

#### CONSTITUTION

#### Article I. - The Name

The name of this body shall be "The Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

# Article II. - The Purpose

The purpose of this Convention shall be to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer co-operation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God.

The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention on May 9, 1963, shall be the doctrinal guideline for this Convention.

# Article III. - Membership

Section 1. The Convention shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Convention, and which desire to co-operate with other churches through this Convention.

Regular Baptist churches are those Baptist churches which in doctrine and in practice adhere to the principles and the spirit of The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the 1963 session of the Southern Baptist Convention, and The Baptist Faith and Message shall not be interpreted as to permit open communion and/or alien immersion.

Section 2. Each co-operating church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for each additional one hundred members, or major fraction thereof above one hundred, provided however, that no church shall be entitled to a total of more than ten messengers.

Section 3. The Convention may appoint a committee on credentials at each session which shall make recommendations to the Convention with reference to seating messengers from any church not hitherto affiliated with the Convention.

# Article IV. - Authority

Section 1. While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, this Convention shall never exercise any authority whatever over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the constitution of any church, or with the exercise of its functions as the only ecclesiastical body, but will cheerfully recognize and uphold the absolute independence of the churches.

# Article V. - Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Each officer of the Convention shall be elected annually, except the Recording Secretary and Treasurer who shall be the same as the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board, and shall continue in office until his successor in office shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the

deliberations of the Convention and to discharge such other duties as may devolve upon the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all committees unless the Convention shall otherwise determine. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in his stead.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of the proceedings of the Convention, to edit and arrange publication of a suitable number of the minutes for distribution among the churches, as the Convention may direct, as soon as reasonably possible after the close of the session. He shall file and keep in order all papers deemed important to the work of the Convention.

# Article VI. - The Executive Board

Section 1. This Convention shall elect a Board of Trustees as provided for in the Convention's charter. This Board shall be known as the "Executive Board of Arkansas Baptist State Convention." This Board shall be composed of one member from the bounds of each co-operating association with a membership up to 5,000, and one additional member for each additional 5,000 constituency, or major fraction thereof, provided however, that no association shall be entitled to more than five (5) members. In addition, the convention shall elect one lady from the bounds of each of the eight districts in the state to serve on the Executive Board. Upon the removal of any Executive Board member from the bounds of his or her association, his or her membership on the Executive Board ceases therewith; his or her successor in office may be named by the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board to hold office until the next meeting of the Convention. No member of this board shall hold any remunerative office under the Convention or any of its institutions. One-third of this board shall be elected annually to hold office for three years, and a majority of the board members shall constitute a quorum. Any member of the Executive Board who misses all the Executive Board meetings and the Executive Board committee meetings for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on the Board.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall be constituted and empowered by the Convention as its business and legal agent to administer all business committed to it by the Convention, and to employ such paid agents as it may deem necessary in carrying out the missionary, educational, benevolent and financial enterprises of the Convention. The Executive Board shall raise, collect, receive and disburse all the funds of the Baptist Cooperative Program, both state and southwide. The office of the Executive Board shall be a clearing house for administering the business affairs of the Convention, and a headquarters for Baptist information. Its books, records and files shall at all time be open for the reference and inspection of any co-operating church which may desire to examine them.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall render to the Convention annually a complete and detailed statement of all its business for the year.

# Article VII. - Trusteeships

The Convention shall elect trustees to manage and to operate its colleges, hospitals, orphanages and any other institutions it may possess, as follows:

Section 1. Ouachita Baptist University, 24; Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services, 18; Baptist Memorial Hospital, 9; Southern Baptist College, 24.

Section 2. One-third of the members of the Boards of Trustees shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. Any member of any Board

of Trustees who misses all the meetings of that Board for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on that Board.

Section 3. Each Board of Trustees shall elect from their membership a chairman and a recording secretary and such other officers as seems advisable.

Section 4. All trusteeships shall render to the Convention at each annual session complete and detailed reports of all transactions and business and any other activities for the year, and shall be subject to the direction of the Convention in all matters pertaining to administering the affairs of the institution with which their trusteeship is concerned.

# Article VIII. - Operation of Agencies

Section 1. Each board, agency, and institution of this Convention shall submit to the Executive Board at its annual budget planning meeting, which is to be held prior to the annual meeting of the Convention, a detailed statement of its sources of income, and a budget of proposed expenditures for the ensuing year. When received and adopted by the Convention, these budgets shall become the basis for the operations for the ensuing year.

# Article IX. - Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall meet annually, "if God permit," on a date to be fixed by the Convention. The Executive Board is empowered in emergencies to call special sessions of the Convention and to change either the time or place of meeting or both should the occasion demand.

#### Article X. - Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of this Convention, two-thirds of the members voting concurring in the measure, except Article IV which shall remain forever unalterable in substance.

Section 2. Any proposed amendment to this Constitution shall be presented to the Convention in writing, for its consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, and may be voted on, on any subsequent day during the session, provided adequate publicity has been given in previous announcement.

# Article XI. - Parliamentary Authority

Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard for deciding questions of parliamentary procedure.

# Article XII. - Districts

The Convention shall establish such geographic districts as it may deem wise to facilitate its promotion, administration, and organization of its objectives, provided, it will never violate in any way the boundaries of any association within the area of the convention. The boundaries of such districts shall be drawn so as to provide equitable geographical and numerical voice and representation on all convention committees, commissions, boards, except the Executive Board, all trusteeships. Each tenth year hereafter, the whole matter of districts shall be readjusted to take in consideration the flow of membership in our Baptist churches.

# BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are enacted for the government of the Convention.

# 1. Enrollment of Messengers

The Secretary of the Convention shall enroll, upon arrival, messengers who present proper credentials from the churches. These messengers, together with others who may be enrolled upon presentation of approved credentials during the session, shall constitute the Convention. Any contention concerning seating messengers shall be presented to a committee appointed by the President for recommendation to the Convention for its action.

# 2. Officers

The President, First Vice-President, and Second Vice-President shall be elected on the second day of the Convention, their terms of office to begin with the final session of the Convention.

The election of all officers shall be by ballot; provided, however, there is only one nomination for the office, then the Secretary or any other present may be directed to cast the ballot of the entire assembly for the single nominee.

The first vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after balloting for the president has been completed and the winner announced, and the second vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after the balloting for the first vice president has been completed and the winner announced.

Each officer of the Convention shall be elected by a majority of all votes cast.

In case of removal from office, by death or otherwise, of the President, the Vice-Presidents shall automatically succeed to the office of President in the order of their election. The President may not be elected for more than two consecutive terms.

The Treasurer of the Executive Board shall be also Treasurer of the Convention.

All elected officers of this Convention shall be members of churches co-operating with this Convention. This must also apply to members of the Executive Board and the institutional boards of this Convention.

#### 3. The Executive Board

The Executive Board, being the legal trustee of the Convention, shall be empowered by the Convention to administer all business committed to it by the Convention.

The Executive Board is empowered to act for the Convention between sessions of the Convention, provided that is shall never exercise any authority contrary to the expressed will of the Convention.

When any unforeseen emergency occurs in any of the affairs of the Convention, or in any of the interest it controls, that in the judgment of the Executive Board requires action before the next session of the Convention, the Executive Board shall have full authority to take such action as may seem necessary, and all interests concerned shall be governed by such action, provided the Executive Board shall make full report of all matters pertaining thereunto to the next session of the Convention for its approval, and

provided further, that nothing in this article shall be construed as giving the Executive Board authority to execute any matter already committed by the Convention to any of its Boards of Trustees or its institutions unless such Board when so commissioned shall decline to act on the orders of the Convention.

All proposals requiring the expenditures of money by the Convention, or the Executive Board of the Convention, from the annual budget, shall be considered by the Executive Board, before being presented to the Convention.

This Board shall be charged with the responsibility to have the books and financial affairs of each and all of the boards and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention audited annually by an accredited firm of auditors, all audits to be accessible to the Executive Board at its budget planning session, and to be included in the institution's report to the Convention.

Members of the Executive Board, having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

The various associations of Arkansas whose churches are affiliated with this Convention, may submit to the committee on nominations names of those whom they believe should be considered for membership on the Executive Board as members from that association.

# 4. Trusteeships

All trusteeships of this Convention shall be amenable to the Convention on all matters, through its Executive Board. No trusteeship shall conduct extra movements to raise money outside its regular revenue-producing sources, nor shall a deficit in running expense or debt be incurred without the approval of the Convention in session or of the Executive Board in case of aforementioned emergencies, except, as follows: when an emergency arises concerning the opportunity to purchase needed property for expansion, the president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board and the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board (all three concurring) believing such an emergency exists and deeming it wise to incur indebtedness, may give the Trustees of an institution such permission, and make a full report to the Executive Board and to the next Convention in session.

Members of Boards of Trustees having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

Not more than two (2) members of a Board of Trustees shall at the same time be members of the same local church, nor shall more than six (6) members reside in any one association.

A member of a Board of Trustees of one institution of the Convention may not at the same time be a member of any other Board of Trustees of another institution of the Convention.

No member of a Board of Trustees of any institution of this Convention may at the same time be a member of the Executive Board of the Convention.

#### 5. Committee Members

- 1. A nine-member rotating Nominating Committee, comprised of at least three laymen, will place in nomination at each annual convention names of persons to fill vacancies on all convention boards. At each annual convention, the president will appoint one-third of this committee to three-year terms to replace the one-third rotating off, plus filling any vacancies that may exist on the committee at that time. Nominations for all boards from this Nominating Committee must be as equitably divided as possible between the eight existing districts of our state convention. The president shall also name the chairman, who shall come from a one-year term member.
- 2. A member filling an unexpired term not having served the full term of years as provided by the Constitution, shall be, at the discretion of the Nominating Committee, eligible for election to a full term.
- 3. No member of a commission or committee delegated to study or make recommendations concerning our institutions shall be a member of any Board of Trustees of such institutions.
- 4. All associational missionaries or mission pastors receiving all or part compensation from the Convention through the Executive Board shall be considered employees of the Convention and shall not be members of any Convention or institutional board. The president of the Convention by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Board for the duration of his term of office.

# 6. Constitution and By-Laws Committee

A standing Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be composed of six (6) members to be nominated by the Nominating Committee. One-third of the membership (2) shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three (3) years. No member shall be eligible to serve more than two terms until one year has elapsed.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of advising the presiding officer concerning constitutional matters during the annual session of the convention with reference to matters which may arise from the floor or from other committees. The committee will act ad interim in all matters concerning the Constitution and By-Laws referred to it by the boards and agencies of the convention. The committee will receive all proposed constitutional changes before the convention and will be responsible for presenting them in writing, for convention consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, after adequate publicity has been given. The duties of the committee in no way preclude amendments to the constitution by messengers to the convention.

#### APPENDICES

1. Doctrinal Guidelines (1970 Annual, page 61)

Report of the Committee of Twenty-Five adopted, including the recommendation that the SBC statement of faith of 1963, *The Baptist Faith and Message*, be adopted as doctrinal guidelines for our convention.

2. Appendices (1967 annual, page 40)

Resolution adopted that a search be made of the minutes of the convention to discover policies and interpretations which have been adopted in past years, and these interpretations and policies be added at the end of the constitution and by laws of the convention as appendices.

3. Church Ordinances (1965 annual, page 31)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, in the past, the most general interpretation of the New Testament, and the most general interpretation of the Word 'principles' as it is used in Article 3, Section 1, of our constitution, and the most prevalent practice of Baptist churches in Arkansas with reference to the church ordinances, has been what is commonly called "close baptism" and "close communion", and

Whereas, it is recorded on page 57 of the minutes of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention meeting in Fort Smith in 1937 that the Convention officially objected to the teaching of alien immersion and open communion in one of our seminaries, thereby establishing a precedence for future conventions, therefore,

Be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in its 112th annual session, go on record as objecting to the reception of alien immersion and the practice of open communion, and

Be it further resolved that we urge churches everywhere to re-examine the New Testament teaching on baptism and the Lord's Supper.

4. Federal Aid (1965 annual, page 43)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, Arkansas Baptists have been faced with the issue of Federal aid to private institutions, and, whereas, many feel that the acceptance of such funds violates the cherished Baptist position of the separation of church and state, therefore, be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention go on record as reaffirming our traditional Baptist position on the separation of church and state, and that we urge all of our Baptist institutions and programs to respect this principle.

5. Executive Board Recommendations (1963 annual, page 35)

Voted that all recommendations of the Executive Board shall be published in the *Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine* one month prior to the meeting of the state convention.

6. Book of Reports (1959 annual, page 28)

Voted that the convention constitution and by-laws be printed each year in the Book of Reports for the convenience of our messengers.

7. Baptist Memorial Hospital Trustees (1959 annual, page 29)

Voted that the members of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, not be included in the ruling which would prevent their serving on this board and one other convention board.

8. Capital Indebtedness (1959 annual, page 30)

Voted that all requests for capital indebtedness by any convention institution or agency must be submitted to the Executive Board at least 90 days in advance of the July meeting of the Executive Board.

 Out-of-state participation by Executive Board staff (1953 annual, page 22)

Voted that we recommend the Cooperative Program as the best method of giving financial support to the Baptist work at home and abroad. We discourage any of the departments of our Arkansas Baptist work in accepting invitations to participate in the work of missions outside of our regular work within our state territory, at the expense of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention Departments involved. Further, we request our Executive Secretary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the President of the Executive Board confer with the heads of all Southern Baptist agencies expressing our concern about the practices of asking State Convention departments to give employees to such efforts outside our state, unless expenses and salaries are provided for by the agencies that use such workers.

10. Seating of Messengers (1949 annual, page 92)

Resolution adopted that this convention refuse to seat any messengers from any church that accepts alien immersion; practices open communion; or affiliates with any branch of the Federal Council of Churches, World Council of Churches; or any other organization similar to or growing out of such.

# THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE

## I. THE SCRIPTURES

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is the record of God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. It reveals the principles by which God judges us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. The criterion by which the Bible is to be interpreted is Jesus Christ.

Ex. 24:4; Deut. 4:1-2; 17:19; Josh. 8:34; Psalm 19:7-10; 119:11, 89, 105, 140; Isa. 34:16; 40:8; Jer. 15:16; 36; Matt. 5:17-18; 22:29; Luke 21:33; 24:44-46; John 5:39; 16:13-15; 17:17; Acts 2:16 ff.; 17:11; Rom. 15:4; 16:25-26; 2 Tim. 3:15-17; Heb. 1:1-2; 4:12; 1 Peter 1:25; 2 Peter 1:19-21

#### II. GOD

There is one and only one living and true God. He is an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Redeemer, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe. God is infinite in holiness and all other perfections. To Him we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. The eternal God reveals Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

#### A. God the Father

God as Father reigns with providential care over His universe, His creatures, and the flow of the stream of human history according to the purposes of His grace. He is all powerful, all loving, and all wise. God is Father in truth to those who become children of God through faith in Jesus Christ. He is fatherly in His attitude toward all men.

# B. God the Son

Christ is the eternal Son of God. In His incarnation as Jesus Christ he was conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. Jesus perfectly revealed and did the will of God, taking upon Himself the demands and necessities of human nature and identifying Himself completely with mankind yet without sin. He honored the divine law by His personal obedience, and in His death on the cross He made

provision for the redemption of men from sin. He was raised from the dead with a glorified body and appeared to His disciples as the person who was with them before His crucifixion. He ascended into heaven and is now exalted at the right hand of God where He is the One Mediator, partaking of the nature of God and of man, and in whose Person is effected the reconciliation between God and man. He will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission. He now dwells in all believers as the living and ever present Lord.

# C. God the Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of God. He inspired holy men of old to write the Scriptures. Through illumination He enables men to understand truth. He exalts Christ. He convicts of sin, of righteousness and of judgment. He calls men to the Saviour, and effects regeneration. He cultivates Christian character, comforts believers, and bestows the spiritual gifts by which they serve God through His church. He seals the believer unto the day of final redemption. His presence in the Christian is the assurance of God to bring the believer into the fulness of the stature of Christ. He enlightens and empowers the believer and the church in worship, evangelism, and service.

#### III. MAN

Man was created by the special act of God, in His own image, and is the crowning work of His creation. In the beginning man was innocent of sin and was endowed by His Creator with freedom of choice. By his free choice man sinned against God and brought sin into the human race. Through the temptation of Satan man transgressed the command of God, and fell from his original innocence; whereby his posterity inherit a nature and an environment inclined toward sin, and as soon as they are capable of moral action become transgressors and are under condemnation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human

personality is evident in that God created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore every man possesses dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

#### IV. SALVATION

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, sanctification, and glorification.

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace. Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer into a relationship of peace and favor with God.

B. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.

C. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

#### V. GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sancti-

fied by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, bring reproach on the cause of Christ, and temporal judgments on themselves, yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

#### VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is a local body of baptized believers who are associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel, observing the two ordinances of Christ, committed to His teachings, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth.

This church is an autonomous body, operating through democratic processes under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. In such a congregation members are equally responsible. Its Scriptural officers are pastors and deacons.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages.

# VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

# VIII. THE LORD'S DAY

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed

in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, work of necessity and mercy only being excepted.

#### IX. THE KINGDOM

The Kingdom of God includes both His general sovereignty over the universe and His particular kingship over men who willfully acknowledge Him as King. Particularly the Kingdom is the realm of salvation into which men enter by trustful, childlike commitment to Jesus Christ. Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

#### X. LAST THINGS

God, in His own time and in His own way, will bring the world to its appropriate end. According to His promise, Jesus Christ will return personally and visibly in glory to the earth; the dead will be raised; and Christ will judge all men in righteousness. The unrighteous will be consigned to Hell, the place of everlasting punishment. The righteous in their resurrected and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

# XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavor to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

#### XII. EDUCATION

The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

#### XIII. STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proprortionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

# XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such cooperation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

#### XV. THE CHRISTIAN AND THE SOCIAL ORDER

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in his own life and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Tesus. The Christian should oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice. He should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their lovalty to Christ and His truth.

#### XVI. PEACE AND WAR

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace

with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love.

#### XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not con-trary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

John McClanahan, Pine Bluff, chairman, called for a meeting of the Resolutions Committee and requested that all resolutions for the consideration of the committee should be in writing.

No proposed amendments to the constitution were read.

- A. C. Uth, Searcy, chairman of the Tellers Committee, moved that only the numbered ballots included in the messenger packets be used as official ballots for the convention. Second and carried.
- 4. Fraternal greetings were received from the following: P. N. Curian, New Delhi, India, president, All India Prayer Fellowship, who was introduced by Don Moore, Fort Smith, for brief words of greeting; Dr. Fred T. Guy, Little Rock, president, Missionary Baptist State Convention Consolidated; Dr. G. R. Mazique, Helena, president, and Dr. W. O. Lindsey, Little Rock, recording secretary, Regular Arkansas Missionary Convention, Inc.; Dr. J. C. Oliver, Little Rock, president, Arkansas Baptist College. President South requested all the foreign missionaries present to stand.

President South gave a forecast of the convention program.

Eldridge L. Miller, Fort Smith, on behalf of Pastor William L. Bennett, First, Fort Smith, extended a welcome to the messengers to attend the State Evangelism Conference, January 22-23, 1973.

Jesse S. Reed, secretary, Evangelism, reported baptisms for the year total 14,540, over two thousand more than the previous year and the greatest number of baptisms in sixteen years.

The death of Mrs. C. W. Caldwell, Little Rock, was announced with funeral services to be held Nov. 15, 2 p.m.; at Pulaski Heights, Little Rock. Jesse Reed moved that this convention send a message of condolence to the Caldwell family. Second and carried.

- 5. John McClanahan read a proposed resolution from the Rocky Bayou Southern Baptist Association concerning the opening of hunting season on Sunday by the Game and Fish Commission. Dr. John Miller, Camden, read a proposed resolution concerning abortion on demand. The resolutions were referred to the Resolutions Committee for consideration.
- 6. The 50th Anniversary of Baptist Student work was observed with a slide presentation directed by Arliss Dickerson, Arkadelphia. The BSU Chorale, composed of students from ten campuses in Arkansas, sang "Here Is My Life" and "There's a Sweet Sweet Spirit" directed by Rick Ramsey, ASU, Jonesboro. Personal testimonies were given by Susan Atchison, HSC; Andy Haney, ASU; and Susan Koury, ASU.
- 7. W. O. Vaught, Jr., chairman, Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign, reported that four and one-half million dollars have been pledged in Phase I of the campaign, led by Alvin W. (Bo) Huffman, Jr., Blytheville. A brief message was heard from Jim Tillman, Little Rock, former Walnut Ridge pastor, who will now direct Phase II, to raise the total amount pledged and to enlist support of other churches who have not pledged assistance to the campaign.

8. Ural Clayton led the messengers in singing, "Amazing Grace." Dr. South introduced the speaker and following a solo by Martha Branham, "I Shail Never Forget the Day," W. A. Criswell, Dallas, Texas closed the session with his message, "Why Christian Education."

The session was adjourned in prayer by Arliss Dickerson.

- 9. The session was opened with Paul Sanders, Little Rock, First Vice President, presiding. Following organ and piano prelude, Jim Raymick, North Little Rock, led the messengers in singing, "I Love Thee" and Paul Sanders led in prayer.
- W. Harold Hicks, retired pastor, Little Rock, led in observing Memorial Moments for those the Lord has called home since the last meeting. Following a period of quiet meditation, Dr. Hicks led in prayer.

