CONSTITUTION

Article I.—The Name

The name of this body shall be "The Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

Article II.—The Purpose

The purpose of this Convention shall be to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer co-operation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God.

Article III.—Membership

Section 1. The Convention shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Convention, and which desire to co-operate with other churches through this Convention.

Section 2. Each co-operating church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for each additional one hundred members, or major fraction thereof above one hundred, provided however, that no church shall be entitled to a total of more than ten messengers.

Section 3. The Convention may appoint a committee on credentials at each session which shall make recommendations to the Convention with reference to seating messengers from any church not hitherto affiliated with the Convention.

Article IV.—Authority

Section 1. While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, this Convention shall never exercise any authority whatever over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the constitution of any church, or with the exercise of its functions as the only ecclesiastical body, but will cheerfully recognize and uphold the absolute independence of the churches.

Article V.—Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Each officer of the Convention shall be elected annually, except the Recording Secretary and Treasurer who shall be the same as the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board, and shall continue in office until his successor in office shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the deliberations of the Convention and to discharge such other duties as may devolve upon the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all committees unless the Convention shall

otherwise determine. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in his stead.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of the proceedings of the Convention, to edit and arrange publication of a suitable number of the minutes for distribution among the churches, as the Convention may direct, as soon as reasonably possible after the close of the session. He shall file and keep in order all papers deemed important to the work of the Convention.

Article VI.—The Executive Board

Section 1. This Convention shall elect a Board of Trustees as provided for in the Convention's charter. This Board shall be known as the "Executive Board of Arkansas Baptist State Convention." This Board shall be composed of one member from the bounds of each co-operating association with a membership up to 5,000, and one additional member for each additional 5,000 constituency, or major fraction thereof, provided however, that no association shall be entitled to more than five (5) members. The state President and the Executive Secretary of Woman's Missionary Union shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Board. Upon the removal of any Executive Board member from the bounds of his or her association, his or her membership on the Executive Board ceases therewith; his or her successor in office may be named by the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board to hold office until the next meeting of the Convention. No member of this board shall hold any remunerative office under the Convention or any of its institutions. One-third of this board shall be elected annually to hold office for three years, and twenty (20) members shall constitute a quorum. Any member of the Executive Board who misses all the Executive Board meetings and the Executive Board committee meetings for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on the Board.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall be constituted and empowered by the Convention as its business and legal agent to administer all business committed to it by the Convention, and to employ such paid agents as it may deem necessary in carrying out the missionary, educational, benevolent and financial enterprises of the Convention. The Executive Board shall raise, collect, receive and disburse all the funds of the Baptist Cooperative Program, both state and southwide. The office of the Executive Board shall be a clearing house for administering the business affairs of the Convention, and a headquarters for Baptist information. Its books, records and files shall at all times be open for the reference and inspection of any co-operating church which may desire to examine them.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall render to the Convention annually a complete and detailed statement of all its business for the year.

Article VII.—Trusteeships

The Convention shall elect trustees to manage and to operate its colleges, hospitals, orphanages and any other institutions it may possess, as follows:

Section 1. Ouachita Baptist University, 24; Arkansas Baptist Home for Children, 18; Baptist Memorial Hospital, 9.

Section 2. One-third of the members of the Boards of Trustees shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. Any member of any Board of Trustees who misses all the meetings of that Board for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on that Board.

Section 3. Each Board of Trustees shall elect from their membership a chairman and a recording secretary and such other officers as seems advisable.

Section 4. All trusteeships shall render to the Convention at each annual session complete and detailed reports of all transactions and business and any other activities for the year, and shall be subject to the direction of the Convention in all matters pertaining to administering the affairs of the institution with which their trusteeship is concerned.

Article VIII.—Operation of Agencies

Section 1. Each board, agency, and institution of this Convention shall submit to the Executive Board at its annual budget planning meeting, which is to be held prior to the annual meeting of the Convention, a detailed statement of its sources of income, and a budget of proposed expenditures for the ensuing year. When received and adopted by the Convention, these budgets shall become the basis for the operations for the ensuing year.

Article IX.—Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall meet annually, "if God permit," on a date to be fixed by the Convention. The Executive Board is empowered in emergencies to call special sessions of the Convention and to change either the time or place of meeting or both should the occasion demand.

Article X.—Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of this Convention, two-thirds of the members voting concurring in the measure, except Article IV which shall remain forever unalterable in substance.

Section 2. Any proposed amendment to this Constitution shall be presented to the Convention in writing, for its consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, and may be voted on, on any subsequent day during the session, provided adequate publicity has been given in previous announcement.

Article XI.—Parliamentary Authority

Kerfoot's **Parliamentary Law** shall be the standard for deciding questions of parliamentary procedure.

BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are enacted for the government of the Convention.

1. Enrollment of Messengers

The Secretary of the Convention shall enroll, upon arrival, messengers who present proper credentials from the churches. These messengers, together with others who may be enrolled upon presentation of approved credentials during the session, shall constitute the Convention. Any contention concerning seating messengers shall be presented to a committee appointed by the President for recommendation to the Convention for its action.

2. Officers

The President, First Vice-President, and Second Vice-President shall be elected on the second day of the Convention, their terms of office to begin with the final session of the Convention; and the President shall appoint and announce a Nominating Committee to report at the next session of the Convention.

The election of all officers shall be by ballot; provided, however, there is only one nomination for the office, then the Secretary, or any other present may be directed to cast the ballot of the entire assembly for the single nominee.

The first vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after balloting for the president has been completed and the winner announced, and the second vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after the balloting for the first vice president has been completed and the winner announced.

Each officer of the Convention shall be elected by a majority of all votes cast.

In case of removal from office, by death or otherwise, of the President, the Vice-Presidents shall automatically succeed to the office of President in the order of their election. The President may not be elected for more than two consecutive terms.

The Treasurer of the Executive Board shall be also Treasurer of the Convention.

All elected officers of this Convention shall be members of churches co-operating with this Convention. This must also apply to members of the Executive Board and the institutional boards of this Convention.

3. The Executive Board

The Executive Board, being the legal trustee of the Convention, shall be empowered by the Convention to administer all business committed to it by the Convention.

The Executive Board is empowered to act for the Convention between sessions of the Convention, provided that it shall never exercise any authority contrary to the expressed will of the Convention.

When any unforeseen emergency occurs in any of the affairs of the Convention, or in any of the interests it controls, that in the judgment of the Executive Board requires action before the next session of the Convention, the Executive Board shall have full authority to take such action as may seem necessary, and all interests concerned shall be governed by such action, provided the Executive Board shall make full report of all matters pertaining thereunto to the next session of the Convention for its approval, and provided further, that nothing in this article shall be construed as giving the Executive Board authority to execute any matter already committed by the Convention to any of its Boards of Trustees or its institutions unless such Board when so commissioned shall decline to act on the orders of the Convention.

All proposals requiring the expenditures of money by the Convention, or the Executive Board of the Convention, from the annual budget, shall be considered by the Executive Board, before being presented to the Convention.

This Board shall be charged with the responsibility to have the books and financial affairs of each and all of the boards and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention audited annually by an accredited firm of auditors, all audits to be accessible to the Executive Board at its budget planning session, and to be included in the institution's report to the Convention.

Members of the Executive Board, having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

The various associations of Arkansas, whose churches are affiliated with this Convention, may submit to the committee on nominations names of those whom they believe should be considered for membership on the Executive Board as members from that association.

4. Trusteeships

All trusteeships of this Convention shall be amenable to the Convention on all matters, through its Executive Board. No trusteeship shall conduct extra movements to raise money outside its regular revenue-producing sources, nor shall a deficit in running expense or debt be incurred without the approval of the Convention in session or of the Executive Board in case of aforementioned emergencies, except, as follows: When an emergency arises concerning the opportunity to purchase needed property for expansion, the president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board and the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board, (all three concurring) believing such an emergency exists and deeming it wise to incur indebtedness, may give the Trustees of an institution such permission, and make a full report to the Executive Board and to the next Convention in session.

Members of Boards of Trustees having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

Not more than two (2) members of a Board of Trustees shall at the same time be members of the same local church, nor shall more than six (6) members reside in any one association.

A member of a Board of Trustees of one institution of the Convention may not at the same time be a member of any other Board of Trustees of another institution of the Convention.

No member of a Board of Trustees of any institution of this Convention may at the same time be a member of the Executive Board of the Convention.

5. Committee Members

1. A member filling an unexpired term not having served the full term of years as provided by the Constitution, shall be, at the discretion of the Nominating Committee, eligible for election to a full term.

2. No member of a commission or committee delegated to study or make recommendations concerning our institutions shall be a member of any Board of Trustees of such institutions.

3. All associational missionaries or mission pastors receiving all or part compensation from the Convention through the Executive Board shall be considered employees of the Convention and shall not be members of any Convention or institutional board. The president of the Convention by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Board for the duration of his term of office.

9. MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

(1) Fritz Goodbar, Little Rock, read the following proposed change to the Constitution of the convention:

"That Article VI dealing with the Executive Board be amended by adding at the close of the sentence on line 8 (1965 minutes) the following . . . 'the duly elected state president of this convention shall serve as chairman of the Executive Board during his tenure of office. This amendment to become effective following the 1967 annual meeting of this convention.' "

By common consent the proposed change was referred to the Committee on the Order of Business for action at a later session.

(2) John McClanahan, Pine Bluff, read the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, the 1966 session of the Arkansas Baptist Convention failed to approve the recommendation of the Credentials Committee, and instead voted not to seat messengers from the First Baptist Church in Russellville, and

"WHEREAS, this church has maintained for the intervening year its loyalty as a regular Baptist Church in the Arkansas Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention, using Southern Baptist literature and program materials and contributing regularly to Southern Baptist world missions through the Cooperative Program, and

"WHEREAS, the messengers from the First Baptist Church in Russellville were duly seated at the 1966 session of the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Detroit, President Wayne Dehoney ruling that a move not to seat the Russellville Church was out of order on constitutional, doctrinal, and historical grounds, and

"WHEREAS, messengers from the said church are deliberately not present for the sessions of this convention, having been told one year ago that they could not be seated, and

"WHEREAS, this resolution is not an endorsement of the Russellville position on the church ordinances, it is a recognition of their right within historical Baptist tradition to take such action for their local church

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, THAT the 1966 session of the Arkansas Baptist Convention go on record as inviting the First Baptist Church at Russellville to attend any remaining sessions of this convention and/or future conventions."

Voted: That the resolution be referred to the Credentials Committee for consideration at a later session at a time set by the Committee on Order of Business.

(3) J. T. Summers, Little Rock, read a proposed interpretation to the Constitution which was referred to the Credentials Committee by common consent:

"That this convention interpret the words 'regular Baptist churches' in Article 3, Section 1, of the constitution of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention to mean:

'Churches who do not accept alien immersion, nor practice open communion.' "

James Ware, Conway, was ruled out of order by the president in debating a matter which was not before the convention and the ruling was sustained by the body.

10. Robert Bauman, Manager, Baptist Book Store, Little Rock, spoke briefly and invited the messengers to visit the book store and convention exhibit, announced an autograph party by

several authors and urged the messengers to send in their orders for the January Bible study books soon.

✓ 11. ARKANSAS BAPTIST MEDICAL CENTER REQUEST

James A. Linder, Vice President, Board of Trustees, Arkansas Baptist Medical Center, brought the report of the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center. Following a statement by R. L. South, President of the Executive Board, that the matter had been through the proper committees of the Executive Board and the Executive Board is concurring in the recommendation of the Medical Center Trustees, James Linder moved the convention grant the request of the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center Trustees to declare the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center a body corporate independent of the convention, solely under the control of its Board of Trustees and membership.

(See **Book of Reports** section, pages 82-83)

James Walker, Amity, moved to amend the motion that the buildings and equipment of the medical center be deeded to the Trustees of the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center or some other group, and that no restriction as to future members of the Board be made, and that the term "Baptist" be stricken from the name of the institution and the convention sever all legal relationship with the medical center. There was a second. The amendment was defeated by a voice vote after a motion by E. E. Boone, Wynne, to table the matter for one year was defeated.

Speakers for the motion to delay were Dale Jackson, Harrison; Raymond Whetstone, Percy; John Basinger, Lake City. Harold White, Paris, urged the messengers not to delay action on the request.

Guy Wilson, Little Rock, offered a substitute motion that "Arkansas Baptist Medical Center, as one of the family of Arkansas Baptist State Convention, be permitted by this convention to apply for and to receive public funds for use by Arkansas Baptist Medical Center for any of the purposes and objectives to which such funds lawfully and morally may be applied by its Board of Trustees." Motion was seconded. Speakers against the substitute motion were Dr. C. R. Ellis, Malvern; W. V. Garner, Texarkana; Don Cooper, Crawfordsville. Mr. H. H. Harvill, Humphrey, in Harmony Association, spoke in favor of the substitute motion.

Move for the previous question was sustained.

Motion to table the motion until Tuesday was defeated.

Motion to vote on the substitute motion by ballot was defeated.

The substitute motion by Guy Wilson was undecided due to difficulty in correctly counting the standing vote and the messengers then voted to vote on the substitute motion by ballot.

Voted: Not to hear Amos Greer, Pine Bluff.

Hoyt Mulkey led the messengers in singing "Blessed Be the Name." There was a motion and second to hear James L. Sullivan, Nashville, Tennessee, during the counting of the ballots. A substitute motion for the Committee on Order of Business to place Dr. Sullivan at a later session in the convention was withdrawn when he indicated he could not be present. The messengers voted to hear Dr. Sullivan, but the Tellers Committee returned at this time to report the substitute motion by Guy Wilson had failed by a vote of: 601 - NO and 436 - YES. (This vote was later corrected by the chairman of the Tellers Committee to - 516 - NO and 431 - YES. See item #21, Miscellaneous Business, Morning Session, Tuesday, November 8, 1966).

The original motion to release Arkansas Baptist Medical Center was then considered and the messengers voted to limit debate to two minutes each, with the president calling time on the debate.

A substitute motion by Raymond Whetstone, Percy, to keep the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center as it is without accepting aid or grants of any kind was ruled out of order because it was a motion to accomplish what a defeat of the motion would accomplish.

Jimmy Watson, Camden, made a substitute motion that the Board of Trustees be instructed to sell Arkansas Baptist Medical Center and give the proceeds to Ouachita Baptist University. There was a second. After debate, the call for previous question was sustained. The substitute motion to sell Arkansas Baptist Medical Center was defeated.

John Gilbreath, Administrator, Arkansas Baptist Medical Center, spoke in favor of the original motion. The call for the previous question was sustained and the vote by ballot was taken.

Jerre Hassell, North Little Rock, Chairman of the Committee on Order of Business, announced the following changes in the program: Fritz Goodbar's proposal to change the constitution to 10:35 a.m. on Tuesday; John McClanahan's resolution and J. T. Summers' interpretation of the constitution, both of which were referred to the Credentials Committee, to be heard during the Miscellaneous Business at 7:15 p.m. on Tuesday.

12. Hoyt Mulkey led the Music Men and Women in singing

"I Need Thee Every Hour." James L. Sullivan, Executive Secretary, The Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee, brought the sermon of the evening. Following the message President Hook announced the vote on the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center Request.

Voted: To grant the request of the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center, 488 - For; 327 - Against.

13. The session was adjourned in prayer by T. K. Rucker, Little Rock.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION

Tuesday, November 8, 1966

(Memorial Moments — Election of Officers)

14. The meeting was called to order by W. Harold White, Paris, Second Vice President. Hoyt Mulkey led the messengers in singing "Trust and Obey." Jerry Hodge, Little Rock layman, read the scripture, Deuteronomy 4: 1-14, and led in prayer.

15. Memorial Moments were observed under the leadership of H. L. Lipford, Mabelvale, who read the following tribute:

MEMORIAL MOMENTS

"It is good that we take time in an early session of this meeting of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention to give thanks unto our Lord for the lives of those with whom we have walked in Christian service and fellowship, and who have 'gone to be with the Lord' since the last meeting of our convention.

"In an effort to offer tribute and respect to our comrades who have laid down their armor and joined the departed redeemed with Christ, we are reminded that their 'labor was not in vain in the Lord.' We are keenly conscious of our debt to them and to our God for the many examples of Kingdom accomplishments by these noble servants who have labored faithfully and sacrificially for our Lord. It is a challenge to know that we reap where 'other men laboured' and that we 'are entered into their labours' to be found 'always abounding in the work of the Lord.'

Voted: To elect D. C. McAtee, Smackover, Second Vice President by acclamation.

The unanimous vote was cast by S. A. Whitlow.

19. Ray McClung, Little Rock, sang "God Leads Us Along," accompanied by Mrs. Kenneth Moore, Little Rock. Don Hook brought the President's Address.

20. George T. Blackmon, Arkadelphia, spoke to the report of the Arkansas Baptist History Commission.

Voted: To adopt the report of the Arkansas Baptist History Commission as printed in the Book of Reports.

21. MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

(1) At the instruction of the Committee on Order of Business, Fritz Goodbar read his proposed amendment to the Constitution that would make the elected president of the convention the president of the Executive Board. Motion by Fritz Goodbar was seconded. After debate, the call for previous question was sustained. Motion to change the constitution was DEFEATED.

(2) L. H. Coleman, Pine Bluff, moved that the 1967 Convention Nominating Committee be instructed to set a date for the 1968 convention at a time other than during the national and state elections. There was a second.

Voted: That the 1967 Convention Nominating Committee be instructed to set the date of the 1968 Convention at a time other than during the National and State election.

(3) **Voted: To hear Charles Taylor and no other item of business at this time.**

Charles Taylor, Harrison, made the following statement: "In view of the fact that 222 messengers to this convention were denied the privilege of voting on this important issue (the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center request voted on in the Monday night session), simply because the convention did not do what it had voted to do and because a large number of us had made commitments to our churches to vote against this issue and through no error on our part were denied this privilege, I move that this convention correct this injustice by taking a re-vote on the original motion concerning Arkansas Baptist Medical Center and the convention's relation to it." There was a second.

Call for the previous question was sustained. Jerry Don Abernathy, chairman, Tellers Committee, announced the corrected totals on the vote concerning the substitute motion made by Guy Wilson as follows:

FOR - 431; AGAINST - 516.

Voted: To table the matter and move on with the order of the day.

22. The report on Civic Morality was introduced by Tom Digby, North Little Rock. Dr. W. Henry Goodloe, Executive Director, Christian Civic Foundation, was introduced to the messengers.

Voted: To adopt the report of the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas as printed in the Book of Reports.

23. Following special music by Archie McMillan, Little Rock, "March, March, All Ye People", Andrew Hall, Fayetteville, read the scripture, Hosea 10:12, and other related passages, and led in prayer. Dale Cowling, Little Rock, brought the annual sermon, "It is Time!"

24. The session was adjourned with prayer by C. W. Caldwell, Little Rock.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

Tuesday, November 8, 1966

(Report of Committee on Federal aid)

25. The session was opened with the messengers singing "Serve the Lord With Gladness" under the direction of Hoyt Mulkey, with Thomas A. Hinson, Second Vice President, presiding.

26. Sam Sanderson, Mena layman, read the scripture, Romans 12, and led in prayer.

27. Horace Thompson, Little Rock, president of the Board of Trustees, Arkansas Baptist Home for Children, introduced the new Executive Director of the home, Maurice Caldwell, who spoke to the report.

Voted: That the report of the Arkansas Baptist Home for Children be adopted as printed in the Book of Reports.

28. W. J. Hinsley, Hot Springs, was recognized as the oldest living former president of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and spoke briefly.

29. W. Harold Hicks, Chairman of the committee appointed in the 1965 session to study the matter of Federal aid, brought the report of his committee with the assistance of Eugene Moore, Fort Smith.

Voted: To adopt the report and recommendations of the Committee.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FEDERAL AID

INTRODUCTION

Baptists have historically been at the forefront in holding to the principle of a free church in a free state. The tyranny of government-controlled religion led our forefathers to suffer unto death for religious freedom.

