With the deepest swelling gratitude to Almighty God, we may well shout in our souls, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us!" Your Board believes that the victories of this year mark the beginning every way of a new and meaningful epoch for Arkansas Baptists. God has given victories State-wide and State-through. It has been a pivotal year. So, on our faces, let us cry from the dust, "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless His holy name!"

#### A HARD YEAR.

In many respects this has been a very hard year. It has tried our faith and our works. When the year began we were still more or less in the grip of the panic. We also faced a debt of more than \$7,000, brought over from last year. The outlook seemed dark and rather discouraging, but faith in God and in you pressed your Board to venture, and, after praying long for divine guidance, appropriations were made to the amount of \$32,000, including the debt. The year has not seen without tears and agony of heart. We had a battle ahead of us and knew it.

Because of the debt the field force for the first two quarters was cut down to about one-third of the former year. This was embarrassing but necessary. Then the only State-wide evangelist we had lost one month because of sickness. God seemed to be

testing us.

Another thing that made this a gloriously hard year for your Board was the fact that other denominational interests were pressed by strong representatives throughout the State from the first of the year. Because of a heavy debt, our beloved colleges, Ouachita and Central, were in the balances. With joy your Board gave way to a successful State-wide campaign for this interest, pressed by Brother Bowers and his helpers most of the year. We are happy that God put it into the hearts of his people to respond to the call to save our schools. There remains much yet to be done, however, in this matter. Then Brother T. T. Thompson was on the field a part of the year in the interest of the Tri-State Hospital at Memphis. This work made good headway while it was being prosecuted.

To the difficulties mentioned above there is to be added the fact that we had many destructive storms in several sections of the State in the early spring, as at Brinkley, Bee Branch, Piney, etc. But to mention these cyclones is to remind you of a heavy and widespread loss of property as well as loss of life. As summer came on a drouth set in. The results were that in many sections less than half a crop was made, and, taking the State as a whole, only about 60 per cent of a normal crop was gathered. But when God helps, Arkansas Baptists are not a people to be defeated or daunted by a mere drouth. We are passing that status of things.

#### A YEAR OF ADVANCE, HOWEVER.

Notwithstanding all of the above named difficulties, the Lord gave victory on every field. It has certainly been a year of testing and triumph. No white flags have gone up in Baptist hands.

#### ASSOCIATION MISSIONS.

Association missions have made a good advance this year. Your Board has worked in co-operation with a number of Association boards, and this phase of the work has prospered every way. In this way we get closer to the churches and bring all of our work home to the hearts of the people better. Enlightenment, enlargement and enlistment make a touchdown here. The outlook for this phase of your work is brighter for the coming year than ever before. With the proper co-operation of pastors, systematic plans may be perfected in this division of our work that will reach every church with a gospel revival and telling offering during each year. Let everybody take heart and determine to fight it out along this line, if it takes all the summer of the gospel dispensation.

#### HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Home and Foreign Mission campaign in March and April was a remarkable one in every way. Arkansas Baptists were asked to give \$10,000 to Home Missions, and \$13,000 to Foreign. Notwithstanding the many, many discouraging features of the year, our people never went to a large task with a more holy determination and conquering faith. There was some very bad weather, the chilling effects of the panic still lingered, and many of our churches were pastorless. But brave, godly laymen threw themselves into the breach and led their churches to do glorious things. Pastors proved themselves to be worthy leaders, the churches manifested the Calvary spirit, our women did noble work, and Jesus led all the forces to a wonderful victory. When the campaign closed Arkansas Baptists had raised \$10,159 for Home Missions, or \$159 more than we were asked to raise, and \$12,432 for Foreign Missions. We were asked to raise \$23,000 for both interests and lacked

but about \$400 reaching it. For the first time in our history we raised our apportionment for Home Missions and came near reaching it for Foreign. In this great work Arkańsás Baptists are going to the ends of the earth with God's life-message and helping to save every stretching land upon which the sun shines. This means that we are tying our own beloved State on to heaven. Let us all praise God and set our faces to other such victories!

#### GROWING PASTORS.

The past year has marked a very gratifying growth in pastoral leadership and efficiency. This is the sort of growth that means more growth, deep and high and broad, a growth that will multiply itself even unto the end of the ages. More pastors have taken their own collections than ever before. This is as it should be. The pastors are our main men. They are the key to every situation, the solution to every problem. If they are wise and courageous, have a large vision of things and really feel that they are God's Holy Ghost-appointed leaders, no denominational task is too hard, and every victory is ours. Jesus has no braver division of leaders on his staff than our beloved Arkansas pastors. Thank God for them. Whatever they take up will go and in country, town and city alike, they are taking up every department of our work and pressing out and up and on to victory in every direction.

#### AGGRESSIVE LAYMEN.

The year just closed has been one of marked improvement in the efficiency and leadership of our laymen. Scores and scores of our laymen are worthy of honorable mention. We will never be able to dot the lands of earth with aggressive, militant churches without virile laymen who are willing to put their blood and money into God's business. The outlook in this direction is neither dark nor hazy. God hasten the day when every member of every Baptist church in Arkansas can be counted on by his pastor to help man every gun and press every phase of God's much loved kingdom.

#### A YEAR OF CHURCH BUILDING.

This year has been one marked in every way for the building of meeting houses. While your Board does not put any money into church buildings, we would if we could. The time ought soon to come when we could lend some material encouragement to this all-important matter. A splendid church building in a community often causes Baptist stock to double, and this is a good thing. Let us rejoice that many such buildings are going up now in Arkansas. A magnificent church building, such as the one in which we are meeting, ought to be a sort of embodiment of God's glory. The Lord multiply good meeting houses in every county in the State.

#### FORCES UNITING.

One feature of the work this year, very pleasing to us all, has been the tendency toward the unification of our forces. All over the State conditions in this regard are growing better. It has been the policy of your Board to turn on all the light possible. The people are seeing more and more that this Convention is for peace and progress. The happy day is coming when we will be one again. May God hasten the day when those who have been torn from us will come back to their first love. Let every legiti-

mate encouragement be given by all of us to bring this day on apace. It will be a shouting time in neaven and in earth.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL AND B. Y. P. U. WORK.

Our Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. work has made fairly good progress, when we consider the fact that we have not had a man on the field for this particular work. Our missionaries have given considerable attention to the organization of Sunday Schools, some ninety-two having been organized and set going in a good way. Right good progress has been made in B. Y. P. U. work. The

Right good progress has been made in B. Y. P. U. work. The Assembly in this city in July was very helpful and encouraging indeed. It prophesies much for the future of our churches. The time has come when a permanent part of our work ought to be to have a good Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. man on the field all the year. In some measure our future hangs on this. We cannot afford to neglect it longer. Shall our young people become live, wise, efficient servants of God, and our denomination strong and mighty, or will we lose the lead we have gained at the cost of long years? Out attitude toward this proposition will answer. Here we will show our wisdom. May God give us eyes for the future.

