## "That The World May Know"

Some months ago, while reading the life of Karl Marx, I found myself asking, Why was it that Christians of that day let an



atheist stand out as the passionate champion of the miserable people of the world? As I have traveled in the areas of the world where the masses of miserable people live today, the hungry people, those who have so little of the good things of life, I find myself asking, Why is it that Christians have allowed these people to believe that atheistic Communists are their champions? That it is the Communist and not the Christian who is leading the struggle for their good?

A Christian was talking with a man in Burma before the Communists secured control of that country. The man was somewhat typical of the

great masses of people in the world who are economically and politically depressed. The Christian was pointing out the evils of communism to him. The man, though not a Communist himself, brushed aside all the reasoning of the Christian by the simple statement, "But they are on our side."

One cannot travel about the world today without feeling the powerful upsurge of the "have not" peoples. It is like the tide of the ocean that is irresistibly coming in. It cannot be stopped; and we wouldn't stop it if we could. In past years these people unconsciously accepted the idea that fate had fixed their lots where they were. We thought of them en masse: the peasants, the coolies, the Asiatics, the Africans, the heathen. But now they have become aware of the fact that they are people, basically just like other people. They think of themselves now as persons, and aspire to the same kind of things that other people aspire to achieve and have; people who have within themselves the same kind of hungers and hopes for life that others have. Means of intercommunication, made possible by modern inventions, have revealed to them the things that other people and nations have acquired. Now, they are on the move to acquire the same kind of things for themselves. And as they move, they have somehow come to believe that the Communist "is on our side."

#### Their Deception Our Responsibility

Why haven't we Christians convinced them that we are on their side? Why is it that our nations, which are called "Christian," have failed to convince them that they are on their side? For several hundreds of years we held the right of way in the Orient, India and Africa, where most of these people live. How and why have we failed?

In defense of ourselves we recall the fact that Jesus refused to turn stones into bread with which to feed the people in order to get them to follow Him. We remember that the multitudes flocked around Him when He fed them with a few fish and loaves of bread, and that they left Him when He told them about the bread of life. We know that the Communists are exploiting the human hungers of millions of people today; that they are capturing their allegiance with promises of the fulfillment of hopes which turn out to be bonds of exploitation.

But this defense, although true, does not dispose of the disturbing questions that turn themselves over and over in my mind and heart. Why haven't we convinced them that we are on their side? What have we done to convince them? How far have we gone? How much have we actually undertaken to do in their behalf? How far ought we to go? How much is it worth?

Communists have gone all out to convince these people that they are on their side. In their purpose to exploit and direct the awakening human hungers of these vast peoples of the world, they know that they are aiming to harness the most powerful force in the life of the world. They know that a movement propelled by this powerful current will be irresistible. They plan to ride it into world power. No price is too great for them to pay.

#### How Can They Know That Jesus Loves Them?

I am compelled to believe that as Christians we do not comprehend the terrible importance of this situation. God has committed to us the means of fulfilling the hunger and hope of these masses of people. We have the messages of abundant life which alone can satisfy their hunger. We can be the agencies for directing for its true purpose the most powerful force in the life of the world. We have reason for doing this that are a thousandfold more important and worthwhile than the Communists have for what they are doing. And yet, it is precisely because the Communists have done so much more to be convincing than we have that they have succeeded in their objectives where we have failed.

If one is inclined to doubt that statement, let him compare the extent of our effort to win the world to Christ with the effort of the Communists to gain control of the world. Let him try to imagine the effect that Christians would have, if we were prepared to go as far to make Christ known to the world as Communists have gone to make known their "way of life."

I was in Nigeria a few weeks ago where I saw multitudes of these seeking people. I felt the vacancy of their lives and the surge of their aspirations. They hunger and thirst for what they do not have. As I stood one day in a market place, with the crowds of people moving about the trading centers, I thought, Jesus is on their side, and they don't know it. He went all the way in love and life in their behalf.

How far will we go to let these people know that Jesus is on their side? How much is it worth?

## The Holy Spirit and Jesus

. . And he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove, and lighting upon him."

It must have been a memorable scene never to be forgotten by those who witnessed it! A young man with an unusual light in His countenance came to John on the bank the Jordan and requested baptism. And th who were near by heard the conversation that ensued. John hesitated saying, "I have need to be baptized of thee, and comest Thou to me? And Jesus answering said unto him, Suffer it to be so now: for thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness . . . And Jesus, when He was baptized, went up straightway out of the water: and lo, the heavens were opened unto Him, and He saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and lighting upon Him. And lo, a voice from heaven saving. This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." (Matthew 3:14-17).

Such a scene was never before witnessed, and has never been witnessed since. Jesus having risen from the baptismal waters stood in the river. A form like that of a dove descended and rested upon Him as if crowning Him for His kingly mission. And a voice was heard to say, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased."

So when Jesus inaugurated His ministry by the act of baptism, the Father spoke His approval and the Holy Spirit came as His constant companion.

## From The Editor's Desk

## The Continuing Christmas Story

"Why should He love me so?" I do not know. There is no explanation of the love of God sinful men, which is within the compass of finite minds to fully grasp.

We read of God's wonderful love for human kind as expressed in the life and ministry



and death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ. We yield ourselves to that love and lo, we know it is true. Explain it? We cannot. Rationalize it? No. Reduce it to logical deductions? Impossible. The love of God in Christ Jesus is an experience of the soul. And experience is the only method by which we can know His love.

