Alexandria, Louisiana, Sept. 19
Three accurate passes by Herman McAllister, Tiger quarterback, set up an early scoring drive that was climaxed by Paul Kirkpatrick's six yard jaunt around left end. Otis Turner added and that was the final scoring of the rough rock-'em, sock-'em game at Bolton Field last night.

Throughout the entire final three periods Ouachita had the breaks aiding them on defense and a catapulting Bengal offerse made this a happy advantage by directing their monopoly of ball possession to pay off with crushing drives deep into Wildcat territory.

Offside penalties coupled with fumbles and fines for roughing kept the Pelican State boys far from the O.B.C. goal the entire sixty minutes. Tiger brilliance was spotty but promising.

Baptist air supremacy dominated the offensive departments of both teams. The Ouachitonians' racked up 74 yarrls with six completions out of twelve attempts while all of the Wildcat's trys went astray.

It was a little close for the highly touted Arkansas hoys
and their untried " $T$ " but supreme moments of aerial wizardy gave that necessary margin to what has been slated as the top cleven of A.I.C. competition this season.

Surprise of the game was the fine play of the Tiger's unheralded line. The forward wall gave up less than two yards per Louisiana College's rushing play while vicious linebacking on the part of Nolen Harris and Carl Ramsey offered the Pineville Wildcats little or no opportunity to gain even inches.

Although statistics gave the Cats the edge, with 12 first downs to Ouachita's ten there could be little doubt as to who gained prestige over the bitterly contested Bolton sod, for the Baptists from Arkansas proved that when they gave ground it was only in small lots and at infrequent intervals.

Though the gallant Louisiana College Wildcats were given benefit of audience sympathy as to bad breaks there can be no doubt as to their happy attitude when they realized that they will not meet any team as devastating as the terrific Tigers from Ouachita Baptist College comes the rest of their season's schedule. It was in this period that the Tigennen produce their ponderous possibilities of a forward aggregation led by such stalwarts as Jim Herrington and Roy White. Deft in their responsibilities and accurate in their defensive guessing these men led the evening's top defensive performances by constant-
ly finding a first grip in the Ouachitonian's protective tackles.
A third period found the yardage on an "even-stephen" hasis and only the near breakaways by Walter Wimberly of O.B.C. and Sammy Furo, Magnolia's flash offered the potential thriller that some six thousand expectant spectators awaited.

Then came the last quarter and the playing balanced until the last five minutes. At this time Scott intercepter quarter-back McAlister's pass on the 50 -yard line and returned to the Tiger eleven where Kirkpatrick cleanly cut him down. Wells, substitute back, carried to the nine. On the following play Ross, Magnolia quarter-back, lateraled to Furo who scampered around right end to add another six. Scott's conversion was again good and the score was 14-0, Magnolia up.

Paul Kirkpatrick drew first blood with a finely executed 25 -yard end run. This came in the first three minutes of play and it looked like the Tigers were off.

It wasn't a case of the Baptist's folding, instead just one of those nights, when passes were handed in glue to their receivers and in spots where the defense couldn't stop them.

Rex Pierce, Teacher back, returned the ensuing kickoff after the Tiger tally for 40 yards to the Bear 45 . The Bears completed four straight passes to tie the count and break the Tigers' effective resistance. From there they went on to five more touchdowns.

It was the Teacher's passing attack that spelled the difference. They completed 14 of 28 tosses for 274 yards and racked up 21 first downs to only five for Ouachita.

The Teachers' scoring chronologically: John Kornegay passed 10 yards to Gene Keeton; Steve Anthony drove over from the four yard line after completing passes of 46 , seven and 13 yards to set up the tally. Anthony passed 20 yards to Lee Roy Plummer. Plummer returned a partially blocked

Ouachita punt 45 yards. Kornegay plunged over from the one-foot line and Louis Bell stepped over from the four.

Throughout the entire night the line defensive standouts were from Tigerville. Roy White, Jim Herrington, and Nolen Harris proved their hest when the Teachermen tried through the O.B.C. front wall. Injuries were frequent and the toll was terrific for the State boys. There could be little doubt as to the vicious ability of the Tigers if they could have been more of a unit last night. It might be that by the time the Teachers play again they are going to regret mixing it so handily with the boys from Arkadelphia.

Whatever was missing last night in the Tiger pass defensive won't be there next week if their continued trying even after sure defeat was a symbol of future efforts. With several games out of conference in their immediate limeup the Parsons can be counted on to make some sort of comeback.

 Arkadelphia, Oct. 10Sparked by husky Walter Wimberly the Ouachita Tigers couldn't be stopped by anything but the referee's whistle last night when they hustled to a $30-0$ win over the East Texas Savages. Their defensive tactics were so effective that the Tigers held the Savages to a mere 8 yard net gain rushing and 23 through the air.