#### EVANGELISM IN CHURCHES INCREASING.

Gratifying to the last degree has been the growth of the evangelistic spirit in our churches. There have been more revivals in our churches this year than in any other year in our history. Why mention this in this report? Our answer is, that if the missionaries sent out by this Board did not help to inspire a soul-saving spirit in our churches and help stir pastors to reach out for the lost far and near, our work would come far short of what God wants it to be. If God will give us soul-winning churches, the rest will be easy. A healthy evangelistic spirit in our churches will drive out all bickering, division and covetousness. It will burn out the frills and feathers of a merely oratorical preaching, unite a divided people, and give a new face to things generally. It is heaven's spirit, and will land our churches all upon God's mountain. This iurning evangelistic spirit is the normal condition of the churches of our Lerd Jesus Christ, and may our Father in heaven us your Board and every other means to bring them to this happy State. It is a move towards the uplands of heaven.

#### GERMAN EVANGELISM.

The past year Brother W. H. Mueller has been employed by your Board as a missionary to the Germans. Our German brethren are great people, sturdy, earnest, and thoroughly worthy of our very best efforts for their salvation. Brother Mueller has done very fine work. The Lord has blessed him in many ways and his people are taking to the work well. He has been a great blessing to them. Very soon there ought to be a number of good strong German churches within our borders. These Germans are lost sinners for whom Christ died just as other peoples are. They are included in the commission. We must look on all people as Jesus did. So by prayer and purse let us keep up this good work until these thousands of brothers from over the sea find, not only a new land, but a new Lord and life. Their interests and our interests and Christ's interests demand it. May God continue to

smile upon this splendid work so well begun. It is our business to see that more Germans go to heaven.

#### WOMAN'S WORK GROWING.

For long years this Convention has encouraged and fostered woman's work. Decidedly more has been done along this line this year than ever before. This is very wise. From such sewing a splendid harvest is always reaped. When pennies are put out dollars come back. The Convention at Fayetteville instructed that a State organizer be employed for this work. For four months Miss Katherine Bowman of Nashville, Tennessee, was employed and rendered very efficient service. July 31, Miss Bowman resigned. Then Miss Florence Davis, the present organizer, was engaged and began work September 15. Miss Davis is a highly cultured lady, full of the Spirit and grace of God and a very capable and satisfactory worker every way. Our ladies throughout the State count themselves very fortunate indeed in securing Miss Davis for this position. Scores of organizations for children, young ladies and older ones have been formed, others given new inspiration and life, and the outlook is very bright every way. Of the State, some reaching as much as \$500 or \$600 and more. A live woman's society in a church always proves a great helper to the pastor and becomes a telling factor in building up the kingdom generally. Let us thank God for Miss Davis and pray heaven's blessings upon all our saintly women in their good work.

#### STATE MISSIONS AND OUR COLLEGE DEBTS.

There is a vital, a really death or life relation between our State Mission Board and our Education Board. If State Missions lives, our colleges must live. If our colleges prosper to any degree, State Missions must prosper. These two interests of our work are and must continue to be the closest and most mutually helpful friends. Our colleges now face an exceedingly grave situation. Your Mission Board has lent encouragement during the year to the effort to pay our college debts, and Brother Bowers and his helpers have done a great work, but there is a mountainous task yet before the Education Board. Your Mission Board feels that they and the entire missionary field force must give themselves out of debt at once. It is the opinion of your Board also that every Baptist church in Arkansas ought to throw its doors wide open to this great interest for the next three months. It is a critical hour, our destiny as a denomination is tied up in this matter. Shall the Baptist denomination in Arkansas live and reach out to the ends of the earth with a saving hand? Within the next few months heaven must record our answer. Your Mission Board is under very great obligations to Brother Bowers and his helpers for the splendid service rendered in the late State Mission campaign. Now from this hour, let every Baptist among us be in and out and up and around, till every dollar of indebtedness is lifted from our beloved Ouachita and Central for God's glory. It's coming.

#### THE BOOK DEPARTMENT.

It is not well enough known that your Board has a book department in the Mission rooms at Little Rock. During most of

this year this department of our work has been under the supervision of our efficient brother, A. P. Scofield. Up to this time the book business has been conducted almost wholly for the sake of our colportage work. We could hardly do colportage work successfully without this book department, but there are other possibilities for great good in this business, and it seems to your Board that the time has come when the Baptists of Arkansas ought to have a well supplied and thoroughly equipped book store in Little Rock. This all-important and far-racnin matter might be under the supervision of your Board with a special man appointed to conduct it as it is now, or what would be better, perhaps, some good man of business ability, with the moral support of this Convention and its woards, might undertake it. Whatever is done, this department of our work needs to be more widely and thoroughly advertised, and it is important for all of our people to know that all the profit on this business goes to our mission work, and that every book published may be had by writing to the Baptist Mission Rooms, 124 East Fourth street, Little Rock. Brthren, pray for this interest.

#### OUR HELPERS.

But for the help of many friendly agencies, your Board would not be able to bring to you this encouraging and inspiring report. Friends through and for Jesus make this kingdom go. We feel very grateful to the helpers we are here about to mention.

#### Baptist Advance.

The first of our helpers that we mention is the Baptist Advance. Our work would hardly go at all without this all-important medium. The paper is far better than it has ever been and is getting better all the time. It is the opinion of many that it is the best and most practical Baptist weekly in the South. Editor McKinney seems to have been born for the pen. The columns of the Advance are ever open unreservedly to your Board for every legitimate prosecution of its work. No more could be asked. This Convention owes a debt of deep gratitude to the editor of the Advance, and this gratitude ought by all means to take form in two very necessary things—in increasing the circulation of the paper unto double and more, and then see that it is paid for promptly. These matters are far-reaching in every direction. Will a wise people neglect them? Have our pastors an eye to real business? Here is one test. Enlistment and enlargement step in the tracks of enlightenment. Let a pastor put the Advance in every Baptist home on his field, and that pastor is more than half way up the hill on any proposition. Long live the Baptist Advance and heaven's blessings on its efficient editor.

#### Sunday School Board.

The Sunday School Board has proved itself a helpful friend to your Board again this year by giving us \$500 in books. While we do not feel that this is as much help as we need, we are very grateful for this much. The Sunday School Board is a great factor for good in our Southern Zion. Your Board feels that every possible encouragement ought to be given the Sunday School Board in the way of contributions and helping to increase the circulation of its literature, since every cent of profit from the publications goes right back into the denomination. We feel, how-

ever, that the Sunday School Board ought to put a Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. man in Arkansas the coming year, and we hope that every loyal heart in this Convention will pray believingly to this end.