Across the Southern Baptist Convention Baptists are engaged in studies of our cherished principle of separation of church and state, as it relates to our institutions, particularly our hospitals, universities, and colleges. Vast sums of government money are available to these Baptist institutions. Can we accept some of these programs without violating our convictions? Are there areas of cooperation where we can work with government for the common good? Is the principle of separation to be applied by Baptists in the same fashion to hospitals and higher educational institutions? Can Arkansas Baptist Medical Center maintain and increase the quality of service demanded by both government standards and Christian conscience without government funds that are being offered, and accepted by other hospitals in this community and state? Can Ouachita University expect to receive, from Baptists and other friends, enough financial support to compete with similar universities that are receiving large sums of federal aid? Can the Trustees of our university be given the liberty and confidence of our Arkansas Baptist constituency to be selective and use such programs now offered, or to be offered, that in their judgement do not violate commonly held Baptist convictions? These are some of the questions we face as Baptists.

Your committee was authorized by the action of the 1965 Arkansas Baptist State Convention and appointed by the president. It's assignment was: "to study the provisions, availability, and conditions of accepting Federal funds as they are made available under recent legislation to private institutions such as our own colleges and hospital." Also, "to make a report of its findings, and make any recommendations it may care to make to the 1966 Convention." (President Don Hook's letter of December 8, 1965 to Dr. W. H. Hicks.)

As a working plan the committee was divided into two sections. Hal Kenamer, Superintendent of Schools of Paris and Rev. Eugene Moore, pastor of Trinity Baptist Church of Fort Smith, making the study on federal aid to higher educational institutions; and Dr. W. Payton Kolb, physician of Little Rock, and Rev. Tal Bonham, pastor of the South Side Baptist Church of Pine Bluff, making the study of federal aid to hospitals. The committee as a whole has met five times.

Your committee has chosen to omit the section of our study on federal aid or grants to hospitals in the light of the request of the Trustees of Arkansas Baptist Medical Center to the Executive Board of the Convention, since this matter is before this Convention as a special item of business, and, because, in recent months widespread information on, and discussion of the Hospital Trustees' request, have served to place this matter before our Baptist constituency and the messengers of this convention.

We submit herein our report on Federal Aid to our Higher Educational Institutions.

I. THERE ARE NOW OVER TWO HUNDRED TYPES OF ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS PROMOTED BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT IN WHICH OUR BAPTIST COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES ARE LEGALLY ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE.

Our principal concern in this report is the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963, which authorizes "assistance to public and other non-profit institutions of higher education in financing the construction, rehabilitation, or improvement of needed academic and related facilities in undergraduate and graduate institutions."

The limitations of the act forbid the use of Federal grants for several purposes including:

A. Any facility used or to be used for sectarian instruction or as a place of public worship.

B. Any facility which is used or to be used primarily in connection with any part of the program of a school or department of divinity.

The law states, "No department, agency, officer, or employee of the United States shall, under authority of this Act, exercise any direction, supervision, or control over, or impose any requirements or conditions with respect to, the personnel, curriculum, methods of instruction, or administration of any educational institution."

II. THE TYPES AND KINDS OF GOVERNMENTAL ASSISTANCE ACCEPTED BY OUR COLLEGES IN THE PAST.

Long before the H.E.F. Act of 1963 was passed there

were numerous programs by which the federal government sought to aid educational institutions both public and private non-profit. There have been a number of federal programs in which our Baptist colleges have participated. In so far as this committee has knowledge there has been no serious objection to such participation, and no one has thought of them as being encroachments on the historic policy of "a free church in a free state" or of "separation of church and state."

In the past either one or both of our colleges have participated in the following programs of the federal government:

(1) Contractual services which the institution performed for the government, and for which the institution was paid by the government.

Namely: R.O.T.C.; other military training programs; special teacher training programs; etc.

(2) Exercised the privilege as a non-profit educational institution of purchasing and securing surplus property: including land, buildings, and various other supplies and equipment. Some of this property was secured on the basis of a bid, some on a fixed price, some on a handling charge, and some as an outright gift.

(3) They have negotiated building loans from an agency of the U. S. Government.

(4) Loans and grants to students by the federal government under various programs have been administered by the colleges.

(5) Research grants to members of the faculty have been received.

III. GOVERNMENT AID NOT YET ACCEPTED BY THE COLLEGES.

There are numerous government programs in which our colleges are not now participating either because of limited facilities, by choice of the administration, or for some other reason. In the areas mentioned above however, the colleges generally are continuing to participate. The one exception is the acceptance of grants for new facilities under the H.E.F. Act of 1963. It should be noted, however, that while government surplus property (buildings and miscellaneous equipment) has been received as a gift in some instances, government money as a gift to build new facilities has not been accepted.

IV. NEEDS OF OUR BAPTIST COLLEGES.

1. IMMEDIATE NEEDS:

A. Southern Baptist College needs a science building

providing at least twelve laboratories and class rooms with all the facilities pertaining thereto. A fine arts building and an auditorium are urgently needed. The estimated cost of these facilities is \$475,000.

B. Ouachita Baptist University needs at once:

- (1) an addition to the library to double its size.
- (2) an addition to the science building to double its size.
- (3) additional class room space.

The estimated cost of these facilities is \$975,000.

2. LONG TERM NEEDS (WITHIN FIVE YEARS).

A. Southern Baptist College will need

- (1) an administration building.
- (2) additional classroom building.
- (3) additional faculty housing.

The estimated cost of these facilities is \$900,000.

B. Ouachita Baptist University will need

- (1) a dormitory for 300 men.
- (2) enlarged student center.
- (3) modern apartments (75) for married students.

The estimated cost of these facilities is \$1,550,000.

3. These needs pertain to physical facilities and say nothing of such items as endowment funds and faculty salaries.

V. THE CONDITIONS RESULTING FROM THE PAST ACCEPTANCE OF GOVERNMENT AID AND EARLIER PARTICIPATION IN THE VARIOUS GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS CONCERNING EDUCATION AND TRAINING.

In a letter dated June 29, 1966, Dr. Ralph Phelps said: "This depends on what program we are talking about. Every program has conditions of eligibility, disbursement of funds, reporting, etc. The programs in which we are currently participating affect us, mainly, by (1) furnishing badly needed funds to students and (2) requiring mountains of paper work by our administrative staff. Nothing in these programs dictates what or how we teach, who teaches, whom we accept as students, requirements for graduation (except in the case of R.O.T.C.) or anything else fundamental. If our religious freedom is impaired, we are not

aware of it; and we live in the center of these programs.”
“In all government programs (grant, scholarship, contract or loan), we must comply with the Civil Rights Act of 1964.”

OBSERVATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE:

(1) There has been no resentment on the part of Baptists generally to the participation by our colleges in any of the government programs outlined above.

(2) The colleges are serving larger and ever increasing numbers of students which has been made possible in part, at least, by this assistance from the government.

(3) The ministry of the colleges has been encouraged and strengthened thereby.

(4) There has not been a single incident reported in which any agency of the federal government has attempted to direct, control, coerce, or dictate the policies of the colleges as determined by their trustees and their administrations.

(5) There has been no apparent reduction of gifts to the colleges attributed to the fact that they were participating in any government programs.

VI. THE ANTICIPATED CONDITIONS RESULTING FROM THE CONTINUED PARTICIPATION BY OUR COLLEGES IN THESE GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS.

Concerning this matter, Dr. H. E. Williams wrote in a letter dated July 12, 1966, as follows:

“In answer to this question, of course, any statement we would give would be purely in the problematical and theoretical stage as no person knows exactly what may result in the future from governmental assistance. Presently there is every indication that the governmental agencies do wish to avoid any conflict with the basic philosophy of church related institutions. The present law strictly forbids dictation to church related institutions as to whom they shall employ for different responsibilities and especially in the area of teaching. How long this condition will obtain is of course a matter that we could not predict. I do not see any problems in the immediate future in taking direct governmental grants but most of us in private and state institutions of higher learning both have some misgivings about the long-term affect that such grants may have upon the general pattern of American education.”

OBSERVATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE:

(1) We do not anticipate any adverse affects on the cause of Christian education and the ministry of our col-

leges if they **continue to participate as at present** in existing government programs or of similar kinds in the future.

(2) We do not envision a day in which our colleges will be entirely free from controls by one or more branches of government.

(3) We have not yet found any disposition on the part of government, either state or federal, to direct, control, coerce or dictate the work of the churches, or to disregard the sanctity of a free church in a free state as it pertains to worship and education with due regard to the general welfare of the citizenry.

(4) Because our Baptist colleges have not accepted building grants as authorized by the H.E.F. Act of 1963 there has been reported a decline in gifts to these institutions.

VII. WHAT WILL BE THE CONDITIONS RESULTING TO OUR COLLEGES IF THE BUILDING GRANTS PROPOSED BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT ARE REFUSED?

1. The advancement and improvement of the physical facilities of the colleges will be retarded.
2. The size of the student bodies will be restricted.
3. The colleges will not cease to function.
4. The colleges will remain increasingly dependent upon gifts from private sources and from their sponsoring organization for their capital needs.

VIII. CHURCH-STATE ISSUES IN THE COURTS.

This committee has taken note of the fact that the state of Maryland appropriated sizeable grants to four church related colleges in that state. The action was contested and the Maryland State Supreme Court has ruled against such use of government funds. It is expected that the case will be appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court. The decision of this court will doubtless be of great concern to those who either have or are considering accepting any financial grants from the government. Especially since the Supreme Court's decision in the Everson case of 1947: "No tax in any amount, large or small, can be levied to support any religious activities, or to support any religious institutions, whatever they may be called, or whatever form they may adopt to teach or practice religion."

IX. CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

In the light of the foregoing study we recommend:

1. That the administration and trustees of our colleges as they shall deem desirable continue to participate

in those government programs which embrace the following:

(A) AIDS TO STUDENTS.

Such as:

- A. National Defense Loans
- B. Equal Opportunity Act jobs and scholarships
- C. G. I. Training
- D. Scholarships for dependents of service men killed in service.
- E. And other similar programs.

(B) CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENTS FOR PERFORMANCE OF SPECIFIC SERVICES FOR THE GOVERNMENT.

Such as:

- A. Reserve Officers Training Corps (R.O.T.C.)
- B. Training institutes
- C. Research grants
- D. Other similar programs

(C) BUILDING LOANS AT RATE OF INTEREST COMPARABLE TO THAT CHARGED OTHER NON-PROFIT INSTITUTIONS.

(D) ACCEPTANCE AND/OR PURCHASE OF DISPOSED SURPLUS PROPERTY.

(E) SPECIAL SCHOLARSHIPS AND FELLOWSHIPS.

2. We recommend that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention continue the practice of refusing grants of funds by government to any church related institution.

3. We further recommend that a period of **one year** be used for informing and educating Arkansas Baptists concerning the crisis in Christian higher education, stating the needs of our Baptist colleges and setting forth possible solutions to these needs;

And that this recommendation be implemented jointly by the Public Relations Department of the convention, of Ouachita University and of Southern College.

APPENDIX

In order that the reader may have easy access to the provisions of the "Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963," portions from that Act are attached to this report as an appendix.

I. PROVISIONS OF THE HIGHER EDUCATION FACILITIES ACT OF 1963

Text of the Law

Following is the text of Public Law 88-204:

PUBLIC LAW 88-204, 88th CONGRESS, H.R. 6143,
December 16, 1963

An Act to authorize assistance to public and other non-profit institutions of higher education in financing the construction, rehabilitation, or improvement of needed academic and related facilities in undergraduate and graduate institutions.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That this Act may be cited as the 'Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963.'

Findings and Declaration of Policy

Sec. 2. The Congress hereby finds that the security and welfare of the United States require that this and future generations of American youth be assured ample opportunity for the fullest development of their intellectual capacities, and that this opportunity will be jeopardized unless the nation's colleges and universities are encouraged and assisted in their efforts to accommodate rapidly growing numbers of youth who aspire to a higher education. The Congress further finds and declares that these needs are so great and these steps so urgent that it is incumbent upon the nation to take positive and immediate action to meet these needs through assistance to institutions of higher education, including graduate and undergraduate institutions, junior and community colleges, and technical institutes, in providing certain academic facilities."

In Title I the H.E.F. Act of 1963 sets forth provisions for making outright grants, as directed and approved by State Education Commissions, to both public and private non-profit educational institutions. Eligibility for such grants was classified as follows:

Eligibility For Grants

Sec. 106. An institution of higher education shall be eligible for a grant for construction of an academic facility

under this title (1) in the case of an institution of higher education other than public community college or public technical institute, only if such construction is limited to structures, or portions thereof, especially designed for instruction or research in the natural or physical sciences, mathematics, modern foreign languages, or engineering, or for use as a library, and (2) only if such construction will, either alone or together with other construction, is undertaken within a reasonable time. (A) result in an urgently needed substantial expansion of the institution's student enrollment capacity, or (B) in the case of a new institution of higher education, result in creating urgently needed enrollment capacity." Limitations of the act are pointed out in Title IV under "definitions."

Title IV—General Provisions **Definitions**

Sec. 401. As used in this Act—

(a) (1) Except as provided in subparagraph (2) of this paragraph, the term 'academic facilities' means structures suitable for use as classrooms, laboratories, libraries, and related facilities necessary or appropriate for instruction of students, or for research, or for administration of the educational or research programs, of an institution of higher education, and maintenance, storage, or utility facilities essential to operation of the foregoing facilities.

(2) The term 'academic facilities' shall not include (a) any facility intended primarily for events for which admission is to be charged to the general public, or (B) any gymnasium or other facility specially designed for athletic or recreational activities, other than for an academic course in physical education or where the Commissioner finds that the physical integration of such facilities with other academic facilities included under this Act is required to carry out the objectives of this Act, or (C) any facility used or to be used for sectarian instruction or as a place for religious worship, or (D) any facility which (although not a facility described in the preceding clause) is used or to be used primarily in connection with any part of the program of a school or department of divinity, or (E) any facility used or to be used by a school of 'medicine', 'school of dentistry', 'school of osteopathy', 'school of pharmacy', 'school of optometry', 'school of podiatry', 'school of nursing', or 'school of public health', as defined in section 724 of the Public Health Service Act. For the purposes of this subparagraph the term 'school or department of divinity' means an institution or a department or branch of an institution, whose program is specifically for the education of students to prepare them to become ministers of religion or to enter upon some other religious vocation or to prepare them to teach theological subjects."

The H.E.F. Act of 1963 sets a restriction upon government controls with the following provisions:

Federal Control Not Authorized

Sec. 407. No department, agency, officer, or employee of the United States shall, under authority of this Act, exercise any direction, supervision, or control over, or impose any requirements or conditions with respect to, the personnel, curriculum, methods of instruction, or administration of any educational institution."

These excerpts from the H.E.F. Act of 1963 clearly indicate that our Baptist colleges would be classified as eligible to receive "grants" which are provided in the act if these institutions desired to make applications for the same.

The H.E.F. Act of 1963 sets forth many other details of its provisions but we have quoted from the text only sufficiently to make the above conclusion.

The 89th Congress passed several amendments to H.E.F. Act of 1963 but did not change the section on eligibility for grants to private non-profit educational institutions nor did it change Sec. 407 pertaining to the prohibition of federal controls.

There are now well over two hundred types of assistance programs promoted by the federal government in which our Baptist colleges are eligible to participate.

30. T. K. Rucker, Field Representative, Annuity Board, spoke regarding the retirement plans and the increased benefits to be available to the participating members at no extra cost.

Voted: To adopt the report of the Annuity Board as printed in the Book of Reports.

31. Introducing the Race Relations report was Clyde Hart, Secretary, Race Relations Department.

Voted: That the report on Race Relations be adopted as printed in the Book of Reports.

Dr. Hart recognized several visitors in the session, including many of the pastors and wives from the Regular Missionary Baptist Convention, Inc., and the Consolidated Baptist Convention, in addition to Lawrence Davis, president, AM&N; C. B. Knox, Fred Guy, T. W. Cox, and Lacy Solomon, BSU Director and Bible teacher, AM&N. A concert by the choir from the AM&N College Choir included "The Lord's Prayer" and "Creation," with Robert Dansby, narrator; Eugene Parker, pianist; and James Leary, string bass. Following the introduction of the speaker by Clyde Hart,

the choir sang "The Holy City," Dorothy Page, soloist, and J. H. Jackson, President of the National Baptist Convention USA, Inc., Chicago, Illinois, brought the sermon for the hour, "The Universal Appeal of Jesus," with the text from Mark 1:44-45.

32. The meeting was adjourned with prayer by W. O. Vaught, Jr., Little Rock.

SECOND DAY—EVENING SESSION

Tuesday, November 8, 1966

(Credentials Committee Report — McClanahan Resolution — Summers Interpretation of Constitution — Christian Education Reports)

33. The session was opened with Hoyt Mulkey leading the messengers in singing, "Saviour Like A Shepherd Lead Us."

34. Earl Verser, Eudora layman, read the scripture, II Timothy 2:1-26, and led in prayer.

35. Don Hook announced the following changes in the Resolution Committee: John Maddox to serve as chairman, Harold Presley to replace Burton Miley who could not be present.

36. MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

W. V. Philliber, chairman, brought the report of the Credentials Committee. **Voted: To accept the report of the Credentials Committee.**

(a) Harlan Park Church, Conway

"We recommend that the petition of the Harlan Park Church be accepted, and their messengers be seated."

Voted: To welcome into our fellowship the Harlan Park Church, Conway, Faulkner Association, and seat their messengers.

(b) McClanahan Resolution

"WHEREAS, we the committee have listened for four hours to interested parties concerning this matter, and

"WHEREAS, the Credentials Committee has no

Constitutional authority to pass, judge, or reflect on any resolution involving any act of the 1965 convention, and

“WHEREAS, the function of the Credentials Committee is to act upon petitions for membership, Article III, Membership, Section 3,

‘The convention may appoint a committee on credentials at each session which shall make recommendations to the convention with reference to seating messengers from any church not hitherto affiliated with the convention.’

This committee is powerless to act since the Russellville Church has not sought to be received.”

(c) Summers' Interpretation to Constitution

“WHEREAS, the plea for an interpretation of the term ‘regular’ is for all practical purposes the same in content as the amendment presented by Don Hook last year which states... ‘Be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in its 112th annual session, go on record as objecting to the reception of alien immersion and the practice of open communion...’ (page 23, 1965 minutes)

“We return the resolution to the floor of the convention as was the precedent set last year.”

37. The president recognized John McClanahan, Pine Bluff, who read his resolution and moved its adoption. There was a second.

“WHEREAS the 1965 Session of the Arkansas Baptist Convention failed to approve the recommendation of the Credentials Committee, and instead voted not to seat messengers from the First Baptist Church in Russellville, and

“WHEREAS this church has maintained for the intervening year its loyalty as a regular Baptist Church in the Arkansas Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention, using Southern Baptist literature and program materials and contributing regularly to Southern Baptist World missions through the Cooperative Program, and

“WHEREAS the messengers from the First Baptist Church in Russellville were duly seated at the 1966 Session of the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Detroit, President Wayne DeHoney ruling that a move not to seat the Russellville Church was out of order on constitutional, doctrinal, and historical grounds, and

“WHEREAS messengers from the said church are deliberately not present for the sessions of this convention, having been told one year ago that they could not be seated, and

"WHEREAS this resolution is not an endorsement of the Russellville position on the church ordinances, it is a recognition of their right within historical Baptist tradition to take such action for their local church

"THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, THAT

"The 1966 Session of the Arkansas Baptist Convention go on record as inviting the First Baptist Church of Russellville to attend any remaining sessions of this convention and/or future conventions."

The chair ruled the resolution must be automatically referred to the Resolutions Committee unless the convention desires otherwise.

Voted: To deal with the resolution at this time.

John McClanahan spoke to the resolution.

Thomas A. Hinson moved the matter be tabled indefinitely in the following statement:

"Because the matter represented by the McClanahan and Summers Resolutions introduced here last night was rather thoroughly debated here last year, and because in minds of many of us nothing has really changed in the intervening time and because many of us feel than another debate on this matter will only divide us more, I move that the matter of Dr. McClanahan's resolution, Brother Summers' Resolution and the portion of the Credential Committee's report dealing with either of these matters be tabled indefinitely." There was a second.

