David Allen Wehr returns to OBU as Artist-in-Residence eleven years after his first performance here in 1983 as winner of the National Federation of Music Clubs Young Artist Award. Since then, his international career has taken him to thirty countries in the Far East, Europe, North and South America, and he is recognized as one of the most significant musicians of his generation. His awards include Second Prize at the 1983 Naumburg International Piano Competition at Carnegie Hall in New York City, the Chamber Music Prize at the 1986 Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition in Salt Lake City, Second Prize at the 1986 University of Maryland/William Kapell International Piano Competition at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., and the Gold Medal at the 1987 Santander International Piano Competition in Spain. He has appeared as soloist with many of the world's great orchestras, including the London Symphony, the National Symphony, Houston Symphony, Chautauqua Symphony, New Zealand Symphony and all the major Spanish and Latin American orchestras. His concerts in the musical capitals of New York, London, Paris, Vienna, Madrid, Washington, Chicago, Los Angeles and Buenos Aires have been met with critical and popular acclaim.

Chamber music is an important aspect of Mr. Wehr's career, and he tours worldwide with the Sartory Trio, under Columbia Artists Management. Since 1991, he has toured annually in the U.S. and Canada for Community Concerts, both as soloist and with the Sartory Trio. His recordings include "20-Century American Piano Music" (Chandos CD and cassette), "Tuxedo Blues/Reverie" (Jazzmuze cassette), and "Liszt Transcriptions from Wagner Operas" (Connoisser Society CD). In November, he records the complete piano music of Charles Tomlinson Griffes, and in May, 1995, the complete Chopin Nocturnes, both for Connoisseur Society.

Mr. Wehr has been engaged as soloist by Arkansas Symphony for their 1995-96 season. His next recital at OBU is scheduled for February 28, 1995, and next fall, he begins a two-year series of eight concerts devoted to performing the complete cycle of thirty-two sonatas by Beethoven, a first for the state of Arkansas.

Mr. Wehr is an honorary National Arts Associate of Sigma Alpha lota.