Home Board.

The Home Mission Board has reached out its generous hand and helped us again this year. This Board has given to our cooperative work \$5,000, and \$300 toward office expenses and secretary's salarv. For this very kindly help we are grateful every way, and thank God for helpful friends in such a stretched-out time of need. For long years the Home Board has gone with us to the battle, and we have hopes that it will continue this saving help. Let every man and church among us prove our loyal friendship to Home Missions on to the end. Besides the amounts mentioned above, the Home Board has contributed thousands of dollars to church uilding in Arkansas. May the grace of our Father prosper the work of the Home Board till all our home land becomes a militant force that will shake the gates of hell.

Foreign Mission Board.

The Foreign Mission Board has contributed \$525 during the vear towards the Secretary's salary and office expenses, besides sending us good supplies of tracts, etc. All the above named agencies have contributed very materially to the great victory God has given us his year. All joy and grace to them till the coming of our King.

#### THE STATE MISSION CAMPAIGN.

What can be said of the late State Mission campaign? Because of the heavy debt your Board had felt from the first of the year that the campaign ought to begin as early as June or July, if possible, but other vital interests of the denomination forbade this. However, the Secretary of the Board and others were busy during he time makin prevarations for the campaign. Everybody knew that the campaign must be strenuous and stiff and stubborn for God. The State was sown down with perhaps a half million pages of tracts during August and September. Your Board believes more and more in the wide and wise distribution of informing literature. These tracts carry a thousand messages to ten thousand hearts that might never be reached otherwise. They continue to send forth an enlightening and unifying influence, both day and night, and thus hurry the kindom on apace. Pastors and churches nerved themselves for the battle as never. Women's Societies, Sunday Schools, and every other organization in our churches, went into the campaign with a faith and determination glorious to behold. As the campaign moved on the churches of the Lord Jesus, in country, town and city, covered themselves with missionary glory. They did it because they had in their pastors a leadership unsurnassed in all God's broad land, The brave and self-sacrificing missionaries went into the campaign to win, and came off the field worn and dusty, but with a victorious spirit in every breast, having collected nearly twice as much for State Missions as in any former year in all our history. Jesus seemed to take the lead and inspire the hearts in every church and mission field, and the rest was easy: Arkansas Baptists have proved that they are no longer a feeble folk. An in-

domitable spirit has sprung up in their breasts and within the bounds of this State they mean for God to have the victory at all hazards and at all times.

#### SUMMARY OF OUR WORK.

As we come to a summary of all the work done, we do so with joyful thanksgiving. The first half of the year we had only one State evangelist and two district missionaries with six colporters. The last half of the year the force was increased to three evangelists, five district missionaries and eight colporters. Some fifty-five churches have had the salaries of their pastors supplemented by your Board. We co-operated with a number of Association Boards in the support of their missionaries, part of the salary of one city missionary has been paid and eight ministerial students were employed during the summer months. Quite a number of voluntary meetings were held by pastors.

well as a vision of a lost and losing world from Calvary's point of view. It is all plain. We must go forward, we must break

forth on all sides. It is Christ's hour for Christ's men.

As your Board closes this annual report of a glorious year, we do it with feelings of gratitude, mingled with those of fear and trembling, lest we come short of the great opportunity and weighing obligations of this marvelous era into which God has brought We submit to you this report with all the souls saved and baptized as mentioned above, and not one dollar of indebtedness resting upon us, and, looking anxiously out on the new year, cry to you in the words of our brother Paul: "Therefore, beloved brethren, be yet steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord!"

22. The report of the Committee on State Missions was read by Otto Whittington, of Pine Bluff, as follows:

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE MISSIONS.

The fundamental thing in the conventional idea is that the churches of a particular territory band themselves together in order to give the gospel to the destitute portions of that district. This is the most effective way to carry on mission work, because it unifies our strength and unity in the harness of power. God has used it to promote His kingdom in many ways and through it has brought about the salvation of many souls.

Our Convenion, then, has for its most important work the destitute places of the State of Arkansas. The very best time and the necessary length of time should be given by this body to

the consideration of State Missions.

First of all, we thank God for the marvelous way in which He has used the work of the Convention this year in the salvation of the lost. We are profoundly thankful to Him for the men He has given us to carry on this great work. He has used them in a mighty sweep of His kingdom throughout the State. Then we thank Him for the host of loyal Baptists all over the State that have stood by this great work of God with their prayers and with their money. The number of these people is rapidly increasing and they are coming more and more to "one spirit and one mind, striving together for the faith of the gospel."

There is much destitution in the State. There has never been. as we believe, such a call for the gospel from the smaller towns and country districts as there is now. Men are needed to preach the gospel in many places where there are no Baptist churches, and many churches are wanting pastors.

Brethren, let us pray God to send more laborers into our State and as much as lieth in us strive to supply this great demand. Some of our larger towns and cities are sorely in need of more ches. Church buildings are greatly needed in many sections. Many of our associations should have a strong man in the

field for his entire time. The people need to know about the work that is being done and not only to know but to have a part in it, that there may be simultaneous development over the State and that our great power and resources may be rightly harnessed and effectively used for the kingdom of God. Brethren, the respon-sibility is on us and that responsibility increases as God blesses

and uses us.

Under the leadership of God we have made great progress this year. Brother J. S. Rogers, our efficient secretary, has wrought well. Through his untiring efforts and his great zeal for God's cause we have been led to an almost matchless victory.

The amount received for State Missions during the year just closed was \$34,393. This is an increase of \$8,354 over the preceding year; 4,156 men and women, boys and girls, have made professions of conversions, and 4,638 have united with Baptist churches. God has certainly made bare His mighty arm and poured us out a great blessing.

Since it has been demonstrated and proved by the blessings of God that He is well pleased with the work of the Board, we make

the following recommendations:

That the Baptists throughout the State give to this work a more loyal support with their prayers, with their service and with their means.

2. That our State Board give us during the year more facts and figures about the needs and work of the State through cards,

folders, slips, tracts, and through the Baptist Advance.

3. That the pastors over the State inform their churches of

the work that is being done and the work that needs to be done.
4. That as the Baptist Advance has rendered invaluable service in the recent campaign for missions and in all other departments of the work, we give it our hearty and loyal support and spread its circulation both in and outside the State.

That our Board be instructed to lay out their work for

the ensuing year on the basis of \$40,000.

