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

CONSTITUTION

Article I. - The Name

The name of this body shall be "The Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

Article II. - The Purpose

The purpose of this Convention shall be to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer co-operation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God.

Article III. – Membership

- Section 1. The Convention shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Convention, and which desire to co-operate with other churches through this Convention.
- Section 2. Each co-operating church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for each additional one hundred members, or major fraction thereof above one hundred, provided however, that no church shall be entitled to a total of more than ten messengers.
- Section 3. The Convention may appoint a committee on credentials at each session which shall make recommendations to the Convention with reference to seating messengers from any church not hitherto affiliated with the Convention.

Article IV. - Authority

Section 1. While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, this Convention shall never exercise any authority whatever over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the constitution of any church, or with the exercise of its functions as the only ecclesiastical body, but will cheerfully recognize and uphold the absolute independence of the churches.

Article V. - Officers

- Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Each officer of the Convention shall be elected annually, except the Recording Secretary and Treasurer who shall be the same as the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board, and shall continue in office until his successor in office shall have been elected and qualified.
- Section 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the deliberations of the Convention and to discharge such other duties as may devolve upon the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all committees unless the Convention shall otherwise determine. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in his stead.
- Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of the proceedings of the Convention, to edit and arrange publication of a suitable

number of the minutes for distribution among the churches, as the Convention may direct, as soon as reasonably possible after the close of the session. He shall file and keep in order all papers deemed important to the work of the Convention.

Article VI. - The Executive Board

Section 1. This Convention shall elect a Board of Trustees as provided for in the Convention's charter. This Board shall be known as the "Executive Board of Arkansas Baptist State Convention." This Board shall be composed of one member from the bounds of each co-operating association with a membership up to 5,000, and one additional member for each additional 5,000 constituency, or major fraction thereof, provided however, that no association shall be entitled to more than five (5) members. In addition, the convention shall elect one lady from the bounds of each of the eight districts in the state to serve on the Executive Board. Upon the removal of any Executive Board member from the bounds of his or her association, his or her membership on the Executive Board ceases therewith; his or her successor in office may be named by the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board to hold office until the next meeting of the Convention. No member of this board shall hold any remunerative office under the Convention or any of its institutions. One-third of this board shall be elected annually to hold office for three years, and a majority of the board members shall constitute a quorum. Any member of the Executive Board who misses all the Executive Board meetings and the Executive Board committee meetings for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on the Board.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall be constituted and empowered by the Convention as its business and legal agent to administer all business committed to it by the Convention, and to employ such paid agents as it may deem necessary in carrying out the missionary, educational, benevolent and financial enterprises of the Convention. The Executive Board shall raise, collect, receive and disburse all the funds of the Baptist Cooperative Program, both state and southwide. The office of the Executive Board shall be a clearing house for administering the business affairs of the Convention, and a headquarters for Baptist information. Its books, records and files shall at all time be open for the reference and inspection of any co-operating church which may desire to examine them.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall render to the Convention annually a complete and detailed statement of all its business for the year.

Article VII. – Trusteeships

The Convention shall elect trustees to manage and to operate its colleges, hospitals, orphanages and any other institutions it may possess, as follows:

Section 1. Ouachita Baptist University, 24; Arkansas Baptist Home for Children, 18; Baptist Memorial Hospital, 9; Southern Baptist College, 24.

Section 2. One-third of the members of the Boards of Trustees shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. Any member of any Board of Trustees who misses all the meetings of that Board for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on that Board.

Section 3. Each Board of Trustees shall elect from their membership a chairman and a recording secretary and such other officers as seems advisable.

Section 4. All trusteeships shall render to the Convention at each annual session complete and detailed reports of all transactions and business and any other activities for the year, and shall be subject to the direction of the Convention in all matters pertaining to administering the affairs of the institution with which their trusteeship is concerned.

Article VIII. - Operation of Agencies

Section 1. Each board, agency, and institution of this Convention shall submit to the Executive Board at its annual budget planning meeting, which is to be held prior to the annual meeting of the Convention, a detailed statement of its sources of income, and a budget of proposed expenditures for the ensuing year. When received and adopted by the Convention, these budgets shall become the basis for the operations for the ensuing year.

Article IX. - Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall meet annually, "if God permit," on a date to be fixed by the Convention. The Executive Board is empowered in emergencies to call special sessions of the Convention and to change either the time or place of meeting or both should the occasion demand.

Article X. - Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of this Convention, two-thirds of the members voting concurring in the measure, except Article IV which shall remain forever unalterable in substance.

Section 2. Any proposed amendment to this Constitution shall be presented to the Convention in writing, for its consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, and may be voted on, on any subsequent day during the session, provided adequate publicity has been given in previous announcement.

Article XI. – Parliamentary Authority

Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard for deciding questions of parliamentary procedure.

Article XII. - Districts

The Convention shall establish such geographic districts as it may deem wise to facilitate its promotion, administration, and organization of its objectives, provided, it will never violate in any way the boundaries of any association within the area of the convention. The boundaries of such districts shall be drawn so as to provide equitable geographical and numerical voice and representation on all convention committees, commissions, boards, except the Executive Board, all trusteeships. Each tenth year hereafter, the whole matter of districts shall be readjusted to take in consideration the flow of membership in our Baptist churches.

BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are enacted for the government of the Convention.

1. Enrollment of Messengers

The Secretary of the Convention shall enroll, upon arrival, messengers who present proper credentials from the churches. These messengers, together with others who may be enrolled upon presentation of approved credentials during the session, shall constitute the Convention. Any contention concerning seating messengers shall be presented to a committee appointed by the President for recommendation to the Convention for its action.

2. Officers

The President, First Vice-President, and Second Vice-President shall be elected on the second day of the Convention, their terms of office to begin with the final session of the Convention.

The election of all officers shall be by ballot; provided, however, there is only one nomination for the office, then the Secretary or any other present may be directed to cast the ballot of the entire assembly for the single nominee.

The first vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after balloting for the president has been completed and the winner announced, and the second vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after the balloting for the first vice president has been completed and the winner announced.

Each officer of the Convention shall be elected by a majority of all votes cast.

In case of removal from office, by death or otherwise, of the President, the Vice-Presidents shall automatically succeed to the office of President in the order of their election. The President may not be elected for more than two consecutive terms.

The Treasurer of the Executive Board shall be also Treasurer of the Convention.

All elected officers of this Convention shall be members of churches co-operating with this Convention. This must also apply to members of the Executive Board and the institutional boards of this Convention.

3. The Executive Board

The Executive Board, being the legal trustee of the Convention, shall be empowered by the Convention to administer all business committed to it by the Convention.

The Executive Board is empowered to act for the Convention between sessions of the Convention, provided that is shall never exercise any authority contrary to the expressed will of the Convention.

When any unforeseen emergency occurs in any of the affairs of the Convention, or in any of the interest it controls, that in the judgment of the Executive Board requires action before the next session of the Convention, the Executive Board shall have full authority to take such action as may seem necessary, and all interests concerned shall be governed by such action, provided the Executive Board shall make full report of all matters pertaining thereunto to the next session of the Convention for its approval, and

provided further, that nothing in this article shall be construed as giving the Executive Board authority to execute any matter already committed by the Convention to any of its Boards of Trustees or its institutions unless such Board when so commissioned shall decline to act on the orders of the Convention.

All proposals requiring the expenditures of money by the Convention, or the Executive Board of the Convention, from the annual budget, shall be considered by the Executive Board, before being presented to the Convention.

This Board shall be charged with the responsibility to have the books and financial affairs of each and all of the boards and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention audited annually by an accredited firm of auditors, all audits to be accessible to the Executive Board at its budget planning session, and to be included in the institution's report to the Convention.

Members of the Executive Board, having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

The various associations of Arkansas whose churches are affiliated with this Convention, may submit to the committee on nominations names of those whom they believe should be considered for membership on the Executive Board as members from that association.

4. Trusteeships

All trusteeships of this Convention shall be amenable to the Convention on all matters, through its Executive Board. No trusteeship shall conduct extra movements to raise money outside its regular revenue-producing sources, nor shall a deficit in running expense or debt be incurred without the approval of the Convention in session or of the Executive Board in case of aforementioned emergencies, except, as follows: when an emergency arises concerning the opportunity to purchase needed property for expansion, the president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board and the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board (all three concurring) believing such an emergency exists and deeming it wise to incur indebtedness, may give the Trustees of an institution such permission, and make a full report to the Executive Board and to the next Convention in session.

Members of Boards of Trustees having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

Not more than two (2) members of a Board of Trustees shall at the same time be members of the same local church, nor shall more than six (6) members reside in any one association.

A member of a Board of Trustees of one institution of the Convention may not at the same time be a member of any other Board of Trustees of another institution of the Convention.

No member of a Board of Trustees of any institution of this Convention may at the same time be a member of the Executive Board of the Convention.

5. Committee Members

- 1. A nine-member rotating Nominating Committee, comprised of at least three laymen, will place in nomination at each annual convention names of persons to fill vacancies on all convention boards. At each annual convention, the president will appoint one-third of this committee to three-year terms to replace the one-third rotating off, plus filling any vacancies that may exist on the committee at that time. Nominations for all boards from this Nominating Committee must be as equitably divided as possible between the eight existing districts of our state convention. The president shall also name the chairman, who shall come from a one-year term member.
- 2. A member filling an unexpired term not having served the full term of years as provided by the Constitution, shall be, at the discretion of the Nominating Committee, eligible for election to a full term.
- 3. No member of a commission or committee delegated to study or make recommendations concerning our institutions shall be a member of any Board of Trustees of such institutions.
- 4. All associational missionaries or mission pastors receiving all or part compensation from the Convention through the Executive Board shall be considered employees of the Convention and shall not be members of any Convention or institutional board. The president of the Convention by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Board for the duration of his term of office.

6. Constitution and By-Laws Committee

A standing Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be composed of six (6) members to be nominated by the Nominating Committee. One-third of the membership (2) shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three (3) years. No member shall be eligible to serve more than two terms until one year has elapsed.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of advising the presiding officer concerning constitutional matters during the annual session of the convention with reference to matters which may arise from the floor or from other committees. The committee will act ad interim in all matters concerning the Constitution and By-Laws referred to it by the boards and agencies of the convention. The committee will receive all proposed constitutional changes before the convention and will be responsible for presenting them in writing, for convention consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, after adequate publicity has been given. The duties of the committee in no way preclude amendments to the constitution by messengers to the convention.

APPENDICES

1. Appendices (1967 annual, page 40)

Resolution adopted that a search be made of the minutes of the convention to discover policies and interpretations which have been adopted in past years, and these interpretations and policies be added at the end of the constitution and by laws of the convention as appendices.

2. Church Ordinances (1965 annual, page 31)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, in the past, the most general interpretation of the New Testament, and the most general interpretation of the Word 'principles' as it is used in Article 3, Section 1, of our constitution, and the most prevalent practice of Baptist churches in Arkansas with reference to the church ordinances, has been what is commonly called "close baptism" and "close communion", and

Whereas, it is recorded on page 57 of the minutes of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention meeting in Fort Smith in 1937 that the Convention officially objected to the teaching of alien immersion and open communion in one of our seminaries, thereby establishing a precedence for future conventions, therefore,

Be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in its 112th annual session, go on record as objecting to the reception of alien immersion and the practice of open communion, and

Be it further resolved that we urge churches everywhere to re-examine the New Testament teaching on baptism and the Lord's Supper.

3. Federal Aid (1965 annual, page 43)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, Arkansas Baptists have been faced with the issue of Federal aid to private institutions, and, whereas, many feel that the acceptance of such funds violates the cherished Baptist position of the separation of church and state, therefore, be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention go on record as reaffirming our traditional Baptist position on the separation of church and state, and that we urge all of our Baptist institutions and programs to respect this principle.

4. Executive Board Recommendations (1963 annual, page 35)

Voted that all recommendations of the Executive Board shall be published in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine one month prior to the meeting of the state convention.

5. Book of Reports (1959 annual, page 28)

Voted that the convention constitution and by-laws be printed each year in the Book of Reports for the convenience of our messengers.

6. Baptist Memorial Hospital Trustees (1959 annual, page 29)

Voted that the members of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, not be included in the ruling which would prevent their serving on this board and one other convention board.

7. Capital Indebtedness (1959 annual, page 30)

Voted that all requests for capital indebtedness by any convention institution or agency must be submitted to the Executive Board at least 90 days in advance of the July meeting of the Executive

8. Out-of-state participation by Executive Board staff (1953 annual, page 22)

Voted that we recommend the Cooperative Program as the best method of giving financial support to the Baptist work at home and abroad. We discourage any of the departments of our Arkansas Baptist work in accepting invitations to participate in the work of missions outside of our regular work within our state territory, at the expense of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention Departments involved. Further, we request our Executive Secretary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the President of the Executive Board confer with the heads of all Southern Baptist agencies expressing our concern about the practices of asking State Convention departments to give employees to such efforts outside our state, unless expenses and salaries are provided for by the agencies that use such workers.

9. Seating of Messengers (1949 annual, page 92)

Resolution adopted that this convention refuse to seat any messengers from any church that accepts alien immersion; practices open communion; or affiliates with any branch of the Federal Council of Churches, World Council of Churches; or any other organization similar to or growing out of such.

Doctrinal Guidelines (1970 Annual, page 61)
Report of the Committee of Twenty-five adopted, including the recommendation that the SBC statement of faith of 1963, The Baptist Faith and Message, be adopted as doctrinal guidelines for our convention.

FIRST DAY - EVENING SESSION

Tuesday, November 17, 1970

(Convention Enrollment and Organization – Committees Appointed)

1. The One Hundred Seventeenth Annual Session (122nd Year) of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in the Robinson Auditorium, Little Rock, was opened with the singing of the Music Men of Arkansas, "A Psalm of Faith" under the direction of Ural C. Clayton, secretary, Church Music.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Tal D. Bonham, Pine Bluff. The convention theme, "Evangelism in a Decade of Discipleship." Music for the convention was coordinated by Mr. Clayton. Betty Marshall, Little Rock, served as convention organist. Pianists for various sessions were: Pat Higgs, Walnut Ridge; Mrs. Norman Hynes, Little Rock; Cannon Lamont, Pine Bluff; and Mrs. Harold Wilson, Little Rock. Mr. Clayton led the messengers in singing, "How Firm a Foundation."

- 2. J. Harold Smith, Fort Smith, read the scripture, Psalm 34, and led in prayer. The Music Men sang "O Happy Day."

5. Convention Enrollment and Organization

- 10. Paul Sanders, Little Rock, chairman, Resolutions Committee, made a statement concerning resolutions to be considered.
- 11. Eddie McCord, DeWitt, chairman, Tellers Committee, moved that the printed ballots which were received at the registration desk be the official ballots in this convention for all secret voting, and that no other ballots be recognized, and that the number of the ballot to be used be indicated by the presiding officer at the time of voting.

VOTED: THAT ONLY THE OFFICIAL BALLOTS BE USED.

12. Miscellaneous Business

The following proposed amendment to the Constitution, Article XII, was read by George T. Blackmon, Arkadelphia. The amendment came as a recommendation of the District Study Committee, Walter Yeldell, Chairman, who could not be present.

"The convention shall establish such geographic districts as it may deem wise to facilitate its promotion, administration, and organization of its objectives, provided, it will never violate in any

way the boundaries of any association affiliated with it. The boundaries of such districts shall be drawn so as to provide equitable geographical and numerical voice and representation on all convention committees, commissions, boards, except the Executive Board, and trusteeships. Each tenth year hereafter, the whole matter of districts shall be readjusted to take in consideration the flow of membership in our Baptist churches."

Consideration of the amendment was announced for the Wednesday session at $2:15\ \mathrm{p.m.}$

President Bonham gave a brief program forecast and expressed appreciation to other program committee members, Bill Kennedy, Star City, who coordinated the service for the State Capitol; Kenneth Threet, Piggott, and W. H. Hicks, Little Rock, for the evangelistic rally on Thursday evening in Barton Coliseum.

- 13. John H. Williams, financial planning secretary, Southern Baptist Convention, presented a gavel to the president, as a momento commemorating the 45th year of the Cooperative Program. The gavel was made of native wood from the Thailand mission field.
- 14. The Foreign Mission Board, Southern Baptist Convention, was represented by Floyd H. North, Richmond, Virginia, editor, The Commission. Don A. Reavis, Regional Personnel Representative, was present during the convention and available for conferences concerning service in the mission field.
- 15. Arthur Rutledge, executive secretary-treasurer, Home Mission Board, Southern Baptist Convention, Atlanta, Georgia, gave a brief report.
- 16. Mr. Clayton led the messengers in singing, "Amazing Grace," and the Music Men sang "Jesus Paid It All." W. O. Vaught, Jr., Little Rock, introduced the speaker of the evening. W. A. Criswell, Dallas, Texas, brought a message on "The Infallible Word of the Lord," with a text from II Timothy 3:17.