#### MEMORIAL MOMENTS

### W. Harold Hicks

The purpose of these Memorial Moments is to call our hearts and minds to grateful remembrance of that host of beloved family members and faithful fellow Christians who have been called by their Lord into his glorious presence.

For these brief minutes this convention turns from its plans for the future, and even from the considerations of the present, to bring into the prominent places of our minds and hearts the memory of those whom "we have loved and now have lost awhile." How sad and poor is that person or people who become so enamoured and preoccupied with present pursuits that they fail to remember with honor and esteem those who have laid the foundations upon which we build, who, under God, served their day in the kingdom with courage, conviction, and consecration. If we are a people of strength and power today, it is because, under God and His blessings, those have gone before us as Baptists bequeathed to us a goodly heritage.

The ancient Romans had the custom of placing the statues and busts of their distinguished ancestors in the vestibules of their homes that they and their children might be constantly reminded of their greatness and led to initiate their noble deeds.

As we pause in a few moments, before we are led in audible prayer, I am inviting you to bow in meditation — allowing your mind to dwell in loving remembrance on those who have loved and who have served the Lord with joy and faithfulness. May the memory of them fill the vestibules of our hearts and minds.

We shall also be aware of those who have even in recent hours watched loved ones close their earthly journey and step across Jordan into Christ's heavenly mansion. For all who bear the burdens of separation and lonliness we make our intercessions to the Lord who promised His children, "I will never leave you nor forsake you."

The words of our Lord are always our greatest source of comfort and strength. Let us hear his words as recorded in John 14: 1-6,

"Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. In a new feature for this period Dr. Ashcraft requested new retirees from active pastorate or other work be recognized. Erwin L. McDonald, retired editor, Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine, was present.

12. The introduction of President South was made by Paul Sanders. The messengers were led in singing "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross" by Jim Raymick and the Park Hill, North Little Rock, Chorale, sang "Behold He Cometh," directed by Jim Raymick. Following a medley arrangement of "Great is Thy Faithfulness" and "My Lord is Near Me All the Time" by Mr. Raymick, Rheubin L. South brought the President's Address, "The Day of March Has Come," with the text from Joshua 14:6-15.

### 13. Election of Officers

First Vice President Paul Sanders called for nominations for president. Rheubin L. South was nominated for a second term. Following motion and second that the nominations cease and Dr. South be elected by acclamation, and carried, the vote of the entire convention for Dr. South was cast by Charles H. Ashcraft, executive secretary.

With R. L. South presiding, nominations for first vice president were called for. Those nominated were E. E. Boone, Wynne, and Padgett Cope, Little Rock. Ballot #1 was used for voting and the tellers retired to count the votes. E. E. Boone was elected first vice president.

#### 14. Miscellaneous business

(1) James E. Hampton, missionary to Tanzania, East Africa, presented President South with a gavel made from Tanzanian ebony and carved in the shape of the freedom torch which is the symbol of the country of Tanzania. The gavel was given not only to call the convention to order but also when used to call the people to prayer for their servants around the world.

- (2) Robert Bauman, manager, Baptist Book Store, announced that the book store would occupy a new location at 4418 South University Avenue, Little Rock, early in 1973. Mr. Bauman said that further plans call for the opening of a "Lifeway" store at another location sometime in the future.
- (3) Dale Cowling, Little Rock, introduced Ragon Courtney, actor, lyricist and playwright, now with the Christian Drama and Music Center, Little Rock. The musical drama "Celebrated Life", based on the story of Jesus as related by Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, will be produced at the Arkansas Arts Center, Little Rock, November 22-25.
- (4) Ural Clayton told of plans for the Music Men of Arkansas to assist in a pilot project of work in Alaska in the fall of 1973. Thirty-nine churches have requested assistance during the Alaska Crusade. Volunteers whose churches can provide expenses, estimated to be about \$450, will spend two weeks in the State of Alaska helping develop a music ministry and work in other areas.
- (5) Justice Carleton Harris, Pine Bluff, read a resolution honoring Erwin L. McDonald, retired editor, Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine, presenting him a plaque from the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention.
- J. Everett Sneed, Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine, presented a plaque to Dr. McDonald on behalf of the executive board, because of his fifteen years service as editor, serving the longest tenure as editor of the Arkansas paper. Dr. McDonald's retirement was effective March 1, 1972. In brief acceptance remarks Dr. McDonald expressed appreciation to the Baptists of Arkansas and to the faithful staff of the Newsmagazine.

15. Executive Board report

The Executive Board report was presented by Dillard S. Miller, president, assisted by Loyd Hunnicutt, chairman, Operating Committee; John McClanahan, chairman, Program Committee; and Gerald Trussell, chairman, Finance Committee. The following Executive Board Recommendations were approved:

(1) Housing Allowance for Retired Ordained Ministers
John McClanahan moved that actual expense for housing
up to one-third of the total retirement annuity received through
the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention shall
constitute a rental allowance paid as part of the retired ordained
minister's compensation for past services. Second and carried.

(2) 1973-74 Emphasis – "Share the Word Now"
On motion by John McClanahan, second and carried, the following was approved:

"That the Arkansas Baptist State Convention suggested program and theme for 1973-74 be "Share the Word Now." This program coordinates the state ten year program with the Southern Baptist Convention long-range program for the decade of the seventies.

"That the state Sunday School Department lead the state emphasis, and suggest a calendar of events and resource materials which the church may consider in planning their work.

"That the Sunday School program for 1973-74, "People Now," be supported by the Missions Department program, "Extend Now," the Evangelism Department program, "Win Now," and other department programs support the promotion in appropriate ways."

Lawson Hatfield spoke to the recommendation and introduced the promotion with a specially prepared fifteen months calendar for July, 1973 to September, 1974.

(3) 1973 Budget

On the recommendation of the Executive Board, Gerald Trussell moved that the \$3,327,457 budget for 1973 be adopted. Second and carried. (See page 62)

- 16. Dillard Miller moved that the "SPIRIT OF '76" Committee be adopted to plan for an emphasis on evangelism and patriotism in 1976, the 200th anniversary of our nation. Second and carried. (See page 60)
- 17. Dillard Miller moved that the following persons be elected by the convention to serve as members of the permanent State Joint Committee from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention for Work with National Baptists: Rheubin L. South, North Little Rock; Dr. James Sawyer, Benton; and Mrs. R. A. Coppenger, Arkadelphia. Second and carried.
- 18. Jim Raymick led the messengers in singing, "Trusting Jesus," and President South introduced Bernes K. Selph, Benton, for the Annual Convention Sermon. Martha Branham sang, "God did a Wonderful Thing for Me" and "There's More, So Much More," and scripture was from Rev. 5: 1-13, read by Charles Mayo, Benton. Dr. Selph's message was "Jesus, Our Lord."

The session was adjourned in prayer by Loyd Hunnicutt.

### SECOND DAY - AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, November 15, 1972

(Election of Officers continued – Report of Nominating Committee)

19. With Dr. James Sawyer, Benton, Second Vice President presiding, the session opened with Ben Prince leading the messengers in singing, "Standing on the Promises." Special music was by Ben Prince, "I Trust in God."

The scripture reading was from Acts 20:17-32, by Earl Verser, Eudora, who led in prayer.

- 20. The second study in Galatians was brought by J. W. MacGorman.
- 21. Following the singing of the hymn, "I Stand Amazed in the Presence" the election of officers was continued and nominations for second

vice president were called for. Those nominated were Earl Verser, layman from Eudora, and James E. Hill, Jr., pastor, Hot Springs. Ballot #2 was used for voting and the tellers retired to count the votes. Earl Verser was elected second vice president.

### 22. Miscellaneous business

(1) Lendol Jackson, Walnut Ridge, invited the messengers to Southern Baptist College for the annual Church Efficiency

Conference, Dec. 4-6, 1972.

(2) President South called Frank S. Groner, Administrator, Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis; and John A. Gilbraeth, executive director, Baptist Medical Center Systems, Little Rock, to the platform for presentation to the convention and expressed appreciation to them for their dedication to the Christian ministry of healing.

23. Report of Nominating Committee

Mason Craig, chairman, assisted by James E. Hill, Jr. read the report of the Nominating Committee. James E. Hill Jr. moved the report of the Nominating Committee be adopted. Second and carried. (for directory of board members see page 9)

- 24. Johnny Biggs, executive director, brought the report of the Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services. (Printed Report, see page 91)
- 25. Edward Harris, executive director, brought the report for the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, Inc. Dr. Harris reported that the work is largely supported by Methodists and Baptists in Arkansas. He urged caution on the part of the messengers against the wet forces in the state now striking for a hold in the state through the many resort communities in Arkansas.
- 26. Mason Craig moved that David George, pastor, First, Stuttgart, be elected to a vacancy on the BSU Advisory Committee for District 8 vacancy. Second and carried.
- 27. Ben Prince led the messengers in singing, "O Happy Day." Following a solo by Martha Branham, "Amazing Grace," John Ed Steely, professor of historical theology, Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina, brought the address on theological education.

The session was adjourned in prayer by Reece Howard, former Arkansas pastor, now retired and living in Texas.

### SECOND DAY — EVENING SESSION

Wednesday, November 15, 1972

 $(Christian\ Education\ -For\ eign\ Missions)$ 

28. Following piano and organ prelude President Rheubin L. South called the session to order and opened with the messengers singing, "All Hail The Power", led by Carl Sewald, Choral Department, Southern Baptist College, Walnut Ridge.

The Southern Baptist College choir, directed by Dr. Sewald, sang arrangements of "The Great Physician," "God of Grace, God of Glory," and "Praise to the Lord the Almighty."

29. Stephen Hatfield, Little Rock, freshman, Ouachita Baptist University, read the scripture, I Cor. 9:17-23, and led in prayer.

Martha Branham sang a medley, "Whiter Than Snow," "Are you Washed," and "There is a Fountain."

- 30. In keeping with the ten year emphases on the various executive board programs, the Baptist Building was represented by the Church Training Department for 1972-73 emphasis. Ralph W. Davis, Secretary, Church Training, introduced Forrest Watkins, Church Training Consultant, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, for a visual presentation on "CHURCH—The Sunday Night Place."
  - 31. Voted: to adopt reports of Executive Board Programs.

    Ralph W. Davis moved that all Baptist Building reports printed in the Book of Reports be adopted. Second and carried.
  - 32. Voted: to adopt the Southern Baptist College Report.

    H. E. Williams, president, moved the Southern Baptist College report be adopted as found in the Book of Reports. Second and carried. Dr. Williams brought a message on Christian education.
- 33. Daniel R. Grant, president, Ouachita Baptist University, presented a gavel to President South made from timbers of Old North Dorm, erected in 1891, and torn down in 1972 to make way for a new structure.

Voted: to adopt the Ouachita report.

Dr. Grant moved the report of Ouachita Baptist University be adopted as found in the Book of Reports. Second and carried. Dr. Grant spoke to the report.

- 34. Charles Wright, professor of music, Ouachita Baptist University, led the messengers in singing, "Rejoice Ye Pure in Heart." The 150 voice choir of Ouachita, with Dr. Wright directing and brass ensemble accompaniment, sang, "God of Our Fathers," "Battle Hymn," and "Joyful Joyful We Adore Thee" and received a standing ovation.
- 35. W. O. Vaught, Jr., Little Rock, member of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, reported that the board would meet in Little Rock, April 8-10, 1974. Dr. Vaught said the Baptists of Arkansas would be in for a moving experience in attending the commissioning service for new missionaries in the Tuesday night service, April 9.

Following introductory remarks by W. O. Vaught, Jr., the Adult and Youth Choirs of Immanuel, Little Rock, set the mood for the speaker of the evening in a colorful dramatic and choral presentation featuring Joe and Donna Helms in "I'm Glad I'm an American."

The flags of all nations were in parade and displayed before a large American flag especially made for the service, as the choirs sang "Battle Hymn," an appropriate setting for the speaker just before the opening of the Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions and the Lottie Moon Offering.

The speaker for the closing message of the day was Baker James Cauthen, executive secretary, Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Missionaries, active and retired; parents of missionaries, "MK's",

and pastors of churches who have sent missionaries were given special recognition by Dr. Cauthen. The message was "Some Things to Remember in a World Task" with the text from Deuteronomy.

The sessions of the day were adjourned in prayer by James E. Hampton, missionary to Tanzania, East Africa.

#### THIRD DAY — MORNING SESSION

Thursday, November 16, 1972

(Dedication of Annual – Report of Resolutions Committee)

36. The final session was opened with organ and piano prelude music. Joe Helms, Little Rock, led the messengers in singing, "There's Within My Heart a Melody" and sang a solo, "I Have Come From the Darkness."

Andrew Setliffe, Little Rock, read the scripture and led in prayer.

- 37. J. W. MacGorman brought the concluding study in Galatians.
- 38. George T. Blackmon, executive secretary, brought the report of the Arkansas Baptist History Commission.

Voted: to adopt the report of the Arkansas Baptist History Commission.

### ARKANSAS BAPTIST HISTORY COMMISSION

George T. Blackmon, Executive Secretary OBU Box 862, Arkadelphia 71923

#### I. ORGANIZATION

The History Commission was set up by a resolution in the 1960 annual session of the Convention. It is composed of nine (9) members — One (1) from each of eight (8) districts and one (1) member-at-large as chairman. Each member is elected to a three (3) year term; one third rotate off each year. The Executive Secretary does not rotate.

#### II. FUNCTIONS

The commission is the agency of the Convention in the field of history. It is engaged in locating, collecting and preserving on positive microfilm documents of Baptist churches, associations, and state and national bodies. Its greatest achievement has been in collecting files of associational minutes of each of eleven (11) separate national Baptist denominations which have affiliate churches in Arkansas.

### III. HOLDINGS

The old Historical Society held forty (40) reels of Positive Microfilm of Associational Minutes; ten (10) reels have been added in 1972. Several reels of Manuscripts and other Baptist documents have also been added:

Thirty- two bound volumes of Associational Minutes have been added with the Cooperation of Riley Library. Twenty bound volumes of mail-outs of local churches and associations have also been added.

The Commission has collected two hundred (200) minutes of Baptist Associations in Arkansas and complete files of four (4) local churches, some dating back to 1853.

### IV. PROJECTS

The Commission urges all churches and associations in the state to put it on their mailing list for the coming year. Separate reels of positive microfilm of several associations may now be obtained from the Historical Commission of the State of Arkansas, Memorial Building, Little Rock. The loan, for microfilming, of minutes of churches organized before 1870 would greatly speed up the writing of an updated history of Baptists. The Commission cooperates with the Historical Commission, SBC, in every phase of its work. Membership in the Southern Baptist Historical Society (\$5.00 per year) carries with it the borrowing privileges from the library in Nashville, Tennessee. Send fees, applications, and requests to Dr. Lynn May, 127 Ninth Ave. N., Nashville, Tenn. 37234.

39. Arlen Waldrup, El Dorado, president of the Board of Trustees, brought a report from the Arkansas Baptist Foundation.

Voted: to adopt the report of Arkansas Baptist Foundation as found in the Book of Reports with the recommendation that receipts from undesignated gifts be given to the operation of the Foundation.

- 40. Stanley Williamson, Stewardship Commission, Nashville, Tennessee, presented an award to Carroll County Association as the first Southern Baptist association in 1971 and 1972 to have 100% Cooperative Program contributions by the churches. All churches in the association gave 10% or more. The award was made jointly by the Stewardship Commission and the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention. Receiving the award for the association were Elmer Griever, Jr., moderator, Berryville; and Jesse Holcomb, Green Forest, stewardship chairman.
- Dr. Williamson also presented to the executive secretary, representing the churches of the Arkansas convention, an award in recognition of the continued support of the Cooperative Program, an attractive framed collage of paper money and coin from around the world. The gift symbolized the translation of Cooperative Program gifts into work in many lands.
- 41. Other Southern Baptist representatives recognized for brief words of greeting were John Allen, Home Mission Board; Bo Huffman, Radio and TV Commission; Thurman Braughton, missionary to Malaysia; and B. J. Chenault, Annuity Board.

#### 42. Miscellaneous Business

- (1) President South expressed appreciation to Worthen Bank, Little Rock, for the flower arrangement sent to the auditorium for our meeting. An appropriate written thanks will be sent by the executive secretary.
- (2) Dr. South also expressed his gratitude to the following laymen who contributed beef for the Ouachita-Southern Barbecue on Wednesday evening: Sheriff Robert Moore, Arkansas City; Fay Wright, North Little Rock; Don Salmon, North Iittle Rock and Ernest Bailey, Little Rock.
- (3) President South reported that greetings had been sent to all the sister conventions in session and that return greetings had been received from sixteen conventions.

(4) Lawson Hatfield, director, Sunday School Department, honored Mary Emma Humphrey who will retire December 31, 1972 from the department by a public expression of gratitude for her twelve years' faithful work and the gift of a terrarium.

Voted: Health insurance study for church staff members.

(5) Richard Vestal, North Little Rock, moved that our executive secretary and the president of the executive board seek out the possibility of an adequate health plan that can be afforded for the church employees of our churches, their report and findings to be published in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine after being reported to the executive board meeting in December 1972. Second. John Maddux spoke to the motion. Carried.

### Voted: to dedicate 1972 annual to Lela Jane Caldwell.

- J. A. Hogan, Fort Smith, moved that the 1972 annual be dedicated to the memory of Mrs. C. W. (Lela Jane) Caldwell. Second and carried.

  Wilbur Herring read the following resolutions and moved their
  adoption. Second and carried.

# Resolution #1. Appreciation to hosts

WHEREAS the Second Baptist Church of Hot Springs, Arkansas, has graciously extended all of its facilities and services to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention meeting in the City of Hot Springs, November 14-16, 1972, and

WHEREAS the City of Hot Springs has served as the host city for the Arkansas Baptist State Convention for its 119th Annual Session, and

WHEREAS all the Southern Baptist churches in and around the City of Hot Springs have joined to make our stay a most pleasant one,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we express our genuine thanks to the host church, the host city, and the host association for all the individual and collective courtesies which have made our convention one set in attractive surroundings with most thoughtful people.

### Resolution #2. Bo Huffman and Jim Tillman

WHEREAS the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign has been greatly blessed of the Lord by dedicated and capable leadership, and

WHEREAS over four and one-half million dollars has been pledged for Ouachita Baptist University and Southern Baptist College by this united effort, and

WHEREAS the Arkansas Baptist State Convention desires to pursue this campaign to full completion,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this convention commend Alvin "Bo" Huffman, Jr. for his splendid leadership as director of the campaign in Phase I, and

That this convention pledge our support to Jim Tillman as director of Phase II of the campaign, and

That this convention express our appreciation to W. O. Vaught, Jr., Rheubin L. South, and their corps of workers who have so willingly given of their time and strength in this great cause for Christian Higher Education in the State of Arkansas.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this convention commend Brother Jesse Reed and all other personnel in the Baptist Building for their continued leadership with the churches in the important field of evangelism.

### Resolution #4. Foreign Missions

WHEREAS the presentation of Foreign Missions at the Wednesday evening session of this convention was unusually stirring and meaningful,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we express our appreciation to Dr. Rheubin L. South, Dr. W. O. Vaught, Jr., Dr. Baker James Cauthen, and all other participants for this outstanding service. We would further encourage all our churches to give generously to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions.

### Resolution #5. Baptist Student Union

WHEREAS the Baptist Student Union of the Southern Baptist Convention is currently celebrating fifty years of Christian ministry to and through college and university students across the nation, and

WHEREAS the Baptist Student Department of the Arkansas Baptist Convention has shared generously and faithfully in the campus ministries of the BSU during the forty-eight of these fifty years on Arkansas college campuses, and

WHEREAS the Baptist Student Union in Arkansas is creatively and effectively ministering to thousands of students on twenty-one Arkansas campuses, thirteen of which have Baptist Student Centers,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we commend Dr. Tom Logue, Secretary of the Student Department for the Arkansas Baptist Convention, his staff, and the BSU Directors and associates on the various campuses for their outstanding service to countless students and their inspiring leadership in evangelism, missions and Christian leadership development among some of our choicest Christian youth.

# Resolution #6. World Peace and Drug Control

WHEREAS an equitable and lasting settlement of the war in Southeast Asia, and a solution to the problem of drug abuse in our nation are two major concerns of Arkansas Baptists and all conscientious citizens of our nation,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we commend President Richard M. Nixon and his staff of advisors for their work in the areas of world peace and drug control. We also encourage their continued effort toward bringing the war in Southeast Asia to a just and lasting peace. We further encourage their continued persistence in seeking to control and eliminate the abusive use of drugs in American society.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to President Richard M. Nixon.

John McClanahan read the following resolutions and moved their adoption. Second and carried.

#### Resolution #7. Tax Aid to Private and Parochial Schools

WHEREAS during this election year several men seeking or holding public office have advocated the use of tax monies for the support of private and parochial schools, and

WHEREAS Baptists have historically interpreted such action to be a violation of the cherished principle of the separation of church and state,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this convention re-affirm its conviction that public monies should not be used for the support of private or parochial education.

### Resolution #8. Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages on State Property

WHEREAS the State Laws of Arkansas forbid the consumption of alcoholic beverages on the premises of property owned by the State, and

WHEREAS certain groups are bringing pressure upon the administration of the University of Arkansas for the right to drink such beverages on the campus, said property being owned by the State,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this convention make known its support of the present law forbidding the drinking of alcoholic beverages on state property.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the President and members of the Board of Trustees of the University, and to the Governor of the State of Arkansas.