That it be made the permanent policy of this Convention that the State Mission books close on Tuesday night following the first Sunday in November of each year, at midnight.

- 30. Ben Cox read the report of the Board of Education, as follows:

### REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

To the State Baptist Convention, Greeting:

In submitting this annual report of Ouachita and Central colleges, the Board of Education desires to put upon record their profound gratitude for divine blessings during the past year. Our colleges are now in the most prosperous condition in their history. Their walls are crowded with enthusiastic students. These students are under the guidance of able, God-fearing teachers, and everywhere the spirit of Christian work and Christian love per-

vades the class rooms. To prevent this report from being unduly long, we shall discuss only the most salient features of the year's progress.

#### OUACHITA COLLEGE.

At Ouachita College there is now enrolled 331 students, as compared with 291 on the corresponding day last year. This represents a healthy increase in number, but the greatest growth in the college has been in the character of the student body. The students of Ouachita College this year are at least six months ahead of last year's in preparation; so much so that some of the preparatory classes which were overflowing last year have been abandoned this year. We are gratified also to report that Ouachita is now drawing patronage from many families who in past years have been sending their children to institutions in distant States. We are glad of the growing spirit of confidence in the character of work done at Ouachita College.

The students who have gone out from this noble college have

made good in public and private life.

The attendance of ministerial students this year has broken all records. A call to preach is a call to get ready to preach, and this fundamental truth is finding a lodgment in the hearts of the rising generation. It should be understood that Ouachita College is not running a theological seminary. We encourage students in ministerial classes to attend our Theological Seminaries after getting through here. Our ministerial students need grounding in the usual literary studies. We recognize, however, that not all of these students are able to attend special seminaries and we have therefore provided classes in Church History, Old and New Testament, and other studies of a special nature. The indications are that the ministerial students' enrollment this year will run to sixty or seventy-five.

Another gratifying feature of the character of our student body is the large number of students in attendance who are preparing themselves especially to teach in the public schools. Ouachita will have her share in the educational redemption of the State of Arkansas. At present there are ninety-seven students at Ouach-

ita preparing to teach.

The physical needs of Ouachita College are many. Our buildings need reparing, the scientific department needs new apparatus, but we have refrained from pressing upon the brethren our material needs because of the necessity of lifting the debt. Ouachita College is in competition with every other college in the country. The people nowadays are seeking the best, and the Baptist brotherhood should not be satisfied with anything short of the best. A college is read in the lives of its graduates. The 500 graduates who have gone forth from this institution are living epistles read of all men. The Ouachita influence is elevating the school system of our State, it is spreading the glad tidings of salvation among the masses, it is lending dignity to the citizenship of our commonwealth. Not only the Baptists, but all the people of Arkansas, are proud of the great work done by Ouachita College.

We wish to put upon record our appreciation for the noble gift of Col. W. H. Halliburton, of DeWitt. Col. Halliburton has donated to Ouachita College library 1,150 books, selected with special reference to the needs of our students. His name will be impressed upon the hearts of our students and friends of education.

Our faculty this year has been selected after unusual care and investigation, and most of them are overworked and underpaid. A big college brings big responsibilities and big blessings. We appreciate the untiring efforts of the president and faculty of Ouachita. to build up a great institution, but we should not impose upon them the task of making bricks without straw.

We are glad to note the many evidences of college spirit. The Ouachita spirit has gripped the hearts of the Ouachita boys and girls and as a result the highest type of manhood and womanhood

will be trained and developed.

#### CENTRAL COLLEGE.

The attendance at Central College at present is possibly the greatest in the history of the institution at this time of the session, the end of the first quarter. We have an enrollment of 129, against 131 for the whole of last year, which would indicate an attendance of at least 150 for the entire year. The most notable thing in regard to the attendance is the fact that the attendance of the different departments of the conservatory has almost doubled that of previous years. The institution has also received the benefit of the general uplift of the high school work of the State, and the higher classes have a larger attendance than usual. The average age of the student body is higher than heretofore, and the earnestness with which they come indicates a more settled purpose for higher ideals.

We were able to retain the larger proportion of our best teachers in last year's faculty for this year, and to supply the places made vacant with more acceptable material.

Our building is in good condition, but we are in sore need of better equipment. A chemical and physical laboratory is an absolute necessity. Situated as we are in the same town with two other colleges which have strong departments in this line, our need is especially emphasized. The tendency always is to measure our competitors by taking their weakest points and comparing these with our strongest points. This places Central at a very great disadvantage, not only with the schools in our home town, but with other institutions that are attempting to do first-class work. A laboratory must be furnished. The work in this department is far beneath that in other departments of the school.

The conservatory needs equipment and the library must have new books. These matters have been neglected because of the fear of debt, in the attempt to bring the expenses of the school within

its income.

#### IN CONCLUSION.

During the past year the Lord directed a way for the appointment of Brother R. G. Bowers to lead our hosts in the great educational movement of lifting the debts from Ouachita and Central. This noble brother has been untiring in his efforts. He has worked day and night to accomplish this great task and has had the sympathy and prayers of the brethren in the campaign. We feel that no wiser or petter choice could have been made than in the selection of Brother Bowers. At times some have not realized the deep significance of our forward movement in the cause of education, and what it means to the Baptists, but our people are now beginning to see that every denomination that has neglected education has dwindled into insignificance. If the Baptists wish to live they

must support education. If they are worth living they will support education. The support of Ouachita and Central is a question of education. The support of Ouachita and Central is a question of institutional life or death to the Baptists of Arkansas. We feel grateful for what Dr. Bowers has accomplished. His report will show that we are on the eve of victory. This Convention, however, meets at a critical time for our schools. Encouragement given now will turn the tide of battle. We pray the Lord of hosts to so inlumine the hearts and guide the minds that the Baptists may feel prompted to see their duty and to do their duty at this critical time. Debts are pressing upon us and our feet are clogged. Ouachita and Central under such burdens cannot achieve the greatest results. Ouachita and Central are two beautiful wings lifting the denomination's higher life. But these wings are tied, and must be loosed. loosed. BEN COX,

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Educational institutions represent the ideals of civilization. Christian schools stand for a Christian civilization. Baptist institutions of learning stand for the Lordship of Jesus and the truest

ideals of Christian character and endeavor.

Our Lord is entitled to the best service which can be given by those who have been redeemed. In order that such service may be given, the spirit and doctrines of the Gospel should be inculcated in our young people at that period when they are most susceptible to such influences. Our Baptist schools are the only places where this can oe done. Whoever assists in establishing or maintaining a Baptist school is making an investment that, for all the years to come, will be helping mankind.

