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

Letter from the Editor



From the very opening gun the Baptist-men took command of the field of play in every department and amassed hard-running and sharp forward passing gains that could not be stopped by a scrappy but incapable lot of Oklahomans.

First tallying came with a brilliant receiving of Bailey's pass by end Dick Helms who evaded numerous tacklers to end a thirty yard jaunt into the end zone standing up. "Magic Toe" Turner converted and the score was 7-0 in the middle of the second quarter, remaining that way for the rest of that half.

This came after Wayne Smith, Dub Kelly and Buddy Hudson had decoyed the Tornado secondary into fatal close in position by constant pounding into and through their outlying positions. Once the stage was set, Quarterback Bailey proceeded to call the play that resulted in a 40 yard toss by himself and the 30 yard scamper by the receiver Dick

The entire first half was a perfect example of what two rough and ready clubs can furnish in the way of action. At no time was any avid fan sitting down. There was "Ike" Sharp taking a lateral from Kelly and bulling his big tackle frame deep into the oppositions territory. There was Walter

Wimberly and Spear Titsworth tearing great gaps in the Okie's forward line. Then the East Central boys became men and for awhile it would seem that the tide had turned but somehow the Ada men found too much Merrington. O'Farrell, Nix, Lynd and a host of others stopping them and not enough of the same to cope with O.C.B.'s Hudson, Kirk-


patrick, Holland, and McKnight.

Ouachita's sharpened Tigers carved a memorable place for themselves in the honor placques of the AIC by fashioning a polished 21 to 13 victory over Arkansas Tech's Wonder Boys before nearly 6000 riotous spectators in Tiger Stadium last night.

If ever a team was near perfection, it was the Bengals as they jumped on the Russellville lads from the opening whistle and didn't let up even after they had secured an insurance tally in the final period.

A hard-driving fleet of Tiger backs ground out 287 yards overland, and added 47 more on four passes. Veldon McKnight, Paul Kirkpatrick, Sam Bailey. Wayne Smith, DubKelly, and Spear Titsworth constantly tormented the Techsters with their ripping efforts into the line and flashing sprints around the ends.

Up front for the Bengals was a devastating difference in the games outcome since Baird, White, Herrington, Ramsey, Harris, Tabor, Sharp, Turner, and a host of substitutions allowed only 129 yards through or around them and 79 of these were chalked up in scatback Jack Simpson's canter in the third quarter.

Ouachita scored with less than two minutes remaining in the first quarter. It came as a result of a Bailey to Kirkpatrick toss with the Benton boy easing away from Simpson and going into tally territory. Turner added the point. Tech came back in the second stanza with a series of sustained gains that were climaxed when Albright connected to Morris who was brought down on the Tiger one. Simpson tried three times hefore going over. Harwood missed the conversion. Half-time score, O.B.C. 7—Tech 6.

There was little progress in the third stanza until Jack Bell's fine punt return to the Tech 21. Smith and Kirkpatrick alternated to set the ball on the six and from there Bailey sneaked across on two tries. Turner's placement was perfect. This made the score, O.B.C. 14—Tech 6.

Minutes later Simpson of Tech blazed his 79 yard gain around left end and although OBC's Jack Mitchell almost made a necessary tackle in a record 15 yard sprint with the Tech speedster it hecame another six points for the Wonder-Men and with Harwood splitting the uprights the score became, O.B.C. 14—Tech 13.

The Aggies started off strong but were soon suffering from the Baptist men's alert ball hawking. Fumbles were frequent for the Aggies and the Tigers knew how to recover. In the first stanza the A&M eleven drove to the Ouachita five but a fumble by Jimmy Smith was recovered by the Purple and Gold who took over from that dangerous position and maneuver into the farthers' home fifty. That was about all for a heated first quarter.

On the first play in the second period, Veldon Mc-Knight intercepted David Anderson's forward to stop that Aggie threat. They played on even terms for the remainder of the quarter.

Taking the second half kickoff, the Tigers went down field for the game's first touchdown. Spear Titsworth, Ralph Holland and Sam Bailey alternated in moving the ball to the 10 on three first downs. Bailey circled end for the score. Otis Turner was rushed out of the conversion attempt.

O.B.C. 20 Vs. HENDERSON STATE TEACHERS 7

Arkadelphia, November 26

Ouachita College's bowl-bound Tigers took their eighth straight victory when they downed the hard fighting but inferior Henderson Reddies 20 to 7, before a large Turkey Day crowd here yesterday afternoon. Upwards of 8,000 bipartisan fans thronged into A. U. Williams Stadium for the game.

Coach Wes Bradshaw's Bengals, who will play two postseason games in December, struck fast in the opening quarter to make a 49-yard drive pay off, and later added two more touchdowns in the second quarter.