Tigerville kicked off and on the sixth play of the game alert Bob Galloway secured a Savage fumble and put the Arkansas Baptist aggregation in possession of the oval. From this point on it was all Ouachita. Wimberly and Hudson alternated to carry the hall from the East Texas 28 to the six but were stopped for four downs. Savage fullback Bill Brockman booted to the Texas 38 and the march was on again for the Cats. Wimberly hit for 22 off left tackle. Here the East Texas men committed an error against the rules and the resulting penalty left the ball on their one yard line. Jack Bell carried over for six. Ike Sharp failed to convert,

The O.B.C. second tally came not long after Bell intercepted a Brockman pass on his own 25 and hipped his way back to the 34 . Paul Kirkpatrick got hot for a fast 39 break-a-way that set the ball weil within the Savage Territory and Spear Titsworth soon added 3 more with a vicious line try. Wimberly stabbed for one then twice more for 12 , leaving the oval resting on the six. His next venture carried him into pay dirt for six more points. Ike Sharp failed to convert.

It was the second stanza and East Texas was trying aerial ways for their offensive efforts. Boh Hurtte's passes were short and accurate but alert Buddy Hudson came through with an interception and a fast 15 yard return before downed on the Tiger 48. First tallying came with a brilliant receiving of Bailey's pass by end Dick Helnis who evaded numerous tacklers to end a thirty yard jaunt into the end zone standing up. "Magic:Toe Turner converted and the score was 7.0 in the middle of the second quarter, remaining that way for the rest of that half.

If ever a team was near perfection, it was the Bengals as they jumped on the Russellville lads from the opening whistle and didn't let up even after they had secured an insurance tally in the final period.

A hard-driving fleet of Tiger backs ground out 287 yards overland, and added 47 more on four passes. Veldon McKnight, Paul Kirkpatrick, Sam Bailev. ## Arkadelphia, November 26

Ouachita College's bowl-bound Tigers took their eighth straight victory when they downed the hard fighting but inferior Henderson Reddies 20 to 7, before a large Turkey Day crowd here yesterday afternoon. Upwards of 8,000 bipartisan fans thronged into A. U. Williams Stadium for the game.

Coach Wes Bradshaw's Bengals, who will play two postseason games in December, struck fast in the opening quarter to make a 49 -yard drive pay off, and later added two more touchdowns in the second quarter.

Wayne Smith, OBC halfback from Magnolia lugged the mail across for the first score on a slice off tackle from the eight-yard line. Ouachita had received the opening kickoff on the 22, but Benton's Walter Wimberly wasn't stopped until he crossed the mid-stripe, planting the oval on the HSTC 49. Smith, Wimberly, and Veldon McKnight shared in the ball carrying until Smith made the six-point plunge. Otis ("Magic Toe") Turner split the uprights to make it 7-0.

McKnight faked a hand-off, hesitated for a moment, and then scampered 36 yards around his right end to earn the next Tiger tally early in the second period. Several exchanges by punts, fumbles and intercepted passes had followed the first score before Bradshaw's men got in position for the McKnight touchdown. A punt by Henderson's J. W. Dicken-

In their first bowl outing the Ouachita Tigers of Arkadelphia, Arkansas, last night, defeated the Savages of Southeastern State from Durant, Okla, 7.0 in as thrilling a gane as this part of the country has seen in a decade.

Thousands of frozen fans in the inaugural running of the Texoma Bowl saw the Ouachita College Parsons capitalize on one big break to snatch victory from the sentimental favorite of local fans. Talley pilfered the pigskin from Quarterback J. D. Thorne. Redmon had not pulled the balf in and Talley promptly relieved Redmon of the ball and charged ahead from the 12 to the iwo-yard line before he, was hauled down. It took big Walter Wimberly two cracks at the Sav. age forward wall to score, and in came Turner to split the uprights.

The game was highlighted by the play of Ouachita's two little round men at tackle, all-conference "Tke" Sharp who hits the scales at an even 250 pounds and Roy White, another Conference champ who weighed in at 246 pounds. These two tackles constantly racked back the Savage offensive action, and aided by the 236 pound, six-foot, three-inch Talley, the 235 pounder George Mays halted the Savages in their most opportune moments of scoring possibilities.

Arthur Stewart, pre-game favorite for being the best back on the field had to give up going forward when these four big heavies with plenty of football savvy pushed him and his team-mates back 20 yards in four plays at one time.

Poor quarterbacking cost the Durant boys a scoring opportunity in the third period. With fourth down coming up and inches to go. Quarterback Thorne called for a pass which was intercepted by an alert Paul Kirkpatrick of the Bengals and hussled back out of his own territory. This was but one example of the Tigermen's alert pass hawking for the statistics proved the Bengals were credited with three interceptions of the Savage's ten trys.

Freshman Wayne Smith late in the third quarter shook loose for what appeared to be another Bengal touchdown but J. C. Dunn finally nailed him on the Savage 45 . It was then that the highly touted Spear Titsworth of the Tigerville aggregation waked up with three of the mosl spectacular exhibitions of running trickery exhibited for the evening. Ouachita College certainly rroved a crowd pleaser as the fans showed when they quickly swung toward the Bengals in their cheers and applause. Little wonder as to how they could show such a powerful brand of straighton football when we study their record of roster all-stars. Just before OBC left home camp for Denison the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference announced its all-conference selections for the season and Ouachita had placed 15 in some capacity on that highly rated list of standouts. Mythical All-Conference selections from the Ouachita Tiger eleven totalled four, with three linemen and one back gaining Arkansas gridiron honors.