I have just read again The Story; that is, three excerpts from the story—the birth, the crucifixion, and the resurrection of Jesus. For His birth cannot be understood apart from His crucifixion and His resurrection.

#### The Bethlehem Scene

At this season of the year we turn our thoughts to the babe in Bethlehem's manger—the manger which has been glorified by its divine occupant. We think of Mary, the child's mother, and Joseph. We visualize the shepherds on the Judean hills and the angelic choir as it

makes the announcement of the birth of the Son of God to the humble shepherds. And then the chorus, "Glory to God in the Highest, and on earth, peace, good will toward men." We think of the star and the wise men from the East at their journey's end, paying homage to the new born King.

We sing our Christmas carols. We recite poetry which the bards have produced to try to put into language something of the significance of the event. We read the story again. It has been dramatized and we try to reproduce it to stir the imagination of children and adults as well. We preach sermons and offer our prayers.

This routine has been going on year after ar for centuries and still The Story is new. It never grows old. It charms us and thrills us and awes us. Those who take the time to ponder the events which produced Christmas never cease to wonder at its glory and its mystery.

#### Life and Death

But Christmas is followed by Easter. And between these two dates, more properly events, there is a life and death process which is unequalled in the history of human kind.

We see the babe grow into childhood, into boyhood, into young manhood. We observe Him in the home, and at work, until finally He launches His public career.

We follow Him up and down the highways and along the village streets, into the market places, into the synagogues, into the temple, and into the homes of the people. We hear Him teaching the multitudes. We see Him as He turns His attention to a single individual. He speaks the words of healing and the lame walk, the blind see, the deaf hear, the fevered brow is cooled, and the leper is cleansed.

"Thy sins be forgiven thee," He says, and the sin blackened soul is cleansed and free. Men and women who had never known anything but a life of sin and who didn't know at there was any better life for them awakened to an experience of forgiveness and cleansing they had never dreamed possible.

But for all this ministry of mercy and love and forgiveness His reward was a cross upon which He was nailed. Look from the manger to Calvary today, for only so can you know the significance of that manger scene. Visualize the babe in the manger and then look at the man on the Cross. It's the same person. What has He done? He has loved men and women, boys and girls. He has healed their bodies. He has forgiven their sins. He has cleansed their souls. That is the crime for which He is dying on Calvary's Cross.

Hear Him say, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do." And when He had suffered the full measure of a slow tortuous death for the sins of the world He again addressed His father, "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit." It was not from the height of His popularity that He committed His spirit back to God, but from the height of Calvary and from the Cross upon which He died.

#### The Empty Tomb

Kind hands took the body and wrapped it in linen cloths and laid it in a tomb. But who can entomb the Son of God, the Savior of men? Look again on the third day and there discover the linen cloths lying exactly where the body of Jesus lay. But the body is not there. Why look for the living among the dead? "He is not here, He is risen."

Once more we see Him walking the streets of the cities and the villages, entering into the homes, speaking His blessings upon those who love Him, and commissioning His followers to preach His gospel in all the world.

#### Look Again

Once again visualize the babe in the manger and from that scene look at the risen Christ, bearing in His person the marks of death for you and for me.

Surely if we review this story and visualize these scenes and then think of the marvelous love which produced it all, we will not be able to desecrate this Christmas season with fleshly and worldly excesses which bear no kinship to the spirit of Christmas.

If we understand and appreciate the true Christmas spirit we will be better Christians during the year to come. We will love Him more. We will serve Him more faithfully. We

## A Juvenile In The White House

President Truman's letter to the critic, Paul Hume of the Washington Post, who didn't put a very high valuation on Margaret Truman's singing, reveals in the President a juvenile intelligence and juvenile emotional immaturity.

This is not the first intemperate outburst of the President's. It is only the latest in a succession of such outbursts.

#### Confusion and Uncertainty

Such indiscretion on the part of the highest official of the land can only create bewilderment, confusion, and uncertainty in our national administration and a lack of confidence and fear on the part of the electorate.

Such juvenile intelligence and emotional immaturity as displayed by the President are wholly incapable of dealing with the vital and dangerous national and international issues of this critical period in the history of the world. It was inevitable that a man of the President's limited abilities would surround himself with advisors who in the main are but little more capable than himself. This situation has made it practically impossible for the real statesmen and men of ability in the administration and in the congress to exert much influence on the policies of our nation both in its own national affairs and in international relations.

Perhaps there would be no point in saying all this were it not for the purpose of calling our people to prayer. We need to pray a prayer of repentance for our personal, our social, our economic, our national sins. The great prophets and statesmen of the Old Testament frequently confessed the sins of their people, their nation, and asked God to forgive. They did not always ask that the punishment for the national sins be withheld or withdrawn but they did ask that the people might come back to God in repentance and trust in Him. Surely we need to pray such a prayer today.

#### **Our Last Resort**

We need to pray for our national leaders. They are weak men like all the rest of us. They are confused and bewildered. They don't know what to do and they don't know where they are leading our nation. According to our form of government we can't change our national leaders now. Perhaps if we had the opportunity to change them we wouldn't. It appears that we have reached our last resort: prayer.

Let us pray that God will guide the decisions of our national leaders by His own infinite wisdom and that He may countermand their impulsive and emotional decisions which have already caused so much confusion and uncertainty and that He may guide the destiny of our nation and the nations of the world to accomplish His purposes of redeeming grace among men.