The Baptists of Arkansas have done a noble work in the establishment of the schools which we now have. The efficient work which our Baptist people are now doing is largely due to the

influence of these schools.

But these schools are greatly burdened by debt and hampered

by lack of equipment and endowment. It seems, to your committee, that now is the time when we must immediately pay these debts or be unworthy of the trust imposed upon us. We must now go

forward or go down.

Brother Bowers and his helpers have raised among the breth-ren and friends of the schools the larger part of these debts. Much of the money pledged is conditional upon raising the entire debt. We are devoutly thankful for the encouraging response of the peo-

ple to Brother Bowers' worthy appeals.

Your committee recommends that this Convention provide for a continuance of this campaign for the immediate payment of such of these debts as are due, and that provision oe made for the payment of the others as soon as due; and that the campaign continue until our schools are relieved of debt, properly equipped and endowed.

35. Ben Cox led the congregation in singing "Throw Out the Life Line," after which C. N. White, of Eureka Springs, led in prayer.

36. The following resolutions were read by Allen

Hill Autry, and adopted:

Whereas, The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has appointed to the foreign mission field a brother reported to be an avowed alien immersionist; and,

Whereas, Said appointment is subversive of time-honored Baptist principles, namely: Strict baptism and strict church member-

ship—the safeguards of our churches; and,

Whereas, We believe that the appointment of such alien immersionists will prove detrimental to our cause in the Southland by encouraging false doctrinal views and lax practice, and tremendously stagnating the stream of Christian giving in many of our Southern Baptist churches; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, as a convention, do hereby urgently request the Foreign Mission Board to withdraw all such alien immersionists from our mission fields, if such there be, and appoint no other alien immersionists thereto. Assuring them of our highest regards and Christian love, and of our care for the best interests

of all the churches and for the truth as it is in Jesus.

Resolved, That the practice of holding union meetings, as is done by some Baptists, is subversive of Baptist principles, and should be discouraged.

37. Christian Education being before the body again, addresses on the interests of Ouachita and Central Colleges were made by A. J. Fawcett, Tillman B. Johnson, J. S. Rogers, F. F. Gibson, and R. G. Bowers. At the conclusion of the last address a collection was taken to raise the amount necessary to lift all the remaining indebtedness upon the two colleges, contributions being asked for to be paid in cash, or notes bearing 6 per cent interest. The sum of \$21,000 was asked. Subscriptions began to come in rapidly. Men almost clamored for the privilege of giving. It soon became necessary for two secretaries to record the gifts. There was hilarious giving. When it was announced that \$22,150 had been subscribed, no subscription being for less than

- \$100, there was such a scene upon the floor and platform of the Convention as the Recording Angel alone can describe. The great congregation sang and praised God, strong men broke down and wept for joy, while here and there brethren clasped each other in their arms and thanked the Lord. For the first time since the two colleges were established, nearly a quarter of a century ago, their debts, which often had threatened to sweep them out of Baptist hands—their long-standing debts were provided for.
- 38. It was meet that the man who had led in raising \$83,000 for the two colleges during the past year should lead in the closing prayer, and the President called on R. G. Bowers, Financial Agent, to pronounce the benediction. The Convention thus adjourned at 11:45 p. m.

# Sunday—Afternoon Session.

- 39. After devotional exercises the Convention was addressed by J. T. Henderson, of Bristol, Tenn., secretary Southern Baptist Laymen's Movement.
- 40. H. L. Winburn offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that the Convention's Nominating Committee ought to name a committee of nine men who will agitate, organize and promote the work of the Laymen's Missionary Movement in Arkansas throughout this year, and report to the next meeting of the Convention.

41. Jno. Jeter Hurt read the report of the Committee on Home Missions, which, after insertion of an amendment on Church Building offered by R. F. Tredway, and discussion by J. J. Hurt, A. C. Jones and L. R. Scarborough, of Texas, was adopted.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

The love of one's own is not antagonistic to the highest conception of Christian duty. Our Lord shed tears of bitterest grief over the capital city of His race because her people repented not; and turned His attention to the Gentile world after He had done

his best in preaching God's redeeming love to His own people. Andrew lives forever in sacred history because when he was converted he ran first and found his brother Simon and brought him

It is in accord, then, with Scripture precedent and the highest sense of Christian statesmanship that we love with an undying affection, and sacrificial service, this land of our fathers and the land of our birth. It is our bounden duty, also, to do all in our might to make it the land of our Savior and the flaming evangel to the nations of pure and undefiled religion. If in days gone by God called America to set before the peoples of earth the glories of a government that provides for the highest possible development or the individual in social, political and intellectual freedom how much more, in these latter days, does He call to America to snow the feeble, tottering religions of the world the wonders of His grace as exemplified in a great republic whose people know

and serve the living God?

It becomes us, then, fellow-citizens of the South and fellowservants of the King, to strike hands one with another all over this Southern Baptist Zion and move forward in the holy effort to take America for Jesus. For this organized cause came the Home Mission Board into existence. Its missionaries spread their gospel tents on the broad, Western prairies—and push their horses up the remote mountain gorges. Its evangelists go with intrepid daring into the strongholds of sin and set up the cross of the crucified Savior. Its women workers and others meet the foreigners at our wharves and give them tracts that tell of Jesus. Its dollars by hundreds and thousands go into houses of worship where strug-

gling bands of Christians have already done their best.

Its faithful teachers labor day and night in our mountain schools to train boys and girls for intelligent service in our churches.

In all these benevolences of the Home Board, Arkansas has shared abundantly. The time has now come when we ought to make large returns for these benefits, that the Board may help others who need its help, and help us further to help ourselves. As there are within the territory of the Southern Baptist

Convention a vast number of homeless churches, and there is no adequate fund to be used in meeting this need, and believing that our work is greatly hindered by these conditions, this Convention therefore suggests to the Home Mission Board the advisability of putting a man in the field at once, whose work shall be to secure a Church Building Fund of not less than a half million dollars, to be used in assisting weak and worthy churches in providing suitable houses.

The Secretaries of this Convention shall furnish the Home

Board with a copy of this resolution.

42. The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was read by E. E. Dudley, of Jonesboro, as follows:

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The facts of our great world-wide work should be of deepest Interest to all. It will be my purpose in this report to present to you these facts.

There were sent out during last year 21 new missionaries. We have now on the field 231 missionaries and 375 native helpers,

making a total of 606 workers.

There were 259 churches and 559 out-stations, with a total membership of 16,596. There are 162 houses of worship; 325 Sunday Schools with a total of 10,430 scholars. These churches with the missionaries contributed last year \$40,287. There are 128 day schools with 3,269 scholars; nine boys' boarding schools with 428 scholars, and 13 girls' boarding schools with 586 scholars; two colleges with 100 students; four women's training schools with 37 students, and eight theological training schools with 176 students.

