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





School Accepts Challenge Of American Freedom



Serving in his eleventh term as president of Ouachita, Dr. Ralph A. Phelps Jr. has seen the college expand in many directions this year.

















To print the news in a journalistic style and a professional manner is the aim of the editors and the staff of the Signal.


The Signal this year has been characterized by hard work and superior newspapers for which the editors and staff received justly-deserved plaudits.



Spirits Soar As Band Strikes Up


On hand at all home football games and some on other fields to cheer the Tigers and enthuse the fans was the college band, directed by Marvin Lawson.



All-Americans; Conference Stars Lead '6

Every year a few of the top individuals in every sport make the all Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference team. Very seldom, on the other hand, do these same individuals merit national recognition.

This year Ouachita was fortunate not only to have seven players in various sports make All-AIC, but two of these individuals were also named to the Small College All-American Basketball Team,

The Tigers had a very successful basketball season this year, winning the AIC championship and going to the National Tourney in Kansas City. Leading the team were all AIC selections Leon Clements, David Kossover, and Bill Heaton.

Clements not only made the All-AIC first team, but was selected as the most valuable player in the conference. The 6 foot 6 inch junior center from Kingsland, showed why he was selected for this honor by pumping in 26 points against Emporia, Kansas in the National Tournament. For his fine play there, he was named as a honorable mention All-American selection.

Heaton, senior forward, was the "sparkplug" and "clutch man" on the Tiger team. Without him, the Tigers would have lacked that "something extra" that marks a champion-ship basketball team.

Kossover, a fine little outside man and deadly clutchshooter, was not only named All-AIC, but selected as honorable mention All American as well.

In football, Ouachita placed as many players on the All-AIC team as any Tiger Team in the last fifteen years.

Tackle John Kitchens, 200 pound senior from Pine Bluff, and end Jimmy Jackson, 175 pound senior from El Dorado, were the pair to make the All-AIC list this year.

Kitchens was one of the anchors in the Tigers' defensive wall. Although hindered by a knee injury most of the season, the big tackle still accounted for 33 unassisted tackles.

Jackson gained more yards than any pass receiver for the second straight year. He gained a total of 354 yards on 17 pass receptions.

Honorable mention All-AIC was accorded George Jones, Gary Malesky, and Jack Mills.

In baseball, centerfielder Charlie Williams, and former NAIA batting champ Larry Greene, a third baseman were awarded places on the All-AIC squad.

They were sluggish and did not look like the defending AIC champs. They looked like help would be needed for Clements, Kossover and Heaton, who were carrying the load.

This opinion was verified in the league opener as upstart Harding easily won 90-76. After routine victories over Ozarks, Southern State and Henderson, the Tigers suddenly caught fire. They ripped State Teachers, 104-93, and stopped Tech at Russellville, 95-86. They were now working as a team. At times all five starters scored in double figures and their bench strength began to make itself evident.



Last season the Tigers made a fine showing in baseball in the AIC. Because it was not recorded in last year's annual, we shall do so here.

The Tigers were a so-so team during the regular season, but caught fire in the post-season tournament. After losing, 4-2, to ASTC in the first round, the Tigers won four straight before bowing again to the Bears in the finals. Included in this string was a rousing 15-14 victory over Tech. 
