## Grant leaves Vanderbilt for OBU presidency

At a time in the nation's history when being a college president isn't as popular as it used to be, Dr. Daniel Grant gave up his position as professor of political science at Vanderbilt University where he had been since 1948 to become president of Ouachita. His father, the late Dr. James R. Grant, had served as president of Ouachita from 1934 until 1949.

A nationally recognized authority on urban and metropolitan government and intergovernmental relations, Dr. Grant is an active Baptist layman, a frequent speaker on college campuses during Religious Emphasis Weeks, and International Student Conferences.

He is the author of many books and articles dealing with state and local governments.

Dr. and Mrs. Grant have three children, Carolyn, Shirley and Ross.

## Dr. Grant inaugurated 12th president of OBU

Dr. Daniel R. Grant became the twelfth president of Ouachita in colorful ceremonies Oct. 22. In accepting the job which he had actually begun on Feb. 1, 1970, Dr. Grant challenged the University to be "the cutting edge in Christian higher education."

Held in Rockefeller Field House, the inauguration drew official representatives from 51 colleges and universities and featured music by the University Band, salutations from the Former Students Association, the student senate, Clark County, Henderson State College and the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

The inaugural speaker was the Honorable Carleton A. Harris, chief justice of the Arkansas Supreme Court.

Concluding the historic event was a lighthearted dinner where the principal speaker was Chet Lauck of "Lum 'n Abner" fame.

Chairman of the steering committee in charge of planning the inauguration was Dr. William Trantham.

## Three vice presidents

 work with Dr. GrantWorking directly under Dr. Daniel Grant, Ouachita's three vice presidents guided the University's financial, academic and development operations.

The vice president for finance, Jim Orr, was responsible for general business affairs, plant operation, college transportation, commercial properties, faculty rental housing, the bookstore and post office, education supplies, the dining hall, and the University farm and stables.

Responsibility for general academic matters and for supervision of the deans and directors of all academic programs was assigned to the vice president for academic affairs, Dr. Carl Goodson.

Fund raising, public relations, placement and activities of the Former Students Association were responsibilities of the vice president for development, Dr. Ben Elrod.

Ouachita Baptist University, owned and operated by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, worked through a Board of Trustees numbering 24 members, elected by the convention. Eight of these trustees are elected each year for a three-year term; they may succeed themselves once before having to go
 off the Board for at least one year.

## Administrators guide student counselling

Among the most vital of the administrative duties at Ouachita are those of registrar, student aids, field representative and dean of students.

Keeping all academic records is the responsibility of the registrar, along with counselling on progress toward undergraduate graduation.

Student loans, scholarships, WorkStudy grants, campus employment and other student aids are duties assigned to the director of student aids.

The field representative is in charge of the all-important ared of student recruiting and general relations with Ouachita's denominational public.

The dean of students spends much of his time in counselling and also handles student activities and disciplinary action.

## Administrators supervise

## university functions

Plant maintenance, supervision of student religious activities, direction of women's activities, operation of the library and information services are all $\alpha$ part of Ouachita's administrative program.

The director of plant maintenance keeps the University's operations functioning by looking after the upkeep of all buildings and equipment.

Activities at the Baptist Student Union, Ouachita's largest and most inclusive campus organization, seek to relate college activities to local Baptist churches and to deepen the spiritual lives of the students.

Responsibilities for personal counselling of women, supervision of women's housing and coordination of women's activities are assigned to the dean of women.

The librarian looks after Ouachita's 85,000 volumes, pamphlet collection, film strips, recordings and other audio-visual materials.

Information services at Ouachita include news stories, design of displays and folders, promotional brochures and hundreds of photographs of University events and student leaders.

## Variety of operations in administrative work

The day-to-day administrative operations at Ouachita require closely coordinated teamwork among the many men and women who are assigned staff duties.

The dietician and cafeteria supervisor must plan menus, buy and prepare food for 1,900 meals a day and supervise a staff of 24 full-time and 36 student employees.

Ouachita's vital telephone communications are carried out by only one full-time person, the head operator, and six student operators.

In addition to handling a staggering volume of books every year, the book store is responsible for selling supplies, art materials, sweat shirts, social club jewelry and for ordering senior rings, graduation announcements and caps and gowns.

Assisting the registrar means supervising a staff of 18 , including 17 student helpers, keeping track of records and acting as secretary to the registrar.

## Students direct efforts for student-led revival

Major efforts for students in religion this year were directed toward a student-led revival held in the fall. The Ministerial Alliance, which is a fellowship of students who work in the field of religion, helped to direct the activities. The members tried to "inspire" without becoming involved as a club.

Classroom hours were enriched by the stories and pictures of students and teachers who had spent the previous months as summer missionaries or in other home and foreign mission fields.

The religion department expanded: Bible Study Workshops were offered for pastors; Dean Bill Dixon and Dr. Ben Elrod were added to the staff for the second semester; and both teachers and students benefited from the use of additional visual aids.

The fall lecture series brought in the widely recognized Dr. Paul Drakeford. He spoke to chapel groups, gave lectures and held personal conferences with interested students.

## New look, more students, spark school of music

The largest music enrollment since 1965 and major improvements in physical facilities highlighted the fall term of Ouachita's school of music.