Voted: To table the matter indefinitely.

38. Frank Taylor, Malvern, moved that the following men, Dale Jackson, Harrison; Roy Hilton, El Dorado; S. M. Williamson, Strong; Ray Palmer, Clarendon; and Paul Roberts, Little Rock, be elected by the convention as a committee to bring back to the first session of the 1967 convention a recommended change as to the election of our state Executive Board. There was a second but the motion was DEFEATED.

39. A motion to extend the time for Miscellaneous Business was DEFEATED. By common consent Glynn McCalman, Little Rock, was granted by personal privilege four minutes for a statement.

40. The president read the following telegram from the chairman of deacons of First Baptist Church, Forrest City, and said acknowledgement that had been requested would be sent.

"Rev. Don Hook, President
Arkansas Baptist State Convention
Second Baptist Church,
Little Rock, Arkansas

"We, of the First Baptist Church of Forrest City, Arkansas, would like to employ this means of expressing to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention now in session a firm protest against and disapproval of the action taken by the convention last evening, November 7, 1966, in regard to releasing all claims to the Baptist Medical Center to the Board of Trustees of the same. We feel that this matter of business was purposely scheduled at a time when true representation of Arkansas Baptists would not be present. We feel that the action was taken without Arkansas Baptists being adequately informed and we feel that the action was from an autocratic, political viewpoint rather than a democratic, Christian viewpoint.

"As the matter now stands, we are seriously considering the withdrawal of our contribution through the Cooperative Program. We therefore urge upon the convention to seriously pray and to consider rescinding the action taken last evening.

39. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

James E. Tull, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina, spoke on theological education.

Marvin Green, chairman, Board of Trustees, introduced the Ouachita University portion of the report. The Ouachita Choir sang two selections under the direction of Charles Wright. Johnny Heflin, president of the Ouachita student body, told why he was glad he chose Ouachita. Dr. Bob Riley, professor, Ouachita, spoke from the faculty viewpoint.

Voted: To adopt the report of Ouachita Baptist University as printed in the Book of Reports.

H. E. Williams, President, Southern Baptist College, spoke to the report of the college, following the Southern Baptist College Choir who sang, "Let Thy Holy Presence," with James Smith, soloist, and "Now I Belong to Jesus." The choir was directed by Amon Baker with Pat Higgs, accompanist.

Voted: To adopt the report of Southern Baptist College as printed in the Book of Reports.

40. Voted: To adopt the report of the Radio and Television Commission as printed in the Book of Reports.

Andrew Hall, Fayetteville, introduced a short film produced by the Radio and TV Commission, "The Shape of Imagination."

41. Maria Bishop, Nashville, Ouachita student, sang "Is Your Heart Right With God?" and Ralph A. Phelps, Jr., president of Ouachita University, brought the closing message of the day, "Orthodoxy and Orthopraxy," using a text from Luke 6.

42. The session was adjourned with prayer by Johnny Jackson, Little Rock.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION

Wednesday, November 9, 1966

(Vote affirmed — Executive Board Reports — 1967 Budget)

43. The session was opened by Harold White, First Vice President, and Hoyt Mulkey led the messengers in singing "Higher Ground."

44. Eddie Davis, Lepanto layman, read the scripture, Proverbs 1: 1-9 and led in prayer.

Voted: To pass the reading of the Journal and the Secretary be authorized to make such corrections as may be discovered.

45. J. T. Elliff, Secretary, Missions-Evangelism Department, introduced the following staff members of his department for brief reports on their work: W. H. Heard, chaplain, Arkansas Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Booneville; LeRoy Patterson, pastor, Alexander, and part-time chaplain, Girls' Training School; E. A. Richmond, chaplain, Boys' Training School, Pine Bluff. Special recognition was given to Rev. and Mrs. Boyd Baker, retired chaplain at the State Sanatorium and Mrs. Charles Finch, widow of the late chaplain there. Kenneth Parker, Arkana Mission, White River Association, and Wes Kent, Snowball community, Stone-Van Buren-Searcy Association, spoke concerning the work they are doing through the student preaching ministry of the Missions Department. David Stephens, Tillar, reported on the Church Development program used in Trinity Church, Searcy, during his pastorate there. Dale Barnett spoke on the work he is now doing through rural missions and Jesse Reed, director of Evangelism, spoke of his recent trip to the World Evangelism Conference in Berlin.

Voted: To adopt the report of Missions-Evangelism as printed

in the Book of Reports with the exception of the recommendation of the Director of Evangelism concerning the Crusade of the Americas.

46. Ralph Douglas, Associate Executive Secretary, brought the stewardship report. Lewis Clarke, Marianna, and R. B. Crotts, Wynne, gave brief testimonies on how the stewardship program in their churches had been helped through the "Forward Program of Christian Stewardship."

Voted: To adopt the Stewardship Report as printed in the Book of Reports.

47. Woman's Missionary Union report was given by Nancy Cooper, Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

Voted: To adopt the report of Woman's Missionary Union as printed in the Book of Reports.

48. MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

(a) Faber Tyler, layman from First, Ozark, invited the messengers of her sister churches to attend their Centennial Anniversary at Ozark, First, November 19-20, 1966.

(b) Don Hook recognized Mrs. H. A. Moore, Fort Smith, 1966 Arkansas Baptist Mother of the Year.

(c) Harold White read a telegram of greetings from the Florida convention.

(d) The following resolution was read by Amos Greer who moved it be adopted:

"WHEREAS the chair ruled on the hospital issue that only ballot #2 be used, and if a neighbor did not bring his ballot that the highest ballot in the book could be changed to #2 and used;

"THEREFORE be it resolved that the chair appoint the tellers to review the ballots on the hospital issue and disallow all ballots between #2 and the number of ballots which the president had ascertained and that all other ballots be disqualified and a true ballot on the issue be established on the basis of this recount."

The motion was seconded.

Ralph M. Cadwell, Blytheville, made a substitute motion that this body of elected messengers to the 113th annual session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention rescind the action taken concerning our Arkansas Baptist Medical Center on Monday evening, November 7, 1966.

Don Harbuck urged the matter be ruled out of order. Jack Bledsoe stated that a tabled matter could not be reconsidered. The chair ruled that a motion to rescind was in order. Don Harbuck appealed the decision of the president to the assembly, which sustained the president's ruling.

A substitute motion by Jerre Hassell, North Little Rock, to affirm the vote as reported by the tellers was seconded but ruled out of order as a negative vote on the substitute motion would be the same. Don Hook asked Harold White to preside and appealed to the body not to rescind the action. The president took the chair again and limited debate to one minute. Dale Jackson and J. T. Summers spoke for the motion to rescind.

James Overton made a substitute motion that we call a special session of the convention to deal with the matter. There was a second. Don Harbuck and W. V. Garner spoke against the special session. The chair ruled that the substitute motion for a special session was out of order and his ruling was sustained by the body.

Call for the previous question was sustained.

Voted: To take the vote on the motion to rescind.

The president ruled that a voice vote on the motion to rescind defeated the motion. Following a challenge of this ruling a standing vote was taken on the motion to rescind and the tellers reported as follows: For - 197; Against - 272.

A motion by Amos Greer for a recount was ruled out of order.

Point of order was called for.

Ralph A. Phelps, Jr. made a substitute motion that this body affirm the vote taken Monday night and the count as reported by the tellers. Second. Charles Mayo, Benton, spoke in favor of the affirming of the vote. Call for previous question was sustained.

Voted: To affirm the vote taken and the count as reported by the tellers.

49. EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

R. L. South, president, and S. A. Whitlow, Executive Secretary, with members of the Executive Board on the platform brought the recommendations of the Executive Board.

(a) Annuity Board

Carl Bunch read Recommendation #1 and moved its

adoption. Following a second the following recommendation was approved.

(1) "We recommend that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention ask the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention to abide by the written certificate contracts in the Ministers Retirement Plan and the Southern Baptist Protection Plan regarding cashouts.

"The Ministers Retirement Plan certificate states . . . (17) In case of a member who leaves the Baptist ministry to enter the service of some other denomination, or who engages in some other line of work, or who moves outside the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention, the obligation of the Retirement fund shall be limited to the return of the accumulated credits of such member as of the date of the termination of the service within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention.'

"The Southern Baptist Protection Plan certificate states '(21) Withdrawal from Service — In the case of a member who leaves the service of the Southern Baptist Convention, membership in this plan may be retained. No further payments may be made under the plan and the provisions of the plan regarding annuity payments shall apply. If, however, at the time of withdrawal, the member may so demand he may return his certificate for cancellation and the obligation under the Protection Plan shall be limited to the return of sixty per centum (60%) of the member contributions with interest credited at such rate as may be determined from time to time by the Annuity Board to the date of termination of his service within the Southern Baptist Convention.'

"The new Southern Baptist Protection Plan certificate being issued as of April 1, 1966, states '(20) Withdrawal from Service — In the case of a member who leaves the service of the Southern Baptist Convention, membership in this plan will be retained. No further payments may be made under the plan, and the provisions of the Plan regarding retirement income benefits shall apply.' "

(2) "The following items are recommended to offer substantial increases in retirement benefits, disability benefits, and death benefits with no change in cost to the state conventions; will simplify participation by the member since he will hold one certificate regardless of where he serves in the Southern Baptist Convention; and will result in actuarial strength, both from a larger spread of lives which helps mortality, and uniting the resources of all plans together giving added financial stability.

"I. That all our state plans be merged with like plans of other states and that all plans thusly merged be administered hereafter on a Southern Baptist Convention-wide basis.

"II. That the present member of the Southern Baptist

Protection Plan be transferred as of July 1, 1967 or January 1, 1968 to the new Southern Baptist Protection Program.

"III. That the new Program be promoted through the individual churches, urging them to put up 10% of the pastor's salary toward his family protection, it being understood that the convention's pro rata cost will be the same as it is now.

"IV. That this Convention pledge to actively promote this program and that it will seek to maintain and improve as a minimum its present percentage of participation and its present level of average age (not lower than the Southern Baptist Convention level) and that, in the event it fails to do so, this convention recognize and absorb any actuarial liability caused by such failure to do so. (The convention already has this obligation.)

"V. That each church may, at its own election, pay dues on a \$4,000 salary basis even though the pastor's salary is less than \$4,000."

(b) Arkansas Baptist Medical Center Request

Recommendation #2 was not read as this matter was approved in the Monday night session.

(c) Ouachita Baptist University

Hugh Owen read Recommendation #3 and moved its adoption. Following a second the following recommendation was approved.

"We recommend that the Trustees of Ouachita Baptist University be granted permission to sell up to \$2,000,000 worth of first mortgage bonds to construct buildings and additions on the Arkadelphia campus."

(d) Proposed Budget for 1967

R. L. South reviewed briefly the budget proposal for 1967 and moved its adoption. Second and carried. (See page 54)

(e) Cooperative Program

Wilson Deese read Recommendation #5 and moved its adoption. Following a second the following recommendation was approved.

"(a) That we ask our churches to make a 10% increase in 1967 to the Cooperative Program

"(b) That June 12-16, 1967 be designated as Cooperative Program Week, and

"(c) That October 15, 1967 be called 'Catch-Up Sunday' and churches which have made no contributions to the Cooperative Program during the year will be urged to make an offering."

(f) Budget Allocation for Arkansas Baptist Medical Center

Tal Bonham read Recommendation #6 and moved its adoption. "Since the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center's request was granted by the convention, we recommend that the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center allocations in the 1967 budget be transferred:

One-half to 'Camp Indebtedness'

One-half to 'Ministerial Education' to include ministers, their wives and children,

And that the schools (Ouachita and Southern) work with the Finance Committee of the Executive Board in the administration of funds for ministerial education through 1967." There was a second.

James C. Miller, Parkin, made a substitute motion that the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center allocation be transferred one half to Arkansas Baptist Home for Children and one half to Ministerial Aid. Motion died for lack of a second. The recommendation of the Executive Board was adopted.

Leslie Riherd read recommendation #7 and moved its adoption. There was a second and the following request from Jesse Reed, Director of Evangelism, was approved:

“Southern Baptists are working with other Baptists of the Western Hemisphere to launch a great evange-

listic effort in 1969. It is called "The Crusade of the Americas."

"As Director of Evangelism, I urgently request the Executive Board to recommend to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting at Second Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas, November 7-9, 1966, that we participate in "The Crusade of the Americas" in 1969. I further recommend that the date for the east half of the state be March 16-30, and the west half, April 6 - Easter (April 20)."

Voted: To adopt the report of the Executive Board in its entirety as amended.

50. Following special music by the Ladies' Trio, Calvary Church, Little Rock, "The Haven of Rest," James G. Harris, pastor, University Church, Fort Worth, Texas, brought the closing sermon of the session, "Southern Baptists and Heresy," and led in prayer.

51. The session was adjourned in prayer by J. I. Cossey, Harrisburg.

THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, November 9, 1966

Nominating Committee Report — Study Committee Progress Report)

52. The session was opened with Thomas A. Hinson, Second Vice President, presiding, and Max Alexander, North Little Rock, led the messengers in singing, "Jesus is all the World to Me." Jay Heflin, Little Rock layman, read the scripture, Philippians 4:4-13, and led in prayer.

53. Ed F. McDonald, Jr., Executive Secretary, Arkansas Baptist Foundation, brought the report of the Foundation.

Voted: To accept the report and recommendation of the Arkansas Baptist Foundation as printed in the Book of Reports.

54. Erwin L. McDonald, editor, brought the report of the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine.

55. Harry Brewer, Jonesboro, along with other officers and past presidents of the State Brotherhood Convention, paid tribute to Nelson Tull, retiring Brotherhood Secretary. A check for the purchase of a color television and an appropriate plaque honoring the more than 20 years of faithful service were presented to Mr. Tull. Lucien Coleman, Sr., Associate Secretary, Brotherhood Commission, Memphis, Tennessee, spoke in behalf of the Brotherhood Commission. R. L. South read a letter from the Executive Board and Dr. James Sawyer, Benton, led in prayer.

56. Dillard Miller, Mena, chairman, read the report of the Nominating Committee.

Voted: To adopt the report of the Nominating Committee.

57. Announcement was made of the meeting of the Executive Board to elect a president immediately following the close of the afternoon session.

58. Loyd L. Hunnicutt, Magnolia, chairman, of the Study Committee appointed by the 1965 convention, brought a progress report of his committee assisted by several members of the committee, W. R. Vestal, Monticello; Emil Williams, Jonesboro; Jerre Hassell, North Little Rock; and Hoyle Haire, Booneville. No action was taken.

PROGRESS REPORT OF STUDY COMMITTEE

Since the purpose and duties of the Study Committee were not specifically stated in the recommendation adopted by the Convention in its annual meeting in 1965, the committee invited the Executive Secretary, President of the Convention, and the President of the Executive Board to counsel with us at our initial meeting.

The conclusion reached by this committee as to its purpose and duties is that—due to the rapid growth and expanding financial needs of the institutions and departments of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, and the possibility of their being without available sufficient funds to meet their needs, we should:

- (1) Make a detailed study of the needs, and
- (2) Suggest some general guidelines for the operation of the institutions and departments regarding finances.

In order to determine the needs, the chairman of this committee, with one or more members of the committee, met with the

administrators of the various institutions and the Executive Secretary, requesting that a study be made of each institution and department on a ten-year projection, and that the Study Committee be furnished with copies of their reports. Specifically did we ask for objectives, estimated cost, and sources of income.

All institutional administrators and their respective boards of trustees, and the Executive Secretary with the heads of all departments, graciously and readily complied with the committee's request, providing us with elaborate reports of their projected plans, reports which would require a few hours to read.

In our progress report this year, your committee is endeavoring to present only a summary of these reports with any financial problems they may entail.

The committee has been divided into sub-committees in order that a more detailed study might be made of each institution and department, and to bring brief progress reports.

The Study Committee has been unable thus far to arrive at a satisfactory projection of Capital Needs.

This committee plans to bring its final report to the 1967 meeting of the Convention with some suggested guidelines for the operation of the agencies of the Convention regarding finances. In order to do this, we hope to have several area meetings where all interested parties may come together for more complete information and share ideas and suggestions. It is our conviction that in praying for divine guidance and in the exchange of ideas, a solution can be found for financial problems which may exist, and that safe guidelines can be established for the successful future operation of the Convention's institutions and departments.

Operating on the idea that the Home will continue as a home of institutional care, we anticipate an increase of 25% from the Cooperative Program by 1976. The annual increase in money will be equivalent to 5% per year on a total from the Cooperative Program for operation of the Home by 1976 of \$125,000. This will include a projection of the present plans which have been projected by the Board of Foster Home program to begin within this ten year period of time.

I. The Aims of the Institution—Objectives Over a Ten Year Period

Faculty Salary Increases: from \$25,000 to \$50,000 increase per year striving for a base salary of \$7,500 to \$8,000.

No possibility of attaining or requiring four year status is foreseen. It is the thought of the administration that the school serves a unique purpose in the field of Junior College.

The projected enrolment for the school is a little over a thousand students. The present enrolment is in the neighborhood of nine hundred. There is no thought of increasing much beyond one thousand. The administration is giving careful thought to a method of limiting the enrolment to this figure. Possible methods are now under study and will be revealed shortly. Thus, the school's enrolment is now very near ceiling for the indefinite future.

II. Sources of Income

The dormitories will be self-liquidating projects and funds are anticipated from private sources to take care of these needs.

The Science complex, Fine Arts Building and Auditorium are to be paid for in the current campaign. Sources for payment for the Administration Building, class room building, faculty housing, endowment, etc. will come from sources yet unknown.

The increase for faculty salaries will come from increased fees and contributions from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, Arkansas Foundation of Associated Colleges and other groups.

III. Expected Income From the Cooperative Program

Southern Baptist College now has an operating budget of \$831,000 and receives \$80,000 from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. By 1976 the anticipated budget will be \$1,350,000. At that time it is expected that the school will receive \$134,000 from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. At the present time, then, approximately ten per cent of the school's operating budget is furnished by the Convention. The ten-year projection calls for an increase in the operating budget of some \$500,000. At the same time, it is expected that the Convention's assistance to the school will increase by \$50,000; thus the percentage of approximately ten percent now being supplied will be consistent through this next ten year period. The school anticipates no more than a total of ten percent of the present operating budget to be furnished by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. The average support received from such sources by other members of the A.F.A.C. is fourteen percent of the operating budget. At the same time, students' fees are less than the average.

**Report of Sub-Committee on
Ouachita Baptist University**

Ouachita is projected to have 2123 students in 1977. This will be an increase of some 338 students. The University is facing enlargement which is necessary for the expanding student body. There are \$1,825,000 in immediate needs. These include:

Addition to Hamilton Moses Science Hall	\$ 350,000
Dormitory for 300 men	975,000
Major class room building	400,000
Renovation of Cone-Bottoms Dormitory	100,000

There are of course long range needs which could come up quickly should enrollments take an unexpected jump. This includes:

Apartments for 75 married students	\$ 375,000
Student Center Enlarged	200,000
Dormitory for 300 women	975,000
New Auditorium	500,000
Renovation of Mitchell Hall	100,000
Total	\$2,150,000

It must be remembered these are only approximate amounts. For instance, the Verser Speech and Drama Center was begun with an estimated cost of \$125,000. But \$165,000 now looks more like the approximate figure.

Ouachita University draws its funds from several sources:

- Student fees
- Endowment income
- Gifts
- Grants
- Auxiliary enterprises
- Cooperative Program

The Cooperative Program contributes 14% of the operating budget. In order to care for anticipated needs there is a projection that the operating cost will need to be increased 20% per year—10% coming from the Cooperative Program and 10% coming from a combination of all other sources. This means that by 1977 Ouachita will be expecting \$535,000 from Cooperative Program money.

**Report of Sub-Committee on
The Executive Board**

Objective: The Executive Board of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention has as its objective for the next ten years an expanding of its programs in every field of its endeavor. The Programs of the Executive Board are: Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine, Baptist Student Union, Baptist Brotherhood, Church Music, Baptist Foundation, Missions-Evangelism, Race Relations, Stewardship-Promotion, Sunday School, Training Union, and Woman's Missionary Union. In addition to the above, the Administration of the Executive Board will also expand in both personnel and expenditure.