Of course, the preaching of the Gospel is the great power on the foreign field, but along with preaching, the training of the native Christians and Christian workers is indispensable; hence the necessity of having mission schools on all our foreign fields. All of our schools, even those in which elementary branches are taught, have in view the training of native workers. Moreover, to put the children of Christians into the native schools would be

suicidal.

Another feature of the work is our Medical Missions. We have 13 medical missionaries, three hospitals, 11 dispensaries with a total number of patients last year of 42,659. All of these patients, with their friends and relatives, heard the Gospel before they received treatment.

The printing press, also, is used for the spread of the truth. We have four excellent printing plants, which sent out during the year hundreds of thousands of religious tracts, periodicals, books and Bibles in the languages of the various countries. The colporter often accompanies the missionary, and sometimes goes into

distant places which the missionary does not reach.

One of the results of these labors was the baptism of 2,905 converts last year, but the largest results, due to the leavening power of the gospel among the people, cannot be tabulated. During the past year Southern Baptists have given to Foreign Missions \$58,000 more than during the previous year. The total receipts were \$460,979. The Convention asks for \$537,500 this year. Although the gifts seem large, the sad fact remains that more than ten thousand of our churches gave nothing to this cause last year. Sadder still to us is the fact that of the 1,482 Baptist churches in Arkansas, only 250 made contributions, while 1,232 gave nothing to Foreign Missions last year. May God give to all of our Arkansas Baptist churches the spirit of obedience to the command of our Lord, especially in view of the fact that the Baptists in the Southwest so earnestly and so persistently claim to be loyal to Him and His Word.

Your committee would most urgently commend to the pastors and leading members of the churches which have been contributing to this Board the importance of devising some means of reaching the non-contributing churches and enlisting their support in

behalf of the world's evangelization.

# COMMITTEE ON COLORED WORK.

We rejoice in all that has ever been done, in all that is being done, and in all that shall ever be done, for the uplift and development of our brother in black, especially, intellectually and morally. We should hail with delight and encourage with heart and hand every agency which has for its object the salvation of the negroes and their training for service, both in the homeland and on foreign fields. We should bend every nerve and spare no means to make the negro a better citizen, and a more efficient Christian worker. To this end we would recommend to all our people the great work being done by the Home Mission Board among the negro population. We would also urge the importance of the foreign mission work among the negroes on Africa's sunny soil. We would urge our people to enlarge their gifts to both these agencies. And we would commend the work now being done by the Arkansas Baptist College, with J. A. Booker, the efficient president.

45. J. G. Lile, of Magnolia, read the report of Special Committee on Orphans' Home, as follows:

### REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ORPHANS' HOME.

Be it resolved.

1. That it is the sense of this Convention that our Orphans' Home should be removed from Monticello and located in some more

central and accessible place.

2. That a commission consisting of H. C. Fox, John Ayers, G. W. Puryear, R. N. Garrett, H. T. Bradford, J. H. Kitchens, and J. H. Estes be, and the same is, hereby appointed, and said commission is hereby directed to solicit bids for the location of said Orphans' Home, and to select a new location for said Home, taking into consideration in so doing healthfulness, accessibility, nearness to the center of the State, and educational advantages, as well as the amount in cash, lands, or other property that may be offered for the locating of same at the places offering bids.

3. That the trustees of the Arkansas Baptists' Orphans'

Home be, and tney are hereby, directed, after the selection of a location for said Orphans' Home by the above named commission, to make such amendment to the charter of said institution as may be necessary, and to make the best disposition possible of the property of said institution at Monticello, and as speedily as possible to erect buildings and remove such institution to the place selected

by said commission.

4. That said trustees be, and they are hereby, directed to make an equitable and just settlement of property interests with Mrs. Gardner and others at Monticello, to the end that this Convention may not be in the attitude of repudiating any trust or confidence, and that its honor may be maintained.

The report was adopted after discussion by J. G. Lile.

- 46. Ben Cox moved to amend the Constitution in Article VI, by substitution of the word Thursday for Friday, which motion was adopted.
- 47. On motion of E. J. A. McKinney, the Convention set the time for preaching the next annual sermon at 11 o'clock a. m. of the first day of meeting.
- 48. A. J. Fawcett, of Hamburg, presented the following resolutions, which, after discussion by A. J. Fawcett, were adopted:

### MINISTERIAL RELIEF RESOLUTIONS.

Whereas, There being many aged and infirm Baptist preachers in Arkansas, who are without the means of adequate support; and Whereas, Our Convention up to date has made but little provision for their relief; therefore,

Resolved, First, that we, believe that the time has come when

this long neglected work should have our immediate attention.

Second. That a committee of seven wise and discreet brethrem be appointed at this session of the Convention to formulate a plan to provide a fund for the relief of these old brethren, and requiring said committee to report at the next session of this body.

Third. That we recommend to the associations that they gather up the names together with the postoffice addresses of all old and indigent brethren and report same to the above committee, so that we may have a basis upon which we may predicate the needs of this department of our work.

- 49. On motion, reading of the journal was dispensed with and the matter was left to the President and Secretaries, as a special committee.
- 50. The report of the Special Committee to which was referred for consideration and recommendation the matter of purchasing property in Little Rock for the establishment of a Baptist sanitarium, was read by J. J. Hurt. After adoption of an amendment offered by R. G. Bowers, and having been recommitted for recommendation of names for members of the commission provided for, the report following was adopted:

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LITTLE ROCK SANITARIUM.

We, your committee appointed to look into the advisability of purchasing the property now owned by the College of Physicians and Surgeons in Little Rock, to be used as a Baptist sanitarium, beg leave to report:

1. The property can be bought for the sum of \$50,000, including grounds, buildings, furnishings, operating tables, etc., such equipment as is found in a sanitarium doing actual business.

2. We have examined a statement showing that the property has been used as a sanitarium for the past two years, and that over and above all expenses there has been a net profit from each month's business.

3. It is necessary, if we would secure control of the property, that the present option be closed on or before the 30th day of this month.

4. Payments of the purchase price may be made as follows:
(1) First \$12,000 any time before November 1, 1910.
(2) Next \$9,000 any time before November 1, 1911.

(2) Next \$9,000 any time before November 1, 1911.
(3) Next \$9,000 any time before November 1, 1912.

(4) \$2,000 per year until \$8,000 is paid, the remainder at optional times.

(5) The situ of Little Book has already subscribed \$10

5) The city of Little Rock has already subscribed \$10,-000 of the amount.