The session was adjourned in prayer by Clifford Palmer, Springdale.

SECOND DAY - MORNING SESSION

Wednesday, November 18, 1970

(Report of Committee of Twenty-Five — Election of Officers-Executive Board Report)

17. The session, meeting at Immanuel Baptist Church, was opened with the Handbell Choir, Second Church, Little Rock, Archie McMillan, director. Jim Hart, Hope, led the messengers in singing, "Nothing But the Blood." Following a duet by Mr. and Mrs. Hart, Don Reed, Paragould, led in prayer.

VOTED: THAT TAL BONHAM BE RE-ELECTED PRESIDENT BY ACCLAMATION.

The vote of the entire convention was cast by Charles H. Ashcraft, executive secretary.

A. C. Uth, Searcy, was nominated for First Vice President by Wade Carver, West Memphis.

VOTED: THAT A. C. UTH BE ELECTED FIRST VICE PRESIDENT BY ACCLAMATION.

The executive secretary cast the ballot of the entire convention for A. C. Uth.

D. C. McAtee, Smackover, was nominated for Second Vice President.

VOTED: THAT D. C. McATEE BE ELECTED SECOND VICE PRESIDENT BY ACCLAMATION.

Charles H. Ashcraft cast the ballot of the convention for D. C. McAtee.

24. D. C. McAtee told of the death of one of our foreign missionaries, Mrs. Bill Kite, Zambia, from injuries sustained in an automobile accident, where she and her husband serve for the Foreign Mission Board. Mr. Kite and the children are now in the states with relatives in Redding, Iowa, and he will be available for speaking engagements in connection with the Foreign Missions Week of Prayer.

Robert Bauman, manager, Baptist Book Store, Little Rock, spoke briefly for the book store and the exhibit prepared for the messengers.

Loyd Sparkman, Biloxi, Mississippi, now retired, who served as president of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, 1952-1953, was recognized as a visitor and brought brief greetings.

25. Executive Board Report

W. O. Vaught, Jr., president, brought the report and recommendations of the executive board, assisted by Jack Bledsoe, Monticello, vice chairman of the Finance Committee.

VOTED: UNANIMOUS APPROVAL BY A STANDING VOTE OF REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

Be it Resolved, that 1971 be designated for an all out effort to increase Cooperative Program giving in the churches of our convention with all institutions giving strong support.

Be it Resolved, that 1972 be designated as the year when funds will be sought for Ouachita Baptist University.

Be it Resolved, that 1973 be designated as the year when funds will be sought for Southern Baptist College.

Be it Resolved, that the goals for the respective schools be determined after careful study to be presented to the 1971 annual convention for consideration.

3. 1971 BUDGET (see page 58)

26. Ural Clayton led the messengers in singing "To God Be The Glory." Following the introduction of the speaker by Kenneth Threet, John Richardson, West Memphis, Sang "Grace So Amazing." Damon Shook, Hot Springs, read the scripture, Revelations 2:8-11, and led in prayer.

The Annual Convention Sermon was preached by William L. Bennett, Fort Smith, "What is the Holy Spirit Saying to the Churches?"

The session was adjourned in prayer by Ronald Griffin, Jacksonville.

SECOND DAY - AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, November 18, 1970

(District Study Committee Report – Arkansas Baptist Home for Children New Articles of Incorporation Adopted)

27. The session was opened at Immanuel Baptist Church by Kenneth Threet, Second Vice President, at 1:45 p.m. Bob Hatzfeld, Little Rock, led the messengers in singing, "Whosoever Meaneth Me" and "Jesus Saves," followed by a duet, Mrs. Norman Coad and Mrs. Norman Hynes, both of Little Rock, "My Faith Looks Up to Thee."

Following a prayer request for pastor Ray South, Prairie Grove, who was reported critically ill, prayer was led by H. D. McCarty, Fayetteville. The testimony for the session was in sign language by Ted Morrison, active in the Silent Department of First, Little Rock, for many years. The testimony was interpreted by C. F. Landon, Little Rock.

- 28. C. E. Autrey brought the second study on the Bible and Evangelism.
- 29. George T. Blackmon brought the report of the District Study Committee and moved the adoption of the amendment recommended. Burton Miley, Hardy, moved to amend the proposed amendment as follows:

The convention shall establish such geographic districts as it may deem wise to facilitate its promotion, administration, and organization of its objectives, provided, it will never violate in any way the boundaries of any association within the area of the convention. The boundaries of such districts shall be drawn so as

to provide equitable geographical and numerical voice and representation on all convention committees, commissions, boards, except the Executive Board, and trusteeships. Each tenth year hereafter, the whole matter of districts may be readjusted to take in consideration the flow of membership in our Baptist churches."

VOTED: TO AMEND THE AMENDMENT.

VOTED: TO ADOPT THE REPORT AND TO APPROVE THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION AS AMENDED.

L. H. Coleman read the following recommendation and moved its adoption:

Your committee on districting Arkansas Baptist State Convention, in light of your having adopted Article XII to the Constitution, recommends that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention refer this matter of districting to the Executive Board of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and instruct it to appoint such committee within itself to draw up the boundary lines of such districts as it deems wise and report its recommendation to the convention in 1971.

Dr. Coleman reported that the committee did draw up a plan and if the Executive Board committee would like this information it would be available.

VOTED: TO APPROVE THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE COMMITTEE REGARDING THE DISTRICTING.

- 30. Robert Blann, Flint, Michigan, brought brief greetings from the Michigan State Convention.
- 31. Miscellaneous business was called for and David Crouch, Warren, read a resolution regarding the sale of alcoholic beverages in dry counties. The resolution was referred to the Resolutions Committee.
- 32. Following special music by the Ladies Ensemble, Park Hill, North Little Rock, singing, "Where He Leads Me I Must Follow," directed by Jim Raymick, William M. Pinson, Jr., associate professor of Christian ethics, Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, spoke on "Christ in the Metropolis."
- 33. Maurice Caldwell, Monticello, executive director, and Jay D. Tolleson, Pine Bluff, president of the Board of Trustees, Arkansas Baptist Home for Children, brought the report and recommendations of the children's home.

VOTED: TO ADOPT THE REPORT OF THE ARKANSAS BAPTIST HOME FOR CHILDREN AS PRINTED IN THE BOOK OF REPORTS.

VOTED: TO APPROVE THE PROPOSED NEW ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION FOR THE CHILDREN'S HOME, THE NAME CHANGE

TO ARKANSAS BAPTIST FAMILY AND CHILD CARE SERVICES, AND THAT ALL NECESSARY CHANGES BE MADE.

- 34. VOTED: TO REQUEST THE COMMITTEE ON ORDER OF BUSINESS TO RE-SCHEDULE THE REPORTS OF CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION, AMERICANS UNITED, AND ANNUITY BOARD TO PROCEED WITH PRIORITY ITEMS ON THE PROGRAM.
- 35. Bob Hatzfeld led the messengers in singing "Our Best" and sang a solo "Teach Me, O Lord, to Care". "Christ and Black America" was the topic of the message of Tom Skinner, Negro evangelist, Brooklyn, New York.

this convention, recommit ourselves and lead the Arkansas Baptist churches to recommit themselves to the main task of leading people to a personal commitment to Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, and that we commend the evangelistic spirit of this convention and encourage future sessions of the state convention to continue the emphasis on evangelism and missions.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE SALE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IN DRY COUNTIES

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention respectfully request our newly elected Governor to use his powers and influence with the state legislators to change the state laws that permit the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board to issue permits for the sale of alcoholic beverages in dry counties due to the fact that these laws appear not only to be morally wrong, but also to usurp the constitutional rights of the people.

ADMINISTRATION

Cooperative Program receipts for this year through the month of September total \$1,875,538.46 an increase of \$44,435.15 over the same period last year. This represents an increase of 2.43%. The executive board and the Baptist Building staff are committed to an all-out effort to meet the 1970 budget, including the Capital Needs section. Sunday, April 18, 1971 has been designated as Cooperative Program Day. All churches will be encouraged to give special emphasis on that day to the Cooperative Program.

On the recommendation of the executive committee the executive board voted to change the convention meeting from Immanuel, Pine Bluff, to Immanuel, Little Rock with the Immanuel Church, Pine Bluff, concurring. The meeting was changed after a thorough study of available rooms, restaurants and auditorium space was made.

Ralph Douglas has announced plans for early retirement, effective January 1, 1971, after completing almost seventeen years in denominational service. A suitable expression of appreciation will be made at this convention meeting. Dr. Douglas hopes to be busy in the field of interim and supply work to continue his fine ministry with Arkansas Baptists.

The president of the convention, Tal Bonham; the president of the executive board, W. O. Vaught, Jr.; Ouachita Baptist University president Dan Grant; Southern Baptist College president H. E. Williams, and the executive secretary along with Ben Elrod, in a joint meeting express the hope that a campaign can be conducted for the colleges, with 1971 emphasizing the Cooperative Program; 1972 designated as the year to receive funds for Ouachita Baptist University, and 1973 as the year to solicit funds for Southern Baptist College. This matter will be presented to this convention meeting.

Personnel Changes

Ural C. Clayton was elected secretary of the Church Music Department and came on duty August 15, 1970. Mr. Clayton came from the Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, where he served with distinction as minister of music. Robert U. Ferguson was elected to serve as director of Work with National Baptist in the Missions Department. Brother Ferguson came from the pastorate in Mobile, Alabama, assuming his duties May 15, 1970. Early this year Marion O. Reneau, San Antonio, Texas, came to the Missions Department as chaplain at the Girls' Training School and Dewie E. Williams, Fowlkes, Tennessee, assumed his duties as chaplain at Cummins Prison. Hugh Cantrell, former In-service director with the Baptist schools in Arkansas, is now working under the direction of the Missions Department and the executive secretary in various assignments including Brotherhood, Annuity, Church Development and Stewardship. The Woman's Missionary Union is now fully staffed with the coming of Nan Owens as Adult Division Director and Julia Ketner as Children and Pre-School Division Director. Mrs. Tyler, bookkeeper since 1944, was named financial secretary and Mrs. Bernie Bjorkman, secretary to the executive secretary since 1958, was named administrative secretary with additional duties. Mrs. Joyce Thomas was employed as office secretary in Administration, beginning January 28, 1970. We regret to report that Mrs. E. F. Stokes, Circulation Manager, Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine, is on disability annuity at this writing but is reported steadily improving. Mrs. Weldon Taylor is now serving as bookkeeper in the Newsmagazine office and Mrs. J. F. Middleton is mail clerk. New campus directors employed by Baptist Student Union this year are: Don Norrington, for work with all schools without a director; Arliss Dickerson, Henderson State; and Martha McDonald, associate for University of Arkansas.

1971 budget

The 1971 budget proposal represents an effort to adjust to the reduced Cooperative Program receipts. Most items are reduced one percent but the small overall increase was allowed according to the budget formula which has been in effect since 1964.

Be it Resolved, that the goals for the respective schools be determined after careful study to be presented to the 1971 annual convention for consideration.

REPORT of COMMITTEE OF TWENTY-FIVE

On November 18, 1969 at Fort Smith, Arkansas, the Arkansas Baptist State Convention was convened with two motions regarding messengers and membership to the convention. These motions received due seconds, and did carry. We quote a part of each of these motions: First, "I... move that the matter of recognizing messengers' credentials in this convention be arrested at its present stage of development to allow a broad study committee at least one year's work and that all questions relating to this issue be referred to said committee which will report to this convention in the 1970 session." Second, "I move that a study committee of 25 people be appointed by the new president of this convention to clarify, specify, and recommend policies regarding membership to this convention, . . ."

This committee was appointed by your president and the names with their addresses were published. The committee has striven with diligence and dedication to accomplish its assigned task.

The first meeting called included only the chairmen of the sub-committees, the president of the convention, and the executive secretary. At this time plans were made for a meeting of the larger committee.

At the meeting July 21, Dr. R. L. South read excerpts from statements of faith and constitutions from various Baptist bodies from the early European era until the present. Copies of a paper prepared by Don Hook were distributed. The title of this paper is: SOME ERRORS WITH REFERENCE TO THE ACTION OF THE 1968 SESSION OF THE ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION WITHDRAWING FELLOWSHIP FROM FOUR CHURCHES. Copies of a paper prepared by Dr. Vester Wolber, THE ISSUES OF THE ORDINANCES, were handed out.

After a period of general discussion by the larger committee the sub-committees held their separate meetings.

The sub-committees were assembled again in a general session and reports of assignments were given. This session was closed with a season of prayer and each member pledged to pray about the work of the committee and the life of our convention.

On August 19 the sub-committee chairmen met again with the general chairman to assess progress. At this time plans were made for the general meeting of the entire committee on September 15. It was hoped that on that date the work of the committee could be completed, and the report to the convention could be prepared.

With 22 members of the committee present September 15, and with the executive secretary, work was begun. Reports of sub-committees were given, and the committee engaged in discussion.

Motions offered:

- 1. To amend the constitution, Tabled.
- 2. That the committee respectfully request another year for study and that the chairman, vice chairman, and the executive secretary form a progress report for the convention meeting. Carried.

3. That, AS A FIRST STEP, the committee recommend the adoption of the 1963 SBC statement of faith as DOCTRINAL GUIDELINES for the convention. Carried.

Therefore, your committee of Twenty-Five respectfully submits this request for continued study and the recommendation that the SBC statement of faith of 1963, THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE, be adopted. The committee's recommendation of the adoption of the SBC statement of faith is offered with two important emphases. First, it is offered as a FIRST STEP. And, second, it is offered as DOCTRINAL GUIDELINES for our convention.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST HISTORY COMMISSION

George T. Blackmon, Executive Secretary OBU Box 862, Arkadelphia

I. ORGANIZATION

The History Commission was set up by a resolution in the 1960 annual session of the Convention. It is composed of nine (9) members — one (1) from each of eight (8) districts and one (1) member-at-large as chairman. Each member is elected to a three (3) year term; one third rotate off each year. The Executive Secretary does not rotate.

II. FUNCTIONS

The commission is the agency of the Convention in the field of history. It is engaged in locating, collecting and preserving on positive microfilm documents of Baptist churches, associations, and state and national bodies. Its greatest achievement has been in collecting files of associational minutes of each of eleven (11) separate national Baptist denominations which have affiliate churches in Arkansas.

III. HOLDINGS

The old Historical Society, superseded by the Commission, left forty (40) reels of positive microfilm of associational minutes. The Convention now holds two hundred forty-one (241) reels of associational minutes alone and several reels of other documents of Baptist history.

In addition to the microfilm files which are the property of the convention, with the help of the Commission, Riley Library at OBU, Arkadelphia, now has one hundred fifty-two (152) bound volumes of associational minutes, having added sixty-nine this year; sixty-one (61) volumes of the SBC minutes; twenty-seven (27) volumes of minutes of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention; twenty-two (22) volumes of the The Primitive Baptist; four (4) volumes of publications of Central, Harmony, Independence, and Liberty Associations; and thirty (30) volumes of church (3); FBC, McGehee (2); FBC, Russellville (6); Grace, NLR (2); Grand Ave., Ft. Smith (4); Immanuel, LR (2); Immanuel, Texarkana (4); Pike Avenue, NLR (2); SBC, LR (1); and Sunny Side, Rogers (1). The Commission holds files of many other churches and associations too incomplete for binding.

IV. PROJECTS

The Commission urges all churches and associations in the state to put it on their mailing list for the coming year. Separate reels of positive microfilm of several associations may now be obtained from the Historical Commission of the State of Arkansas, Memorial Building, Little Rock. The loan, for microfilming, of minutes of churches organized before 1870 would greatly speed up the writing of an updated history of Baptists. The Commission cooperates with the Historical Commission, SBC, in every phase of its work. Membership in the Southern Baptist Historical Society (\$5.00 per year) carries with it the borrowing privileges from the library in Nashville, Tennessee. ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE

A former Arkansan now living in another state continues to be an avid reader of the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine. On a recent trip to Richmond, Va., to visit relatives she took with her some copies of the Arkansas paper. Her brother-in-law there, seeing our paper for the first time, was so impressed with it that he sent us his subscription for the coming year. He said that it was the best all-around religious news publication he had ever seen.

A businessman living in Memphis wrote us that he had accidentally seen a copy of our paper when one addressed to another person had been placed in his mail box by mistake. He said that he read the paper before turning it back to the postal service and liked it so well that he was subscribing for it.

In contrast with these reactions, the like of which we have many, we occasionally have a sour note from someone who has been so angered by something he read in the paper that he cancels his subscription. One lady who cancelled wrote that we "put so much into the paper that I cannot possibly find time to read it."

The Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine has the challenging assignment of helping its readers to keep informed on what is going on in the denomination and in the world around us. The paper also, through editorials and special articles, attempts to interpret the news. One particular department of the paper — "The People Speak" — affords opportunity for readers to express their own views and to take issue with views contrary to their own. This, we believe, is a valuable part of the paper, not just as an escape valve affording people opportunity to let off steam, but for its contribution to enlightenment and the reasoning process.

The Arkansas paper, when compared with its 30 sister publications across the Southern Baptist Convention, rates especially high from the standpoint of the variety of materials carried. The regular reader has a steady diet of devotional and doctrinal materials, inspirational features, church history, Sunday School lesson helps, character-development stories for children, wholesome bits of wit and humor, and promotional materials from all the various departments of the Baptist work and witness.

Which leads us to conclude, modestly, that the Arkansas paper is tops for those who like the sort of paper it is!

Approximately 60,000 Baptists, the most of them in Arkansas, receive the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine each week. At least some of them read it and react to it. The ideal constantly sought is for the paper to be read and used regularly by every member of every church affiliated with the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. The best approach to achieving this goal, we believe, is for every church to send the paper to every member (or family) through the Church Budget Plan. More than 775 of our churches now do this.

- 3. Our Easter ministry this year not only included Daytona Beach during the Easter holidays, where our students had ministered for three years, but also included Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Over sixty students were involved in these two beach projects. Other Easter projects were a work camp and youth revival among the Indian Baptist churches in Oklahoma, where another eight students worked; a work camp in Clarksville, Arkansas, where twelve students worked; and a work project in Little Rock at Youth Home, Inc. where another six students worked.

PERSONNEL CHANGES

Don Norrington, a recent graduate of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, is the new "roving" Baptist Student Director, working at Arkansas College at Batesville, Arkansas State University-Beebe Branch at Beebe, College of the Ozarks at Clarksville, and Phillips County Community College at Helena. Mr. Norrington is a graduate of Southeast Missouri State where he was president of the Baptist Student Union.

Arliss Dickerson is the new Baptist Student Director at Henderson State College. A graduate of Southern Baptist College and Arkansas State University, he has recently returned from Viet Nam where he served as a Chaplain's Assistant.

Marty McDonald, a recent graduate of Ouachita Baptist University, is the new associate at the University of Arkansas. Marty served as summer missionary in 1968 with the Arkansas students who pioneered in a migrant ministry in the West.

CENTER CONSTRUCTION

Arkansas A&M

The Baptist Student Center at Arkansas A&M at Monticello had the dedication of the new facility on September 29, 1970. The old section of the building was completely remodeled and redecorated and a new entrance, recreational area, kitchen, and storage spaces were added. The Building Committee members for the new building were Noel Barlow, Carl Overton, Harold White, Don Williams, Kenneth Everett, L. H. Coleman, David George, and James Walker.

Arkansas Tech

Construction has begun on the new Baptist Student Center at Arkansas Tech in Russellville. The old structure, originally a frame house, is being replaced by a new center valued at \$68,234. The Building Committee members are Neil Jackson, T. J. Orton, Coy Sample, Charles Thompson, Nodell Dennis, Nelson Wilhelm, Ernest Hogan, and Harold Sadler.

BROTHERHOOD

Missionary education for men and boys is increasingly claiming the

attention of the churches in our state. This interest in missions is also reflected in the increase in mission action projects undertaken by Baptist Men's organizations and Royal Ambassador chapters in the local church community. Request for Brotherhood materials, for both Baptist Men's work and Royal Ambassador chapters, has been increasingly heavy during the first ten months of this year. For this we are grateful, for it is our belief that when the material is studied it will lead church leadership to form organizations for missionary education and involvement in mission actions for men and boys.

A major problem faced is to get churches to report Baptist Men's organizations and Royal Amabassador chapters on their associational letter and to send a list of Brotherhood officers and Royal Ambassador counselors to the Brotherhood Department.

Since our last report several events of importance in Brotherhood work have taken place. On November 3 the annual state Royal Ambassador Fellowship Supper was held. Over 400 boys and counselors, representing every section of the state, attended. Following the meal, Dr. John McClanahan presented slides on missions and needs in the Bible lands.

A meeting for Baptist men from across the state was held on March 6-7. Between 150 and 200 Baptist Men representing every section of the state attended the meeting. Plans are in the making for a good program and larger attendance in 1971.

The thirtieth annual Royal Ambassador Congress convened on May 1-2. About 700 boys and counselors were in attendance. The Congress opened on Friday with a Hot Dog Supper. The program featured singing groups, pictures of work on mission fields, demonstrations of physical fitness, and mission messages.

June was a month of camping activities for Royal Ambassadors and a Prayer Retreat for Baptist Men.

Baptist Men met on June 12-13, at Camp Paron for a time of fellowship, recreation, and prayer. The attendance was not large, but the spirit and results were tremendous. We are looking forward to a larger attendance on June 11-12, 1971. Plans for the weekend retreat are already being made.

The series of Royal Ambassador Camps beginning on June 8 was the finest we have had. Total attendance for the three weeks was 269. The Lord blessed the effort with 29 boys being saved, 69 rededications, and four surrendering for special service. We are concerned that fewer boys are answering the call for full-time Christian vocations. We are grateful for the pastors, laymen, and high school and college young men who serve as counselors and staff during camps. Boys representing churches from twenty-nine associations attended camp this year. Pray with us that more parents and churches will lead their boys to become involved in the State Royal Ambassador Camp program.

Plans for involving men and boys in missionary education and mission actions in the coming year include: Royal Ambassador Fellowship Supper on November 2, 1970; the state-wide Baptist Men's Meeting is scheduled for March 19-20, 1971; the Royal Ambassador Congress will convene on May 7-8; and the month of June will be given to Royal Ambassador Camps and the Baptist Men's Retreat.

We give thanks and praise the Lord for His blessing this year. Our prayer is that He may continue to bless in the area of missionary education and mission action for men and boys. The Brotherhood Department stands ready to assist churches in any way possible. Call on us if we may serve you.

CHURCH MUSIC

Music in our Southern Baptist churches is experiencing a steady growth. In worship, music involves both old and young in personal praise, adoration and commitment. In witness, music proclaims the message of salvation to all who hear. In education, music imparts sound doctrine and scripture truth. In ministry, music comforts and gladdens hearts, reaches multitudes through radio and T.V., and serves as an arm of love extended by the church to those who need its ministry.

The tasks assigned to the state and local church ministry are: to teach music; to train persons to lead, sing and play music; to provide music in the church and community; and to provide and interpret information regarding the work of the church and denomination.

In helping to accomplish these tasks and the church's main functions of worship, proclamation, education and ministry, six areas of music needs are developed through state, district and associational channels to provide a balanced local music program. These areas are: congregational organizational, graded choir, instrumental, special ministries and administrative.

A church has a music ministry, and should so report it on the annual uniform church letter to the association, when it (a) elects or calls a music director (volunteer or paid) and (b) when the music director is charged with the responsibility of developing the church music program.

The work of the department has been planned and directed by the District Music Directors and committees composed of local church music leaders, due to the absence of a State Department Secretary.

Mr. Ural C. Clayton accepted the leadership of this department and began his work as Arkansas State Music Secretary in August of this year.

I. STATE ASSISTANCE TO ASSOCIATIONS AND CHURCHES

- A. District Music Directors The state is divided into eight districts with a district director serving as music representative between the state office and local associations and churches. These district directors who have served in 1970 are: District 1 Northwest, Don Edmondson; District 2 North Central, Hamp Valentine; District 3 Northeast, Charles Butler; District 4 West Central, Phil Whitten; District 5 Central, Dick Hennings; District 6 East Central, John Richardson; District 7 Southwest, Morris Ratley; District 8 Southeast, Carbon Sims.
- B. Festivals Choir festivals were promoted for different age groups, and this program continues to be one of the most widely approved and acclaimed programs in our state music ministry. During 1970 we conducted four Primary Leadership Workshops, five Junior Festivals, and two State Youth Festivals. Many churches interested in organizing choirs come to observe the festivals and later organize for service in their local church. Each choir that attends learns a group of songs to sing in the massed chorus and also learns two numbers to sing for adjudication and rating.

C. Summer Music Camps — A comprehensive program of music education and spiritual enrichment makes up the curriculum of our two state music camps — Ouachita Music Conference for youth and adults, and the Junior Music Camp for juniors. Classes are provided for accompanists, song leaders, graded choir leaders, choir members, and volunteer and full-time music directors.

The theme for Youth Music Camp this year was Vocational Guidance. The program, curriculum and services were designed to promote this emphasis. One of the highlights of this year's Junior Camp were the two cantatas which were taught and presented. "Something Wonderful" a new Christmas cantata written by Mr. A. L. Butler was directed by Mrs. Butler, who was on our faculty. In addition, another faculty member, Rose Marie Cooper, directed her new Christmas cantata, "Morning Star". This was a first time presentation of this cantata.

The objective of your Church Training Department in the area of Training Union promotion is to assist the churches in establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving their training program.

- Provide and interpret information regarding the work of the church and denomination

(2) Associational leadership schools.

In order to help the churches make preparation for the many changes that will take place this year we scheduled 39 associational leadership schools during this year. They were held in the following associations: Arkansas Valley, Ashley, Bartholomew, Benton County, Black River, Boone-Newton, Buckner, Caddo River, Calvary, Centennial, Central, Concord, Conway-Perry, Current River, Dardanelle-Russellville, Delta, Faulkner, Gainesville, Greene County, Harmony, Hope, Independence, Liberty, Little Red River, Little River, Mississippi County, Mt. Zion, North Pulaski, Pulaski, Stone-Van Buren-Searcy, Tri-County, Trinity, Washington-Madison, White River. In addition to these leadership schools, we also scheduled one-night clinics in Carroll County, Big Creek and Rocky Bayou Associations. Since we have not yet completed these schools, the last one will be held the first of November, we do not have the total attendance and other figures at this time. We do know that these meetings were well attended and many churches were represented in each association.

Planning meetings were held in each association about six weeks before the leadership schools to help prepare for the actual school.

4. Individual church work.

Individual director led campaigns were conducted in the First Baptist Church, McGehee, and several one-night conferences were conducted in churches during the year.

The following churches received merit recognition during this year: First Church, Mena; Pleasant Plains Church; Highway Church, North Little Rock; Baring Cross Church, North Little Rock.

5. Drills and Tournaments

Junior memory sword drill, intermediate sword drill and speakers' tournaments were held in the eight districts, March 9-20, 1970. District winners in the sword drill and speakers tournament participated in the state drills and tournaments. In the intermediate sword drill, Sherry Hacker, West Baptist Church, Batesville, placed first and represented Arkansas at Ridgecrest.

In the Speakers Tournament, Kyle Cox, Second Baptist Church, Russellville, won first place and represented Arkansas at Ridgecrest.

II. Program of Vocational Guidance

Eighteen men have been selected and trained to help us in this area. The counselors are: Kay Mansell, Jim Tillman, John Holston, Andrew Setliffe, Gerald Taylor, Jim Davis, Mason Craig, Guin Renshaw, Hilton Lane, D. B. Bledsoe, Coy Sample, Dorsey Crow, Charles Smithson, Edward L. Powers, Gerald Jackson, Norman Sutton, Eugene Ryan, and Nodell Dennis.

Vocational Guidance counselors assisted in four associational camps and in the three state assemblies at Siloam Springs. They conducted vocational guidance conferences, and individual conferences at these camps for those who felt God calling them to a church vocation.

Mr. Robert Holley, associate in the Church Training Department, has been assigned the leadership of this program and will work in cooperation with the Vocational Guidance Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

III. Program of Church Administration

Eight men have been selected and trained to help us in the area of church administration. The consultants are: James A. Griffin, Kenneth Threet, Ray McClung, Roy Law, Harold Taylor, Harry Wigger, James Johnson and Ross Williams.

Deacons retreat was held at the Mt. Zion Baptist Camp on July 30-August 1, for deacons and pastors in this area.

Pastors retreat was conducted May 18-20, 1970, at Camp Paron in cooperation with the State Missions Department. Our department was responsible for enlisting Dr. J. Winston Pearce, Golden Gate Seminary, who led conferences on planning a year's preaching ministry.

During the year church administration consultants visited with individual churches for conferences. Some of the subjects discussed were: Church Council, church programming, long range planning, training church council members, and Church Program Achievement Guide.

Mr. Ralph W. Davis, Secretary of the Church Training Department, serves as State Consultant and works in cooperation with the Church Administration Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

IV. Program of Family Ministry

Our department plans to select family ministry consultants who will receive training to assist churches and associations in this area of work.

The structure of family ministry in a church is built around three aspects: church-home cooperation, education for marriage and family living and care of families.

V. Program of Recreation

Mr. Jim Maloch, Second Church, Little Rock, serves as state recreation director. He assists in the promotion of recreation at the state workshop, youth convention, etc.

A group of recreation leaders from over the state receive training each year at the state workshop.

These workers are available to go to churches to help them plan their program of recreation at no expense to the church.

VI. Program of Library Work

The three following library consultants assist churches and associations

in library work: Mrs. Robert Chambers, Lepanto; Mrs. Robert Tucker, West Helena; and Blanche Mays, Wynne.

We had a library conference during the second week at Siloam Springs. This was taught by Mrs. Tucker.

These workers helped several churches set up their libraries during the year.

EVANGELISM

Evangelism is the function of the whole church. It is a continuing program. Evangelism precedes any organization in the church or any other kind of program, because without it there would be no people to organize.

Everyone is for evangelism and talks in favor of it, but when it comes right down to doing it we find it hard work. Therefore, many people substitute activities in church work for bringing people to Christ.

Since October 1, 1969, there have been 145 professions of faith, 48 additions by letter, 4 surrendered for special service, and many rededications in revivals conducted by Brother Clarence Shell, Jr., our State Evangelist. His 1971 schedule is practically full.

During the year much personal witnessing has been done by the Baptist Building Staff on Thursday afternoons. Many souls have been saved, letters transferred, people encouraged and rededicated because of those men going out. Our hearts have also been warmed. It reminds us once again that our main task is to confront people with the "Good News".

Soul-Winning Commitment Day will be January 10, 1971. I challenge each pastor to preach a sermon on some phase of personal witnessing and challenge the people to commit themselves to this outreach program.

Life Line Baptist Church, on the Chicot Road, Little Rock, will host the Statewide Evangelism Conference January 25-26, 1971.

The Pastor's Personal Witnessing Retreat will be held at Camp Paron, September 2-3, 1971.

Five Area Evangelism Conferences will be held September 13-17 at the following places: September 13, Rogers, First Baptist; September 14, Mena, First Baptist; September 15, Texarkana, Beech Street; September 16, Batesville, First Baptist; September 17, Tyronza, First Baptist. Dr. Kenneth Chafin and Dr. Charles Ashcraft will be the speakers.

WIN (Witness Involvement Now) materials will be available by May 1, 1971. These are for individual use to involve our lay members in personal witnessing.

MISSIONS

The Lord has opened many new doors for mission endeavor, and He is increasing the vision of Arkansas Baptists to see and answer the calls for help in our state mission program.

Resort Missions. The past summer has recorded our best effort to minister to the thousands of tourists who visit Arkansas. With Home Mission Board assistance we have had six student summer missionaries, primarily engaged in resort missions, and we have a special project on Lake Ouachita. The Lake Ouachita ministry is directed from a camper now owned by the Missions Department. Two student summer missionaries carried on continuous weekday ministries in that area with special efforts of personal witnessing. The response of campers has been most encouraging. In addition to this, numerous associations and churches adjacent to resort areas are getting involved. We will have a resort ministry conference each year to assist churches in this work.

Mission Aid. Twenty-two churches received Pastoral Aid; 9 churches received Building Aid; 8 new mission sites were purchased; 1 church loan was made; 21 students served as pastors of 21 small churches and missions, reporting 61 baptisms during the first 9 months of 1970. An intensive survey of the problems and needs of Arkansas Baptist churches of 300 and less members is being completed in 11 associations. The Home Mission Board, state convention, and these associations are cooperating to make this survey. New ministries to smaller churches will come from this survey. The first conference on Southern Baptist small church needs was conducted at Camp Paron, September 21-22, with 7 states participating. From this conference we will develop a strategy for the work with small churches in the 70's.

Special Missions Ministries. During the past year 21 churches have begun WEEKDAY activities, including 19 day care centers or kindergartens, 3 youth rap-ins (coffeehouse type ministry), 1 mothers' group (club), 2 after-school care centers, 3 senior citizens' groups, 1 mechanics class, 3 literacy classes, and 1 counseling center. During 1969-70, 3 volunteer sponsor programs were begun in Arkansas in ADULT AND JUVENILE REHABILITATION. Bartholomew Association conducted an excellent program for the MIGRANTS working in the tomato harvest. Several conversions resulted from this endeavor. The Missions Department offers assistance in SURVEYS to find the type of ministry in which a church should be engaged in a particular community. During the past year 18 such surveys have been taken.

