
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


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
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A flash of understanding Student life

1973-74 will go down as an extraordinary year in the history of Ouachita. The year was unique, not only on our campus but also in the "real" world. We were forced to face

73-74 year extraordinary on campus and off

such national events as the Watergate affair and an energy crisis that gained a fantastic momentum almost overnight. The comet Kohoutek, one of the greatest since Haley's comet, sort of fizzled out and went back into outer space. While on campus, we saw the opening of Evans Student Center, made possible through many generous gifts from friends and the family of the university. O. C. Bailey, a men's dorm until this year, housed upperclass women. Meanwhile, Conger became a men's dorm once again. The formation of a new girls' social club, Pi Kappa Zeta, came about in the fall. Criticism again made its way to the bull sessions in the dorms. **Continued** topics this year include: one-year mandatory ROTC for freshman men, dorm rules for women, the food in the cafeteria and the price of tuition and everyday necessities. All in all, the spirit remained. The school continued having an ever-growing meaning to each student on our campus.



during the fall along with Lile Hall housing the Division of Business and Economics. Construction was started on the Fine Arts Center, the third of a five-building megastructure. Completion date is set for late August, 1974. O. C. Bailey dorm, formerly for men, was changed to a women's residence hall. Blake Hall was converted from an office hall into a men's residence hall. Cone Bottoms dormitory was equipped with air conditioning on the first and third floors. The front lawn was improved by replanting shrubs, pruning trees and generally improving the lawn area.







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

high school program. He can't recruit swimmers from out of state because he can't offer them any financial aid. Limited to four work-study arrangements and no scholarships, it is difficult to build any depth, which it takes to compete. This year Ouachita finished sixth in a field of seven at the AIC conference swim meet held in February at the State College pool in Conway. The Ouachita Tigers spent a rough spring under the hand of head coach Buddy Benson in 1973. There had to be rebuilding of an average team the year before. The Tigers were determined that someone was going to pay when the 1973 season opened. That someone

was Bishop College, a Baptist school in Dallas. Ouachita travelled to Dallas and then up and down Bishop's field with about the same ease in opening the season with an easy 40-19 victory. Luther Guinn and Tim Leatherwood raced for 304 yards and Mike Carroll unleashed a seldom-used offensive weapon: the forward pass. Warren Woodson's undefeated Trinity Tigers invaded the A.U. Williams Stadium the next Saturday afternoon expecting to make Ouachita their second AIC victim in a row after beating UAM the week before. The Tigers used error-free ball, and gave Ouachita a 28-7 win and a 2-0 record. In 1972, Ouachita's Johnny Baker surprised Troy State with two late touchdowns. In 1973's version, the Red Wave was determined to have no late-minute shenanigans pulled by Bakers successor, Luther Guinn, or by any of the other Tiger hopefuls. In a hard-fought contest, Troy State used the kicking game to its advantage in securing a 17-7 decision. Troy State's rush was just the beginning of Tiger woes.









minute 31-29 come-from-behind victory. After falling behind 21-0 before halftime, Luther Guinn clicked off two straight touchdowns on quick plays to send the Tigers in at halftime trailing 21-14. Then Gooden came out and produced a long touchdown drive, but Ouachita countered with two TD's of its own, including a two point conversion to put the Tigers up 29-28. Gooden cranked up again and drove the length of the field before kicking a short field goal with five seconds left to win for the Bison. The UAM Weevils had the worst defense in the AIC against rush, but the AIC's leading ground gainer, Guinn, and compatriots could manage only 10 points. However, Rick Lineberger and company held the Boll Weevils to only 7 and Ouachita evened its conference record at 1-1. Then the proverbial bottom fell out, starting with an inexperienced SCA freshman, Sam Coleman. He turned out to be more than the Tigers could handle, rushing 105 vards and two touchdowns in leading the State College Bears to a 13-0 triumph over OBU.