Friends, let us pray.

will trust Him more implicitly.

"Why should He love me so?" Let that question so fasten itself in your consciousness that you will never again be able to forget it.

# Kingdom Progress

## Church Centered Missions

Arkansas's first Church centered Mission Conference was held in the First Baptist Church of Little Rock, December 7-8 under the sponsorship of the Department of Missions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

In spite of the cold weather with ice and snow, approximately one hundred pastors and missionaries attended. All were high in their praise of the value of the conference and expressed a desire that it become an annual meeting.

Guest speakers were Dr. S. F. Dowis, Superintendent of Cooperative Missions of the Home Mission Board, and A. L. Lowther, Superintendent of Missions in Oklahoma City. Both gave inspirational messages and led round-table conferences on every phase of local mission work.

A number of testimonies were given by pastors and laymen in regard to mission stations which their churches have sponsored. Pastor J. D. Tolleson and Deacon Swift of Immanuel Church, El Dorado, gave the history of the mission sponsored by their church. It has had marvelous growth and is now in a splendid building with a full time pastor.

Pastor Harvey Elledge told of the many

mission stations established by the Baring Cross Church. Some of those mentioned were: Levy, Pike Avenue, Rose City, Amboy, and Camp Robinson. As these missions have been established and have grown into churches, the Baring Cross Church, itself, has had phenomenal growth.

Dr. John Miller spoke of his experience in the mission work of the Immanuel Church, Little Rock and of the First Church, Camden. Pastor Lloyd A. Sparkman told of Moscow Mission which is sponsored by the South Side Church of Pine Bluff and is located fifteen miles out in the country. It was the testimony of all of these men that from the time the churches began to sponsor missions, the financial burdens of their churches began to be lifted and the Lord's blessings seemed to be upon the churches in an unusual manner.

Friday morning most of the time was devoted to round-table discussions of mission committees, proper steps in organizing a mission, financing the work, and organizing the mission into a church.

The conference was brought to a climactic close with a great message from the beloved pastor of the First Church, Camden, Dr. T. L. Harris.

## B. B. Sawyer in Revival At First, Russellville

Dr. Braxton B. Sawyer, pastor of Immanuel Church, Fort Smith, assisted Pastor W. E. Speed, First Church, Russellville, in a revival meeting in October. There were over thirty additions to the church.

Dr. Sawyer is on the field again after his automobile accident a short while ago. Dr. John D. Freeman, executive secretary of the Baptist Foundation, supplied his pulpit while Dr. Sawyer was in the hospital.

#### H. H. Zimmerman in Revival At Piney Church

The Piney Church of Central Association, Edward Anderson, pastor, had H. H. Zimmerman of Arkadelphia in a revival meeting, December 3 to 10. Reg Baber was in charge of the musical program.

There were 22 by baptism and three by letter. Evangelist Zimmerman was pastor of the First Church, Albuquerque, New Mexico, for seven years. He also served as missionary to Brazil for seven years.

#### Raymond Johnson Ordained To Gospel Ministry

Raymond E. Johnson was ordained by the Prosperity Church, near Fordyce, to the full gospel ministry on Sunday, December 3. A. P. Elliff was moderator and R. K. Hunt, clerk

#### First, Hamburg Has Dr. Noel Taylor in Revival

Dr. Noel M. Taylor, Executive Secretary of the Illinois Baptist State Association, concluded a stewardship revival December 3 in the First Church, Hamburg, whose pastor is Lowell F. Matheney, a native of Illinois. Definite results of this revival have been

Definite results of this revival have been recorded as follows: For the past year the average tithes and offerings of the church have been \$480.77 per Sunday. The goal for demonstration day was \$849.99. The tithes and offerings on the closing Sunday of the stewardship revival totaled \$1,212.08.

Prior to the stewardship revival the church reported 175 tithers; on the closing day of the stewardship revival 225 had pledged to tithe.

Pastor Matheney has been with the Haburg Church about eighteen months during which time there have been more than 250 additions to the church, almost 200 of these have been by baptism.

The Sunday School attendance has increased from an average of about 285 to 375. The annual budget of the church has grown from \$22,000 to more than \$28,000. During this time a Brotherhood has been organized. A mission has been started and recently became a full time church with more than eighty members. Plans are now under way for the construction of a new auditorium that will give the church the facilities for handling a Sunday School attendance of more than 600.

#### Missionary Carl Clark Organizes Church in El Dorado

Missionary Carl A. Clark, Liberty Association, is in the process of organizing a church in the north east section of El Dorado. A lot and building were donated and plans are now underway for the church building.

On Sunday morning, December 3, there were 61 present and on Sunday evening the attendance was 82. In a recent revival there were 40 additions.

As time goes on, the lack of trained workers becomes more and more evident; but our consolation lies in the fact that there are now two schools training men and women for Christian service in Italy.

The Italian Baptist Orphanage is already filled to capacity. There are close to 100 boys and girls already living in the G. B. Taylor Boys' Dormitory and the G. B. Fraser Girls' Dormitory. Shoes and sweaters, used but still good, are a special need at the Orphanage

Mr. Creamer, who has long been prominent in Brooklyn industry, has been director of the Brooklyn Federation of Churches for the past thirty years. He is vice-president of the Brooklyn-Queens Y. M. C. A., as well as member of the national board and the international committee of the "Y."