## Resolution #9. Highway Safety

WHEREAS the number of highway fatalities has increased significantly during the past year in the State of Arkansas, and

WHEREAS transportation forecasts indicate that there will be an increasing number of motor vehicles on the highways of our state in coming years,

- BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we encourage all our residents to recognize the moral responsibility of their driving habits and to demonstrate Christian principles of courtesy and caution therein.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we commend our law enforcement officers for their efforts in behalf of highway safety, and particularly for their efforts to remove the drinking driver from our roadways.
- BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that we urge our elected representatives in the State Legislature to initiate and support legislation which will deal more forcefully with offenders who are charged with driving while intoxicated.
- BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the newly elected President of the Senate and the chairman of the House of Representatives in the Arkansas State Legislature.

Don Harbuck, El Dorado, read the following resolution and moved its adoption. There was a second. Following discussion and one speaker against the resolution the motion was carried with a divided vote.

### Resolution #10. Game and Fish Commission

WHEREAS the State of Arkansas has become a center for all types of out-door sports activities, and

WHEREAS the management of our natural wildlife resources by the Game and Fish Commission has been performed with unusual professional competence and with regard for all sections of the state and all groups of sportsmen,

- BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we commend the Game and Fish Commission for their superior management of our wildlife resources, and that we pledge them our support in these worthy endeavors and urge them to observe the practice of not setting the opening day of any hunting season on Sunday.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the officials of the Game and Fish Commission.

Don Harbuck read the following resolutions and moved their adoption. Second and carried.

### Resolution #11. Commending Public School Educators

WHEREAS the public schools in the State of Arkansas have been passing through a time of great transition and sociological change, and

WHEREAS we believe in the right of every child to receive the best possible education,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we commend those public school officials — administrators, faculty, and students — who have provided responsible moral leadership in time of great stress.

### Resolution #12. Abortion

WHEREAS in recent years the State of Arkansas has adopted laws which have broadened the base for securing legal abortions, and

WHEREAS these changes in the law have increased the potential for misinterpretation and abuse, and

WHEREAS grave dangers are attendant upon improperly regulated abortions, and

WHEREAS it is essential to the welfare of society that the sacredness of human life be affirmed and protected in all of its aspects.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that all agencies and personnel responsible for authorizing abortions be urged to give scrupulous regard to the letter and intent of the new laws, and particularly we request that they give every resistance to making abortions available simply on demand.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the convention president appoint a committee to assemble authentic materials on the complex abortion issue and make this information, along with the present resolution available to our churches and to medical personnel, societies, and agencies in Arkansas, as well as to governmental agencies, officials, and legislators in the state so that Christian insights on this subject may be more widely dissiminated and influential.

By common consent it was agreed that Resolution #7 would be sent to the appropriate officials.

44. Following the singing of the hymn, "When We Walk With the Lord" President R. L. South expressed appreciation for all the messengers to the convention musicians, Mrs. Branham, Mrs. Pilcher and Mr. Haley. Mrs. Branham's final number for the convention was "The King is Coming."

The closing message of the convention was by Owen Cooper, layman of Yazoo City, Mississippi, who is serving as president of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The One Hundred Nineteenth Annual Session was adjourned in prayer by Dillard Miller, Mena.

# Cooperative Program Receipts

We express our gratitude to Arkansas Baptists for their faithful stewardship in 1972. The Cooperative Program receipts for the first nine months of this year total \$2,257,248.29. This is a 9.13% increase over the same period last year.

### Staff Changes

R. H. Dorris, Director of Chaplaincies, was elected Director of Missions, effective November 1, 1971, following the resignation of J. T. Elliff, who moved to Oklahoma. Wilson C. Deese, West Helena pastor, was elected to fill the Chaplaincy position.

Erwin L. McDonald retired as editor of the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine, completing fifteen years' service. J. Everett Sneed, Director, Special Ministries, was named editor by the executive board in a called session, April 4, 1972, assuming this post on May 1.

Don Norrington became associate to Tom J. Logue, Baptist Student Union, moving to the Little Rock area from Beebe where he served as "roving" director. John Gilbert, Moorehead, Mississippi, was elected campus director for Arkansas Tech. Ken Watkins, Ashland, Mississippi, became associate director for the UA Fayetteville campus.

Ural Clayton, State Music Secretary, resigned to accept a position with First Baptist Church, Little Rock.

#### Executive Board

Dillard S. Miller has served as president of the Executive Board this year. Under his leadership Executive Board committees have had a busy year. Special committees have studied many areas including how our work can best relate to the smaller church, the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, pastor-church information services, and an exhaustive study of salary and benefits of Executive Board employees. The organization meeting of the board was changed from January to the first full week of December.

The Missions Department was authorized to set up a State Missions Emergency Fund from overage in the projected Dixie Jackson State Mission Offering to be disbursed by a sub-committee of the Operating Committee.

The following guidelines were adopted by the board regarding the work of the BSU Advisory Committee:

- "A. We recommend the approval of the philosophy and objectives of Southern Baptist Student Work (Section I of report) and the stated purposes and organization structure of the Baptist Student Union goals and objectives in Arkansas as outlined in Section II and III of the report.
- "B. We recommend that the chairman of the BSU Advisory Committee, if he is not already on the Executive Board, be an ex-officio member of that board and be given written notification of each Executive Board meeting.

- "C. We recommend that since there are different boards and committees working in the areas that directly affect Baptist Student Union, any board, committee or sub-committee meeting to discuss any aspect of the Baptist Student program, forward a copy of that appropriate section of the minutes of that meeting to the State Baptist Student Director for distribution to the members of the BSU Advisory Committee. We would also like to recommend that when possible the State Baptist Student Director and the Chairman of the BSU Advisory Committee be invited to attend pertinent meetings.
- "D. Since this action presupposes more active committee participation, we recommend that travel expenses for 1973 be taken from convention sources and that the 1974 Student budget be increased to include these costs.
- "E. We recommend that this report be reviewed within the next five years by the Program Committee of the Executive Board."

At the request of the executive secretary plans for an emphasis on evangelism and patriotism in 1976 were launched. R. Wilbur Herring, Jonesboro, was elected by the board to serve as chairman. Others named to serve on this "Spirit of '76" committee are:

### **BUDGET FORMULA**

for ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION (Adopted by Executive Board, 1964, Revision approved, 8/22/72)

### Base Formula

The budget shall be based upon and governed by the percentage increase (or decrease) for the first six months of the current calendar year as compared to the corresponding period for the preceding year.

### I. State Causes

- The Executive Board programs shall receive a total increase (or decrease) equal to the percentage increase (or decrease) named in the base formula.
- 2. Christian Education shall receive an increase of eighty percent (80%) of the percentage increase named in the base formula, or if there should be a decrease in the base formula the decrease in allocation to this category shall be equal to that of the base formula plus twenty percent (20%) of the percentage decrease.
- 3. Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services shall receive an increase of fifty percent (50%) of the percentage increase named in the base formula, or if there should be a decrease in the base formula the decrease in allocation to this category shall be equal to that of the base formula plus fifty percent (50%) of the percentage decrease.
- 4. The Arkansas Baptist Foundation, beginning with the 1974 budget, shall receive an increase of twenty percent (20%) of the increase named in the base formula or if there should be a decrease in the base formula the decrease in allocation to this category shall be equal to that of the base formula plus eighty percent (80%) of the percentage decrease.

### II. Southern Baptist Convention

Southern Baptist Convention causes shall be based upon the total sum of categories number I, STATE CAUSES, and number II, SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION causes. Southern Baptist Convention causes shall be increased (or decreased) one-fourth of one percent (¼ of 1%) when the increase (or decrease) in the base formula is seven percent (7%), and one-half of one percent (½ of 1%) when the increase (or decrease) in the base formula is eight percent (8%) or more.

### III. Advance Section

In category III, ADVANCE SECTION, the funds will be divided between Christian Education and other causes up to an increase named in the base formula, and if there is a decrease in the base formula the decrease in allocation to this category shall be by the same percentage as in the base formula. \*\*\*\*\*

All funds received over the sum total of categories I, II, and III shall be divided as follows:

½ - to Southern Baptist Convention

½ – at the discretion of the Executive Board

#### RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. Housing Allowance for Retired Ordained Ministers.

The Executive Board recommends that actual expense for housing up to one-third of the total retirement annuity received through the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention shall constitute a rental allowance paid as part of the retired ordained minister's compensation for past services.

2. 1973-74 Emphasis – "Share the Word Now"

"The Executive Board recommends that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention suggested program and theme for 1973-74 be "Share the Word Now." This Program coordinates the state Ten Year Program with the Southern Baptist Convention long-range program for the decade of the seventies.

"We recommend that the state Sunday School department lead the state emphasis, and suggest a calendar of events and resource materials which the church may consider in planning their work.

"We recommend that the Sunday School program for '73-'74, "People Now," be supported by the Missions Department program, "Extend Now," the Evangelism Department program, "Win Now," and other department programs support the promotion in appropriate ways."

The ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE serves as the line of communication for Baptists of Arkansas. It features news of local, state, and national interest, as well as the world in religion. It is the intent of this publication to inform, inspire, promote, and to give direction in Baptist affairs.

Except at the very beginning of the Convention and during the Civil War, Arkansas Baptists have provided a paper without interruption. It is felt that the quality which the ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE has maintained across the years will serve as a foundation for future advance.

With the retirement of Dr. Erwin L. McDonald, Dr. Charles Ashcraft, executive secretary, served as interim editor until the election of J. Everett Sneed to the position in April of this year.

The NEWSMAGAZINE has experienced a good year. In July, there were 60,006 subscribers. This number is an increase of almost 2,000 since the same time last year.

Although the printing and mailing costs have increased substantially, no increase in subscription price is anticipated. It is hoped that the publication can and will be available to every Southern Baptist in the state.

We are in the process of greatly increasing the coverage of the local news from our churches. Great emphasis will be laid on evangelistic outreach and missions — local, state, and world-wide. In order to facilitate better coverage, each association has been requested to elect their own reporter. Each individual and church is still encouraged to write to us directly if desired. This additional communication should benefit us greatly.

The ministry of our paper is even more important with the Ouachita-Southern Higher Education Campaign moving into its final stage. It is our intent to inform the people as to the progress of this significant venture for our Lord.

We appeal to the pastors and church leaders to assist us in increasing our circulation. We believe that, in so doing, they will help themselves, for informed Baptists are the most responsive Baptists. We believe the ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE to be one of the best bargains available today.

### ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE ASSEMBLY

Lawson Hatfield, Director

The objective of the state assembly is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose ..." to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer cooperation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God.

The program of the state assembly seeks to reach its objective by:

- 1. Providing facilities and operating the assembly as a service to the programs of the convention.
- 2. Offering training for church leaders, church members and others of all age groups in Bible study, stewardship and missions.
- 3. Provide worship, witnessing and evangelistic opportunities.
- 4. Planning fellowship and recreational activities.
- 5. Encouraging all boards, agencies and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention to provide an informal meeting place for denominational leaders, church leaders and members.
- 6. Cultivating and training young people, our leaders of tomorrow.

A report and evaluation of the four 1972 assemblies follows.

The total registration of 3,460 reflected in the following figures which are listed for the four consecutive weeks: 552, 1,205, 694, 1,009. This is 1,023 more than last year. In addition there were many visitors in the services each week.

Four weeks are scheduled for 1973.

The assembly program reflects a variety of study and fellowship opportunities for the many people in attendance. The Children's Building was well staffed for good learning experiences for preschool children. In four weeks the building was used by about 89 children and leaders.

A Children's Assembly (Grades 3 through 6) is conducted in a separate area by a good staff of leaders and ministered to about 455 in this group.

The Youth-Adult Assembly is the largest in attendance, with about 2,916 participating in the four assemblies. Bible study classes for young people and special studies and organizational work was offered for adults. Several special studies were provided for some groups including an "On-to-College" class. A large special choir produced "Encounter," a contemporary folk-type musical for youth on Friday night of each week.

During the four assemblies 265 of those in attendance recorded decisions. Of these 188 were professions of faith, 77 were surrenders to special service.

Three new dormitories were opened for the 1972 summer session. Additional improvements in facilities are underway for 1973 including two more new dormitories and one new 12-unit family building.

### BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

Tom J. Logue, Director

#### USA LOOKS AT ARKANSAS BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

- 1. CBS Television and Associated Press brought more publicity to Arkansas Baptists this year than in their entire 125 year history as they told the nation of 32 Arkansas students working in a ghetto area of Baltimore during their "spring break."
- 2. Stars and Stripes carried the same story overseas.
- 3. Our students who were interviewed were clear in saying that they did the work because of Jesus Christ in their lives.

#### CAMPUS EVANGELISM

- 1. 161 conversions were reported among our students on 21 campuses.
- 2. Arkansas BSU Directors led 10 WIN Conferences on state campuses and 25 in local churches.
- 3. Over 2,000 individual Bible study packets were sold on our campuses. Arkansas State alone had over 200 students in 30 Bible study groups meeting weekly.
- 4. Concerts with the "New Light," a music group in the BSU at State College of Arkansas, accompanied by an evangelistic message and a mobile book display, were held on many of the campuses of the state.
- 5. 10,000 high school and college students are expected, at this writing, for the Saturday afternoon session of the BSU State Convention, a "Jesus Festival."

#### MISSIONS

- 1. Arkansas BSU had 189 students in mission projects, 124 during "spring break", and 65 gave their summer to mission activities in every part of Arkansas and the USA and several places overseas.
- 2. Spring projects included the ghetto project in Baltimore, witnessing at Daytona Beach, witnessing at Fort Lauderdale, and a work group at Kyle's Boys' Camp near Jasper.

# PERSONNEL CHANGES

- 1. John Gilbert is the new Baptist Student Director at Arkansas Tech. He has served as BSU Director for 5 years in Mississippi and 4 years in Texas.
- 2. Ken Watkins, a recent graduate of Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, has become Associate BSU Director at the University of Arkansas.

- 3. Don Norrington, our "roving" BSU Director for College of the Ozarks, Arkansas College, Arkansas State University Beebe Branch, and Phillips County Community College has become Associate State BSU Director.
- 4. Shirley Tucker, recent graduate of the University of Arkansas is serving as interim "roving" director for the schools above.

#### BSU CENTER CONSTRUCTION

- 1. The director's office in our BSU Center at State College of Arkansas has been redecorated as the gift of an anonymous donor.
- 2. An architect has been employed to draw plans for the new Baptist Student Center at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock.

### FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

- 1. In celebration of BSU's fiftieth anniversary 11 pages of the September 21 issue of the Arkansas Baptist carried the story of the growth of Arkansas BSU.
- 2. A tape and slide presentation of BSU work in Arkansas has been prepared and is available to churches and associations.
- 3. A special student newspaper was handed out at the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

### BROTHERHOOD

#### C. H. Seaton

Reports for the past year indicate a continuing interest in Brotherhood work and missionary education for men and boys. This is reflected in the increase in new organizations and membership throughout the Convention. The increase in Arkansas was almost 1200.

Brotherhood was one of the two education program organizations showing an increase, the other being Church Music. For this continued growth, we give thanks to God and to the leadership in our churches and associations.

Since the last report there have been several state wide meetings of interest to Brotherhood work.

November 8, some 444 boys, counselors and pastors attended the State Royal Ambassador Fellowship Supper.

March 16-17, was the date for the Baptist Men's Meeting. One hundred plus men attended and heard Dr. Arthur Rutledge and Bud Fray, along with several laymen, challenge them to more involvement in missions at home and around the world.

Royal Ambassadors, about 500, gathered on May 5-6, for the annual State Congress.

Royal Ambassador Camps were conducted in June. Three hundred and ten boys registered for the three weeks of camp. Visible results were 20 boys saved, 15 surrendered for full time Christian vocations and 65 made a rededication of their life to Christ. Only eternity will reveal the real value of the camps in changed lives and concepts. Ben Hope, as Camp Missionary, and Boyd Baker, as Camp Pastor, led in providing a high spiritual atmosphere for the camps.

Baptist Men's Encampment was held on June 16-17 at Camp Paron. The outing and program was attended by about 50 men. Conference leader and speakers included Peter Petty, Supt. of Missions for Washington-Madison Association and Bob Hall, Minister of Education, Baptist Tabernacle, Little Rock. Alvin "Bo" Huffman brought a challenging message to the men on "Involvement of Men in Missions — Now." An inspiring testimony period was a feature of the meeting.

Plans are already underway for all the state wide events for the year ahead. Speakers for some coming events include Dr. Baker J. Cauthen and Dr. Glendon McCullough.

We are grateful to God for His blessings on the work of men and boys through Brotherhood. May missionary education through Baptist Men and Royal Ambassadors continue to grow until every church is adequately providing for men and boys, is our prayer.

#### **CAMP PARON**

Camp Paron has been used extensively during the year by Baptist Building Departments.

In addition almost every week-end has been filled with choir groups and youth retreats,

June and July were used by RA and GA Camps. Each of the weeks were filled almost to capacity for GA Camp. Several other weeks during the year were filled by associations or church youth groups.

Prospects are now for all weeks during June, July and August, 1973 to be filled by Baptist Building groups or associations. Week-ends all during the year are rapidly being filled.

The rising cost of food materials and labor to maintain the camp will soon necessitate an increase in the rates for use of the facilities. Rates for use of the camp are still very reasonable.

A new ice maker was purchased during the year. New shower stalls and curtains have been installed. They are permanent being made of concrete blocks and finished to conform with other walls in the bath.

New metal culverts were installed in the two bridges on the circle drive. This will eliminate the need for replacing the wood floor of the bridge every two years.

A deep-fry cooker has been purchased and will be installed soon. It will be necessary to install some new wiring and receptables before it can be placed in use.

Some new play equipment was purchased. More play equipment is planned for next year. Several improvements are in the planning stages for the future.

Needs include an infirmary and staff building. Hopefully these can be secured in the next few years.

Camp is an important feature in the spiritual growth especially boys and girls. GA and RA Camps play an important part in spiritual, mental, physical and social growth of boys and girls. Camp Paron makes a Christian camp possible for Arkansas boys and girls. Let's keep it the best in the land.

## CHURCH MUSIC

Music in our Southern Baptist churches is more and more assuming its rightful place in our experiences of worship. In worship, music involves both old and young in personal praise, adoration, and commitment. In witness, music proclaims the message of salvation to all who hear. In education, music imparts sound doctrine and scripture truth. In ministry, music comforts and gladdens hearts, reaches multitudes through radio and T V, and serves as an arm of love extended by the church to those who need its ministry.

The tasks assigned to the state and local church ministry are: to teach music; to train persons to lead, sing, and play music; to provide music in the church and community; and to provide and interpret information regarding the work of the church and denomination.

In helping to accomplish these tasks and the church's main functions of worship, proclamation, education, and ministry, six areas of music needs are developed through state, district, and associational channels to provide a balanced local music program. These areas are: congregational, organizational, graded choir, instrumental, special ministries, and administrative.

A church has a music ministry, and should so report it on the annual uniform church letter to the association, when it (a) elects or calls a music director (volunteer or paid) and (b) when the music director is charged with the responsibility of developing the church music program.

The work of the department has been planned and directed by the District Music Directors and committees composed of local church music leaders, under the supervision of Ural C. Clayton, department secretary. Mr. Clayton resigned this position in June of this year. The various program projects are being directed by local church directors who were especially chosen for each project.

## I. STATE ASSISTANCE TO ASSOCIATIONS AND CHURCHES

- A. District Music Directors The state is divided into eight districts with a district director serving as music representative between the state office and local associations and churches. These district directors who have served in 1972 are: District 1 Northwest, Bill Canary; District 2 North Central, Neal Guthrie; District 3 Northeast, Charles Butler; District 4 West Central, Phil Whitten; District 5 Central, Robert Hatzfeld; District 6 East Central, John Richardson; District 7 Southwest, Jim Hart; District 8 Southeast, Carbon Sims.
- B. Festivals Choir festivals were promoted for different age groups, and this program continues to be one of the most widely approved and acclaimed programs in our state music ministry. The department sponsored five festivals for Young Musicians in April at Jacksonville, Benton, Springdale, El Dorado, and Blytheville; also two festivals for youth choirs, in February, in Little Rock. Churches interested in organizing choirs to come to observe the festivals and later organize for service in their local church. Each choir attending learns a group of songs to sing in the massed chorus and learns two numbers to sing for adjucication and rating.
- C. Summer Music Camps A comprehensive program of music education and spiritual enrichment makes up the curriculum of our two state music camps Youth and Adult Music Conference in June, and Music Camp for Young Musicians in August. These camps are held at Arkadelphia at Ouachita Baptist University and First Baptist Church. Classes are provided for accompanists, song leaders, graded choir leaders, choir members, and volunteer and full-time music directors.

The theme for Youth Music Camp this year was Drama in Music. The program curriculum and services were designed to promote this emphasis. The highlights for this camp were the performance of "Elijah", an oratorio; drama and staging classes, music classes, and the spiritual emphasis through the Bible studies and worship services.

The outstanding features of Music Camp for Young Musicians were concerts given by each of three age groups singing "Let Us Follow Him", a cantata by sixth graders; "Jesus" a new cantata by fifth graders; and a group of anthems by the fourth grade group. Each of these groups had drama skits as a part of each performance. Other features of the camp were as follows: theory classes, choir leadership classes, studies in lives of composers, and the worship services.