Chaplaincy Ministries. Expansion of Chaplaincy Ministries exceeded expectations during the past year. A total of 16 Arkansas Baptist chaplains are now serving in various hospitals, institutions and industries in the state. In addition, 2 military chaplains are stationed at the Little Rock Air Force Base. Another 16 of our Baptist pastors are serving in military reserve units in their communities. Within the past year 2 chaplains were added to the staff of the Missions Department, bringing to 4 the number of men now serving in 5 state institutions. They are Dewie E. Williams, chaplain at Cummins Prison, and Marion O. Reneau, chaplain of the Girls Training School and the McRae Unit of the Arkansas Children's Colony. Oak Lawn Farms, Inc., Pine Bluff, has recently employed pastor Harry Jacobs, of Osceola, as the firm's first chaplain. Other industries in the state are giving promising consideration to this same venture. Clinical pastoral education was made available to pastors through seminars in 8 communities and a six-weeks "in-residence" course at the Baptist Medical Center, co-sponsored by this Department.

Work with National Baptists in Arkansas seeks to strengthen National Baptist work by increased understanding and involvement and through direct work in leadership training, summer camps and activities, A.M.& N. student center, and fraternal relations. Four student summer missionaries were employed to work in Sunday School, Training Union, and V.B.S. programs. They conducted 8 Vacation Bible Schools with 476 enrolled and registered 5 professions of faith. Rev. Lacy Solomon, teacher-missionary at A.M.& N. College in Pine Bluff, conducts an energetic program in the modern student facilities. His classes enroll 170 students. On September 27 the new A. O. Smith Memorial Chapel was dedicated at the A.M.& N. Student Center. A chapel with modern facilities for 200 is the result of the gift of Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Smith of Stamps, Arkansas, and the Cooperative Program of Arkansas Baptists. In 1970 our scholarship program provided for three worthy students who are preparing for religious work. Hart of the Hills Camp for Negro youth is located on 12th Street Pike near Ferndale. Four weeks of camp enrolled 304 persons and resulted in 10 professions of faith. Extension classes for in-service training are provided in two centers, Camden and Lewisville, with 59 enrolled, and leadership clinics and institutes are promoted in numerous areas of the state. The most vital concern we have to date is the formation of associational or district joint committees composed of National and Southern Baptist leaders who will assist the director in discovering local needs and establishing programs to meet these needs.

Deaf Ministry. We have work with the deaf in 12 churches in the state, 9 of which have regular services with 16 Sunday School classes. Two classes to train interpreters have been conducted this year, a retreat for deaf students was held at Camp Paron, and the Arkansas Baptist Conference of the Deaf met with First Baptist Church, Little Rock, with an attendance of 210. C. F. Landon, Director of Deaf Ministry, has performed numerous services for the deaf, including weddings, funerals, interpreting for court cases, and interpreting some services during the Robinson Crusade in Pine Bluff. Mrs. Landon served in G. A. camps four weeks. The news-letter Arkansas Deaf Baptist is mailed monthly to 385 deaf Arkansans.

World Missions Conferences are also directed by Brother Landon. Seven have been held this year and, to date, five have been scheduled for 1971.

STEWARDSHIP

1970 has been a very good year in laying a good foundation for launching into the 70's and preparation for the theme for the convention year in 1971 "Committed to the Lordship of Christ through Stewardship."

A Stewardship Workshop was held at Camp Paron April 20, 1970. At this meeting the following representatives were invited: moderator, missionary, associational stewardship chairman. All of our stewardship materials that are available to aid the churches in stewardship development were presented and discussed. Mr. Michael Speer from the Stewardship Commission in Nashville helped present the materials. May 4-8, 1970 we made a tour of the state in 5 Area-Wide Workshops to present all our materials to aid the churches in stewardship development. Mr. Paul Allison, Stewardship Commission in Nashville made this tour with us.

Each quarter we have prepared and published in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine a list of the top 25 churches in two areas: (1) Those who are the largest givers in dollars through the Cooperative Program, and, (2) Those who are in the top 25 in per capita giving. This recognizes the churches regardless of size or financial strength who give the highest percentage through the Cooperative Program.

We have run surveys to gather information in the following areas:

- . Churches with budgets
- 2. Churches who give on a fixed dollar amount or a percentage basis.
- 3. Churches who have used one or more of our Stewardship Development programs.
- 4. The number of tithers in each church.
- 5. Churches who use individual offering envelopes.
- 6. Does the church support the Cooperative Program?
- 7. Does the church support associational missions?

We have enlisted a stewardship chairman in each association through which we will work. This fall we will be enlisting a stewardship chairman in each church and placing in their hand a new and revised book on the chairman of stewardship in the local church. This should prove one of the greatest boons in the promotion of stewardship that we have undertaken yet.

This fall at budget making time there will be a series of three letters going to each pastor. In this catalog is listed all the materials available to the churches from the Commission. In the past, less than 10% of our churches have used any of these materials in budget making promotion or subscription. We are hoping for a great increase in these materials for 1971.

We urge each church to observe:

- 1. Cooperative Program Day Sunday, April 18, 1971
- 2. Use one of the five stewardship aids in budget making, promotion and subscription.
- 3. Use individual offering envelopes.
- 4. Give through the Cooperative Program regularly.
- 5. Adopt a worthy increase for increased giving through the Cooperative Program year by year.
- 6. Strive to enlist all your people in tithing.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

The objective of the Sunday School Department is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose . . . "to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer co-operation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God."

The Sunday School Department seeks to accomplish its objective through four major programs: Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, Weekday Bible Study and Church Administration. These programs will help churches establish, conduct, enlarge, and improve their ministries of Bible teaching, leadership training and personal witnessing. The department also programs the state assembly.

The secretary, Lawson Hatfield, relates primarily to local church assistance, church architecture, and adult work.

Don Cooper, associate secretary, relates to associational promotion and Vacation Bible School work and serves as youth division consultant.

Mrs. Mary Emma Humphrey relates to the promotion of weekday Bible study and work with the mentally retarded, and serves as children's division consultant.

Miss Pat Ratton edits the Sunday School News, relates to kindergartens and nursery school, and serves as preschool division consultant.

Beyond the Baptist Building the work is promoted by area consultants and forty-four associational Sunday School organizations.

II. VACATION BIBLE SCHOL PROMOTION

Sixteen associations reported conducting 22 VBS clinics with 2,358 present.

III. WEEKDAY BIBLE STUDY PROMOTION

The objective of the program of weekday Bible study promotion is to assist churches, associations, and the state convention in establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving weekday Bible study in the churches. Weekday Bible study includes formally scheduled opportunities for concentrated teaching of the Bible and other curriculum areas for pupils of public school ages in weekday Bible study classes and other programs of weekday Bible study. It also includes special teaching opportunities for children in kindergarten, child care programs, and nursery schools.

There are 55 churches which provide kindergarten and day care ministries. Churches are showing concern for some special groups as reflected in providing Sunday School teaching in fourteen departments for the mentally retarded.

IV. CHURCH ARCHITECTURE CONSULTATION

The objective of the program of church architecture consultation is to interpret the relationship of property and buildings of a church and to provide information and consultation to churches and denominational organizations concerning all phases and details of planning and securing appropriate property and buildings.

Through personal visits and correspondence 43 churches were referred to the Church Architecture Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE ASSEMBLY

The objective of the state assembly is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose ... "to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer cooperation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God."

The program of the state assembly seeks to reach its objective by:

- 1. Providing facilities and operating the assembly as a service to the programs of the Convention.
- 2. Offering training for church leaders, church members and others of all age groups in Bible study, stewardship and missions.
- 3. Providing worship, witnessing and evangelistic opportunities.
- 4. Planning fellowship and recreational activities.
- Cooperating with all boards, agencies and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention to provide an informal meeting place for denominational leaders, church leaders and members.
- 6. Cultivating and training young people, our leaders of tomorrow.

A report and evaluation of the three 1970 assemblies follows.

The total registration of 2,196 is reflected in the following figures which are listed for the three consecutive weeks: 440, 915, and 841. In addition there were many visitors in the services each week.

The assembly program reflects a reasonable degree of variety considering the many needs of people in attendance. The Children's Building was well staffed for good learning experiences for preschool children. In three weeks the building was used by about 100 children and leaders.

A Junior Assembly is conducted in separate areas by a good staff of leaders and ministered to about 450 in this age group.

The Youth-Adult Assembly is the largest in attendance, with about 1600 participating in the three assemblies. Bible Study classes for young people and special studies and organizational work was offered for adults. Several special studies were provided for some groups. An "On-to-College" class and a large special choir produced "Tell It Like It Is," a contemporary folk-type musical for Youth. This was produced Friday night for each week.

During the three assemblies 612 of those in attendance made and recorded written decisions. Of the 612 cards, 99 were professions of faith, 90 were surrenders to special service and 423 were rededications.

The business manager of the assembly, Ralph Douglas and resident director, Gene Devor teamed up to provide the assembly with a new dormitory which houses 100 campers in four large dormitory rooms. Additional improvements in facilities are in the planning stage.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The objective of Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, is to promote Christian missions through its age-level organizations. The following is included in the statement of relationships (Bylaws, Article III), "Woman's Missionary Union shall cooperate with the total program of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention as it relates to the promotion of Christian missions." It is further stated that associational unions shall be recognized as liaison between state and church Woman's Missionary Unions; and church organizations shall be recognized as the units through which the object may be accomplished. In fulfillment of this objective and statement of relationships plans have been developed for teaching missions, leading persons to participate in missions, leading in special missions projects, and interpreting the work of the church and denomination.

According to the Sunday School Board's Department of Research and Statistics and records in the State WMU Office, there were 31,672 WMU members reported in 2,597 organizations, in 638 churches in Arkansas. These figures reflect slight recovery from resistance to change in organization patterns instituted the previous year, and to the fact that increasing numbers of women are employed outside the home and are thus lost to organizations meeting in the day, both as members of the adult organization and as leaders of youth organizations. There is, however, evidence now of "settling down" and renewed interest in plans projected for the 70's which even include new organizational names, new grouping-grading to conform with other church program organizations, and new leader and member periodicals.

The WMU Achievement Guide is a tool for planning, coordinating and evaluating Woman's Missionary Union work as a whole. It is organized around program foundations, program relationships, organization, leaders-members, physical resources, finances, planning and evaluation, records and reports. There are three levels of achievement: Merit, Advanced and Distinguished. As specified numbers of achievements are attained, an organization is recognized. Recognitions were given 41 Distinguished local church Woman's Missionary Unions, 17 Advanced and 13 Merit.

The objective of the associational WMU program is to assist in establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving Woman's Missionary Union's program in churches of the association. Associational organizations were reported in 41 associations.

Effectiveness in carrying out the objective of the associational WMU is measured by the associational WMU Achievement Guide. Recognitions were given 12 Distinguished associational WMUs (Ashley County, Bartholomew, Caroline, Clear Creek, Concord, Greene County, Liberty, Little River, Mississippi County, Mt. Zion, North Pulaski, Washington-Madison) and one Advanced (Delta).

Through the area of mission support represented in prayer and stewardship the Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions was promoted and its attendant Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions which totaled \$420,119; the Week of Prayer for Home Missions with the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions which totaled \$118,307; and the Season of Prayer for State Missions with the Dixie Jackson Offering which totaled \$65,944.

State-wide meetings featuring missionary speakers and organizational methods were provided for many age-levels. The following are some:

Promotion was given national WMU activities including Annual Meeting, Denver, Colo; YWA Conference, Ridgecrest (Chartered bus for 25); WMU Conference, Glorieta, total of 65 from state (Chartered bus for 39).

Implementing of plans for new grouping-grading plans called for new titles for directors and re-division of work. In July Miss Nan Owens, former missionary to Nigeria, became Director of the Adult Division (Baptist Women, 30 up, and Baptist Young Women, 18-29); and Miss Julia Ketner of Florida became Director of Children's Division (Girls-in-Action, 6-11) and Pre-School Division (Mission Friends, Birth-5). Miss Sara Wisdom, former YWA Director became director of Youth Division (Acteens, 12-17). These, along with the executive secretary, constitute the Field Services staff.

After eighteen years of service on the State WMU staff, Mrs. R. E. Hagood retired as WMS Director on January 1.

Serving on the secretarial office staff are Mrs. Melvin Murphree, a veteran of eleven years, and Mrs. C. S. White, a veteran of ten years.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST HOME FOR CHILDREN

Monticello, Arkansas

Maurice Caldwell, Executive Director

The years 1969 and 1970 have been another pace-setting time for the Arkansas Baptist Home for Children as we have witnessed an expansion of our services to more than 400 individuals.

Services to families and children were in several areas. The children in our institution and foster homes must have the necessities of life such as food, clothing and shelter. They must also be provided medical and dental care, educational and cultural expressions, religious training, recreational and social activities, all of which help young people grow into happy, well-adjusted Christian adults.

For the Arkansas Baptist to provide these essentials, we must continue to plan, think, pray and work to this end. These children need to know that Christian adults are concerned about their lives. Many of them have been hurt since birth, and it is difficult to heal the wounds and erase the scars.

For the Agency to help the total child and his family, there must be different programs of service. In the past, we assumed that the Institution was the answer for all of the ills of children. All children are different and the Institution is only a part of the service that may be needed. In the past, all children were placed in the institution; however, we have found that many children needed a home type environment such as a foster home can provide. We have twenty-five children in foster family homes. We have several family groups of children in private homes. These children are under close supervision of our Agency. Some of these homes receive compensation for their services while others are able to provide this service without payment by our Agency. The foster family provides a setting for the child to learn how to live as a family unit.

The newest innovation of our foster home is a group home for five teen-age boys in Jonesboro. The First Church is assisting in this effort by providing a home for these young people. It offers the individual child a home and it is a good mission-in-action project for the church. Those who have assisted in the project have expressed a great deal of enthusiasm for the program. The church provides the house and utilities along with other assistance such as recreation and friendship to the boys.

Our area office workers are offering an after-care program for those children who have been discharged from care. They help the family and child readjust to the home, community and school. Many times a child would have been able to remain at home if someone had given a little time and friendship to the family. In this area, we are encouraging the local churches to become involved with families. At the present time we are serving approximately two-hundred individuals. Space does not allow testimonies about this work and how it has helped to heal some deep family problems.

STAFF

Staffing a child-caring Agency is a difficult task. We have given a great deal of attention to the problem of attracting and retaining the best Christian people to work with the boys and girls as cottage-parents, social workers and other positions. We have sent cottage parents to the University of Texas

Institute on Child-Care for the past two years. Training was conducted for the staff throughout the year to help in the skill and knowledge of child-care. Our only tools are our own abilities and knowledge and we must relate ourselves individually to each child that we serve.

The Agency provides opportunities for the boys and girls to learn how to live with others. In 1969, more than any time before, the children have participated in school, church and community activities. They have taken part in various sports, bands, cheerleading squad, school, church choirs and other special functions. On campus there was an excellent recreation program for all the children. Some children cannot participate in competition sports; therefore, we offer them individual outlets for recreation. The State BSU assigned two students to work in recreational activities with our children this past summer.

Many churches and individual groups have visited on our campus this year. Each group seemed excited about the program and the privilege to be part of the ministry.

The Institution served one hundred eighty-six children during the past year. We have sixty beds available for children and the average length of stay is eighteen months.

We have used the facilities of other professional agencies to better understand our children. Children are evaluated at the Jenkins Memorial Center and the Mental Health Center in Pine Bluff. Also, we have used the services of other professionals who have given of their time to help in this work.

HIGHLIGHTS OF A BUSY TWELVE MONTHS

The campus at Monticello took on a new look when three old buildings were razed. The old Industrial Building constructed in 1907 was removed, and the two old dormitories constructed in 1923 were removed. Two new cottages were built to replace the old dormitories. They were built with monies from the Barton Estate. All of the cottages have been air-conditioned and remodeled.

An educational fund was established by the W. M. U. of the Central Baptist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Board of Trustees would like to recommend to the convention some necessary changes in the Articles of Incorporation. These are listed for your benefit. The changes are in italics.

PROPOSED

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

OF

ARKANSAS BAPTIST FAMILY AND CHILD CARE SERVICES

The undersigned residents of the State of Arkansas adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I NAME AND LOCATION

The name of this Corporation shall be the "Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services." The principal domicile shall be at Monticello, Drew County, Arkansas, and it may have offices at such other locations in the State of Arkansas as its Board of Trustees may establish from time to time.