Dr. Alfred Grant Walton, minister of the Flatbush-Tompkins Congregational church, was the principal speaker at the dinner ceremonies. He stressed the importance of religious education in these trying times.

"In this atomic age," he told the several hundred guests, "when man has at his disposal powers such as civilization has never known before, there must be moral controls to dominate his conduct.

"This country has emphasized secular education, but it has lagged in religious education... The power of Communism makes it apparent how destructive a philosophy of life may be when it is without God and controlling moral sanctions."

#### Wellborn to Hold Baptist Hour Rallies

Charles Wellborn, Baptist Hour speaker for the first six months of 1951, will be holding meetings with Dr. John Wimbish at the Calvary Baptist Church in New York City, December 31 through January 7.

Lowe, Director of the Radio Commission.

#### Threatened Strike Averted After Principals Pray

Union and management representatives and federal mediators prayed together in a church in Toledo, for Divine guidance in settling a threatened strike of Ohio Fuel Gas Company employees. A strike would imperil gas service to 93,000 domestic and commercial consumers.

A settlement of the critical situation was reached the day after the services at St. Mark's Episcopal church and only hours before a strike deadline set by the 212 CIO Utility Workers Union members.

James McElroy, rector of St. Mark's and chairman of a mediation panel of the Labor-management-Citizens Committee, indicated that accord came quickly after the issue, involving demands for higher pay, was brought in such an unusual manner to the attention of the public.

The settlement terms included a compromise between gas firm employees and management. Unionists had asked a \$2 a day boost in pay and settled for half that much.

#### Graham to Aid Baptist **Evangelism Campaign**

Evangelist Billy Graham will give Texas Baptists ten days of his time next month to help them reach an all-time goal of 250,000 new members in one year.

Dr. C. Wade Freeman, evangelism superintendent of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, said that Dr. Graham was invited to help because Texas Baptist leaders realized they would need some assistance in achieving their record goal.

Dr. Freeman said the evangelist was astounded at the goal, but promised to help because "Texas has the greatest spirit of revival in America."

Dr. Graham will participate in a series of regional "inspiration and information" meetings over the state.

The goal of 250,000 new members for next year is about five times greater than the number ever added to the rolls in any past year. Baptists affiliated with the Texas Convention already number about 1,000,000.

#### Over 3,000 Decisions in Baltimore In Great Methodist Revival

About 10,000 persons attended a mass meeting in Baltimore which climaxed a ten-day Methodist Evangelistic Advance campaign in this area. The crowd, which filled the 5th Regiment Armory, was described as the largest ever attending a Methodist event in Baltimore in recent years.

Incomplete figures showed that the drive had netted some 3,100 new members-1,800 converts who affiliated with a church for the first time, and 1,300 lapsed members who renewed their profession of faith. Many of the 3,100 religious decisions resulted from visits of 800 two-man teams of laymen and clergy who were trained in the techniques of personal evangelism during the campaign. Dr. Albert P. Shirkey, pastor of the Mount Vernon Place Methodist church, Washington, D. C., told the rally that "the darker the world becomes, the more brilliant Jesus be-

comes."

Participating in a processional were 200 girls in white dresses carrying American and Christian flags, 600 men and women choir members in red, blue, brown and black cassocks, and 175 ministers. A huge blue platform backdrop was emblazoned with the words, "The Passion . . . Christ . . . The Pow-

**Lumber Boat Wrecked** Church Built of Salvaged Lumber

The little Oregon fishing village of Charleston, Oregon, near the entrance to Coos Bay, will soon have a new church, because of a shipwreck there six years ago.

It was early in 1944 that the lumber schooner George Olson hit the rocks near the north jetty while outward bound and drifted back into the bay to ground on Guano rock. The deckload of lumber was jettisoned and salvaged.

After two attempts to salvage the ship, she was towed across the bar and cast loose north of the entrance, to drift ashore a mile north of the bar. Storms did their work on the hull, and it broke up to spill the lumber from her holds onto the beach.

Then the Charleston residents went to work. John Porter had been conducting services in the school gym, and he saw in the lumber "cast on the waters" a chance to obtain material for the start of a church.

It took the people about a year to work the timbers across the sand spit to the bay. From here they were rafted and towed over to Charleston, where construction started.

The structure was framed and exterior building paper and roof applied. Then it was partly finished inside to allow the holding of

#### Texas Baptists Plan **Short Wave Broadcasts**

Texas Baptists will begin a series of short wave broadcasts on December 10 designed to promote religion and peace over the world.

The broadcasts will be over WRUL, powerful station in Boston that beams its international broadcasts from several transmitters. The same station is one of several used by the Department of State for its Voice of America programs.

Sponsoring the religious series will be the radio and public relations department of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Said Dr. R. Alton Reed, director of the department:

"The only hope in the world is Christ. We want to give the message of Christ, If we can get the people of the world to turn to Christ then there will not be the belligerency and war mongering we have today."

Dr. Reed emphasized that the series had no connection with the Department of State. He pointed out that seventy-five per cent of WRUL's time is taken by the State Department and the remainder is managed by World Wide Broadcasting Corp., private firm that owns the station.

## Southwestern Registers 1,435 For Fall Semester

Registrations at Southwestern Seminary show a total of 1,435. This is an increase of 71 over last fall's enrollment of 1,364.

These students, coming from 39 states, the District of Columbia, and seven foreign countries British West Indies, Canal Zone, China, Colombia, Hawaii, Italy, and Scotland, constitute by far the largest enrolment in the Seminary's 43 years' history. Of the above number 851 were matriculated the first day of registration, the largest number ever to be enrolled in one day.