We recommend, therefore, that this Convention appoint a commission consisting of wise men, thoroughly representative of this body, to investigate the feasibility, desirability and expediency of accepting the proposition of the Physicians' and Surgeons' College in Little Rock, giving said commission power to act: and that

commission consist of Ben Cox, H. T. Bradford, J. G. Lile, W. Ramsey, C. E. Witt, Jno. Ayers, P. C. Barton, W. W. Byrd, no. Q. Wolf.

At the last annual meeting you granted us an organizer, for which we have prayed for many years. God has set his seal of approval on this plan to stir up the unemployed talent in our churches.

For some time after the Convention we failed to secure an organizer. Finally Miss Katherine Bowman came in April, and made fine progress in her work until the exceedingly warm weather proved her physical inability for such trying service, and she returned to her home in Tennessee. Our hearts then turned to Miss Florence Davis, who came to us in September. Since then she has been continually in service, visiting churches and associations.

The results of the efforts of these two consecrated women cannot be judged by figures alone, but thirty-six societies have been organized for Woman's Missionary Union, besides several Sunbeam Bands and Young Woman's Auxiliaries. We ask for her your hearty co-operation and sympathy, as well as invitations to visit in your church, if you wish any assistance in this line of work.

We also ask your help in interesting the boys of your churches in our new organization, especially for them, called "The Royal Ambassadors." They are the men of affairs of tomorrow. Let us train them in this their formative period that they may be fitted to carry on the plans of an awakened Baptist host. The purpose of the Woman's Missionary Union is to contribute to every interest fostered by the Arkansas State Convention. As an encouragement to this end we try to secure four reports each year from each society—one to the local church at its annual meeting, one to the Association at its annual meeting, one to Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the State Convention. We have great difficulty in securing these reports regularly. We would greatly appreciate your help in this matter, too. Reports do not increase

- The report of Committee on Sunday Schools was read by T. T. Thompson and adopted, as follows:

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday School problem is one of the most complex and far reaching, dealing as it does with persons of all ages, with multi-form dispositions and conditions. From the little tot in the beginners' class to his great-grandfather in the adult class; with his free conceptions of the Bible, and his persistence in thrusting upon the class what he believes, elaborated with an extended experience. But the opportunity to teach and impress the Word must not be lost under any circumstances. The Baraca and Philathea and other grades of organized classes are helping materially in the The Baraca and Philathea and solution of the problems of reaching young men and young women. They are attracted by the association with those of their own age and feeling, and inspired by the friendly rivalry to excel, both in numbers gathered and in the work accomplished.

Your committee cannot furnish definite information as to the number of schools in the State, but rejoice that the number has been greatly increased in the past year by the effort of our faithful mission workers, ninety-three having been organized.

We recommend:

That each church strive to have the best school possible with their environment considered.

That the best quarters be provided for the work of the school.

3. That the best literature be provided for their use, and we esteem our Southern Baptist Convention series the very best.

4. We recommend the Sunday School Board be requested to,

as soon as practicable, put a man or men on the field as Sunday School Specialist for the State, with special view of touching the country situation, and that the general field men of the Nashville-Board be invited into our borders for the purpose of conducting. Teachers' Institutes, and to give skilled instruction in the general. conduct of the schools.

We urge pastors to organize where practicable teachers'

training classes for the finding and training of teachers.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OBITUARIES.

The Lord has been very gracious in preserving the health and life of our ministry during the past year. Yet, some of our most useful and heroic soldiers have fallen on the field. We mention first

REV. Ross More, of the First Baptist Church of Pine Bluff, whose departure was felt to be a distinct loss to the whole State. This noble brother was born at Obion County, Tennessee, October 8, 1874, and died at Pine Bluff, Ark., December 10, 1908, aged 34 years, having been pastor of the First Baptist Church at that place about six years. As a preacher and a pastor he was unexcelled. His Baraca Class was not only the first in the State among Baptists, but the largest, and still remains the most enthusiastic and efficient in the State. During his pastorate a perennial revival began, which continues to flow with increasing force while the weeks and months go by, notwithstanding the church was nearly a year without a pastor after his death. In a very real sense, "He rests from his labors, and his works do follow him."

REV. W. H. STRING? ELLOW, of Searcy, Ark., died June 7, 1909, and, like Barnabas, people were added to the Lord.

REV. R. G. LAFERTY, of Heber, in Little River Association, died

during the past year. He had been a country pastor for about twenty years, and was highly esteemed for his work's sake and! his Godly life.

REV. J. R. HOLCOMB, of Gainesville Association, has gone from

his labors to his reward during the past year.

We feel that it is in perfect keeping with the work of this Convention to note the death of ministers' wives.

JULIA A. BOWLING, wife of Elder W. H. Bowling, was born February 22, 1852, and departed this life March 16, 1909. Shedied, as she lived, firm in the faith.

MRS. B. R. WOMACK, wife of Rev. B. R. Womack, D. D., pastor at Russellville, Ark., died \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 1909. She was a woman of culture and consecration. Her one desire in life was leading souls to Christ. Such do not die when they cease to breathe.

Resolved, That the Secretaries have 3,000 copies of the Minutes of this Convention printed and distributed, and that the Senior Secretary have \$50 and the Junior Secretary \$25, respectively, for their services.

58. The report of the Committee on Publications. was offered by G. L. Boles, and after discussion by A. P. Schofield, O. J. Wade, E. J. A. McKinney, Ben Cox, J. J. Hurt, P. C. Barton, and the adoption of an amendment recommending the second Sunday in Decemberas Baptist Advance Day, was adopted.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATIONS.

The importance of this subject can hardly be overestimated, and yet we think the rank and file of the people are not alive toit. We wish they could realize how much evil is being done, especially to the youth of our land, by the books and papers that comeinto their hands. The country is being flooded with them. There are some books and papers that pretend to be religious, and are read by some good people on that account, that are disorganizing and subversive of the truth, and are almost wholly evil in their tendencies. On the other hand, there are numberless good books and papers. It would be impossible for one person to read them But from the number a helpful selection can be made.

We recommend that pastors, teachers and parents give a careful consideration to this matter. It will not do to ignore thematter in the hope that the young people will not find out and read these things. They are thrust before them all the time.

We would recommend that all our people feel the obligation: resting upon them to give their support to denominational papers.