- D. Preschool and Children's Choir Leadership Clinics In addition to the leadership classes available at both music camps, there were training opportunities in this area in one-day clinics in September at Monticello, Jonesboro, Little Rock, Fort Smith, and Hope.
- E. Volunteer and Part-Time Music Directors Retreat This week-end Retreat at Camp Paron was considered a tremendous success in this first venture, and it is hoped that this will be a regular feature of the music camp program. LeRoy McClard from the Baptist Sunday School Board met with these directors for a period of training, and inspiration which proved to be very helpful to every one attending.

F. Church Music Workshop — This Department and the Church Music Department of Ouachita University jointly sponsored this event for part-time music directors, graded choir workers, and ministers of music. Musical training and spiritual renewal were the highlights of this event.

#### II. OUTREACH

#### A. Festivals -

In the 5 festivals for Young Musicians, 51 choirs participated, total attendance of 1495.

In the 2 youth choir festivals, 44 choirs participated, total attendance of 1202

B. Choir Day – Choir Day at Ouachita in September was sponsored by Ouachita and promoted by our department. Over 2400 participated in the rehearsals and the half-time program at Ouachita's first home game of the season.

# IV. NEW PROJECT BEGUN

In January of this year a group of specialists, called Arkansas' "Central Training Team" went to Nashville Sunday School Board for two days of intensive training, with presentation of new methods and materials, by Sunday School Board personnel in the specific areas, as relate to the music program of a church, of administration, adult choir, youth choir, children's choirs, preschool children's choir, and instrumental. This "Central Team" will, in turn, pass on this information and inspiration to specialists in each of the eight districts. These district specialists will be available to train people in local churches. This program is designed to up-date and up-grade the music program in all of our Arkansas local churches.

#### V. CONCLUSION

This is the 31st Annual Report of the Arkansas Baptist Music Ministry — the oldest such state music organization in the Southern Baptist Convention, begun in September 1941, as the "Arkansas Baptist Musicians".

The department personnel earnestly request your continued prayer support for the effectiveness of their service, and the music program's tasks and ministries.

## CHURCH TRAINING

Ralph W. Davis, Secretary

The Church Training Department has been assigned the following programs of work in addition to Church Training:

Vocational Guidance Church Administration Family Ministry Church Library Church Recreation

The work of the Church Training Department in assisting in these extra areas is made possible by the enlistment, training, and use of 40 approved workers in all sections of Arkansas. In each of the eight districts there is a district representative (DR) and age group workers for preschool, children, youth, and adults making five workers in each district for a total of 40 workers. These workers are enlisted for an indefinite period of time and are given definite training every year. In 1972 the approved workers had their training session at a retreat at Petit Jean during the days of August 14-15. Guest conference leaders were Leonard Wedel and Earl Murphy of the Sunday School Board. Additional training will be given to these approved workers at an all day meeting on Saturday, March 3, 1973 at which time they will be trained to conduct the UpGrade Conferences in 30 associations during 1973. They will also receive definite training at the Special Workers' Clinic in Tulsa, Oklahoma, March 19-21, 1973. These trained workers assist the Church Training Department in the promotion of Church Training throughout the year.

In order to promote the other programs of work listed above, each program has a group of counselors or approved workers.

The Church Training Department works in cooperation with the Church Training Department of the Sunday School Board. The definite study areas which determine the curriculum materials include Christian theology, Christian history, Christian ethics, church policy, and performance of the functions of the church such as witness, worship, and ministry.

# 1. State Meetings.

The State Church Training Workshop was conducted on Thursday, Oct. 28, 1971 at First Church, Little Rock. Conferences were held for each age group division. There was also a conference for general officers, associational missionaries, library workers, church secretaries, and church administration consultants.

## 2. District Work.

(1) Eight District Planning Meetings were held for Associational Superintendents of Missions and Associational Church Training

Directors. They were presented with their Associational Church Training Guide, materials and suggestions were shared to help with "M" Night in the associations, new plans for Doctrinal Emphasis Week — 1973 were presented and plans and materials for the 1973 Bible Exploring Drill, Youth Bible Drill, and Youth Speakers' Tournament were discussed. Also presented were plans for the Associational UpGrade Clinics for 1973. Emphasis was also given to Baptist Youth Night, March 17, 1973, which will be conducted in the associations.

- (2) Associational Idea Clinics.

  Thirty-two Idea Clinics in 30 associations of the state were conducted in 1972. These clinics consisted of five conferences for all leaders of the Church Training Program.
- (3) Drills and Tournaments.

  The Bible Exploring Drill (for older children), the Youth Bible Drill (for younger youth), and the Youth Speakers' Tournaments (for older youth) were held in the eight districts, March 13-24. District winners in the Bible Drill and Speakers' Tournament participated in the state drills and tournaments. In the Youth Bible Drill, Susan Gray, First Baptist Church, West Memphis, placed first and represented Arkansas at Ridgecrest.

In the Speakers' Tournament, Donald Wade Henry, First Church, Nashville, won first place and represented Arkansas at Ridgecrest.

(4) Growth Clinics.

There were 27 out of 44 associations that had a Growth Clinic.
324 churches were represented and this is 38% of the total churches in the 27 associations. Total attendance was 878 with 242 pastors present and 226 directors present.

#### Personal Consultations.

Over 35 churches were visted by the secretary or associate for individual conferences with the pastor, minister of education, or church training leaders.

# 5. Church Administration Workshops.

One workshop was conducted in Fort Smith and five other workshops were scheduled for October, 1972 in El Dorado, Texarkana, North Little Rock, Springdale, and Blytheville. Workers from the Sunday School Board and from neighboring states assisted the Church Training Department in these workshops. These workshops were scheduled on Monday afternoon, Monday night, Tuesday afternoon, Tuesday night and were for pastors and staff members, church secretaries, and deacons.

## 6. Vocational Guidance.

On April 28-29, 1972, Robert Holley of our department, assisted by workers from the Sunday School Board, conducted a successful Church Vocations Conference in Little Rock with approximately 100 in attendance. Our department also provided vocational guidance counselors for four assemblies at Siloam Springs.

## 7. Church Recreation.

Jim Maloch, Second Church, Little Rock, serves as state recreation director. He assists in the promotion of recreation in churches and associations. He has several recreational workers who are available to assist churches at no expense to the church.

# 8. Library Work.

Miss Blanche Mays of Wynne, one of the state library workers, has assisted several churches in setting up or improving their libraries during the year. Other library consultants include Mrs. Robert Chambers, Lepanto and Mrs. Robert Tucker, Wynne. These workers are available to assist churches at no expense to the church except entertainment while they are on the field.

#### MISSIONS

## R. H. Dorris, Secretary

#### Direct Missions

Church Pastoral Aid and Student Preaching Aid helped 42 churches during the year to have a pastor on the field at least part of the time.

Salary Aid has been given to nine associations to help keep a missionary on the field.

Two new church-type missions were begun in resort/retirement communities of Fairfield Bay and Bella Vista. This makes four such missions now in operation.

Seven student summer missionaries worked 10 weeks in Fairfield Bay, Ouachita Lake, Petit Jean Mountain, and Fayetteville areas. They gave testimonies and witnessed to more than 15,000 persons.

Grants were made to seven churches for building aid, while loans were made to five others. All loan funds are presently committed. Requests for loans when funds are available amount to \$31,500. Special efforts are being made to complete the campaign for the goal of \$100,000 for the Revolving Loan Fund. As of October 1, approximately \$41,000 has been received.

Four area Pastors' Retreats were held in September with a total attendance of 96 men.

## **Special Ministries**

Forty churches now have one or more weekday ministries.

The Migrant Mission Center in Hope was opened May 15 of this year, and by October 1, 30,705 migrant people had visited the Center. More than 20 made professions of faith.

A special ministries program continues to operate in Central Association under a full-time director.

The Special Ministries Workshop held in July was attended by 48 conferees and four conference leaders, all of whom are key persons in their associations.

The first statewide Seminar on Witnessing to Other Faiths was held in Little Rock October 31 – November 1.

It is expected that a Director of Special Mission Ministries will be added to the Mission Department staff by January 1.

# Deaf Ministry

Eleven churches now have ministries to the deaf with a total of 14 classes and 22 interpreters.

The Arkansas Baptist Conference for the Deaf met in June at Lonsdale with excellent attendance. An Interpreters' Conference was also held and the Baptist Interpreters of Arkansas organized. An Interpreters' Workshop is planned for January, 1973, in Little Rock.

Director C. F. Landon served as interpreter for five weeks for deaf counsellors and teachers in a college level course taught at the Arkansas School for the Deaf. He and Mrs. Landon served as missionaries in four youth camps this summer.

## World Missions Conferences

Six World Missions Conferences were scheduled for 1972. In 1971 a total of 25,341 people from 176 churches attended such conferences. There were 9 professions of faith and 6 volunteers for special service.

# **Chaplaincy Ministries**

Chaplaincy ministries is another effort of the church and the convention to fulfil its mission of reaching men for Christ.

Five full-time chaplains employed in the Missions Department serve state institutions. Student Chaplain David Purkiss serves weekends in the McRae Unit of the Childrens Colony, Alexander, and Ralph Shaddox receives a stipend for his otherwise volunteer ministry in the Craighead and Greene County agencies. These are all supported by Cooperative Program and special State Mission Gifts. Through August this year they have reported 196 professions of faith in Christ.

Pastor-chaplain service is provided by many Baptist preachers in military units, hospitals, motels, and industries. Some of these pastors are "on call" for any assistance they can provide.

# Work with National Baptists

Working with National Baptists in Arkansas is a cooperative ministry of the Home Mission Board and the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Since January 1, 1972, 10 Leadership Training Institutes have been conducted with 625 adults enrolled. The first State Leadership Workshop held at Paron for pastors and laymen was attended by 49 persons, evenly divided between National and Southern Baptists.

Five weeks of summer camp were held at Camp Hart of the Hills with 221 enrolled and five professions of faith in Christ.

The BSU program at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff has 120 currently enrolled in Bible classes and a full program of BSU activities. Six National and Southern Baptist associations contributed to the expenses of a BSU-sponsored Religious Emphasis Week with Dr. Robert Freeman as guest speaker.

Three student summer missionaries conducted eight Vacation Bible Schools with 704 enrolled and 45 professions of faith, two youth revivals

with 23 professions of faith, and general visitation and survey work. One student spent five weeks in Camden directing Center activities sponsored by the local Joint Committee.

Five students in Arkansas have been assisted through the Home Mission Board scholarship program. Three of these are in college and two in seminary training.

Five active Associational Joint Committees in Camden, Helena, Pine Bluff, West Memphis, and Little Rock are seeking ways and means of cooperative ministries for National and Southern Baptists.

A State Advisory Committee, consisting of the presidents and selected representatives from the National and Southern Baptist Conventions, met May 3, 1972, to explore the possibilities of a State Joint Committee. Recommendations for the election of representatives will be presented to all conventions in November.

Extension Center work is active in four areas: Lewisville, Camden, Helena, and Little Rock, with a total enrollment of 152.

Encouraging reports come from many churches in Arkansas engaged in programs of ministry with National Baptists on a local level. No attempt has yet been made to analyze these cooperative ministries.

Fraternal greetings, sermons, addresses, and Christ-like good will are included in the daily schedule of the work.

#### STEWARDSHIP-COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

At the end of 1971 Cooperative Program receipts had exceeded the total 1971 budget by \$53,698.45; this represented an 8.63 percent increase over 1970 and set a new record for the state convention.

During 1972 Cooperative Program receipts have continued to increase and, at the time of this report, were more than 10 percent in excess of those a year ago. Thus, it is anticipated that receipts at the end of 1972 will set another record for Arkansas Baptists.

Assuming that the full budget is met, then one million dollars will be given to convention-wide causes by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, the first time such a figure has ever been reached. Both the 1972 budget and the proposed 1973 budget also includes increased percentages going to convention-wide causes.

Increased efforts have been made during the year to express appreciation and give recognition to those churches and associations deserving such recognition for outstanding leadership in mission support. Plaques were personally presented to five churches for outstanding accomplishments in Gooperative Program gifts in past years. The areas of recognition included total giving, percentage giving, and per capita giving.

Other recognitions have been made, sometimes by personal letters to the churches and at other times through articles published in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine. Twenty churches were recognized for having consistently each year for the past ten years increased their Cooperative Program gifts.

The first association in the state to have all of its churches contributing to missions through the Cooperative Program was honored at an Appreciation Dinner, to which each pastor and treasurer was invited. The same association has now achieved the distinction of having all of its churches contributing a minimum of 10 percent to missions through the Cooperative Program.

Stewardship promotion is also on the increase in the churches and the associations. Most available stewardship materials are published by the Stewardship Commission and distributed through the state convention offices; however, some materials are produced locally to meet specific needs. All of these materials have been very favorably received by the churches and are being utilized in greater quantities. Many churches are using for the first time some specific stewardship emphasis, and every report received has been favorable and encouraging. In February a state stewardship clinic was held in Little Rock, at which 24 associations were represented. Another similar clinic is being planned for next February.

A brochure entitled "May I Help You?" was published by the department; it lists in reference form every resource available from the department. It will be revised and updated at least annually and distributed widely in various ways. It has been well received and is thought to be unique in stewardship literature; other state conventions are copying the idea and format.

A unique Bible study on the stewardship of land and the stewardship of time was sponsored by the department. It was called a "Stewardship Camp-In," and was held in a campground to which camping families were invited. The response was so encouraging that the group present organized the Arkansas Baptist Campers and requested that the department continue sponsorship of such activities. The first meeting attracted national attention, since it was the first such meeting ever sponsored directly by a state convention.

During the year the department secretary has attempted to visit personally with each new pastor moving into the state from elsewhere. He visited on behalf of the executive secretary, the Baptist Building staff, and the Cooperative Program. Twenty-eight visits of this nature have been made, and in every case deep appreciation has been expressed by the new pastor.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL

## Lawson Hatfield, Director

The objective of the Sunday School is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose . . . "to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer cooperation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God."

The Sunday School Department seeks to accomplish its objective by helping churches establish, conduct, enlarge and improve their program of Bible teaching. The Bible teaching program includes two major areas: Sunday School and extension activities.

Sunday School, the basic approach of the Bible teaching program, consists of age-graded Bible classes meeting regularly on Sunday morning, or, in some mission situations, on Sunday afternoon.

Additional facets of the Bible teaching program which are provided for organizationally by the Sunday School are called extension activities. The following extension activities may be included in a church's program of Bible teaching: Vacation Bible School, Weekday Bible Study, Bible Conferences, Fellowship Bible Classes, Bible Study Course, New Sunday Schools, Family Bible Study, and Correspondence Bible Study.

Church Architecture consultation is available through the Sunday School Department.

The director, Lawson Hatfield, relates primarily to local church assistance, church architecture, and adult work.

Don Cooper, associate director, relates to associational promotion and Vacation Bible School work. He serves as youth division consultant.

Mrs. Mary Emma Humphrey, children's division consultant, relates to the promotion of weekday Bible study and work with the mentally retarded.

Miss Pat Ratton serves as preschool division consultant, edits the Sunday School News, and relates to kindergarten programs.

Beyond the Baptist Building, the work is promoted by district directors and forty-four associational Sunday School organizations.

## I. SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION

1. The objective of the program of Sunday School promotion is to assist churches, associations, and the state convention in

establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving Sunday School program in churches.

- 2. Tasks of the Sunday School include:
  - (1) Teach the Biblical revelation
  - (2) Reach persons for Christ and church membership
  - (3) Perform the functions of the church within its constituency
  - (4) Provide and interpret information concerning the work of the church and denomination.
- 3. Following is a summary of the projects the department promoted during the past year:
  - (1) State
    - Three Preschool-Children's Workshops 180 registered; 40 churches represented.
    - State Bible Conference 150 registered; 72 churches represented.
    - State Sunday School Convention 248 registered; 82 churches represented.
    - General Officers Retreat 46 registered; 28 churches represented.
    - State Vacation Bible School Clinic 275 registered; 41 associations represented.
    - Two Small Church Sunday School Conferences 48 registered; 14 churches represented.
    - State Briefing Meeting 28 registered; 18 associations represented.
    - Department Director assisted Evangelism Department in State Evangelism Retreat and State Evangelism Area Conferences.
  - (2) Associational
    - Ten training schools 615 registered; 114 churches represented. 15 associations were assisted in one-night training or planning sessions.
  - (3) Church
    - 27 churches were assisted in training or planning conferences with 950 registered.
  - (4) Convention-wide
    - Department personnel participated in 6 convention-wide planning meetings.

#### II. VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL PROMOTION

Following is a summary of the projects the department promoted and assisted:

A state VBS clinic for associational team members; 41 associations represented with 275 total attendance.

Trained 6 college students for Mission Department.

Department personnel assisted in 8 associational VBS clinics.

#### III. WEEKDAY BIBLE STUDY PROMOTION

The objective of the program of weekday Bible study promotion is to assist churches, associations, and the state convention in establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving weekday Bible study in the churches. Weekday Bible study includes formally scheduled opportunities for concentrated teaching of the Bible and other curriculum areas for pupils of public school ages in weekday Bible study classes and other programs for children in kindergarten, child care programs, and nursery schools.

Fifty-five churches provide kindergarten ministries. Churches are showing concern for some special groups as reflected in providing Sunday School teaching in 30 departments for the mentally retarded.

### IV. CHURCH ARCHITECTURE CONSULTATION

The objective of the program of church architecture consultation is to interpret the relationship of property and buildings of a church and to provide information and consultation to churches and denominational organizations concerning all phases and details of planning and securing appropriate property and building.

Through personal visits and correspondence 41 churches were referred to the Church Architecture Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

## RETIREMENT

With the close of 1972, Mrs. Mary Emma Humphrey retires after 12 years of excellent service in the area of children's work. We recommend her continued ministry among the churches.

## **FUTURE PLANS**

The plans for the department for the 1973 onward will be determined by a new job description for some staff members. The plan is for four men who will be trained as consultants in every approved program of the department. Each man will be available to relate to 11 specific associations for planning and service.

This differs from the current plan in which staff members have a limited number of specialized assignments and are available to serve in all 44 associations.

The purpose of this change is to offer more efficient service to the associations without limiting services to the churches.

#### WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

## Nancy Cooper, Executive Secretary and Treasurer

To help churches identify and concentrate on the most crucial needs for the church year, leaders of the Southern Baptist Convention identified five critical issues. WMU's relationship to these issues was one factor which led to the choice of mission action and family missions as emphases for the year. Target areas in mission action were economically disadvantaged, headliners, juvenile rehabilitation, prisoners rehabilitation, moral problems, and alcohol and drug abusers. Efforts were made to involve families together in God's work by encouraging church-wide, family involved, mission study, mission action, praying for missions and giving to missions.

For development of leaders in more than a dozen areas of mission action, one of fifteen nation-wide workshops was held at Ouachita University, May 17-19. This was provided jointly by the Home Mission Board and Woman's Missionary Union, SBC. Later, at state conferences training was offered in corresponding areas.

Representatives from the state were involved in national WMU activities including the Annual Meeting in Philadelphia ... A chartered bus was provided for 39 of the 78 Arkansans who attended the WMU Conference, Glorieta ... Also a chartered bus was provided for 49 of the 61 girls and leaders who attended the historic "first" national Acteens Conference at Glorieta.

The 1972 Annual Meeting of Arkansas WMU was held March 21-22 at Second Baptist Church, El Dorado. A record of one dozen missionaries from six countries were featured ... A one-day Acteens "Celebration" for Junior High girls was held May 6 at Immanuel Church, Little Rock, with attendance exceeding three hundred ... Parson was the site for four six-day girls' camps. Three were for ones nine through eleven and one was for girls twelve through seventeen. Decisions were recorded by 102.

Annual meetings were held in each District at which Mrs. J. A. Hogan, state president, presided. State WMU staff presented organizational plans and missionary messages were brought by Miss Mary Frank Kirkpatrick of Nigeria and Dr. Everett Sneed, then director of special ministries for the state missions department.

Leadership training is a major of all state church-program organizations and was provided by WMU on state, district, associational and local church levels. Two one-day conferences offering training in twenty areas of involvement were held at Ouachita University and were attended by four hundred. Similarly, a one day conference was held at Southern Baptist College where registration totaled 230.

Associational WMU leadership assembled in Little Rock for orientation August 29. Helps are provided quarterly for a choice of activities on associational level.

Mission giving continues to claim concern of Woman's Missionary Union. The Cooperative Program is recognized and promoted as having priority as the channel through which the tithe should be given. Then there are three approved mission offerings through which "over and above" gifts are encouraged, i.e., Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions, and Dixie Jackson Offering for State Missions. Record giving was reported through these channels with \$518,704 for foreign missions, \$152,361 for home missions, and \$81,000 for state missions.

In response to promotion of the No. American Baptist Women's Union, meeting in Toronto, Canada, October 17-19, 71 women from Arkansas attended. Two chartered buses were provided. NABWU is a part of the Women's Department of the Baptist World Alliance and meets every five years. Women of fourteen Baptist conventions on the No. American continent comprise the fellowship.

## ANNUITY BOARD

# T. K. Rucker, Field Representative

The Annuity Board has a new chief executive officer for the first time in 17 years. Darold H. Morgan became president on March 1 when R. Alton Reed retired.

Assets of the Board have passed the \$300 million mark. These are funds held in trust for persons contributing to retirement plans, or to use to pay monthly benefits.

