CONSTITUTION

Article I.—The Name

The name of this body shall be "The Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

Article II.—The Purpose

The purpose of this Convention shall be to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer co-operation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God.

Article III.—Membership

Section 1. The Convention shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Convention, and which desire to co-operate with other churches through this Convention.

Section 2. Each co-operating church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for each additional one hundred members, or major fraction thereof above one hundred, provided however, that no church shall be entitled to a total of more than ten messengers.

Section 3. The Convention may appoint a committee on credentials at each session which shall make recommendations to the Convention with reference to seating messengers from any church not hitherto affiliated with the Convention.

Article IV.—Authority

Section 1. While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, this Convention shall never exercise any authority whatever over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the constitution of any church, or with the exercise of its functions as the only ecclesiastical body, but will cheerfully recognize and uphold the absolute independence of the churches.

Article V.—Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Each officer of the Convention shall be elected annually, except the Recording Secretary and Treasurer who shall be the same as the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board, and shall continue in office until his successor in office shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the deliberations of the Convention and to discharge such other duties as may devolve upon the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all committees unless the Convention shall

otherwise determine. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in his stead.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of the proceedings of the Convention, to edit and arrange publication of a suitable number of the minutes for distribution among the churches, as the Convention may direct, as soon as reasonably possible after the close of the session. He shall file and keep in order all papers deemed important to the work of the Convention.

Article VI.—The Executive Board

Section 1. This Convention shall elect a Board of Trustees as provided for in the Convention's charter. This Board shall be known as the "Executive Board of Arkansas Baptist State Convention." This Board shall be composed of one member from the bounds of each co-operating association with a membership up to 5,000, and one additional member for each additional 5,000 constituency, or major fraction thereof, provided however, that no association shall be entitled to more than five (5) members. The state President and the Executive Secretary of Woman's Missionary Union shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Board. Upon the removal of any Executive Board member from the bounds of his or her association, his or her membership on the Executive Board ceases therewith; his or her successor in office may be named by the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board to hold office until the next meeting of the Convention. No member of this board shall hold any remunerative office under the Convention or any of its institutions. One-third of this board shall be elected annually to hold office for three years, and twenty (20) members shall constitute a quorum. Any member of the Executive Board who misses all the Executive Board meetings and the Executive Board committee meetings for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on the Board.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall be constituted and empowered by the Convention as its business and legal agent to administer all business committed to it by the Convention, and to employ such paid agents as it may deem necessary in carrying out the missionary, educational, benevolent and financial enterprises of the Convention. The Executive Board shall raise, collect, receive and disburse all the funds of the Baptist Cooperative Program, both state and southwide. The office of the Executive Board shall be a clearing house for administering the business affairs of the Convention, and a headquarters for Baptist information. Its books, records and files shall at all time be open for the reference and inspection of any co-operating church which may desire to examine them.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall render to the Convention annually a complete and detailed statement of all its business for the year.

Article VII.—Trusteeships

The Convention shall elect trustees to manage and to operate its colleges, hospitals, orphanages and any other institutions it may possess, as follows:

Section 1. Ouachita Baptist University, 24; Arkansas Baptist Home for Children, 18; Baptist Memorial Hospital, 9; Southern Baptist College, 24.

Section 2. One-third of the members of the Boards of Trustees shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. Any member of any Board of Trustees who misses all the meetings of that Board for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on that Board.

Section 3. Each Board of Trustees shall elect from their membership a chairman and a recording secretary and such other officers as seems advisable.

Section 4. All trusteeships shall render to the Convention at each annual session complete and detailed reports of all transactions and business and any other activities for the year, and shall be subject to the direction of the Convention in all matters pertaining to administering the affairs of the institution with which their trusteeship is concerned.

Article VIII.—Operation of Agencies

Section 1. Each board, agency, and institution of this Convention shall submit to the Executive Board at its annual budget planning meeting, which is to be held prior to the annual meeting of the Convention, a detailed statement of its sources of income, and a budget of proposed expenditures for the ensuing year. When received and adopted by the Convention, these budgets shall become the basis for the operations for the ensuing year.

Article IX.—Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall meet annually, "if God permit," on a date to be fixed by the Convention. The Executive Board is empowered in emergencies to call special sessions of the Convention and to change either the time or place of meeting or both should the occasion demand.

Article X.—Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of this Convention, two-thirds of the members voting concurring in the measure, except Article IV which shall remain forever unalterable in substance.

Section 2. Any proposed amendment to this Constitution shall be presented to the Convention in writing, for its consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, and may be voted on, on any subsequent day during the session, provided adequate publicity has been given in previous announcement.

Article XI.—Parliamentary Authority

Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard for deciding questions of parliamentary procedure.

BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are enacted for the government of the Convention.

1. Enrollment of Messengers

The Secretary of the Convention shall enroll, upon arrival, messengers who present proper credentials from the churches. These messengers, together with others who may be enrolled upon presentation of approved credentials during the session, shall constitute the Convention. Any contention concerning seating messengers shall be presented to a committee appointed by the President for recommendation to the Convention for its action.

2. Officers

The President, First Vice-President, and Second Vice-President shall be elected on the second day of the Convention, their terms of office to begin with the final session of the Convention.

The election of all officers shall be by ballot; provided, however, there is only one nomination for the office, then the Secretary or any other present may be directed to cast the ballot of the entire assembly for the single nominee.

The first vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after balloting for the president has been completed and the winner announced, and the second vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after the balloting for the first vice president has been completed and the winner announced.

Each officer of the Convention shall be elected by a majority of all votes cast.

In case of removal from office, by death or otherwise, of the President, the Vice-Presidents shall automatically succeed to the office of President in the order of their election. The President may not be elected for more than two consecutive terms.

The Treasurer of the Executive Board shall be also Treasurer of the Convention.

All elected officers of this Convention shall be members of churches co-operating with this Convention. This must also apply to members of the Executive Board and the institutional boards of this Convention.

3. The Executive Board

The Executive Board, being the legal trustee of the Convention, shall be empowered by the Convention to administer all business committed to it by the Convention.

The Executive Board is empowered to act for the Convention between sessions of the Convention, provided that it shall never exercise any authority contrary to the expressed will of the Convention.

When any unforeseen emergency occurs in any of the affairs of the Convention, or in any of the interests it controls, that in the judgment of the Executive Board requires action before the next session of the Convention, the Executive Board shall have full authority to take such action as may seem necessary, and all interests concerned shall be governed by such action, provided the Executive Board shall make full report of all matters pertaining thereunto to the next session of the Convention for its approval, and provided further, that nothing in this article shall be construed as giving the Executive Board authority to execute any matter already committed by the Convention to any of its Boards of Trustees or its institutions unless such Board when so commissioned shall decline to act on the orders of the Convention.

All proposals requiring the expenditures of money by the Convention, or the Executive Board of the Convention, from the annual budget, shall be considered by the Executive Board, before being presented to the Convention.

This Board shall be charged with the responsibility to have the books and financial affairs of each and all of the boards and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention audited annually by an accredited firm of auditors, all audits to be accessible to the Executive Board at its budget planning session, and to be included in the institution's report to the Convention.

Members of the Executive Board, having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

The various associations of Arkansas whose churches are affiliated with this Convention, may submit to the committee on nominations names of those whom they believe should be considered for membership on the Executive Board as members from that association.

4. Trusteeships

All trusteeships of this Convention shall be amenable to the Convention on all matters, through its Executive Board. No trusteeship shall conduct extra movements to raise money outside its regular revenue-producing sources, nor shall a deficit in running expense or debt be incurred without the approval of the Convention in session or of the Executive Board in case of aforementioned emergencies, except, as follows: When an emergency arises concerning the opportunity to purchase needed property for expansion, the president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board and the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board (all three concurring) believing such an emergency exists and deeming it wise to incur indebtedness, may give the Trustees of an institution such permission, and make a full report to the Executive Board and to the next Convention in session.

Members of Boards of Trustees having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

Not more than two (2) members of a Board of Trustees shall at the same time be members of the same local church, nor shall more than six (6) members reside in any one association.

A member of a Board of Trustees of one institution of the Convention may not at the same time be a member of any other Board of Trustees of another institution of the Convention.

No member of a Board of Trustees of any institution of this Convention may at the same time be a member of the Executive Board of the Convention.

5. Committee Members

1. A nine-member rotating Nominating Committee, comprised of at least three laymen, will place in nomination at each annual convention names of persons to fill vacancies on all convention boards. At each annual convention, the president will appoint one-third of this committee to three-year terms to replace the one-third rotating off, plus filling any vacancies that may exist on the committee at that time. Nominations for all boards from this Nominating Committee must be as equitably divided as possible between the eight existing districts of our state convention. The president shall also name the chairman, who shall come from a one-year term member.

2. A member filling an unexpired term not having served the full term of years as provided by the Constitution, shall be, at the discretion of the Nominating Committee, eligible for election to a full term.

3. No member of a commission or committee delegated to study or make recommendations concerning our institutions shall be a member of any Board of Trustees of such institutions.

4. All associational missionaries or mission pastors receiving all or part compensation from the Convention through the Executive Board shall be considered employees of the Convention and shall not be members of any Convention or institutional board. The president of the Convention by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Board for the duration of his term of office.

6. Constitution and By-Laws Committee

A standing Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be composed of six (6) members to be nominated by the Nominating Committee. One-third of the membership (2) shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three (3) years. No member shall be eligible to serve more than two terms until one year has elapsed.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of advising the presiding officer concerning constitutional matters during the annual session of the convention with

reference to matters which may arise from the floor or from other committees. The committee will act ad interim in all matters concerning the Constitution and By-Laws referred to it by the boards and agencies of the convention. The committee will receive all proposed constitutional changes before the convention, and will be responsible for presenting them in writing, for convention consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, after adequate publicity has been given. The duties of this committee in no way preclude amendments to the constitution by messengers to the convention.

APPENDICES

1. **Appendices** (1967 annual, page 40)

Resolution adopted that a search be made of the minutes of the convention to discover policies and interpretations which have been adopted in past years, and these interpretations and policies be added at the end of the constitution and by laws of the convention as appendices.

2. **Church Ordinances** (1965 annual, page 31)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, in the past, the most general interpretation of the New Testament, and the most general interpretation of the Word 'principles' as it is used in Article 3, Section 1, of our constitution, and the most prevalent practice of Baptist churches in Arkansas with reference to the church ordinances, has been what is commonly called "close baptism" and "close communion", and

Whereas, it is recorded on page 57 of the minutes of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention meeting in Fort Smith in 1937 that the Convention officially objected to the teaching of alien immersion and open communion in one of our seminaries, thereby establishing a precedence for future conventions, therefore,

Be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in its 112th annual session, go on record as objecting to the reception of alien immersion and the practice of open communion, and

Be it further resolved that we urge churches everywhere to re-examine the New Testament teachings on baptism and the Lord's Supper.

3. **Federal Aid** (1965 annual, page 43)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, Arkansas Baptists have been faced with the issue of Federal aid to private institutions, and, whereas, many feel that the acceptance of such funds violates the cherished Baptist position of the separation of church and state, therefore, be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention go on record as reaffirming our traditional Baptist position on the separation of church and state, and that we urge all of our Baptist insitutions and programs to respect this principle.

4. **Executive Board Recommendations** (1963 annual, page 35)

Voted that all recommendations of the Executive Board shall be published in the **Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine** one month prior to the meeting of the state convention.

5. **Book of Reports** (1959 annual, page 28)

Voted that the convention constitution and by-laws be printed each year in the **Book of Reports** for the convenience of our messengers.

6. **Baptist Memorial Hospital Trustees** (1959 annual, page 29)

Voted that the members of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, not be included in the ruling which would prevent their serving on this board and one other convention board.

7. **Capital Indebtedness** (1959 annual, page 30)

Voted that all requests for capital indebtedness by any convention institution or agency must be submitted to the Executive Board at least 90 days in advance of the July meeting of the Executive Board.

8. **Out-of-state participation by Executive Board staff** (1953 annual, page 22)

Voted that we recommend the Cooperative Program as the best method of giving financial support to the Baptist work at home and abroad. We discourage any of the departments of our Arkansas Baptist work in accepting invitations to participate in the work of missions outside of our regular work within our state territory, at the expense of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention Departments involved. Further, we request our Executive Secretary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the President of the Executive Board confer with the heads of all Southern Baptist agencies expressing our concern about the practices of asking State Convention departments to give employees to such efforts outside our state, unless expenses and salaries are provided for by the agencies that use such workers.

9. **Seating of Messengers** (1949 annual, page 92)

Resolution adopted that this convention refuse to seat any messengers from any church that accepts alien immersion; practices open communion; or affiliates with any branch of the Federal Council of Churches, World Council of Churches; or any other organization similar to or growing out of such.

1. The One Hundred Fifteenth Annual Session (120th year) of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in Convention Center, Hot Springs, was called to order with Thomas A. Hinson, West Memphis, President, presiding. The theme of the convention "Fulfillment Through Evangelism and Missions."

2. Music for the convention was coordinated and directed by Hoyt A. Mulkey, Secretary, Church Music; Mrs. Lehman Webb, Hot Springs, served as organist and Mrs. Bernes Selph, Benton, pianist.

3. The meeting opened with the Music Men of Arkansas singing. Mr. Mulkey led the messengers in singing "The Church's One Foundation" and "Come Thou Fount."

4. Marvin Tate, Associate Professor of Old Testament Interpretation, Southern Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky, brought the opening devotional study from Isaiah.

5. Hot Springs Mayor Dan Wolfe, and Hugh Owen, Malvern, Superintendent of Missions for Central Baptist Association, brought words of greeting from the host city and association.

6. There was a motion and second that all duly elected and registered messengers present and those who come in who know themselves to be duly elected and registered messengers be seated to constitute the body of the 1968 convention.

Carl Overton, Hamburg, read the following resolution:

"Whereas, the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in 1937 officially rejected the teaching of alien immersion and open communion in one of our seminaries, thereby establishing a precedent for future conventions, and

"Whereas, the most general interpretation of the word 'principles' as it is used in Article 3, Section 1, of our Constitution, and the most prevalent practice of Baptists in Arkansas, with reference to the church ordinances, has been what is commonly called 'close baptism' and 'close communion', and

"Whereas, the 1949 Convention by resolution, interpreted the terms 'regular Baptist churches' in the Constitution to mean that messengers from any church which practices open communion and accepts alien immersion, or affiliates with any branch of the Federal Council of Churches or World Council of Churches, are not entitled to seats in this convention, and

"Whereas, the 1950 Convention reaffirmed the action of the previous year, and

"Whereas, the 1965 Convention refused seats in its body to the messengers from the First Baptist Church, Russellville because of their stated policy of acceptance of alien immersion and the practice of open communion, and

"Whereas, the 1966 Convention refused to act on a resolution to invite the messengers from Russellville, First Baptist Church, to seats in its body, and

"Whereas, it is reported that the University Baptist Church, Little Rock, recently received persons into its fellowship not only by alien immersion but also on sprinkling for baptism, and

"Whereas, the First Baptist Church, Malvern, on Sunday night, November 17th, 1968, voted to practice open communion

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

"That the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in its 120th year in Hot Springs, November 18-20, 1968, withdraw fellowship from the above named churches for practices contrary to the spirit and letter of its constitution."

A motion by Carl Overton that the rules be suspended so the resolution could be acted on immediately was seconded and carried.

Mr. Overton moved the adoption of his resolution, Second. James Ware, layman, Conway, made a statement and moved the motion be tabled. Second but motion to table was defeated. Merle A. Johnson, Jr., Malvern, made the following statement against the resolution.

"Mr. President:

"Once again we are brought back to the question of baptism and communion. However, the fundamental crisis at this time is a basically philosophical question of the nature of this convention. Before we vote on the stated issue of these practices, I humbly ask for a definitive statement of the nature of the convention.

"My questions are thusly:

1. "Is this a convention of messengers or churches? (The messenger system as I understand it is Southern Baptist and the churches or delegate system is Landmark and this is one of the three fundamental differences in our make up.)
2. "If you say 'yes' and this convention is a convention of messengers, is it legally and constitutionally possible to sit in judgment on messengers for the practices of the churches. Mr. President, is it not a violation of our own constitution to examine doctrinal practices of the churches until such time shall arise that our constitution be amended to qualify the word 'regular' by a constitutional amendment? 'Yes' or 'No', sir? If 'yes', is not this whole business out of order when referring to churches? And, sir, if this business of reference to a local church's practice is not out of order by the constitution, would you tell us on what basis it is in order? An appendix to the constitution is not an article or an amendment to the constitution; it is an interpretation and not binding until it is ratified by an amendment procedure. Is this not correct?

3. "If this is a convention of messengers then is it constitutionally possible to broach this subject concerning a local church's practice since we are not seating churches here but messengers?"
4. "If your answer that this convention is a convention of messengers, is the fundamental question not one of the practices of the churches in question, but the messengers since we are not seating churches but messengers?"
5. "Is it not possible that even though the majority here believe in Baptist baptism and close communion that some of the messengers from those churches in question differ with their churches? If this is a convention of messengers then it is the orthodoxy of the messengers which is in question and not the churches, since churches have no constitutional function here and only messengers are seated and are a part of this convention.

If one messenger from a so-called offending church believes like this body and not like his church then should he have his credentials revoked? We cannot know until we ask each messenger."
6. "I ask you, sir, that each messenger of each church in question, to be in keeping with our constitution of a convention of messengers, be taken to a room and interrogated before the Credentials Committee and that the Credentials Committee confine its duties to messengers not churches."
7. "Finally, since we are a body of messengers and not churches in the technical sense, I submit that not only the messengers of the churches in question are subject to discipline but that to be legally fair with our constitution that each messenger here who believes in communion for Christians other than Baptists and believers' baptism administered by other than a Baptist Church be unseated as well, regardless from which church he comes."

There is no fundamental difference in the fitness of messengers regardless of their home church's stand. It is not church's policies but potential messengers private beliefs which are at stake here—if we are a convention of messengers.

Sir: are we a convention of messengers or churches and do we not adjourn sine die each year thereby giving us no legal and technical jurisdiction over the churches of this convention and only over messengers at these sessions?

Please answer this because some of us cannot even understand our constitution in the light of this discussion on judgment of the church's practices while we leave out the right of each messenger to speak for himself."

Perry Blount, pastor, Lake Village, stated that the Lake Village Baptist Church on December 8, 1965 in regular church conference voted 76-2 to practice open communion and moved to amend the resolution to add the name of the Lake Village Baptist Church to the list of churches named in the resolution. Amendment was carried.

Morris Smith, Morrilton, and John McClanahan, Pine Bluff, spoke against the resolution. Glenn McCalmon, Little Rock, questioned whether the 1949 action was binding and the chair ruled the presiding officer is bound by such action of the convention until a change is made to the contrary. H. H. Harvill, Humphrey, called for a point

of order that the body had no legal right to vote, not having been organized, but the chair ruled the procedure in order. Dean Newberry, Rogers, Chairman, Tellers Committee, instructed the messengers on which ballot to use and the ballot vote on the resolution to withdraw fellowship from Russellville, First; Malvern, First; University, Little Rock, and Lake Village Church was carried, 491 - yes; 312 - no.

7. Robert Bauman, Manager, Baptist Book Store, spoke to the messengers concerning the service of the book store to Baptists of Arkansas and told of the exhibit prepared for assistance to the churches during the work of the new year.

8. The president gave a forecast of the program for the sessions to follow.

9. The original motion to seat messengers except those from the churches named in the resolution was carried.

10. Tal Bonham, Pine Bluff, Chairman of the Committee on Order of Business, moved that the printed program be adopted and all items in upper case letters be priority items to appear at the stated time to preserve the time allotted for the guest speakers. Following clarification of the question raised by William Garner, Texarkana, as to when business and discussion would be continued, the president ruled it would be continued immediately following the priority speaker, the motion was carried.

12. Miscellaneous Business

(1) A proposed change in the by-laws was read by Jerry Don Abernathy and referred to the Committee on Order of Business.

(2) Morris Smith moved the Executive Secretary be instructed not to receive Cooperative Program funds from the churches not seated. **Second. Motion was defeated.**

(3) Jack Clack, Brinkley, read a proposed constitutional change which was referred to the Committee on Order of Business.