ARTICLE II PERIOD OF EXISTENCE

The period of existence of this Corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE III PURPOSES

The objects and purposes of this *Corporation* are as follows:

- (a) To provide and maintain a facility at Monticello, Arkansas, known as the *Arkansas Baptist Home for Children*, and/or such other places as may be established for dependent, neglected, and/or needy children of the State of Arkansas;
- (b) To establish and maintain a child care program to meet the spiritual, physical, mental, and emotional needs of homeless and dependent children;
- (c) To establish Christian homes throughout the State of Arkansas as foster and group homes for children;
- (d) To provide group care and treatment for children whose needs cannot at the time be adequately met in a family;
- (e) To provide supportive and supplementary services for children in need of assistance while the child is living in his or her home with natural or foster parents.
- (f) To establish area offices to assist in the placement of children in foster homes, group homes, and/or institutions; to provide counseling services to children in their own homes and to adults and families who are experiencing parent-child conflicts and to work toward the Christian growth of all children:
- (g) To do and perform any and all things deemed proper or needed to meet the special and/or normal needs of children who are accepted for care by Arkansas Baptists;
- (h) To exercise any and all rights and powers which a corporation may now or hereafter exercise.

The purposes specified herein shall be construed both as purposes and powers and shall in no wise be limited or restricted by reference to, or inference from, the terms of any other clause in this or any other Article hereof, but the purposes and powers specified in each of the clauses herein shall be regarded as independent purposes and powers, and the enumeration of specific purposes and powers shall not be construed to limit or restrict in any manner the meaning of general terms or of the general powers of the Corporation; nor shall the expression of one thing be deemed to exclude

another, although it be of like nature not expressed.

ARTICLE IV BOARD OF TRUSTEES

- 1. This *Corporation* shall be managed and controlled by a board of eighteen *trustees* who shall serve a term of three years and shall continue in office until their successors shall be elected or appointed pursuant to the Constitution of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Unless otherwise provided, six *trustees* shall be elected or appointed each year at the annual meeting of the said Arkansas Baptist State Convention to take the place of those trustees whose term shall have expired. The *trustees* presently serving shall continue in office for the term of each such trustee and until their successors are elected or appointed. The Board shall make a report of the condition, progress and management of the activities of the *Corporation* annually to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.
- 2. In the event of the dissolution of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention without a successor then the management and control of said Agency shall be in an Association of Baptist Churches of the State of Arkansas designated by the Board of *Trustees* of said *Agency*.
- 3. The Board of *Trustees* are authorized to adopt by-laws, rules, and regulations for the management of the *Corporation*, and to elect an Executive Director and such other officers as shall be necessary for the proper management and support of the work of the *Corporation*.
- 4. In the event of a vacancy in the membership of the Board of Trustees, such vacancy shall be filled by the Nominating Committee of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. The person so appointed shall serve the unexpired term of the member. This is in accordance with the Constitution of the State Convention.
- 5. The Board of *Trustees* shall annually elect, from the membership of the Board, a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The office of Secretary and Treasurer may be held by the same person.

ARTICLE V

These Articles of Incorporation may be altered and amended at any regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, provided, however, any such amendment may be modified or repealed by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention or its successor, and the same may not thereafter be again adopted without the prior approval of the Convention or its successor.

ARTICLE VI

The Board of Trustees shall hold meetings quarterly and at such other times as a majority of the Board may hereafter establish. A majority of the membership of the Board shall constitute a quorum at all meetings.

ARTICLE VII

The period of existence of this Corporation shall be perpetual unless dissolved pursuant to law. In the event of the dissolution, the assets shall revert to and become the property of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention or its successors.

ARTICLE VIII

The name of the registered agent for this Corporation is Maurice Caldwell at Monticello, Arkansas.

ARTICLE IX

This is a nonprofit Corporation and it shall never be operated for any profit purpose. It shall at all times be fully qualified to receive and accept contributions as a nonprofit Corporation.

ARTICLE X

In a year when the national news media have had much to report that is discouraging on such topics as international warfare, racial tension, campus violence, economic uncertainties, and the growing acceptance of alcohol, narcotics, and sexual promiscuity as natural components of American college life, it is wonderful to be able to report good news in the cause of Christ at Ouachita Baptist University. Never before have Arkansas Baptists been so united in support of Christian higher education. It has been a year for a fresh start for Ouachita and Arkansas Baptists with new administrative personnel having an unusual opprotunity to break new ground in cooperative effort.

Dr. Daniel R. Grant, after twenty-one years at Vanderbilt University, accepted the call to return to his native state to be president of his alma mater, effective February 1, 1970. His father, Dr. J. R. Grant, was president from 1934 to 1949. The new President Grant has sought to establish an "open door and open ear policy" in his relations not only with students but with all those who have a stake in the future of Ouachita — parents, pastors, denominational leaders, faculty and alumni. He has promised to work for a greater Ouachita with emphasis on the twin goals of Christian excellence and educational excellence.

Three new administrative appointments rank high among the good news items of the past year. Dr. Carl Goodson returned to Ouachita as Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences, effective July 1, 1970, leaving the position of Academic Dean of Missouri Baptist College. He had previously served as Professor of Greek and Religion at Ouachita from 1961 to 1968.

Dr. Ben Elrod was appointed Vice President for Development, effective August 15, returning to Ouachita from serving as President of Oakland City College in Indiana. Dr. Elrod needs no introduction to Arkansas Baptists, being a native of the state, a graduate of Ouachita, and pastor of several churches before establishing Ouachita's first development program during 1963 to 1968. Dr. Elrod's experience and Christian dedication will be invaluable as Ouachita works to achieve a stronger financial base.

Mr. B. Aldon Dixon was appointed Dean of Students, effective August 1, 1970. He was Director of Student-Related Development at Belmont College and received his education at Truett-McConnell College, Carson-Newman College, and George Peabody College. Mr. Dixon is popular with young people and has a contagious Christian faith.

Enrollment at Ouachita levelled off during the 1969-70 year after three successive years of decline from the 1966-67 record of students constituting the Post World War II "baby boom." The fall enrollment in 1969 was 1400 at the Arkadelphia campus and a total of 1489 including the Blytheville and Camden extensions. Summer school enrollment in 1970 was the highest in several years, 507 for the first term, including a record 133 graduate students. Ouachita's "non-duplicating enrollment" for the fall, spring, and summer terms on all campuses was 2005. The largest freshman class since the record year of 1966 enrolled at Ouachita in the fall of 1970, totaling 460. Over-all enrollment increased two per cent in spite of decreased enrollments at all of

Arkansas' state colleges.

Important Christian distinctives continued to characterize the educational experience for students at Ouachita: courses in Old and New Testament were requirements for graduation; chapel was required of all students; Dr. Wayne Ward gave the Ralph Smith Lectures on "Faith for the Space Age"; a team of Christian leaders from various vocations led in a campus-wide Christian Focus Week; noon-day services were held daily in Berry Chapel; and students were involved in local churches, various conferences, conventions, and mission projects, during both the academic year and the summer.

Ouachita continued to play a vital role in training young people for church-related vocations, and it is interesting to note that a recent study by the Baptist Sunday School Board reveals that four-fifths of the volunteers for church-related vocations are students at our Baptist Colleges. Ouachita had 110 ministerial students, 25 were preparing for religious education, 15 were preparing for the church music ministry, and 10 were home or foreign mission volunteers. Many more students were preparing for lay vocations with a strong sense of Christian stewardship of personal talents. Ouachita seeks to develop and nurture student respect for our great denominational distinctives and commitment to roles of service and leadership within the denomination.

Ouachita's accreditation was continued by the North Central Association following a January examination, the first in ten years. The examiners were complimentary of many things at Ouachita, including the dedication of the faculty to their job and to Ouachita as an institution, the ability and spirit of the student body, the relative absence of racial discrimination, and the quality of administrative leadership. It is important also to know of their criticisms: faculty salaries were too low three years ago, but no general raises have been made since then; there are too many one-man departments; the physical plant needs to be improved, especially for two or three departments; and sizeable operating deficits were experienced during the last two years. OBU faculty salaries during 1969-70 were the lowest of eleven Arkansas colleges reported in the national AAUP Bulletin, its rank having dropped considerably since the preceding year.

Ouachita's budget for the fiscal year 1969-70 was \$2,804,956. The Arkansas Baptist Convention in 1969 provided a very important \$456,420 of this total, including \$68,509 from the capital needs portion of the Convention's budget. If Arkansas Baptists had fully met the Convention budget, more than \$70,000 in additional capital needs funds would have gone to Ouachita. Cooperative Program funds to Ouachita in 1969 amounted to more than five times the \$83,500 income from Ouachita's two million dollar endowment.

The financial prospects for Ouachita are looking brighter, even though the financial crisis has not yet passed. Several requirements are involved in making genuine financial progress: steady improvement in Arkansas Baptist Cooperative Program support, a more realistic tuition rate closer in line with tuition charged by other private colleges in Arkansas, increased annual giving by alumni and friends, increased local church responsibility for scholarships to send their worthy but financially needy young people to Ouachita, more systematic development of other sources of funds consistent with the purposes of Christian higher education. No one of these will move Ouachita out of the woods, financially speaking, but a coordinated effort on all of them will make possible a new era of greatness for Christian education at Ouachita Baptist University.

A covenant of faith, prayer, work, and patience among Arkansas Baptists will bring unparalleled results for Christ on our campus.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST COLLEGE

Walnut Ridge, Arkansas

Southern Baptist College, "The Campus of Christian Purpose", experienced significant gains during the 1969-70 session. The enrollment for the year reached an all-time high of 1341 different students. Some 736 of these were on the Walnut Ridge campus, and 469 were at the Blytheville Air Force Base. The college also operated two small extension centers at Senath and Hayti, Missouri, with respective enrollments of 108 and 28 for the year.

During the year the financial problems incidental to rising inflation in the nation forced larger than normal expenditures in many areas. In addition to problems from this source, the Capital Needs allocation of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention to the college was more than \$23,000 short for the year. The previous two years also showed shortages of approximately \$15,000. The cumulative shortages now exceed \$38,000. This poses problems not only for Southern Baptist College, but also for other Arkansas Baptist institutions and causes dear to all of our hearts. The administration of the college humbly implores our Baptist Church leadership to again re-emphasize the Co-operative Program, the lifeline of all Baptist work.

The college budget for the coming year exceeds \$1,111,000. This indicates a continuing rise in the cost of quality education, which is in keeping with the trends over the nation. Southern Baptist College is one of the few private colleges in America which has been operating regularly "in the black". This has been done by the most possible frugal use of money. The North Central Association examiners recently complimented the college highly on this accomplishment. The college is trying to keep faith with Arkansas Baptists by seeing that every dollar is wisely spent. Regular audits are provided the Executive Secretary of the convention.

Students and faculty service to the church life of the area continues as a major interest of the college. During the year some seventy five to eighty ministers went out each Sunday and, also many other times, in a preaching ministry to the area. Many served churches as pastors, and others acted as supply ministers or interim pastors. More than a dozen student groups were forned to conduct week-end revivals and special services. All in all thousands of sernons and messages were delivered, and hundreds were won to the Lord and His churches through this ministry rendered by the personnel of the college.

Student life, though somewhat disturbed by the tragic national scene in student affairs, also witnessed some very high hours and wonderful Christian experiences. A large number of students were won to Christ, and many made commitments of their lives to Christian service. On the other hand, we regret that some had to be suspended because they did not comply with the Christian policies of the institution.

The faculty has been engaged in an intensive study of the Christian mission of the college and is searching for better methods of producing Christian behavioural objectives in the students who attend. During the

coming session, this study will be completed and methods developed for implementing the results. The college leadership feels that there is a growing need for a deepening of spiritual emphasis simultaneously with greater effort made toward better ways of communicating this objective to the students. With the growing number of moral problems arising in the giant secular colleges and universities of the entire world in mind, it is our thinking that Southern Baptist College should give even stronger than usual consideration to her Christian mission.

The college continues to enjoy wide recognition as one of the leading two-year colleges of this part of the nation. Leadership of the faculty and administration continues to participate in state and national higher education activities. The American Association of Junior Colleges and the U.S. Office of Education chose Southern again to participate in a special nationwide program for developing colleges. This is the third year she has been a part of this very significant consortium of the more promising two-year colleges.

Southern is grateful for the support received from Baptist people through the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. During the last year, approximately \$55,000 came from that source. From Arkansas business and industry came another \$25,000. Friends of the college also made contributions during the year. All of these funds help provide a very vital ministry to Baptist life in the context of private, church-related college training. Preservation of this service to our people and the world is essential to the continued freedom of the world. The Christian college is the most vital institution in the hands of the church by which it serves the modern world. There is nothing like it and no substitute for it. If the Christian college dies first, then the church will die next.

BAPTIST MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Memphis, Tennessee

The year 1969 witnessed a great deal of progress and activity at Baptist Memorial Hospital. The expansion of the diagnostic section of the X-ray Department was completed adding 12 X-ray rooms to the facility. The cashiers' area was expanded so that the length of time required to check out of the hospital might be decreased. A new 350-seat cafeteria serving hospital employees, medical staff and the public was finished. A new 23-bed Intensive Care Unit with an adjacent waiting room and prayer room was developed, and the 16th and 17th patient floors of the Union East Unit were completed adding 102 beds to the hospital's capacity.

To provide for more rapid delivery of emergency patients a heliport was constructed just across the street from the Emergency Room on the lawn in front of the new Union East Unit.

The program of progressive patient care was further developed by the addition of a minimal care unit. The staffing on this unit is geared to the less acute needs of the patients eligible for admission to this area and the routine service rates on the unit are considerably less than those on general patient floors, reflecting this economy in staffing.

A 25-bed rehabilitation unit for patients with spinal cord injuries was established at the Lamar Unit. This is the only unit of this type in the

Mid-South and one that has been desperately needed.

To better serve the patients, the position of liaison nurse was established. This individual works with patients being discharged who might benefit from the services of one or more of the various community health and welfare agencies.

The School of Nursing graduating class numbered 39 with 25 of these new graduates remaining to work at Baptist Memorial Hospital. Dr. W. Douglas Hudgins, Executive Secretary of the Mississippi Baptist Convention, was the commencement speaker. There were 107 students in the September freshman class, the largest class since 1960.

An affiliation with the Baptist Memorial Hospital School for Medical Record Librarians was developed with Southwest Baptist College in Bolivar, Missouri and Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama.

During 1969 Baptist Memorial Hospital moved from the fifth to the third largest of all hospitals in the country in terms of admissions. The School of Nursing glee club was honored by being asked to sing at the American Hospital Association Convention in Chicago. This was the first time a school of nursing glee club had ever been asked to appear at an AHA Convention.

The hospital received the Baptist Public Relations Association's first place award in the special projects category for the program developed commemorating the completion of the Union East Unit.

Hospital employees responded to the Shelby United Neighbors Campaign by increasing their contribution over 1968 by 33 percent.

Mrs. Shirley Evans was appointed director of student nurse activities. Mrs. Evans was a former hospital hostess. Prior to coming to Baptist Memorial Hospital she graduated from Blue Mountain College and was director of music and education at the First Baptist Church in Holly Springs, Mississippi.

Two new administrative assistants were appointed to the administrative staff. Mr. David Coombes received his master's degree in hospital administration from the University of Minnesota and Mr. Harry Nurkin is a graduate of Duke University's graduate program in hospital administration.

Dr. Frank S. Groner, administrator, received an honorary doctor's degree from his alma mater, Baylor University.

The Reverend Dan McEver was named assistant chaplain effective June 8, 1969. Reverend McEver received a master of divinity degree from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky and is a graduate of Baylor University.

Mr. Hays E. Owen, Jr., president of the board of trustees, was appointed to the American Hospital Association's Committee on Governing Boards. This committee is composed of a select group of trustees from throughout the country. (Since the development of this report the hospital was saddened by the news of the sudden death of Mr. Hays Owen, Jr., on June 26, 1970. He was 47 years old).

During the year the hospital received full three-year accreditation from the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. Service awards were presented to 149 employees who had anniversaries of 10 years or longer. In December of 1969 a special issue of the hospital publication, the "Baptiscope", was developed for the ministers of Tennessee, Mississippi, and Arkansas. It was designed to inform the religious community of the religious activities of Baptist Memorial Hospital and the policies and programs of special interest to the clergy.

Special attention is focused on the Marion County Drys who, aided financially by other county units coordinated by the Christian Civic Foundation, have entered suit to test the constitutionality of Act 132 (the mixed-drink law) before the Arkansas Supreme Court.

The Special Session of the Arkansas General Assembly, March 2-7, 1970, was the only legislative activity during the year with potential involvement of items of special concern to the Foundation constituency. We were represented on the scene each day of the session by the Executive Director and members of the Executive Committee and of the Board. As is well known, taxes and general finances occupied the major interests of the legislators and these matters were handled with dispatch.

It is believed that the 1971 Regular Session will be the most important in many years, and every effort should be made to have special representation from the Foundation each day of the session. Looking toward this need, the Executive Committee in its meeting on September 9, 1970, voted unanimously to employ a Legislative Information Assistant as in previous sessions, provided funds could be found. It was noted that the Marion County Drys have designated \$500 of their funds toward that end.