The Annuity Board adopted new guidelines for investment of funds held in trust for retirement plans. Changes in investment policies will produce greater benefits to present and future beneficiaries. As a basic policy, the Board has always refrained from investment in industries such as tobacco or liquor. In recent years, the Board has also given consideration to ecological attitudes, employment policies and other moral questions. The aim still remains to invest for the largest possible returns in keeping with safety of monetary and morality factors.

The Annuity Board provides retirement pension plans for 36,000 pastors, church staff, and denominational agency employees. It pays monthly retirement benefits to about 8,000 people who have retired from fulltime church-related services to churches and the denomination. Over \$10 million in retirement benefits were paid in 1971 to beneficiaries, which included two separate issues of the "13th Check." This with the increase resulting from a change of rate on annuity tables made it possible for annuitants last year to receive 29% more than originally promised.

The Board also provides insurance coverage for church and denominational employees but does not write the insurance itself. Nearly 5,000 individuals are enrolled in the Life Benefit Plan. Another 6,890 are enrolled in Group Life Insurance through the churches. Church Long-Term Disability has 6,782 active members. More than 13,000 participated in the Health Benefit Plan offering medical and hospitalization coverage. Claims exceeded premiums paid into this plan last year.

The Board will again this year provide member statements to active retirement plan participants. This statement will show the personal account, including amount built up, and the anticipated income at normal retirement age if present contributions continue until then.

## ARKANSAS STATE CONVENTION REPORT

Arkansas — 570 churches and associations; 671 employees participating. There are 19,039 churches and associations with 21,013 employees currently participating in the Southern Baptist Protection Program. In this state convention, the number of new members enrolled in Plan A during the first seven months of 1972 is 31.

The following state Baptist agencies participate in the retirement program: Arkansas Baptist Convention, Arkansas Baptist Home for Children, Ouachita Baptist University, and Southern Baptist College. We have enrolled 5 in Plan B, 3 in Plan C. There have been two who have taken retirement. There are 5 who have taken long term disability. We have signed up many in our life insurance, but only five have cleared in the total amount of \$155,000 coverage.

There are only 12 churches not in the annuity program who have 500 members or more.

There are 98 churches not in the annuity program who have from 200-499 members. We keep in close touch with the superintendent of missions in each association as a church grows strong enough to become a prospect we try to enlist them.

There has been tremendous turmoil in the health insurance field and long term disability insurance this year. The Annuity Board is the mediator between the insurance company and the member. They are being faithful in their stewardship with almost an impossible situation. We do not know what can be done but you may know with all confidence that everything will be done that can be done in the best interest of the member. We hope to know something definite by January 1, 1973.

#### CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT

Alvin Huffman, Jr., Director

Since the time designated for the completion of the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign has not been reached, this is a progress report submitted on a continuing project. The Director's request to be relieved of the responsibilities of the Campaign, effective September 30, 1972, has been granted by the Steering Committee. This report has been prepared for the information and inspiration of Arkansas Baptists, as well as for the purpose of recording the Campaign historically.

A total amount received in gifts and pledges from all sources to the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign as of September 30, 1972 is \$4,549,768.04. A report by category follows:

Based on verbal commitments made and outstanding, it is entirely possible that the Church Phase will exceed three million dollars and that the total of all pledges and gifts will be well in excess of five million dollars.

The total expenses incurred in the two divisions involving churches from the beginning of the Campaign, January 1, 1971 through June 30, 1972, is \$86,418.25 and this is a ratio of 3.035 percent of expense to income and pledges. This is considerably below the average cost of securing funds in special campaigns and it is quite a tribute to our volunteer Campaign leadership and the dedication and ability of our Campaign workers.

Executive Secretary, Dr. Charles H. Ashcraft, and the officers and staff of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention have directly participated in the work and provided inspiration and counsel. Our colleagues and fellow staff members in the Baptist Building have been a significant source of encouragement and assistance. From the inception of the Campaign, the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine has played, and continues to play, a tremendous supportive role. Ouachita President, Dr. Daniel R. Grant and

Southern President, Dr. H. E. Williams, their faculty and staff members have given generously of themselves without reservation. Their contributions have been invaluable. This outstanding leadership support, the generous attitude and response of Arkansas Baptists generally, and the guidance and blessings provided by the Heavenly Father have made this great stewardship venture possible.

The Arkansas Baptist State Convention voted unanimously in November 1970 to conduct the largest fund campaign in the history of the Convention in 1971-73, with emphasis on the Cooperative Program in 1971, Ouachita Baptist University in 1972, and Southern Baptist College in 1973. In a meeting early in 1971, the Campaign Steering Committee, which included representatives from both institutions, recommended a goal of four million dollars for Christian Higher Education with 75 percent of the undesignated receipts allocated to Ouachita and 25 percent to Southern Baptist College. This plan was recommended by the Executive Committee of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and adopted by the Convention in session at Little Rock on Wednesday, November 17, 1971.

The Steering Committee members are: Dr. W. O. Vaught, Jr., Chairman, Dr. R. L. South, Vice-Chairman, Dr. Daniel R. Grant, Dr. H. E. Williams, Dr. Ben M. Elrod, Dr. Woodrow Behannon, Mr. H. E. Raines, Mr. William Downs, Dr. Kenneth Threet, Dr. Padgett Cope, Dr. Ralph Douglas, Dr. Tal Bonham and Executive Secretary, Dr. Charles H. Ashcraft.

Offices for the Higher Education Development Department were opened in the Baptist Building, Little Rock, on July 1, 1971. Alvin Huffman, Jr., a Blytheville layman, was secured as Director and Robert L. Cargill, Director of Development for Oklahoma Baptist University, was retained as consultant on a per diem basis. Mrs. Camilla Reynolds serves as office manager for the departmental staff. The ability and dedication of both Mrs. Reynolds and Mr. Cargill have contributed meaningfully to the Campaign.

The Campaign is divided into an Advance Division and a General Division. The Advance Division is composed of 118 churches whose 1970 income totaled \$50,000 or more. The General Division consists of 1060 churches whose 1970 income totaled less than \$50,000.

Each church in the Advance Division is asked to adopt a goal equal to a minimum of 20 percent of its total undesignated 1970 receipts, to be paid over a three to five year period. Thus a church that elects to pay over a five year period would have an annual increase of four percent in its budget and/or designated contributions to the Campaign. The leadership for this division is provided by forty representative pastors who volunteered to serve as Advance Division Co-Chairmen. Each church was requested to appoint a Campaign Chairman and committee.

The churches of the General Division are encouraged to pledge a minimum of 13 1/3 percent of their total undesignated 1970 income, payable over a three to five year period. A church choosing to pay this over a five year period would have an annual increase of 2 2/3 percent of its budget and/or designated contributions to the Campaign. A church pledge for the full amount suggested and paid over a five year period is much preferred to a smaller pledge paid over a three or four year term.

For purposes of coordination, leadership, and communication, the General Division churches are assigned to regions in keeping with the eight existing Arkansas Baptist State Convention Districts. The Regional Chairmen are: Dr. Bill G. Bruster, Region I; Mr. Paul Henry, Region II; Judge Edward Maddox, Region III; Mr. Roy Gean, Jr., Chairman, Mr. Jeral Hampton, Vice-Chairman, Region IV; Reverend W. Lloyd Cloud, Region V; Mr. Billy Rogers, Region VI; Mr. Earl Jones, Jr., Region VII; Dr. Reubin Setliff III, Region VIIIA; and Mr. Edward Snider, Region VIIIB.

Each Association of the State has a Chairman and a Campaign Coordinator (most of these are Associational Superintendents of Missions and they have made outstanding contributions). Each church is asked to appoint a Campaign Chairman. Both pastors and lay people are serving as Associational Chairmen with the chairman at the church level being selected from the laity.

Space allocated for this report will not permit the listing of all of the Campaign Leadership, but the results will indicate that spiritual resourcefulness, motivation and dedication to the task have characterized the entire group. A complete list of the Campaign Team by name, assignment, and area of responsibility is attached to this report in duplicate and filed to become a permanent part of the record of the Campaign.

All contributions made in this, the Church Phase of the Campaign, are being paid through the local churches and remitted by them to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention through the regular channels. Distribution of receipts from the Campaign is being made to Ouachita and Southern according to the formula agreed upon, or as designated by the contributing churches and individuals. The churches may use any method they choose to underwrite the pledge and it may be paid weekly, monthly, quarterly, semi-annually, or annually. Some churches have found that their prior financial commitments have made it wise to pledge on an "open end" basis. This plan gives the church much flexibility in the matter of making and fulfilling its commitment. Churches have been encouraged to adopt this method of payment where conditions indicated it as a wise alternative.

The pledges being asked of the churches under the 20 percent and 13 1/3 percent plans outlined above are not "inflated", but realistic and obtainable. If every Arkansas Baptist State Convention Church adopts the suggested and recommended goal, a total of \$3,978,339 will be contributed. Church pledges to the Campaign will be accepted through 1973, but payments on the pledges and direct financial support will be on a continuing basis, as the churches and individuals may choose.

Both institutions have been authorized to conduct and finance special Area Campaigns during its year of special emphasis — Ouachita in 1972 and Southern in 1973. These Special Area Campaigns are separate from the Church Phase of the Campaign and are not to be confused with it. Area Campaigns are designed to give broad alumni, industry, and community participation in certain strategic areas.

Ouachita Baptist University, under the excellent direction of Dr. Ben M. Elrod, Director of Development, has conducted highly successful area campaigns in Arkadelphia and Little Rock with another scheduled for El Dorado during the fall of 1972. The Arkadelphia Campaign totaled \$320,000.00 and the Greater Little Rock Area Campaign totaled \$787,863.75. Southern Baptist College is perfecting plans for area campaigns

to be conducted in 1973. Their new Director of Development, Dr. Lawrence A. Tucker will plan and direct these special undertakings.

Reverend James E. Tillman, who is completing a great ministry as pastor of First Baptist Church, Walnut Ridge, has been appointed Director of the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign effective October 1, 1972. Brother Tillman, as a pastor and a dedicated team member, has made outstanding contributions to the Campaign thus far. He is qualified through background, experience, and personality to lead the Campaign in reaching its full potential and complete victory!

## ARKANSAS BAPTIST FAMILY AND CHILD CARE SERVICES

Johnny G. Biggs, Executive Director

We are grateful that our agency has been able to provide services to hundreds of people this past year, representing all sections of our state. It is unfortunate that the conditions in our society seem to multiply personal and family problems, but our staff feels fortunate to be a part of a Christian ministry to help meet these complex personal and family needs by combining professional services and Christian compassion.

Arkansas Baptist Home for Children. In the past twelve months, we have provided quality care for seventy-six children at the Children's Home. Some were there for only a short time, while the majority were there during the entire year. Of this number, there were forty-three new admissions during the year. In addition, thirteen children were pre-placed at the Home, but other permanent living arrangements were made for them. Our staff has been busy with discharge planning for our children, as well as taking new children into care. Our area workers will continue to work with these families as long as they need our help.

Our staff is dedicated to helping children come to grips with their personal and family problems; to help them grow and develop to utilize their full God-given potential; and to build and strengthen family relationships when possible.

Graduates. We had seven recent graduates in our program during this past school year; six of them graduating from high school and one from college. The graduates represented somewhat the spectrum of our child care services. Of the high school graduates, four of them are from the Children's Home and two from our foster care program.

Their time in our care ranged from less than one year to seven years. We are proud of the accomplishments of these young graduates and how they have been helped to overcome personal and family obstacles to reach this goal and set still higher goals for themselves.

Area Offices. Our area offices have seen an increase in the number of requests for help during this past year. Three hundred thirty-eight new referrals have been processed through these offices, representing a variety of problems. On an average, each referral represents services to three people. In addition to conducting intakes for the Children's Home, our area workers provided counseling services to families and children, as well as being involved in community and church projects relating to the needs of children.

Foster Homes — Group Home. Some of the children under our care benefited from the experience of living in a warm Christian foster home as a part of the family. Our foster homes are selected on the basis of a careful study and evaluation. During the year, seventeen of our children lived in foster homes under our supervision. It is gratifying to see a needful child and a resourceful foster family work together to assist the child in developing firm foundation material for life.

Our Group Home for Boys in Jonesboro provided care for ten boys during the year. These boys have the opportunity to live as a group in their community and benefit from the community resources and from concerned Christians who sponsor them. Casework services are provided for the boys and their families by our area director.

Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services is indeed grateful for the assistance received through the Cooperative Program, the annual Thanksgiving Offering, and other gifts. It is our desire and commitment to be good stewards of these funds as we channel them into appropriate services that exemplify the campassion of Christ.

The staff of Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services is devoted to helping the child and his family develop their fullest potential. Our services have expanded to keep up with current quality child care practices, family needs, and the ever present divine command to minister to those in need as taught in God's Word. This is a ministry of healing for many children and families — A Ministry of Love.

# Baptist Memorial Hospital Memphis, Tennessee

## Frank S. Groner, Administrator

A number of significant medical services were initiated at Baptist Memorial Hospital during 1971. Among these were:

- A 14-bed rehabilitation unit for those suffering from strokes was established at the hospital's Lamar Rehabilitation Unit with Dr. W. T. Satterfield, Jr., serving as medical director.
- One of the few pulmonary rehabilitation clinics to be found in a voluntary hospital was established as a part of the Pulmonary Physiology Department. This clinic provides services for those patients suffering from chronic lung diseases.
- An Australia antigen laboratory was established to screen for the presence of hepatitis in blood donated for transfusions.
- A 23-bed sub-intensive care unit for coronary patients was opened to supplement the facilities of the Coronary Intensive Care Unit.
- Two "ultra clean" operating rooms were developed to be used primarily for a surgical procedure known as a total hip replacement. Through high-efficiency ceiling filters and a laminar flow of air, a nearly sterile atmosphere is created. The Margaret Hamilton Endowment Fund donated \$75,000 toward the construction of these facilities.

- Two new Urology operating rooms were developed with X-ray and autoclaving facilities.
- An intensive care unit for newborn was placed in operation. This unit consists of 11 isolettes, each with its own support and monitoring facilities.
- Floors 18 and 19 in the Union East wing were completed and opened for patient service, providing 102 additional beds. Construction began on the completion of two shelled floors in the Madison East wing which are scheduled for occupancy in January 1973.
- An infection control program was instituted under the supervision of Miss Jane Orr, RN. Her responsibility is to maintain vigilant surveillance against infections to insure that Baptist Memorial Hospital is a clean, safe place for patient care.

The reputation of Baptist Memorial Hospital, while built on service, is maintained by its employees. Some achievements of particular note should be mentioned, and these include:

- Charles McKnight, hospital chaplain for the past 15 years, was awarded a Doctor of Humanics degree from Union University.
- Charles Baker, assistant administrator, was elected president of the Memphis Hospital Council.
- Dr. Frank Groner celebrated his 25th anniversary as hospital administrator on October 7, 1971.
- Dr. Frank Kroetz was appointed as the new director of the Cardiac Laboratories. Dr. Kroetz was formerly director of the Hemodynamics Laboratory and Assistant Professor of Internal Medicine at the University of Iowa.
- Joseph Powell, assistant administrator, was elected as a trustee of the Tennessee Hospital Association.

The hospital and its friends were saddened by the death of Dr. Jennings B. George, who was a member of the Board of Trustees from 1950 until his death on March 12, 1971. During this time Dr. George served as a vice president of the Board and as a member of its Executive Committee.

A very rewarding Religious Emphasis Week was conducted by Dr. John H. Boyle, Associate Professor of Psychology of Religion at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville. His theme for the week was entitled "Boundaries of Hope," and his presentations were televised to the patients by the hospital's closed circuit television system.

The hospital's 12 educational programs graduated many students to serve the health field. Among these were 41 graduating nurses, 34 of which remained to work at Baptist Memorial Hospital.

A two-year grant in the amount of \$89,939 was received from the John A. Hartford Foundation for use in the hospital's hepatitis research program.

The hospital's medical staff pledged \$215,000 toward the construction of a 400-seat auditorium and seminar center.

Baptist Memorial Hospital continues to maintain the lowest cost per patient day of all general hospitals in the United States of 1,000 beds or over. In addition to admitting more patients than any other voluntary hospital in the nation during 1971, BMH maintained the largest number of beds and the highest average number of inpatients.

# OUACHITA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY Arkadelphia, Arkansas

Daniel R. Grant, President

During the 1971-72 year, Ouachita Baptist University moved forward in faith and gratitude. This year should go down as one of the high points in Arkansas Baptist history because it was a year of unparalled commitment by Arkansas Baptists to Christian higher education. It was a year of remarkable discovery that working together sacrificially in a financial campaign for Christian higher education can lead to spiritual revival for individuals and churches, and to renewed support for the Cooperative Program for all causes of Arkansas Baptists.

The \$4 million Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign is clearly a modern miracle among Arkansas Baptists, and Ouachita will be eternally grateful for the leadership of men like W. O. Vaught, Rheubin South, Bo Huffman, Charles Ashcraft, Ben Elrod, and countless others.

Ouachita moved forward in faith by adopting a long-range campus development plan that will preserve the beauty and the tradition of the old campus core, while capitalizing on the remarkable beauty of the Ouachita River and the ravine in a new and exciting way. Construction was begun on the first and second units of a five-building "mega-structure," in confidence that the pledges in the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign will pay for this 1,5 million dollar project within three years. These first two units are a student center building and a classroom-office building, scheduled for completion in the summer of 1973. Planning was begun for the third unit in the mega-structure, the music-fine arts center. Terral-Moore Hall was remodeled to provide classrooms and offices on its second floor, and the Hobgood property was remodeled to provide a new home for the Home Economics Department.

Ouachita has also moved forward in faith by accepting for the fall of 1972 the largest freshman class (506) in six years — a 22 percent increase over 1971. Fall enrollment in 1972 is 1,511, an increase of nine percent over 1972. Only when Ouachita operated a nursing school was the freshman class and the total enrollment larger. This is an act of faith because it assumes that Ouachita can continue to attract and retain the kind of faculty that is characterized by special excellence in academic competence and in Christian commitment, as necessary for the larger number of students. Non-duplicating enrollment in 1971-72 — all graduate, undergraduate and special students during the 12-month period — was more than 2,000. Along with the good news about Ouachita, Arkansas Baptists need also to know that faculty salaries at Ouachita still rank near the bottom among senior colleges in Arkansas, and Arkansas colleges, in turn rank twelfth among the twelve Southern states. This requires a special kind of commitment and loyalty by Ouachita's faculty members.

During 1971-72 Ouachita continued those Christian distinctives of long standing: required Bible courses for all students, required chapel attendance, a Christian Focus Week, given full right-of-way inside and outside the classrooms, daily noonday prayer services, the Ralph Smith Lectures, and an almost countless number of special projects on and off the campus for Christian witness and service. More than twenty-four student revival teams served the various churches in Arkansas during the year, plus two special

"Contact Teams" available throughout the summer of 1972 for youth revivals, retreats, and seminars. A total of 183 Ouachita students were preparing for church-related vocations — 112 ministerial students, 41 for the music ministry, and 30 for other church-related vocations. Ouachita is proud of the record number of twenty-one "MK's" — children of Southern Baptist foreign missionaries, and of the large number of sons and daughters of pastors and others in church-related vocations. Student groups represented Ouachita well in intercollegiate competition — in drama, music, journalism, and athletics, including state championships in basketball, baseball, and track.

With the assistance of a generous gift from the Dermott Baptist Church, the "Herbert House" near the Ouachita campus was extensively remodeled to become a missionary residence home for Southern Baptist missionaries on furlough. Rev. and Mrs. Lloyd Neil, from Nigeria, became the first missionaries-in-residence in the spring semester of 1972, followed by Dr. and Mrs. Glen Hickey, from Brazil, in the summer of 1972. It is expected that this new project will bring the challenge of world missions to Ouachita students on a much more personal basis.

Progress in academic quality continued during 1971-72. With a faculty of approximately 100, the student-faculty ratio remained at a very favorable 14 to 1. Following highly successful accreditation examination visits in 1970 and 1971, Ouachita continued its full accreditation status with the North Central Association, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and the National Association of Schools of Music. The excellent reputation of Ouachita's School of Music continues to grow, and this is reflected in a steady increase in students enrolled in a music degree program during the past three years from 100 to 118 to 139. Ouachita's Graduate School, until recently primarily a summer school activity, has approached the practical limits of the present size faculty with close to 50 graduate students during the regular academic year. Degrees were given to 272 students last year – 240 Bachelors degrees, and 32 Masters degrees.

Ouachita's library continues to be equal to, or better than, most of the college libraries in the state in spite of larger appropriations for library books and staffs which the state colleges have been receiving in recent years. Inter-library cooperation among the private colleges in the state, as well as between Ouachita and Henderson State College in the establishment of a union card catalogue, provide extra library strength.

The Ouachita budget for 1971-72 was \$3,335,000, and is \$3,424,000 for the year 1972-73. Although student tuition and fees continue to be the largest single source of funds for this budget (approximately one-third of the total), the annual tuition charge would have to be more than \$400 greater for each student if it were not for the strong support provided by the Cooperative Program of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. This appropriation in the 1972 Convention budget included \$420,433 in the Operating Budget and \$156,797 in the Capital Needs Budget. Ouachita's Board of Trustees has directed that, as the pledges are paid in the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign, one dollar out of every three be designated for "non-bricks-and-mortar purposes." This will help provide a healthy balance between much needed improvements in buildings and grounds, and equally important strengthening of the faculty and of student financial assistance programs.