(4) Dean Newberry moved that ballots printed in the back of the program be the official ballot for voting and no other ballots be recognized. **Second, carried.**

13. Carl Bunch, Jonesboro, chairman, Committee on Southern Baptist College's offer, reviewed the history of the work of the committee.

14. In accord with the priority items on the program, the chair called for the Keynote Address. Dr. Warren Hultgren, pastor, First, Tulsa, Oklahoma, used the convention theme, "Fulfillment Through Evangelism and Missions."

15. Carl Bunch read the following recommendation from the committee on the Southern Baptist College Offer and moved it be adopted. Second. Mr. Bunch spoke to the report.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY SOUTHERN BAPTIST COLLEGE'S OFFER THAT SHE BE ACCEPTED AS A MEMBER OF THE FAMILY OF ARKANSAS BAPTIST INSTITUTIONS

"Your committee which has been instructed to study Southern Baptist College's offer that she be included in the family of Arkansas Baptist institutions recommends that her request be honored; that she be received and that Arkansas Baptists accept the full responsibility which this entails.

"It is further recommended that our institutions of Christian higher education be under one board of trustees to be known as the Board of Christian Education. This will necessitate changes in our constitution and those of Ouachita Baptist University and Southern Baptist College. Thus, it is recommended that the necessary changes be made to provide for the one board, the Board of Christian Education, and to provide for the composition of the board as is herein-after recommended.

"The Board of Christian Education shall be composed of thirty members. Initially, fifteen members shall be impartially selected by and from each of the present boards of trustees. These thirty members will be impartially assigned a one, two, or three year term of service so as to provide that ten members shall rotate off the board each year. Those to succeed them shall be elected according to the Convention's policy pertaining there-to.

"Both institutions will continue an independent operation under separate administrations and budgets. Endowments will not become the common property of both institutions but will remain the property of the separate institutions. Any future endowments will become the property of the institution which the donor may name. Undesignated endowments will be equitably shared by both institutions as determined by the Board of Christian Education.

"The acceptance of Southern Baptist College into the family of Arkansas Baptist institutions and the formation of the Christian Education shall be immediately effective upon the adoption of this report. The Board of Christian Education will be considered as a new board in determining terms of service of the board members.

"We further recommend that this action be reviewed by a committee appointed by the convention president then in office at the convention three (3) years from this action. Such committee will study the operational effectiveness of the board structure and bring

recommendations for changes in the system which they deem necessary to the 1972 convention.

W. O. Vaught, Jr., Little Rock, spoke against the proposal for one board for the two schools and moved to amend the report "by striking from their report all reference to one board, and in the place of their recommendation for one board we authorize the convention to elect separate boards of trustees of 24 members each to operate these two colleges." Amendment was seconded. S. A. Whitlow and Ralph A. Phelps urged approval of the recommendation of the committee and defeat of the amendment. Kenneth Threet, Piggott; Paul McCray, Jonesboro; and Don Hook, Little Rock, spoke for the amendment. Amendment was carried. The motion to adopt the report as amended was carried.

Burton Miley called attention to a change needed in the constitution concerning boards of trustees for the institutions. The chair requested the Committee on Order of Business to include this item in their report.

Tal Bonham stated the three items concerning changes in the constitution and by-laws would be considered on Tuesday morning at 10:30 a.m.

The session was adjourned in prayer by Thomas A. Hinson.

19. Vice President Digby read greetings from the Kentucky Baptist Convention and the Ohio Baptist Convention.

20. Robert Bauman spoke briefly concerning the books and records available in the book store exhibit.

21. Following special music by John Richardson, West Memphis, Thomas A. Hinson brought the president's address, "Twin Heartbeats — Evangelism and Missions."

22. Miscellaneous Business

(1) A standing vote of appreciation for the president's message was given and the editor of the **Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine** stated that the message would be carried in the next issue.

(2) Constitutional Changes and Amendments.

Jerry Don Abernathy read the following proposed change in the constitution and moved its adoption:

"To strike from By-law 2, paragraph one, these words: 'and the president shall appoint and announce a nominating committee to report at the next session of the convention' and add, as the first paragraph of By-law 5, the following:

"A nine-member rotating committee on Boards will place in nomination at each annual convention names of persons to

fill vacancies on all convention boards. At each annual convention, the president will appoint one-third of this committee to three-year terms to replace the one-third rotating off, plus filling any vacancies that may exist on the committee at that time. Nominations for all boards from this committee on boards must be as equitably divided as possible between the eight existing districts of our state convention.

"This action, when passed, will require a change in By-law 5; paragraphs 1, 2, 3 will become 2, 3, 4 respectively, and in paragraph 1, the name NOMINATING COMMITTEE will become COMMITTEE ON BOARDS.

"To set up the original Committee on Boards, all nine members will be appointed by the Convention President and the length of their terms indicated in this appointment."

A motion to amend the proposed change to state that the convention president would name the chairman of the committee from the one-year members on the committee was seconded and carried. Amos Greer moved it be amended to change the committee name from "Committee on Boards" to "Nominating Committee." Seconded and carried. A motion by John McClanahan to amend the change to require one-third of the committee members to be laymen, (men or women) was seconded and carried.

The change in the constitution was carried as amended:

"A nine-member rotating Nominating Committee, comprised of at least three (3) laymen, will place in nomination at each annual convention names of persons to fill vacancies on all convention boards. At each annual convention, the president will appoint one-third of this committee to three-year terms to replace the one-third rotating off, plus filling any vacancies that may exist on the committee at that time. Nominations for all boards from this Nominating Committee must be as equitably divided as possible between the eight districts of our state convention. The president shall name the chairman from a one-year term member of the committee."

(3) Jack Clack, Brinkley, read the following proposed change in the convention By-laws, and moved its adoption:

6. "Constitution and By-laws Committee

"A standing Constitution and By-laws Committee shall be composed of six (6) members to be nominated by the Nominating Committee. One-third of the membership (2) shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three (3) years. No member shall be eligible to serve more than two terms until one year has elapsed.

"The Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of advising the presiding officer concerning constitutional matters during the annual session of the convention with reference to matters which may arise from the floor or from other committees. The committee will act ad interim in all matters concerning the Constitution and By-laws referred to it by the boards and agencies of the Convention. The Committee will receive all proposed constitutional changes before the convention, and will be responsi-

ble for presenting them in writing, for convention consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, after adequate publicity has been given. The duties of this committee in no way preclude amendments to the Constitution by messengers to the convention."

The motion was seconded and carried.

(4) A statement by Refus Caldwell, Perryville, concerning the seating of messengers in the 1969 convention was read but no action taken. The chair requested other Miscellaneous Business items to be delayed until the Wednesday morning session.

23. A motion to re-schedule the Executive Board's recommendation on the 1969 budget from 3:10 p.m. Wednesday was approved unanimously.

24. Election of Officers

Andrew Hall, Fayetteville, nominated Thomas A. Hinson for re-election as president. A motion and second that he be elected by acclamation was carried. John McClanahan nominated Judge Tom F. Digby for First Vice President. Richard Vestal nominated Tal Bonham. A ballot vote on the First Vice President and Tom Digby was re-elected.

25. Mason Craig, alternate, read the scripture and led in prayer. Following special music by Elois Hines, Little Rock, and Don Edmonson, Fayetteville, with Mrs. Sonneman at the organ, Andrew Hall, Fayetteville, delivered the annual sermon, "By Who's Authority."

The election of Second Vice President was scheduled for Tuesday afternoon following the message by Mrs. Behanna. The session was adjourned with prayer by R. H. Dorris, North Little Rock.

SECOND DAY — AFTERNOON SESSION

Tuesday, November 19, 1968

26. Kenneth Threet, Piggott, Second Vice President, called the meeting to order. Charles Mayo, Benton, led the messengers in singing, "The Master Doth Call Us," and "I Stand Amazed in the Presence." Ed Claybrook, Paragould, led in prayer. Marvin Tate brought the devotional message from Isaiah.

27. Maurice Caldwell, Executive Director, Arkansas Baptist Home for Children, brought the report of the children's home with the help of Ed Claybrook, a member of the Board of Trustees.

28. Elmer S. West, Jr., Director, Program Development, Christian Life Commission, Southern Baptist Convention, spoke of their work.

29. W. Henry Goodloe, Executive Director, Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas reported on its work.

30. Stanley Lowell spoke briefly on the work of Americans United.

31. Mrs. Floyd Richardson. Warren, Sang "Isn't It A Joy?" W. O. Vaught, Jr., Little Rock, introduced the speaker for the session, Mrs. Gertrude Behanna, San Antonio, Texas, and author of the book, "The Late Liz". Following Mrs. Behanna's testimony of her conversion the session was adjourned in prayer by Lehman Webb, Hot Springs.

SECOND DAY — EVENING SESSION

Tuesday, November 19, 1968

"Power From Above"

32. The session was opened with the Nightingale Singers of Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, singing a medley under the direction of Tommy Lane.

33. Marvin Tate brought the devotional Bible study from Isaiah, Thomas A. Hinson led in prayer.

34. Kenneth Threet was nominated for re-election as Second Vice President. Motion and second that he be elected by acclamation was carried.

35. The Baptist Memorial Hospital report was given by Maurice Elliott, new assistant administrator.

Voted: To adopt the printed report of Baptist Memorial Hospital as found in the Book of Reports.

36. The 1968 report of the Executive Board programs and plans for 1969 were presented in an unusual pageant written by Mrs. Leland E. Miller, Houston, Texas. Taking part in the drama were the heads of departments from the Baptist Building, S. A. Whitlow, and numerous representatives from churches in the Hot Springs area.

37. President Hinson recognized all associational superintendents of missions who were present. The following associations were named for high attendance at the convention: Central Association, Hugh Owen, Superintendent of Missions, 79.5% of churches represented; Caroline Association, J. M. James, Superintendent of Missions, 67.8% of churches represented; North Pulaski Association, Jerre R. Hassell, Moderator, 64.7% of churches represented.

38. Following special music by the Nightingale Singers, the closing message of the evening was by W. A. Criswell, Dallas, Texas, who used the topic "Power from Above", with scripture from Joel 2:28.

The final session of the day was adjourned with prayer by Wilson Deese, West Helena.

THIRD DAY -- MORNING SESSION

Wednesday, November 20, 1968

"Preparing the Messengers"

*(Constitutional Amendments Approved—
Reconciliatory Committee Authorized)*

39. President Thomas A. Hinson called the session to order and Roy Chatham, Hope, led the messengers in singing "Wonderful

Words of Life", "A Wonderful Saviour is Jesus My Lord", and "Break Thou the Bread of Life."

40. Burton Miley, Springdale, led in prayer and Marvin Tate brought the morning devotional study from Isaiah.

41. Miscellaneous Business

(1) George T. Blackmon, Executive Secretary, Arkansas Baptist History Commission, brought their report.

Voted: To adopt the report of the Arkansas Baptist History Commission as printed in the Book of Reports with minor corrections.

(2) Constitutional Changes

(a) S. A. Whitlow moved that Article 7, Trusteeships, Section 1, be amended to add: "Southern Baptist College, 24."

Second and carried.

(b) Refus Caldwell, Perryville, read the following statement and moved its adoption:

"Inasmuch as there seems to be a controversy each year about open and closed communion and who should be or not be seated as messengers to our convention,

"I make a motion that each church who wishes to have their messengers seated at the 1969 convention send up a statement of faith and practice to the convention, this being what or whose baptism they will accept and their stand on the Lord's Supper and,

"That a committee be appointed sufficient to study these statements and for their statements to be their credentials whether they be seated or not and that at least three letters be sent to each church in our convention advising them of this action and that these statements be sent to the chairman of the committee not later than August 1, 1969."

The motion was seconded. Brother Caldwell then withdrew his motion in the interest of harmony in the convention.

Voted. To adopt the following motion by Alfred R. Cullum, South McGehee:

"That this convention instruct our president to appoint a Reconciliatory Committee, to be available upon request, to serve in dealing with current frictional situations in churches where fellowship has been withdrawn.

"In the event any church seeks out such help, the committee be instructed to counsel within the framework of the apparent wishes expressed by majority vote in the 1968 Arkansas Baptist State Convention concerning modes and manners of observing the Lord's Supper and receiving membership into local churches.

"The intent of this motion being to make available an open door of restoration of fellowship, this committee, upon sought counsel discovering favorable response, be then instructed to make such report to the Credentials Committee prior to the seating of messengers in the 1969 convention who in turn would present testimony for convention action."

Voted: To extend time three minutes to hear Glynn McCalmon who requested point of personal privilege.

Mr. McCalmon requested advice from the chair on the procedure for restoring fellowship between his church and the convention, and was referred to the Reconciliatory Committee authorized by vote of the convention.

42. Southern Baptist Convention emphasis was made by brief messages from the following representatives:

Seminaries — James Taylor, New Orleans Seminary

Executive Committee and Stewardship Committee — Michael Speer, Nashville, Tennessee

Radio and Television Commission — John Pounders, layman, Little Rock

Annuity Board — T. K. Rucker, Little Rock

Voted: To adopt the report of the Annuity Board as found in the Book of Reports.

43. Following the singing of "Redeemed" by the messengers, Don Hook, Little Rock, introduced the Home Mission Board representative, Victor T. Glass, who spoke concerning our work with National Baptists.

Voted: That the report of the Home Mission Board be approved as printed in the Book of Reports.

44. Cornell Goerner, Richmond, Virginia, represented the Foreign Mission Board. He introduced W. O. Vaught, member of the Board of Trustees for the Foreign Mission Board and several of the foreign missionaries who were present.

Voted: To approve the report of the Foreign Mission Board as printed in the Book of Reports.

45. Other official representatives of Southern Baptist agencies and institutions present were: Bryan Robinson, Atlanta, Southern Baptist Hospitals; Howard Bramlette, Nashville, Education Commission; D. B. Bledsoe, board member and official representative of the Southeastern Seminary; and Crawford Howell, Sunday School Board, Nashville.

46. Following special music by Ben Prince, Little Rock, "Fill My Cup Lord", Robert Naylor, President, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, brought the closing message of the session, "Preparing the Messengers—for What — and Why." The session was adjourned with prayer by Paul Roberts, Little Rock.

THIRD DAY -- AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, November 20, 1968

"Partners In The Task"

(Nominating Committee Report — Resolutions Committee Report — Executive Board Report — 1969 Budget)

47. The session was called to order by Kenneth Threet, Second

Vice President. The meeting was opened with the A M & N College Choir singing a medley of songs.

48. Marvin Tate brought the devotional Bible study on Isaiah.

49. Report of Nominating Committee was read by L. H. Coleman, Pine Bluff, chairman, who moved its adoption. Second. John McClanahan moved the report be amended to delete the nominations for the Ouachita University Board and vote on it as a separate item. Second but amendment was defeated. **The report of Nominating Committee was adopted as read.**

50. Padgett Cope, Little Rock, read the report of the Committee on Resolutions and moved its adoption. Tal Bonham, Pine Bluff, moved to amend the report so that if the Monday holiday bill has already been signed into law that the resolution be changed accordingly. Second and amendment carried. An amendment that a copy of the resolution concerning the mixed drink bill be sent to the governor and to the legislators was seconded and carried. **The report of the Resolutions Committee was adopted as amended.**

1. Resolution on Appreciation to Host City

We are grateful to God for his gracious providence which has brought Arkansas Baptists to Hot Springs for the 1968 Convention. The number of messengers has exceeded all previous records outside the city of Little Rock. The sessions have been good and profitable.

We express our appreciation to the people of Hot Springs who, in typical Hot Springs fashion, officially and unofficially, from the Mayor to the man on the streets, have been friendly, hospitable, and accommodating. The committee on arrangements has put forth every effort for our comfort and convenience. We owe a great debt of gratitude to the press, radio and television for their interesting, balanced and factual coverage of all sessions.

2. Resolution on Appreciation for Host Church

To the host church, the spacious Second Baptist Church, its pastor, Dr. Walter Yeldell, its staff, employees and membership, for gracious provisions and cordial entertainment, we record our feeling of lasting appreciation.

3. Resolution of Appreciation to Program Committee

To the Program Committee, our speakers, guests from various states and institutions, our state Baptist leaders and others for their rich contribution to each session, we offer warm appreciation. We take note of the apparent evidence of an unusual amount of pre-session planning and publicity. Especially do we appreciate President Hinson's "Count-down to Convention" column in the **Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine**, and we believe that the unusual attendance and interest at this convention reflects God's blessings upon the thoroughness of this preparation.

4. Resolution on Appreciation for Convention Officers

The Bible says, "whatsoever ye do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not unto men." In this spirit the officers of our convention have served during the past year. We extend to them our deep gratitude and sincere appreciation for sacrificial and fruitful service in the areas of responsibility given to them.

President Thomas A. Hinson has given himself untiringly to the multitude of responsibilities and activities accompanying his office and has exercised unusual wisdom and dynamic leadership in the discharge of these obligations and opportunities. The convention desires to convey both to him and his faithful church our most sincere gratitude for their willingness to share so freely of time, strength and talent.

Our Vice Presidents, Tom Digby and Kenneth Threet, have at all times stood ready to assist the President in any way possible and to further the work of every department of our convention.

Our Recording Secretary, Mrs. Nadine Bjorkman, has worked efficiently in all her responsibilities. The Convention recognizes with sincere appreciation the fact that this year is eleven years of effective leadership and service on the part of Dr. S. A. Whitlow, our Executive Secretary. To him and to all of his associates, we wish to say simply, but wholeheartedly, "We are grateful to you for a job well done in the service of the Lord."

5. Resolution on Evangelism and the Crusade of the Americas

Whereas, the greatest need of the world is a spiritual awakening and a turning to God through Jesus Christ, and

Whereas, Baptists of this hemisphere are engaged in the greatest evangelistic enterprise in the history of Christianity, the Crusade of the Americas,

Whereas, Dr. C. E. Autrey has expressed his desire to lead our denomination into a tremendous evangelistic and missionary effort.

Therefore, be it resolved that we commend our denominational leaders, and our pastors, and people for their commitment to the cause of evangelism in general and the Crusade of the Americas in particular, and

Be it further resolved, that we call our people to full dedication and prayer that the Holy Spirit will use the Crusade of the Americas to result in a mighty spiritual revival sweeping the hemisphere and the world,

Be it further resolved, that we pledge our prayerful support to our leaders as they seek to guide us in this unprecedented evangelistic undertaking.

6. Resolution on Human Relations

Whereas, Arkansas Baptists as evangelical Christians, have a major responsibility for the Christian witness both in the homeland and around the world, and

Whereas, the progress made toward an easing of racial tensions and a Christian solution does not match the extreme urgency reflected in current crises, and

Whereas, Paul, in his letter to the Colossians (3:11) says, "There cannot be Greek and Jew, circumcision and uncircumcision, barbarians, Scythian, bondman, freeman; but Christ is all, and in all," therefore,

Be it resolved by the messengers assembled in this 115th session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, that we:

1. Rededicate ourselves in the spirit of Christ to a ministry of reconciliation among all men.
2. Remind ourselves that all men stand as equals at the foot of the cross without distinction of color.
3. Pledge ourselves to provide positive leadership in our communities, seeking through conciliation and understanding to obtain peaceful compliance with laws assuring equal rights for all. We further pledge ourselves to go beyond these laws in the practice of Christian love.

7. Resolution on the Lord's Day

Whereas, there is a growing disregard of Sunday as the Lord's Day, and

Whereas, there is under consideration in the Congress of the United States a bill to fix certain national holidays on Monday, and

Whereas, such a bill, if passed, will encourage further disregard of Sunday as the Lord's Day.

Therefore, be it resolved, that we appeal for a proper and faithful observance of Sunday as the Lord's Day by our people.

8. Resolution on Obscenity

Whereas, we find ourselves in the midst of a moral revolution of unprecedented proportions, and

Whereas, the mass media, including television, movies, and literature greatly affect our total society, and

Whereas, there has developed an appalling tendency to violate the most elementary code of moral decency,

Therefore be it resolved:

1. That this convention urge all responsible Christian citizens to appeal to news-stands and proprietors and sellers of all publications to refuse to sell literature of lewd nature.

2. Since the United States Supreme Court has ruled that ordinances and laws passed by counties and municipalities forbidding the sale of pornographic publications is in violation of the constitution, we urge a thorough investigation of new ways and means by which the filth can be legally controlled.