Wayne Smith, OBC halfback from Magnolia lugged the mail across for the first score on a slice off tackle from the eight-yard line. Ouachita had received the opening kickoff on the 22, but Benton's Walter Wimberly wasn't stopped until he crossed the mid-stripe, planting the oval on the HSTC 49. Smith, Wimberly, and Veldon McKnight shared in the ball carrying until Smith made the six-point plunge. Otis ("Magic Toe") Turner split the uprights to make it 7-0.

McKnight faked a hand-off, hesitated for a moment, and then scampered 36 yards around his right end to earn the next Tiger tally early in the second period. Several exchanges by punts, fumbles and intercepted passes had followed the first score before Bradshaw's men got in position for the Mc-Knight touchdown. A punt by Henderson's J. W. Dickenson had dropped dead on the Tiger 49, and two mid-line plunges by Herman McAlister and Buddy Hudson for five and ten yards respectively, had planted the oval on the HSTC 36, from where the senior from El Dorado scored. Turner converted to make the score 14-0.

Ouachita's lone pass completion of the afternoon was good for the third Tiger score. A clipping penalty had moved the Redmen back to their own 23. Fullback Penny Scott faded back and flipped a short pass toward a Reddie receiver, but Ouachita's Turner intercepted and plunged to the 18. Spear Titsworth crashed center for 10 yards and a first down on the Reddie eight. Titsworth tried another center plunge but ran into hepped up resistance. On the next play the Bengals elected to go "over," so Sam Bailey flipped a flat pass to halfback Paul Kirkpatrick who had only to dodge one man to execute the touchdown. Henderson's Bobby Neal charged through and barely stopped Turner's attempted extra point try.

In the third quarter Henderson, as usual, when they score on Ouachita, was lucky when they intercepted a Tiger pass on the Purple and Gold 26 and ran it back for A Reddie touchdown. Gatting place kicked the extra point and the scoring was at an end for the day.

Ouachita outgained Henderson in scrimmage yardage by the terrific total of 207 to 110. The Bengals led in first down by 9 to 8. Nothing more need be said except that the final score was OBC 20, HSTC 7.





O.B.C. 7 Vs. OKLAHOMA SOUTHEASTERN STATE 0

TEXOMA BOWL, Denison, Texas, Dec. 11

In their first bowl outing the Ouachita Tigers of Arkadelphia, Arkansas, last night, defeated the Savages of Southeastern State from Durant, Okla, 7-0 in as thrilling a game as this part of the country has seen in a decade.

Thousands of frozen fans in the inaugural running of the Texoma Bowl saw the Ouachita College Parsons capitalize on one big break to snatch victory from the sentimental favorite of local fans. Talley pilfered the pigskin from Quarterback J. D. Thorne. Redmon had not pulled the ball in and Talley promptly relieved Redmon of the ball and charged ahead from the 12 to the two-yard line before he was hauled down. It took big Walter Wimberly two cracks at the Savage forward wall to score, and in came Turner to split the uprights.

The game was highlighted by the play of Ouachita's two little round men at tackle, all-conference "Ike" Sharp who hits the scales at an even 250 pounds and Roy White, another Conference champ who weighed in at 246 pounds. These two tackles constantly racked back the Savage offensive action, and aided by the 236 pound, six-foot, three-inch Tailey, the 235 pounder George Mays halted the Savages in their most opportune moments of scoring possibilities.

Arthur Stewart, pre-game favorite for being the best back on the field had to give up going forward when these four big heavies with plenty of football savvy pushed him and his team-mates back 20 yards in four plays at one time.

Poor quarterbacking cost the Durant boys a scoring opportunity in the third period. With fourth down coming up and inches to go, Quarterback Thorne called for a pass which was intercepted by an alert Paul Kirkpatrick of the Bengals and hussled back out of his own territory. This was but one example of the Tigermen's alert pass hawking for the statistics proved the Bengals were credited with three interceptions of the Savage's ten trys.

Freshman Wayne Smith late in the third quarter shook loose for what appeared to be another Bengal touchdown but J. C. Dunn finally nailed him on the Savage 45. It was then that the highly touted Spear Titsworth of the Tigerville aggregation waked up with three of the most spectacular exhibitions of running trickery exhibited for the evening. Taking the oval on Quarterback McKnight's hand-off, Titsworth proceeded to dip, shake, and fake his way to the Savage 39. On the next hand-away it was again Titsworth on the take and a vicious drive into the Southeastern secondary for 9 more yards before being pulled down by Thorne. Then came the third carry by the same steaming fullback that proved to be the thriller of the nightcap when he broke into the Savage backfield at a fast clip only to be gathered in apparently by three Oklahoma tacklers but when the action had seemed to cease Titsworth was still going forward and another six points seemed on the way. Merez came up from behind to make the old college try that stopped a definite touchdown go.

Although Ouachita gained only 8 first downs to Southeastern's 11, the fans seemed of the general opinion that they never really unleashed their full offensive efforts. And when the yards gained rushing proved also in the Savage's favor by 37 yards it may easily be explained that the Oklahoma eleven also had possession of the ball considerably more than the Arkansas gridsters.