The 1971-72 year on the Ouachita campus was a very active year for special service to the denomination, beginning with the phenomenal Youth

Choir Day attended by more than 3,000 and climaxing with a mass choir performance with the Ouachita Band at half time during the opening football game. Among the many other church groups visiting the campus were the State WMU House Party, church youth retreats, Church Music Workshop, Regional Mission Action Conference, Adult Music Camp, Junior Music Camp, and the Air Force Spiritual Life Conference.

Ouachita Baptist University is deeply grateful to Arkansas Baptists for launching a new era in sacrificial support for Christian higher education, and is committed to faithful stewardship in this vital Christian cause.

# SOUTHERN BAPTIST COLLEGE Walnut Ridge, Arkansas 72476

The 1971-72 session of Southern Baptist College witnessed many high marks of achievement in the life of the institution. The board of trustees, the college administration, faculty and students of the college are extremely grateful to Baptists for the growing help and interest that made these achievements possible. The college personnel and students are often reminded of the support received from the churches comprising the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. The college catalogue carries a statement reminding the enrollee that our Baptist denomination is making an investment in his or her life as a student with the hope that great returns to the work of our Lord will come from this investment.

## **OUACHITA-SOUTHERN CAMPAIGN**

Southern Baptist College personnel are profoundly grateful for the significant way that so many churches and individuals have responded to the appeal of the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign. Never in our long history have our people done such a magnificent thing. The goal has been surpassed in pledges and yet more and more of the churches are still responding to the challenge.

The united nature of the appeal providing for major needs in both institutions for the immediate future, has met with the full approval of Arkansas Baptists. Arkansas Baptists like to work together rather than separately.

#### ENROLLMENT

The Office of Registrar of Southern reports that 1,330 different students enrolled during the year. This was seven more than for the previous year. This includes the Walnut Ridge campus, Blytheville Air Force Resident Center and extension centers at Senath, Missouri; Little Rock Air Force Base and Piggott, Arkansas. Though the enrollment on campus was down slightly over the previous year the enrollment at the other centers was larger.

#### **FINANCES**

With the help of the Lord the college was able to close the last year "in the black" despite the terrible problems incidental to the spiraling inflation of the national economy. Every thing continues to climb in price and the administration is constantly challenged to make every dollar do "double duty". Over half of the private colleges in America have regularly shown deficits in recent years. In a total budget of \$1,008,716.05 the college showed a net gain of \$43,742.67. The combined assets of the college stands at \$4,529,599.81 according to the most recent audit report.

The college is especially proud of the above financial situation in view of the fact that it receives less from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention than any other college in the Southern Baptist Convention receives from a state convention. The Arkansas Baptist budget produced \$55,754.00 for operations last year while an additional \$24,390.00 was provided from the budget for capital needs. The combined figure is still far less than the average provided junior colleges of the Southern Baptist Convention by the different state conventions. Southern is not complaining but rather wishes to point out that the institution is truly a "Baptist bargain" that our people should know more about.

At the same time the college has been so frugal in handling her finances she has tried to keep student charges from rising dramatically. Her tuition, room and board are still much lower than the average college in America. Truly this is a modern economic miracle.

## STUDENT ASSISTANCE

Southern Baptist College is known as "The Campus of Christian Purpose". In keeping with this motto the leadership of the college strives at all times to be as helpful as possible to all students to whom it can minister. Students needing help can secure grants, loans and work to help defray much, or even in some extreme cases all, of the costs for a college education. No college in America strives harder to help those deserving young people who really want a chance to get a quality education in a Christian atmosphere.

#### CHRISTIAN EMPHASIS

The college makes every positive effort to provide a program of Christian emphasis in classroom and extra-curricular activities. During the year scores of young people were won to the Lord on the campus. Student groups made countless appearances all over the mid-South and in several states in revivals and other services resulting in hundreds making Christian commitments. Several young men felt the call to the Christian ministry and are now training for this service. Southern is not hesitant in pressing the intelligent appeals of the Christian faith upon the young men and women who come to her for college training.

#### ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Southern is proud to report that it has one of the best faculties found in the two-year colleges in America. A recent survey made by a graduate

student working on a doctoral thesis, revealed that the faculty of Southern has the highest number of years of preparation held by any two-year college faculty within five hundred miles. That must be a record for a Baptist college.

Not only are the faculty members well trained, they are also dedicated Christians, active in their churches. They are also dedicated to the causes of Christian education.

#### BUILDING PROGRAM

Southern is now in the process of construction of the Fine Arts section of the new Auditorium and Fine Arts Building. The building will house all of the music activities of the college and the art department. It will be one of the best buildings on the campus and one that any college would own with pride. Construction should be complete by late fall and will be occupied by the second semester.

The auditorium is scheduled for construction during 1973. It will provide seating for up to 1100 people. It is sorely needed to provide a place for chapel and general convocations.

As funds are produced by the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign other needed facilities will be added. It is thought that the campaign will produce enough funds to complete the structural needs of Southern for the foreseeable future. If all of the pledges are paid the college will realize about \$1,000,000 from this effort.

## **OUR COMMITMENT**

Southern Baptist College leadership believes that her major mission is to serve God by serving the educational needs of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in Northeast Arkansas. This need is two-fold: (1) To provide a college of high educational quality in easy reach of the 2,500,000 people within 100 miles; and (2) To provide an intelligent and positive Christian witness to the multitudes within her influence and to the ends of the earth, through the lives of young people and Christian leaders who will be trained within her walls.

We express our abiding gratitude to Arkansas Baptists for their funds and prayers. May God bless everyone of you.

# CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS, INC. 301 Waldon Building, Little Rock, Arkansas 72201

This Annual Report covers eight months of the administration of Dr. W. Henry Goodloe, who retired May 31, 1972, and four months of Reverend Edward W. Harris, who succeeded Dr. Goodloe on June 1, 1972.

As of October 1, 1972, the wet forces have filed petitions for Local Option Elections to be held November 7 in three counties, Baxter, Newton and Stone. The petitions in Newton County are being challenged by drys and may be invalidated. Stone and Baxter Counties face very strong challenges again. In Washington County the dry forces filed petitions for an election. Because of invalidation of names, the petitions were ruled inadequate. The County Clerk has granted an additional ten days for amendment and correction. If the 900 new names prove sufficient, the dry forces face a very difficult uphill fight in Washington County. Threats of elections in Cleburne, Montgomery and Pike Counties did not materialize. Clearly the wet forces are concentrating upon our resort areas, because of the influx of tourists. Dry forces must gird themselves for repeated battles at each future General Election.

The 1972 Special Session of the Arkansas General Assembly dealt with two matters of particular concern to the Foundation. One was Act 68, setting harsher penalties for pushers of illegal drugs, and Act 67, establishing the Arkansas Drug Abuse Authority.

In the first month of the new Director's administration, he led the Foundation in opposing applications by the Safeway Stores of Arkansas and other chain grocery stores to permit the sale of wines in those retail outlets possessing beer permits. We took the position that wine and other hard liquor sales ought to be separated from the sale of foods, since wine is a narcotic and not a food. We also took the position that to extend such sales where family groups did their shopping was to expose children and youth to a dangerous temptation that was needless and senseless. The Editor of the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine, Dr. J. E. Sneed, as well as Baptist ministers and laymen played an important part in the fight. The Executive Director of the Christian Civic Foundation had the privilege of representing the Foundation before the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board on August 10 at a public hearing. At that time, he filed a copy of the very strong editorial which Dr. Sneed wrote in support of our effort, along with the written statement by the Director. The verdict was a unanimous one in opposition to granting the applications for wine permits. The solidarity of our Baptist support, by clergy and laity, was one of the best examples of how Christians can implement their moral convictions in public expressions of support for a clear-cut cause of righteousness.

During the past year, our Educational Assistant, Mr. Paul Ramsey, presented our Alcohol-Narcotics Education Program in 97 public schools, speaking to approximately 48,000 students. Of this number, 58 (or 60%) were classroom sessions. He also spoke to 7 churches, the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, 3 youth clubs, 2 community workshops, 1 PTA, 2 civic clubs, and 1 ministerial association. He also had one day engagements at four Methodist youth camps and led groups at Aldersgate Methodist Camp during three weeks in August. Paul, his wife, and daughter spent three weeks at the Baptist Assembly at Siloam Springs. He attended the Tane-Baylor University Alcohol-Narcotics Workshop at Baylor University, Waco, Texas, August 2-5, with the Executive Director, Reverend Harris.

We have written 135 schools asking for engagements for our Educational Assistant for the 1972-73 school term. Sixty dates have been confirmed already in 57 schools, and we anticipate a total of approximately 110. Engagements also include 4 civic clubs, 4 churches, 1 church youth rally. He will also attend the State Teachers meeting.

Our Alcohol-Narcotics Education Program has wide acceptance in our public schools. Because of the nature of our organization as a non-profit, inter-denominational, non-political group, we find many doors open to us and many areas of cooperation with State agencies available. Our present emphasis has been largely upon Hard Drugs, but the growing demands of youth and leaders in the 70's is for a new emphasis upon Alcohol as our most dangerous narcotic.

The new Executive Director attended the Biennial meeting of the American Council on Alcohol Problems at Green Lake, Wisconsin, September 11-13, in addition to the Tane-Baylor University Workshop, August 2-5. He has preached in many churches as invitations have been extended.

One of the pressing problems that faced the new Executive Director was a financial emergency during the first four months. Deficit financing for the past four years reached an end in May, 1972, when the last reserve resources, \$600 AP&L Stock, was sold to complete the payment of the salary of the retiring Executive Director. Each succeeding payroll date brought a new crisis, because of a budget that had not been underwritten. The figures below represent the barest minimum of expenditures. The deficit of \$1,171.22 at the end of September, 1972, was met by the gracious advancement of the State Baptist Convention's total commitment for the remainder of the calendar year. Emergency funds promised will be needed to complete the calendar year. Prospects for 1973 appear brighter because of promises by our supporters, but the remaining months of 1972 will be difficult ones unless new funds are forthcoming between now and December 31

#### AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The Bible speaks to the heart of man, whether African or American, Asian, or European. And it is the sole purpose of your American Bible Society to provide this Book to men, women and children, everywhere, in a language they can understand and at a price they can afford.

This simple statement of the Society's purpose carries no restriction. In its incompassing mission, the Bible Society seeks to bring God's Word to all people everywhere. For the Bible Society is wholeheartedly convinced that the redemptive power of God is released through the reading of His Word and that, for multitudes of people, their first and only chance to come face to face with Christ may be through the pages of Scripture.

Thus the American Bible Society has an urgent goal: to provide Scriptures for all people everywhere in the language they can easily understand and in attractive formats that will arrest their attention and lead them to the discovery of Jesus Christ.

## SCRIPTURE TRANSLATION

The opening of this report quotes a Thai hospital patient confirming that the words of John's Gospel come from God. Such conviction is possible for this patient — and for countless others around the world — because he

reads The Word in the understandable words of his native language.

The Bible Society is presently engaged in a top-priority project, the translation of the Bible into everyday speech for all the major languages, plus many key secondary languages and dialects. Nearly 50 projects now exist, involving languages and dialects spoken by more than 70% of the world's population. In addition they continue to publish and distribute large number of Scriptures in other versions, including King James and Revised Standard Version.

People who speak languages in which no Scripture is yet available are not neglected. By 1965, at least one Book of the Bible had been translated into 1,250 languages and dialects. In the ensuing six years, translations of at least one Book of the Bible had been published by the Bible Societies in an additional 207 languages.

At the present time, 97% of the world's population can secure at least a Portion (a single Book) in their own language, and approximately 3,000 translators are presently at work on some six hundred new translations and revisions. At the close of 1971, at least one Book of the Bible had been published in 1,457 languages and dialects; the complete Bible in 253.

#### DISTRIBUTION

During the past year, ABS distributed a total of 90,129,921 Scriptures within the United States. This total reflects the continued growth and interest in the use of Scripture both within and outside the church.

As a result of special campaigns and unanticipated popularity, "Good News for Modern Man" is now circulating in almost 33 million copies. This makes the small volume the all-time best-selling paperback publication. Dr. Porter Routh accepted the symbolic 25 millionth copy of "Good News" on behalf of the Southern Baptist Convention.

In addition to the distribution programs within the USA, the American Bible Society is a leading member of the United Bible Societies, a fellowship of fifty Bible Societies around the world at work in 158 countries and territories. ABS supplied 53% of the 1971 United Bible Societies' World Service Budget to aid non-self-supporting national Bible Societies, thereby providing over half of the 1971 world distribution total last year, 173 million Scriptures.

# MINISTRY TO THE BLIND

A total of 747,131 Scriptures in special formats (Braille, records, cassettes, tapes) were provided for the blind, a 36.2% increase over 1970. A Braille edition of the Psalms was made available in Today's English Version.

## ARMED SERVICES

Distribution of complete Bibles to members of the Armed Services through chaplains reached 54,490 copies, an increase of 33.3% over 1970.

## CAMPUS MINISTRY

A special edition of 150,000 copies of ABS/TEV New Testament with a cover displaying the seals of the universities of the Big Ten athletic conference was distributed to students at these Midwest schools. The Evangelism Department of the Home Mission Board used a special edition of ABS/TEV on college campuses.

## SOUTHERN BAPTIST SUPPORT THE WORK

Southern Baptists consider the American Bible Society an essential part of their own worldwide mission program and believe in the missionary importance of giving to the Society.

Resolutions commending the work of the American Bible Society and requesting the churches to contribute to its ongoing support have been adopted by state conventions and by the Southern Baptist Convention.

Through gifts to ABS, Southern Baptist churches have shown their deep and continued interest in providing the Word of God for every man in his own language. Following is the record of the Southern Baptist Convention in recent years:

The 1971 gifts from Southern Baptist churches, totaling \$240,249, stood first among all denominations contributing to the Society. Cumulative church gifts last year totaled \$1,246,190. The Arkansas Baptist State Convention gave \$7,232.19 last year, or less than  $1\phi$  per member.

Although Southern Baptists stand first in total gifts, the per capita gift from more than 11.8 million members amounts to slightly more than two cents per person.

# Missionary Support

The sending out and maintaining of missionaries is primary in Southern Baptist overseas missions through the channel of the Foreign Mission Board. At the close of 1971 the Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,526. This included 169 missionary associates, 5 special project medical personnel, and 125 missionary journeymen. Appointments during the year totaled 226 (120 career, 28 associates, 67 journeymen, 2 special project medical workers, and 9 career reappointments).

Southern Baptist Missions (organizations of missionaries) and national Baptist groups in dozens of countries continue to call for reinforcements in missionary personnel. Some requests are still not filled, even though they have been repeated for several years and are still urgent.

On January 1, 1972, Southern Baptist missionaries were under appointment to 75 geographical or political entities.\* During 1971, missionaries took up residence in Upper Volta, Laos, and Surinam. Personnel assigned to Mozambique and Barbados were awaiting official government permission for residence and work in those countries.

(Work in Libya and Turkey is with an Englishlanguage Baptist church in each country.)

### Evangelism And Church Development

Underlying all our missionary endeavors is the ultimate purpose of leading people to new life in Jesus Christ and the cultivation of New Testament churches. Organized churches with which Southern Baptist missionaries are related on mission fields now total 6,045, of which more than 70 percent are self-supporting. Work and accomplishments reported are largely those of national churches, leaders, and conventions, with the assistance of missionary co-workers and resources from Southern Baptists.

The program of evangelism and church development includes many types of ministry: radio and television, English-language churches, lay-leadership training, stewardship promotion, camps and conferences; work with women, men, and youth; music and religious education.

In 1971, national Baptist organizations were formed in several countries: Bahama Islands, Indonesia, Kenya, Tanzania, and Thailand. In the latter four, home missionaries were assigned to serve among the people of those nations. Baptists in several other lands strengthened their home and foreign mission witness.

A national evangelistic campaign was held in Portugal, and large-scale sectional campaigns were conducted in Spain, India, Brazil, Chile, and Ecuador. In Jordan a remarkable spirit of renewal permeated the Baptist churches there.

New recording or radio-TV studios were developing an outreach in France, Italy, Indonesia, Brazil, and Ecuador. Progress was made in camp programs in Guyana, and a new retreat and training center was opened in the Philippines.

### Schools And Student Work

The training of national leaders is a prerequisite to strong indigenous churches. Educational institutions under Baptist auspices in various lands may include all levels from kindergarten through university. Of special importance is the development of pastors and other church leaders through theological schools and in programs below the full seminary level.

New Bible schools for the training of church workers were opened in Togo, Uganda, and Austria. A mobile Bible school was launched in Indonesia, while in Vietnam and Guatemala theological extension programs were started. A plan for theological education through directed private study and group discussions was developing in the Caribbean.

Work among students in university circles was strengthened as several new projects were launched: a Baptist student center in Israel, a coffeehouse in Mexico, and an outreach library/youth center in India.

#### **Publication Work**

Publication ministries are an integral part of Southern Baptist overseas missions, as all kinds of Christian literature are provided for purposes of evangelism and the developing of vigorous church life. Our missionaries are related to publishing centers in 23 lands and to informal literature production programs in a number of other countries. They assisted in producing nearly 20 million pieces of literature: tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, hymnals, and other items.

During 1971, a writing workshop in Rhodesia opened the way for national black Christians to participate in the writing of Baptist literature. Journalism workshops in Uruguay also served to develop national Baptist talents. The varied needs of a Baptist literature ministry for French-speaking countries of West Africa were discussed by missionaries in a conference in Togo during the year.

Reading clubs, libraries, and correspondence courses continued to provide means of reaching thousands of people with the gospel.

### Hospitals And Medical Care

The program of hospitals and medical care serves the physical needs of thousands of people who would otherwise be neglected and often opens strategic doors for evangelistic witness. During 1971, missionaries and national workers engaged in this ministry treated nearly 56,000 inpatients and saw more than 941,000 outpatients.

Construction of the Baptist hospital in Bangalore, India, progressed during 1971. In Paraguay, a medical team at the Baptist hospital performed the first heart valve replacements in the nation. Day clinics in local churches and mission points were helping to meet health needs in several countries.

### Benevolent Ministries

Benevolent ministries include agricultural programs, good will and community centers, children's homes, and direct relief work. During 1971, Southern Baptists, through the Foreign Mission Board, provided funds for victims of disease, war, and natural disasters in several countries, particularly in East Pakistan, now Bangladesh.

A day-care program was set up by Baptists in Vietnam, and the Baptist program of social ministries received formal approval and recognition by the Vietnamese government.

Agricultural projects continued to provide help and a Christian witness in a number of lands. A rural life center was started in the Philippines, and agricultural mission work was launched in Venezuela.

Good will and community centers in 16 countries reached people in varied ways: literacy classes, home-making courses, Bible study clubs, recreation programs, and evangelistic services. The 20 children's homes maintained by Baptists in mission lands cared for more than 1,000 boys and girls last year.

#### Contributions

At the end of 1971, Southern Baptists' contributions for foreign missions totaled \$33,719,447 (a per capita gift of \$2.80, nine cents more than in 1970). The 1971 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering goal was \$16,750,000- an increase over the \$16,220,105 contributed (as of May 1, 1971) through the 1970 offering.

Approximately 50 percent of the Southern Baptist Convention Cooperative Program funds are made available annually for foreign missions. This is the basis upon which sustained advance can be built. Still needed urgently overseas fields are land, buildings, and equipment, amounting to several million dollars' worth.

### HOME MISSION BOARD Southern Baptist Convention Atlanta, Georgia

### Arthur B. Rutledge, Executive Secretary-Treasurer

Many of the nation's longstanding problems dominated the news of 1971 in home missions. Such problems as crime and violence, hostility and alienation, alcoholism and drug abuse, racial tensions and family problems, plus war and economic stress burdened concerned Christians. Many were encouraged, however, by what seems to be a spiritual awakening among youth and by a freshly exposed hunger for God. A favorable climate strengthens our Christian witness.

Those who serve Christ in this nation are placed in the midst of one of the great evangelism and mission fields of the world. With approximately 80 million not identified with any religious group and a high percentage of church members nominally related to the work of Christ, we face needs of the first magnitude, and humanly speaking, what happens in America in a large part determines what happens in the spread of the gospel around the world.

### Missionaries Number 2,229

The rising cost of living and a slowdown in giving affected the mission force, which numbers close to the same figure as one year ago. However, more than 400 missionaries were appointed in all categories. Of those under appointment, approximately 900 are career missionaries, 712 associate missionaries, 64 US-2, 73 state convention staff members supported in part, and 480 pastors who receive church pastoral aid. Two-thirds of all missionaries are jointly supported by state conventions, and only one-third are entirely supported by the Home Mission Board. This mission force serves in all fifty states, Puerto Rico, and Panama.

### Evangelism Launches TV, Bus, And Renewal Efforts

In cooperation with the Radio and Television Commission, the Division of Evangelism will premier in October a weekly television presentation featuring Kenneth Chafin, the Spring Street Singers, and special guests in an unapologetic presentation of the faith leading to personal commitment.

The Division of Evangelism also has added staff members for specialized work — in renewal evangelism, Reid Hardin, and in bus evangelism, William Powell.

### 909 Chaplains Serve

Southern Baptist ministers served as chaplains in the military, in hospitals, institutions, and industry. There were 573 in the military (reflecting slightly the reduction in the armed forces — last year the total was 617); 61 in Veteran's Administration; 172 in hospital chaplaincy; 84 in institutional; and 19 in industrial chaplaincy.

### Church Loans Broadens Service

The Division of Church Loans now considers requests for church loans from groups in the older, established states of the Convention. In addition, the division considers church loan requests from "Negro and other ethnic Baptist churches."