3. That we, as individuals, urge the motion picture industry to reinstate and honor its own code of decency, and

4. That this convention hereby voice the urgent hope that the television industry will reject its current programming of violence, immorality, and illicit sex in favor of basic moral values without which no nation can long endure, and

4. That Sunday television programming avoid conflict of interest with local church services as much as possible.

9. Resolution on State Governmental Affairs

Whereas, there is abundant evidence that a mixed-drink bill will be submitted to the State Legislature in its 1969 session,

Be it resolved, that the 115th session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention go on record as opposing any legislation legalizing the sale of alcoholic beverage by the drink,

Be it therefore resolved, that we appeal to all the Baptists of Arkansas and all Christians to join us in this opposition and to use every means to influence their legislators in opposing any such proposed legislation on this order, and that we give every possible moral support to all legislators who are committed to the defeat of this proposed legislation.

Be it also resolved, that we commend our state governmental officials for their efforts at prison reforms and all other efforts aimed at improving the general welfare of the citizens of our state in areas such as public education, law enforcement, mental, health and rehabilitation and care for children.

Voted: To adopt the following reports of the executive board programs as printed in the Book of Reports; Arkansas Baptist News-magazine, Baptist Student Union, Brotherhood, Church Music, Church Training, Missions-Evangelism, Race Relations, Stewardship and Cooperative Program, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union; and the report of the Arkansas Baptist Foundations with the recommendation.

54. Following a word of appreciation to Clyde Hart, retired recently as secretary of the Race Relations Department, and now state director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Harold Ray, Jonesboro.

THIRD DAY — EVENING SESSION

Wednesday, November 20, 1968

“Passion For the Whole World”

55. The final session of the One Hundred Fifteenth Annual Meeting was opened with the Combined Choirs of Southern Baptist College, Arkansas A M & N College and Ouachita University, singing “The Last Words of David” and “Alleluia.”

56. Marvin Tate brought the final study from Isaiah.

57. H. E. Williams, Walnut Ridge, president, Southern Baptist College, brought the report of the college, assisted by the choir.

Voted: To adopt the report of Southern Baptist College as printed in the Book of Reports.

58. Marvin Green, Stephens, and a member of Ouachita Baptist University Board of Trustees, along with Dr. Ralph A. Phelps, Jr., president, brought the report of Ouachita, assisted by the Ouachita Singers who presented a medley, “Deep River”, “What Wondrous Love is This”, and “When He Shall Come.” A mixed quartet from Ouachita sang “Jesus Revealed in Me” and several students presented excerpts from “God’s Trombones” as a dramatic choral reading.

Voted: To adopt the report of Ouachita Baptist University as printed in the Book of Reports.

The combined choirs closed the education reports with a final number under the direction of Shelton McGehee, Pine Bluff.

Lee, Memphis, calling all to be “genuinely Christian” and “to serve as a missionary at home or abroad.” The meeting was adjourned with prayer by James Hampton, Mena.

ADMINISTRATION

Cooperative Program

It now seems that 1968 will be a good year with our churches. Cooperative Program receipts through the month of September amounts to \$1,797,030.08. This is \$110,000 more than the comparable period for last year. At the present rate of increase we shall almost reach our budget for the year of approximately \$2,500,000. There are indications that the number of baptisms witnessed by our churches should register a small increase over 1967.

Crusade of the Americas

It seems that interest in the Crusade of the Americas is picking up. We shall have had a state-wide rally in Little Rock prior to our annual meeting for this year. In our state the three conventions, Regular Arkansas Missionary Baptist Convention, Inc., the Consolidated Missionary Baptist State Convention and the Arkansas Baptist State Convention are cooperating in this evangelistic effort. It is our hope and prayer this joint effort will make us more effective workers and witnesses as Baptists.

Mission Projects

Our convention has assisted three of our sister conventions this year in mission efforts. During the summer a large number of people went from our state to help in the Denver Crusade. In addition, we helped in this crusade with a contribution of a little more than \$10,000. We also contributed \$2,500 to the Idaho-Utah Convention for what they term Project 400. This is an effort to form "Home Fellowships." This is an approach whereby their convention pays a small salary to pastors to form a worship group in a home where Baptists are not enough to start a church and sustain a continuing ministry. At this writing (October 10) a bus load of pastors has just returned from Detroit, Michigan, where plans are being made for our churches to render assistance to them under Project 500. The opportunity in Detroit is of great magnitude. The men returned in eagerness to make their report to their churches. Likely a number of missions will come to pass as a result of this trip by our men.

New Baptist Building

At this time we are nearing the completion of our new Baptist Building. It is going to be a building of both beauty and utility. We disposed of the properties at Camp Robinson, West Markham Street, and have a firm bid for the property located at 401 West Capitol. We should realize a net of approximately \$285,000. We shall render a compete and detailed statement of the cost of the building upon its completion.

Addition to Chapel at BSU, AM&N College, Pine Bluff

Out of the generosity of Mr. A. O. Smith, a layman from Stamps, Arkansas, we are now in the process of constructing a \$15,000 addition in connection with our center at AM&N College at Pine Bluff which will serve as a chapel. A worthy service is being rendered to the large student body there through this facility.

Property Near North Little Rock

The Executive Board has deeded a 2½ acre plot of ground located near the edge of North Little Rock to the North Pulaski Baptist Association. A new church will soon be started in this promising area.

Tornado Relief

Several tornadoes which struck our state earlier in the year left in their wake both death and destruction. The Executive Board made available small sums of money to the churches in the following places:

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY SOUTHERN BAPTIST
COLLEGE'S REQUEST THAT SHE BE ACCEPTED AS A
MEMBER OF THE FAMILY OF ARKANSAS
BAPTIST INSTITUTIONS**

Your committee which has been instructed to study Southern Baptist College's request that she be included in the family of Arkansas Baptist institutions recommends that her request be honored; that she be received and that Arkansas Baptists accept the full responsibility which this entails.

It is further recommended that our institutions of Christian higher education be under one board of trustees to be known as The Board of Christian Education. This will necessitate changes in our constitution and those of Ouachita Baptist University and Southern Baptist College. Thus, it is recommended that the necessary changes be made to provide for the one board, The Board of Christian Education, and to provide for the composition of the board as is hereinafter recommended.

The Board of Christian Education shall be composed of thirty members. Initially, twelve members shall be impartially selected by and from each of the present boards of trustees. These twenty four members will be impartially assigned a one, two, or three year term of service so as to provide that eight members shall rotate off the board each year. Those to succeed them shall be selected as follows. The president of each institution shall have the privilege of recommending eight nominees to the Convention Nominating Committee each year with the assurance that their suggestion will receive due consideration and that at least two of the eight shall be presented as nominees to the Convention.

The other six members shall be members at large. These are to be recommended by the president and Executive Committee of each institution to The Board of Christian Education which will elect them subject to the Convention's endorsement. The names will be presented to the Convention through the Convention's Nominating Committee. These members at large will not necessarily be residents of Arkansas but will be Baptist.*

Terms for all members of The Board of Christian Education shall be determined by the Convention's constitution and by-laws on trusteeship.

The Board of Christian Education will provide its own internal structure for the administration of each institution. An Executive Committee from among the trustees will be designated for each institution and delegated the authority to act in an administrative and advisory capacity between regular board meetings.

It is further recommended that an executive officer, Chancellor, be jointly employed by both institutions. He will be responsible for the promotion of the total cause of Christian higher education, including fund raising, and for the preparation of agendas for the meetings of The Board of Christian Education. He will be responsible only to the board and will have no administrative authority over either of the institutions. He will, however, work very closely

with the administrators of both institutions and will receive their cooperation in promoting the cause of Christian higher education.

Both institutions will continue an independent operation under separate administrations and budgets. Endowments will not become the common property of both institutions but will remain the property of the separate institutions. Any future endowments will become the property of the institution which the donor may name. Undesignated endowments will be equitably shared by both institutions as determined by The Board of Christian Education.

The acceptance of Southern Baptist College into the family of Arkansas Baptist institutions and the formation of the Board of Christian Education shall be immediately effective upon the adoption of this report.** The Board of Christian Education will be considered as a new board in determining terms of service of the board members.

*This will enable Southern Baptist College to retain a part of the fine trustee leadership which she has enjoyed from southeast Missouri. It will also enable Ouachita Baptist University to profit from some fine interested leadership outside our state.

**This report has the approval of both institutions.

With the action of the Southern Baptist Convention at its annual meeting in Houston last June, the Convention provides for a new emphasis on applying the gospel of Christ to social issues, particularly to human relations. The Home Mission Board is now pursuing its assignment of implementing the new policy.

This new departure aims at continuing to preach the gospel of redemption but also concerns itself with breaking down all discrimination in the interest of helping to meet all the needs of all people. So, now, more than ever, Southern Baptists need their Baptist state paper. For the Baptist paper is the only systematic means of keeping abreast of Baptist affairs.

The editor and staff of the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine are grateful for the prayers and support of the people and the churches that make the paper possible. The weekly mailing as this was written, October 9, was 59,946. This compares with 59,147 on October 10, 1967.

A total of 782 churches now have the paper in the budget as compared with 779 a year ago.

The church budget plan continues to be the best plan of getting the paper, with its vital contents, into the hands of the people. It is encouraging that most of our churches now recognize the importance of the paper, placing it in the same category of necessity as Sunday School and Training Union literature.

Churches not yet having the paper in their budgets are urged to contact the editor for information on how the budget plan operates.

MISSIONS-EVANGELISM

The past year has been one of growth and expansion in the Missions Department. Through the cooperation of the Home Mission Board, we have been able to extend our ministry into several new areas.

Traditional Ministries

Work with Rural Churches:

Churches receiving Building Aid	9
Churches granted loans	4
Churches receiving Pastoral Aid	28

Brother Dale Barnett conducted 21 revivals with a total of 94 professions of faith.

Thirty-three students served 30 churches through the Student Preaching Program. There were 46 professions of faith recorded.

Fourteen associations received missionary's salary supplement, which we consider as mainly an assistance to the smaller churches.

Deaf Ministry:

Brother C. F. Landon ministers to 11 congregations where 325 deaf people attend regularly. Several sign language classes are being conducted over the state. New ministry has been started or is planned for 6 places.

New Mission Sites:

No new sites have been purchased this year.

Student Summer Missionaries:

Six out-of-state summer missionaries were used in Arkansas during the summer in Current River, Gainesville, Liberty and Ouachita Associations. They assisted in 15 Vacation Bible Schools, 4 revivals, and 6 camps.

World Missions Conference:

Three World Missions Conferences were conducted in the state during the past 12 months. These were in Clear Creek, Boone-Newton, and Little Red River Associations. Mr. Landon is charged with the responsibility of arranging these conferences with the associational and Southern Baptist Convention leaders.

New Ministries

Chaplaincy:

Brother R. H. Dorris has worked for six months in the new position as Director of Chaplaincies. He coordinates the work of our three chaplains at the Girls' and Boys' Training Schools and tuberculosis sanatorium. He has helped plan 12 area clinics for pastors and doctors and local hospital administrative staff for the purpose of better understanding between local pastors and local hospitals and doctors of the role of the ministers with the sick. Two clinics have been held to date with excellent results. He is working with industry in several sections of the state with a view of future industrial chaplaincies. He is in close contact with state officials so that Arkansas Baptists will have opportunity to relate to other institutional chaplaincies should opportunity arise. There have been 140 conversions reported through the ministry of our chaplains the past year.

Special Ministries:

We continue our cooperative effort in **Juvenile Rehabilitation** with the Children's Home, Pulaski and North Pulaski Associations. Mr. Johnny Biggs is a liaison between the families of problem children and the courts. He secures from the Greater Little Rock churches foster homes for children. There are from 1,000 to 2,000 broken homes in Little Rock where children live with only one parent. In the past six months, Mr. Biggs has held 316 conferences with young people, families, and professional people.

In July we assumed the management of **Hope House**, an adult prisoner rehabilitation project of the Second Baptist Church, Little Rock. Forty-four prisoners have been at Hope House in 15 months with only one going back to prison. Seventeen have been converted. Mr. Bill Bramlett, manager of Hope House, speaks all over the state to schools, churches and civic clubs as a crime preventive measure. When a Special Ministries Director is secured we may find it feasible to open several such facilities over the state.

At Hot Springs we have completed six months of **Special Ministries** work of Rev. Harry Woodall. While Mr. Woodall works with Central Association, the Missions Department and the Home Mission Board bear the major part of the expense of this work in our nationally-known resort center. Mr. Woodall has succeeded in a very short time in making an excellent survey of both needs and resources for ministry here.

During the year, over 2,000 people have heard Home Mission Board personnel and others explain Week-day Ministry. The response has been very decisively in favor of this type work in our Baptist churches. Such activity is not new to Baptist life, having been conducted in Baptist Centers for many years. The new dimension is the function of the local church in the same.

A **Special Ministries Director** will be provided for the state, one-half of whose salary will be paid by the Home Mission Board. His duties would be to direct the promotion of Juvenile and Adult Rehabilitation, Week-day Ministry, Migrant and Literacy Work. He would also direct surveys of churches and associations to discover week-day ministry needs.

Our new film, produced professionally and financed by the Woman's Missionary Union, has reached thousands with the message of Arkansas State Missions.

EVANGELISM

PACT, a prayer partner plan which will link Baptists on the North and South American continents in intercessory prayer for the Crusades of the Americas, was initiated last year. Prayer is the greatest preparation we can make for the Crusade.

A Watch-Night Prayer Service will be held December 31, 1968, in the churches across our convention.

There will be a nation-wide emphasis on prayer with one full day of prayer in our churches, January 12, 1969. This is Soul-Winning Commitment Day also.

Our annual State-Wide Evangelism Conference will be held January 27-28, 1969 at Second Baptist Church, Little Rock. The night sessions will be in Robinson Auditorium. The theme of the conference is "Christ the Only Hope." Dr. Harper Shannon, pastor, First Baptist Church, Dothan, Alabama, will be our Bible teacher. Rev. John Bisagno, pastor, First Southern Baptist Church, Del City, Oklahoma, whose church led the Southern Baptist Convention in baptisms in 1967 associational year, will be on our program. Other speakers will be: Dr. S. A. Whitlow, our own executive secretary; Dr. Clark H. Pinnock, professor at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary; Dr. H. Franklin Paschall, immediate past president of the Southern Baptist Convention; Dr. Eual Lawson, Home Mission Board; Dr. Manuel Scott, pastor, Calvary Baptist Church, Los Angeles, California; J. T. Elliff, secretary of missions, Arkansas Baptist State Convention; and Dr. William L. Bennett, pastor, First Baptist Church, Fort Smith. The two National Baptist Conventions, along with our own convention people, will be in attendance during the conference; especially the night sessions in Robinson Auditorium. Dr. Manuel Scott is one of the greatest Negro preachers in America. For the last two years he has preached to overflow crowds in the Oklahoma and Missouri Evangelism Conferences.

Our Pastors' Personal Witnessing Retreat was held at Camp Paron, September 5-6. Rev. Homer Lindsey, Jr., pastor, Northwest Baptist Church, Miami, Florida, was our speaker. Rev. Herbert Hodges, pastor, South Highland Baptist Church, Little Rock, was the Bible teacher. Dr. J. I. Cossey, Harrisburg, spoke on "Physical Fitness and Evangelism." There were 43 pastors (one from each association) present; plus 45 other workers, making a total of 85 in attendance at the retreat. The program was built around how the Northwest Baptist Church, Miami, Florida, witnesses and wins so many people to the Lord each year. The retreat next year will be September 4-5. Dr. Mack Douglas, pastor, First Baptist Church, Pompano Beach, Florida, will be one of the speakers.

There were 1,200 people present at the six Area-Wide Evangelism Conferences, September 15-20. There were 148 pastors, 12 music-education men, 19 associational superintendents of missions, and 37 other ordained ministers in attendance. The purpose of these conferences was to reach those who do not ordinarily attend the State-Wide Evangelism Conference.

The Area-Wide Evangelism Conferences in 1969 will be held September 15-19 at Harrison, Fort Smith, Arkadelphia, Pine Bluff, and Walnut Ridge.

Every association in the state has voted to participate in the Crusade of the Americas. Your church should have already voted to participate in the Crusade. If you do not have your evangelist and singer, you may already be too late to get the ones you want. If so, you pastors perhaps should preach your own revival. Each association should elect a director for the Crusade. The revival dates for Arkansas are: eastern half, March 16-30; western half, April 6-20.

A State-Wide Crusade of the Americas Rally was held November 4 at Barton Coliseum with the two National Baptist Conventions

and our own Arkansas Baptist State Convention in attendance. This was a kick-off for the Crusade of the Americas.

1. We express gratitude to God for the spiritual victories in the lives of our students, both in professions of faith in Jesus Christ and in rededication of life.
2. Arkansas had 77 students work in summer missions this year, an all-time high for Arkansas. Two of our campuses, Arkansas A&M and Arkansas A.M.&N. were in the top 18 schools in the nation.
3. Our Easter ministry at Daytona Beach during the Easter holidays was a meaningful experience to the 45 students who went and a spiritual blessing to many on the beach.
4. Another unusual ministry in 1968 was our migrant ministry. Twenty students worked as migrants in Idaho and Oregon, leading in recreational activities and worship services among the people with whom they worked.
5. The MIL ("Meaning In Life") Singers had another good summer. Besides working in Arkansas churches, the Singers performed at Foreign Mission Week at Ridgecrest before 2,500 people.
6. Plans are being made to erect a new Baptist Student Center at Arkansas Tech at Russellville and an addition at Arkansas A&M at Monticello.

Personnel Changes

Gerald Cound, formerly director at Arkansas A&M, has become the first associate in the state office. Mr. Cound served in South America two years with the Peace Corps and won the Neil Martin trophy as Arkansas' outstanding athlete in 1962.

Ken McCain has taken the position of Danny McCauley, who is serving in the Medical Corps in Vietnam, as the "roving director," working on the campuses of the College of the Ozarks in Clarksville; Arkansas State University, Beebe Branch; Arkansas College in Batesville; and Phillips County Community College in Helena and West Helena. Mr. McCain is a graduate of Arkansas A&M and participated in the migrant ministry this summer.

Marcus Rackley is the new director at Arkansas Tech, replacing Glyn Finley. Mr. Rackley is a graduate of Hendrix College and Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary and has pastored and done BSU work in California.

Benny Clark is the new director at Henderson State College, replacing Nancy Phillips Russ who has married and joined the faculty at Henderson. Benny is a graduate of Southern Baptist College, Arkansas State University, and Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. Mr. Clark served as BSU president at Southern

Baptist College and Arkansas State University and has pastored and served as BSU director in Missouri.

Two directors serving this year under an internship program from Southern Seminary are **Sherman Zimmerman** at Ouachita Baptist University and **Atherton Hiett** serving as associate at University of Arkansas. BROTHERHOOD

The year 1967 was one of increase for all phases of Brotherhood work. We are grateful that Brotherhood was one of the three ministries showing an increase. It is gratifying to report that the increase is continuing in 1968. Incomplete reports indicate that the increase for 1968 will be above the previous year. New Royal Ambassador chapters account for much of the increase; however, there has been an upsurge of interest in units of Baptist Men. Requests for materials for Royal Ambassador leaders and Baptist Men's officers continue to be made in increasing numbers, along with requests for leadership training sessions. More and more, churches are realizing the need and importance of missionary education for Baptist boys and men and recognizing that Royal Ambassadors and Baptist Men's organizations are the answer to the need.

Since our last report several outstanding events have taken place in the area of Brotherhood work.

On May 16-18 twelve men, representing the districts of the state, attended a five-state regional training institute in Norman, Oklahoma. The institute was sponsored jointly by the Brotherhood Commission and the state Brotherhood Departments. These men were used in training sessions in October.

June 14-15 was the Baptist Men's Encampment at Camp Paron. Although the attendance was not large, the men present gained a real insight to the possibilities of mission action projects and were blessed by the inspirational messages, plus enjoying some of the recreational facilities of camp.

Last year's state-wide Royal Ambassador Fellowship Supper held in November was one of the best in several years. The attendance was 408, representing almost every section of the state. Dr. Rogers Smith, associate executive secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, was the speaker.

On May 3-4 the state Royal Ambassador Congress was held. The attendance was over 600 and represented a good cross-section of the state. The program was interesting, timely, and challenging to every boy and man attending.