A breakdown of the enrolment shows 845 registered in the School of Theology, 524 in the School of Religious Education, and 123 in the School of Sacred Music. Fifty-seven of the number are enrolled for degrees in two schools.

#### Total S. B. C. Gifts Pass Ten Million

Combined Southern Baptist Convention Cooperative Program and designated gifts have gone past the ten million dollar mark for the second time in history. The first time was in 1946 in connection with the relief and rehabilitation offering. The announcement was made by Dr. Duke K. McCall, executive secretary, Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee.

Gifts totaled \$10,045,590 at the end of the days work on December 7.

In the first seven days of December, Foreign Missions Advance received \$153,927, a total of all Southern Convention Cooperative Program receipts over the current total and capital needs budgets of \$6,657,000. The Convention passed from the capital needs budget into the Foreign Mission Advance on November 30.

At the end of November's business, Corative Program receipts were 15.17 per cent higher than in 1949; designations were 3.57 per cent higher and total gifts 11.14 per cent higher.

## A Stranger Called My Name

Cold chills have run up and down my spine ever since the man on the streetcar in Istanbul, Turkey, called my name. Perhaps I should explain that he had never seen me before. Certainly I had never seen him.

I had followed the popular but illegal Turkish custom of jumping on the steps of a moving streetcar. That maneuver saved walking a fourth of a mile to the nearest car stop. It also eliminated the possibility of being trampled in the crowd waiting to get on at a regular stop. The car was already so crowded I could only get space for one foot and one hand.

An officious man in civilian dress ordered me to get in the car. That was as simple as putting one more sardine in a can. He then lectured me about Turkish laws against riding on the step of a streetcar. I grinned with normal American disrespect for a lecture by a fellow civilian.

At that point he drew himself up and said, "Your name is McCall." When I looked only slightly startled he added. "You entered

the country last Wednesday."

That was my first brush with the secret police systems so common to these lands. I am remembering the reams of forms I have filled out. I have given my birthday and where I was born so many times I had thought about changing the answers just to get a little variety. From now on I have a new respect for the forms and will copy the answers very carefully from my passport.

What is that passport worth? I could easily sell it for \$2,000. Actually I would charge about \$2,000 to let a stranger hold it in his

I want to remember that the next time I feel like fussing about the responsibilities and costs of being an American citizen. Being able to hold a United States passport is

about the greatest privilege in this world.


Along with that should go some comment about the privilege of being a Christian. I do not want to sound superficial or forced, but the fact is that citizenship in the kingdom of God is the only citizenship worth more than what an American passport means. The thousands of men and women who live in strange lands as missionaries illustrate that.

Anyway, when some judgment angel calls my name and starts reciting my record on earth-I sure hope none of my friends will be listening-I want to be able to say something like this: "Keep talking, Friend, and at the end of the list you will come to the note that despite my shortcomings I have long since accepted citizenship in the kingdom of God." Whatever colored passports are issued for heaven, I am going to pull it out and walk right in.

I went around to St. Sophia. I do not know whether to call it a church, a mosque, or a museum. It has been all three in that order. Originally it was the main Christian church to which the emperors belonged. The city of Istanbul is old Constantinople, named for Constantine the emperor who first accepted Christianity in 312 A. D. A couple of centuries later Vladimir, the ruler of Russia, decided to find the best religion for his people. He had representatives of various religions come to see him. He then sent a commission to visit the headquarters of each one.

When the commission came to what is now Istanbul, the patriarch of the Greek Orthodox Church celebrated a gorgeous high mass in St. Sophia Church. The members of the commission from Russia watched in awe.

Over their heads arched dome upon dome of that great church. The top dome, I am told, is the largest in the world with the dome of the capitol building in Washington placing fourth. I paced off the diameter of the dome from the markings on the floor. I figure it is two steps more than the distance from home plate to second base, almost 100 feet.



Each of the domes in St. Sophia is covered with genuine silver and gold mosaics. When the Turks made a Mohammedan mosque out of it, they painted over these beautiful pictures. Now that it is a museum the paint is being removed and some of the glory is re-

What was the effect on Vladimir's commission? Russia is still mainly Greek Orthodox in religion. Here is a part of the commission's report: "When we stood in that temple we did not know whether we were in heaven or on earth. No man having tasted the sweet will choose the bitter; nor can we remain heathen anymore."

Even more powerful than a beautiful building is the influence of a life dedicated to God.

It is significant that the great evangelistic crusade east of the Mississippi River planned for April, 1951, has already created a Convention-wide emphasis on prayer and the study of prayer. It is fitting that we should make the last day of this year a day of united prayer for peace and for power that at home and around the world God's will may be done and multitudes may be saved.

#### Catholic vs. Protestant Doctrine

Continuing a timely series of articles "In Defense of our Protestant Heritage," the January issue of The Converted Catholic Magazine carries two illuminating features one on the Roman Catholic observance known as the Novena, and the other on Catholic vs. Protestant doctrines on "Forgiveness of Sin."

Few Protestants are aware of the amazing intricacies in the Roman Catholic teaching regarding sin. Rome teaches her adherents in substance, "Leave the question of your sins to us. We specialize in sin."

