














## UNDEFEATED

TIGERS MARCH THROUGH GAC REGULAR SEASON WITH 10-O RECORD

For the fourth time in the history of the program, the Tigers went undefeated in the regular season, clinching an undisputed conference title. This was an especially exciting accomplishment for the fifth year seniors who chose to return to accomplish this goal. Their return not only meant a lot to their coaches, but also their teammates.

Quarterback Riley Harms, a kinesiology major from Fremont, Neb., said, "It's not like they just came back and played the 11 games. It's the whole offseason, the whole summer, and then all the practices that come with it, so that was a big part of the year was being able to do it for those guys."

Jay Derby, offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, noted that in his 24 years of coaching at Ouachita, the goal of reaching the NCAA playoffs and having an undefeated season was no longer a goal. It was an expectation.

vidually-won awards, it would be appropriate for the season to be considered successful as many members of the team were honored for their hard work.


"I wasn't expecting the awards I received this season," Braziel said. "I was so excited and grateful for these awards and I couldn't have done it without the other girls."



Right before hitting the field, the team would take one moment together. "We come together before the game to discuss how we as a team can be successful and we close out by saying the Lord's prayer," said Terry.



pray before each game, or thanking Him for the abilities He had blessed them with, these men recognized the goodness of God through their chosen sport.



In the midst of long bus rides to far away games, the girls developed an unbreakable bond on and off the soccer field.


Jaymee Dotson, a kinesiology major from Princeton, Texas, was named to the All-

The season ended at the GAC conference tournament when Oklahoma Baptist scored in the final seconds to win. By// Rose Robinson









Star City, Arkansas, a small agricultural Arkansas Delta town of just barely 2,000 people, is known as the setting for a 1992 police thriller film titled "One False Move." A blockbuster movie was not the only thing to come out of Star City. It is also the place that Coach Todd Knight calls

Knight grew up in Star City, Arkansas, and only moved away for his true love, playing football. As a standout player for the Star City Bulldogs, it was no surprise when he decided to play at the next level. During his time at Ouachita, he continued to grow as a football player and eventually decided he wanted to coach. After moving to Delta State and UT El Paso, Knight found his way back to Ouachita in 1999 and has served as the head football coach ever since. With 23 seasons leading the team, Knight is currently the longest-standing football coach in Arkansas.

Knight's legacy of work on behalf of his players and colleagues was recognized at the national level in early January. He received the honor of being nominated as the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) president while attending the yearly convention in Charlotte. In this role, he will push for policy changes, represent coaches from high school to the NFL, and continue to lead the Ouachita Tigers as their head coach while also leading on a national level.

This is our professional organization. There are probably 15,000 coaches from the NFL down the high school. I've been a member since the late 80s," said Knight. In 2012, Grant Teaff, a historic coach from Baylor, advocated for Knight to be one of only two division two representatives on the

"It's an ascending board, as people leave or change jobs you move up in leadership," said Knight. Because of his long tenure at Ouachita, Knight was able to work his way up in the AFCA and serve as the vice president and now as the president. Serving under legendary coaches such as Mack Brown from Texas and Tommy Tuberville from Cincinnati, Knight never thought he would ascend into the presidency.

We are working on things that affect college football, coaches and players," said Knight, "We give input to NCAA committees and coaches, to improve coaches and make the game better for players. That's really our focus." With new guidelines for NIL (Name, Image and Likeness) deals and the college football transfer portal, advocating for coaches and players looks different than it did when Knight joined the AFCA in the 1980s.

"Nobody understands how the portal is changing college football. It looks good. it looks glamorous, but it's really not," said Knight, "This sport was created to be a team sport and it dismantles football teams. It takes brotherhood and leaning on each other. All of a sudden, the loyalty is gone." Knight's goal in addressing these major changes in college football is to use his role, and the team surrounding him, to set parameters to make the portal healthy for coaches, players, and the team aspect of the game. A major concern associated with the portal is graduation rates. Student-athletes that enter the transfer portal struggle to graduate.

Knight's athletes being successful after they hang up their cleats has always been a priority. The impact he has made on students during his long stint at Ouachita has not gone unnoticed, and now his impact will transition to the national level.