Royal Ambassador camps were conducted during the month of June. Some 20 associations were represented during the three weeks of camp. The visible results from camp were most gratifying. There were 26 boys saved out of 30 who registered as non-Christian. There were three young men surrendering to the ministry and three to be missionaries. There were 14 who surrendered to full-time Christian vocation work but not sure just what field of service God desired them to follow. In addition, there were 77 boys who rededicated their lives to Christ with the expressed desire to be better witnesses for Christ. The total visible results of camps were 123. Only eternity, however, can reveal the real value of the camps in the life of each boy.

We give thanks to God for His blessings this year and pray that His blessings may continue to be upon this important phase of work, and that His guidance may continue to enlarge the scope of missionary education and involvement in mission action for Baptist boys and men in the churches of the state.

CHURCH MUSIC

Music in our Southern Baptist churches is experiencing a steady growth. In **worship**, music involves both old and young in personal praise, adoration and commitment. In **witness**, music proclaims the message of salvation to all who hear. In **education**, music imparts sound doctrine and scripture truth. In **ministry**, music comforts and gladdens hearts, reaches multitudes through radio and T.V., and serves as an arm of love extended by the church to those who need its ministry.

The tasks assigned to the state and local church ministry are: to provide music and musicians for the congregational services and the organizations of the church; to lead persons to participate in hymn singing; to teach music and hymnody; to train persons to lead, sing and play music; to provide organization and leadership for special projects of the church; and provide and interpret information regarding the work of the church and the denomination.

In helping to accomplish these tasks and the church's main functions of worship, proclamation, education and ministry, six areas of music needs are developed through state, district and associational channels to provide a balanced local music program. These areas are: congregational, organizational, graded choir, instrumental, special ministries and administrative.

A church has a music ministry, and should so report it on the annual uniform church letter to the association, when it (a) elects or calls a music director (volunteer or paid) and (b) when the music director is charged with the responsibility of developing the church music program.

I. STATE ASSISTANCE TO ASSOCIATIONS AND CHURCHES

A. District Music Directors — The state is divided into eight districts with a district director serving as music representative between the state office and local associations and churches. These district directors who have served in 1968 are: District 1 - Northwest, John Gardner; District 2 - North Central, Charles Hughes; District 3 - Northeast, Charles Butler; District 4 - West Central, Don Edmonson; District 5 - Central, Farland Bottoms; District 6 - East Central, R. D. Roberts; District 7 - Southwest, Morris Ratley; District 8 - Southeast, Carbon Sims.

B. State Approved Music Workers — These workers are used to assist in graded choir training, festival planning, and consultation in any church or association in the development of the music ministry for their specific areas. Our State Approved Music Workers in 1968 were: Mrs. Charles Mayo in the Beginner area; Mr. Allen Simmons in the Primary area; Miss Nancy Blair and Mr. Archie McMillan in the Junior area; Mr. Richard Ham and Mr. Bob Hatzfeld in the Youth area; Mr. Ural Clayton and Dr. William Horton in the Adult area; Miss Patricia Higgs in the instrumental area, and Mr. Bill McGraw the handbell consultant.

C. Summer Approved Music Workers — Upon request from a church or association, summer workers are sent from the department to hold one- or two-week music schools, music camps, or other types of music training. The two 1968 summer workers employed by the department to work were Mrs. Brenda Blackwell, public school music teacher from Missouri, and Mr. Robert L. Blocker, graduate music student from South Carolina.

D. Festivals — Choir festivals were promoted for three different age groups, and this program continues to be one of the most widely approved and acclaimed programs in our state music ministry. During 1968 we conducted five primary festivals, 6 junior festivals, 4 regional youth festivals, and one state-wide youth festival. Many churches interested in organizing choirs come to observe the festivals, and later organize for service in their local church. Each choir who attends learns a group of songs to sing in the mass chorus and also learns two numbers to sing for adjudication and rating.

E. Summer Music Camps — A comprehensive program of music education and spiritual enrichment makes up the curriculum of our two state music camps - **Ouachita Music Conference** for youth and adults, and the **Junior Music Camp** for Juniors. Classes are provided for accompanist, song leaders, graded choir leaders, choir members, and volunteer and full-time music directors.

D. Adult Choral Clinics — These clinics were conducted by Dr. Gordon Young in four different areas of the state, with a total attendance of 310.

E. Methods and Materials Clinic — This clinic was conducted by field service personnel from the Music Department of the Sunday School Board. It was held at Park Hill Church in North Little Rock. This two-day conference was attended by approximately 200 people from all over the state.

F. Music Tournaments:

CHURCH TRAINING

The name of the Training Union Department of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention was changed by Executive Board action to the Church Training Department on August 20, 1968. This in no

way changes the name of Training Union which is the organization in our churches and associations. However, this more nearly defines the work of the department.

In addition to the program of Training Union work the Church Training Department has been assigned the following three programs: Vocational Guidance, Church Administration and Family Ministry. The Church Training Department has been assigned two other programs on a contact basis. These are Church Library and Recreation. By contact basis we mean that the state approved library worker and the state approved recreation director work directly with these programs of the Baptist Sunday School Board in cooperation with the Church Training Department.

I. Promotion of Training Union Work

The objective of your Church Training Department in the area of Training Union promotion is to assist the churches in establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving their training program.

The six tasks of a church assigned to the Training Union are:

1. Teach Christian theology, Christian history, Christian ethics, church polity and organization
2. Give orientation to new members
3. Train church members to worship, witness, learn and minister daily
4. Train leaders for the church and denomination
5. Provide organization and leadership for special projects of the church and denomination
6. Provide and interpret information regarding the work of the church and denomination

The four study areas assigned to the Training Union are:

1. Christian theology
2. Christian History
3. Christian ethics
4. Church polity and organization

The three divisions of training assigned to the Training Union are: member training, new member orientation and leader training.

1. State Meetings.

2. District Work.

(1) Eight district training meetings were conducted November 13-17, 1967, for associational Training Union officers.

(2) Secretary of the department and the eight district representatives enlisted and met with eight groups of "case study" teams in preparation for the State Youth Convention.

(3) Secretary and associate of Church Training Department conducted eight district planning meetings for district age group workers and superintendents of missions and associational directors of each association during August and September, 1968. Attendance was as follows: District workers, 42; Superintendents of Missions, 22; Associational Directors, 25; Associations represented, 31.

again at the Workshop on October 25, 1968: James Johnson, Harold Ray, Mason Craig, Carl Overton, Robert F. Tucker, Hilton Lane, Charles Stephan, John Robbins, Harry Wigger, Klois Hargis, S. D. Hacker, Ray McClung, James Griffin and James Dean. They conducted under the leadership of James Griffin, campaigns in 6 churches of Mississippi County, 11 churches in Tri-County, 4 churches in White River and 5 churches in Benton County association.

(4) Interpretation clinics were conducted by district age group workers in the following associations: Mississippi County, Calvary, Little River, Stone-Van Buren-Searcy, Gainesville, Current River, Washington-Madison, and Central.

(5) Other associational conferences conducted during the year were as follows: Training Union Rallies - 4; conferences to plan associational events - 15; contacting pastors for leadership schools - 8 associations; other conferences - 20.

(6) Associational elementary workshops were conducted in the following associations: Centennial, Arkansas Valley, Delta, and Ashley.

4. Individual Church Work.

Individual director-led campaigns were conducted in the following churches: First Church, Springdale; Second Church, West Helena; First Church, Forrest City; First Church, Newport; First Church, Jacksonville; First Church, Warren and Central Church, Magnolia.

One night conferences were conducted in 25 churches during the year.

The following have received Merit recognition during the year: Kelso Church; First Church, McGehee; East Side Chapel, Pine Bluff; South Side Church, Pine Bluff; First Church, Farmington; First Church, Flippin; Diaz Church, Tuckerman; First Church, Newport; Armored Church; First Church, Hot Springs; First Church, Jacksonville. The following churches have received Advanced recognition: South McGehee Church; Kern Heights, DeQueen; Grand Avenue, Fort Smith and Bellaire Church, Dermott.

5. Drills and Tournaments

Junior memory sword drill, intermediate sword drill and speakers' tournaments were held in the eight districts March 25 - April 5, 1968. District winners in the sword drill and speakers' tournaments participated in the state drills and tournaments. In the Intermediate sword drill, Janie Adams, Hickory Street Church, Texarkana, placed first and represented Arkansas at Glorieta. Debbie Moore, First Church, Hope, placed second and represented Arkansas at Ridgecrest.

In the 17-18 year Speakers' Tournament, Lowell Snow of Grand Avenue, Fort Smith, won first place and represented Arkansas at Glorieta. Janice Wilson of Ouachita University won first place in the 19-24 year group and represented Arkansas at Ridgecrest.

II. Program of Vocational Guidance

Sixteen Vocational Guidance Consultants have been selected by the Church Training Department and these have attended a twenty hour lab at Ridgecrest, Glorieta, or Camp Paron, and are well qualified to assist in a state wide program in the area of vocational guidance. The consultants are: A. Kay Mansell, Jim Tillman, John Holston, Andrew Setliffe, Gerald Taylor, Jim R. Davis, Mason Craig, Guin Renshaw, Hilton Lane, D. B. Bledsoe, Jack Riley, Homer Bradley, Jere Wilson, Richard Stephens, Coy Sample and Prince Claybrook.

These consultants will be available to assist in a state program which will include the following events: serve as vocational counselors at state and associational assemblies, engage in "follow up" of church vocations volunteers after summer camps and assemblies, assist associational youth organizations with conferences on vocations, plan associational adult conferences, plan future "Klesis," etc.

Mr. Robert Holley, associate in the Church Training Department, has been assigned the leadership of this program and will work in cooperation with the Vocational Guidance Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

III. Program of Church Administration

Your Church Training Department has been assigned the task of Church Administration in Arkansas and the department secretary will serve as State Consultant and will work in cooperation with the Church Administration Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board. Some areas of assistance to the churches will be as follows:

1. **Church Achievement Guide.** "Request for Recognition" will be sent from the churches to the Church Training Department. Secretary of this department will check them, sign them and return to the pastor the appropriate recognition certificate which will be provided by the Church Administration Department of the Baptist School Board.

2. **Two Church Administration Workshops** have been planned for October 25, 1968, one for eight church administration consultants and one for Church Council members.

3. **Long Range Planning Seminar** will be conducted at a centrally located place May 5-8, 1969.

4. **Pastors' Retreat** will be conducted May 26-28, 1969, and May 25-27, 1970, in cooperation with the State Missions Department. In 1969 the Church Training Department will provide the leadership of Dr. Myron C. Madden, New Orleans Hospital, who will discuss "pastoral ministries."

In 1970 Dr. J. Winston Pearce will conduct conferences on planning a years preaching ministry and Mrs. Pearce (Winnie) will conduct conferences for pastors' wives. First State wide Deacons Retreat will be conducted May 9-10, 1968.

The following Church Administration Consultants will be available to assist churches and associations in areas of church council, long range planning, training of church officers and committees,

church development, etc.: James Griffin, Bailey Smith, Kenneth Threet, Ray McClung, Paul Sanders, Roy Law, Everett Sneed, Harold Taylor and Glenn Morgan.

IV. Program of Family Ministry

Your Church Training Department has been assigned the task of Family Ministry. The structure of family ministry in a church is built around three aspects: church-home cooperation, education for marriage and family living, and care of families. Due to the limited number of personnel in the Church Training Department, little assistance can be given to this area of work. It is very likely that Family Ministry consultants may be selected in the near future who can be trained to assist churches and associations in this important area of work.

V. Program of Recreation

The Church Training Department is related to the Recreation Department of the Sunday School Board on a contact basis. Mr. Jim Maloch, Second Church, Little Rock, serves as State Recreational Director. He assists in the promotion of recreation at the State Workshop, Youth Convention, etc. each year. He has selected and trained twelve recreational leaders to assist in this area of work.

VI. Program of Library Work

The Church Training Department is related to the Church Library Department of the Sunday School Board on a contact basis. State approved library workers are Miss Lola Mae Wheelchel of Immanuel Church, Little Rock, and Mrs. Robert Chambers of First Church, Lepanto. Twenty-five new church libraries were begun in 1968, making a total of 504 registered libraries. Nine libraries have achieved Merit recognition and three of these have achieved Advanced recognition.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

The objective of the Sunday School Department is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose . . . "to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer co-operation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God."

The Sunday School Department seeks to accomplish its objective through four major programs; Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, Weekday Bible Teaching and Church Architecture which will help churches establish, conduct, enlarge and improve their ministries of Bible teaching, leadership training and personal witnessing. The department also programs the state assembly.

The secretary, Lawson Hatfield, relates primarily to local church assistance, Church Architecture, and specializes in Adult work.

Don Cooper, associate secretary, joined the department June 15, 1968. Mr. Cooper relates primarily to associational promotion and Vacation Bible School work.

Mrs. Mary Emma Humphrey, Consultant, Children's Work, relates primarily to the promotion of Weekday Bible Study and specializes in Nursery, Beginner, Primary and Junior work.

Miss Pat Ratton, Consultant, Youth Work, joined the department in October 1967, relates primarily to editing Department Newsletter, and specializes in Intermediate, Young People, Cradle Roll and Extension Departments of work.

Beyond the Baptist Building the work is promoted by Area Consultants and 43 Associational Sunday School organizations.

Tasks of the Sunday School include: Teach the Biblical revelation, lead in reaching all prospects for the church; lead all church members to worship, witness, learn, and minister daily; provide organization and leadership for special projects of the church; and provide and interpret information regarding the work of the church and denomination.

THE PROGRAM OF VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL PROMOTION

Forty-nine kindergartens and day nurseries in the churches. Churches are showing concern for some special groups as related in providing Sunday School teaching in 4 departments for the mentally retarded and/or for the deaf. Possibly there are many more than these.

Following is a summary of the projects the department promoted and assisted:

Four state VBS Clinics for associational team members; 38 associations represented with 270 total attendance.

Four associational VBS Clinics.

Trained 38 college students for BSU and Missions Department.

Eighteen associations reported conducting 20 VBS Clinics with 1,866 present.

THE PROGRAM OF WEEKDAY BIBLE STUDY PROMOTION

Objective. — The objective of the Program of Weekday Bible Study Promotion is to assist churches, associations, and the state convention in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving Weekday Bible Study in the churches. NOTE: Weekday Bible Study includes formally scheduled opportunities for concentrated teaching of the Bible and other curriculum areas for pupils of public school ages in Weekday Bible Study classes and other programs of weekday Bible study. It includes also special teaching opportunities for children in kindergarten, child care programs, and nursery schools.

The Weekday Bible Study material for Juniors and for Intermediates was used all three weeks at Siloam Springs Baptist Assembly in 1968.

Forty-nine kindergartens and day nurseries in the churches. Churches are showing concern for some special groups as reflected in providing Sunday School teaching in 4 departments for the mentally retarded and 1 for the deaf. Possibly there are many more than these.

THE PROGRAM OF CHURCH ARCHITECTURE CONSULTATION

Objective. — The objective of the program of Church Architecture Consultation is to interpret the relationship of property and buildings of a church and to provide information and consultation to churches and denominational organizations concerning all phases and details of planning and securing appropriate property and buildings.

By personal visits and through correspondence we referred 35 churches to the Church Architecture Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL AND THE CRUSADE OF THE AMERICAS

The Sunday School of a church has an important job to do in the Crusade of the Americas.

The Sunday School, because of its fundamental nature, plays a significant role in most major church undertakings. This is particularly true in relation to the Crusade of the Americas emphasis.

Note how the Sunday School's part in the Church Growth Plan supports the Crusade of the Americas. They are:

1. Create a climate of concern for the unreached.
2. Discover church prospects.
3. Cultivate the prospects.
4. Enlist prospects in Bible Study.
5. Teach prospects the gospel and its claims.
6. Witness to prospects about salvation and church membership.
7. Include new church members in the life and work of the church.

Co-operating churches which have not already done so, are urged to participate in the nation-wide Prospect Search. (Census).

During the winter and spring is a good time to push an enrolment visitation program.

January Bible Study is an important influence in the Crusade. January 5-12, involving hundreds of thousands will engage them in study of the gospel message of salvation in Isaiah.

Prior to the Crusade Revivals a Sunday School sponsored Personal Witnessing Plan will help prepare many to witness.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE ASSEMBLY

The objective of the state assembly is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose . . . "to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the end of the earth; to cultivate closer cooperation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God."

The program of the state assembly seeks to reach its objective by:

1. Providing facilities and operating the assembly as a service to the programs of the Convention.
2. Offering training for church leaders, church members and others of all age groups in Bible study, stewardship and missions.
3. Providing worship, witnessing and evangelistic opportunities.
4. Planning fellowship and recreational activities.
5. Cooperating with all boards, agencies and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention to provide an informal meeting place for denominational leaders, church leaders and members.
6. Cultivating and training young people, our leaders of tomorrow.

The measurable results of the three 1968 assemblies are as follows:

2,115 registered with 57 conversions, 84 surrendered for special service and 447 rededications or 588 recorded decisions.

There are four distinct areas of the assembly: Pre-school, children, youth and adult.

In 1969 an "Honor Camper" program will offer attendance scholarships to young people in each of the three sessions. This program was instituted in 1968, third week with Beth Langford of Second Church, Conway and Hal Graves of First Church, Fordyce the 1968 Junior Honor Campers. Carol Hallum of Levy Church, North Little Rock and Ross Carden of First Church, Fordyce were the Youth Honor Campers.

The state assembly may be a sleeping giant for the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

The assembly is not asleep in its outreach, evangelism and ministry to hundreds of young people for the convention. But as a unifying force for the state convention and church leaders, we may be sleeping on our best opportunity.

When and where could state leaders and church leaders meet in a more congenial atmosphere than under the spreading walnut trees in the valley of the assembly grounds?

How could we find a more informal and conducive opportunity for planning, training and fellowship than in summer sessions at a state assembly?

The assembly could and should be expanded into a profitable leadership session and public relations opportunities for all boards, agencies and institutions of the convention, especially for the Executive Board programs.

For the assembly to be expanded certain resources and relationships would be required.

One, facilities for families, individuals and groups must be provided and existing facilities be improved.

Two, the Executive Board programs must be involved in planning and conducting the assembly program. For instance, associational briefing meetings, district planning sessions, evangelism and stewardship promotion and other group planning meetings could be conducted, involving more leaders.

Future planning of the state assembly program could take this turn and become a great unifying force in our total work.

RACE RELATIONS

The Race Relations Department is a joint project of the Home Mission Board, Southern Baptist Convention and the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Financial support is obtained through the Co-operative Program, Home Mission Board, WMU Dixie Jackson offering and designated gifts.

The purpose of the Race Relations Department is to help our Negro Baptist friends to help themselves in developing better churches and through a program of sharing in Christian love, to build up a better spirit of Christian goodwill and understanding.

We have had five units of extension schools and seven classes taught in the first five months of 1968. Extension teachers were: Rev. Jim Gerrin, Rev. W. L. Probasco, Rev. and Mrs. W. R. Rogers, Rev. J. N. Harrison, Rev. Donald Dilday and Rev. M. W. Williams.

The average for all units and classes was 161, average attendance 332. Many attended classes without enrolling.

Over two hundred students were enrolled last semester in one of the four Bible classes taught by Rev. Lacy K. Solomon, Director, BSU Center, AM&N College, Pine Bluff, Arkansas. AM&N College is an accredited school and students taking these Bible courses are given credit toward their degree.

Our summer mission work is a joy to our hearts, as well as being rewarding in results for the Lord. This summer, from our BSU Center, AM&N College there were 21 students volunteering for summer mission work. Sixteen of these students served out of the State of Arkansas, under the supervision of the Home Mission Board, and six of them served in Arkansas. In the past three years these students, who have worked in Arkansas, have served in 55 churches, enrolled 3,828 children in Vacation Bible Schools, had 202 professions of faith and 140 dedications. They have also served as counselors in our Hart of The Hills summer camp for Negro children, ages 8 to 17, with 368 enrolling for this summer.

We also expect to start, and complete as soon as possible, a chapel for our BSU Center with an approximate value of \$30,000.

STEWARDSHIP

The per capita income of Arkansas is at an all-time high, therefore the potential for increasing the local church income for 1969 is excellent. But, income and giving must be more than dollars and cents in a church budget. Programs to increase giving must be more than machines and psychological "come on." Real Christian stewardship is spiritual surrender; it is commitment of self and possessions to God. Anything less than this is superficial.