There are venial sins and mortal sins—sins that need not be confessed to a priest, others that must be confessed. The Catholic Church reserves the sole right on earth to determine what is sin, and the degree of that sin. Equally elaborate is the system of penances and "works of merit" by which Roman Catholics are assured they may lessen their time of punishment in purgatory.

These articles make clear the reason why the Roman Catholic Church handles the question of sin in this complex fashion. It is shown to be the key to the master pattern of control of souls in this world and the next. Protestants who would understand the secret of Rome's power should know what she teaches about sin.

An important and lucrative feature of Roman Catholic disciplinary practice is the Novena. To achieve the promised spiritual and temporal benefits of the Novena, the suppliant must attend an unbroken succession of nine special masses. If he breaks the series, he must start all over again, or forfeit the hoped-for benefits.

The Roman Catholic Church holds out the promise of certain spiritual and temporal benefits to those who accomplish the Novena. The suppliant must specify a particular desired benefit. It may be spiritual, such as the wish that he may get to heaven; or it may

## Southern Baptist Work In Manila

By John A. ABERNATHY

Dear Friends:

By the time you receive this it will be Christmas; so here's wishing you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year! Doubtless you have been wondering how we are getting along with the work in Manila. Until recently we had very little to report. When we arrived here there was nothing in the way of mission work established. Of course there were four Chinese churches sponsored by other denominations, self-supporting. It was like trying to carve something out of a solid stone wall. To be sure, there were over 150,000 Chinese in and around Manila with little being done spiritually for them. This





in itself was a great challenge. I was told this week that ninety per cent of all business in the Philippines is in the hands of Chinese. Certainly in Manila it is true. There are many rich merchants, traders, manufacturers, and other business establishments. Among these people are several millionaires. Only a small per cent are Christians.

#### A Place to Worship

When we found that we would have to begin at the bottom, the question arose in our minds for a moment as to whether we had

be temporal, such as a petition for a husband or wife, or an apartment. Or again it may be the desire to enlist God's aid in some honorable project. Having made his choice and declared his "intention," the suppliant must persevere. Yet, having completed the Novena, the suppliant may not claim the promised benefit or feel any assurance that it will materialize, for such an attitude would be a mortal sin of presumption. Thus, as the article clearly shows, he is right where he started. Indeed, a study of the Novena is a short course of instruction in the basic strategy of Rome in controlling her adherents, and gives an insight into the workings of the Catholic mind that will help Protestants who are concerned for their Catholic friends and neigh-

made a mistake in coming here. Then when we reviewed the immediate past, we realized that He had definitely led us and it was up to us to do our part. Consulting with the five other young missionaries already here a little ahead of us we decided the first thing to do would be to find a suitable place for a mission. Several places were offered for rent, but none were large enough nor in the right location. While we were waiting and praying we occupied much of the time walking the streets and visiting in the stores and homes of the Chinese. In this way we made many valuable contacts that have proved of inestimable value in securing the right kind of place, in other ways.

The end of October the right place was found. The entire second floor of a bank building: modern re-inforced concrete, steel sash, elevator, right in the heart of the Chinese part of Manila. We have room enough for 1,000 people, Sunday School and other group rooms. The owner repainted the walls and sanded the floors before we took over. With modern pews, lights, piano, and other furniture we have a lovely place of worship. The rent each month for the building is pretty high, but we feel as soon as we are able to organize a church the people will be able to build their own church and be practically self supporting from then on. The Lord directed us to a Mr. Hsu, a Chinese preacher who has been in the Philippines many years and who is of Baptist faith. He is a soul winner and deeply interested in the ongoing of this young project. He speaks Cantonese, Fukinese, Mandarian, and pretty good English.

#### Revival Meeting

On November 12 we had our opening day, followed by a a week of special evangelistic meetings. The local Chinese newspapers had given the meetings wide publicity and many personal invitations had been printed and distributed. It was good to be able to preach in Chinese again. From the first service large crowds came and during the week many confessed Christ as Lord and Savior. Now we are happy and busy in helping to project the new work in all its phases. A Sunday School has been organized and is already a going concern. During the meetings each evening before the sermon a movie was put on in the hall, introducing the theme of the sermon for the evening. This helped to draw crowds as well as to prepare the people for what followed. All the missionaries helped in the meetings. Most of them are teaching Sunday School classes, helping in the preaching and in Visual Aid work. Some weeks ago it was my privilege to be invited to hold a one week revival meeting at Baguio, where we have our first Chinese Baptist Church. Then last week I preached in a revival at Clarke Air Base to our U.S. military personnel. It was like an old fashioned revival back home. Many were saved and others rededicated their lives to Christ. Southern Baptist Chaplains, W. E. Ferguson and Ralph Hill, are there.

Letters and telegrams have come from Korea, Ours, with the home of the David Ahns, was burned to the ground; the Baptist Church was spared; Rev. Lee Chung-tuk, chairman of the convention had been martyred. We were urged to return as soon as possible and are now waiting reply to application to return. Pray for the work in Manila and for the suffering Koreans.

There are times when the students of the New Orleans Seminary and its practical activities department may weary in their mission activities on the city streets. The good they do often takes time to be realized.

The word "obligation" was mentioned in a Training Union program in one of the New Orleans churches.

"That reminds me of a great deal," a middle-aged man remarked as part of his discussion. The following approximates the rest of his testimony.

"From birth until a few years ago I belonged to a church of another faith. When my father died I was told that for \$1,000 he could be prayed out of purgatory. That was my obligation to the church. I raised and paid the money.