Added personnel over the next ten years are anticipated as follows: Baptist Foundation and Stewardship-Promotion will add one (1) new worker each. The Administration, Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine, Brotherhood, Church Music, Race Relations, Training Union, and WMU Departments will add two (2) new workers each.

The Sunday School Department will increase by five (5) new workers. The Missions-Evangelism Department, and the Baptist Student Union expect an increase of seven (7) each in their personnel requirements.

This makes a total of 35 additional personnel expected to be needed ten years hence, i.e., 1976.

In actual dollar and cents, not including our Southern Baptist Convention causes, the Executive Board Programs will increase from \$661,149 in 1967 to \$1,419,318 in 1976. Capital Needs will increase from \$128,751 to \$199,733 during this same period of time.

Cost of Objectives: The percentage of yearly increase in financial requirements to meet this expanding program, is set at 5%, plus \$35,000 each year to pay for the 35 needed new personnel. This indicates that it will require an average of \$10,143 for each new worker.

Anticipated Income: The Executive Secretary estimates that Cooperative Program receipts will increase at a yearly rate of 5%. He also estimates that an additional \$35,500 annual increase will be available to secure the proposed 35 additional personnel. This estimate of rate of increase appears to be realistic inasmuch as the rate of increase in Cooperative Program receipts for the last nine (9) years has been 5.10% annually, including the first seven (7) months of 1966.

In actual dollars and cents, our entire Cooperative Program receipts are estimated to increase from the proposed budget of 1967 of \$2,366,110 to \$4,069,476 in 1976.

Source of Income: The source of the income for all of these

programs will be derived from the Cooperative Program and the special offerings that may be taken from time to time.

ADMINISTRATION

A total of \$1,401,829.31 has been received through the Cooperative Program for the first eight months of this year. This represents an approximate increase of ten percent over that of the comparable period of last year. This is an all-time high in mission giving through the Cooperative Program for this period of time. In the proposed budget for 1967 the percentage giving to the Southern Baptist Convention has been increased by $\frac{1}{2}$ percent, or to 37 $\frac{1}{2}$ percent. This is made possible because of the good response on the part of a number of our churches to the Convention's recommendation last year of a 10 percent increase in 1966.

PERSONNEL

During the year Mr. Doyle "Windy" Burke has come to the Baptist Student Union Department as city-wide director of Little Rock. He also assists Dr. Logue in the Little Rock office.

The Rev. Dale Barnett joined the Department of Missions-Evangelism September 1, 1966 as a rural mission worker for north central Arkansas. He will give assistance in the Church Development Ministry.

Dr. Ralph Douglas has assumed added responsibilities in servicing the programs at our Paron Camp and Siloam Springs Assembly. In doing this, Mr. John Cutsinger assumed added responsibilities as Director of Public Relations. This is a work that has long been needed in the life of our Convention.

IMPROVEMENTS ON CAMP AND ASSEMBLY

A new swimming pool has been added to the "Hart of the Hills" camp used by the Department of Race Relations and some repairs have been made on some of the buildings at Siloam Springs Assembly. One of our most pressing needs is the completion of Camp Paron to bring it into full capacity use.

RETIREMENT POLICY

The Executive Board has revised its retirement policy to make it permissible for Board employees to retire at age 62 and mandatory at age 65. The time for retirement is at the end of the year of one's 65th birthday.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. Annuity Board

1. "We recommend that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention ask the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention to abide by the written certificate contracts in the Ministers Retirement Plan and the Southern Baptist Protection Plan regarding cashouts.

"The Ministers Retirement Plan certificate states . .' (17) In case of a member who leaves the Baptist ministry to enter the service of some other denomination, or who engages in some other line of work, or who moves outside the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention, the obligation of the Retirement fund shall be limited to the return of the accumulated credits of such member as of the date of the termination of the service within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention.'

"The Southern Baptist Protection Plan certificate states '(21) Withdrawal from Service — In the case of a member who leaves the service of the Southern Baptist Convention, membership in this plan may be retained. No further payments may be made under the plan and the provisions of the plan regarding annuity payments shall apply. If, however, at the time of withdrawal, the member may so demand he may return his certificate for cancellation and the obligation under the Protection Plan shall be limited to the return of sixty per centum (60%) of the member contributions with interest credited at such rate as may be determined from time to time by the Annuity Board to the date of termination of his service within the Southern Baptist Convention.'

"The new Southern Baptist Protection Plan certificate being issued as of April 1, 1966, states '(20) Withdrawal from Service — In the case of a member who leaves the service of the Southern Baptist Convention, membership in this plan will be retained. No further payments may be made under the plan, and the provisions of the Plan regarding retirement income benefits shall apply.'

2. The following items are recommended to offer substantial increases in retirement benefits, disability benefits, and death benefits with no change in cost to the state conventions; will simplify participation by the member since he will hold one certificate regardless of where he serves in the Southern Baptist Convention; and will result in actuarial strength, both from a larger spread of lives which helps mortality, and uniting the resources of all plans together giving added financial stability.

"I. That all our state plans be merged with like plans of other states and that all plans thusly merged be administered hereafter on a Southern Baptist Convention-wide basis.

"II. That the present member of the Southern Baptist Protection Plan be transferred as of July 1, 1967 or January 1, 1968 to the new Southern Baptist Protection Program.

"III. That the new Program be promoted through the individual churches, urging them to put up 10% of the pastor's salary toward his family protection, it being understood that the convention's pro rata cost will be the same as it is now.

"IV. That this Convention pledge to actively promote this program and that it will seek to maintain and improve as a minimum its present percentage of participation and its present level of average age (not lower than the Southern Baptist Convention level) and that, in the event it fails to do so, this convention recognize and absorb any actuarial liability caused by such failure to do so. (The convention already has this obligation.)

"V. That each church may, at its own election, pay dues on a \$4,000 salary basis even though the pastor's salary is less than \$4,000."

2. Arkansas Baptist Medical Center

"WHEREAS, Arkansas Baptist Medical Center in Little Rock, Arkansas, is a public non-profit hospital corporation organized and existing by the authority and under the sponsorship of Baptist State Convention of Arkansas, pursuant to the statutes and laws of the State of Arkansas; and,

"WHEREAS, under the protection of this Convention, and subject to legitimate controls historically exercised by it, Arkansas Baptist Medical Center, since its establishment, has expanded its services to the ill and the halt so that it now has become a great health complex serving the needs of all people of the State without discrimination and regardless of financial means or lack of them; and,

"WHEREAS, the founding and continued growth of Arkansas Baptist Medical Center have been made possible by unstinted contribution of resources, both human and material, emanating from the Baptist denomination in Arkansas, the public generally, those engaged in the healing arts, the men and women who voluntarily have applied their time and talents to the building of a great institution, the dedicated trustees who wisely have created policies and the administrative personnel who have artfully applied those policies to the myriad daily tasks of operating a vast hospital and many others who have been devoted to its humane purposes; and,

"WHEREAS, Arkansas Baptist Medical Center is so firmly rooted in the institutional soil of this State that its perpetual existence as an agency of succor is assured, and this Convention may now dedicate itself and its material resources to other institutional beneficiaries under its aegis;

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

"I. That Baptist State Convention of Arkansas hereby does declare that Arkansas Baptist Medical Center henceforth is, and forever shall be, a body corporate independent of this Convention, solely under the control of its Board of Trustees and membership, fully discharged of responsibility to or control of this Convention.

"II. That Baptist State Convention of Arkansas henceforth relinquishes all its dominion of, and its rights and powers in anywise pertaining to, Arkansas Baptist Medical Center, and it acknowledges that it no longer asserts, and shall not have

henceforth, control of any of the property, real, personal or mixed, of Arkansas Baptist Medical Center, the complete powers and right to hold and alienate which are vested entirely in its Board of Trustees, all subject to the restriction, hereby imposed, that Arkansas Baptist Medical Center shall be forever under the control of a Board of Trustees composed wholly and entirely of Convention Baptists, and that no person other than a Convention Baptist shall be elected to membership on the Board of Trustees or shall be eligible to serve thereon, or upon the controlling Board of Arkansas Baptist Medical Center by whatever title said Board hereafter may be designated and known. The restriction hereby imposed shall constitute, and it is, a covenant running with this relinquishment of control, and should the same be not strictly observed by the membership of Arkansas Baptist Medical Center and by its Board of Trustees, however hereafter designated and known, then the control of said institution and its properties then had and held, as heretofore exercised by this Convention, shall revert to this Convention.

"But no reverter hereunder shall be with prejudice to any obligation incurred or assumed by Arkansas Baptist Medical Center, nor shall any mortgage, deed of trust, financing statement, or other encumbrance of its properties, however heretofore or hereafter made and for whatever term the same may endure, nor any renewal of the same, be invalid or defended by this convention notwithstanding an event shall occur which shall warrant a reversion hereunder; it being expressly hereby declared that no person, association, corporation or other entity need look to the composition of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Baptist Medical Center for the purpose of ascertaining whether the conditions and covenant of this resolution have been kept and performed by it.

"III. That this Convention retains, as will ever be so, its sense of pride in and good will toward Arkansas Baptist Medical Center as an institution of high merit devoted to the service of our Lord.

"IV. The Secretary of this Convention is authorized and directed to certify and transmit to the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Baptist Medical Center a true copy of this resolution as evidence of the action herein prescribed and taken."

3. Ouachita Baptist University

That the Trustees of Ouachita Baptist University be granted permission to sell up to \$2,000,000 worth of first mortgage bonds to construct buildings and additions on the Arkadelphia campus.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST ASSEMBLY AND PARON CAMP

This year Arkansas Baptist Assembly at Siloam Springs registered 2,063 people. This is 185 more than registered last year.

In fact, the budget for 1967 will include about \$1,000 of Cooperative Program money. The other money for the budget will be made in renting to other religious groups.

When you consider the far-reaching influence of the Assembly for good, you can readily see that Arkansas Baptists get full value for each dollar put into this program.

Paron Camp

Paron Camp is operated on a twelve-month basis. The R.A.'s and G.A.'s use it during the summer and denominational and church groups use it during the winter.

This camp needs expanded facilities and this expansion is keeping pace with the available money.

A sincere request—pray for the ministries of the assembly and camp and give us sincere suggestions as to how the services can be improved.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The year of 1966 has been one of the best for your Arkansas Baptist Foundation. Our assets have now exceeded \$200,000. ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE

As of September 15, 1966, a total of 765 churches of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention were sending the *Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine* to all of their members, through the Church Budget plan. This was an increase of 18 over the 747 churches having the paper in their budgets a year ago.

The paper also shows a substantial gain in circulation, the total circulation being 58,324 as of September 15 this year as compared with 56,777 a year ago—an increase of 1,553.

In the interest of improving its reader appeal, the *Newsmagazine* recently underwent a "face-lifting" in a week-end conference

between the paper's staff and Journalist Wesley M. (Pat) Pattillo of the staff of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky.

Two new features have been added recently: a sports column, "Outdoors with Doc," by Dr. Ralph A. Phelps, Jr., president of Ouachita Baptist University, and a Life-and-Work Sunday School commentary, by Dr. L. H. Coleman, pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church, Pine Bluff.

A book by Editor Erwin L. McDonald, announced last year—*Across the Editor's Desk*—has been published by Broadman Press, Nashville, and is now available in the Baptist Book Store. While the book was written with Southern Baptists and Baptist state papers generally in mind, it should be of particular interest to Baptists of Arkansas, since it relates particularly to the *Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine* and many of the problems the paper's editor and staff face from week to week in producing it and getting it out to the paper's subscribers.

Baptists of Arkansas are asked to keep their state paper in mind when they know of items of interest for the paper, and they are encouraged to read the paper regularly to keep themselves informed on Baptist news, doctrine, and world mission program.

MISSIONS-EVANGELISM

The year past marks the final months of ministry by Dr. C. W. Caldwell and J. T. Elliff's selection to fill the vacated position, with several months' interim between.

While these changes were taking place, the work of State Missions continued. During the past nine months, State Mission assistance has been given to 28 churches for pastoral salary aid in the amount of \$12,150; 18 associations have been assisted with missionary's salary supplement in the amount of \$14,472.50; 12 churches have received help with building aid in the amount of \$26,873.38. Several of the churches helped during the first nine months of the year had building aid approved before 1966. Please note the statement below on policy change regarding applications for building aid.*

Two mission sites have been secured with mission fund money: the Memorial Mission at Blytheville, in Mississippi County Association, and the Hulbert Church in West Memphis, Tri-County Association, at a total cost of \$3,000. Two other mission sites have been approved, and our participation is pending the completion of legal work for the property.

Chaplain W. H. Heard continues his effective ministry at the sanatorium at Booneville. Chaplain E. A. Richmond of the Boys' Training School at Pine Bluff, is within \$1,500 of raising the \$20,000 for much-needed educational space at the school for religious training. The school is to match this amount with \$20,000 to make possible the building. Rev. Leroy Patterson, pastor of Alexander Baptist Church, is giving part time to the work of the Girls' Training School.

R. A. Hill reports 12 personally-directed surveys at various places in the state, with 12 more set up for local direction. He also reports that at least 75% of Arkansas church fields have been surveyed as a result of the use of the Church Development Guidebook. At this time, Brother Hill has resigned to accept a pastorate, and his successor in this vital work is being sought.

Although we do not have a paid worker, as such, for the deaf ministry, we still make funds available for carrying on the services for the deaf, mainly through lay leadership, under the direction of Brother Joe Johnson. Three deaf people were sent to Glorieta to participate in the Convention-wide program.

Two new mission projects have been started which seem to have promise. One is the Student Preaching Program, which is the use of ministerial students in financially weak areas to maintain a Baptist witness. This program envisions the use of ministerial students from any college in the state to work under sponsoring churches or associational missionaries. The student visits and preaches on one or more church fields each week end, with the Missions Department guaranteeing \$25 honorarium per week, plus 5c mileage to and from the school and church. Financial assistance from the churches is deducted from the amount the Missions Department guarantees, so that our actual participation is usually less than the amount indicated.

The other new work is an expansion of our ministry to rural churches. Brother Dale Barnett has been added to the Missions Department staff to give his full time to holding revivals in rural churches and leading rural churches in a development ministry. His work will be confined to the northern half of the state.

Surveys are underway to determine if any further actions are needed to advance our Arkansas missions program. There are indications that we need to provide help in juvenile and ex-prisoner rehabilitation, industrial chaplaincy, and summer resort area ministry. We also possibly need some approved way whereby Arkansas churches could help foster direct mission work in pioneer areas outside the state.

The State Mission staff feels that just as we cannot achieve our full purpose as a Christian without being a daily vocal witness for Christ, so a church cannot realize its full purpose without some vital and tangible mission involvement in addition to participation through the Cooperative Program. We hope to help foster this spirit with Arkansas churches so that "missions and evangelism" will not be mere words we say but representative of the life and spirit of our work.

***Note:** The Operating Committee has set a new policy regarding allocated funds for Building Aid and Mission Sites which requires a new application for funds if the approved allocation is not called for during the calendar year.

EVANGELISM

The year 1966-67 will find Southern Baptists emphasizing "A Church Fulfilling Its Mission through Education." To aid our

churches in reaching this theme, Evangelism has a definite objective.

The objective of the Program of Evangelism Development is to work with and assist churches and associations in interpreting, promoting and properly relating the message (this includes theology of evangelism), methods, motivation, and spirit of New Testament **evangelism**.

We shall aid by promoting: associational evangelism clinics, area evangelism conferences, area evangelism crusades, January Bible Study, Soul-winning Commitment Day, training of Christian witnesses, revival preparation, orientation of new members, and pastor-led revivals in 1967.

The State-wide Evangelism Conference will be held at Second Baptist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, January 23-25. Tuesday evening, January 24, the service will be held in Convention Hall, and the emphasis will be on our youth.

Southern Baptists are working with other Baptists of the Western Hemisphere to launch a great evangelistic effort in 1969. It is called "The Crusade of the Americas."

I recommend that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, now in session at Second Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas, November 9, 1966, vote to participate in "The Crusade of the Americas" in 1969. I further recommend that the date for the east half of the state be March 16-30, and the west half, April 6-Easter (April 20).

BROTHERHOOD

1965-'66 has been a very busy year in Brotherhood on every level of work. Much of time and labor has been expended in preparations for, and in initial promotion of, the New Brotherhood Program which became effective on October 1, 1966.

In keeping with the Southern Baptist Convention assignment given in 1965 to the Brotherhood (the assignment of "Missionary Education and Mission Activities Involving Men, Young Men, and Boys"), the Brotherhood Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has been busy all year producing new materials and formulating new programs of work for men, young men, and boys. State Brotherhood Departments have been active in the development of this new program, and in beginning its promotion as it has been developed.

The connotation of the name "Brotherhood" has been changed to include the whole program of missionary education and mission activities involving the male members of Southern Baptist churches. Thus "Brotherhood" is now an over-arching word applied to the organization of Baptist Men (formerly the Brotherhood), the organization of Baptist Young Men, and the organization of Baptist Boys (Royal Ambassadors).

Every church in the Southern Baptist Convention has been asked to elect a Brotherhood Director, who will be a church officer (just as are the Sunday School Superintendent and the Training Union Director). The Brotherhood Director will work towards the organization and the enhancement of missionary education and mission action on all three levels: men, young men, and boys. A church with any one or more of the three units will be considered as having a Brotherhood. Any church desiring

Brotherhood work can begin Brotherhood organization at any point; that is, with the men, or with the young men, or with the boys. Looking objectively at Brotherhood organization, it is best to begin at the point of greatest promise or at the point of greatest need. Beginning at both points will assure the organization of Brotherhood work on at least two levels. In a church where young men are few in number the young men should be included in the organization of Baptist Men.

New Brotherhood literature includes four manuals, all of which may be obtained at the Baptist Book Store. These are: "The Brotherhood Program in a Baptist Church"; "Missionary Education for Baptist Men"; "Missionary Education for Baptist Young Men"; and "Missionary Education for Baptist Boys". The Church Brotherhood Handbook is a great help in promoting and developing all areas of Brotherhood work. The Handbook is an annual periodical, and may be secured from the Brotherhood Commission or from the Brotherhood Department. The "Guide" in a new quarterly magazine for Baptist Men and Baptist Young Men. The Royal Ambassador program continues without change except that it is now operating under an RA Leader who is a member of the Church Brotherhood Council, serving under the direction of the Church Brotherhood Director.

Associational Brotherhood work has also been changed to point the whole associational Brotherhood program towards the organization, development, and enhancement of Brotherhood work in the churches. The function of the Associational Brotherhood is now largely that of promotion, training, and enlargement, all of which have as their objective the building up of church Brotherhood work throughout the association.

Brotherhood has made much progress in Arkansas during the past year. The incentive of the New Brotherhood Program, the giving to Brotherhood of a definite field of work in the over-all denominational program (an area of work which has no conflicts with work assigned to other departments), a new and very fine spirit of cooperation among the channel organizations of Southern Baptist work and Arkansas Baptist work, have all helped to provide the greatest opportunity Brotherhood has ever had to make a very definite and much needed contribution to the growth and enhancement of the work of our churches and our denomination.

And, because of the nature of Brotherhood work, that of "Missionary Education and Mission Activities Involving Men, Young Men, and Boys", and since no other channel organization has been assigned responsibilities in this particular field, it is now of paramount necessity that every church have a Brotherhood. Surely every church, large or small, needs to give prayerful consideration to the involvement of its men, young men, and boys in mission study and mission action.

CHURCH MUSIC

The tasks assigned to the state and local music ministry are: To provide music and musicians for the congregational services and the organizations of the church; to lead persons to participate

in hymn singing; to teach music and hymnody; to train persons to lead, sing, and play music; to provide organization and leadership for special projects of the church; and to provide and interpret information regarding the work of the church and denomination.

Five areas of music needs are developed through state, district and associational channels to provide a balanced music program, including: Congregational Area, Graded Choir Area, Instrumental Area, Co-operative Ministries Area, and Administrative Area.