The theme for all Stewardship material for 1968-69 is "Tithe To Tell." This is taken from Isaiah 6:8-9, "Also I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here I am; send me. And he said, Go, and tell this people, Hear ye indeed, but understand not; and see ye indeed, but perceive not." Not all can go personally into all the world to tell, but everyone can meet the requirements of God by praying for and financially supporting those who have been called to go and are now "telling" in difficult places. One of the best ways to make sure that all of the "tellers" are adequately financed is through dedicated tithes.

The Stewardship programs are offered to the churches to help each member to see and understand his or her part in "Tithing To Tell." These programs are as follows: The Forward Program of Christian Stewardship, Growth in Christian Stewardship, Tithers Enrollment Week, and Venture in Stewardship For the Christian Family.

Here is a brief outline of each program:

The Forward Program of Christian Stewardship has three major Sundays - Budget Adoption Day, Tithers Demonstration Day,

and Dedication Day, plus three week days sharing "Tithe To Tell" message in homes.

The Growth in Christian Stewardship - More than 75% of the Arkansas churches have less than 300 members and this program is designed especially for churches this size. It takes into consideration limited facilities and lack of know-how on the part of the average church member. This is a warm, spiritual approach to leading in Stewardship growth.

Tithers Enrollment Week - This is a plan to help any church anywhere to lead the members to see the need of giving at least a tithe. It is simple and yet effective. There are no large committees, no organization, and very little money needed to use this plan.

Venture In Stewardship For the Christian Family - This is a new approach and is designed to help the family. The Bible presents Christ as Lord and Master in all areas of life. This program applies itself to a family's total life situation. It is built around five special days, daily family devotions, and a Family-at-Home dedication service. The main thrust of this program is helping families with a family financial planning conference. This can be the greatest thing ever to help the entire family.

Stewardship Help - During the past year we have helped churches and associations with their Stewardship education by speaking personally and furnishing Stewardship teachers and speakers for churches and associations.

Some associations have used the Associational Development Program and our office has furnished Stewardship and Cooperative Program speakers in a Sunday worship service for each participating church.

Independence Association, Dr. Everett Sneed, missionary, used this emphasis and here is an excerpt from a letter that our office received from him.

"In 1966 we entered the Association Stewardship Development Program. Our finances grew from a 2% increase in 1965 to a 34% increase in 1966. It had been evident for some time that all the churches wanted to share in the expenses of associational missions and world missions. So Bro. Bone, our associational Stewardship Chairman, presented the Stewardship Development Program to the associational Executive Board, which voted unanimously to participate in this effort."

"The results were heart-warming as this summary indicates: 1) Every church and mission now supports the Cooperative Program and associational missions. 2) Our associational budget grew 23% which enabled us to become self-supporting. (We had previously received \$75.00 monthly from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.) This year's budget will go over the \$15,000 mark as other churches have adopted the recommended 6% of undesignated gifts to the association. 3) The number of systematic tithers has been increased in almost all of our churches in the association, thus the local churches have been strengthened."

We urge all associations who have associational World Mission Conferences to use Stewardship and Cooperative Program speakers.

Our office will furnish these speakers without charge to the association.

Stewardship Chairman - Please elect a Stewardship Chairman in each association. These men receive the new Stewardship material and help promote Stewardship in the association.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program gifts through the month of September this year (1968) amounted to \$1,797,030.08. The total gifts this year are about 6½% over last year. The proposed Cooperative Program budget for 1969 is \$2,667,207. This is a 6.84% increase over 1968.

Here is a picture of the percent of total receipts given through the Cooperative Program by the associations last year. These figures were taken from the last associational letters.

It arose out of the desire and efforts of pastors and churches to find a plan whereby all worthy denominational causes might be cared for fully and fairly without conflicting with the necessary progress and work in the churches themselves. It

is believed to be sane, scriptural, comprehensive, unifying, equitable, economical, and thoroughly workable."

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The year 1967-68 can best be characterized for Woman's Missionary Union as one of transition which will culminate in 1970 when all convention agencies will complete reorganization. Though promotion of established plan of work was never relaxed, new plans and materials for the forthcoming year were introduced in the second quarter of the year and with them a transfer of emphasis to leadership training on new concepts. Characterizing the new look are simplicity and flexibility, and plans are designed to apply equally to a small church and to a large church.

The concepts and materials were introduced by a team of two from Woman's Missionary Union, SBC, on February 22 to the state WMU executive board and selected teams of leadership from associations. (Att. 285 from 30 associations.)

Follow-up on state level for local leadership was done in 12 regional Interpretation Meetings under the direction of a two-member team. (Att. 2,207)

In August further training was offered in two state-wide one day meetings. The first was devoted to local church leadership where instruction was given in 15 areas of WMU work. (Att. 705.) The other was for a limited number of associational WMU leaders. (Att. 125.)

Thirty-eight women went by chartered bus to WMU, SBC, Conference, Ridgecrest, which was attended by a total of 75 from Arkansas. Thirty-one were reported to have been at the corresponding conference at Glorieta.

Annual District Meetings held in Hamburg, Prescott, Waldron, Springdale, Mountain Home, Corning, Marianna and Conway were attended by 1,401. A missionary speaker, denominational and organizational emphases were presented at each meeting.

The Annual Meeting of Arkansas Woman's Missionary Union was held at First Baptist Church, West Memphis, March 25-27.

The ongoing stewardship emphasis of Woman's Missionary Union includes teachings relative to the tithe and gifts for the support of missions through the Cooperative Program and mission offerings. Of the latter there are three special ones which are church-wide but for which Woman's Missionary Union provides organization and promotion. They are Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions and Dixie Jackson Offering for State Missions. Through these, Arkansas Baptists contributed \$393,729, \$116,731, and \$65,646 respectively. (Included in the latter was a \$10,000 designation for the Denver, Colorado, Evangelistic Crusade.)

In the area of youth work two specific opportunities were provided for members of Young Woman's Auxiliary. One was a chartered

bus to YMA Conference, Ridgecrest, for the 37 Arkansans in attendance. The other was a weekend Houseparty, July 26-28, at Ouachita University attended by 157.

Five weeks of Girls' Auxiliary Camps were held at Camp Paron for girls ranging in ages from nine through 15. Featured each week were missionaries representing foreign, home and state missions, Bible study, organizational methods and directed recreation. Registration for the five weeks totaled 898 with 52 professions of faith and 73 commitment to missions or other special service.

ANNUAL REPORT

July 1, 1967 - June 30, 1968

Services To Children

During the period of September 1, 1967 to June 30, 1968 Arkansans saw gratifying progress at the Arkansas Baptist Home for Children. There have been many changes in the child care program which are in keeping with the present needs of children. The Board of Trustees is continually searching for opportunities to minister to children and families. The board and staff realize that their task is to reach out to people in their own communities with services.

Area Offices. One of the most effective ways of helping people is to place qualified social workers in strategic areas of the state. Presently the Board of Trustees is seeing results of a social worker in the Little Rock area. The trustees are in the process of surveying the northern part of the state with the probability of opening another family and child care office. The Home is receiving an increasing number of requests from pastors, families, psychiatrists, courts, and social agencies.

Foster Care. In addition to local offices the Home has opened seven foster homes throughout the state. These homes are serving seven children who need and can accept a family type living. As more foster homes are opened the Home will be able to help more children, especially pre-school children who do not need institutional care. Occasionally the staff plans foster care for children who have been in the Home for many years and would not otherwise be able to make an adjustment to family living.

Institutional Care. During the past year the Agency has cared for 77 children in the institutional care program. These children have come from situations which prevented their remaining in their own homes. The reasons for their coming to the Home are as varied as the number of children. During their stay they receive casework services and other help they may require such as remedial education, psychiatric care, group therapy, and medical attention. In addition the children experience a spiritual awareness directed by the Home, the local churches, and the Arkansas A & M BSU.

Services to Children in Their Own Homes. With the decentralization of services and programs to the local community there has been an increasing response to casework services to children in their own homes. When families are referred for help the worker tries to work with the family to prevent a broken home. The agency is working with thirty families involving approximately ninety children. The philosophy of the Board and staff is to sustain the family unit if possible. In some situations this effort is successful and in other cases it is necessary for children to come to the Home for temporary care. After the child has received care and is ready to return to his own home a follow-up service is initiated by the social work staff whose intent is to keep in touch with the family.

Achievements

Children Returning Home. Forty children returned to their own homes after receiving care at the Home from September, 1967 to June, 1968. There were eight graduating seniors this year which is a record high for the Home. Two plan to go to college making seven the total number enrolled in college. The other five are working, attending business school, and are in military service.

Additional Staff. The Home has employed additional staff including three social workers, a director of recreation and activities, and houseparents. An inservice training program has been provided for all staff member to enable them to meet the complex needs of children. Six staff members attended a workshop for child care staff at the University of Texas in Austin.

Endowment. The Home was notified of the will of Mrs. T. H. Barton, El Dorado, Arkansas. This money will be placed in the endowment fund of the Home.

Farm Discontinues. The Board of Trustees, after an intensive study and evaluation, agreed to discontinue the farming operation. The money formerly used for farming expenditures has been directed to definite child care needs. It was obvious to those who seriously studied the total program that the farm no longer contributed to the children, either financially or personally.

Little Rock Office. As previously stated, the Board has employed a staff of workers at the Little Rock office, presently located in the Pulaski County Association Building and will relocate in the new State Baptist Building. The staff in this area office includes the director who is an experienced graduate social worker, a part-time social worker, and a secretary.

Professional Consultation. The Home has accepted the services of a leading psychologist who voluntarily offers testing, evaluation, and consultation for individual children.

Although it is increasingly difficult for the Home to keep within its budget, it has managed to do so during the past year.

Needs

Services. The Board and staff have evaluated the needs to carry on an improved and more comprehensive child care program. Some of these needs are additional area offices comparable to the Little Rock office, more foster homes, and a group for adolescent girls who require special attention. In addition the staff has recognized the need of an intensive care cottage for the seriously disturbed children which would require additional workers and appropriate facilities.

Endowment Fund. As services to children and families increase it is obvious that financial needs also increase. The endowment fund offers an opportunity for groups as well as individuals to contribute to the long range financial needs of the Arkansas Baptist Home for Children.

Education Fund. The Home has been blessed with a number of children who are academically qualified to attend college. With the increasing number of young people in college it has been necessary to increase the education fund. Ouachita Baptist University has granted scholarships to assist these students, and a scholarship fund for Arkansas Baptist Home students has been established at Ouachita by an anonymous contributor. Although these scholarships are available, individuals who are interested are encouraged to contribute to this fund.

Buildings. The Board of Trustees recently made a study of the building at the Home and found the need to replace two buildings which were built in 1924 and are unsafe for occupancy. The Board has recently arranged for an architect and an engineer to study the needs of the Home and they recommended to replace these two buildings which will cost approximately \$200,000 to construct and furnish.

Important Date for all new members in Plan "A"

Plan "A," one of the three plans in the Southern Baptist Protection Program which went into effect on January 1, 1968, has a provision which vitally affects all prospective members. Careful thought and consideration should be given to this provision which is called "Penalty for Delayed Participation."

This provision, commonly known as a "grace period," which becomes effective January 1, 1969, is established in one of three ways:

(1) as of January 1, 1969, if a minister was active in pastoral duties on January 1, 1968; (2) on his 26th birthday; or (3) one year from the date he first becomes eligible; whichever is the latest date.

This simply means that, if a prospective member joins Plan "A" of the Protection Program later than the grace date, the disability, widow, child, education, education and dependent parent benefits will

be reduced proportionally. The benefit reduction will be according to the ratio the years of delayed participation bear to the total number of years from the grace date to the normal retirement date. It is, therefore, very important for all persons who are contemplating joining the Plan, and are now eligible, to do so before January 1, 1969.

Response to the new Program has been good. As of July 31, 1968, 1,956 persons joined some part of the Protection Program. The plans in the Program are: Plan "A," the plan in which benefits were increased and new ones added; Plan "B," a supplemental retirement plan for ministers and the basic plan for other church and denominational employes with a fixed dollar benefit; and Plan "C," the supplemental retirement plan with variable benefits.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION REPORT January - July, 1968

ARKANSAS BAPTIST HISTORY COMMISSION

George T. Blackmon, Executive Secretary

I. ORGANIZATION

The History Commission was set up by a resolution in the 1960 annual session of the convention. It is composed of nine (9) members—one from each of the eight (8) districts and one (1) member-at-large as chairman. The convention elects each member for a three (3) year term; one third rotate off each year. The 1965 annual session elected Dr. George T. Blackmon as Executive Secretary for an indefinite term.

II. FUNCTIONS

The commission is the agency of the convention in the field of history. It is engaged in locating, collecting, preserving, and using documents of Baptists in Arkansas. Its greater achievements have been in locating and obtaining on positive microfilm minutes of local churches and associations in Arkansas.

III. HOLDINGS

In 1960, the commission received from the old historical society forty (40) reels of microfilm of three thousand eighty-six (3,086) minutes and other Baptists documents, along with several minutes to copy. The files have now been increased to one hundred forty-four (144) reels, twenty-four of which have been added since the 1967 session.

With the help of the commission, Riley Library holds seventy-eight (78) volumes of minutes of local associations in Arkansas, bound ten (10) or more years to a volume; forty-eight (48) volumes of the **Southern Baptist Convention Annuals** (a complete file); nineteen (19) volumes of the **Arkansas Baptist State Convention Annuals**; fourteen (14) volumes of the **American Baptist Yearbook**; and several bound volumes of local church and association periodicals.

The commission holds many items of similar materials in files which are too incomplete for binding. It holds also several manuscript and printed copies of histories of churches and associations.

IV. PROJECTS:

The commission began the project of having the local association minutes microfilmed by associations. The earlier reels were done by years. Eight association files have been completed. The American Baptist Historical Society, the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary Library, and our state Baptist offices are cooperating in this project. Any interested person may obtain positive reels from the Historical Commission of the State of Arkansas, Memorial Building, Little Rock, at twelve cents (12c) per foot. The commission met on January 5, 1968. It embarked upon the task of producing an updated **History of Baptists in Arkansas**. The project has not succeeded as rapidly as expected; however, the records of seventeen (17) of the seventy (70) existing churches organized before 1870, are now on microfilm.

The commission respectfully requests the local churches for assistance in this project and requests the privilege to circulate a questionnaire on historical data during the next year. The associations are requested to mail to the commission copies of their annual sessions as soon as the same are printed. Any person, church, or association is asked to mail duplicate materials to the commission which can use them on exchange with other agencies.

BAPTIST MEMORIAL HOSPITAL
Memphis, Tennessee

Nineteen sixty-seven was a dynamic year for Baptist Memorial Hospital and a proud one for all those that have interest in its future and progress. The completion of the largest expansion program in the hospital's history was a fitting way to celebrate its 55th anniversary. The dedication of the Union-East Unit attracted health leaders from throughout the country and culminated in a community banquet with 1500 in attendance.

The addition of 18 floors to the Union-East Unit and 6 floors to the Madison-East Unit provides for the eventual expansion of the present facilities to 1750 beds. The present capacity of the hospital is 1400 beds, which includes a recently opened 50-bed extended care facility.

For the third year in a row Baptist Memorial Hospital ranked as the largest voluntary hospital in the United States in terms of

number of admissions. The present replacement value of the hospital is approximately 65 million dollars.

The Union-East Unit provided for the development of 14 new operating rooms (bringing the total to 33), a 34-bed recovery room, and enlarged laboratory facilities, and space for the newly installed 360-30 IBM computer system.

Improvement and expansion projects recently completed or presently underway include the admissions department, intensive care unit, central kitchen, pharmacy, teaching laboratory, radioisotope laboratory, business offices, nursing offices, cafeteria, central supply, psychiatric unit, x-ray department plus many other lesser projects.

The world-famous Campbell Clinic (orthopedic) became a part of Baptist Memorial Hospital, occupying an entire 101-bed floor in the Union-East—Madison-East Units.

Research took a step forward with the development of laboratories for this purpose in the building formerly utilized as a student nurse dorm.

A Brace Department was also added to the vast array of patient care services during 1967.

The employee service award presentation saw a total of 113 employees representing 1,455 years of service receive awards for abiding anniversaries for from 10 to 40 years. Over one-third of the 3,167 employees have been at Baptist Memorial Hospital for more than five years.

The Board of Trustees presented its Merit Award to Dr. R. E. Semmes in recognition of his multi-faceted and loyal contribution to Baptist Memorial Hospital. They also recognized 20 years of outstanding service by Dr. Frank S. Groner, Administrator.

Community involvement once again exhibited by Baptist Memorial Hospital's sponsorship of a Junior Achievement Company.

Every specialty of medicine is represented among the 633 members of the Baptist Memorial Hospital Medical Staff. The Staff, recognized as one of the country's finest, is an autonomous group of self-governing physicians organized under their own constitution and by-laws and devoted to upholding the high standard of the hospital. All members of the staff are required to be eligible for certification in their specialty or specialties.

In its extensive program of medical and para-medical education, the hospital has in training at all times about 400 students. The Baptist Memorial Hospital education programs run the gamut of hospital related fields, and in each the hospital graduates commanded high respect. Each of the programs is accredited by its respective association, and the hospital is fully approved by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

Students graduated from the following hospital operated education programs:

1. School of Nursing (42 graduated, 32 remained to work at Baptist Memorial Hospital.)

2. Intern-Resident Program.
3. School of Medical Technology.
4. School of Medical Record Librarians.
5. School of X-Ray Technicians.
6. Preceptorships for University Programs in Hospital Administration.
7. Affiliation with Memphis Vocational Schools for the training of practical nurses.
8. Training program for Surgical Technicians.
9. Training program for Obstetrical Technicians.
10. An affiliation with the University of Tennessee College of Medicine for surgical and medical clerkship for the eleventh and twelfth quarter medical students of this school.

Employees and patients of Baptist Memorial Hospital enjoyed a very successful Religious Emphasis Week which was conducted by Rev. Charles Trentham, pastor of First Baptist Church, Knoxville, Tennessee. The theme of Religious Emphasis Week was "Living Life."

The philosophy of Baptist Memorial Hospital is perhaps best exhibited in its vast service role. During the fiscal year ending September 30, 1967, indigent and medical residents of the tri-state area received \$2,345,208.68* in free hospital care. Included in this total figure for charity and allowance is:

1. Charity and allowances for residents of Arkansas \$435,459.17
 2. Discounts and allowances to ministers and other full-time religious workers \$ 73,300.76

In a program involving so many intangibles as the work of Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, Inc., it is impossible to assemble statistics in brief compass sufficient to reveal our full activity, but we submit herewith some revealing facts pointing up areas of activity.

Immediately following our Annual Meeting in January, we took a long look at the year ahead to determine where our greatest efforts should be directed.

The most urgent emphasis was in connection with the two Special Sessions of the Legislature in February and May. Our Legislative Information Assistant, Reverend Roy H. Galyean, was in attendance every day during both sessions and his services proved invaluable. His daily reports enabled us to keep our constituency regularly informed on pending legislation in areas of concern to the Foundation.

One of the most pressing issues in these sessions involved the mixed-drink bill. Because arguments projected by proponents of the bill were constantly being expounded to confuse the public, we felt a vital need to counter these arguments with facts. The result was the brochure, "Liquor-by-the-Drink In Arkansas?" Samples of this brochure, were distributed to some three thousand key people in the state, including the legislators, resulting in the ultimate distribution of over twelve thousand copies. We believe the quick action in getting these true facts to the people played an important part in the final defeat of the measure. This brochure is also being used now in the Local Option areas and will still be effective if such proposed legislation is presented to the 1969 Regular Session of the General Assembly.

In response to urgent requests, the Foundation also placed a large ad in each of the two major state papers urging people to contact their legislators concerning the mixed-drink issue, and bought full-page ads in the Baptist and Methodist papers to publish the names and addresses of all the legislators.

Looking toward the 1969 Legislature, we have secured copies of implied consent laws and related information from those states where such laws are now in force, hoping to find a responsible person or group to sponsor this legislation. Our wish was granted when it was announced that a special committee of the Arkansas Medical Association plans to introduce such a bill. We immediately offered to share our research with this group. It is our hope that the bill will be passed and we will do everything possible to achieve this goal.

