The Artist

Pianist Marina Lomazov began her piano lessons in Kiev at the age of five and gave her first recital at the age of seven. After graduating with honors from the school for gifted children she entered the Kiev Conservatory. While in the Conservatory she was a prize winner of several national competitions. After her family immigrated to the United States, Marina continued her education as a scholarship student at some of the most prestigious schools in the United States including the Eastman School of Music, the Juilliard School, and the Manhattan School of Music.

Ms. Lomazov has performed extensively in the halls of the United States as well as in France, Russia, Japan, and Canada and was featured on National Public Radio. She has also performed as a guest artist for numerous music festivals in the U.S. and abroad. Since her competitions, Marina was winner of the 1997 National Federation of Music Clubs Young Artist Award for Piano. Other awards include the Silver Medal and a special prize for "Best Performance of a French Composition" in the 1995 Cleveland International Piano Competition where she performed with the Ohio Chamber Orchestra. In 1997 she was invited to participate in the "Scholars for Scholars" music festival for the American Cancer She also travelled to the 2nd Society in Melbourne, Florida. Hamamatsu International Piano Academy, Japan, as representative of the Eastman School of Music, was top prize winner of the Hamamatsu Academy Piano Competition.

Ms. Lomazov is currently a doctoral candidate at she Eastman School of Music where she studies with, and is assistant to, Professor Natalya Antonova.