"A year later my wife died. Again I was told that my obligation was \$1,000, or her soul would never rest in peace. I paid it, by the hardest.

"Not long after that my child died. This time I was told that the obligation would be only \$500 for the necessary masses.

"I refused to pay. I also left the church. One night months later I was downtown and heard a street preacher say that a person can be saved from his sin forever; that there is no such a place as purgatory mentioned in the Bible.

"I asked the speaker how much this would cost. 'Cost, man,' he said. 'Salvation is free!' And he showed me in the Bible where Jesus died for our sins. He died for me. I was shown that Jesus paid it all. All to him we owe.

"That did something for me that never had been done before. I saw it immediately, and accepted. Later I was directed to this church where I was to ask for membership.

"So now I have a greater obligation. Now I can say with the Apostle Paul, 'For me to live is Christ, and to die is gain.'

"What I have now is mine forever, and it is something money cannot buy."

#### Water for Troops in Korea

Lieutenant Colonel M. C. Ellison of the Engineering Corps, writing to the Washington Star, says that the Corps of Engineers is charged with the responsibility of supplying portable water to troops in the field. His letter continues:

"Each division is supported by an organic combat engineer battalion equipped with four sets of water purification equipment with ample capacity for supplying portable water for a full division of soldiers. This equipment is so designed that water from polluted streams or wells may be converted to absolutely safe, palatable water at the rate of 35 gallons per minute for each of the four water purification sets; therefore, it is not necessary to transport drinking water from Japan or distill sea water to adequately supply our troops. The equipment in the hands of our engineers can be used to purify water from the many streams found throughout Korea.

"The Corps of Engineers conducts research and development to insure that our engineers are equipped with the best water purification equipment obtainable."

## The Savior Is Born

This discussion is based on the International Uniform Sunday School Lesson Outlines, copyrighted by the International Council of Religious Education and used by permission.

Great events stand out and apart in the human mind. Momentous happenings stir the emotions. Hearts rejoice and souls are thrilled when righteousness triumphs over evil. D-Day in World War II was a day of great consequence—but V-J Day was the day that spelled victory over evil, at least temporarily.

Some of us can remember Armistice Day in World War I. The news that the war had ended reached many towns at two or three o'clock in the morning. People went wild with joy; whistles blew, guns boomed, people paraded the dark streets beating tin pans or buckets; they felt compelled to manifest their emotional delight in some outward manner.

Thinking further along this line, we study with deep appreciation the life and adventures of Christopher Columbus. In retrospection we can see the leadership of God in that daring event that opened the American continent to the world; it was a momentous day in history when America was discovered; it meant freedom for many who had never known any feal liberty. It meant freedom for so many future generations.

So certain days have become symbols of great events in our history. July 4 is a symbol of independence; and whether Jesus was actually born on December 25 or not, the day has become associated with salvation and spiritual freedom in the human mind, as the birthdate of our Redeemer.

#### **Promise Fulfilled**

For many centuries the prophets in Israel promised the world a Messiah, a King and Redeemer. Many times He was depicted as a King on a throne, as an adult being; but a few of the prophecies described Him as a baby and a child. But listen to Isaiah: "Therefore the Lord Himself shall give you a sign: Behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel." "Unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given, and the government shall be upon His shoulder; and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the mighty God, the everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace." Again, the prophet Micah foretold the place of His birth: "But thou, Bethlehem, Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall HE come forth unto me that is TO BE RULER IN ISRAEL."

The world was going its busy way, no doubt, when the greatest

event in history up to that hour, came to pass. Caesar Augustus had ordered an enrolment of all the people in his vast domain. Carpenter Joseph, living in Nazareth, found it necessary to traverse what was then a great distance, 80 miles, to Bethlehem for his enrolment because that was the hirthplace of his forefathers and he, being of the lineage of David, had to go to the city of David for the occasion. All things were working for the fulfilment of scripture even the decree from Caesar that the whole world be enrolled for taxation. There was nothing else for Joseph to do but to take Mary, his wife, and go to Bethlehem.

#### Cradled In a Manger

It is an old and familiar story how they arrived in the crowded village only to find there were no vacancies in the way of room or shelter. The very best the couple could do was to camp in a deserted stable, which was probably in a cave at the edge of the little town. So it was in this unusually humble surroundings that the Lord Jesus Christ came into the world; how odd in the human mind, but how like the Father we know, to manifest Himself to the human race robed in the body of a tiny, newborn baby, in the lowliest environment, that would be so humiliating to the ego of human beings. No palace of cedar with gold veneering such as was the customary birthplace for royalty in that day: no beautiful nursery done up in pink and blue greeted the earth's Redeemer. Were these delicacies that mean so much to modern parents too effeminate for the rugged personality that was to endure so very much for the sons of Adam! His first covering was strips of cloth wrapped around His little body, and He was first cradled in a feeding trough for animals: a manger.

#### His Glory Revealed

But let us look away, from the first dismal surroundings of the Christ child to the revelation of His glories elsewhere in the same country. God honored another humble occasion, a group of shepherds with the most unique annunciation the world has ever known, with the presence of an angelic chorus and with a flood of light of heavenly glory, they were the first ones to know of the great Redeemer's birth as He made His debut among men. "And

there were shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flocks by night. And lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them and the glory of the Lord shone round about them."

