## *Dedication*



Dear Ouachitonians,


As the year draws to a close and many of you will be completing your work at Ouachita, our thoughts turn to what you will be in the days ahead. I refer not to the position you will fill or the job you will hold but to the kind of person you will be qualitatively.

You may remember that at the beginning of this school year in a chapel talk I listed seven identifying marks which we hope will characterize all who have been students here. These are at least the goals which the faculty and staff have had in mind during your days at Ouachita, so perhaps you would like to keep them for future reference.

1. A Ouachitonian believes in God through Jesus Christ and knows that spiritual values are superior to purely material considerations.
2. A Ouachitonian has a basic understanding of and appreciation for the world in which he lives.
3. A Ouachitonian possesses intellectual curiosity, knows how to think and is not afraid to do so.
4. A Ouachitonian is motivated, to a large degree, by a desire to serve; he is not egocentric.
5. A Ouachitonian gives apparent evidence of cultural development and experience--in his speech, manners, reading, listening, morals.
6. A Ouachitonian knows how to get along with his fellow man and to be a good citizen in society.
7. A Ouachitonian believes in an absolute rather than a relativistic ethic, in eternal rather than pragmatic truth.

As you leave Ouachita, either temporarily or permanently, you go with my earnest prayer that you will always remain worthy of the lofty traditions of Ouachita and with my assurance of an abiding appreciation for what you are and can yet become.

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