The Local Option Kit prepared late last year in anticipation of Local Option Elections has proved to be a very effective and useful item. These kits were distributed to key people in the following areas where Local Option petitions were circulated: Ashley County, Baxter County, Benton County, Hempstead County, Polk County, Marion County, St. Francis Township in Greene County, Kingsland Township in Cleveland County, and Precinct K of Ward 4 in North Little Rock. All but the two townships are being called by the wet forces.

At the request of local dry leaders, your Director has attended organizational and discussion meetings and rallies in most of these areas. We have further aided these groups by ordering literature and other materials for their use, enabling them to take advantage of our discounts, and have provided pertinent statistical facts compiled specifically for the affected areas.

We are glad to say that in Marion County the petitions were unable to secure enough response and the petition was never filed. Furthermore, the petitions in Polk and Hempstead Counties barely had enough signatures to be certified.

We are fortunate to have as our Educational Assistant, Mr. Paul R. Ramsey, who was employed in January, 1968. His background of training and experience is a valuable asset in his work, and his youthful enthusiasm for the work is contagious with young people especially. Since coming to the Foundation, Mr. Ramsey has received special training at the "School of Alcohol Studies" at Baylor University in Waco, Texas, and at the "Institute of Scientific Studies For the Prevention of Alcoholism" at Mars Hill College in North Carolina. Your Executive Director also attended the Baylor School.

Although his work is primarily in the public schools, whenever possible, Mr. Ramsey accepts engagements before civic clubs, college and church groups. During the summer, he spent as much time as possible in teaching assignments at church youth camps. In addition, as a member of the Arkansas National Guard, he is often required to attend weekend drills.

In the Foundation's school program, factual, objective information about the physiological and sociological aspects of the use of alcoholic beverages and other narcotics is presented. Here as in other areas of activity, the Foundation program is based on the principal that drinking is a matter of choice and given a free choice in the light of scientific facts, abstinence is the wiser course.

Outside the schools, the Foundation carries on its educational program through extensive use of films and special leaflets on pertinent issues and other publications. Hundreds of pieces of literature on alcohol, narcotics, smoking, gambling and pornography are mailed from the office each year to individuals in response to requests. Also, many young people in high school and college are aided each year in preparing term papers by materials loaned from our files and Reference Library.

Although alarming reports on the national scene may make the scales seem overbalanced, we are by certain events which seem to be tilting the scales toward a more rational society. On one side, we see the increasing rate of crime with the part played by alcohol and nar-

cotics repeatedly revealed in reports from law enforcement agencies and crime investigation committees. On the other side, the Omnibus Crime Bill, though all aspects may not be what we would **have** preferred, is evidence of concern by our national leaders.

The growing laxity in TV, movies and publications in the use of violence, obscenity and alcohol is a matter of concern that cannot be ignored. However, the passage of Public Law 90-100 establishing a Commission on Obscenity and Pornography, and Public Law 90-206 prohibiting pandering advertisements in the mail are two steps toward curbing at least a part of the problem. We regret that no action has been taken on the bills to control alcoholic beverages advertising on TV and radio to require labeling of alcoholic beverages as health hazards. However, their introduction is further evidence of concern and it is our earnest prayer that these bills will receive favorable consideration.

On the liability side of the scales, we must mention that after several attempts failed to pass authorization for Sunday liquor sales in Washington, D. C., the measure finally slipped through as an amendment to the D.C. Revenue Bill. Tacking such a controversial and obviously unpopular item onto an appropriation bill is example of cunning tactics used by the liquor industry to utilize every means possible to promote the sale of its product. BE FOREWARNED - what happened in Washington, D. C., can happen here. This is only one of the many reasons it is so important for us to have a Legislative Information Assistant constantly during the General Assembly session.

Our films are in constant use. We are pleased to report that during the year, two new 16mm films on narcotics were added to our library, as well as two film strips on LSD and Glue Sniffing.

Again, our total budget of \$35,670 is not being fully met. Total income received during the year from October 1, 1967, through September 30, 1968, was \$31,534.15. Of this amount, \$13,081.55, or 41.5% came from Baptists, \$15,828.40, or 50.9% from Methodists, and the remaining \$2,624.20 from other sources. (\$2,000 of this remainder came from two loans from First Federal Savings and Loan Association, which are still outstanding.) We want to express our sincere gratitude to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the following Associations and individual churches who made direct contributions through their local budgets during the above period.

The effectiveness of the mixed-drink brochure and the Local Option Kit have proved their worth many times over. We are often asked why we do not produce more material of this kind dealing specifically with Arkansas. The answer is simple - money. Certainly, none of you need to be reminded of the problems involved in raising funds. It has been the policy of the Foundation to provide materials in reasonable quantities free of charge. However, the expense involved last spring with the Special Legislative Session and printing of the mixed-drink brochures made it necessary to ask for these brochures exactly what they cost us. It is our hope that there will be other individual churches added to the above list at our next report, thus enabling us not only to carry on our policy of free distribution, but also to produce other informative and factual pieces.

OUACHITA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Arkadelphia, Arkansas

Academic excellence within a framework of Christian truth was the watchword at Ouachita Baptist University during the eighty-second year of her illustrious history.

Once again the Gorman Report, a study which rates all institutions of higher learning in the United States, ranked Ouachita second in the state, the University of Arkansas with all its resources being the only school rating higher. The ranking is based on both academic and administrative excellence.

Spiritual Life

At the same time that a quality education was being offered the 2,302 separate students who enrolled during the year, the eternal truths of Christianity were exalted; and spiritual activities were prominent on the campus. Old and New Testament survey courses

were prerequisites for all students to graduate, chapel was required of all enrolled, a revival was held in the Fall and religious emphasis week in the Spring, and daily noon-day devotionals were held five days a week in Berry Chapel for faculty or students who wanted to attend. Many students were active in programs in local churches, both in Arkadelphia and in other communities. A number served as pastors, part-time ministers of music and education, and youth directors.

A vital part of Ouachita's ministry since her inception has been the training of people for vocational religious service, and through the years her graduates have been outstanding in church and mission service. During the year, there were 156 students training for full-time Christian service. Of these, 115 were ministerial students, 13 were preparing for work in religious education, 15 were studying church music, and 13 were preparing for other church-related vocations.

Academic Life

Ouachita graduated 300 students during the year, the largest number in the school's history and almost as many as her total enrollment a few years ago. Of these, 17 received the Master's degree.

Extension centers in Camden and Little Rock provided off-campus continuing education for a number of adults, and Ouachita cooperated with Southern Baptist College in providing junior-senior courses at Blytheville Air Force Base. These off-campus centers provide an excellent way of providing Christian education over a larger area and at a minimal cost to the institution.

An extremely valuable adjunct to the academic life was a three-story addition to Riley Library. Built during the year, the new wing will double the library space and make possible use of many books which previously could not be shelved for lack of space. The library now houses 98,149 volumes which are divided as follows: books, 62,160; bound periodicals, 12,167; government documents, 15,312; microfilms, 1,564; music scores, 2,078; recording, 1,666; microcards, 494; microfiche, 2,708. The library regularly receives 465 current periodicals, 13 indexes, 9 newspapers, and 40 Baptist papers.

Over a 20-year period, holdings in Riley Library have increased from 25,000 in 1948 to 48,739 in 1958 to 98,149 in 1968, an increase of 292 per cent.

During the year, courses were taught leading to majors in 32 separate departments. A total of 565 courses made up the undergraduate curriculum.

In the interest of economy, because of the small demand in relation to the expense involved Master's programs were dropped in religion and American civilization. Because of the growth of the Master's programs in elementary and secondary education, however, the total graduate enrollment increased.

Finances

The school again operated within her income, although the task was difficult when inflation continues to raise costs at a time when student charges remained unchanged.

Ouachita's total receipts for the fiscal year ending May 31, 1968, were \$2,888,227.46. For operations and capital needs, she received from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention \$508,454.00, or 17.6% of her total income. The gifts of Arkansas Baptists through the Co-operative Program were literally the life-blood of Ouachita.

The Endowment Fund totaled \$2,037,820.64 and yielded a return of \$88,885.63. It was managed by the trust department of the Worthen Bank and Trust Company of Little Rock.

A step forward in helping parents plan their children's educational career was taken when trustees voted to guarantee that tuition for a student would not increase during the four years he is enrolled.

A further step toward sound administration was taken when Trustees voted to limit enrollment on the main campus to 1,700 at any given time. This means that the present physical plant will be adequate and that the long, hard struggle to add buildings can come to an end for a while.

In Memoriam

Ouachita suffered two especially severe losses in the last 12 months. Dr. Howard Kinlaw, loyal, able and devoted Dean of the Graduate School, died tragically on February 6, 1968. He was also Director of the Teacher Education Department.

Miss Emma Riley, long-time trustee and generous contributor to many causes on the campus over a long period of time, died on September 8, 1968, after being injured in a fall. "Miss Emma," as she was lovingly known, had given Flenniken Memorial Student Center as a memorial to her sister, Mary Riley Flenniken, and had given a large portion of the cost of Riley Library as a memorial to the Riley family. In her will she left a generous sum to the Ouachita Endowment Fund as a living memorial to Mrs. Flenniken.

In Appreciation

A special word of appreciation is due Dr. Marvin Green, who served as Acting President from September 1, 1967, to March 1, 1968, while President Phelps was on a sabbatical leave. Dr. Green, who has been a trustee for 17 years and has given generously to the financial support of Ouachita, served full-time without pay for six months and performed yeoman service in the post.

The trustees, faculty members, and staff who put the institution above self and served "beyond the call of duty" to make Ouachita "queen of the college world" also deserve praise.

Prognosis

Although rising educational costs plague all church-related schools with fixed incomes, the prospects for Ouachita continue bright. The future is promising if our faith is large and if Arkansas Baptists want Ouachita to succeed.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST COLLEGE

Walnut Ridge, Arkansas

The 1967-68 session of Southern Baptist College, "The Campus of Christian Purpose", Walnut Ridge, Arkansas, was marked by several advances forward. The enrollment reached a total of 1087 different individuals, approximately 800 on campus and the others at the Blytheville Air Force Base Residence Center and the Piggott Extension Center. Over 100 of these were studying for the ministry and other Christian services.

During the year the college instituted a tutorial-counseling service for the limited number of students allowed to enter with grade difficulties. This program is unique in the area of higher education and in a serious attempt to help young people who find the transition from high school to college too difficult. In the testing program administered by the college, it was found that about 25% of these students were capable of making higher grades in any college or university. Most of them were the victims of the restlessness of the era and the indifference of the large college or university. The tutorial-counseling program of Southern is proud to report that about 65% of these students are being salvaged from academic wreckage and have been reclaimed for college careers. Some of them have "found themselves" in the fine academic and Christian atmosphere of the college. The college has limited the number admissible under this program to approximately 30 students per year. Each student admitted is interviewed by at least three people who seek to ascertain dedicated sincerity on the part of the person seeking a second chance at an education.

The college is most proud of her record in recent years to attract many honor graduates of the high schools of her area. Each year a large number of valedictorians and salutatorians enroll in Southern.

The college follows with interest her graduates as they attend other institutions. Every year a large and growing number of her graduates are listed as honor students in the senior institutions. This year one of her graduates was listed as one of the top 25 graduates in an institution of well over 6,000 students. Others graduated at other universities with high recognition.

Southern instituted a new program to enhance teacher training on the part of her faculty, already one of the best two-year college faculties in the country. Each faculty member now is expected to have at least the "specialist degree" beyond the Master's degree. In disciplines where the specialist degree is not offered, a person must have completed at least one-half the requirements for the doctorate. Very substantial salary increases are provided for those reaching these higher levels of training. Presently every regular faculty member has at least the Master's degree and eight have earned the doctorate or completed residence requirements for this degree. Under accrediting standards Southern could have as many as one-fourth of her faculty with only bachelor's degrees. The faculty of Southern is presently much above this level. It is the feeling of the administration that the new program will greatly aid the college in developing one of the best faculties to be found in the two year liberal arts colleges of America.

Significant advances were made in the library during 1967-68. The library staff added approximately 5,000 volumes during the session. Older books were retired and the present holdings number about 24,000. It is noteworthy that this large number of books is so current since the library reports that more than one-fourth are less than three years old. Few if any colleges report such a large percentage of late publication books.

The college was invited to participate in developing college programs with three outstanding educational entities: Michigan State University, University of Illinois and the American Association of Junior Colleges. These programs will provide consultative services for institutional research and study in personnel policies, student personnel services, administrative structure, finance, development, educational facilities and faculty. This invitation indicates the honorable position the college has earned in the educational world since only institutions with a fine record and real promise of future development were invited to participate in these national programs for continued improvement.

Southern also had her spiritual tides during the year. The BSU Religious Emphasis Week and the campus revival were high points in the year. Many other great blessings came to the campus in such events as the Church Efficiency Conference and the special services during the year. Approximately 150 students made professions of faith in Christ or other Christian commitments.

In addition to the on-campus Christian activities, the college shared her Christian life with the entire area. Sunday by Sunday scores of her ministerial students, faculty members and student groups went out over the region preaching and providing other Christian ministries to which thousands have responded. The college approved evangelist also reaches many, many more each year with the strong appeals of the Gospel message. Truly Southern is a missionary institution to her immediate area.

She also serves the entire world in her contribution of missionaries for the foreign fields. Each year now new appointees include those who were former students of the college. Her sons and daughters now serve around the world in missionary service with the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Southern is indeed grateful for the assistance received from the Cooperative Program of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Though the amount is much smaller than the average Baptist college receives, it is tremendously helpful and deeply appreciated. Southern strives to be a good steward of Baptist gifts to help her in her service to mankind and our Lord.

SURVEY BASED ON 1967 STATISTICS

On May 1, 1968, Southern Baptist missionaries were at work in 65 geographical or political entities* and were under appointment to 4 more, pending official government permission to enter. During 1967, missionaries went to live in Ethiopia and Botswana. A couple stationed in Luxembourg moved to Belgium to work with Americans and Belgians.

*Argentina, Austria, Bahamas, Belgium (and Luxembourg), Bermuda, Botswana, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Ethiopia, France, French West Indies, Gaza, Germany, Ghana, Guam, Guatemala, Guyana, Honduras, Hong Kong, Iceland, India, Indonesia, Israel, Italy, Ivory Coast, Jamaica, Japan, Jordan, Kenya, Korea, Lebanon, Liberia, Libya, Macao, Malawi, Malaysia, Mexico, Morocco, Nigeria, Okinawa, Pakistan, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Portugal, Rhodesia, Singapore, Spain, Switzerland (Baptist Center), Taiwan, Tanzania, Thailand, Togo, Trinidad, Turkey, Uganda, Uruguay, Venezuela, Vietnam, Yemen, and Zambia.

Missionary Support

At the close of 1967 the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,277. This included 91 missionary associates, 3 special project medical personnel, and 102 missionary journeymen. Appointments during the year totaled 222 (130 career, 32 associates, 55 journeymen, and 5 reappointed). Between January and May, 1968, 115 more were added, 73 of them journeymen.

Even with the additional appointments, several hundred calls for missionary personnel are still unanswered. Preacher and medical people continue to be the most urgently requested.

Evangelism and Church Development

The leading of people to new life in Jesus Christ is the ultimate purpose underlying all our missionary endeavors. Years of foreign mission labor have taught us that the cultivation of New Testament churches is the wisest investment of missionary resources. At the year's end, reports from the Missions (organizations of Southern Baptist missionaries) totaled 4,918 churches (3,211 self-supporting) 6,463 mission points, and 4,119 national pastors. Also reported were 46,275 baptisms, 571,647 church members, and 515,630 enrolled in Sunday School. Mainland China, closed to missionaries at present, was last estimated as having 392 churches and 123,000 members related to Southern Baptist mission work.

The Foreign Mission Board shared in 7 major evangelistic campaigns (Chile, East Africa, Indonesia, Japan, Jordan, Portugal, and Zambia), in which more than 17,000 decisions were reported. The third Orient Missions Conference, a highly significant meeting, convened in Hong Kong.

Amazing results continue to accompany Baptist radio and television efforts. Correspondence courses, sponsored through Baptist radio programs, enrolled thousands of people. New radio recording studios opened in Lebanon and Rhodesia. Dr. Milton E. Cunningham was designated to serve as the Board's radio and television representative in Africa, south of the Sahara.

Schools and Student Work

The 1,295 schools (in 42 countries) with which our missionaries are related enrolled 181,639 students and were staffed by 6,469 national and 399 missionary teachers and administrators. Among the schools were 44 theological institutions having 1,766 students, and 6 women's training schools with 627 enrolled.

Several schools dedicated new buildings. The Zambia Theological Seminary admitted its first students. Two seminaries — one in Malaysia, another in Peru - moved to new campuses.

Publication Work

Book stores and reading rooms on the mission fields are confronting hundreds with the Christian message. Literature in the language of the people has become increasingly important for evangelism, leadership training, and Christian education.

Twenty-four publication centers overseas and at El Paso, Texas (Spanish), produced over 23 million pieces; tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, hymn books. Staffing these centers were 71 missionaries and 566 nationals.

Baptists opened new book stores and reading rooms in Israel, Japan, Nigeria, and other lands. In Rhodesia, a new Baptist publications building was dedicated.

The Commission, foreign missions journal of the Board, reported an average monthly circulation of 87,541 in 1967.

Hospitals and Medical Care

Medical institutions included 20 hospitals and 86 clinics and dispensaries, with a total of 1,438 beds. In 1967, 145 national and 58 missionary physicians served with 367 national and 65 missionary nurses. They treated 47,580 inpatients and cared for 597,711 outpatients. Engaged additionally in the medical ministry were 913 nationals and 43 missionaries.

Public health broadcasts were initiated from the Baptist hospital in Korea; the Gill Memorial Baptist Hospital in Brazil was inaugurated; and a leprosy building was completed at the Baptist hospital in Thailand.

Benevolent Ministries

To meet urgent relief needs, the Foreign Mission Board allocated emergency funds for the assistance of victims of war and natural disasters in 12 countries.

Twenty-five good will and community centers in 14 countries reached people in varied ways: literacy classes, homemaking courses, Bible study clubs, and evangelistic services. Staffed by 31 missionaries and 112 nationals, these centers enrolled 10,030 children and adults. In 15 children's homes, 4 missionaries assisted 113 national workers in caring for 1,168 boys and girls. Two new servicemen's centers in Korea began their ministry, and a Baptist center opened in Lome, Togo.

Contributions

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$28,286,597 as 1967 closed (an increase of \$1,239,397 over 1966). The 1967 Lottie Moon Christmas offering had reached a total of \$14,664,679.30 by May 1, 1968.

Still, needs continued to be far beyond financial resources. Unfilled requests from the Missions for urgently needed land, equipment, and buildings amounted to several million dollars.

The Crusade of the Americas and Project 500 will magnify the ultimate purpose of all home mission work—to lead people to know and follow Christ. We face the future with the prayer that this agency may be used increasingly to develop in America a nation whose God is the Lord and to build an enlarging foundation for the spread of the gospel."

God's Word will be distributed in ever increasing numbers and variety in 1968 because of action by the Home Mission Board. The agency and concerned individuals have purchased 75,000 copies of **Good News for Modern Man**. The Division of Communication has prepared a list of Scripture portions and other Bible aids for use with all people served by mission and evangelism workers. This list is available on request from the division.

PREPARATION FOR THE CRUSADE of the Americas dominated much of the work of evangelism during the past year, serving also the theme for most of the evangelism conferences in the states the early part of 1968. The response was excellent to many special projects, such as the numerous crusades in the Northeast.

THE MISSIONARY FORCE totals almost 2,300 representing a gain over 100, although 460 appointments were made of associate and career missionaries. Most of them are jointly employed with a state convention, association, and/or local congregation.

OTHER MISSION WORKERS included 740 student summer missionaries, with 626 supported by the Home Mission Board and 114 by Baptist Student Unions. There was greater interest and participation in the Christian Service Corps, including more than 100 (enlisted in part by the Brotherhood) who assisted with flood relief in Fairbanks, Alaska.

CHAPLAINS on active duty in Vietnam number more than 100, while there are 666 chaplains on duty with all the military. In ad-

dition about 300 chaplains serve in hospitals, institutions, and industry.