Here was, no doubt, a group of faithful children of God; some who must have yearned for the coming Messiah. It is highly possible that they were sitting in a group, discussing some of the mysteries of the Kingdom of God. Suddenly, in the darkness of the night, a glorious light illumined their presence, and an angel appeared in their midst. Their reaction was the same that ours would be: they were filled with fear and amazement. But the angel calmed their fears with the announcement that he brought good news, he had glad tidings of great joy for them, news that would also effect all people, "For unto you is born a Savior, which is Christ the Lord." When did this happen? "This day." "Where?" "In the city of David," which they knew to mean, Bethlehem.

The Jews were sticklers for signs, they wanted definite proof for everything they heard, so the angel gave them two signs: "Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling cloths." They would also find the babe—"lying in a manger." If they found a babe dressed in any other manner or cradled any place else, it would not be the Savior. This seems to indicate that swaddling clothes and a manger-cradle were not the usual customs of their day.

#### Heavenly Enthusiasm

Following this announcement, a heavenly choir was heard, ringing out the praises of God in the night air on the Judean hillside, singing, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." The Prince of Peace was born! Sinful man may not be able to comprehend and appreciate the fact, but the heavenly host could not refrain from shouting their praises of the glad tidings to the earth. Like a group of people in a burst of applause over some happy occasion on earth, the hosts of heaven had to manifest their enthusiasm over the happy event, the momentous happening of that hour when, earth's redemption was nearer completion than at any time previous in its existence.


The emphasis of the angel's messages was that the Savior had been born. The greatest King this world will ever know had been

born also, but the emphasis was not placed there. A descendant of the famous king David, the house of royalty, had been born, but the emphasis was not placed there. Thee "good tidings" which the angel bore was that the Savior was born.

#### Peace Will Win

The Redeemer had arrived at last! And He would bring peace to the earth. The inhabitants of this earth have never known peace. Peace has always been a prized and coveted possession. We have heard war cries, and have endured war, until many would choose peace at any price. Mankind has proved his inability to negotiate and maintain peace. Our peace and the peace of the world is dependent upon the Prince of Peace. God has promised us peace through the work and person of His Son, and He must keep that promise. The angels sang with joy because they knew the time would come when peace and tranquility shall reign supreme over all this earth.

So what could be more appropriate for Christian people, in this dark hour, when another great conflict between nations seems inevitable, than to refresh our minds by rehearsing the wonderful, miraculous birth of our Lord, and reminding ourselves that God has promised us peace at last, upon the earth; but the only peace this world will ever know must be through that person who was born nearly two thousand years ago, in the city of David, the Savior, which is Christ the Lord.

## More Supposition . . .

We have been trying in the last two issues of the ARKANSAS BAPTIST to show our preacher brethren, who are not members of the Ministers Retirement Plan, the wisdom of belonging to the plan through articles written on supposition. Today, we present another—This time on the WIDOWS SUPPLEMENTAL ANNUITY PLAN.

Suppose you are a pastor and married. Suppose you, like most Baptist preachers, have not been able to create a large estate, not even enough to protect your wife and children from want for life's necessities in case you should die — what do you suppose she would do? Would you want her to beg, or "move in" on the relatives for a living? Of course you wouldn't and it will not happen with just a little planning on your part NOW, coupled with what may seem some sacrifice at the moment. YOU need to be in the Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan for her sake.

The objective of the Windows Supplemental Annuity Plan is to establish a uniform program throughout the Southern Baptist Convention to provide annuities for the WIDOWS OF MEMBERS OF A MINISTERS RETIREMENT PLAN of a state Convention of the Southern Baptist Convention, administered by the Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, where such members die before entering upon age retirement annuity or who die while receiving a disability annuity provided under a Ministers Retirement Plan.

For HER sake, think with us brethren! Concerning the cost — the contributions are based on the following percentages of salary basis according to age; up to 59, inclusive — 1½ per cent; 60 to 69, inclusive — 2 per cent; 70 and up — 2½ per cent. Now, in addition to the contribution you make, your convention matches it with a like amount and both contributions are based upon the salary basis upon which the member is paying contributions under the Ministers Retirement Plan.

Now you are interested in the benefits of the plan, and of course, you ought to be interested in knowing what you will get for your money.

In the event of the death of a member before entering upon age retirement annuity or
after entering upon a disability retirement
annuity, during a fiscal year for which all of
the member's contributions have been paid in
full and convention contributions have also
been paid in full, an annuity shall be payable
to the widow of such member in equal monthly payments effective from the date of the
death of the member, ceasing with her death
or remarriage.

The amount she is to receive is based upon a percentage of a potential age retirement annuity, which annuity shall be the equivalent of 50 per cent of the average basis of the member upon which contributions have been paid, as follows:

The first year of eligibility she will receive 20 per cent; the second year 24 per cent; the third year 28 per cent; the fourth year, 32 per cent; the fifth year 36 per cent; and, the sixth year 40 per cent. If the widow at the

date of the death of the member is younger than her husband by ten years there is a reduction in benefits and we will furnish this information to those it may affect.

. Now Brethren, the fiscal year in Arkansas is from January 1 of each year. In other words if you are coming into the Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan you must enter as of January 1, 1951.

Just suppose the Lord should call you home TODAY, would your widow be taken care of properly or would she and the children be forced to do without things you would want them to have or become objects of charity? We want to insist for the sake of your family, that you pray about this matter and send in for application blanks. We respectfully suggest that a regular income is much more to be preferred than a lump sum payment which would soon be gone.