The Committee requested the Executive Director to send a letter to the Board members in the seventy-five counties asking that county units be re-activated to raise additional funds for the Marion County court test of Act 132, and extending the effort in support of measures in the 1971 General Assembly to repeal or modify the Act in the interest of dry counties. Several legislators have expressed the intention to introduce such proposals.

Local Option elections are being held during 1970 in Baxter County with action initiated by the wets to repeal the dry status of the county, and in Stone County with action instigated by the drys to change the legally wet status of the county to the dry category.

The program on Alcohol-Narcotics Education in the public schools of the state conducted by our Educational Assistant, Paul R. Ramsey, continues with high acclaim by school people. During the 1969-70 school year, we were in ninety-four schools, reaching approximately 40,000 students, and for the school year 1970-71, sixty-two schools have already been scheduled, with the prospect of reaching this year more schools and pupils than for any previous year.

So far as is known, the Christian Civic Foundation is the only organization offering the schools an all-day classroom presentation. This has proved to be the most effective and preferred approach, as evidenced by the fact that sixty percent of the work during the past school year was of this type, and the present schedule indicates the percentage will increase this year.

Radio Station KARK has made several radio spots on alcohol and drug abuse featuring our Educational Assistant, which they are broadcasting all over the state through the Arkansas Radio Network.

Work continues in the wide dissemination of alcohol-narcotics education films and literature to schools, churches and other groups, as well as to individuals. Through the generosity of the Pulaski League for True Progress, sufficient funds as surplus from the effort to defeat mixed drinks in Pulaski County were turned over to the Foundation to purchase a new copy of the popular film, "Verdict At 1:32", replacing the worn out copy.

Most active and retired members of the Southern Baptist Protection Program have received increased benefits from the "good experience credit" for the first time during 1970.

"Good experience credit" and the thirteenth check are methods of sharing equitably excess interest earnings and actuarial gains with both active and retired lives. Annual experience is the basis for these credits.

A total of 6,558 retired persons, church staff members and denominational employes, have received monthly retirement benefits amounting to more than \$4.4 million during 1970, which included the amount given for "good experience credit." Southern Baptists used the facilities of the Annuity Board to distribute \$70,546 to 440 relief recipients through funds of the Cooperative Program.

More than \$69.1 million in retirement benefits have been paid by the Annuity Board in its 52 year history; approximately \$8.9 million in relief grants also have been channeled through the Board by Southern Baptists.

Marked increases have also been noted in the Annuity Board life and health insurance services during the first half of this year. The new Group Insurance Program, initiated in late 1969, and the Board's older Life Benefit Plan, now provide life insurance coverage for more than 23,000 persons. The total volume of life insurance in force now exceeds \$342 million.

During 1970, life insurance claims have amounted to \$583,210, while more than \$2.2 million have been paid for health insurance claims. More than 16,000 persons are currently participating in the Annuity Board health insurance programs.

Arkansas State Convention Report - January - June, 1970

The total number of churches is 518 currently participating in the Southern Baptist Protection Program. In this state convention, the number of new members enrolled in Plan A is 15. There are 3 state Baptist agencies in the Program which include:

On May 1, 1970, Southern Baptist missionaries were under appointment to 71 geographical or political entities.* In 1969 three new fields were added: Dahomey, Leeward Islands, and Senegal. Missionaries assigned to Dahomey were in language school in France on May 1, 1970.

*Angola, Argentina, Austria, Bahamas, Belgium, Bermuda, Botswana, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dahomey, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Egypt (U.A.R.), Ethiopia, France, French West Indies, Gaza, Germany, Ghana, Guam, Guatemala, Guyana, Honduras, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Iran, Israel, Italy, Ivory Coast, Jamaica, Japan, Jordan, Kenya, Korea, Lebanon, Leeward Islands, Liberia, Libya, Macao, Malawi, Malaysia, Mexico, Morocco, Nigeria, Okinawa, Pakistan, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Portugal, Rhodesia, Senegal, Singapore, South West Africa, Spain, Switzerland (Baptist Center), Taiwan, Tanzania, Thailand, Togo, Trinidad, Turkey, Uganda, Uruguay, Venezuela, Vietnam, Yemen, and Zambia. (Work in Libya and Turkey is with an English-language Baptist church in each country.)

Missionary Support

At the close of 1969 the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,490. This included 153 missionary associates, 4 special project nurses, and 128 missionary journeymen. Appointments during the year totaled 261 (139 career, 49 associates, 62 journeymen, 1 special project nurse, and 10 career reappointments). Between January and May, 1970, 18 more were added.

The year set a new record for missionary appointments. Yet, even with the added personnel, several hundred calls for new missionaries needed on the fields are still unanswered.

Evangelism and Church Development

Underlying all our missionary endeavors is the ultimate purpose of leading people to new life in Jesus Christ and the cultivation of New Testament churches. At the end of 1969, reports from the Missions (organizations of Southern Baptist missionaries) totaled 5,303 churches (3,821 self-supporting), 7,375 mission points, and 4,574 national pastors. Also reported were 54,994 baptisms and 631,259 church members. Mainland China, closed to missionaries since 1951, was last estimated as having 392 churches, with 123,000 members, related to Southern Baptist mission work.

A major focus of attention during the year was the completion of the Crusade of the Americas. Plans were continued for international campaigns on a large scale in 1970 in Europe, Africa, and Asia.

A radio and television workshop in Kenya brought together representatives from 12 countries. A conference on mass communications, held in the Phillippines, had representatives from 7 Asian nations.

Schools and Student Work

The 758 schools (in 43 countries) with which our missionaries are related enrolled 93,005 students and were staffed by 3,150 national and 460 missionary teachers and administrators. Among the schools were 60 theological institutions with 2,562 students, and 5 women's training schools with 597 enrolled.

During 1969 the Bible school at Mbale, Uganda, graduated its first students, and Portuguese Baptists opened a seminary in Lisbon. In Lusaka, Zambia, a student center building was completed.

Publication Work

Rising literacy rates give book stores and reading rooms unprecedented opportunity to confront multitudes with the Christian message. Therefore, literature in the language of the people becomes increasingly important.

Twenty-seven publication centers overseas and at El Paso, Texas, produced over 29 million pieces: tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, hymnbooks. Staffing these centers were 83 missionaries and 591 national workers.

Missionaries in the Ivory Coast and Togo are cooperating in an effort to produce Baptist literature for the French-speaking countries of West Africa. In Seoul, Korea, a new Baptist Center — which includes a book store — was dedicated during the year. By the end of 1970, the Baptist Press in Hong Kong plans to complete the production of a new hymnal for use by Chinese Baptists throughout Asia.

The Commission, foreign missions journal of the Board, reported an average monthly circulation of 79,698 in 1969.

Hospitals and Medical Care

Medical institutions in which Southern Baptist missionaries serve included 21 hospitals and 92 clinics and dispensaries, with a total of 1,538 beds. In 1969, 194 national and 47 missionary physicians labored with 387 national and 77 missionary nurses. They treated 64,508 inpatients and cared for 815,512 outpatients. Engaged additionally in the medical ministry were 1,575 nationals and 38 missionaries.

A mobile medical unit began operation in Honduras in 1969, and the nursing school of the Japan Baptist Hospital graduated its first students. Preparation was under way for a 75-bed hospital in Bangalore, India, and progress was made toward the construction of a new ward at the hospital in Sanyati, Rhodesia.

Benevolent Ministries

During 1969 the Foreign Mission Board provided emergency funds for the relief of human distress in Nigeria and Vietnam and in Chile where a severe drought brought much suffering. Two welfare and health centers were opened in East Pakistan. Missionaries in Vietnam formulated a long-range program of benevolent ministries — to include health centers, day care centers, and family counseling, as well as to continue to assist in meeting

emergency needs as they arise.

Forty-six good will and community centers were in operation in 1969, reaching people in varied ways: literacy classes, home-making courses, Bible study clubs, and evangelistic services. Staffed by 42 missionaries and 138 nationals, these centers extended their ministry to 457,615 children and adults. Two missionaries assisted national workers in caring for 838 boys and girls in 19 children's homes.

Contributions

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$31,005,797 as 1969 closed (a per capita gift of \$2.70). The 1969 Lottie Moon Christmas offering had reached a total of \$15,297,558 by May 1, 1970.

Always there are financial needs above the resources which Southern Baptists make available to foreign missions. Several million dollars worth of land, buildings, and equipment continue to be needed urgently on overseas fields.

HOME MISSION BOARD

Southern Baptist Convention Atlanta, Georgia

The Home Mission Board is observing its 125th anniversary year with gratitude to God for his favor and appreciation to Southern Baptists for their support during the past century and a quarter.

Though society has changed drastically and the contemporary scene is often disturbing, the Board's basic task remains unchanged — Our Land for Christ.

The Gospel To All People

CRUSADE OF THE AMERICAS. — Rallies were conducted in thirty-seven major metropolitan areas in cooperation with the Sunday School Board. Three-hundred-thousand church leaders were reached. Three films for color evangelistic telecasts were produced with assistance of the Radio and Television Commission.

LAY WITNESSING. – The Association Witness Training Institute was held in 535 associations involving six thousand churches.

BAPTISMS. — Southern Baptist churches reported 368,225 baptisms for 1969. Out of this number 69,359 were reported through the Home Mission Board as follows:

Establishment of New Churches and Missions

NEW CHURCHES AND MISSIONS. — In spite of the lack of adequate funds, there were 370 new missions and 97 new churches reported for 1969.

 ${\tt PASTORAL}$ ${\tt SUPPORT.}$ — Four hundred and twenty-eight received church pastoral aid.

CHURCH LOANS. — During 1969, 142 loans were granted for \$3,816.,303. An additional eighty-five loans were executed for \$4,550,900. The total churches served were 227 with \$8,367,203 total loans.

Missionaries

APPOINTED MISSIONARIES. — The Home Mission Board appointed 585 new missioionaries, bringing the total number of missionaries to 2,235.

OTHER MISSIONARIES. — Student Summer Personnel, 922; Christian Service Corps, 74 short-term and 40 long-term; 31 youth groups with a total of 1,175 young people, 100 adults accompanied the young people.

MINISTERING TO ALL PEOPLE as in the New Testament, a ministry is provided for the total person.

NATIONAL CRISIS. — The Home Mission Board continued to work with other agencies to implement the crisis statement. Program leadership has been provided by the assignment of missionaries to fields with critical needs and also by encouraging the involvement of Southern Baptists in local efforts to meet such needs.

BAPTIST CENTERS. — Through materials and counseling two hundred churches have been helped to begin church community weekday programs. Laymen and laywomen have been used as volunteers in centers in order to provide opportunities for them to use their training, interests and talents.

LITERACY MISSIONS. — Volunteers were enlisted in three states to serve as literacy missions resource personnel to promote and train volunteers at the local level. The revised edition of the present Teacher's Guide for Literacy Missions has been completed and released.

MIGRANT MISSIONS. — The spiritual and other needs of migrants were ministered to by fourteen state conventions, twenty-six associations and ninety churches.

YOUTH AND FAMILY SERVICES. — Assistance was given in the establishing of fifty new volunteer ministries to youth and families. State mission directors and superintendents of missions aided in this expansion. It

is estimated that some type of youth and family service ministry is being conducted in 175 associations.

Associational Missions

GOOPERATIVE EFFORT. — The program of Associational Administrative Services worked with Rural-Urban, Metropolitan and Pioneer Missions Departments and state convention leadership in developing the administrative part of an associational missions program. The Superintendent of Missions for an Association, by E. C. Watson; The Work of the Baptist Association: an Integrative Study, by Lynn E. May; and The Associational Planning Guide, 1969-70 were published. Conferences and personal assistance in administrative procedures were provided to associational, state convention and Southern Baptist Convention program leaders.

Spreading the Word

PRINTED MATERIALS. — Over 160 pieces of printed materials were produced to give information to aid missions and evangelism leaders. These include a large map, special study map for March Week of Prayer, general tract, "Cooperative Program Travel Guide," updating "Home Missions Since 1845," three million church bulletin inserts for March Week of Prayer, Home Missions magazine and Home Mission Graded Series.

SCRIPTURE DISTRIBUTION. — Missionaries and mission leaders have been assisted in securing scriptures resulting in bringing a number to Christ and into his service. A list of scriptures has been updated for use with people served by the Home Mission Board. Many new uses for scriptures have been discovered. The large type New Testament has been provided for the aged, and six, seven and eight-year-olds whose readers in school have large type, people where there is limited light in the home, for study and those with limited eyesight.

BIBLE CORRESPONDENCE COURSE. — As of the end of the year there were 53,396 enrolled in the Correspondence Bible Course. Twenty students have received certificates for the completion of the course.

WORLD MISSIONS CONFERENCES. — One hundred and two World Missions Conferences were conducted with 116 associations participating. There was a total attendance of 619,472 with 1,863 churches participating. There were 241 volunteers for special service and 267 professions of faith. Home missions speakers attended 247 camps with 29,785 total attendance, 1,404 professions of faith and 1,136 young people committing their lives to church related vocations.

"Against a background of a divisive war, persistent racial conflict, student tensions, shifting moral values, a slowing church membership growth, and a shaky vitality within Christendom, the Home Mission Board sought a blending of faith-commitment to Christ and ministry to fellow-men. The Board's twelve programs enjoyed a healthy year, and registered some significant advances. The development and communication of a national mission strategy received special attention from all program leaders through conferences, seminars, colloquiums, special studies, in-service training efforts, pilot projects, and publication of papers, articles, books, and release of other materials."

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD of the Southern Baptist Convention

Since 1891 the Sunday School Board has sought to aid churches in winning people to Christ and educating them in the faith. This continued to be the emphasis through the 25 programs of work assigned to the board by the Southern Baptist Convention.

The board stands ready to answer the call to individual and collective needs whether by service through Baptist Book Stores, through Sunday School quarterlies for Junior boys all over the country, through direct consultant service to the local church, or through its hundreds of other ministries.

Consultants and editors strive daily to supply requested study materials and planning services through education and service programs. Assistance is available to churches and individuals in the areas of literature, books, music, supplies, films, Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, Bible study, Training Union, church music, church administration, audiovisual education, student work, family ministry, vocational guidance, Bible and tract distribution, church architecture, church library and church recreation.

Glorieta (N.M.) and Ridgecrest (N.C.) Baptist Assemblies, operated by the board, are used each summer for conferences, youth activities, mission studies and leadership training sessions. Both assemblies are available during winter months for church and campus groups. Additionally, at the Sunday School Board and in local churches, seminars, conferences and clinics are held throughout the year for many church program areas. Through every means Southern Baptist churches are seeking more efficient, effective means to spread the gospel and to glorify God. It is the goal of Sunday School Board personnel to work jointly with the churches as servants of God.

The board makes every effort to support the work of Southern Baptist Conventions, associations, congregations and individuals through its actions.

In August, the elected Sunday School Board fulfilled requests of the Southern Baptist Convention which met in June to withdraw Volume 1 of "The Broadman Bible Commentary" and named a committee to consider possibilities for rewriting the book. It also withdrew two publications which did not meet the editorial standards of the board.

The board staff was instructed to edit all materials carefully to make them consistent with the 1963 statement of "The Baptist Faith and Message," and with generally accepted views of Southern Baptists; and when other views should be included, that they be clearly indicated and distinguished.

The staff further was instructed to continue preparation of a manual of doctrinal guidelines for editors and writers; instructed the administration to study possible revisions of the "Church Covenant" as it appears in the "Baptist Hymnal"; and took note of the reassignment of the program of student work to the board.

The board anticipates increased success through Christian education in light of the response to new 70's programs and materials. New Vacation Bible

School materials gained wide acceptance during the summer of 1970. Thousands of children and youth participated in local church and mission schools.

The new study course program has also met with favorable acceptance with new titles and methods of credit for church members. The new Sunday School and church training programs offer increased means of reaching the world for Christ. New magazines in special fields such as preaching, deacon ministries, and many other areas promise to aid Southern Baptists in discipleship and penetration during the 70's.

CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION of the Southern Baptist Convention Nashville, Tennessee

In the decade of the 1960s the Christian Life Commission's emphasis on applied Christianity may be said to have come of age with Southern Baptists. Throughout Southern Baptist churches, associations, state conventions, institutions, and various agencies there has been a strong upsurge of involvement in matters related to Christian social ethics.

During the past year, materials on applied Christianity were channeled by the Commission through various state Baptist papers, Southern Baptist Convention agency publications, and other mass media outlets in total quantities of tens of millions. The Commission's literature program was expanded by the addition of ten new titles in the "Issues and Answers" series on the subjects of abortion; black power; civil disobedience; drugs; extremism; guaranteed income; totalitarianism; urban crisis; violence; and law, order and justice. Ten additional "Issues and Answers" pamphlets have now been produced on aging, capital punishment, consumer credit, generation gap, open housing, pollution, population explosion, revolution, sex education, and taxation. The Commission now has some 70 tracts in print and available for helping churches emphasize the practical dimensions of the Christian faith.