Ouachita College certainly proved a crowd pleaser as the fans showed when they quickly swung toward the Bengals in their cheers and applause. Little wonder as to how they could show such a powerful brand of straight-on football when we study their record of roster all-stars. Just before OBC left home camp for Denison the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference announced its all-conference selections for the season and Ouachita had placed 15 in some capacity on that highly rated list of standouts. Mythical All-Conference selections from the Ouachita Tiger eleven totalled four, with three linemen and one back gaining Arkansas gridiron honors. Guard Jim Herrington of Lake Providence, La., quarterback Sam Bailey of Magnolia, tackle Ike Sharp of Warren, and tackle Roy White of Benton took first laurels, while Smackover's Jim Tabor and Benton's Walter Wimberly finished on the second eleven.

O.B.C. 12 Vs. HARDIN-SIMMONS UNIVERSITY 40 Little Rock, Arkansas, Dec. 18

Today, in the Arkansas Memorial Stadium, two great Baptist Colleges sent forth their best of gridiron talent to do battle for the benefit of the Shriner's Crippled Children Fund.

Before thousands of spectators and hundreds of thousands of radio listeners who preferred to set at home with previous purchased tickets rather than chance the inclement weather the Ouachita Tigers and Hardin-Simmons Cowboys put on a show that thrilled even the laziest of spectators. Especially was this true when the much under-dog. Ouachita, found themselves on the heavy end of a 12-6 score at half time.

The first half opened with Ouachita receiving and driving hard to get into striking territory. On a 40 yard drive that featured the peak form of the entire Bengal team the big Cats banged their way to the eight and on the next play Jack Bell of Hope slashed over from that point.

But the Cowboys bounced right back and took spirit from Paul Petty who intercepted Bailey's intended pass for Kirkpatrick on the Tiger 26. Eight plays later Petty sprinted around end for a Cowboy tally that tied the score six-all.

Five plays after the following kickoff Walter Wimberly stole one of Johnny Ford's tosses for the Abilene men and raced 21 yards for another Tiger touchdown. Failure in try for the extra point left the game score 12-6 in favor of Ouachita.

It was a superior Ouachita throughout the remainder of the first half. The Tigermen out rushed and out sparked the Texas Baptist in every phase of the game. There was a tremendous line up front for the Bengals. Turner, White, McCullough, Harris, Herrington, Sharp, Rainsey, Galloway, Tabor, Talley, Mays, and others of the famed O.B.C. line were worked into the game in combinations that at no time allowed the Cowboys to face less than a two hundred and twentynine pound average.

As for the backfield there was no comparison that first half. Bailey's passing, McKnight's heady quarterbacking and personal bootlegging of the ball together with Kirkpatrick, Smith, Titsworth, and others.

Then came the beginning of the third quarter and Hardin-Simmons began to feel her way back. The Cowboys began to strike at the tiring middle of the Tiger line. Then a third string full-back came into the game for Hardin-Simmons and became the outstanding ground gainer and runner of the day. He was Paul Troutman, who had an infamous reputation for fumbling all of the year and only came into this afternoon's game to give the first and second string Cowboy full-backs a rest. But hig Paul became virtually a one man team and it only took him three and one half minutes and seven plays to drive across pay dirt. Paul Bailey kicked the first successful try for extra point in the afternoon.

It began to look as if the Tigers might find their first half stride again as they proceeded to stop the men from Abilene. But just as the Baptists from Arkansas began a drive of their own they fumbled and Bailey of the Texas Baptists recovered. This began a drive that saw big Paul Troutman get in high gear again and take the ball from his own 46 to the Bengal 10 in seven plays from where Ford climbed intu the air and dropped a short pass into the waiting arms of Jack Boles.

At the beginning of the fourth quarter the tired Bengals threw Earl Fleming and Jimmy Ives into the fray. These had been a successful pass combinaction all the year and almost clicked on two trys. But again an intercepted pass downed the Cat's spirits when Troutman intercepted on the Cowboy 48. On a series of sustained drives the Rope Artists plunged away to the Tiger 20 where Pat Bailey plunged to another touchdown for the victory maddened Cowboys.

The final period scoring was not yet at an end for the Cowboys. It took only a Bengal fumble on their own 22 yard line and a recovery by a fresh and alert Cowboy to start another tally. Two line plunges for eight yards and Ford elected to pass to Jack Boles for another goal and an extra point added.

Again the tiring Catmen bobbled and Hardin-Simmons recovered. Taking the ball on the Tiger 40 the Cowboy aggregation took only six plays to place the ball on the six from where Bailey crashed over for the final and last touchdown of the day. Final score, O.B.C. 12, Hardin-Simmons 40.


The playing field is much improved over last year and with the addition of a few seats larger crowds are enjoying the games.