### Disaster Relief Provided

In the wake of Hurricane Fern which hit the Texas coast in the fall of 1971, the Board contributed \$1,000 in disaster relief. Earlier in the year, \$50,000 was given to assist the California Baptist General Convention and the churches in recovering from the earthquake which shook the San Fernando Valley area in February.

### Crisis Work Continues

Several programs continue to give attention to ministries in areas of critical human need, in keeping with the "Crisis Statement" adopted by the Convention in 1968 and reaffirmed the following year. In keeping with the Board's action of March, 1971, which discontinued the "Crisis Committee," the Home Mission Board administration assigned to the Strategy Planning Group the responsibility for responses to these needs.

### Student Summer Personnel

A total of 960 student summer mission personnel were under appointment in 1971, 693 sponsored by the Home Mission Board and 267 by BSU. Eighty-seven of the 693 sponsored by the Board received no compensation and 21 paid their own travel expenses. More than 900 are expected to be appointed in 1972.

### Extend Now Emphasized

Church extension continues to receive one of the top priorities in home mission work, and a major emphasis is planned using the theme, "Extend Now." Leaders continue to push for those methods which make full use of laity in leading home Bible fellowships, especially in the early growth period for a church. Also, the "Extend Now" emphasis stresses the use of organized work, such as Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible Schools, and other organizations as first units, plus community events which help to start work within an area.

### 90 New Language Congregations

Mission leaders in language work led in starting 90 new congregations among Arabs, Hungarians, Rumanians, Spanish, Slavic, Portuguese, Estonians, and Yugoslavs. This work reports 886 couples and 121 single missionaries under appointment. These serve in approximately 45 states, the District of Columbia, Panama, and Puerto Rico.

### Interfaith Witness

More than 200,000 copies of pamphlets informing Southern Baptists of how to relate to other faiths were distributed by the Department of Interfaith Witness. Leaders are working to develop a nationwide team of laymen equipped to witness across religious lines.

### Pioneer Missions Emphasized

The work of pioneer missions no longer has specific staff personnel assigned to promote the emphasis, but the goals are incorporated in other programs, particularly those of church loans, establishing new churches and church-type missions, associational administration service, language missions, and Christian social ministries.

### Associational Services

The administration of associations has been strengthened through planning, conducting, and evaluating the work in associations, the sharing of findings through conferences and publications, and through the development of associational strategy awareness conferences. The Associational Administration bulletin serves as an effective link in providing these services.

# Rural-Urban Missions Strengthened

The in-between world, where the metropolitan area meets the rural-urban fringe, is receiving study by mission leaders, and they are developing a strategy to assist churches and associations to prepare for the tensions and opportunities which accompany such changes. A stronger emphasis also is developing to aid in the formation of fields of churches for stronger leadership and services.

### Metropolitan Missions Looks At Transition

Mission leaders conducted experimental programs in urban training for a local church in a transitional area and initiated plans for conducting local church urban training on a large scale. An extensive emphasis is being placed on long-range planning projects for metropolitan associations.

### Inflation Hampers Work

Income for the Home Mission Board, primarily through the Cooperative Program and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, continues to exceed \$15 million, but the increase each year amounts to less than three percent while operating costs have increased by six percent annually. Slight increases in salaries and fringe benefits have eaten away at continued expansion of home mission work.

Cecil Etheredge, missionary personnel secretary, said reduced funds have slowed the appointment of many qualified people.

"The hardest 'no' we have to say is to the mission interns who have prepared themselves for years for this type of service," he said.

Another example — Etheredge said that 105 applied for appointment to the US-2 ministry this year. Sixty-nine of these were approved but the mission departments came up with funds to use only 28.

The same type of financial pinch is being felt in all mission work, forcing mission leaders into greater use of laity, low-cost facilities, combined church fields, and other ways to stretch the mission dollar.

"Much of this might be a blessing in disguise," said Arthur B. Rutledge, executive secretary of the Home Mission Board. He indicated that the SBC Executive Committee asked the Convention for a 9.8 percent increase for the HMB for 1973, and he thought churches were responding well to the appeals for increased giving through the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering promoted by Woman's Missionary Union.

### THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD Southern Baptist Convention Nashville, Tennessee

James L. Sullivan, Executive Secretary-Treasurer

The major emphasis for the Sunday School Board during the year 1970-71 was upon new materials and methods designed to meet the needs and wants of Southern Baptists.

Several significant projects have been launched to help the churches expand and improve their ministries. These include People-to-People campaigns; WIN (Witness Involvement Now) campaigns and strategy; Leadership Readiness Conferences; Operation Talk Back; Teach-O-Graph materials; and the publication of the one-volume Bible commentary, "The Teacher's Bible Commentary."

Total income was \$42,400,000, an increase of \$4,017,000 over the previous year. Net earnings are used for working capital, reserves, and fixed assets. Other income derived from sales is used for assisting churches through education and service programs, cooperative work with state conventions, and other Southern Baptist Convention support.

The Board transferred to the Southern Baptist Convention \$321,467 for operating expenses; also provided was \$949,638 to state conventions in keeping with the objective to assist state conventions in the promotion of Sunday School, Training Union, music ministry, student work, church administration, church architecture, church library, church recreation, vocational guidance and family ministry.

BROADMAN PRESS released 55 new titles and reprinted 86 Broadman books. Sales of books were \$1,121,240, an increase of \$6,925 over the previous year.

BROADMAN FILMS released 4 new motion pictures, 27 filmstrips, 11 cassette tapes, 2 audiovisuals, and 1 equipment item. Sales totaled \$773,051, an increase of \$22,530 over last year.

A total of 63 new Broadman supplies were added to the product line. Total sales were \$1,770,910, a decrease of \$72,206 from the previous year.

BROADMAN MUSIC released 149 new titles and reprinted 208 titles. Sales totaled \$651,811, an increase of \$41,826 over last year.

CONVENTION PRESS added 97 items to the product line. Sales totaled \$2,315,962, a decrease of \$641,089.

THE CHURCH ADMINISTRATION DEPARTMENT assists churches, associations, state conventions and other Southern Baptist Convention programs in conducting and improving church administration in the individual churches.

Pastoral work is a major emphasis. Fourteen Pastoral Leadership Seminars and fifteen Pastoral Ministries Workshops will be conducted in many areas of the nation.

A revival-type campaign, "Church Rally to ReaLife," has been designed and tested. It will feature gospel singing, testimonies, scripture memorization and ideas for personal devotional activities. A rally materials package is available for church members which includes scripture cards, Bible study lessons, devotional leaflets and witnessing cards. The pastors will receive a filmclip and a pastor's manual.

"Equipping for Ministry in the World" will be observed in April, 1973. This observance consists of Life Commitment Month in April and Church Vocations Sunday on April 22. Materials include a nine-session study workbook, "Where Do I Go from Here: Work, Worship, Leisure," which is available at Baptist Book Stores.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT has given major emphasis during 1971-72 to Sunday School enlargement campaigns, strenthening associational Sunday School workers and training Sunday School leaders. These also will be major points of emphasis for the coming year.

Nationwide Bible Conferences were held in Denver, Colo., and Richmond, Va. Next year 4,000 people are expected to attend the Mid-America Bible Conference in Memphis, Tenn., March 26-29, 1973. The first Spring Youth Bible Conference will be held at Ridgecrest Baptist Conference Center April 16-20, 1973.

Volume one of the Youth Bible Survey Series, a set of seven books designed to survey the entire Bible will be released July 1, 1973. Attendance at Glorieta and Ridgecrest Conference Centers during Sunday School weeks was 12,393 for the summer of 1972.

The Sunday School department planned and conducted 21 church conferences, 4 college conferences and 10 other conferences on the total Weekday Bible Study Program.

Vacation Bible School, an extension of the Sunday School department, had 107,849 VBS workers from 18,247 churches trained in 1,250 associational VBS clinics.

Vacation Bible School statistics for the past year show increases in professions of faith, enrollment, average attendance, adult enrolment, number of mission schools, and the number of prospects discovered. A total of 28,463 Vacation Bible Schools had an enrolment of 3,241,947 pupils in 1971.

THE CHURCH TRAINING DEPARTMENT assists churches, associations, and state conventions in establishing, enlarging, conducting, and improving the Training Union program in the churches.

Attention was given to interpretation of new materials and leader training in various study meetings. WIN (Witness Involvement Now) training was introduced and program personnel provided WIN orientation for 1,701 persons at Glorieta and Ridgecrest.

THE BOOK STORE DIVISION assists churches by making available church supplies through strategically located retail stores. W. O. Thomason, new book store division director, announced the new slogan for the Baptist Book Stores as "Partners in Growth".

Lifeway, a book store channel to the general public operated by Southern Baptists, opened its first store in Jackson, Miss., recently, as a pilot project for the book store division. Baptist Book Stores in Carbondale, Ill., and Tampa, Fla., were relocated. Book store sales totaled \$19,383,995, an increase of \$768,595 over last year.

THE CHURCH ARCHITECTURE DEPARTMENT consulted with 3,662 individual churches and denominational organizations and provided services for 143 churches and/or missionaries in 28 foreign countries. The total number of answered requests for the year was 7,054.

NATIONAL STUDENT MINISTRIES assist churches, campus Baptist organizations, associations, and state conventions in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving their programs for college and university students and faculty members, including internationals.

The name National Student Ministries, (formerly Student Department), was adopted Oct. 1, 1971.

The total number of student ministries was reported to be 796, an increase of 95 over the previous year. A total of 4,053 conversions, 9,074 commitments to church vocations, and 110,922 students in BSU were reported.

CHURCH LIBRARY DEPARTMENT personnel participated in a total of 212 field engagements. A total of 505 churches achieved at least merit recognition in the Church Library Achievement Guide, and 9,119 credits were earned in the library services section of the New Church Study Course.

CHURCH RECREATION DEPARTMENT personnel sponsored or conducted 21 consultations with churches planning a recreation building; 11 consultations with churches, associations, or state agencies, planning for camps and assemblies; and 5 Instructors' Courses to assist state conventions in training potential approved workers.

A total of 2,951 persons received four or more hours training in conferences, workshops and clinics. A total of 1,156 children were involved in department-sponsored day camping at Ridgecrest Baptist Conference Center.

THE CHURCH MUSIC DEPARTMENT participated in 23 state music festivals in 10 states, made 22 visits to 5 seminaries and 14 Southern Baptist Colleges for program interpretation, and attended evangelism conferences, church music leadership conferences, and youth music workshops. Church Music also provided music leadership for four weeks at Glorieta and Ridgecrest, and for the Nationwide Bible Conferences.

The purpose of the CONFERENCE CENTER DIVISION is to provide facilities and to operate the conference centers as a service to other programs of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Glorieta and Ridgecrest Baptist Conference Centers are the two main facilities — additionally, the division also operates Camp Ridgecrest and Camp Crestridge with a spiritual emphasis for boys and girls.

The Conference Center Division, formerly the Assembly Division, acquired its new name during the summer when the Sunday School Board Trustees voted to change the name and adopt a conference program involving all-year operation.

The registered attendance for the regular 12-week denominational conferences during the 1972 summer season was 29,530 at Ridgecrest and 26,225 at Glorieta.

# CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION Southern Baptist Convention Nashville, Tennessee 37219

The Christian Life Commission's stewardship of emphasis on applied Christianity included some particularly significant developments during the past year.

Through continuing study and research, the staff sought to maintain an adequate base for the Commission's various ministries in the general area of Christian social concerns.

Close cooperation was maintained with the other agencies of the Convention and with other Baptist bodies in fostering practical expressions of the Christian faith.

Reliable and current resource materials on drugs, pornography, gambling, sex education, ecology, and related topics were provided to the Baptist constituency.

Substantial progress was made in channeling Christian social concerns into Baptist life in Latin America.

Widely diversified speaking engagements touching all segments of Southern Baptist life were filled; and special liaison was maintained with Baptist seminaries and seminarians.

The writing and channeling of appropriate materials on applied Christianity continued, and special resource papers on drugs, pollution, and the urban crisis were inserted in **Home Missions** magazine.

Literature sales for 71 titles amounted to \$22,372.92 during the year for a gain of 6.08% over 1970.

The Commission's weekly column, "On the Moral Scene," was carried in many of the state Baptist papers.

The 1971 national seminar on "National Priorities and Christian Responsibility" and the 1972 national seminar, "SALT '72," were unusually well attended and materials from the conferences were widely utilized on radio, in print, by tapes and cassettes, and through local churches.

Five small regional conferences were held on "The Local Church and Christian Social Concern" across the territory of the Convention.

A close working relationship was maintained with the state Christian Life Commissions.

A particularly significant observance of Race Relations Sunday was sponsored.

Many special activities were engaged in such as the preparation for pastors of a cassette tape on "Pomography — A Christian Perspective," production of an NBC "Analogue" national radio program, participation in the White House Conference on Aging, sponsorship of a research project on Southern Baptists and the Bill of Rights, and work to combat legalized gambling.

Dr. William M. Pinson's book on "A Program of Application for a Local Church: Suggestions for Christian Social Action" was printed in first draft, and distribution for revision and subsequent reprinting was begun.

The Commission also served as the secretariat for both the Southern Baptist Social Service Association and the Southern Baptist Association of Executives of Homes for the Aging. In line with the Commission's Convention-assigned responsibilities concerning peace with justice, the services of a certified United Nations Non-Governmental Observer were also maintained.

The Christian Life Commission is especially glad to work with Baptist associations and churches in activating Christian Life Committees to maintain a continuing emphasis on Christian social concerns.

### EDUCATION COMMISSION Southern Baptist Convention Nashville, Tennessee

Nineteen and seventy-one was a banner year for the Education Commission. State conventions, Southern Baptist Convention agencies, as well as Baptist colleges and schools, greatly increased their calls on the Education Commission for assistance in a wide range of areas, including trustee orientations, accreditation, faculty workshops, institutional self-studies, assistance with admissions policies and procedures, faculty and personnel placement, denominational relations, adult education, vocational guidance, finances, public relations, administrative counsel, to name some of the major areas.

According to prior agreement, the Education Commission completely phased out its work in vocational guidance, transferring all this responsibility to the Baptist Sunday School Board. However, the Education Commission will continue to work with the Sunday School Board in establishing vocational guidance centers on Baptist college campuses.

Another major achievement in 1971 was the production of new tracts and literature having to do with the work of the Commission, student recruitment, teacher placement, philosophy and purpose of Christian higher education, and the publication of an updated survey showing the courses offered by various Southern Baptist colleges and schools.

One of the most significant new publications is An Orientation Manual for College Trustees which has already had a wide sale. Many state conventions are now sponsoring annual trustee orientation conferences in addition to the work in this area undertaken by the individual boards.

Baptist schools along with all other colleges in the private sector of higher education are experiencing grave difficulties particularly in the matter of rising costs. Although other private schools show a drop in enrollment, Baptist colleges on the whole last year showed an increase of more than 2,000 students. In addition to this, two colleges that previously had been junior colleges have now become fully accredited senior colleges. These are Gardner-Webb College in Boiling Springs, North Carolina and Averett in Danville, Virginia. Southern Baptist theological seminaries made an important step forward by agreeing on new degree requirements and new degree nomenclature.

The Education Commission is looking forward in 1972 to concentrating on improved communication, particularly in the area of denominational relations and by improving services to Southern Baptist colleges and schools. These goals are outlined in detail under the program statements.

1. The Program of Education Leadership and Coordination.

Goals for 1972-73 include conducting seminars in a number of areas including public relations, student recruitment, and improved field work programs on Baptist college campuses. Additional goals are improved communication with Baptist state papers, promoting additional trustee orientation conferences both at the state and institutional level and working more closely with

all SBC agencies in programs in areas where there is mutual interest.

During 1971 several major objectives were achieved including working with Baptist colleges in area of accreditation and serving as liaison between Southern Baptist colleges and schools and the Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges, the Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges, The American Alumni Council, Protestant Council of Universities and Colleges, American Association of Higher Education, the Association of American Colleges, and the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools. The Educator was completely redesigned and reprogrammed. The Education Commission also worked with the United College Board for Development of black higher education and continued its services as consultant for the American Baptist Theological Seminary.

### 2. The Program of School and College Studies and Surveys.

A number of goals have been set for 1972 and 73. These include sponsoring a national convocation on trusteeship by bringing together board chairmen and other trustees to Nashville for a two-day conference centered mainly around the role of the trustees and denominational relations. The Commission will continue to study adult education working closely with the Seminary Extension Department to establish new programs on Baptist college campuses. The Commission working with the Baptist Sunday School Board will seek to establish during 1972 and 73 additional vocational guidance centers on Baptist college campuses. A major goal for 1972-73 will be developing trends, finances, management, credit transfer, and interinstitutional cooperation.

The major accomplishments for 1971 consisted of working with state secretaries and individual institutions in areas ranging from denominational relations to institutional management. The Commission also assisted individual institutions in curriculum development and interinstitutional relations. One of the most rewarding achievements of 1971 was assisting several states in developing trustee orientation conferences. The Commission also assisted the Seminary Extension Department in establishing several new extension centers on Baptist college campuses. The Commission co-sponsored with the Seminary Extension Department a two-day conference in Nashville with selected college representatives on the matter of adult education. In addition to this a number of surveys were conducted in the area of costs, enrollment, admission procedures, interinstitutional procedures, and fringe benefits.

# 3. The Program of Teacher-Personnel Recruitment and Placement Service.

The program goals for 1972-73 will be to continue to upgrade the placement service and more actively recruit dedicated men and women with the highest academic qualifications. A greater emphasis will be placed on discovering qualified Baptist administrative personnel since the placement office receives more and more requests in this area. The Commission also will seek to

engage more active participation on the part of pastors, student secretaries and other Convention personnel in finding qualified Baptist teachers as administrative personnel.

The major accomplishment in this area during 1971 was to redesign the program of teacher and personnel placement and to produce new literature in this area. Two different surveys gave overwhelming indications of the high value which Baptist colleges place on this service.

4. The Program of Student Recruitment and Convention Relations
Our goals for 1972-73 include sponsoring regional
workshops on student recruitment and denominational relations,
encouraging Baptist state conventions and Baptist institutions to
play a greater role in observing the annual Conventionwide
emphasis on Baptist seminaries, colleges, and schools, and to
make wider use of all Southern Baptist Convention media for
year-round emphasis on our educational institutions.

Nineteen and seventy-one was a year marked by great progress in this area. The staff spent many hours redesigning the annual Conventionwide emphasis on Baptist, Seminary, College, and School Day with the thought of making more use of the institutions and the states where these institutions are located in promoting this annual day. The Commission also worked jointly with the following agencies: The Home Mission Board, the American Baptist Theological Seminary, the Foreign Mission Board, the Baptist Sunday School Board, all Southern Baptist theological seminaries, the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs, the Historical Commission, and the Stewardship Commission. In addition to this several new pieces of recruitment literature were reproduced, special articles sent to Baptist state papers and to other Southern Baptist publications.

One of the highlights of 1971 was the public relations workshop held in September in connection with the meeting of the Executive Committee. New public relations personnel from Baptist colleges and schools were invited to Nashville for a two-day conference. It was the concensus of this group that such an orientation program should be conducted at least every two years for new public relations personnel.

The Education Commission does the staff work for the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools, although these two organizations are completely independent and separate. All previous attendance records were broken at the annual meeting where more than two hundred school men representing seminaries, universities, colleges, academies, and Bible schools came to Nashville for a three-day conference. The conference was built around four major emphases: improving denominational relations, more effective student recruitment, student financial needs, and more effective cooperation between the Education Commission and other agencies and boards of the SBC.

Institutional Changes. — William G. Tanner assumed the presidency of Oklahoma Baptist University. This left Mary Hardin-Baylor's presidency

vacant and Bobby E. Parker, vice-president of academic affairs was elevated to the presidency. George E. Modlin was elected chancellor of the University of Richmond and E. Bruce Heilman succeeded him as president. John E. Weems was elected president of Meredith College succeeding E. Bruce Heilman. Charles L. Harman, president of Bluefield College, announced his retirement and will be succeeded July 1 by Charles L. Tyer.

Support. — Our educational institutions received \$22,803,445 from the state conventions and Southern Baptist Convention during the past year, or an increase of \$1,080,523. In addition Georgia schools received \$229,444 from the state convention as additions to their endowment funds, and Oklahoma Baptist University received from their convention \$52,750 for the endowment fund.

Donations, gifts, and grants totaled \$22,580,104 for the year. Assets reached an all-time high of \$759,717,631. Of this amount \$231,123,327 was for endowment, or an increase of \$19,165,188 over the previous year.

Church Related Vocations. — Volunteers totaled 14,777. This is an increase over the previous year. The only category showing a slight decline is other church vocation volunteers, but the difference may be in the reporting this year.

# GOLDEN GATE BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Mill Valley, California

In its 28th year, Golden Gate Seminary had another near record enrollment -338, just above last year. New students entering during the year number 122.

International students continue to seek admission to Golden Gate in large numbers. There were 39 of these this year. Our students came from 36 states as well. Almost every year the number of students from Baptist colleges declines. Only 39% of the student body are in this group this year.

Dr. Elmer L. Gray has served the seminary as Academic Dean for two years, giving outstanding leadership. In addition, Dr. W. A. Carleton, dean for 17 years, who continued services as Distinguished Professor of Church History for two years has now retired. Dr. and Mrs. Carlyle D. Bennett retired after nearly 20 years in Church Music. Dr. John P. Johnson of Mississippi College begins service with Golden Gate August 1 in the field of Church Music.