THE DOWNTOWN CHURCH STUDY was completed in cooperation with the Sunday School Board, and the first urban studies seminar was held in cooperation with Southeastern seminary and the District of Columbia convention.

THE NORTHEAST has become the scene for some of Southern Baptists most creative and rapid growth (with a 25 percent increase in the year) as part of an intensive emphasis upon pioneer missions.

LANGUAGE CONGREGATIONS are studying ways in which they might move to early self-support through a new emphasis implemented by the Language Missions Department. The study stresses a study of each field, consideration of fields of churches and missions by missionary personnel, and stronger self-determination by these congregations.

CUBA, still a source of great concern, has a shortage of national pastoral leadership. David Fite continues in prison and Herbert Caudill is under house arrest; twenty-five pastors are yet in prison. The Clifton Fites, David's parents, visited Cuba to plead unsuccessfully for his release, and an Atlanta physician made a brief visit to operate successfully on Caudill's one good eye. The Baptist World Alliance reports that Cuban Baptists will participate in the Crusade of the Americas.

THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM and the Annie Armstrong Offering provided the largest support in the history of the agency, with \$5,253,718 coming from the Cooperative Program including \$323,268 from the advance section and the Annie Armstrong Offering brought \$4,088,513.

NEW QUARTERS FOR THE STAFF and office force of the Home Mission Board were secured in Atlanta at 1350 Spring Street, N. W. (30309) to house, sometime after July 1, 1968, personnel now employed and those needed for the future. The new building, a seven-story structure, will nearly double the available space of the old building purchased more than twenty years ago.

THE MISSIONARY OBLIGATIONS of churches, associations, and state conventions are assisted by programs of the Home Mission Board, often apart from financial programs that are participated in personally and financed locally.

A MAJOR USE OF RESOURCES is made in the newer areas of the Convention where the Board helps in mission work through state conventions. Allocations to the older state conventions are limited mostly to the programs of language missions, Christian social ministries, work with National Baptists, special mission ministries, and with survey and special studies.

CHURCH LOANS for the purchase of sites and for building construction were made by the Division of Church Loans to 310 churches with loans totaling \$7,199,377.

PROJECT 500 LOCATIONS have been identified and plans are being made in the state conventions and the associations for the establishment of these 500 congregations during the two-year em-

phasis of the project. More than half of these new churches will be located in pioneer fields.

THE GROWING LEISURE CRISIS and ways of ministering to resort communities have been under study, through conferences, pilot projects, and on-going mission efforts as directed by the Department of Rural-Urban Missions.

FRATERNAL AND COOPERATIVE RELATIONSHIPS with National Baptists and Southern Baptists are seen as major factors in helping to solve problems of race. The Department of Work with National Baptists reports more good will, cooperation, and sharing between the two groups of Baptists, beginning at the grass roots and continuing throughout the denominations.

THE EXPANDING OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRIES reported extensive evaluation of existing ministries, studying centers in New Orleans, searching for a change in strategy in Literacy Missions, establishing guidelines for disaster relief, and designing a ministry to ex-prisoners. The ministry of Juvenile Rehabilitation has expanded to 100 areas, and new methods and new concerns are under study.

AN INTEREST IN NON-EVANGELICALS, their beliefs and ways in which Southern Baptists might witness to them has been projected by the Department of Work Related to Non-Evangelicals, including the Christian sects, Jews, non-Christian world religions, and Roman Catholics.

"The Christian task in the homeland grows with each passing day. The population has passed 200 million. By 1980 it is expected to reach 242 million. Migration from central cities to suburbs will continue, as doubtless will problems of poverty, racial tension, and public and private morality. More than seventy-five million people in the United States are unchurched. Our national involvement around the world constitutes a heavy burden. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Southern Baptist Convention

Through 25 ministries the Sunday School Board seeks to meet its objective: to support the Southern Baptist Convention in its task of bringing men to God through Jesus Christ. This is accomplished

by making available Bibles, lesson courses and materials, books, films and filmstrips, music and recordings, and church supplies and by fostering education and service programs which will help the churches to establish, conduct, enlarge, and improve their ministries of Bible teaching and Christian training.

Eight of the Board's 25 programs of work produced earnings for the fiscal year, October 1, 1966, through September 30, 1967. The six programs of publishing, the book store program, and the program of assembly operation produced net earnings of \$8,267,000, an increase of \$149,000 over the preceding year and \$70,000 over the budget.

These net earnings were used as follows: education service programs, \$6,386,000; capital reserves, \$1,258,000; and fixed assets, \$1,161,000.

Reports of the 17 education and service programs summarize the efforts of the Board to assist churches in establishing, enlarging, conducting, and improving their work.

The Board provided \$409,633 for the program of Southern Baptist Convention support and \$964,398 to Baptist state conventions for their use in promoting Sunday School, Training Union, music, student, and church architecture work.

Programs of Publishing

Church literature production included 2 weeklies, 7 monthlies, 60 quarterlies, 40 graded publications, 15 special items, 15 supplementary materials, with total materials amounting to 105,874,440 plus 83,200,067 bulletin items.

The Life and Work Curriculum materials accounted for approximately 58 percent of the circulation of the Sunday School literature for Young People and Adults and about 64 percent of the circulation of Training Union literature for the two groups.

Released by Broadman Press were 61 new books with a printing of 645,591 copies and 62 other books reprinted totaling 367,785.

Broadman films produced 9 motion pictures, 22 filmstrips, and 14 slide sets. There were 1,762 churches enrolled in the Church Audiovisual Education Plan at the end of the fiscal year.

Broadman music publishing included 130 new items with 360,118 copies and 182 reprints with 887,365 copies manufactured by 11 suppliers.

The Program of Broadman Supplies Production reported the production of 48 new items of church supplies, equipment, and educational aids, with a total of 5,928,549 copies. Backlist items manufactured totaled 207,050,235 copies.

Convention Press produced 35 new titles with 1,242,227 copies and 123 reprints totaling 3,222,058 copies.

Book Store Program

The 51 Baptist Book Stores reported sales of \$15,292,397 for the year, an increase of \$525,430 over the previous year. Net earnings for the year were \$604,622, a decrease of \$109,072.

The Knoxville Tennessee store property was purchased. Buildings for the Denver, Houston, New Orleans, and Roanoke stores were completed. Total rentals from Baptist Film Centers were 28,172 for an income of \$88,134.

Program of Assembly Operation

Attendance registration at the 32 regular denominational conferences was 36,555 at Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly and 26,286 at Glorieta Baptist Assembly. Grand totals of registered persons at both assemblies (including staffers and other groups) were 70,601 in 1967 and 67,204 in 1966.

Camp Ridgecrest for Boys had 266 campers and 76 staff members in attendance. At Camp Crestridge for Girls, there were 336 campers, 62 staff members and 13 junior counselors.

Regular employees of the Sunday School Board numbered 1,413—Nashville, 842; Baptist Book Stores, 539; Ridgecrest Assembly, 22; Glorieta Assembly, 10.

State Convention Support—By States

During the fiscal year the Sunday School Board provided \$964,398 to the states to assist them in promotion of Sunday School, Training Union, student, church music, and church architecture program. The amounts by states were as follows:

In 1967, Southern Baptists moved forward in their concern for social issues and relating the Bible to everyday life. With a sound theology, a zealous concern for evangelism and a deeper and greater interest in ministry and an awakening social consciousness, Southern Baptists stand on the threshold of greater things. With these developments, the work of the Christian Life Commission is increased. Greater demands are placed on the Commission to make its work more effective in all areas of denominational life.

Last year the Christian Life Commission disseminated a new series of pamphlets entitled "Issues and Answers," dealing with critical issues of our day. This series, along with the other, has more than doubled the distribution of any previous year.

The Christian Life Commission has widely distributed articles, study guides, photographs, sermons and addresses. Various channeled materials through denominational magazines and periodicals have been utilized. Each one making an impact for applied Christianity in its area.

These things, especially, seem to stand out in this year's efforts. First, two successful summer conferences at Glorieta and Ridgecrest were held. A significant book, *Morality and the Mass Media*, written by Kyle Haselden from his Ridgecrest lectures, was produced by Broadman Press. The book, *Peace, Peace*, compiled by Dr. Foy Valentine, is a compilation of messages from the Glorieta Assembly.

Second, support was secured to guarantee the free distribution of more than 50,000 copies of *Resource Guide to Current Social Issues*. These copies will be distributed to Southern Baptist pastors, ministers of education and denominational workers. It has been especially designed and developed to provide practical help on the most important moral issues of the day.

Third, a most significant Christian Citizenship Seminar was held in Washington, D. C. during March of this year. Some 200-250 Southern Baptist thought leaders from across the Convention came to discuss "Christian Action In a Disordered Society."

The Christian Life Commission also serves in a Program of Specialized Service and Co-ordination. Baptist work is strengthened by the Commission's responsibility with the Southern Baptist Counseling and Guidance Conference. The Southern Baptist Social Service Association and the Association of Executives of Homes for the Aging.

EDUCATION COMMISSION**Southern Baptist Convention****Nashville, Tennessee****Rabun L. Brantley, Executive Secretary-Treasurer**

In 1967 the Education Commission experienced one of the busiest years of its history. The Baptist Education Study Task was completed in June, after the second series of 24 seminars, and the Second

National Conference in Nashville with 300 people in attendance. After the Conference, the Findings Committee met for two and one-half days, followed by much correspondence until the report was completed in a first-draft form. The Findings and Steering Committees met for another two days to finish the report. The first printing of the report was soon sold out and another printing was ordered. Over 21,000 copies of the complete report and 15,000 copies of the chapter entitled "Analysis and Interpretation" were printed. Approximately 8,000 persons participated in the study. The Education Commission did not use \$5,710.55 of the appropriation for the study.

Several sectional meetings are being held to discuss different parts of the report, which is involving many more people in the study and giving it an extended life.

Among the suggestions coming out of the BEST report is that additional colloquiums be held in each state having colleges and in any other states wishing to do so. This should be done over the next year or two in order that such subjects as college-denominational relations, financing the colleges, and accreditation can be covered adequately. The staff has been invited by some states to participate in their continuing study.

The fact that editors of Baptist state papers chose education and the BEST study as the number one news story of 1967 is reassuring. Much discussion of the problems of the colleges was determined at the outset of the study as a main objective. Without the support of the Baptist papers, the Baptist Press, and the news media in general, the study would not have been as successful.

The Education Commission is promoting the fifteenth Annual Emphasis on Christian Higher Education and Baptist Schools in 1968. The emphasis is designed to assist the colleges to enroll top students and help students and parents in selecting a suitable college. Instead of having a general theme this year, the schools themselves are being promoted. In some of the states the third chapter of the BEST report, "Analysis and Interpretation" is being sent to the pastors and ministers of education by the colleges in these states as a means of informing the people of their offerings and needs. Most of the states, or the colleges in the states, purchased copies of the full study report for distributions to the pastors. Some states distributed the reports at the state conventions.

The Commission is in its third year as one of the denominations sponsoring the Cooperative College Registry. Every reasonable effort is continuing to be made to find teachers for Baptist schools. Presidents and deans say that this assistance is of the greatest value to them as the teacher supply becomes increasingly critical.

In addition to a number of new registrants, wishing to teach in Baptist colleges, who have been processed in the Nashville office, more than 5,500 teachers had registered with the Cooperative College Registry in Philadelphia by January. The Registry has provided many additional teachers for Baptist colleges.

During the year Kentucky Southern College has withdrawn its Baptist affiliation and considered merging with the University of Louisville. Maryland Baptists have delayed opening their college at Walkersville indefinitely. Atlanta Baptist College is rushing prepara-

tions for opening in September 1968. Plans for the new Florida Baptist College at West Palm Beach have not been completed. The St. Louis Baptist College plans to move to its new campus in September.

College and Career is widening its circulation, with a number of bulk subscriptions. Churches find the paper helpful in their emphasis programs for youth. Seventeen states are providing subscriptions to the high school libraries wishing to receive it. Colleges are mailing out the paper as a part of recruitment. It goes in bulk to summer assemblies and conferences.

There are more requests for loans from graduate students than can be supplied. The income from the Robertson-Sheppard fund and the J. W. Farmer fund is not sufficient for all the needs. This program of assistance to graduate students who plan to teach in Baptist schools has served 120 persons since it was begun.

The requests for the Opdyke scholarships are heavy, especially from colleges located in Appalachia. Last year 21 awards were made. Many recipients write that the help made the difference in their needs.

The Southern Baptist Educator circulates primarily to college administrators, teachers, and trustees. The BEST report urged a more widespread circulation of the magazine in order to acquaint the people with the schools.

Southern Baptists now operate 38 senior colleges, 15 junior colleges, 7 academies, 4 Bible schools, 6 seminaries, and the American Baptist Theological Seminary, sponsored jointly with the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Incorporated.

Institutional Changes.—Institutional changes for the year were: Leslie H. Campbell retired and Norman A. Wiggins succeeded him as president of Campbell College, R. A. McLemore, president of Mississippi College, has announced his retirement for June 30, 1968 and William Lewis Nobles has been elected to succeed him July 1; Robert E. Craig resigned as president of Southwest Baptist College to assume the presidency of Union University; Courts Redford is serving as interim president at Southwest Baptist College; J. Ollie Edmunds became the first Chancellor of Stetson University and Paul F. Geren was elected president; Joseph C. Clapp, University of Corpus Christi died (and his successor has not been named); J. K. Powell has served as interim president of Campbellsville College while John M. Carter has been on leave of absence; Harold W. Tribble retired as president of Wake Forest University and James Ralph Scales succeeded him.

Enrollment and Support.—Baptist schools show an enrollment of 98,695 for 1967-68, or a gain over 1966-67 of 554 students. The '66-'67 totals were 101,202, but a change in reporting extension and special students for 1967-68 by three colleges accounted for a loss of 2,507 from last year's totals. With these exceptions the overall gain in the year is 554.

From September 1965 to August 1966, graduates from the schools were 12,604, compared to 13,596 from September 1966 to August 1967.

State conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention gifts to the schools for the year increased \$307,984, or \$19,304,199 compared

to \$18,996,215 in 1966-67. Of this amount, \$13,924,201 went for operations and \$5,379,998 for capital projects.

The schools received \$23,488,325 in other gifts, grants, and donations, or an increase of \$5,860,723. The total assets of Southern Baptist educational institutions are \$585,559,053, of which \$142,620,912 is for endowment. The total assets increased \$51,781,850 over the preceding year and endowments increased \$5,137,119 (book value.)

Church-Related Vocations.—Reports from the seminaries, colleges, and schools show that ministerial students declined only 35 for the year. Home and foreign mission volunteers showed a gain of 43, a loss of 102 in ministers of education, a loss of only two in church music, a gain of 211 in other church vocation volunteers or a gain of 119 for those interested in all church-related vocations. It could be that the losses in some areas are reflected gains in others. It is encouraging to see that the total picture shows an increase this year. The specific figures follow:

PROGRAM REPORT

The Program of Christian Education Leadership and Promotion

The conclusion of the two-year Baptist Education Study Task (BEST) was the big news for the Education Commission in 1967. Follow-up work in the form of colloquiums will continue for a year or two. Expansion of the circulation of *The Southern Baptist Educator* in order to disseminate news of the schools to more people was recommended by the study. During the two-year study Commission continued its usual work of promoting the interests of the colleges, assisting parents, students, conventions, colleges, and state study committees. Increasing requests for assistance are coming from pre-

college and graduate students. More students each year apply for loans or scholarships from the Robertson-Sheppard fund, the J. W. Farmer fund, and the Opdyke fund, more than 100 being assisted last year.

The Program of School and College Studies and Surveys

Though most of the Commission's activity for the past two years has been involved in the Baptist Education Study Task, the staff has served in several survey roles assisting state committees with information and counsel. Information, questionnaire, and mailing assistance has been given several graduate students who were working on dissertations. Five denominations have asked for information on our experience with the BEST which they plan to use in similar studies. By maintaining liaison with the graduate schools and helping graduate students, the Commission will be able to benefit from student research which its own staff cannot undertake. The staff has reordered parts of the BEST report three times from the printers to fill requests from the states.

The Program of Teacher Recruitment and Placement

If judged by the requests for help in finding suitable faculties and staffs, and by the activity in placement, the Commission is constantly expanding its usefulness to the schools. Now in its third year as one of the nine denominations operating the Cooperative College Registry, the Commission is able to supply several thousand additional teacher prospects to Baptist administrators annually. Baptist schools will be proportionately involved in an estimated 100,000 position changes this year in American colleges. The Commission has only about \$20,000 available to lend to graduate students each year. According to the requests for aid this amount should be multiplied ten times.

The Program of Assistance in College Recruitment

The fifteenth annual emphasis in the churches on Christian education and Baptist schools is being sponsored this year by the Commission. The third Sunday in February is becoming more frequently observed as Baptist College and Seminary Day. Pastors are asked to observe the day by inviting speakers from nearby Baptist schools or in some other manner. Pastors and ministers of education are sent letters and sample materials suitable for use in an emphasis for young people on college planning and selection. **College and Career** subscriptions are used by some schools as a recruitment mailing. Helpful materials on college planning and career choices are distributed at Ridgecrest, Glorieta, and other assemblies. The problem today is not the lack of students but rather the selection of those who should attend Baptist colleges.

THE RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION Fort Worth, Texas

When the world's population is measured against the potential audience of a given religious radio program, the task which lies before the Christian world takes on positive aspects. The most promising path to any form of world evangelism lies in radio and television and with the professional experts who have learned to wield them

successfully. During the past decade, no field of Southern Baptist endeavor has grown so rapidly as that which the Radio and Television Commission is engaged.

Increasingly in 1967-68, the Commission has been on the front lines of our nation's spiritual warfare. A higher value was placed on the programs produced to represent Southern Baptists by station managers, with time segments improving by 18 per cent.

From August, 1967, to August, 1968, there was a 9.6% gain in programs distributed by the Commission. Thus, the largest audience in the agency's history was reached with the gospel of Christ. It is interesting to note that during the 12-month period there was a decided increase in the use of television programs.

The distribution of JOT, an animated color cartoon series for children has made the largest impact in the shortest period of time of any program ever produced by the Commission. The response to the program by both children and parents has been overwhelming, running to 1000 letters and cards a day for this program alone. JOT is now being used by 42 television stations throughout the nation, with a waiting list, and a plea for additional episodes.

A new direction for printed materials offered by the agency took place early in the year. *Beam, International* was redesigned to become a monthly newsletter to the radio and television industry. Sermons on "The Baptist Hour" are now offered separately in a quarterly compilation, and other material which formerly appeared in *Beam, International* is being offered for use in Baptist state papers in an effort to reach a larger audience.

Southern Baptists' Radio-TV Commissions now claims approximately 20 per cent of all religious public service time on stations scheduling one or more Radio and Television Commission programs. The potential audience for this time each week is estimated at 60 to 75 million, with programs in every state and major city in America and some 40 other countries.

The relationship with the broadcasting networks was especially fruitful in 1967, with almost \$850,000 worth of time and production cost donated to the work of the Commission and thus to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Network television time in 1968 has been excellent. In September Dr. W. C. Fields, director of public relations for the SBC Executive Committee, appeared on NBC-TV to discuss religious public relations with Ben Grauer. In October CBS-TV carried a half hour report of the Baptist World Youth Congress in Berne, Switzerland, and in November a conversation with missionaries in Columbia on the work in Cali and Bogota. November 10, ABC-TV telecast a special color film on Rembrandt and the Bible, featuring more than 70 paintings dealing with scriptural passages. In December, Dr. Wayne Dehoney will appear on NBC-TV to discuss the Crusade of the Americas.

Other opportunities continue to develop as all three networks seem to be turning more and more to the Radio and Television Commission with special impromptu program ideas.