The Commission's recent conferences on extremism, authentic Christian morality, drugs, and Christianity and sexuality have been well attended by a representative cross-section of Southern Baptist leaders and have been widely influential. The 1971 national conference topic is "Southern Baptists and National Priorities." The churches and Convention agencies are continuing to make wide use of the tapes, printed proceedings, and other materials produced by these conferences.

Special attention has been paid to the problem of pornography. In New Orleans the Convention instructed the Commission "to unite, organize, and mobilize to correct and overcome the abuses of pornography now being perpetrated against the citizenry, young and old, in our nation." In response the Commission has developed a theological critique as a formal testimony before the President's Commission on Obscenity and Pornography, has released to all the state Baptist papers three articles on pornography entitled "Questions and Answers About Pornography," "Telling It Like It Is About Pornography," and "What Can Christians Do About Pornography?" and has prepared an action guide for churches concerned about helping to solve this problem.

To be true to God's high calling in Christ Jesus, Christians today must be both the converted, gathered church and the reconciling, dispersed church, going into the community to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world. To the end that this calling in all its power and significance may be faithfully realized, the Christian Life Commission is dedicated to the task of emphasizing applied Christianity. A Christian Life Committee Guidebook is available free of charge for those individuals, churches, and associations seeking specific suggestions as to how to plan and work in the area of Christian social concerns. The Commission's objective is to help develop the kind of Christian morality, private and public, which will substantially undergird our total Southern Baptist witness for Jesus Christ.

EDUCATION COMMISSION of the Southern Bantist Convention

Southern Baptist Convention Nashville, Tennessee

Southern Baptist colleges and schools are stronger than at any time in the history of the Convention. The plants are in better condition, the enrollment is at its highest peak, there are more teachers on the faculties with the doctorate, and every aspect of operation is good except for the financial squeeze which has come about through increasing costs and inflation. Tuition charges have been raised to a point where further increases will prohibit many fine Baptist students from enrolling. Rising tuition charges in state colleges have helped somewhat in keeping a balance in costs at the public and private schools.

Baptists are more conscious than ever before of the need for strong colleges and the needs of these colleges. Kentucky and North Carolina during 1969 held a series of meetings on the campuses of their 12 schools to discuss further some of the pressing problems brought to light by the Baptist Education Study Task. These states and probably others will hold similar meetings with church leaders annually. The best thinking and planning will be necessary if the schools are to keep pace with the fast-moving educational world.

Regional meetings of trustees are in the planning stages for the years ahead. Perhaps two regional meetings can be scheduled annually, in cooperation with the trustees of other Baptist institutions. Dedicated and knowledgeable trustees can do more for the strengthening of the institutions than anyone else.

The Commission is promoting the seventeenth annual emphasis in the churches on Christian education and Baptist schools which began on the third Sunday in February, 1970. Some churches will observe the emphasis as late as the summer. The emphasis grows in importance as more Baptist students become available to fill the Baptist schools. All church librarians were requested to set up exhibits of materials from nearby Baptist colleges and schools in February. Hundreds of librarians responded and the schools received a viewing which they have not enjoyed to the same extent before. Plans are underway for a revised issued of the Southern Baptist Campus Directory for early in 1971.

For the fifth year the Commission has been one of a dozen denominations sponsoring the Cooperative College Registry. Over 10,000

teachers who were interested in teaching in a church-related college registered in 1969 and as many or more are expected to do so in 1970. The Registry has enabled the Commission to assist colleges in finding suitable faculty. More well prepared teachers are available now, but finding the best ones is a continuing work.

One of the most rewarding programs of the Commission is the loans made available to graduate students working toward the doctorate, and the scholarships made possible through the income from the Opdyke Fund. There were 246 Opdyke scholarships in 1969. The Robertson-Sheppard and the J. W. Farmer Loan Funds provided for 52 loans in 1969.

In 1969 the Commission distributed 1,050,726 pieces of literature to individuals and churches, in addition to a heavy correspondence about colleges, jobs, and careers. Many news releases to the Baptist state papers were well received.

Institutional Changes. — Changes in the presidencies for the year were: Loyed R. Simmons resigned as president of California Baptist College; J. K. Powell retired as president of Campbellsville College and was succeeded by William R. Davenport; Kenneth A. Maroney who had been acting president of the University of Corpus Christi since January, 1969, assumed the presidency; James H. Edmondson resigned as president of Judson College in July and Fleetwood Carnley is acting president; Ralph A. Phelps, Jr. resigned as president of Quachita Baptist University and was succeeded by Daniel R. Grant; Paul F. Geren, president of Stetson University was killed in an automobile accident in June and John E. Johns is serving as acting president; Carey T. Vinzant retired as president of Tift College and Robert W. Jackson assumed the presidency; B. G. Olson, acting president of William Jewell College resigned in September and was succeeded by E. W. Holzapfel as acting president; L. A. Foster, president of Missouri Baptist College – Hannibal-LaGrange-St. Louis Campuses – has announced his retirement effective June 30; Thomas L. Neely has resigned at North Greenville Junior College effective June 30; H. Leo Eddleman resigned the presidency at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and James D. Mosteller is acting president; Joseph H. Cosby, president, Hargrave Military Academy has announced his retirement as of July 1 and will be followed by Vernon T. Lankford.

Enrollment and Support. — Baptist schools received for the year for operations and capital needs \$25,118,135, or a gain of \$5,109,362. Of this amount \$21,169,007 was for operations and \$3,949,128 for capital needs.

The schools received \$65,110,862 from donations, gifts, and grants. This is a new high for the schools. The total assets of the schools is \$710,508,036. Of this amount \$199,673,627 was for endowment.

The total enrollment for the Baptist schools for the year was 110,143. The American Seminary Extension Centers have always been included in the total enrollment figure. For the first time, in the fall of 1969 and also for the school year 1969-70, the enrollment of Seminary Extension Department of the Southern Baptist Convention seminaries has been included. The schools graduated 15,228 for the same period. The volumes in the libraries now total 4,970,394.

Church-Related Vocations. — Baptist schools show a gain in the number of church-related vocation volunteers for the year 1969-70. The number increased from 14,028 to 14,540 or an overall gain of 512. Senior colleges

would appear to have larger gains than the junior colleges but two colleges went from junior college status to senior college in the year. For the last several years there has been a gradual increase of church-related interests.

The specific figures for last year and this year follow for comparison:

PROGRAM REPORT

The Program of Christian Education Leadership and Promotion

This program of the work of the Education Commission includes more of the areas of the Commission's work than any of its other programs. Included under this program are the production and distribution of articles and publicity releases going to various Baptist publications, the furnishing of statistical and general information about the schools, promotion of annual meetings, correspondence with parents and students about college planning and career choices, attending denominational and educational meetings, committee work, assistance to graduate students, and the administration of loans and scholarships to about 300 students annually. The Commission sends weekly to Baptist state papers a column of educational news entitled "Education — What's Happening." The Commission has been asked to serve as liaison for the study abroad program now offered as a cooperative effort to assist students in earning acceptable credits for summer study and the junior year abroad. By cooperating the Baptist colleges can build worthwhile programs for which credit can be given and considerable savings in travel costs effected.

The Program of College and School Studies and Surveys

A healthy sign in recent years is the continuing study of Baptist colleges and schools in an effort to determine future directions. In some cases one

study committee is hardly dismissed before another one is appointed to pursue some slightly different aspects of current problems. Each state has its standard and peculiar problems to deal with. The Commission's staff supplies information and counsel to working groups. A number of graduate students have requested assistance in deciding on suitable study subjects having to do with the schools and in gathering the information needed. The staff is sometimes able to assist with the paper work and mailing of questionnaires. Contact with graduate schools and students enables the Commission to have available the results of research which its own limited staff would not be able to accomplish.

The Program of Teacher Recruitment and Placement

Baptist presidents have expressed their appreciation for the assistance the Commission's placement service has been able to give them. The shortage of teachers has been critical for several years but now in most areas there are more people available. However, recruiting is still most essential in order for the schools to locate the kind of teachers they want and need. Many good teachers are not interested in teaching in a church-related school and some who are qualified as to subject matter are unsuited for other reasons. Finding the right person is a continuing job. For five years the Commission has participated in the Cooperative College Registry with a dozen other denominations. With some 10,000 registrants annually who state they are interested in teaching in a church-related school, the administrators have a wider range for their selections. The Registry has moved from Philadelphia to Washington and now duplicates its file annually in order to have the prospects available to the United Board for College Development in Atlanta, which has as its main function the upgrading of the predominantly Negro colleges, 15 of them Baptist schools.

The Commission now has available about \$20,000 a year to lend to graduate students who are working toward their doctorates. Priority is given those who are already teaching in Baptist schools. These loans may be repaid through service in Baptist institutions.

The Program of Assistance in College Recruitment

In 1970 the Commission is sponsoring its seventeenth annual emphasis in the churches on Christian education and Baptist schools. The third Sunday in February has been designated on the denomination's calendar as Baptist Colleges, Seminaries, and Schools Day, which signals the start in the churches of an emphasis, variously observed, calling attention to Baptist institutions and encouraging Baptist students to consider them. This year hundreds of church librarians are setting up exhibits of materials which they have secured from the nearby schools, giving a broad viewing of the schools to interested young people. Some churches do not observe the emphasis until the summer months. With about half of all high school graduates now attending college, the opportunities which churches have to assist their young people is increasing. They need help in choosing colleges, careers, and in general planning before college. The church is obligated to do all possible to see that its young people get the best guidance. The Commission prepares suitable materials and suggested programs each year to help the churches in this important work. College and Career is published ten times a year and contains helpful articles on college planning and career choices. Some churches send either individual subscriptions to their young people or order bulk shipments for distribution. Helpful materials are furnished every year at Ridgecrest and Glorieta for distribution.

THE RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION of the Southern Baptist Convention

Few Southern Baptists realize the full scope of the work they are doing through their Radio and Television Commission. Do they, for instance, know that from 1960-69 the Commission received through the Cooperative Program a total of \$7,419,000 for operating purposes? Or, that in return, their Radio and Television Commission obtained a total of more than \$37,000,000 in free time from the radio and television industries?

Do they know that the total weekly programming level, foreign and domestic, during 1960-69, rose from five programs and 844 broadcasts in 1960 to 44 programs and 2,783 broadcasts at the end of 1969? Or that Southern Baptists carry on a massive ministry through the Armed Forces Radio and Television Network to our men and women in the military all over the world? Do they know that Southern Baptists, through this Commission, have the largest electronic ministry of any religious group in the world?

These and many more distinctives set this ministry apart as one of the most vigorous and productive of all the programs in which our denomination is engaged.

The Radio and Television Commission reached deeper into the potential audience for its programming in 1969, and took hold of a larger segment than ever before. With the origination of new radio and television programs, it was possible to initiate a broadcast somewhere in the world on the average of every three minutes, for a total of 152,022 separate broadcasts.

Commission productions increased from 32 to 44 during the year and the total number of programs aired weekly reached 2,783, an all-time high.

Powerline, the "top 40" radio program for teenagers, is currently on 356 stations; and Country Crossroads, featuring a magazine format, and based on "country and western" music and its well-known performers, is on 193 stations. These two accounted for a majority of the year's new stations.

The Centurymen is a newly organized 100-voice male singing group composed of ministers of music from Southern Baptist churches. Devoted to providing music for the Commission's broadcast programming and to representing the denomination internationally, the choir made its premier performance on the National Broadcasting Company television network on December 28, 1969, and in person at the Southern Baptist Convention in Denver, June 3, 1970.

Ten hours of broadcast time was given by the networks at an average value of \$70,000 per hour in 1969. The total number of programs produced by the Commission for the radio networks (ABC, NBC, and CBS) during the year came to 62, and the time to fifteen and one-half hours.

Southern Baptists have a massive ministry to all the children of the world in JOT, the animated children's program for television. The number of stations carrying this program will rise from 40 to 100 during 1970. The JOT films are also available for church use through the Film Centers of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

Next year will bring changes in **The Answer** series, with the name and style phased out, to make way for a shift from drama to live and film documentaries in a series called **The Human Dimension**. To date, eight of the programs for this series have been produced.

Last year an advertising agency concept was begun by the Commission under the name of TimeRite, Inc., for the general benefit of the entire denomination. Three TimeRite representatives are now operating out of offices in Wilmington, North Carolina; Dallas, Texas; and Fresno, California, to service the radio and television needs of local churches, associations, state conventions, and other agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention.

J. P. Allen, former pastor of Broadway Baptist Church and president of the Commission's trustees, was appointed director of the Audience Response Division of the agency. This action reflected a new concentration by the Commission on the spiritual problems and Christian growth of those who respond by mail to its radio and television programs.

GOLDEN GATE BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Mill Valley, California

Harold K. Graves, President

In its 26th year, the Golden Gate Seminary had another Near record enrollment. It exceeded last year but was still a bit short of the record 1956-57 year. Three hundred and sixty-six people enrolled sometime during the session.

International students continue to seek admission to Golden Gate in increasing numbers. Their total reached 68 this year from 27 countries. In addition, 44 states and the District of Columbia were represented in the enrollment. Of added interest is the fact that only 43% of the seminary's students came from Southern Baptist Colleges.

Dr. Wayne Peterson taught his first year in the Old Testament field. During this year, Dean William A. Carleton has reached retirement age. He will be serving part-time as the Distinguished Professor of Church History. Professor J. Winston Pearce took early retirement and will spend next year at our International Seminary at Ruschlikon, Switzerland. Dr. J. C. Bradley resigned to accept a staff assignment at the Baptist Sunday School Board.

Dr. Elmer Gray returns to the Seminary this fall as Academic Dean succeeding Dean Carleton. Dr. Gray will also teach Religious Education as he did at Golden Gate for 8 years before moving to the Sunday School Board as manager of the Sunday School Department 3 years ago. Dr. Kenneth Eakins joins the faculty this fall teaching in the field of Old Testament and Archaeology. Holding degrees both in medicine and theology, he brings an unusual dimension to our fellowship. Dr. Gordon Green, a native of the west and holding two degrees from Golden Gate will teach Preaching this year. His training and pastoral experience in the West prepared him in a significant way for assisting students in communicating the gospel in this culture.

There were 73 to receive degrees or awards at the spring commencement. During the session it was decided to discontinue offering the M.C.M. and S.T.D. degrees beyond those presently so enrolled. Music courses will still be offered, however, making it possible for a student to develop proficiency in two fields.

The development of a program leading to a Professional Doctorate as a first theological degree moves ahead at Golden Gate and many other American Seminaries. Announcements covering this program for all Southern Baptist Seminaries may be expected within the year ahead.

Resources for the support of the theological education for Southern Baptists remain at a critical point. Every economy consistent with good educational procedures is being practiced.

We are grateful for the support of Golden Gate Seminary through your prayers and the Cooperative Program. There were 11 students from Arkansas at Golden Gate this year.

MIDWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY 5001 North Oak Street Trafficway Kansas City, Missouri

Recently a visiting student, a prospective student and a presently enrolled student were conversing in one of the corridors at Midwestern Seminary. The visiting student made the remark, "If a student cannot study in this atmosphere on this campus he could not study anywhere." A number of factors combine to produce this atmosphere that is so conducive for study at Midwestern.

The faculty, composed of 19 full-time and one part-time professors, is a major contributing factor in the developing of the intellectual and spiritual life of the student. Classes are small enough that the professor gets to know his students and becomes a friend as well as a teacher. A regular sabbatical leave program allows each professor an opportunity for enlarging his intellectual and spiritual capacity. This year Dr. Everett Reneer, Professor of the Psychology of Religion and Pastoral Care, is on sabbatical leave studying in a clinical setting in Houston, Texas. His required courses are being taught by Dr. Richard Dayringer, Director of the Department of Pastoral Care at the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Kansas City, Missouri. He is a graduate of Midwestern.

Each year Midwestern has a Visiting Professor of Missions in the person of a furloughing missionary. This year, Dr. Charles Lee Culpepper, Jr., Southern Baptist Missionary to Taiwan, is serving in this capacity.

An in-depth study is being made by the faculty as to our purpose and how well we are meeting that purpose. The study is proving to be very helpful as we take a critical look at ourselves and the job we are doing. With the cooperation of the Research Department of the Sunday School Board a questionnaire has been mailed to every graduate and former student. It is hoped that the information gained from this study and the questionnaire will provide material for improving the curriculum and methods of instruction.