Mitchell Hall auditorium was air conditioned, paneled, carpeted and had a new ceiling and new lighting installed. The music building also was repainted inside.

As an inaugural event, Edmund Karlsrud of the Metropolitan Opera gave a bassbaritone concert. Other visiting artists included French hornist C. Robert Crane who presented a concert in March, and an allSchumann program from Arkansas State University.

During the year, a number of faculty and junior and senior recitals were given, along with programs by various groups within the school of music. Major programs included The Consul by the Opera Workshop, the Messiah presented by the Ouachita Choir and a madrigal festival including high school and college groups.

State auditions for the National Association of Teachers of Singing were held on the Ouachita campus in November and Diana Wilson and Becky Russell were two of the eight winners. They represented Arkansas in the national auditions in Dallas last December.

A Contemporary Music Symposium was held in March in which faculty members and students presented their own compositions.

This summer the Ouachi-Tones will tour the Caribbean under the auspices of the USO.

The Ouachita military science department reinstated an Army Flight Program this year. The five senior students enrolled studied flight, weather, flight planning, Federal Aviation Regulations, and safety. Upon completion of their instruction, the newly commissioned second lieutenants must volunteer for flight training upon entry into active duty.

Last summer, 29 OBU cadets participated in summer camp. They were trained in all basic military skills including weapons, radio-telephone procedures, tanks, patrolling, etc.

Nine scholarships were awarded by Ouachita this fall to offer financial assistance to young men in the four-year Army ROTC program.

Training in military science included the basics of weaponry, drilling, map reading, military history, as well as two hours of drill each week.

OUACHITA vs. SOUTHEASTERN STATE COLLEGE - The Tigers opened at Durant, Okla. with a come-from-behind $16-7$ victory over the Savages. Johnnie Baker and Bruce Efird contributed the scoring with two touchdowns and a field goal.

OUACHITA vs. STATE COLLEGE OE ARKANSAS - Traveling to Conway for their conference opener, the Tigers yielded only 73 yards in defeating SCA 23-7. The Tigers made it to the scoreboard with touchdown runs by Johnnie Baker, Charles Carozza and Barry Bennett and successful conversion and field goal boots by Bruce Efird.

Ouachita scored on its first possession of the third quarter with a 61 -yard pass from Barry Bennett to David Dumond. Bruce Efird added the extra point.

A fourth quarter touchdown run off an intercepted pass ended the Lions' scoring and Tiger Barry Bennett suffered a concussion late in the ballgame.

OUACHITA vs. HARDING - Another loss of 21-7 marred OBU's clash with Harding at A.U. Williams Field. The Bison collected 190 yards on the ground and 204 in the cir.

OUACHITA vs. AUSTIN COLLEGE Taking a break from the conference schedule, the Tigers met Austin College in Sherman, Tex. and came away a $35-28$ winner. All the points in the first half were made by Johnnie Baker with three touchdowns, and by David Dumond with a pass from Barry Bennett.

OUACHITA vs. TECH - In $\alpha$ homecoming duel the Tigers upset leagueleadirg Arkansas Tech 14-12. Defensive back Jim Boyette set up the first Tiger score with a 55 -yard punt return and moments later Johnnie Baker scored on a 20 -yard sweep. Boyette scored the winning points in a third quarter touchdown.

OUACHITA vs. SOUTHERN STATEThe Tigers defeated Southern State 27-7 in the home finale with scores turned in by David Dumond, James Reynolds, Johnnie Baker and Bruce Efird.

OUACHITA vs. HENDERSON-Soundly trouncing the Reddies $36-0$ in the final game, the Tigers grabbed a share of the AIC championship.

Seconds into the game, Tiger defenders swarmed Reddie Charlie Walker in the end zone for a safety. After the HSC kick the Tigers drove 51 yards for the score capped by a 1 -yard plunge by Barry Bennett. Bruce Efird added the extra point.

Midway in the second quarter Efird kicked a 26 -yard field goal making the score 12-0.

The first Tiger score of the second half came on a 9 -yard touchdown run by David Crowley. After the extra point and a field goal made it 29-0, Charles Corozza scored on a 4 -yard pass from Bennett.

## Tiger Basketball

Crippled by the loss of two expected returning starters before the season opened, the Tigers found victories extremely scarce in the early going and spent all of December near the bottom of the conference stand-ings-they won only one of their first four leauge games.

Carrying a 2-8 record after the holiday break, the Tigers were left for dead by most AIC observers.

But then Ouachita managed to pull off one of the more surprising turnabouts in the history of AIC basketball. With the addition of Vietnam veteran Tommy Patterson at semester, Coach Bill Vining's young club jelled and began to reel off victories. By the last of January they had evened their AIC record at 5-5.

Then the Tigers launched a winning streak that was not to end until they had piled up ten straight victories.

During that period they singlehandedly tossed the AIC standings into turmoil, forcing favored Henderson out of the race with two upset victories and defeating leagueleading Southern State and second-place Arkansas AM\&N.

Invited to the District 17 NAIA Playoffs in Pine Bluff, the Tigers polished off Arkansas Tech in the first game to knock the Wonder Boys out of a second straight trip to Kansas City and defeated the only team they hadn't been able to beat in regular season play.

AIC-champion Southern State edged Ouachita $66-60$ in the playoff finals.