Three films featuring Billy Graham, Paul Harvey and The Singing Churchmen, have been produced and are being edited for

showing throughout the nation in March, 1969. The Home Mission Board is paying production and time costs, with the Commission doing the production and time clearance and syndication. This is a great "first" in the planned use of television by another agency of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Twenty-eight radio programs and three television series were being produced and distributed totaling 2207 broadcasts per week at the end of August, 1968. The complete list of programs, and the number of stations broadcasting each follows: **The Answer**—119; **Adams' religious "commercials"**—51; **JOT**—42; **The Baptist Hour**—482; **"Master Control"***—507; **International Sunday School Lesson**—110; **Music to Remember**—137; **Manna In The Morning**—45; **Omniscope**—28; **State News Totals**: Alabama—36; Arkansas—21; Georgia—41; Kentucky—22; Louisiana—15; Mississippi—15; Missouri—3; North Carolina—72; Oklahoma—22; South Carolina—26; Tennessee—28; **Language Program Total**: **Central**—103; **Momentos De Meditacion**—89; **Musica Para Recordar**—86; **La Hora Bautista**—78; **Voice of Hope (Chinese)**—5; **Voice of Peace (Russian)**—4; **Navajo Program**—9; **The Portuguese Baptist Hour**—3; **The Good News (Polish)**—4; **The Chinese Baptist Hour**—1; **Portuguese Baptist Hour**—1. The estimated commercial value of the public service time given to these programs was \$3,246,900.

In addition, Armed Forces Radio and Television Service broadcasts each week "Master Control"* on 200 radio stations, and "The Answer" over 41 stations.

Wider distribution of the scriptures, and Bible reading encouragement, continued throughout the year. A special correspondence course entitled, "The Profile of Christian Experience," to introduce the New Testament to radio listeners, was written by Dr. Ralph Herring, executive secretary of the Seminary Extension Department. Text for this course is the paperback New Testament, **Good News For Modern Man**. Initial offers of this course to radio audiences began during the second quarter of 1968.

During the past 12 months the Commission provided radio and television production assistance for 220 church and agency leaders in 36 states, an increase of 56% for the year. Help was given through the mail, by telephone, conferences at the Communications Center in Fort Worth, and by personal visits to various church fields. More than 300 radio/TV spot announcements and format scripts for local use were written in these efforts.

GOLDEN GATE BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Golden Gate Seminary has now passed the 1000 mark in graduates with its recent 20th commencement. Two-thirds of these remain to serve in the far western part of the United States. Fifteen percent of them are in overseas service.

The final payment on loans incurred in building the present \$6,000,000 Strawberry Point campus was made in December. Now a new obligation for \$225,000 has been assumed to construct 10 faculty-missionary housing units on a part of the campus designated

for that purpose on the Master Plan. This loan will be paid out of rentals.

The first of the Annual Urban Church Institutes was held June 24 - July 4, 1968. Visiting staff included George W. Webber, New York City; Professor Robert Lee, San Francisco Seminary; and Professor Wm. Alonso of the University of California at Berkeley.

Dr. J. Roger Skelton and Dr. Richard B. Cunningham joined the faculty this year and Dr. J. E. Humphrey was made a permanent member. Dr. A. J. Hyatt, librarian since 1956, passed away in November and Rev. G. Paul Hamm was chosen to succeed him. Dr. R. F. Royal, teacher since 1946, retired July 31, 1968.

1968-69 is the Silver Anniversary year of Golden Gate and the 10th year on the new campus. Appropriate activities are being planned to commemorate the event.

Most significant campus improvement this year was conversion of the cafeteria into a modern student center including food and recreational services.

Enrolment in 1967-68 totaled 279: 207 in theology, 59 in religious education, 7 in church music and 6 special students. 288 of these students are married. At commencement time 35 were granted the new M. Div. degree, 4 the B. D., 14 the M.R.E., 4, M.C.M., 5 Th. M. and 1 the S.T.D.

We're grateful for the support of Golden Gate through your prayers and the Cooperative Program. There were 12 students from Arkansas.

Midwestern Seminary has entered in upon her tenth year of history with every reason for encouragement and gratitude. For the third straight year her enrollment has shown an increase. This year it is up seventeen percent over the previous year with a total accumulative enrollment of 262. In addition more than one hundred lay leaders from the churches of the surrounding area are enrolled in special evening school studies.

Our students come from twenty-four different states, seventy-three colleges and universities, and three foreign countries. This year we are very pleased to have representatives from Vietnam, Hong Kong, and South Korea.

Our graduates are in great demand throughout our surrounding states, and are giving a good account of themselves. In increasing numbers they are coming to occupy places of leadership and responsibility in academic and denominational life.

Our professors are in the prime of their teaching careers. Their classroom work is looked upon as their paramount responsibility, but

they are in constant demand throughout the area and the Convention for revivals, Bible conferences, seminars and pulpit supply.

We have added one new professor this year, Dr. Doran McCarty, as associate in the department of Theology and Philosophy. We have three missionaries home on furlough serving as visiting professors: Dr. Kenneth Wolfe, Brazil, in New Testament; Dr. George Wilson, Hong Kong, in Religious Education; and Dr. James Giles, Colombia, Christian Ethics.

We have three men on sabbatical: Dr. John Howell at University of London, and Drs. William Coble and Clifford Ingle at the University of Chicago.

Among the highlights of this school year are the following:

1. Tenth Anniversary Celebration Week, September 26-October 1, with former Board of Trustee presidents, H. I. Hester, Conrad Willard, Malcolm Knight, and Robert Jackson bringing addresses; also present Board president Earl O. Harding, and Executive Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee, Porter Routh.

2. Family Life Conference, October 9-13, sponsored by the Sunday School Board, Missouri Baptist Convention, and Kansas Convention of Southern Baptists. Among those leading in it were David Prewett, consultant, Program of Family Ministries of the Sunday School Board; Evelyn Millis Duvall, internationally known authority on marriage and family; Dr. Myron Madden, New Orleans Baptist Hospital; and Dale Cowling, pastor, Little Rock.

3. Annual Student Missions Conference with thirteen missionary speakers participating.

4. H. I. Hester Lectureship on Preaching, February 13-17, with Dr. David H. C. Read, New York City, National Radio Pulpit Preacher, as special lecturer, and Mr. Russell Newport of Springfield, Missouri, as soloist.

Our recently completed forty-eight married student apartments are always filled, with a waiting list of others to get in. We need fifty to one hundred new apartments to take care of increasing enrollments and demands. Other property needs are: children's building, classroom building, chapel, health and physical activities building.

Midwestern is deeply grateful for the fine interest and loyal support of Southern Baptists from across our Convention. We invite you, when in the heart of America, to visit the beautiful campus of your young but growing new seminary now ten years of age.

NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

New Orleans, Louisiana

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is celebrating its 50th Anniversary this year: The first classroom work began in October 1918 after the Southern Baptist Convention had voted the school into being in 1917. When the Seminary was founded the city of New

Orleans had six Southern Baptist churches. Today the city has 84 churches and missions, many of which were started by Seminary students. More than 4800 alumni now serve church in 47 states and 50 nations. The Seminary is located on a 75 acre campus valued at more than \$7.5 million.

Seminary Offers Five New Graduate Degrees: New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools, by the National Association of Schools of Music and in December, 1965 was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The five new degrees being offered by the Seminary's three distinct schools are: in the School of Theology, the Master of Theology and Master of Theology Honors Program; and in the Schools of Religious Education and Church Music, Specialist in Education, and the Doctor of Education. Remaining unchanged are the degrees of Doctor of Theology, Master of Church Music and Master of Religious Education. Eight degrees can be earned in the three schools.

Forty-Four Member Faculty has 144 Earned Degrees: The faculty members of the New Orleans Seminary have 144 earned degrees including 98 doctoral or professional degrees. They attended 56 colleges and universities, nine seminaries, 14 graduate schools and represent 14 states and three other countries.

Students Participate in Missions and Serve Churches: Each student completes two years of supervised mission work while attending the Seminary. Soon after enrolling, many students become pastors or members of staffs for churches in three states within commuting distance of the Seminary.

Enrollment Shows Steady Increase: For the second year enrollment at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary has continued to grow, showing annual increases of 2½% and 3%. The cumulative enrollment at the close of the fourth term was 835 students.

SOUTHEASTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is deeply rooted in the Christian faith, thorough in scholarship, and vitally related to the churches.

On May 31, 1968, 123 students for Christian ministry were graduated: 92 received the Master of Divinity degree, 10 received the Master of Theology degree, and 21 the Certificate in Theology.

The curriculum of the Master of Divinity degree, including an Honors Program, has been approved by Faculty and Trustees. A two-year course of study is provided for candidates for the Master of Religious Education degree. Graduate study leading to the Master of Theology degree has been retained and may be expanded. Students with acceptable recommendations who are at least thirty (30) years of age but do not have academic qualifications for a degree may earn the Certificate in Theology.

Last February the Trustees granted tenure to Dr. Donald Cook, Associate Professor of New Testament and confirmed the election

of Dr. Ellis Hollon, Jr., Associate Professor of Philosophy of Religion. Dr. Theodore Adams and Dr. I. N. Patterson have accepted appointment to the Faculty for 1968-1969. Mr. Edwin C. Osburn, Librarian and Professor of Bibliography, retired on July 31, 1967 and was succeeded by Dr. Eugene McLeod. Dr. John Burder Hipps, veteran missionary to China and the first professor of Missions at the South-eastern Baptist Seminary died on December 30, 1967.

The Student Center building was dedicated on May 9, 1968. It houses the Baptist Book Store, the Common Room, the Campus Store, facilities for graduate fellows and graders, offices for student leaders, conference rooms, and a post office.

The construction of the Health Center building has been completed. The new building will be equipped and ready for use at the beginning of the 1968 Fall Semester.

The quality of life in this school is discoverable in its 2,097 graduates throughout the United States and in other lands.

THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

The past academic year was one of continuing progress in theological education at Southern Seminary. Enrolment increased for the sixth consecutive year, an unmatched trend among denominational seminaries in the United States. During the 1967-68 session 1,323 different students were provided specialized education in theology, religious education and church music. A milestone was reached in the seminary's life when the 10,000th diploma was presented. Preliminary figures indicate another increase for the coming term.

Action by the trustees in their April meeting changed the names of the doctor's degrees offered in the field of church music and religious education. The new degrees will be doctor of musical arts and doctor of education. This change brings Southern into line with new trends in education.

In the area of theological curriculum, Southern Seminary continues its pioneer efforts. Last year the now popular team teaching approach to theology was introduced. As a part of the continuing self evaluation, smaller classes, new courses, and greater freedom among electives awaits the entering theological student. He can now choose any one of three programs according to his needs, academic background and church vocation goal.

As a part of the seminary, the church music school has been accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools for several years. This year it received accreditation from the National Association of Schools of Music. This will make for a more flexible curriculum and a freer exchange of credits with other music schools on a graduate level.

The Billy Graham Chair of Evangelism Endowment Campaign is currently underway. Approved last year by the convention, the campaign is an attempt to raise \$500,000 for permanent endowment

of an evangelism chair on the Southern Seminary faculty. Southern Seminary's library has been designated as the official depository of all records from the Graham campaigns. Southern will thus become the center for research in evangelism as well as a testing ground for new programs. Kenneth Chafin now occupies the evangelism chair.

To encourage continuing theological education, Southern Seminary offers its alumni a unique degree "trade-in" program. Graduates holding a bachelor of divinity degree may trade it in on the newly recognized master of divinity. In most cases the student must take an additional eight hours of specially designed seminary courses. Louisville area pastors participated in the program during the second semester of 1967-68. More than 120 graduates have indicated an interest in the summer exchange program.

Because of its location and historic reputation, Southern Seminary is one of the major theological education centers of the world. Last year conferences at Southern drew participants from as far away as Japan for 18 special conferences held on campus during the year.

SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Fort Worth, Texas

Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary celebrated its Sixtieth Anniversary during the 1967-68 year having been chartered March 14, 1908. The seminary functioned on the campus of Baylor University, Waco, until the summer of 1910 when it moved to Fort Worth.

The cornerstone of the first building, Fort Worth Hall, provided by the city's citizens, bears the inscription, "as ye go, preach." The major thrust for 60 years has been on evangelism and missions.

Enrollment increased 67 over the previous year with a total of 1,926—1,193 in theology, 564 in religious education and 169 in church music. The latter is the largest ever for the School of Church Music.

Students represented 44 states, the District of Columbia, 17 foreign countries and had studied in 247 colleges and universities and 25 seminaries.

Five new faculty members added during the year were John J. Kiwiet, historical theology; Mrs. Dwight Phillips, church music education; Scotty Gray, music theory; Mrs. James C. McKinney, piano; Phillip Sims, music librarian; and Douglas Ezell, reference librarian.

The development of an enlarged campus from seventy-five to one hundred and thirty acres received priority in physical improvements during the year.

Three buildings are now on "the drawing boards" for construction in 1968 or 1969. Included are a new medical clinical facility, a children's building and a new president's home.

In his report to the Southern Baptist Convention, President Naylor noted, "Intensive study of the curriculum, the emphasis upon individual courses of study and inter-disciplinary teaching continues."

The Doctor of Church Music degree will become the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in the fall of 1968 and several new courses in Social Work will be offered.

Trustees named the student center the Robert E. Naylor Student Center during their spring meeting. They also celebrated the Sixtieth Anniversary of the seminary and the tenth year of the presidency of Robert E. Naylor.

The Decade Report reveals 4,353 degrees and diplomas were awarded with an average of 435 per year, of which 222 were doctoral degrees. Annual enrollment during the period exceeded 2,100. Assets of the seminary increased from \$11,727,556 in 1958 to \$19,000,000 in 1968.

Plans for the future include the development of a long-range program involving the total "seminary dream" for the next twenty-five years.

Four major objectives take priority for the next decade:

1. The recurring recruitment of a committed, aware, God-called, and academically qualified student body.
2. The development of a larger faculty.
3. The continuing development of an alive and dynamic curriculum.
4. An emphasis on continuing theological education for loyal involved alumni and friends.

MEDICINE IN TODAY'S WORLD—These are times in which the unbelievable is taken for granted. Ten short years ago no man-made object had ever been propelled around the world; yet today as this feat takes place, most of us go about business as usual. These unbelievable feats are not confined to space science. The health field has also experienced its share. The region of medical potential has been extended almost beyond the imagination of physicians who practiced a generation ago. Increasingly, effective drug therapy, modern methods of resuscitation after cardiac arrest, heart, kidney, and other body organ transplants are but a few of the unbelievable accomplishments of the medical profession.

THE PROGRAM OF ROUTINE PATIENT CARE—During this fiscal year the two hospitals rendered 266,613 patient days of service to 38,148 inpatients. There were 6,383 babies born which were rendered 26,407 patient days of service. The hospital rendered service to 64,238 outpatients. Both hospitals and also the medical doctors interested are diligently pursuing diagnostic laboratory service and treatment of heart disease.

A PROGRAM OF EDUCATION—There were 221 persons who participated in educational programs during the last fiscal year. There were 12 medical technicians, 15 medical interns, 9 medical residents, 24 radiological technicians, 10 surgical technicians, 142 in nurses training, 8 in pastoral care and 1 in administrative residence. The cost of this program was \$846,248.

PROGRAM OF HOSPITAL CARE FOR THE PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS - CHARITY FREE SERVICE—There were 1,408 patients admitted to the charity clinics during the year, 632 new babies were born thru the charity clinics, and 7,125 visits of outpatients thru these clinics. Outpatient clinics were maintained in all major hospital services. The cost of charity free service was \$355,537 to inpatients and outpatients.

During the last fifty years the population of the western hemisphere has doubled and the number of people 65 years of age and over in the United States has quadrupled. A large population with an increasing average age citizenry means more people risking illness and heavier burden on health care and community services. Doctors and hospitals are being forced to selective admission of patients on need in order to assure beds for critically ill patients. Hospitals become functionally obsolete as medical science advances and therefore fail to serve community needs properly. Who wants to be cared for, when serious illness is experienced, in an obsolete hospital building, with obsolete equipment, by personnel with obsolete knowledge and skill? Modern health bugs need modern treatment.

THE EFFECTS OF MEDICARE ON PARTICIPATING BAPTIST HOSPITALS—A survey was run on Baptist hospitals with reference to the medicare program, and while response was not 100% it was good and a definite pattern can be seen. Even though medicare has been in effect almost two years, considerable confusion still exists in the particular field of auditing hospitals' records and accounting systems to determine the exact amount or percentage of cost the federal government will pay certain hospitals rendering medicare service. During the first sixteen months of medicare service, it was found the average occupancy rate was 80.5%. Medicare days to total patient days was 30%. It was found that medicare patients remain in the hospital 1.9 times as long as non-medicare adults. In this same period, the contractual loss representing only 22 hospitals was \$2,748,000. This is the best figure that can be quoted on the present audit reports.

The hospital has a unique opportunity to be the healing Christian ministry because of need in the lives of the many people coming into hospitals daily. Need is always present in the lives of people, but not always evident.

- Note 2—The Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its meeting, November, 1959, approved the borrowing of funds up to \$200,000.00 for a campsite, assembly and camp facilities and for the purchase of a Baptist Building site with the indebtedness to be liquidated from Cooperative Program budget items designated "Capital Needs" for such programs. Instead of borrowing from outside sources, these excess expenditures were borrowed from the surplus and accumulated monies of the various other funds of the Convention. In November, 1967, the Convention approved the borrowing from outside sources of funds up to \$900,000.00 for the above purposes.

Note 1—Properties on hand at May 31, 1960, were appraised by Glen B. Espy, Appraiser, Little Rock, Arkansas, and these appraised values were placed on the books. Acquisitions subsequent to the appraisal are shown at cost.

Note 2—The University is required to deposit approximately \$85,000.00 in the next year in the Bond and Interest Sinking Fund and the Building Maintenance and Equipment Reserve Account.

Note 3—The University has leased two dormitory facilities from Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company for terms of twenty years beginning January 1, 1967, and October 1, 1967, for a rental of \$74,030.00 and \$74,512.00 annually, payable \$37,015.00 each March 1 and September 1 and \$37,256.00 each October 1 and April 1, respectively.

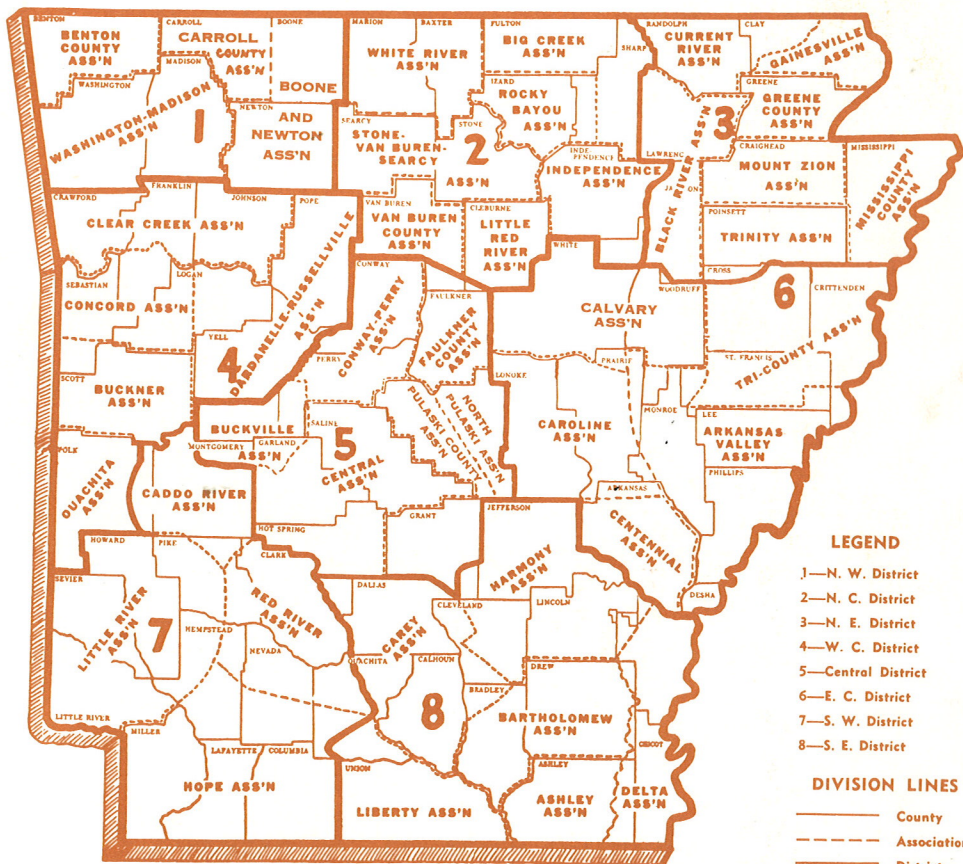