Especially do we call attention to the Baptist Advance. It is the common carrier of information in regard to our work and is, therefore, indispensable to the live worker. It is a great helper in all the denominational and church work. We are glad the Convention has set apart the second Sunday in December and the week following to be devoted to the increase of subscribers to this paper. We earnestly recommend that this matter be taken up by the pastors. We also recommend the Foreign Mission Journal, which keeps us thoroughly informed about the work abroad; and The Home Field, the organ of the Home Board. We also recommend that our churches use the Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. literature of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The State Mission Board has raised more than \$29,000, is out of debt and \$83,000 has been raised for Ouachita and Central colleges. We recognize that the Baptist Advance has been a strong factor in procuring these results. We recommend, therefore, that the second Sunday in December, 1909, be made Baptist Advance Day; that the pastoral, educational and missionary forces be requested to combine in making it a great day; that each church be requested to provide a committee to press the work of procuring subscribers to the Advance during the week following the second Sunday in December; and that a committee of five be appointed by this Convention to prosecute this campaign.

;

The chair appointed on the committee recommended above ten members, as follows: E. E. Dudley, S. E. Tull, H. L. Winburn, Ben Cox, F. F. Gibson, T. B. Johnson, R. F. Tredway, E. P. J. Garrott, J. J. Hurt, and G. L. Boles.

59. The report of the Committee on Temperance was presented by W. T. Amis, and after discussion by W. T. Amis, J. B. Alexander and E. J. A. McKinney, it was adopted:

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

It had been hoped by the temperance people of Arkansas that before now it could be said that the saloon is no longer a legalized institution in our beloved State, only regretting that such is not the case; but we are glad to say that the things that have made against the success of state-wide prohibition are rapidly disappearing and that now the horizon is clearer and more auspicious, and we believe it can safely be predicted that ere long the saloon will be cowed and conquered before the onward sweep of popular sentiment and indignation.

The State has witnessed in the last year an unseemly discord among the forces of temperance, brought about more or less by political influences, but now it would appear that everywhere there is a remarkable unanimity for state-wide prohibition through statutory enactment, and buttressed by constitutional amendment.

and to this desired end all temperance people are working, and in this we all may rejoice and take courage.

We most cheerfully commend every temperance force that leads to the speedy elimination of that woeful traffic in souls, blood and tears, and bid God's blessings to fall on every heart that is enlisted in the already mighty and conquering host of saints who are rondly looking for the day soon to come when Arkansas' name and escutcheon shall be clear of the sting and shame of the liquor business.

In order to all the more hasten the day of approaching doom to the open saloon in Arkansas, and in order that this Convention may have a more vital contact with every force that looks to the destruction of the liquor traffic in this State, and ever be ready to respond to the call of need and exigency, we recommend that, in accord with resolutions passed last year calling for a Temperance Mission, this Convention do now appoint such a mission, consisting of five brethren, appointed by the chair, whose duties it shall be to further in every way possible the temperance and prohibition cause in Arkansas.

We call upon the good people of Arkansas to look well to the selection of senators and representatives from their respective districts and counties. Here lies our strength and our weakness. Never fear that little attention is given this matter by the opponents of temperance and prohibition.

With a solid front and thorough and energetic effort on the part of the prohibition people there is scant hope for the saloonist in Arkansas. We appeal to the good and God-fearing people to rise in their might and crush the giant curse of the age in this State.

And now, since the Anti-Saloon League proposes to adopt a new constitution which takes the form of a convention composed of delegate from the various denominational organizations in the State, and since the new constitution contemplates a reorganization on lines to be outlined in convention assembled, we would recommend the election of delegates to said annual convention, which meets on the fourth Tuesday in January, and that the following constitute said list of delegates: W. E. Atkinson, A. H. Autry, E. J. A. McKinney, W. T. Amis, Ben Cox, J. H. Estes, J. J. Hurt, P. C. Barton, S. E. Tull, J. B. Alexander, W. M. Kelley, H. L. Winburn.

The chair appointed on the committee called for in above report Ben Cox, A. P. Scofield, W. M. Kelly, J. H. Estes and O. J. Wade.

60. The report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance was read by Ben Cox, and after discussion by Ben Cox, H. F. Vermillion, W. L. A. Stranburg, W. A. Ramsey, and the adoption of an amendment offered by E. J. A. McKinney, which amendment was discussed by

E. J. A. McKinney and B. F. Condray, the report was adopted, as follows:

### COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your committee views with sorrow the wave of loose views and practices regarding the observance of the Lord's day, which seems to have recently passed over our land. This holy day has come to be observed by many Americans as a mere holiday to be spent in amusement, whereas it should be observed as a day of reverent rest and solemn worship.

Sunday baseball, Sunday excursions to pleasure resorts, Sunday picnics for idle pleasure, Sunday business for profit, and Sunday labor, except works of absolute necessity and mercy, are vio-

lations of the spirit and object of the Lord's day.

We recommend that preachers, teachers and parents everywhere do all that they can to secure the observance of this day

in the proper spirit and form.

We deplore the conduct of President W. H. Taft in ignoring the obligations of our Christian Sabbath by traveling and holding public meetings on Sunday on his recent trip through the West and South, and request our Secretaries to forward to him a copy of this report, embodying this declaration.

The Unions are growing in numbers and usefulness. The summer assembly at Arkadelphia is growing in attendance and interest, and arrangements are now making which, it is hoped, will render this feature of the work permanent and of far-reaching power and influence. Every church in the State should have its young people represented at the assembly.

During the past year Brother E. E. Lee, the field secretary of the Sunday School Board, cave us a portion of his time, visit-

ing a number of our Unions and accomplishing much good. Your committee would repeat and emphasize the recommendation made at Fayetteville a year ago, that the time has come when a man is needed constantly in the field, working with and for our young people. organizing Unions where there are none, helping the weak and encouraging and instructing the strong.

More of our young people are taking the study courses and more are studying missions than ever before. They are enthusiastic and determined. The prospect is pleasing.

Our pastors and churches should encourage the young people

in this great work by taking a lively interest in it and helping them in every way possible. The church workers of the next decade will come from the ranks of the Baptist Young People's Unions of today. Hence, it behooves us to do all in our power to fit them for a service that we have not done.

Resolved, That we approve of the effort to add to the endowment of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary \$600,000, and that we approve the apportionment of \$25,000 as Arkansas' quota of this amount; also, that we will welcome the seminary's representatives as soon as our present educational campaign will permit.

65. F. F. Gibson, of Fort Smith, offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That we extend to the people of Arkadelphia our thanks and appreciation for their kind hospitality; also to Pastor

Winburn for his untiring efforts in looking after the comforts of the Convention; also to the railroads of Arkansas for reduced rates; also to Ouachita College for a delightful musicale Thursday evening.

66. There being no further business, President W. E. Atkinson declared the Convention adjourned. The next session of the body will be held in the city of Fort Smith, beginning at 10 o'clock a. m., Thursday before the third Sunday in November, 1910. The closing prayer was led by John R. 