"I'm at a national convention and they are introducing Ouachita and they can finally pronounce it. I wouldn't be in this spot if it wasn't for Ouachita," said Knight. The people that Knight surrounds himself with know what Ouachita is, and those surrounding knight have some pretty big names. Sam Pittman, head coach at the University of Arkansas, serves under Coach Knight on the AFCA board. It's no surprise to those that call 410 Quachita Street home that the Tigers could hold their own at the national level, but it's time people from outside of Southern Arkansas know it as well.


'I really think for our football program and school, it shines a light on us. It's kind of like a football player, you can't measure someone's heart," said Knight, "and It's the same way with our school, you can't measure us by enrollment, you have to measure us by production and what we do." One major production of Knight's time at OBU is his work with the "Be the Match" organization. Each president of the AFCA gets to pick a philanthropic organization to promote.

The president gets to decide what our focus is going to be, so going into the fall, the Andy Talley Be The Match Organization will be our big push," said Knight. This organization manages the most diverse marrow registry in the world. They help patients that are diagnosed with life-threatening blood cancers like leukemia and lymphoma find a transplant match. For 70% of patients, there is not a full match within their family. This shows how important a matching registry is for these patients.

"The AFCA is more than just Xs and Os, it's about service as well," said Knight. Knight has promoted this organization multiple times at Ouachita, hosting membership drives all across campus. Knight recruited his football team to set up booths around campus to encourage the student body to join the match program. His plan is to use the coming year to sponsor drives across America.


"It is a lifetime appointment. After ascending to the presidency I will become a past president and will be invited to attend all of the meetings," said Knight, "As long as I'm coaching, I will be part of the clinic. There are guys that come to the clinic that have been retired for 20 years." After Knight's year of service as president, he will still be involved with the AFCA as an ex-officio member. This means he will be invited to give input and suggestions but will not be a voting

"My passion is to make college football the best that it can be, I want to improve the situations of coaches, and I want to improve the situations for all players and especially my players here at Ouachita," said Knight. By // Caroline Johnson




"Every time it seems like they're backed against a wall, doubted, or didn't have respect they always found a way to come through consistently," said Howard. Nowell was in agreement.










- 1. Senior Jud Arrington takes a swing in a midweek game at Henderson State.

"We grew as a team and as people throughout the season as our team chemistry was really good," Lester said. By // Rose Robinson
















Beyond her personal goals, the team also set a goal to get top three in the 800 free relays. At conference, the Tigers achieved this goal and placed in the top three.



In post season honors, the cross country team was named an All-Academic team by the U.S. Track and Field and Cross Country Association. By // Lilly Biggers











LADY TIGERS WIN CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP

Track and cross country won a championship and broke records this season. Through hard work and dedication, the teams earned recognition for their hard work. Led by Coach Steve Guymon, the teams experienced a monumental season in both sports.

For cross country, it was the university's first women's cross country GAC championship, and Guymon was named GAC Coach of the Year.

"I love that track is so individualized. I have my own goals and track allows me to work on those," said Allison Hylkema, a freshman communications and media major from Jackson, Tennessee, who was a member of both teams. Hylkema ran the 5k and 10k races for cross country. She beat her own personal record in the 5k event this season.

"With cross country we're united as a team.

You're able to connect a lot more because you're relying on each other more," said Nataly Nailing, a junior accounting major from Fayetteville who also competed on both teams.

"I'd say Florida was our best meet for cross country. We didn't expect to win, but when we did it was nice to be there all together and celebrate with the team," said Nailing. Ouachita won the meet in Pensacola, Florida, with an average time of 20 minutes and 20 seconds in the 5k event. This course was on sand and was very difficult compared to what the team was used to.

The track team ended the season at the GAC

championships placing 6th. At this meet 25 personal bests were beaten.

The cross country team ended the season at the NCAA regional meet after placing 13th. The team was invited to the regional meet after winning the GAC championship.


Athletes on both teams were recognized by the conference for their performances and their success in the classroom.

was an intramural loved for its uniqueness.