A church has a music ministry, and should so report it, when it: a) Elects a person to direct the music; b) Has at least one music group (choir, ensemble, quartet, etc.) that meets regularly; and c) Uses music to strengthen worship, education, and evangelism.

The Church Music Department personnel includes Hoyt A. Mulkey, secretary since November, 1963, Miss Eleanor Anne Harwell, associate since June, 1965, and Mrs. Harold Wilson, part-time office secretary. Mr. Mulkey's major responsibilities are planning and coordinating the state music festivals, the music camps, and the music for state meetings. Miss Harwell's major areas of activities are graded choir training, summer music worker program, and instrumental consultant.

- C. Summer Approved Music Worker Program—Upon request by a church or association, summer workers are sent from this department to hold one- or two-week music schools, music camps, or other types of music training. The two such workers interviewed and hired by the department for the summer of 1966 were Miss Henri Etta Bleier, a student at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and Mr. William Mack Baker, a graduate student at the University of Arkansas. Following is a report of the work of the summer approved music worker program:

- D. Festivals—Festivals are promoted for four different age groups and this program has proved to be one of the most widely approved and acclaimed programs in our state music ministry. During 1965-66 we conducted five primary festivals, five junior festivals, three youth (advanced) festivals, one youth (beginning) festival, and one adult festival. Many churches interested in organizing choirs comes to observe the festivals, later organizing for service in the local church.
- E. Summer Music Camps—A comprehensive program of music education makes up the curriculum in our two state music camps—Ouachita Music Conference for youth and adults and Junior Music Camp for juniors. Classes are included for the accompanist, the song leader, the graded choir leader, choir members, and juniors, as well as the music director and minister of music. Outstanding church musicians continue to comprise the camp faculties. Star campers at Ouachita who received a scholarship to Ridgecrest Music Week were Emma Kay Stogsdill, Park Hill, North Little Rock, and Leroy Beard, First, Clarendon. At Junior Music Camp a fund was begun to secure handbells for music missionary, Rev. Fred Spann, who was camp pastor while on furlough from Brazil. To date approximately \$300 has been received from churches and individuals in the state.

III. 1966-67 Major Points of Music Emphasis

In addition to the regular calendarized events for 1966-67, the department seeks to make major strides in the following areas:

- A. To encourage each church to report its music ministry enrolment in the Annual Church Letter to the Association. Our goal is for 594 (or 50%) of the churches to make such report by October 1967.
 - B. To communicate to more associations and churches the various types of assistance offered by the department. The secretary and associate will continue visiting in the districts, and district and associational workers will be utilized more in this area.
 - C. To conduct more graded choir clinics on associational and local levels, as this seems to be a prime need in the music ministry.
 - D. To expand and strengthen the newly organized state music committees.
 - E. To develop a music department publication to disseminate music news and information which will replace such items formerly communicated through the *Religious Education News*.
 - F. To emphasize church-related vocations at Ouachita Music Conference because of the great demand for staff workers in all areas throughout the Southern Baptist Convention.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

The purpose or objective of the program of Sunday School promotion is to assist the churches establish, enlarge and improve their Sunday School program which is: to teach the Biblical revelation; to lead in reaching all prospects for the church; to lead all church members to worship, witness, learn and minister daily; to provide organization and leadership for special projects of the church; and to provide and interpret information regarding the work of the church and denomination.

The secretary, Lawson Hatfield, relates primarily to local church assistance, Church Architecture, associational promotion, and Vacation Bible School, and specializes in Adult, Young People's and Intermediate departments of work.

Mrs. Mary Emma Humphrey, the Elementary Consultant, relates primarily to the promotion of training, standards and Week Day Bible Study and specializes in Nursery, Beginner, Primary, Junior, Cradle Roll and Extension departments of work.

Mrs. Bert Haley is the office secretary.

Beyond the Baptist Building the work is promoted by 11 Area Sunday School Consultants and by the 43 Associational Sunday School organizations.

The 11 Area Consultants and their assigned four associations (three in one area) are as follows:

The method of planning the work in the department is known as program planning. The structure of the Sunday School program is divided into three major divisions; study, planning and field service.

The following report is for a twelve month period, October 1965 through September 1966.

1. Study

In order to know how to plan work to meet the needs of the churches, the department constantly seeks to discover the needs of the churches and associations. The evaluation of needs is discovered through personal conversation, conference evaluation forms and mail out surveys.

Several studies have been completed including a study of youth teaching needs in churches and youth conference needs in associations. Returns reveal wide use of group graded literature, but infrequent weekly Officers and Teachers meetings in most churches. Another study of church visitation programs reveals that many promote visitation but few churches observe a regular visitation day. Few churches maintain and use an up to date Prospect file.

One major study dealt with the results of a director-led enlargement campaign conducted in 1965 in the Little Rock area. Of 23 churches surveyed 16 reported an average net gain of 19, an excellent growth report from these churches.

Department workers read and studied regular Bible lessons, denominational literature and programming materials.

In addition three books specializing in creativity were read.

2. Planning

Department personnel participated in two annual planning meetings with Baptist Sunday School Board Sunday School Department leaders. One meeting in the spring majors on long range planning and a December meeting has an emphasis on the immediate and following year's program.

State planning and calendar scheduling is done in correlation with other Religious Education departments and with the other Executive Board program leaders under the direction of Dr. S. A. Whitlow, executive secretary.

3. Field Services

About sixty percent of the department's resources, including time and budget is spent in field services. The following paragraphs reveal much that has been done "on the field."

Five associations have been involved in Elementary Conferences for Nursery, Beginner and Primary workers with 15 churches and 125 persons enrolled. The State Elementary Workshop was conducted in cooperation with the Woman's Missionary Union, Training Union and Church Music Departments. The Workshop was held one day each at Hope, Paragould, Pine Bluff and Fort Smith. There were 400 registered from 77 churches and 28 associations. One hundred of these were new workers. 13 one-day Elementary Workshops were conducted, training 100 elementary workers.

Six state approved age-group workers were trained at Glorieta or Ridgecrest. Eight of eleven Sunday School area consultants were also trained at Glorieta or Ridgecrest. Ten associational Sunday School superintendents and several associational missionaries also attended Sunday School leadership weeks at one of the assemblies.

The State Bible Conference for Pastors and all Sunday School workers registered 500 from 121 churches in 31 Associations.

Associational officers elected and trained totaled 262 or 43% of a potential 602. 41 associations had a superintendent.

Eight associational training schools with 710 enrolled from 120 churches were held in Dardanelle-Russellville, Gainesville, Faulkner, Arkansas Valley, Buckner, Carroll, White River and Black River associations.

Two local church enlargement campaigns plus one associational director-led campaign, in Harmony Association and one Sunday School witnessing campaign were conducted with 21 churches participating.

Twenty-nine individual church and 26 associational conferences have been conducted.

Two Sunday School weeks at Siloam Assembly totaled an enrolment of 1,384 including 131 in leadership courses. About 20 workers attended a special Sunday School course the first (Training Union) week or a total of 151 leaders trained. All three weeks

revealed 50 conversions, 485 rededications and 194 church related vocations, a total of 729 decisions.

Three regional state Vacation Bible School clinics were conducted reaching and training 80 associational team members and 237 additional local church workers. Forty associations reported conducting clinics with 643 churches and 395 pastors and 4,012 in attendance.

Seventy-five churches opened files on Church Building consultation and were referred to Church Architecture department of the Southern Baptist Convention for further assistance.

The Sunday School Department planned a correlated state Life and Work Curriculum Interpretation Clinic with 36 associations represented and 224 registered. These teams conducted clinics in churches and in their associations.

Extensive promotion of the Church Growth Plan has been launched.

Thank you for what you did in Sunday School work in this report period. It has and will help reach, teach and win others to Christ and His Church.

TRAINING UNION

Personnel

The Arkansas Baptist Training Union Department has as its secretary, Ralph W. Davis. On October 1, 1966, James A. Griffin began his fourth year as associate in the department. Mrs. Pat Elder is office secretary and Mrs. Evelyn Eubank is part time secretary.

Enrollment

The latest available figures are those taken from the report of the churches in the fall of 1965. At that time there were 1188 churches in Arkansas with 982 having Training Union and 206 not having Training Union. These 982 churches report a Training Union enrollment of 94,032.

Enlarged Scope

The promotion of Training Union during the past year has been in keeping with the three divisions of Training Union. The churches have been encouraged to have three separate Training Unions at the same time. One division of training is for new members with materials available for separate age groups. Another division of training is for potential leaders with materials provided on a basis of twenty six sessions. The third division for regular members is also conducted on Sunday night.

Campaigns and Leadership Schools

During the first nine months of 1966 associational leadership

schools were held in the following associations: Gainesville, Current River, Carey, Rocky Bayou, Black River, Independence, Ouachita, Liberty, Red River and Benton County.

Church enlargement campaigns were conducted in the following churches: Matthews Memorial, Graves Memorial, Markham Street, First Church, Piggott.

In these schools and campaigns the following leaders were trained: General Officers 163, Adults 614, Young People 112, Intermediate 163, Junior 174, Primary 60, Beginner 36, Nursery 36.

Conferences

There were 65 conferences held during the year with individual and with groups of churches.

Conventions

The State Youth Convention was conducted on April 8, 1966 at Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, with 29 associations represented and 142 churches represented with a total attendance of 1,073.

Tournaments

Junior Memory-Sword drill, Intermediate Sword drill and Speakers' Tournaments were held in the districts during March 21-25, 1966 with 99 participants.

District winners in the Intermediate Sword Drill and Speakers' Tournament participated in the state drill and tournament at the youth convention. In the state Intermediate sword drill, Nelson Gwaltney, Osceola, placed first and represented Arkansas at Ridgecrest. Linda Wallace, Immanuel, Pine Bluff was second place winner and represented Arkansas at Glorieta. In the 17-18 year Speakers' Tournament, Robert Parr, Immanuel, Rogers was first place winner and represented Arkansas at Glorieta. Ken Martin was first place winner in the 19-24 tournament and represented Arkansas at Ridgecrest.

Elementary Workshops

1. The Training Union department participated in four combined regional elementary workshops with a total attendance of 350.

2. Associational elementary workshops were conducted in Current River-Gainesville association, Clear Creek and Independence associations with 35 churches represented and the following leaders trained: Nursery, 44; Beginner, 49; Primary, 93, and 19 others. General Officers who attended were: 16 pastors, 15 directors, 4 superintendents and 45 others making a total attendance of 285.

"M" Night

"M" Night was conducted on December 6, 1965 with 786 churches represented, 629 pastors present, 524 Training Union directors present with an attendance of 11,337.

District Work

The following men have served as district representatives for the past several years: Dean Newberry, Jr., John Holston, Guy Whitney, Orville Haley, Lehman Webb, Ross Ward and D. C. McAtee. These district representatives met with the department workers in Little Rock, May 16-17, 1966 to assist in the planning in all the work of the department for the following year.

In each district there are special district age group workers, Nursery through Adults. These 64 workers are enlisted and trained by the Training Union department. During the first assembly at Siloam Springs 39 of these workers received special training. Many of these workers assisted in campaigns, conferences and leadership schools during the year.

Interpretation Clinics

During the year the district workers conducted associational interpretation clinics in 22 associations during which time they interpreted the alternate organization and the new member orientation program. The following workers were present in their conferences; General Officers 450, Adults 495, Young People and leaders 79, Intermediates and leaders 106, Junior leaders 114, Primary leaders 52, Beginner leaders 104, Nursery leaders 24, others 190, total 1614.

Personal Development

The State Training Union Secretary attended the following meetings: State Secretaries' Meeting, Nashville, December, 1965; Training Union Administration Seminar in Nashville, January 31-February 4, 1966; A called meeting at the Sunday School Board, March 4, 1966; State Secretaries' meeting in Phoenix, Arizona, March 27-31, 1966.

The Associate Training Union Secretary attended the Secretaries' meeting in Nashville in December, 1965, Southern Baptist Convention in Detroit in May and one of the Training Union weeks at Ridgecrest.

RACE RELATIONS

The Race Relations Department is a joint project of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Financial support is obtained through the Cooperative Program, Home Mission Board, W.M.U. Dixie Jackson offering and designated gifts.

The purpose of the Race Relations Department is to help our Negro Baptist friends to help themselves in developing better churches, and through a program of sharing in Christian love, to build up a better spirit of Christian goodwill and understanding.

We have had five extension classes taught in the first five months of 1966. Extension class teachers were: Rev. Don Dilday and Rev. Jim Gerrin in Lewisville; Rev. W. R. Rogers for the men's class and Mrs. W. R. Rogers for the women's class in Camden; Rev. M. W. Williams in Little Rock. The total enrolment was 198, with an average enrolment of 47; total attendance was 933, with an average of 187. Many attended classes without enrolling.

Our Hart of The Hills Camp for Negro children, located near Ferndale, has four weeks of camp each year. One week for each age group—junior boys, junior girls, intermediate boys and intermediate girls. Enrolment for 1966 was 336 (182 girls and 154 boys); 20 professions of faith and 3 dedications for Christian service.

We had seven Negro college students working as summer missionaries in Arkansas this summer. Fifteen were appointed by the Home Mission Board, seven served out of the state. A total of 64 Negro college students were appointed by Home Mission Board; out of the 64 students, 15 of them were from Arkansas. Since 1962 there have been 220 National students appointed to serve as summer missionaries from 22 states. Arkansas has had 64 of them, twice as many as any other of the 22 states.

The seven students serving in Arkansas this year worked in 20 churches holding Vacation Bible Schools with 108 professions of faith and 112 dedications of life. Total enrolment was 1,779 children.

Many churches and WMU's, as well as individuals, have been responsible for sending many of our Negro boys and girls to camp. For this we are thankful.

One of the major emphases of our work is the Baptist Student Center program, at AM&N College, Pine Bluff. Here we have a very beautiful building adequately equipped, under the direction of Rev. Lacy Solomon. We not only have a very active BSU but

Rev. Solomon teaches four classes in religion each semester, for which students can receive full credit toward their degree.

Our long range program includes the Hart of The Hills as a place for Pastor's Retreat, Sunday School, Training Union and Brotherhood meetings as well as our camp. The highest purpose being to the task of "helping our Negro people help themselves in developing better churches."—Clyde Hart, Director.

STEWARDSHIP

Everything that Baptists do is important. This is true because our programs have been wrought out through necessity and experience.

It is necessary to go make, baptize, and teach disciples. This is the great imperative of Christianity. This necessity grew out of man's sinful nature. Because of this nature, man is lost in sin. Experience has taught us to use certain methods and principles in dealing with the redeeming of man from sin and enlisting him in the service of Christ.

When any method is used outside the local church, money is needed because money is our great medium of exchange. Therefore, the stewardship of money is a necessity in our money economy.

It is feasible, then, that modern day Baptists have prayed, planned and pondered about the best way to teach stewardship. All of this has helped us to prepare for this time of money economy. The stewardship leaders have developed ideas into simple plans and elaborate programs in order to help all types of churches. One of these plans is called the *Forward Program of Christian Stewardship*, another is called *Growth in Christian Stewardship*, while yet another is called *Year-Around Stewardship*. There is also a plan to help the associations develop a Stewardship program.

About 17% of our churches used the programs last year. This is about average for the states in the Southern Baptist Convention and above average for the older states, but this is not enough.

This year some associations had a Stewardship meeting, then made plans to have a lay speaker at a Sunday service in every church in the association. These men gave their testimonies and spoke on Stewardship. We are planning to help expand this effort for 1966-67.

We urge each association to elect a Stewardship Chairman. Every association but one elected a chairman this year. Let's make it 100% for 1967.

THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

Did you ever see a haystack? Each haystack has a pole in the center around which the hay is stacked. This pole gives shape, compactness, and stability to the haystack. Without this pole the hay would soon be scattered and lose its food value.

What the pole is to a haystack, the Cooperative Program is to Southern Baptists. The Cooperative Program brings every church into the mission business. Through this plan each church member

can become a missionary wherever Baptists are preaching, teaching, and winning to Christ around the world. This includes the church, the association, the state convention, the Southern Baptist Convention, and around the world.

We urge our churches to:

1. Make a 10% increase through the Cooperative Program in 1967.

2. Observe Cooperative Program Week, June 12-16, 1967. This would be a good time to study the book, "Our Cooperative Program", by W. E. Grindstaff.

3. Use October 15, 1967, as "Catch-up Sunday." The churches that have not contributed through the Cooperative Program during the year can take an offering and send through the Cooperative Program.

For the first nine months of this year, Arkansas Baptists gave \$1,592,026.38 through the Cooperative Program. This is about a 9.77% increase. This is good. Therefore, the Operating Committee of the Executive Board is recommending an increased Cooperative Program budget for 1967.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

"Woman's Missionary Union as a church program organization places the church central in all planning and relates organizational activities to the other four program organizations to help a church fulfil its mission." In this effort the following church tasks are shared with the Brotherhood:

- I. Teach Missions
- II. Lead Persons to Participate in Missions
- III. Provide Organization and Leadership for Special Missions Projects of the Church
- IV. Provide and Interpret Information Regarding the Work of the Church and Denomination

Before people can be taught about missions and become involved in mission action, the major tasks of Woman's Missionary Union, they must be enlisted. WMU shares concern of other church organizations in the slow down in growth and is dedicated to improving its assistance to a church to help fulfill its mission and to help the convention achieve its goals. Statistics given on church letters to associations show a total of 36,000 women and young people were enrolled in the 2,843 WMU organizations reported in 710 churches.

In every community there are groups of people who will never be reached for the Lord and the church without special attention. In an effort to make members aware of those people and to prepare them for a more effective ministry through proclamation and witness a series of pamphlets (priced) were introduced during the year. They are entitled: "How to Discover Needs for Mission Action"; "How to Minister to International Students"; "How to Minister in Institutions"; "How to Minister Through Juvenile Rehabilitation"; "How to Work with Language Groups".

WMU as instigator of Weeks of Prayer and special mission offerings has traditionally provided organization and leadership for their observances. These are now church projects with church-wide participation designed to engage the entire church in missionary concern with WMU in a lead role.

The stewardship emphasis of Woman's Missionary Union has always included the teaching and practice of the tithe and acknowledgement of the Cooperative Program as having first claim on all giving. It is a source of satisfaction that along with increase in gifts through the Cooperative Program there was an average increase of 8.6% in the following special mission offerings which are recognized as a part of the observances of the Weeks of Prayer. Each is designated and administered by the respective mission board.

Two-thirds of the Dixie Jackson Offering was administered

by the Missions Department and one-third by the Race Relations Department of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

Recognitions for attainment on Aims for Advancement were awarded 813 organizations. Five churches and eleven associations reported Honor WMU's. Cards of Accreditation were issued 1,069 individuals for completion of prescribed leadership training.

Statewide activities included: Annual Meeting; WMU District Meetings (8); two-day Leadership Conference for Associational WMU leaders; two-day WMU Houseparty for Local Church leaders; YWA Houseparties (2); YWA Regional Rallies (4); GA Queens' Court. Registration for these totaled 6,094.

ANNUITY BOARD

The steady rise in cost of living has caused a pressing need for broader benefits for retirement, disability and death, so much so, the Annuity Board has created a new program to improve them.

The new program will be called the Southern Baptist Protection Program. It will be offered once all state conventions have approved it. The proposed starting date is July, 1967.

The new Program will offer substantial increases in retirement, disability and death benefits at no extra cost.

Paradoxically, the same factor which created the need for greater benefits (growth of the economy) has made it possible for the improved coverage without increasing the cost.

Two current benefits will be greatly improved. Disability benefits, previously set at a \$900 a year maximum, will be as much as the amount a person would have received if he retired at age 65.

Widow benefits will be the full 40% of the amount a person would have received if he had lived to retire at age 65. This maximum begins with the initial year of participation. Previously, widow benefits have been on a step-up formula taking six years to reach the 40% maximum. Also, there will be no increase in widow dues after age 60 as was required in the basic plan.

Three new benefits will be offered for the first time. These benefits will provide income for minor dependent children, plus a college and educational fund, and income for dependent parents.

The new Southern Baptist Protection Program will use only one certificate, although provision may cover benefits in the basic plan and two supplemental plans. Larger retirement benefits will be possible through the supplemental part.