There were 69 who received degrees or awards at the spring commencement. Considerable faculty attention has been given to a restudy of the curriculum with a view to improve the academic program. The new basic degree, Doctor of Ministry, will be offered this Fall. This is in addition to the M. Div., which most men will receive who plan for the pastorate. The M.R.E. and M.R.E. with Music Major continue as the other basic degrees offered.

A video tape recorder, a portable language laboratory, and cassette tape recorders for the library were put in use last year-expanding the mass of teaching aids being added regularly. The library is being reorganized to make better use of the other media for teaching. Preliminary plans for a new Library Learning Resource Center were completed in January looking toward 1974-75 construction.

A new annual schedule of a four-week September term, three quarters and a summer term was begun in 1970 and is working well. The whole concept of field education or in-service training is being restudied with a view toward more effective practice of one's ministry.

Resources remain critical as Golden Gate continues to seek improvement in its program of training. We are grateful for your support through prayer, sending students, and the Cooperative Program.

There were 8 students in the seminary last year from Arkansas.

# MIDWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Kansas City, Missouri

This has been a great year for Midwestern Seminary. After two years of very diligent and thorough self-study and preparation she was fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. This is considered by many to be the most stringent such association in the United States. This accreditation was in addition to that given in 1964 by the American Association of Theological Schools.

As a result of the self-study, and in keeping with the changing needs of the times, a restructuring of the current degree programs was made resulting in "The Midwestern Plan." This plan provides for a major, and much greater freedom and selectivity on the part of the student in adapting his seminary curriculum and career to his own personal inclinations, capabilities, interests and desires.

The semester schedules were also changed to eleven four-week terms, giving much greater flexibility in scheduling, concentration in study, and opportunity for utilizing skilled specialists as adjunct professors for one to four week periods. Both of these innovations have met with wide appeal, and there has been a 30% increase in enrollment, and prospects for the coming summer and fall indicate another substantial increase.

Besides the eleven adjunct professors utilized this year to very fine advantage, Midwestern has for the third time enlisted the furlough services of Missionary Glen Morris of Thailand. Dr. Othal Feather, formerly of Southwestern Seminary, is also serving as visiting professor in the Department of Religious Education.

In planning for the 1972-73 school year, eighteen adjunct professors have already been engaged.

In keeping with the recommendation of the American Association of Theological Schools in their biennial meeting of 1970, Midwestern definitely will inaugurate a Doctor of Ministry degree program with the September 1972 term. This additional program, beyond the M. Div., is intended to provide the more exceptional individual with opportunity for developing unusual competence in the Gospel ministry.

Two new administrative posts have been established, Dr. Roy L. Honeycutt, Jr., professor of Old Testament, has been given additional responsibilities as the first academic dean of the Seminary. Dr. Doran McCarty, professor of philosophy, has now assumed the additional responsibilities as the director of supervised ministry. The D. Min. program calls for extensive pastoral and project supervision.

Increasing enrollment has called for more on-campus housing. To meet this need we are establishing a beautiful, modern, most attractive modular home park, recessed in the wooded area adjacent to our present apartment projects. The cost is approximately \$400,000, and will care for forty more families. Work is being rushed for completion by late spring.

Midwestern is enjoying one of the most promising and productive periods in her whole history, and great gratitude is felt toward our churches and our Convention for their loyal and gracious support.

# NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY New Orleans, Louisiana

The Seminary Continues to Serve: The Southern Baptist Convention voted the school into being in 1917, and classes began in 1918. When the seminary was founded, the city of New Orleans had six Southern Baptist churches. Today there are 69 churches and eight missions. Many of these were begun by seminary students, and still count students among their church leaders. More than 5,500 graduates of the seminary serve in 48 states and 46 other nations. The school is located on a 75-acre campus valued at \$7.4 million.

New Seminary Era Begins: In May 1972 the seminary saw the end of an old era and the beginning of a new one as the last class graduated from the Schools of Theology, Religious Education, and Church Music. Beginning in the fall of 1972, the seminary will be a single school with five divisions — Division of Biblical Studies, Division of Theological and Historical Studies, Division of Pastoral Ministries, Division of Religious Education Ministries, and Division of Church Music Ministries. This change from the old school-type structure will provide a better framework in which to educate the students of the 1970's and 1980's for unity of ministry at the local church level. The new program provides a stronger emphasis on ministry and offers greater flexibility to a student's course of study. Responding to the need expressed by Southern Baptist churches for a unified approach to ministry by staff members, the new seminary structure emphasizes a common educational experience in which all students take a sequence of basic studies courses before specializing in the various areas of ministry.

Acting Dean Named: As part of the reorganization of the seminary, Dr. J. Hardee Kennedy was named acting dean of the seminary. Dr. Kennedy, who is professor of Old Testament and Hebrew, served as dean of the School of Theology from 1959 to 1968. A member of the faculty since 1947, he is widely known as a speaker and writer.

Director of Development Elected: Dr. Russell M. McIntire began his work as the seminary's director of development in April, 1972. In this new position he is setting up and administering a program by which the seminary may benefit from deferred gifts, bequests, and wills. Dr. McIntire came to New Orleans from Clinton, Mississippi, where he served for 20 years as pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Church Work Consultant Added: The dual responsibility of assisting students and alumni seeking places of service in churches, and making recommendations to churches looking for pastors and other staff members, is the task of W. Robert (Bob) May, church work consultant at the seminary. A New Orleans graduate, May has returned for advanced study following three years as a Navy chaplain. Churches seeking qualified and experienced persons for part-time or full-time staff positions are invited to contact him at the seminary.

Archaeological Studies Abroad: New Orleans Seminary is participating with the University of Tel Aviv, Israel, in the excavation of a major biblical site near Tel Aviv. Students may gain academic credit as well as first-hand knowledge each summer during expeditions sponsored by the seminary's Institute of Archaeological Research, under the direction of Dr. George Kelm, professor of archaeology at the seminary.

Six Graduate Degrees Offered: Degrees offered under the new curriculum include the Doctor of Ministry, Doctor of Theology, Doctor of Education, Master of Divinity, Master of Religious Education, and Master of Church Music. In addition, the seminary offers a diploma program for a limited number of students who are not college graduates.

Enrollment Reaches 749: The cumulative enrollment for the 1971-72 school year was 749, a slight increase over the previous year's enrollment.

Students Participate In Ministry: During his seminary career each student learns to apply the biblical concepts of ministry through participation in supervised field education. In addition, many students serve as pastors or staff members of churches within commuting distance of New Orleans while in seminary.

Prayers Requested For Seminary Needs: Southern Baptists are asked to pray for solutions to the needs at the seminary for more funds for student aid and for faculty and staff salaries.

# SOUTHEASTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Wake Forest, North Carolina

The purpose and the quality of life in this seminary are manifested in the 2,543 graduates who have completed the courses of study for a degree or a Certificate in Theology and have taken their places in the life and work of the churches in the United States and in missionary service overseas.

In harmony with the policy to maintain continuous use of available resources, the academic calendar includes a fall semester, a spring semester, and two terms of summer school. The cumulative enrolment for the last academic year was 621 students.

A competent and devout Faculty has been selected and retained. The Instructional Staff is composed of 25 elected members, 8 visiting professors and special instructors, and certified chaplain supervisors in three medical centers. Of the 25 elected members of the Faculty, 15 have been here ten years or longer.

Dr. Thorwald Lorenzen, Assistant Professor of New Testament, began his work here in the summer of 1971. Dr. Archie Nations and Dr. George Shriver have been granted Sabbatical Leave for the 1972-1973 academic year.

After two years of inquiry and discussion, including consultations with theological educators in all the seminaries of the Southern Baptist Convention, the Faculty and Trustees decided to authorize a program of study leading to the Doctor of Ministry degree in the autumn of 1972. The

primary purpose is to relate academic excellence to professional competence for effective ministry in the churches and in the church-related agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention.

In order to deal adequately with the questions confronting the people of God in this generation, ministers must have Biblical and theological understanding. The students and teachers on this campus are grateful for the opportunity to learn and to teach and to do what they can to make the love of God visible in the midst of human need.

# SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Louisville, Kentucky

### ENROLLMENT TRENDS

Southern Seminary students come from 391 colleges and universities; but note that 47.9 per cent currently come from Baptist colleges and 52.1 per cent from state and private colleges. This represents a major change in the source of students and reflects the very high percentage of Baptist students in public universities.

As a strong advocate of Baptist higher education, I view this shift of ministerial students with grave concern. It does produce a cosmopolitan student body and means that many ministers of tomorrow will have an academic background similar to that of the layman. But Southern Seminary has underscored its unique relation to Baptist colleges by provisions whereby certain courses in the seminary curriculum may be replaced with comparable courses in college. Obviously, state universities would provide such courses only by accident, whereas a Baptist college religion department would inevitably reflect the same church need as a Baptist seminary.

The result has often been an approximate duplication by advanced collegiate courses of basic seminary courses. We hope that Baptist colleges will exploit this commonality, thereby enabling their graduates to move into advanced seminary education more quickly. Note that, of the 25 colleges and universities having the largest number of alumni enrolled in Southern Seminary at present, 19 are Baptist colleges.

Forty-six states are represented in the student body, with 31 foreign students representing 11 countries. While the percentage is small, our 53 non-Baptist seminarians provide a valuable educational ingredient by making it impossible for either professors or students to rest on unexamined Baptist assumptions. At the same time that some Baptist notions are challenged from the tradition of another denomination, still other Baptist viewpoints come to life when illuminated by the excitement of a person who had never seen that before in the scriptures. Everybody benefits.

The 347 students who received a seminary degree in the past year made up the largest graduating class since the seminary's Centennial in 1958-59. To date, Southern Seminary has awarded 11,296 degrees.

### FACULTY AND STAFF

With a deep sense of loss we bid farewell to T. R. (Bob) Allen, for 33 years superintendent of buildings and grounds, and to Swan Haworth, professor of psychology of religion, who have both passed the retirement age of 65 and plan to leave the Louisville area.

At Penrose St. Amant, former dean of the School of Theology, leaves his post as professor of church history to become president of the Baptist seminary in Ruschlikon-Zurich, Switzerland, an important personal relationship enters a new phase. He was the first new faculty member I recommended to the board at the seminary in New Orleans 28 years ago.

No words can express adequate gratitude to these three men for what, individually and distinctively, each has meant to the seminary, its personnel and its students.

But as we say good-by to some, we welcome others: Gordon Clinard, former president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas and pastor in San Angelo, has become an effective new faculty member as Billy Graham Professor of Evangelism. Tom Allerton of Atlanta, Georgia, has spent this year adding doctoral studies to his successful career as a minister of education in preparation for his new teaching role here this fall.

The total instructional staff consists of 58 professors, 30 instructors, and 42 fellows.

Other faculty members will be invited to join the seminary shortly. This is essential. The student-faculty ratio has climbed to 19.16 to 1 for the seminary as a whole in the first semester. Fortunately a large December graduating class dropped this to a slightly more reasonable 17.75 to 1 in the second semester. These ratios reflect a cumulative enrollment for the current year of 1,280 — compared with 803 in 1961.

#### GRADUATE PROGRAMS

Currently Southern Seminary offers six graduate (as contrasted with professional) degrees: Doctor of Theology, Doctor of Sacred Theology, Master of Theology, Doctor of Education, Graduate Specialist in Religious Education, and Doctor of Musical Arts. Enrollment in these programs totals 130 students, the largest group in the School of Theology, where there are 95.

A review of the graduate degree offering of Southern Seminary has been accelerated by the inauguration of the Doctor of Ministry as a new professional doctorate available to both theology and religious education students. Already the School of Theology has decided to suspend admission to the S.T.D. program and the School of Religious Education has suspended admission to the G.S.R.E. Study of the future role of the Th.M. degree is underway. The possibility of replacing the Th.D., and possibly the Ed.D., with the Ph.D. is also being evaluated.

#### PHYSICAL ASSETS

While the big news is in the recasting of the curriculum and the introduction of new dimensions of clinical training, Southern Seminary is also remodeling its 45-year-old administration building.

After two years of study and debate, the trustees determined to concentrate the academic administration in the old classroom area on the second floor of Norton Hall. This half-million-dollar project is well under way. The timing fits into organizational changes growing out of the decennial self-study and accreditation review of the seminary climaxed in the fall of 1971. The assembling of deans and other administrative offices in one major suite instead of several buildings will simplify communications and save time for students making multiple decisions about educational matters.

The campus consists of 48 buildings with 816,475 square feet of space. This includes living quarters for 170 single men, 134 single women, and 451 married student couples.

The seminary administration continues to make plans for the replacement of Seminary Village as the major apartment complex of the campus. Fiscal developments will determine the date of this massive project.

### FIELD EDUCATION

A comprehensive survey of students serving on church staffs has shown 442 students employed and 159 holding voluntary positions. Seminary students serve as pastors of 216 churches and as associate pastors of 37 churches. They are ministers of music in 110 churches and ministers of education in 11.

Among the other students, 51 are educational workers, 42 are youth directors, 32 are involved in Christian social ministries, and 5 are recreation directors.

The field education office also helps alumni already in career positions to find new places of service, and works with pulpit and personnel committees to find candidates for a variety of posts. Last year, 1,021 students were referred to 462 churches requesting help. Information on 3,351 alumni was supplied to churches in response to 1,108 specific requests.

### STUDENT AID

In the academic year 1970-71 a total of \$357,945 was provided in various forms of financial aid to students. Of this amount \$72,301 came from one source, the Charles B. Keesee Educational Fund in Martinsville, Virginia. Another \$59,600 was contributed through churches and other friends for specific seminary students.

Approximately \$10,000 was given to students in the form of mission work grants to enable them to serve in the great cities of the Midwest and the mountains of eastern Kentucky. An additional \$56,000 was given to students to match grants to them from the Foreign Mission Board and the Home Mission Board.

Loans amounting to \$110,000 were made to students last year; another \$21,000 was invested in loans which are cancellable if the students are employed by a church five years after graduation.

### FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The total seminary budget for the current year is \$2,822,055, an increase of \$268,258 over the previous year. Most of the increase came from student fees, which are used for non-academic expenses.

Of the income for educational and general purposes (not including auxiliary enterprises) 59.4 per cent was from Southern Baptist churches through the Cooperative Program. We are grateful that income from the Cooperative Program, which has not increased since 1970, will rise \$111,774 in the next fiscal year to \$1,438,774.

It will be needed. Our monthy campus payroll involves about 350 persons. Clerical and manual employees — primarily students and their wives — received \$495,294 last year. Despite a 58 per cent increase in this payroll since 1966, pay rates continue to be substantially below the community level, and the lowest rates on our pay scale cannot be used because they are below the legal minimum wage!

Increased endowment is an important factor in our ability to embrace the opportunities we have to make a difference in tomorrow's world. The total of endowment funds held by and on behalf of the seminary is currently \$10,442,548. Experts tell us that no new educational institution with less than \$30,000,000 in endowment should open its doors, yet there are the uninformed who believe Southern Seminary is a "well-endowed" operation.

Even if you add to our endowment the total value of our plant (which is now \$14,693,809) the book value of the seminary is \$25,136,357.

The seminary desperately needs gifts, especially through wills and bequests, to enlarge the endowment. This fact must not be obscured by the contemporary crunch on current income. There is an immediacy in appeals for Student Aid, the Alumni Fund, and Foundation Memberships. We ARE hurting, right now.

### IN CONCLUSION

Perhaps it seems awkward to close this annual report with a paragraph about admissions. In fact, the admission policy of this seminary is focused on the future ministry of the churches. The admission policy is rooted in the purposes of the seminary, which states:

The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary is a Christian institution whose primary purpose is to conduct a program of post-baccalaureate professional and graduate theological education designed to equip both men and women students for effective Christian leadership in church-related ministries and in other areas where advanced theological training is required.

We would be happy if the seminary were able to provide theological studies for any interested person. That is simply not possible. Our resources are limited to and our curriculum is focused on the God-called man or woman preparing for an equipping role in the Christian ministry.

The seminary is designed to admit those whom the churches certify as prophets, evangelists, pastors, and teachers. This is biblical language for the enabling ministry of pastors, ministers of education, ministers of social work, missionaries, chaplains, and ministers of music.

To this end we have laid heavy responsibilities on church recommendations which every student must have before he is approved for admission. We have grounded our position in Ephesians 4:11-13 (ASV):

And he gave some to be apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; for the perfecting of the saints, unto the work of ministering unto the building up of the body of Christ: till we all attain unto the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the son of God, unto a full grown man, unto the measure of the statue of the fullness of Christ.

All of God's people are clearly the saints who must be perfected (or matured) that they may carry out a ministry which builds up the church, the body of Christ. Here is biblical foundation for the currently popular concept of the "ministry of the laity." But the ministry of the laity is a cut flower without recognition of Christ's call of some to the roles whereby all the saints are led to do the work of God.

It is heresy to reject the reality of a God-called special ministry . . . and it is wisdom to give those who are so called the finest seminary education, to the end that the whole church may be built up as the body of Christ.

That, in the Year of Our Lord 1972, is what The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary is all about.

# SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Fort Worth, Texas

A record spring enrollment, dramatic curriculum changes, new faculty members, and an institutional self-study are the major factors in the Annual Report of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary for 1971-72.

The 1,840 enrollment for the 1972 spring semester is the largest in history. The total for the year is 2,295, an increase of 124 over the previous year and the highest in fourteen years. Of this number 1,473 were enrolled in the School of Theology, 590 in the School of Religious Education, and 232 in the School of Church Music.

A comprehensive three-year curriculum study in theology has culminated in a new core curriculum, a decrease in number of hours for the M.Div. degree, the approval of the doctor of ministry degree and the phasing out of the Th.M. program. Radical curriculum changes have been made in the religious education curriculum.

New faculty members elected during the year include William Colson, theory and composition; William Crews, social work; David Fite, continuing education; Phillip Briggs and Hazel Morris, religious education.

The faculty and administration are engaged in a two-year institutional self-study which will culminate in a re-examination by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools for Continued Accreditation in the spring of 1973.

A new department of Continuing Education for Ministry was established and thirteen programs were sponsored during the year.

The report also includes the projection of the construction of the Children's Building in 1972, remodeling of Price Hall, and continued additions to Student Housing.

In his outlook for the future, President Robert Naylor predicted "enrollment will increase and the Cooperative Program will continue to be our life line."

### ARKANSAS BAPTIST FOUNDATION

Baptist Foundations are not investment firms, but provide a unique service and ministry to Christian individuals and families. The Arkansas Baptist Foundation is not engaged in fund raising for itself, but rather provides opportunity and assistance to those who wish to have a continuing Christian testimony after death. It assists individuals and families in making wills and establishing trusts and other ways of continuing their Christian stewardship on a permanent basis.

Early in the year Dr. Ed F. McDonald, after more than ten years of service in the position, resigned as executive secretary of the Foundation. He returned to a pastorate in Texarkana.

During the interim period the Foundation Board of Directors requested Executive Secretary Dr. Charles Ashcraft and his assistant, Roy F. Lewis, to care for the administrative duties of the Foundation. Consequently, the activities of the Foundation have been kept to a minimum during this interim period, but all necessary duties have been promptly executed and all inquiries and requests have been promptly handled.

The Board of Directors normally meets each quarter to review the investments of the Foundation and to care for other business matters. While the Foundation has been without an executive secretary, the Board of Directors has carried a larger load of duties and has met more frequently as circumstances required.

The Board of Directors has sought carefully and prayerfully to fill the position of executive secretary after renaming it executive director. A job description was developed and adopted after carefully researching those used in other states. A sub-committee was appointed to screen all candidates recommended for the position. Several interviews have been held, and, while no public announcement can be made at the time of this report, it is hoped than an announcement can be made soon naming a new executive director.

During the year the Foundation became executor of a will that represents the largest such responsibility in the history of the Foundation. While the will is still in the process of being probated, it is estimated that the estate will ultimately exceed \$325,000.

The assets of the Foundation continue to grow and its investments continue to reflect worthy earnings. The investment portfolio was recently analyzed and evaluated by a professional investment counseling firm and the Board of Directors used such information in making their decisions.

With the anticipated leadership of a new director, the Arkansas Baptist Foundation has an unlimited potential for service to Arkansas Baptist.

We recommend the receipts from undesignated gifts be given to the operation of the Foundation.

Our examinations were made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the financial position or the assets and liabilities arising from cash transactions of the respective institutions as of the specified dates, and the results of operations or the cash receipts and disbursements for the periods then ended on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

- Note 1: Properties at May 31, 1960, were appraised by Glenn B. Espy, Appraiser, Little Rock, Arkansas, and these appraised values were placed on the books. Acquisitions subsequent to the appraisal are shown at cost.
- Note 2: The University is required to deposit approximately \$102,300.00 in the next year in the Bond and Interest Sinking Fund and the Building Maintenance and Equipment Reserve Account.
- Note 3: The University has leased two dormitory facilities from Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company for terms of twenty years beginning January 1, 1967, and October 1, 1967, for a rental of \$74,030.00 and \$74,512.00 annually, payable \$37,015.00 each March 1 and September 1, and \$37,256.00 each October 1 and April 1, respectively.
- Note 4: The University has contracted for construction of a student center and classroom building in the amount of approximately \$1,500,000.00. Construction had just begun at the date of this audit and the amounts expended are included in the buildings shown at Schedule "2".