downed OBU 28-10. Enough was enough. It was time for someone to pay again and the Arkansas Tech Wonder boys were handy targets. Ouachita's stagnant offense began to stir. In fact it got downright awakened and enraged. The Tigers rolled to an effortless 28-7 triumph to again even their season record, this time at 4-4. With an even record and one of the two games left being with nationally ranked rival Henderson, Ouachita's road trip to Mississippi College became the key to averting a losing season. Luther Guinn and Mack Harris were out. So Tim Leatherwood was called in. Danny Winston at tailback chalked up 98 yards rushing and one touchdown. Phil Baker scored another. Paul Sharp added his 21st and 22nd consecutive PAT's. OBU had 14 points. Mississippi College pushed across one touchdown to make the score 14-7. Late in the game the Chocs again started to move and scored with 2:24 left, closing the gap to 14-13 and decided to go for two to win. Ed Wilman stopped the progress and Paul Sharp dropped the ball carier on the three, and Ouachita held on to a 14-13 win and assured themselves of at least a break-even season.





Ouachita finished the season with a 2-4 conference mark, which was by no means an indication of the talent of the Tigers. It was a frustrating season, to say the least. Reasons for the downfall are a dime a dozen. Some say that OBU's "Luther to the right, Luther to the left" offense was the reason, but statistics show that Ouachita was in the upper half of the AIC offense. Fault the defense, but its up at the top, too. Fault the coaching, but Buddy Benson

is regarded by the coaches in the state as being the most consistent coach in the state and the best at using to the maximum his available talents. Some say that there is a fine line between winning and losing. Ouachita was just too close to that line all year, and wound up treading on both sides too often. It's always a familiar cry to wait until next year and that's what Tiger fans are vocalizing, but so are Henderson's and Southern State's and SCA's and everybody else with the exception of possibly Harding which is losing their dynamic duo of Tom Ed Gooden and Snake Dixon. But still, Ouachita has the right to look ahead. The first right is the return of the conference's leading ground gainer, Luther Guinn. Among other things, Guinn holds the record for most vards in a single game rushing. Yet there is another "big" reason for an optimistic look to next year, and that's the return of center Bill Walker, no doubt one of the strongest centers in the nation. There are two real question marks concerning Ouachita's 1974 chances for the championship. First, can Quintas Crews continue to produce a solid defensive line, where three of five regulars are lost? Second, can Ouachita finally find a fullback; something that's really been missing since Johnny Johnson departed the scene back in the late '60's? Chances are good for an affirmative answer on both counts. Chances are even better that when Henderson week rolls around next year, there will be a lot more riding on the battle of the ravine, possibly even a conference championship.







the administration and student body. He said that understanding was the key to this policy, since it worked both ways.









Work was completed on the establishment of a union-card catalog system for the Ouachita library and the Henderson library. This provided each institution with a list of books in the other's library.

The dean of students office was concerned not only with routine duties expected of them but also with counseling students, working with student committees, and serving as a voice to represent students in the administration. The director of public relations, in addition to advising the Ouachitonian and "the Signal," produced news releases, slide programs, folders and pamphlets. Supervising janitorial services was a major duty of the plant maintenance director. His staff also assisted in the destruction of half of Lakeside, the air-conditioning of the first and third floors of Cone-Bottoms dormitory, and changing O.C. Bailey from a boy's dorm to a girl's dorm. The dean of the graduate school reported an enrollment of 143

during the fall semester, 18 of whom are full-time students. The growth of Ouachita presented problems to the dean of women's office in finding enough room for women students. This office worked closely with the AWS, and also had a reputation for being willing to listen to students.

The Student Activities office, with Evans Student Center, a new "playground" to plan activities within, went to work when the new SUB was opened in October. They planned parties on the bridge, dinner theaters and organized bowling leagues on the only bowling lanes in Arkadelphia.


Mohon travels to Spain; schools different

"In Spain the educational aspect is different from ours. The children go to school from about the age of 6 to 13. This is the only required schooling. Tests are given and then the students go on to college if they score high enough on these tests. One of the differences in education was the aspect of culture. Even the children are culture-minded. I talked to a man who was a professor at the University of Madrid and he said because Spain had such a rich and old background this could be one of the factors that causes the people to be concerned about their heritage. Education is generalized. In the U.S. people specialize in education and this limits their knowledge toward culture. Generalization allows a wider range of education. Big groups worth money; would be great!
