In addition to the substantial increases in benefits, the new Program also will simplify participation. A member will hold only one certificate for all his retirement, widow and disability benefits. Neither will he have to receive a new certificate when he transfers from one state to another as is now required.

Once the state conventions have approved the new Program, the individual church will be encouraged to put a minimum of 10% of the minister's total salary into the Program for protection for both the member and his family and the church. Dues on the initial \$4,000 will be placed in the basic part of the Program. Dues on salary above the \$4,000 will be placed in one or both supplemental plans as selected by the member. New certificates will be issued to all members currently in the Southern Baptist Protection Plan. New certificates or endorsements will be issued to all members of the Ministers Retirement Plan, Widow Supplemental Annuity Plan and Ministers Security Plan.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST HISTORY COMMISSION

Organization

The Arkansas Baptist History Commission was set up by resolution in the 1960 annual session of the Convention. It is composed of nine members — one each from the eight districts and a member-at-large as chairman. The Convention elects them to a three year term; one-third rotate off each year. The 1965 session elected Dr. George T. Blackmon as Executive Secretary of the Commission for an indefinite term.

The Commission is, therefore, the agency of the Convention in the field of history with duties including of finding, collecting, preserving, and using documents of Baptists in Arkansas. Its greatest achievements have been in the area of preserving on microfilm many minutes of local associations.

Holdings

The original microfilm file turned over to the Commission in 1960 contained forty reels of 3086 minutes along with other documents. The file now has 119 reels in it. Thirty-nine reels containing 975 minutes have been added during the conventional year just ending. The Secretary has another shipment of 75 minutes to be sent for microfilming. Central Baptist College, Dr. C. N. Glover, Wolf Bayou Association of General Baptists, and the Virginia Baptist Historical Society have been most cooperative during the year in collecting minutes of Baptists Associations in Arkansas.

The Commission also holds incomplete files of bulletins by 139 local churches and of publications by 42 associations. It has histories or historical brochures of 102 churches and of 64 local associations and also over 200 biographical sketches of Baptists in Arkansas. Several bound volumes of associational minutes have been added to the collection in Riley Library during the year. The University has bound and accessioned these volumes along with volumes of Baptist publications.

Projects

The Commission in cooperation with the **Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine** has promoted the Baptist History Honor Calendar throughout the year. It has in cooperation with Riley Library continued the binding of minutes by decades to a volume. It held one semi-annual meeting in April.

It is now working toward a ten-day Baptist History Workshop for next July or August. The proposed project would be co-sponsored by Ouachita Baptist University, the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, and an underwriting foundation. Co-promoters would be invited from other Baptist groups in Arkansas. The first step toward realization of the project is to receive assurance of a large participation on the part of associations and churches among the co-promoters. We ask for the privilege to pursue this project provided an underwriting agency is enlisted.

HISTORICAL COMMISSION, SBC

The Historical Commission is a service agency of the Southern Baptist Convention, organized to assist the churches, associations, state conventions, and the Southern Baptist Convention and its agencies, in creating historical records, maintains offices in the Sunday School Board Building, 127 Ninth Avenue North, Nashville, Tennessee, and operates with the Sunday School Board the Dargan-Carver Library which is a joint library of historical and biblical resource materials.

The Commission was chartered in 1951, and succeeded the Southern Baptist Historical Society as the history agency of the Convention. The Society then became an auxiliary to the Commission with open membership to individuals who are interested in participating in the work of the Commission and the Society. The publications of the Commission keep Society members informed about the program and projects. A quarterly **Newsletter** is published, and in August, 1965, the first issue of a distinctive historical journal, **Baptist History & Heritage** was published. In 1966, two issues will be published, one in July and one in October.

The **Quarterly Review** published by the Sunday School Board carries historical materials provided by this Historical Commission in the issues for the first two quarters each year. Active members of the Society receive these publications as membership privileges along with the opportunity of the free use of the material preserved in the joint library in Nashville. Membership in the Society is \$3.00 each year.

Many of the materials preserved by the Commission in the joint library, have been procured by means of microfilm. Rare books, pamphlets, associational and state convention minutes, annuals, and periodicals, are gathered together from various sources and filmed. One aim of the Commission is to procure and preserve copies (printed or filmed) of everything written by or about Baptists. This significant collection is available for research students and historians in writing dissertations, magazine articles, or books about Baptists.

Any materials which the Commission may procure having to do with Arkansas Baptist history is made available to the Arkansas History Commission; and the Arkansas Commission makes historical materials available to the Convention-wide agency.

The Historical Commission offers consultative and advisory services to churches and associations in history-writing projects. In addition, conferences are conducted at the convention assemblies on how to write church history, and how to record and preserve more efficient records in associations and conventions.

The Executive-Secretary of the Historical Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention is Davis C. Wooley.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST HOME FOR CHILDREN

Monticello, Arkansas

D. Dean Rogers, Acting Superintendent

Every child has the right to expect an opportunity in life. Arkansas Baptists have been providing these opportunities to needy children for the past seventy-one years. This has been through our child care ministries which are designed to meet the needs of children who are unable to live in their own homes.

Child Care Ministry

We are happy to report that we have cared for one hundred twenty-seven children through our various services in the past year. One of the things we are most grateful for is the fact that we have been able to return fifteen children to their families during the past twelve months. This was done through our Social Work Services Department. When we accept a child into the Home we do not divorce him from his family. Unless there has been a court order terminating parental rights, we use every resource available to work with the family, helping them in their rehabilitation, and encouraging them to live in such a way so as to accept the responsibilities of parenthood again.

In addition to caring for children on our campus, we also have three children in Foster Homes, one girl in Southern Baptist College, and two in Ouachita Baptist University. This university and college training is made possible by a cooperative effort between the Home and the schools, and particularly by the scholarship programs provided by Dr. Ralph A. Phelps and Dr. H. E. Williams.

The above statistics only give a part of the picture, however. Limitations of finances and facilities make it necessary for all requests to be carefully screened so that those who are admitted are those who can benefit from the services we have to offer. Children having special needs such as psychiatric care, or who are physically or mentally unfit to adjust to our group program are either referred to other specialized agencies or are rejected. We had planned to open a branch office in Little Rock during 1965 so that we could do a better intake job by being nearer our major source of referrals, and have psychological testing, and psychiatric consultation available. Limited finances prevented us from taking this important step. We pray that Arkansas Baptists will recognize the Children's Home as a great mission here within our own state, and provide the resources we must have if we are to serve in the manner you expect us to.

Spiritual Ministry

Although we are constantly striving to keep abreast of modern methods of child care, we will never become unbalanced and forget ours in also a ministry to children with spiritual needs.

Our children attend the three Southern Baptist churches in Monticello, and are active in all church activities. The pastors and

members are gracious and understanding in their ministry to our children.

In each cottage where the children live, daily devotionals are held, and the children are encouraged to consider their relationship to Christ. The staff members are equipped to discuss "how to become a Christian", and are encouraged to point out the right paths for the children to follow.

Due to the influence of the Home and the local churches, a child who comes to us usually makes a profession of faith in a short time, and is baptized into one of the local churches. During the past church year several of our youngsters made professions of faith and were united with a local church.

Educational Ministry

Nearly all of the children who come to us do so after almost unbearable experiences in their homes. They are many times made a pawn of by their parents, and their earlier years of education are disrupted. This causes many of them to get "behind" in school, and some are "slower to learn" than are children who have not experienced these difficulties. We make every effort to help our children "keep up", even to the point of providing tutoring and special classes. Only three have gone from High School without a diploma in the last four years.

In addition to their academic training, our boys and girls take part in the school extracurricular activities. We have children participating in the band, athletics, clubs, etc. They are taught to accept their share of school and community responsibilities.

Farm Program

We are making every effort to put our farm program on a sound basis so that it will "pay its own way". It has been very valuable through the years, not only for the crops and meat it has produced, but also as a work outlet for the children, but it was a costly program for the Home. We are now following every modern method of agriculture available to us to make the farm a real asset.

During the spring and summer of this year we have filled every freezer we own, and have rented several lockers at a local plant and have filled them with vegetables we have raised. In addition to the vegetables, we have processed and saved apples that we have raised, and peaches and pears that were given to us.

On our farm we have five ponds that hold water the year around. Our farm manager developed a system of irrigation, using the water in the ponds to irrigate our crops.

We have cut and baled two thousand seven hundred forty-two bales of hay from our own pastures, and hope to get enough donated to carry us through the winter. We have several acres of corn we will use for feed for this winter, and also will plant oats for winter pastures.

Our farm produces all of the pork and beef we need. We have caged laying hens and gather an average of two hundred eggs

daily. In addition, we raise poultry to serve to the children.

Within another year we feel we will have a very promising and productive farm program.

We have a young man serving as our farm manager and he is doing an excellent job.

Financial Position

As of December 31, 1964, The Arkansas Baptist Home for Children had assets totaling \$943,981.66. Of this amount, Property, Plant, and Equipment totaled \$805,893.74.

The above figure represents a real investment by Arkansas Baptists. We feel we are being good stewards of what you have already invested and of what you allow us each year to operate on. During the past two years we have added several staff members, brought our salaries up to other Baptist Homes' scales, purchased new equipment, upgraded our farm program, added capital improvements, renovated our buildings, etc.

To operate a Home the size and quality of this one requires a great deal of money. Considering the physical lives, and spiritual souls that have been salvaged, no price would be too great to pay. We believe with God's help that Arkansas Baptists will provide our needs.

Our Needs

Our greatest need is still to get the people in our state to understand what we are trying to do, recognize the great mission opportunity, and support us with their prayers, and their means. We believe the key to our success or failure, in getting the program to the people, lies with the pastors. We believe if they will lead their people to support us, the people will. If the pastor does not present our needs to his people, they will have no incentive to give.

Below we are presenting a summary of last year's financial picture across the state. Although an all time record was reached with our Thanksgiving Offering, we should still ask ourselves, "Are we doing all we can for this phase of our mission program known as The Arkansas Baptist Home for Children?"

ARKANSAS BAPTIST MEDICAL CENTER

Little Rock, Arkansas

The crisis which has existed in the operation of Baptist Hospitals the past 20 years has now been intensified by the implementation of Medicare. The cost of operating Arkansas Baptist Medical Center is approximately \$500,000 per month. Income from patients has been providing only 85 per cent of this cost. The balance has been secured from the contributions from the Convention (1 per cent), from the Medical Arts Building, cafeteria, drug store and individual gifts (14 per cent).

The income from our patients is drastically reduced as a result of the cost formula which the government is using to pay for Medicare patient hospitalization. The formula does not make sufficient provision for charity or bad debts, the purchase of equipment, the remodeling of existing buildings, the payment of mortgages, or the construction of new facilities. The hospital will lose a minimum of \$150,000 per year as a result of Medicare.

The government's position is that the formula should not include in its payment of hospital bills an amount for capital expenditures since provision is made under Hill-Harris (formerly Hill-Burton) for these needs. Such funds not only include construction money but allow for replacement and remodeling. When our state fully activates Title 19 of the Medicare Act, 50 per cent of our census could then be covered by the Social Security financed hospitalization plan. At that time the annual loss would be at least doubled.

The hospital has a moral obligation to the entire state to maintain modern equipment and buildings as well as competent technical and professional personnel in order that proper diagnosis and treatment can be afforded. In cooperation with the study committees set up by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention of 1965, the hospital Board of Trustees engaged the services of Block, McGibony, Coburn and Associates, who are leading hospital consultants. This firm made a six-months' study to determine the future of the institution and its needs through 1980. The results have been furnished in a 100-page document. The firm has recommended that the institution build a 250-bed general hospital in the west part of Little Rock on the 53-acre site purchased by the hospital approximately a year ago. The cost of the new hospital would be between \$7.5 million and \$8 million. The survey emphasizes that the problems facing the Board of Trustees are brought about

by such factors as the present location of the physicians' offices in the city, the deterioration of the area in which the hospital is now located, and the inability of the institution to bring its facilities up to the requirements of a 600-bed general hospital at its present site.

The report emphasizes that this recommendation was made after carefully studying the possibility of adding 200 beds to the present hospital. The study showed that such additions and remodeling would cost \$6.5 million and yet fail to solve the obsolescence which now exists and the problems heretofore mentioned.

With income continuously reduced by Medicare patients and our inability to accept federal grants, Baptists of this state cannot continue to operate this hospital at its present standards. Since the life and health of our patients are dependent on these standards, any retrogression is a breach of Christian morality.

Arkansas Baptists have taken the position that there are two reasons involved in the opposition to accepting federal grants. One is the fear of the control of the federal government and the other is a matter of conscience in regard to the principle of separation of church and state.

This hospital is now controlled with governmental regulations exactly in the same manner as those institutions which have accepted federal grants. These controls include policing of civil rights to the extent of forbidding the administration to transfer patients even at their request, regulation as to the square feet in patients' rooms, the number of nursing hours per patient, authority to regulate the type of construction, and a close scrutiny by the government of the level of medical practice in existence within the institution. The denomination has lost its ability to maintain separation of control even though it has not accepted federal grants.

On the matter of conscience, it is felt by many Arkansas Baptists that the hospital is not a church but an institution which serves the public in a community and state in the name of Baptists. For this group it is felt that accepting federal grants to enhance the care given to the community and state is not a violation of the principle. It is well known that other Arkansas Baptists do not share this view.

The Board of Trustees has carefully studied possible solutions to the dilemma. These studies have revealed that other Baptist hospitals have approached this matter by the following methods.

1. Some Baptist hospitals have accepted federal funds as direct grants. The Arkansas Baptist State Convention could give the hospital Board of Trustees authority to accept federal grants after a careful study of the conditions laid down under each grant.

2. Some hospitals offer their services in the ministry of healing in buildings owned by others. The convention could transfer the hospital to a private corporation which could accept federal grants. The Board of Trustees could sign a long-term lease with the corporation to operate but not own the institution.

3. At least one Baptist hospital has a self-perpetuating Board operating through a completely separate corporation outside the convention. Our convention could release control of the hospital

to its present Board of Trustees. The terms of the Board members could remain unchanged. The convention would nominate three individuals to each vacancy on the Board annually and allow the remaining members of the Board to elect from these nominees.

4. Another structure used by a Baptist hospital is through the organization of a non-profit association. Such an association could be formed composed of the present and past members of the Board of Trustees of the hospital. These men not only have had experience in operating a hospital complex, but obviously had the approval of the convention since the convention selected them to serve on the Board. This group could appoint additional Baptist members of churches affiliated with the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and perpetuate itself through the years. The members of the association could meet annually and elect a Board of Trustees to operate the hospital.

It is the feeling of many that the first suggestion is preferable, since it would not disturb the relationship of the hospital with its denomination. It seems evident however, after years of study, that this plan would not be acceptable to some Arkansas Baptists.

Therefore, with the approval of the Executive Board of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Baptist Medical Center recommends to the Convention the adoption of an associational structure as outlined in alternative number four above. This association will be composed of the present and past members of the Board of Trustees of Arkansas Baptist Medical Center. It will appoint additional members of churches affiliated with the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and perpetuate itself through the years. The Association will meet annually and elect a Board of Trustees to operate the hospital.

MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

North Little Rock, Arkansas

Memorial Hospital, located in North Little Rock, spent much of its time during the past year preparing to accept the new program for senior citizens of this City and State. Medicare has absorbed a great deal of the time and energy of our hospital, and the pendulum change has caused numerous adjustments in our hospital operations as it has in institutions all across the nation. Extensive programs of cost analysis and cost control have been instituted in order to arrive at the proper amount of bill for Medicare patients. The number of patients 65 years and older admitted to our hospital has increased and additional increases are expected in the coming year. However, it is expected that we will have sufficient facilities to accept this increase. Medicare and other programs instituted by our Federal Government has made other changes in our hospital such as the method of billing and the assignment of patients to their rooms. Certainly, as we might expect, problems have been encountered, but most of the patients and their families have accepted these changes.

The massive power failure in other parts of our country has caused our local disaster officials to analyze, with us, some of the basic needs of our hospital. This summer we are adding an electrical generating unit to the water pump station that sends water to the top of our hill. In case of an electrical failure, the gas or gasoline powered generator will furnish energy to operate the pumps which will give domestic water and fire protection in such a disaster. Other areas of our disaster planning have been analyzed and revised to meet such unexpected emergencies as a major bus, train, or plane accident, and a natural disaster such as a tornado or a flood.

The citizens of North Little Rock voted during the past year to refinance the bonds which built the original building for Memorial Hospital. The \$350,000 provided by the refinancing of these bonds will be used with matching funds to build an Extended Care Unit for our hospital. This unit will care for patients who do not need the services offered by an acute general hospital, but are still unable to return to their homes. It is felt that the need for this intermediate type care will be expanded due to provisions of the Medicare Act. This portion of the Act goes into effect January 1, 1967. It is hoped that not too long after this time, our hospital can, in some way, provide for these patients.

BAPTIST MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Memphis, Tennessee

Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, Tennessee, has had another year of ministry and growth as it serves the Mid-South in the name of Christ. Effective activities are prevalent in all three areas of the admonition to "preach, teach, and heal."

The Department of Religion serves a vital role in the life of Baptist Hospital. Religious Emphasis Week, held annually, was conducted in 1966 by the Reverend J. Ralph McIntyre, pastor of Brainerd Baptist Church, Chattanooga. In addition to active participation in the week's events by students and employees, patients attended services via closed circuit television and the hospital radio system.

A former resident at Baptist Memorial Hospital, Dr. Dean T. Fitzgerald, Jr., and his wife were appointed missionaries to Jordan by the Foreign Mission Board. In addition, Miss Linda Porter, a former Baptist Memorial Hospital nurse, was assigned by the Board as a missionary to Nigeria.

The School of Nursing moved to new facilities last year. It is now housed in a former apartment building one block from the hospital, which is much more modern and spacious and is air-conditioned. A portion of the old nurses dormitory is being used as living quarters for interns and residents and the balance for hospital service departments, i.e., research, laboratory, maintenance, stores, and linen supply.

The symbol of quality care for hospitals was again achieved as Baptist received another full three-year accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. This is a voluntary survey requested by the hospital to assure its patients that certain standards are being met.

In addition to offering good patient care, Baptist Memorial Hospital discovered that it rendered more care than any other non-governmental hospital in the United States. Baptist admits more patients than any other private hospital and ranks sixth in admissions of all hospitals in this country.

The addition of new facilities has been of major importance through the past year. Construction of the 19-story Union East addition dominates all other projects. The eleven million dollar expansion program will provide 450 additional beds in completed form plus 600 more beds in shelled form. The latter will be located

on the top six floors of Union East and six floors to be added to Madison East. They will be completed as needed.

In addition to beds, the new structure will permit expansion of several service areas: laboratory, x-ray, surgery, recovery room, dietary and offices. Due to the location of new building, it was necessary to move the laundry to an area a short distance from the hospital. The new location plus some new equipment will enable it to grow with the demands placed on it.

A new area of service was added to Baptist Memorial Hospital this year. It is a Coronary Care Unit, a specialized nursing unit for patients with certain types of coronary disease. The 16-bed unit has the latest in electronic equipment which constantly monitors the patient and indicates variations in his condition. It has been estimated that the intensive care given in this area may result in fifty lives saved annually that might otherwise be lost.

From this it can be seen that Baptist Memorial Hospital is interested in providing high quality care and in providing the latest in equipment and service for the benefit of its patients. Below are statistics which indicate the scope of activity for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1965:

OUACHITA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Arkadelphia, Arkansas

With the largest enrollment in history and an enlarged faculty to meet the situation, Ouachita Baptist University began her eighty-first consecutive session in September of 1966. With the opening of school, there were 1,625 full-time students, 17 special students, and 22 graduate students, or a total of 1,664, on the Arkadelphia campus. Final totals in Camden and Little Rock were expected to bring the student body for the fall semester to 2,000.

The 1966-67 session will be the second full year that Ouachita has been a university. During the first year, the school reached a

total non-duplicating enrollment for the year of 2,207, the largest in history. A degree nursing program was started, new accreditation recognition was gained, and facilities already overcrowded were taxed to the breaking point. A total of 232 degrees, including eleven Master's, were conferred.