Students along with faculty, administrators and their families combine to make up the larger "Seminary Family," a term that has come to have real meaning at Midwestern. These students are graduates of 72 colleges and come from 26 states and 4 foreign countries. These men and women serve now while studying. Each year approximately 70% of them find remunerative

part-time service in churches and missions in the area. Midwestern is very fortunate in being located on the edge of well established Southern Baptist work on two sides and on the edge of the great northern and western pioneer areas on the other sides. This presents an opportunity and a challenge for some students to work in established churches and also for others to work in establishing churches in the pioneer areas.

The Kansas City area also offers ample opportunity for secular employment. About 50% of the students are engaged in gainful employment. Most of the wives work to provide a combined salary for meeting living expenses.

Midwestern has a strong emphasis on scholarship, but has an equally strong missionary and evangelistic emphasis. The sun never sets on Midwestern's graduates. Approximately 10% are serving in Mission fields around the world in every area where Southern Baptists have mission work. Another 10% serve under the Home Mission Board and in the chaplaincy. These figures also hold for the present student body in which over 10% are preparing for foreign mission service, about 8% for the chaplaincy and approximately 5% for work under the Home Mission Board. Each year furloughing missionaries are on campus and enrolled in the classes. This year the Bill Bullingtons from Togo, West Africa, occupy the missionary apartment while he studies toward a graduate Master of Theology Degree. He is a graduate of Midwestern.

Special lectures and services add to this study atmosphere. In September we had a Week of Preaching. In February the Hester Lectureship on Preaching was held for a full week with Dr. Edmund Steimle, Professor of Homiletics at Union Theological Seminary in New York City and National Radio Pulpit Preacher, lecturing. In April special lectures were delivered by Professor G.W. Anderson of the Edinburgh University Faculty of Divinity. Four Missionary Days are held each school year.

The campus provides one other factor in the spiritual and study life of the students. The 200 acre campus with its attractive modern buildings is becoming a recognized landmark in the Greater Kansas City area. Located on an interstate highway and just ten minutes from the Municipal Airport and downtown area it is most accessible for students and visiting friends.

In the fall the food services were combined into one unit in the Student Center. The space formerly occupied by the cafeteria has been converted into five one-bedroom apartments. In midwinter 20 new two-bedroom apartments were finished and occupied.

Surely, when one considers all of these contributing factors, our visiting student was correct — "If a student cannot study in this atmosphere on this campus, he could not study anywhere."

NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY New Orleans, Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY IS NOW IN ITS SECOND HALF CENTURY: The first classroom work began in October, 1918, after the Southern Baptist Convention had voted the school into being in 1917. When the Seminary was founded, the city of New Orleans had six

Southern Baptist churches. Today the city has 70 churches, 9 missions, and 3 English speaking churches which have Spanish Speaking Departments and our Seminary students are working in these. More than 5,150 alumni now serve churches in 47 states and 50 nations. The Seminary is located on a 75-acre campus valued at more than \$7.4 million.

FORTY-TWO MEMBER FACULTY HAS 140 EARNED DEGREES: The faculty members of New Orleans Baptist Seminary during the past year listed 140 degrees including 98 doctoral or professional degrees. They attended 60 colleges and universities, 10 seminaries, 14 graduate schools and represent 15 states and four other countries.

THE ACADEMIC POSITION of the Seminary has been strengthened through recent faculty changes. Professor Harry J. Rowe, from Sydney, Australia, is making a significant contribution in the field of Pastoral Theology; Mr. Fisher Humphreys, an alumnus of NOBTS, is newly appointed as Assistant Professor of Theology. Mr. Randall Veazey's resignation from the faculty of the School of Church Music is a serious loss, but Mr. F. Eugene Brasher will be a competent addition on the faculty of that school, beginning in the fall semester. A recent program of significance is the inauguration of summer archaeological field expeditions to the Holy Land, under the direction of Dr. George L. Kelm, Assistant Professor of Biblical Introduction and Archaeology.

OUR PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATING COMMITTEE is seriously at work to secure a new President for the Seminary. Dr. James D. Mosteller, Dean of the School of Theology, is in the meantime serving as Acting President.

SEMINARY OFFERS EIGHT GRADUATE DEGREES: New Orleans Baptist Teological Seminary is accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools, by the National Association of Schools of Music, and in December, 1965, was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The eight degrees being offered by the Seminary's three schools are: School of Theology — the Master of Theology, the Master of Theology Honors Program, and the Doctor of Theology; School of Religious Education — the Master of Religious Education, the Specialist in Education, and the Doctor of Education; School of Church Music — the Master of Church Music, the Specialist in Education and the Doctor in Education.

ENROLLMENT REACHES 780: The total cumulative enrollment for 1969-70 has reached 780 separate persons who have enrolled during the year.

STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN MISSIONS AND SERVE CHURCHES: Each student completes two years of supervised mission work while attending the Seminary. Soon after enrolling, many students become pastors or members of staffs for churches in three states within commuting distance of the Seminary.

PRAYERS REQUESTED FOR SEMINARY NEEDS: Every Southern Baptist is asked to pray for a solution to the needs at the Seminary for more funds for faculty salaries and student aid. Also needed is additional money for the construction of a new library. We earnestly covet your prayers for the leadership of the Holy Spirit as the Presidential Nominating Committee continues in their search for a President for New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Louisville, Kentucky

CHALLENGE AND PROGRESS were the motif of the 1969-70 academic year at Southern Seminary. As the seminary crossed the threshold of the new decade, an almost new administrative team was at work, educational opportunities were multiplying, and the enrolment was expanding.

In the latter part of the 1968-69 school year, the wheels were set in motion for a major turnover among top administrative personnel. Hugh R. Peterson retired as Administrative Dean, and Penrose St. Amant decided to return to teaching full-time, and thus resigned as Dean of the School of Theology. Allen W. Graves, then Dean of the School of Religious Education, was shifted to Administrative Dean, and Ernest J. Loessner, a professor of religious education at the seminary, was chosen to succeed Graves. William E. Hull, a professor of New Testament interpretation, was chosen to succeed St. Amant.

Co-operation has become the key word of educational institutions as they try to meet the mammoth responsibilities demanded by fast-paced modern life. The seminary has had to adopt the idea, too.

During the 1968-69 school year Southern Seminary joined with six other higher education institutions in the Louisville area to form what is now known as the Kentuckiana Metroversity. The Metroversity is a co-operative effort by the seven member schools to broaden the variety and lower the cost of educational programs offered to students by co-ordinating each school's courses and facilities with all the others.

In the spring of 1970 the seminary joined with four other seminaries in developing an educational consortium known as the Theological Educational Association of Mid-America, called by its initials TEAM. The relationship, which has no legally binding structure, will provide each of the participating seminaries with inter-library circulation and research privileges for students and faculty. A special month-long session of student and faculty exchange already has been planned for the new consortium. It will be known as the "Interterm" and will take place next January.

Missions are receiving a stronger emphasis at the seminary. Hugo Culpepper, who served as director of the division of missions for the SBC Home Mission Board for the past five years, has been reappointed W. O. Carver Professor of Missions. G. Willis Bennett has been named to occupy the William Walker Brookes Chair of Church and Community, an endowed professorship held previously on a visiting basis in recent years by SBC Home Mission Board executives Arthur B. Rutledge and M. Wendell Belew.

To further provide top-quality education for future ministers of music, the seminary is constructing a new music building. The building will be fully equipped with organs, an electronic piano laboratory and audio equipment.

Because the seminary realizes the need for a minister to continually expand his educational background, two programs have been established. Through the "Updating Program" the alumni of the seminary are encouraged to "trade-in" their degrees for the newer ones by meeting the latest

requirements. More than 200 have already completed the updating program. The seminary also offers Continuing Theological Education Conferences to strengthen the education Southern Baptist pastors already have. Every March, October, and December the seminary opens its doors to the weekend conferences. At four other times during the year, the seminary sends its professors out to provide on-the-field conferences. Programs for the CTEC conferences cover all phases of theological training: biblical, historical-theological, and practical.

As the seminary enters its 112th year, it is striving harder than ever to serve all Southern Baptists regardless of their geographical location. The enrolment shows its eighth annual increase, and the distribution by states is one good indicator of this outreach. The following is a partial list of the students by states:

SOUTHEASTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Wake Forest, North Carolina

The Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is a school of theology established and operated under the authority of the Southern Baptist Convention for the education of Christian ministers. It provides courses of study leading to the Master of Divinity degree, the Master of Religious Education degree, the Master of Theology degree, and the Certificate in Theology. The faculty is considering the desirability of a program of study leading to a doctorate.

In this seminary priority is given to the education of students for pastoral, educational, and missionary ministries. This is in harmony with the needs of the churches and the purpose of the school.

At the beginning of the 1969 fall semester 570 students were enrolled. Of this number 455 are candidates for the Master of Divinity degree, 47 for the Master of Theology degree, 13 for the Master of Religious Education degree, and 55 for the Certificate in Theology.

Dr. James R. Moseley began his work as Seminary Physician on October 1, 1969. The Board of Trustees granted sabbatical leave for the 1970-71 academic year to Dr. Thomas A. Bland and Dr. John E. Steely. They approved also Dr. John T. Wayland's request for sabbatical leave for the 1971 spring semester.

On May 29, 1970 degrees and certificates were conferred upon 139

members of the graduating class. The quality of life in this school is manifested in the 2,343 graduates who have completed courses of study for a degree or a certificate in theology and have taken their places in the life and work of the churches throughout the Southern Baptist Convention and in other lands.

SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Fort Worth, Texas

Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, reported new accreditation advancement, increased enrollment, continued curriculum revisions and growth in physical facilities according to the Annual Report for 1969-1970.

Three self-study programs came to a climax during the year. After a ten year re-inspection, the American Association of Theological Schools took unanimous action to continue the accreditation of Southwestern Seminary. A similar accreditation study made by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools resulted in an extension of accreditation by that organization at its annual meeting in December. The third study was conducted by the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee.

The 2,096 enrollment for 1969-70 is the largest since 1962-63 and an increase of 60 over the 1968-69 year. Of this number, 1,314 were in the School of Theology, 570 in the School of Religious Education, and 212 in the School of Church Music. There were 1,823 men and 273 women.

Students represented 284 colleges and universities and 30 seminaries. The students came from 44 states and 21 countries.

Four new faculty members were added: Gerald Marsh, pastoral ministries; Jack Terry, principles and philosophy of religious education; Jay N. Heflin, Old Testament; and David Maness, music theory.

Several continuing education conferences were conducted during the year including an annual pastors' conference, world missions conference, a conference on curriculum analysis, church architecture, arts and crafts, a youth director's laboratory, church music workshop, chaplain's conference and others.

The Walsh Medical Center was completed and dedicated on September 1, 1969, and will provide medical and dental services for the seminary "family." A children's building and remodeling of Price Hall are scheduled for construction in 1970. Other projects include a president's home, married students housing, a physical fitness center, and additional campus parking.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST HOSPITALS, INC. New Orleans, Louisiana

This Hospital Agency organized almost 50 years ago as a committee by SBC reports some of its Highlights in the 1969 Fiscal Year.

Dr. Bryant A. Bloss, president of the Hospital Board, whose specialty is orthopedic surgery, stated in his message, at the last Annual Board Meeting, "War is hell but from it many advances in medicine have resulted. The space program although tremendously expensive will bring advances in knowledge and skill in health care sciences. Generally, about 10 years is required between the discovery of a medical science to its practical application to man."

POLIO, a dreadful disease, was taking approximately 55,000 lives annually in this country as late as 1954. This loss of lives has been reduced to approximately 25 lives annually. In the last quarter of a century we remember the discovery and uses of pencillin, sulfa drugs, antibiotics, serums for immunization against diseases such as polio and others. Among the good things that have emerged from atomic energy is radio isotopes. The transplant of human organs is astounding and unbelievable, but it goes on. Many faster and more accurate ways of making diagnosis of diseases have been developed.

A FRATERNAL HOSPITAL PARTNERSHIP between the Foreign Mission Board and our Hospital Agency has been formed by Dr. Franklin Fowler, Foreign Medical Consultant, and a committee of Southern Baptist Hospitals, Inc. This partnership will be extended to any Baptist Hospitals desiring to participate.

THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM OF MATHER SCHOOL OF NURSING, NEW ORLEANS HOSPITAL was merged with that of William Carey College, Hattiesburg, Mississippi during the year. In September 1969, the last freshman class entered Mather School of Nursing to begin the phasing out of the Diploma Program, and the first Baccalaureate Degree class was enrolled at William Carey College. The administration and faculty of the two institutions worked together in planning the curriculum and activities concerning student life. The students will spend a part of their school period at William Carey College and a part at Southern Baptist Hospital, New Orleans. This educational plan offers a new 4-year program in nursing education leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing. In this day of specialization, it has a much broader educational base in liberal arts and opens doors to advancement in areas of leadership, supervisors, instructors, consultants and clinical specialists, and in research.

There were 258 persons who participated in various educational programs during the fiscal year.

SERVICES RENDERED in the two hospitals were 275,579 patient days of service to 36,781 inpatients, other than new borns, and 6,088 babies born who were rendered 24,684 patient days of service. The hospitals rendered service to 67,177 outpatients.

MEDICARE negotiations between the local Board of Directors in New Orleans and the administration there with the government authorities concerning the New Orleans hospital entering the medicare program was in progress several months, perhaps a year or more. Finally, November 1, 1969, the hospital was approved for the medicare program participation. Patients in the medicare age limits served in the New Orleans hospital were 1514 even though that hospital was not a participating hospital. The Jacksonville hospital served 2,464 patients in the medicare age group. The patient days of service in New Orleans to this group were 18,925 and to the group in Jacksonville in this age limit was 38,688.

FREE SERVICE There were 1625 patients admitted to the charity clinics

during the year, 581 new babies were born through the charity clinic and there were 6,827 visits of outpatients. The cost of charity free service was \$367,003 to both inpatients and outpatients, in addition to the physicians on the medical staff rendering these patients in these two hospitals approximately \$275,000 free medical service.

- Note 1: Properties at May 31, 1960, were appraised by Glen B. Espy, Appraiser, Little Rock, Arkansas, and these appraised values were placed on the books. Acquisitions subsequent to the appraisal are shown at cost.
- Note 2: The University is required to deposit approximately \$103,500.00 in the next year in the Bond and Interest Sinking Fund and the Building Maintenance and Equipment Reserve Account.
- Note 3: The University has leased two dormitory facilities from Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company for terms of twenty years beginning January 1, 1967, and October 1, 1967, for a rental of \$74,030.00 and \$74,512.00 annually, payable \$37,015.00 each March 1 and September I, and \$37,256.00 each October 1 and April 1, respectively.

COMMENTS

Cash on hand was verified by actual count. All bank accounts were confirmed by direct correspondence with the depositories. Bank balances were reconciled with the book balance.

Notes and Accounts Receivable were confirmed on a selective basis, by direct correspondence with the debtors.

We tested the pricing and extensions of the physical inventories. No observation of the taking of the physical inventories was made by this firm.

Prepaid insurance represents the amount of insurance premiums unexpired at June 30, 1970.

Investments are valued at the market value at the time of acquisition, except certain issues which have declined in value, where it is evident that such decline is not due to temporary market conditions. These issues were valued at market as of June 30, 1970. A physical inventory of the securities on hand at June 30, 1970 was observed by this firm.

Special deposits were confirmed by direct correspondence.

At June 30, 1965, the college adjusted the book basis of certain fixed assets, in accordance with an appraisal performed May 31, 1965, by a qualified, independent appraiser. The net effect of the adjustment was an increase in fixed assets of \$637,865.81, composed of an increase in land of \$51,840.00 an increase in buildings of \$670,961.49, and a decrease in roadways and utilities of \$34,935.63. All other additions to fixed assets since June 30, 1965, have been recorded at cost.

Bond discount is being amortized on a straight line basis in accordance with the payment schedules of the bonds.

Student loans made under the National Defense Education Act are generally payable over a ten year period, after the student graduates. A selected number of these loans were confirmed by direct correspondence.

Accounts payable were verified by direct correspondence sent to selected creditors whose statements represented approximately 90% of the total outstanding payables at June 30, 1970. During our examination of accounts payable, it was discovered that there had been numerous errors made in the vouchering and coding of accounts payable. For example, it was found there were a number of payables vouchered twice and when paid were again charged to expense. The effect of this type of error is to overstate both accounts payable and the expense accounts. Due to the time element involved in detecting and correcting all errors in vouchering and coding made during the year, we did not extend our examination further than our preliminary tests. However, accounts payable at June 30, 1970, were adjusted to agree with the detail of creditors' statements.

Notes and mortgages payable were confirmed by direct correspondence with the holders.

Accrued expenses and amounts withheld from payrolls were reviewed and found to be reasonably stated.

Student deposits were not confirmed, however, a detail card file is maintained. No material difference was found between the detail file and the control account.