The Nursing program, which will include two years of work on the Arkadelphia campus and two years at Arkansas Baptist Medical Center, got off to a good start. Reasonable assurance of accreditation was granted by the National League for Nursing, thus making students eligible for all rights of an accredited school. Final accreditation cannot be granted until the first class is graduated in 1969. Since Arkansas ranks last in the nation in nurses per 100,000 of the population, this school is desperately needed.

It took higher education in America 100 years to reach a total college enrollment of one million. Then, in a two year period, another million students were added to the student bodies. For this reason, all schools were bursting at the seams; and institutions like Ouachita which do not have tax support are especially hard-pressed to care for the tidal wave of students rolling across the campuses. Library, laboratories, dining hall, and dormitories were all inadequate.

Partial relief from overcrowding has been obtained by the fifty per cent enlargement of the serving and eating areas of the cafeteria. This addition was completed during the summer of 1966 and will permit the serving of 1,500 students per meal.

Further housing relief will be available in the late fall of 1966 when a dormitory to house 306 girls will be ready for occupancy. This building is being constructed by an insurance company which will lease the building to the University. The financial arrangements do not entail any increase in the school's capital indebtedness. The facility will be operated by the University and will be governed by the school's regular parietal rules.

An addition to Riley Library is in the planning stage and will be started in the winter of 1966 if financial arrangements can be worked out. The library is too small for the present student body and must be enlarged if accreditation is to be retained.

Nearing the completion is the Verser Speech and Drama Center, a badly needed facility which will furnish additional classroom and office space as well as a small auditorium. It has been built on a pay-as-you-go basis, and some additional money must be raised before it is finished. A generous gift of two dedicated Baptists, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Verser, Jr. of Eudora, has served as the backbone of financing for this project.

During the past year the field house was completed, thanks to a \$50,000 gift by Mr. Winthrop Rockefeller, Arkansas business man and philanthropist. In appreciation of the gift and in recognition of the many contributions which the Rockefeller family has made to Baptist life through the years, the Trustees have named the building Winthrop Rockefeller Field House. The building was dedicated in the early Fall.

As Ouachita becomes a bigger educational enterprise, it also becomes a bigger business. The school's total income for the fiscal year ending May 31, 1966, was slightly over two million dollars.

Expenditures were within this receipt total, and all obligations were met without any default. Students provided the largest portion of the income, and the Cooperative Program of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention provided the second largest share. Endowment income was approximately \$92,000.

As the war in Vietnam has escalated, there has been increasing concern among male students about meeting academic requirements for draft deferment. Ouachita continues to require two years of Army R.O.T.C. of all able-bodied males. Enrollment in the advance course, which leads to a commission upon graduation, is voluntary; and, although the school has never had a large stream of officers flowing out, those who have served have done so with distinction. The contribution of this part of the University's program is especially noticeable in times of national emergency.

National Defense Loans and the Equal Opportunity Work Study Program both are supplying large number of needy students with the resources to continue their college education. It would be difficult to overstate the value of these student aids.

A bright spot in the past year was the increase in the number of ministerial students enrolled. There were 174 studying for the ministry and an additional 83 preparing for other church-related vocations. When Ouachita points to her achievements through the years, she points with greatest pride to those men and women who have gone from her doors to serve the Lord. Christian in fact as well as tradition, Ouachita is dedicated to training men and women who acknowledge the lordship of Jesus Christ and who are committed to his service. Only through such Christian leaders can the redemptive story be carried to a lost world.

A vital step in Ouachita's long-range program of service was the adoption by the University's trustees in August of 1966 of a master plan of development, together with accompanying fiscal goals. Known as "Operation '80," the plan provides for the addition of eight million dollars in buildings and eight million dollars in endowment by the end of 1980. One of the outstanding campus architects in the country spent three years developing the design approved by the trustees. If followed, this plan will permit the orderly development of a campus to meet the needs of a student body which, it is believed, will continue to serve about the same percentage of high school graduates as are enrolling at Ouachita at present. The goals of "Operation '80" are large ones but are not beyond the reach of Arkansas Baptists marching under God's banner.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST COLLEGE

Walnut Ridge, Arkansas

1965-66 school year at Southern Baptist College was one of outstanding advancement in every way. Enrollment of the college for the regular term increased to 700 different students. In addition to this, the college opened an extensive center at the

Blytheville Air Force Base with an additional 75 students making a total of 775 served during the year.

Southern is mindful of its obligation to the student and our Baptist life generally in the matters of spiritual affairs. During the year every effort has been made to see that the fine spiritual emphasis of the school also enlarged. With the burgeoning increase of students, extra efforts were put forth to bring the student life in contact with an intelligent and warm Christian emphasis.

The college continues to make substantial additions to its physical assets adding during the last year 27 practically new houses for faculty members and a new dormitory for women being completed for occupancy at the beginning of the school term for 1966-67. This dormitory is fireproof throughout with air-conditioned rooms, private bath in each room, fully carpeted floors and thermostats in each room. It also features a large lounge and quarters for the matron including an apartment and office area.

In March of 1966, the college dedicated the beautiful new library, considered by many visitors to be the most beautiful library in this section of the South. It is fireproof and fully air-conditioned with a large reading room to take care of a student body of well over 1000 students.

The college opened its Expansion and Endowment Campaign in October of 1965, which will continue for a period of three years. Over \$340,000 has been subscribed and paid at this time. The Campaign leadership is especially anxious to enlarge this effort in the fall of 1966 and bring it to a successful conclusion within a year.

Major immediate needs to be cared for by the campaign effort include an Auditorium and Fine Arts Building and a Science Complex. These are essential to the proper development and service of the institution.

Southern continues to be the fastest growing college in Arkansas from approximately 236 students the last year before accreditation to 775 for 1965-66.

Additions to the faculty for 1966-67 include 13 well trained experienced people. Several of these new faculty members represent substantial broadening of the curriculum of the institution. Some of these people are outstanding in their field and will make a marked contribution to the educational and religious life of our state.

The budget for 1966-67 is well over \$800,000. In addition to this, the building fund will run a sizeable amount indicating expenditures of at least \$1,000,000 for 1966-67.

Southern Baptist College is tremendously grateful for the support of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and her many friends over the world. The Board of Trustees, the administration, faculty and students wish every Baptist in the state could know how grateful we are for enlarging support. The student is reminded of the contribution of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention by a special item in the catalog calling attention to the fact that the college is supported by Baptists of this state. In return every effort is made to properly represent the Baptist philosophy in the highest tradition.

From January 8, 1966, to October 1, when this report was prepared, we have received toward our regular budget from Baptist churches \$8,519.39, from Methodist churches \$10,239.53, and additional contributions from the women's organizations for Alcohol-Narcotics Education. Assemblies of God contributions are paid at the end of their church year through their own cooperative organization and are not included in this report.

The present employed staff of the Foundation include W. Henry Goodloe — Executive Director, Mrs. Beverly Williams — Office Secretary, and Mr. Jerry McBride — Educational Assistant. In addition, we have a paid legal consultant, Mr. James B. Ganaway, and a Legislative Information Assistant has been authorized and will be employed during the sessions of the Arkansas General Assembly.

The program on Alcohol Education in the high schools of the state meets increasing approval from school personnel over the area, and the help of the State Board of Education in improving the program is gratefully acknowledged. The Educational Assistant, Mr. McBride, has been constantly in the high schools since the beginning of the school term and will be booked for every week of every month for the remainder of the school year. During two weeks of the summer he was a graduate student in the Mars Hill Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism at Mars Hill, North Carolina, making his work with the youth even more competent and relevant than previously.

During the summer months, the Executive Director and the Educational Assistant have been in various youth and adult camps and assemblies, and the Executive Director has been regularly in various churches of Arkansas on Sundays, in addition to weekly contacts among the counties.

During the past three months, we have been involved in five Local Option campaigns and in several local programs to control the indiscriminate display of salacious literature. Films are being added to our library on this and related issues as funds allow. These films are available, along with other materials, to local churches, PTA groups and other interested organizations.

At the moment, there is no special focusing of the energies of the supporting churches toward any one most viciously rampant evil, but we know that such a time will come and we need to be alert to the ever present possibility. Meanwhile, this is the period

of the steady pull and the strengthening of our ranks through faithful prayer and patient educational efforts. We feel that with the ever increasing support of our work by the churches of Arkansas and the intelligent, cooperative effort of other constructive social forces in our state and communities, we have a potential of strength that can be utilized in the moral renewal of Arkansas.

Missionary Personnel

At the close of 1965, the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board had a missionary staff of 2,070. This included 51 missionary associates, 6 special project nurses, and 46 missionary journey-men. Appointments during the year totaled 220 (213 new appointees and 7 reappointed). Between January and May, 1966, 48 more were added, including 2 reappointed and a special project nurse.

A new dimension in missionary service was initiated in the summer of 1965 with the Missionary Journeyman Program. These single college graduates under 27 years of age went to 27 countries for two-year terms in special assignments under the supervision of career missionaries.

Even with the additional appointments, less than 25 percent of missionary personnel need was met. Preachers and medical people continue to be most urgently requested. Also, there are calls for those trained in teaching (seminary), business, agriculture, radio and TV, journalism, and student work.

Missionaries Around The World

Southern Baptist missionaries were under appointment to 61 countries or political entities at the close of 1965.* Work with English-speaking people was begun in Austria and Libya during the year, and missionaries were appointed for English-language work in Turkey. A couple, now in language school, expects to go to Ivory Coast in 1966.

Evangelism And Church Development

The leading of people to new life in Jesus Christ is the ultimate purpose underlying all our missionary endeavors. Years of foreign mission labor have taught us that the cultivation of New Testament churches is the wisest investment of missionary resources. At the year's end there were 4,410 churches (2,529 self-supporting), 7,131 mission points, and 3,816 national pastors related to our Southern Baptist work. These reported 48,080 baptisms, 492,148 church members, and 571,590 enrolled in Sunday School. China, closed to missionaries at present, was last estimated as having 392 churches and 123,000 members.

Nationwide evangelistic crusades were held in Brazil, Thailand, and Malaysia; area campaigns in Spain, northern Mexico, Korea, the Eastern and Northern Regions of Nigeria, and in Paris, France. Notable strides were made in radio-TV outreach around the world. In Latin America and in Korea, missionaries were assigned to give full-time responsibility to such endeavors. In more than twenty nations, regularly scheduled programs were heard by thousands.

Schools And Student Work

The 1,095 schools related to our Missions in 41 countries had an enrolment of 184,810 students with a staff of 5,703 national and 382 missionary teachers. Among the schools are 43 theological institutions with 1,510 students and 6 women's training schools with 527 enrolled. A Bible school for pastors was established at Lilongwe, Malawi; more property was acquired for the Beirut Baptist School in Lebanon; and new seminary presidents were inaugurated in Seoul, Korea, and in Baguio, Philippines.

In student work, progress was made through the opening of centers in Nigeria and in Indonesia, a student lounge in Korea, and a hostel in Taiwan. New student groups were organized in three Latin-American countries, and a missionary journeyman began work with students in the Philippines.

Hospitals And Medical Care

Medical mission institutions include 20 hospitals and 52 clinics and dispensaries, with a total of 1,379 beds. In 1965 there were 106 national and 63 missionary physicians serving with 288 national and 56 missionary nurses. They treated a total of 504,968 patients, of whom 42,690 were inpatients. Engaged additionally in the medical ministry were 725 nationals and 32 missionaries.

Significant advances in this area included a new clinic in Indonesia, a nurses' building in Gaza, a mobile unit in Kenya, and new quarters for a maternity center in Nigeria. The Kederi

Baptist Hospital school of nursing in Indonesia graduated its first class in June, and by the end of the year, the Baptist clinic in Yemen had developed into a 20-bed hospital.

Publication Work

Literature in the language of the people has become increasingly important for evangelism, leadership training, and Christian education. Book stores and reading rooms on our mission fields are confronting hundreds with the Christian message.

Our 21 publication centers overseas and at El Paso, Texas, (Spanish) produced over 18 million pieces: tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, hymn books. Staffing these centers were 58 missionaries and 443 nationals.

In Malawi, the Baptist Press began to produce its own literature; the Baptist Spanish Publishing House introduced a magazine (**Respuesta**) for general public sale; a director of publications for Thailand was assigned; and a Christian Book Center in Liberia was dedicated.

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$24,983,924.53 as 1965 closed. Still, needs continue to be far beyond financial resources. Unfilled requests from the Missions for urgently needed land, equipment, and buildings amounted to more than four million dollars.

The 1965 Lottie Moon Christmas offering reached a total of \$13,194,357.32 (May 1, 1966).

Home Office

There are 153 people working at the Foreign Mission Board's home office, 3806 Monument Avenue, Richmond, Virginia 23230.

THE COMMISSION, foreign missions journal of the Board, reported an average circulation of 106,000 in 1965.

HOME MISSION BOARD

Southern Baptist Convention

Atlanta, Georgia

The Home Mission Board is grouping its resources for "a creative approach to meet the near revolutionary changes which dominate life in the United States," according to Executive Secretary Arthur B. Rutledge.

SOCIAL CHANGES AFFECTING MISSIONS include the urbanization and industrialization of the nation, the population growth, the search for civil justice, and a revolution in morals. Rutledge says the Home Mission Board is seeking to discover the individual's, the church's, and the denomination's mission in a changing society.

HIGHLIGHTS IN MEETING CHANGE included the participation by the Home Mission Board in the SBC's program study, im-

provement in organization, additions to and utilization of staff personnel, record support of missions by all Southern Baptists through participation and finances, and initiation of new ministries.

CHANGES WITH THE AGENCY included the addition of a Division of Administrative Services, a Department of Work Related to Non-Evangelicals, a Department of Christian Social Ministries, a Department of Special Mission Ministries, Art Services, Mission Property Services, and emphasis on metropolitan and academic evangelism, and associate director in the Division of Missions, and the Division of Education and Promotion was renamed Division of Communication.

IN SUPPORTING MISSIONS in the United States, Cuba, Puerto Rico, and Panama, Southern Baptists channeled more than \$7,900,000 through the Home Mission Board. The Cooperative Program provided \$4,365,353, including the largest Advance Section in history, \$911,753; and the Annie Armstrong Offering promoted by Woman's Missionary Union provided a record \$3,573,146.

DISASTER RELIEF became a permanent ministry of the agency in the Department of Christian Social Ministries, and \$50,000 was allocated from the Advance Section for aid to hurricane-stricken areas in Louisiana.

THE MISSIONARY FORCE of over 2,000 is mostly employed under the cooperative agreements with state Baptist conventions. The lower figure of the number of missionaries is due to a restudy of missionary categories. In addition, 656 students are employed for ten weeks for the summer of 1966, and the first group of US-2ers (college graduates for two-year terms) and the first of the Christian Service Corps (mature lay persons for short terms of voluntary service) were appointed.

THE TWELVE PROGRAMS through which the Home Mission Board seeks to bring our land to know Christ are the following:

STUDIES IN DEPTH continue with ministries to metropolitan areas, in resorts, on the rural-urban fringe, and other points of change. One in-depth study on how churches might minister to ex-prisoners continues under the direction of a seminary professor. Another study, of transitional areas in metropolitan units, was completed and is being implemented into programs of the agency.

ACTIVE DUTY CHAPLAINS increased during the year, matching "the increased manpower and readiness" in Viet Nam. Some fifty Southern Baptist chaplains were ordered to duty during the past year, and now 528 serve with the Army, Navy, and Air Force, and the figure is expected to reach 600 before the end of 1966.

781 CHAPLAINS, in addition to those in active duty with the military, are commissioned in the reserve, student program, or National Guards with the military services.

ANOTHER 233 CHAPLAINS serve full time with the veterans administration, hospitals, and other institutions and industry, plus forty-one part-time chaplains in these categories.

The Home Mission Board is providing ways the individual, the church, and the denomination can meet the needs of people. Your increased support and your sharing Christ, a larger missionary force and staff, the forming of twelve programs with organizational changes to implement them are designed to place God's Word in the hands of people so they will accept it in their hearts.

There is need for 186 home missionaries. Needs in our land are greater today than ever before. There are more people, places and spiritual problems. Evangelism, the starting of new churches and church-type missions, and other traditional work in home missions will receive priority. Special attention will be given to metropolitan areas, the downtown church, and the growing number of unchurched.

Without prayer support your Home Mission Board cannot get along. Prayer is one way every one can participate in giving God's Word to the people in our land and other lands.

CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION**Southern Baptist Convention****Nashville, Tennessee****Foy Valentine, Executive Secretary**

The social imperatives of the Christian gospel are slowly but surely being accepted among Southern Baptists. An increasing awareness of Christian social responsibility is manifesting itself in Southern Baptist life at all levels. This concern for applying Christian principles in every area and relationship of life has been reflected during the past year in state convention programs, summer encampments, WMU meetings, Brotherhood programs, student work, college and seminary curriculums, the work of the various Southern Baptist agencies, the numerous publications which serve as mass media for Southern Baptists, and in the preaching and teaching of the whole gospel of Christ in growing numbers of churches.

Last year written materials produced by the staff of the Christian Life Commission or secured by them from competent authors reached a total circulation of 53,736,023, representing an increase over the previous year of 24,122,610. Distribution of pamphlet literature on applied Christianity likewise nearly doubled. A new book on citizenship for Christians was published in the Broadman Readers Plan. The 1965 Glorieta conferences produced a definitive Broadman book on gambling. The Ridgecrest conferences produced two good books on problems related to beverage alcohol, one by Dr. Wayne Oates and one by Dr. William Garmon. Other conferences are being conducted from time to time such as one attended by two hundred Southern Baptist thought leaders in New York in March, 1966 on Christianity and World Issues. The topic chosen for the 1966 Ridgecrest and Glorieta conferences was "Toward a Christian Interpretation of Sex," with Dr. David R. Mace as the featured speaker.

The whole world is being engulfed in a rising tide of social ferment and moral revolution. The issues of family breakdown, racism, inadequate citizenship, technological revolution, unemployment, poverty, war, and immorality are ever before us. Christians do not propose simplistic answers for these incredibly complex problems. They do affirm without equivocation, however, that Christ is the answer to all human needs not only for individuals in their relationship to God but also in their relationships to others in society. God's people are therefore called to minister courageously and creatively in the midst of the social evils and moral compromises of our day as they accept the concept that Christianity must not be divorced from life.

The Christian Life Commission stands eagerly ready to help any pastor, church, or association in applying Christian principles to daily life.

EDUCATION COMMISSION**Southern Baptist Convention****Nashville, Tennessee****Rabun L. Brantley, Executive Secretary-Treasurer**

The most extensive effort yet made by the Education Commission to be of service to the colleges and denomination is its two-year study BEST (Baptist Education Study Task), which began in the summer of 1965 and will continue into the summer of 1967. Twenty-four seminars of twenty persons each are meeting three times in 1966 and three times in 1967. Two national conferences will be held in Nashville, June 13-16, 1966, and June 12-15, 1967. Background papers in seven basic areas have been prepared for the seminars and conferences. Several thousand persons will have an opportunity to express their views on the areas of study which pertain to Baptist higher education. It is expected that the Findings Committee will be able to present some helpful suggestions for the future of Baptist schools by the end of the summer of 1967. The Commission is grateful to the Executive Committee for providing an initial fund of \$25,000 to get the study underway.

Twelve states are participating in the thirteenth (1966) annual emphasis ("What Baptist Colleges Offer") on Christian education and Baptist schools. Before sending kits of materials to ministers and ministers of education, they were queried about their needs, which saved a considerable expense. Kentucky and Maryland sent kits to all their churches. The requests for materials for the emphasis are heavy.

The Commission serves as headquarters for the testing services of the Association of Baptist Professors of Religion for five of the seminaries. The tests are to determine advance standing in the Old and New Testament. Results are sent to all seminaries and colleges for comparison.

The Commission has furnished information on presidential prospects to committees of seven colleges, on their request. Assistance has been given to Atlanta and Maryland committees in their planning for starting colleges. Six states have committees working on the problem of federal aid for schools and some of these have asked for aid. *The Southern Baptist Educator* has published articles on both sides of the question. Information on Baptist schools has been furnished state secretaries and others. The Commission has worked with the Training Union department of the Baptist Sunday School Board on another undated unit "You and A Church Vocation."

College and Career continues to be praised by school counselors and other readers. Seventeen Baptist state conventions have ordered the paper for their high schools. The paper is sent to prospective students by some colleges as a recruitment piece, and it is used in youth programs, summer assemblies, and conferences.

Funds from the Robertson-Sheppard and J. W. Farmer Loan-Scholarship program are taken up until September, 1966, and applications are being made for 1967 and 1968. Five recent doctoral graduates will be teaching in Baptist schools this fall. To date 47 have been helped, with only 3 paying back in cash because they did not get jobs in Baptist schools.

The Commission is also privileged to administer the Opdyke Fund for mountain students. During the school year 1965-66, 256 scholarships were awarded in 45 colleges. Many more scholarships and loan funds could be profitably used.

The Commission is in its first year of participation in the Cooperative Teacher Registry with 9 other denominations. Through the Registry some 2,000 additional teacher prospects are available to Baptist schools.

The Southern Baptist Educator continues to be widely read and quoted. More contributed articles on subjects related to education come in than can be used.

Southern Baptists now operate 39 senior colleges, 15 junior colleges, 7 academies, 5 Bible schools, 6 seminaries, and the American Baptist Theological Seminary, supported jointly with National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc.

Decatur Baptist College moved from Decatur, Texas, to Dallas, in September, 1965, and became the nucleus of Dallas Baptist College which opened with 930 students. The Baptist College at Charleston (S. C.) opened in September, 1965, with over 400 regular students. Maryland and Florida Baptists are planning new colleges, as well as St. Louis and Atlanta.

Enrollment and support.—Enrollments in Baptist schools have reached an all time high for 1965-66 of 96,670 compared to 90,510 in 1964-65.

Graduates from the 73 schools from September, 1964, to August, 1965, totaled 12,205 compared to 11,653 the preceding year.

State conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention gifts to the schools for the year increased \$922,880, or \$17,812,129 compared to \$16,889,249 in 1964-65. Of this amount \$12,351,265 went into operations and \$5,460,864 into capital projects.

In addition, the schools received \$18,362,645 in other gifts, grants, and donations. The total assets of the Southern Baptist educational institutions are \$501,648,878 of which \$129,570,363 is for endowment. The endowment figure is the book value and would show a much higher market value.

Church-related vocations.—Reports from the seminaries and colleges show the ministerial students increased 232 for the year, reflected in senior and junior colleges. There was a loss of only 5 in the reports of home and foreign mission volunteers, a loss of 91 in ministers of education, and a gain of 126 in church music, or a gain of 262 in the three areas. Eighty-two were reported as in a church-related vocation and 108 reported considering a church-related vocation. Following are the figures:

Institutional changes.—Institutional changes for the year were: Wilfred C. Tyler, president of Blue Mountain College, deceased, succeeded by E. Harold Fisher; W. A. Miller, president of University of Corpus Christi, resigned, succeeded by Joseph C. Clapp; James H. Edmondson succeeded Conwell A. Anderson as president of Judson College; G. L. Higgins, Jr., elected president of Acadia Baptist Academy; Jack E. Byron succeeded William H. Cook as president of San Marcos Baptist Academy; E. Gary Harthcock is serving as president of Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute; James Ralph Scales resigned as president of Oklahoma Baptist University; Curtis V. Bishop, president of Averett College, died; A. C. Queen resigned as president of Southern Illinois College of Bible. Three schools are being served by acting presidents.

Program Report

A program of Christian education leadership and coordination

Aspects of Baptist Education Study Task properly come under this program, but it will be only a part of the Commission's efforts to serve through leading, coordinating and promoting Baptist schools. The Commission will continue its assistance to parents, students, colleges, and state conventions. Statistical information on the schools, facts on loans, scholarships, federal aid are constantly being furnished those asking for help. Inter-agency meetings and other necessary travel are increasingly heavy on the time of the small staff, as well as the budget. Administration of the Robertson-Sheppard, Farmer, and Opdyke Scholarship funds shows an increasing need for assistance in meeting college costs.

A program of school and college studies and surveys

Increasing requests for various statistical information and comparisons have added measurably to the duties of the staff. The working of BEST is the most extensive study yet made by

the Commission, involving the 16 states having Baptist schools. The study should tend to bring the states together, working on common goals, as no other project has before. Nearly every mail brings requests for answers to such questions as: How many schools have signed the NDEA loan fund compliance agreement? How many schools are integrated? Which schools have government loans in force? and many similar questions. The Commission is the only clearing house for such information.

A program of teacher recruitment and placement

The most significant aspect of the work of the placement office during the year was affiliation with the Cooperative Teacher Registry, participated in by 9 denominations. While additional cost of travel and processing of teacher credentials have increased under the affiliation, there have been added several thousand new prospects from whom Baptist schools may select teachers. Perhaps all of the colleges are now using the Commission's services in obtaining teachers and still the supply of qualified people is acutely short.

A program of assistance in college recruitment

The thirteenth annual emphasis in the churches in Christian education and Baptist schools is now under way. The theme for 1966 is "What Baptist Colleges Offer." New procedures for circularizing the churches should make the emphasis more efficient, enlist more churches as they see the need for assisting their young people in college and career planning, and effect savings in mailing costs. *College and Career* is being widely circulated by some of the schools as a mailing piece to prospects. Displays of tracts have been set up at summer assemblies and the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention.

RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION

Southern Baptist Convention

Fort Worth, Texas

Southern Baptists' Radio and Television Commission is in a position to press the case for its programming with the broadcasting industry as never before. Factors which make this so include: the new international Communications Center with all of its facilities, appointment of new staff members to key positions in the agency, and the beginning of a corps of field representatives.

The 23 programs produced by the Commission were broadcast on an all-time high number of radio and television stations at the end of 1965—more than 2300. Actually, the Commission appeared on 78.4 per cent of the entire broadcast facilities of the nation between April 1, 1965, and March 31, 1966, broadcasting a total 52,000 hours. If one station ran this amount of programming, it would take 2167 days or almost six years of continuous broadcasting.

In 1965 the value of the public service time given the Commission by the nation's radio and television stations totaled \$3.8 million. Southern Baptists' impact on 20th Century man is directly proportional to the effectiveness of the channels of communication employed.

Program Report

1. A PROGRAM OF PREACHING ON RADIO AND TELEVISION

While the trend among broadcasters in general seems to be away from religious programming, the Southern Baptist message is being heard on more stations by more people in more ways than ever before.

Southern Baptist programs received 7½ hours in time on the three television networks—the equivalent of 15 half hour programs—in 1965. Among these was *The Inheritance*, hour-long special produced jointly with the National Broadcasting Co., which documented the beginnings of the Christian faith through the Biblical archaeology of five countries. It brought the largest response to any single tv exposure Southern Baptists ever had—about 17,000 letters. It is now available to churches.

During the spring of 1966, representatives of the Radio-TV Commission joined NBC-TV in filming in color a third one-hour special, this one on the Life of Christ. It will be telecast in the spring of 1967.

Of the 13 half-hour productions released on *The Answer* series for 1966, 12 were new productions. TV rights were purchased from Family Films for six dramas and the Commission produced two. Production on 1967 *Answer* episodes took place during the spring and summer of 1966. A Commission camera crew spent six weeks in Switzerland and Spain filming the story of Baptist missions in action in those countries.

During 1965 the radio department duplicated 120,000 tapes for all purposes—domestic broadcast, overseas programs, and convention tape packages. Thirteen programs were produced each week for domestic use and eight in other languages for foreign use.

The complete list of programs and the station count for each at the end of 1965 was as follows: *The Answer*, 100; *The Baptist Hour*, 535; "Master-Control"*, 426; *Patterns*, 201; *Music To Remember* (monaural and stereo) 203; *International Sunday School Lesson*, 104; *La Hora Bautista*, 77; *Moments of Meditation*, 30; *Musica Para Recordar*, 105; *Youth Speaks To You*, 67; *The Voice of Peace* (Russian), 4; *The Voice of Hope (Chinese)*, 7; *The Living Water* (Navajo), 7; *Manna In The Morning*, 27; *Oklahoma Baptist News*, 12; *Tennessee Baptist News*, 20; *Arkansas Baptist News*, 26; *Escola Biblia Do Ar* (Portuguese), 2; *Control*Central*, 116; *Momentos de Meditacion*, 109.

2. A PROGRAM OF AUDIENCE BUILDING

State Baptist papers have provided space for the regular listing

of Southern Baptist programs throughout the year and assisted greatly in providing audience within the denomination.

Direct mail has proved most effective through the years for reaching the largest number of people at the lowest cost. The Commission does virtually all of its own printing and by selective use of the mail can inform potential audiences with best economy.

The Beam, the Commission's monthly magazine, has served well in telling the story of the agency to large numbers of people who work in the broadcast industry, as well as to pastors and laymen of the Southern Baptist Convention. At the end of the year circulation stood at 30,000. The Spanish version of *The Beam* (*Senales*) is being mailed quarterly to 5000 readers in South America, and other language versions of the publication are in the planning stages.

Christian Home Music is another facet of audience building which is destined to grow with the addition of a director of program music to the staff. Miss Joe Ann Shelton joined the agency full time in this capacity in mid-1965, after having served on a part time basis for several years as Baptist Hour Choir director **and soloist.**

3. A PROGRAM OF INQUIRY AND COUNSELING

Close cooperation with the Seminary Extension Department and Dr. Ralph Herring, director of SED, in the adaptation of existing course material has provided Southern Baptists with what is thought to be the first Radio Bible Correspondence Course with seminary credit available. Some 200 students were enrolled through initial radio promotion.

This course was first offered on *The Baptist Hour* and the *International Sunday School Lesson* programs with major growth expected during 1966. The basic Bible correspondence course in Spanish is still offered on radio in Mexico and South America with approximately 1000 persons having taken part to this date in its three phases.

4. A PROGRAM OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

Requests have increased annually from all over the world for technical assistance of various kinds. Most often they come from pastors or missionaries who need program material, ideas for a local opportunity on radio/tv, how to plan for radio/tv areas and equipment in a new church building, etc. In addition, news programs for state Baptist conventions were started during the year for Arkansas and Tennessee. Georgia and Kentucky have scheduled similar news programs in the fall of 1966.

NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

New Orleans, Louisiana

SEMINARY BEGINS 50TH YEAR: New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary will begin its 50th year as a Southern Baptist Convention educational institution with the 1966-67 session. When the seminary was established in New Orleans as the Baptist Bible Institute in 1917, the city had six Southern Baptist churches. Now New Orleans has 84 churches and missions. The seminary's alumni, who serve in all 50 states and on most foreign mission fields, helped establish many of these churches as missions.

SECOND YEAR OF MAJOR CAMPUS RENOVATIONS PLANNED: A second year of major campus renovations being made from a three-year \$1,600,000 cooperative program allocation is now being planned. Major campus drainage systems, repairs to buildings, replaced plumbing and waterproofing were parts of the first year repairs. Building deteriorations will be a major renovation expenditure during 1967. The seminary was granted funds for campus renovations because of unusual construction deterioration. The seminary's 311 buildings are located on a 75-acre campus within seven miles of downtown New Orleans.

APPRECIATION EXPRESSED FOR COOPERATIVE PROGRAM GIFTS: Thanks to Southern Baptists for cooperative program gifts has been expressed by students and professors at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. Academic costs for the past year totaled \$819,000. Approximately 70 per cent of this amount was provided by cooperative program funds.

SEMINARY ADDS ACCREDITATION: The seminary's Schools of Theology, Religious Education and Church Music were accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools during the past year. This is in addition to long time accreditation by the American Association of Theological Schools.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT TOTALS 771: Enrolment in the seminary's three schools totaled 771 during the past academic year. From this number 474 were in the School of Theology. Students represented 28 states and nine overseas nations.

FOUNDATION ESTABLISHED TO SERVE SEMINARY: A New Orleans Baptist Seminary Foundation was chartered and approved by the Southern Baptist Convention executive committee during the past year. The foundation's first goal is to secure \$1

million for a permanent fund to provide student church work and missions scholarships, faculty salary increases and to finance theological research.

HURRICANE DAMAGES BEING REPAIRED: Repairs are still being made almost a year after Hurricane Betsy hit the seminary campus. The campus received major damages from the hurricane.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

The purpose of Southern Seminary, since its founding in 1859, has been stated succinctly on the seal of the school: "That the man of God may be thoroughly furnished unto all good works." At Southern Seminary, this means extensive and intensive programs of instruction in theology, religious education and church music. It means a well-equipped campus with teaching, counseling, housing and service facilities.

It also means a trained and dedicated teaching staff of 74 skilled men and women to fully develop the called-out talents of students from 33 states and 14 foreign nations. These students are coming to us in increasing numbers every year, and our campus family now numbers 2,100 students, wives and children. We are committed to them with the same dedication shown by the churches and local associations which have nurtured them in their Christian pilgrimage. It is our sole responsibility to prepare these students for more able service in these local churches and for our expanding missionary challenge at home and abroad.

Significant events in the life of Southern Seminary this past year include:

- 1—Another increase in enrolment—the fourth consecutive year we have seen it rise, contrary to the nationwide trend. The continued upswing is a barometer not only for the internal life of the institution but also for the affection and respect it has within the life of the churches. Whereas with some exceptions enrolment of ministerial students in Baptist colleges continues to decline, there is some evidence that the supply of ministerial students at the seminary level is stabilizing. One effect of the increasing number of ministerial volunteers in non-Baptist colleges is the change in curriculum and relationship to the mainstream of academic life brought about within the seminary.
- 2—Trustees, at their 1966 general meeting, set the middle (median) salary of faculty in seminaries accredited with the American Association of Theological Schools as the base for Southern Seminary faculty compensation. This will bring our professors' remuneration up to the average, but this is still below large-church pastors with similar educational backgrounds.
- 3—After months of extensive research and interviews with recent

graduates, we have adopted dramatic changes in our theology curriculum, providing for greater specialization, newest teaching methods and inter-departmental courses. We feel this will help us to meet the challenge of increasing demands being made upon the Baptist minister today.

- 4—Our housing situation is improving, with three sections of the single-student dormitory renovated and in use for one full school year and the fourth—the section for single women students—set to open for fall term. This renovation was mandatory to update our 40-year-old dormitory, but it has depleted our capital needs budget through 1968. Without increased funds from the Cooperative Program, we are doomed to deficit spending for an indefinite time. At present, the Southern Baptist Convention, through the Cooperative Program, does not even pay for all the **academic** expenses incurred in training leadership for the churches. The seminaries' share of funds has dropped 38% in ten years, while enrolment has climbed 25%.

SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Seven faculty and staff additions, new courses of study, special activities, enrolment statistics, and new facilities highlight the annual report of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Tex. The report will be made during the 1966 Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Detroit, Mich., in May.

President Robert E. Naylor reported a cumulative enrolment of 1,911 for the 1965-66 academic year. The school of theology enrolled 1,181, with 566 in the school of religious education and 164 in the school of church music. The total included 1,595 men or 83.5% and 316 women or 16.5%.

Students came from 228 college or university campuses and twenty seminary campuses representing forty states and fourteen foreign countries. There were 576 students who enrolled for the first time.

The seven faculty and staff additions include Roy J. Fish, from the pastorate of the First Baptist Church, Fairborn, Ohio, as Associate Professor of Evangelism; Charles A. Tidwell, from the church administration department of the Baptist Sunday School Board, as Associate Professor of Church Administration; Larry L. Walker, from the completion of his doctoral work at Dropsie College, as Assistant Professor of Semitic Languages.

Also William B. Tolar, from the Baylor University faculty, to Associate Professor of Biblical Backgrounds; F. B. Huey, Jr., from the faculty of the Baptist Seminary in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, to Associate Professor of Old Testament; LeRoy Ford from the Baptist Sunday School Board as editor of adult training union lessons to Professor of Programmed Instruction and Curriculum

Writing; and Keith C. Wills from Midwestern Seminary as librarian, to Director of Libraries.

Six members of the faculty engaged in sabbatical leave programs during the year: David Garland, W. Boyd Hunt, Lacoste Munn, John Newport, Ann Bradford and Leon Marsh.

New courses added to the curriculum during the year included Ugaritic, new courses in understanding and working with the "exceptional child," studies in programmed instruction and curriculum writing.

Special activities reported were the annual Church Music Workshop which included a "Mendelssohn Choral Festival" and enrolled 400 musicians; the annual college student missions conference which registered over 1600; a church architecture conference, a church drama clinic, a chaplains' conference and other special programs.

The 10th Annual Pastors' Conference is set for June 27-July 1 on campus and an attendance of 500 is anticipated.

Barnard Hall, a residence hall for women, was completely remodeled, renovated, refurnished and air-conditioned. Carroll Park Apartments with 184 apartment units were purchased during the year.

Projected for the immediate future are the remodeling of Fort Worth Hall and the ground floor of Memorial Building; and the construction of a Children's Building and a Health Center and Clinic.

In his report, President Naylor said: "Students are at once the focus and the purpose of Southwestern Seminary. The size of the seminary remains a unique quality. Largest of the seminaries, it has adjusted to the size of its stewardship in academic procedures, in competent, experienced, committed faculty, and in the facilities which house and maintain the seminary program."

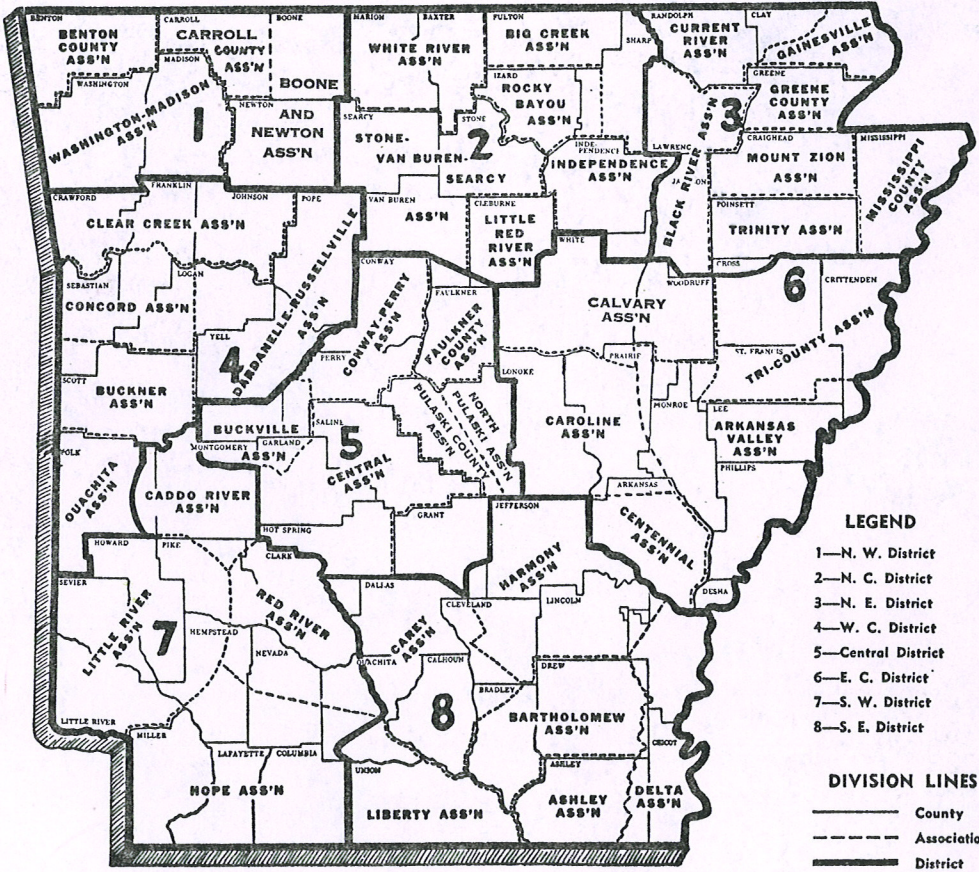
