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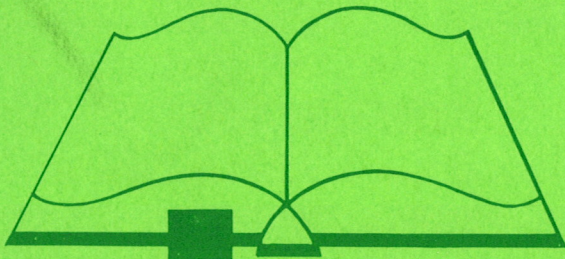

CONSTITUTION

Article I. — The Name

The name of this body shall be "The Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

Article II. — The Purpose

The purpose of this Convention shall be to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer co-operation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God.

The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention on May 9, 1963, shall be the doctrinal guideline for this Convention.

Article III. — Membership

Section 1. The Convention shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Convention, and which desire to co-operate with other churches through this Convention.

Regular Baptist churches are those Baptist churches which in doctrine and in practice adhere to the principles and the spirit of The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the 1963 session of the Southern Baptist Convention, and The Baptist Faith and Message shall not be interpreted as to permit open communion and/or alien immersion.

Section 2. Each co-operating church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for each additional one hundred members, or major fraction thereof above one hundred, provided however, that no church shall be entitled to a total of more than ten messengers.

Section 3. The Convention may appoint a committee on credentials at each session which shall make recommendations to the Convention with reference to seating messengers from any church not hitherto affiliated with the Convention.

Article IV. — Authority

Section 1. While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, this Convention shall never exercise any authority whatever over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the constitution of any church, or with the exercise of its functions as the only ecclesiastical body, but will cheerfully recognize and uphold the absolute independence of the churches.

Article V. — Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Each officer of the Convention shall be elected annually, except the Recording Secretary and Treasurer who shall be the same as the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board, and shall continue in office until his successor in office shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the

deliberations of the Convention and to discharge such other duties as may devolve upon the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all committees unless the Convention shall otherwise determine. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in his stead.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of the proceedings of the Convention, to edit and arrange publication of a suitable number of the minutes for distribution among the churches, as the Convention may direct, as soon as reasonably possible after the close of the session. He shall file and keep in order all papers deemed important to the work of the Convention.

Article VI. — The Executive Board

Section 1. This Convention shall elect a Board of Trustees as provided for in the Convention's charter. This Board shall be known as the "Executive Board of Arkansas Baptist State Convention." This Board shall be composed of one member from the bounds of each co-operating association with a membership up to 5,000, and one additional member for each additional 5,000 constituency, or major fraction thereof, provided however, that no association shall be entitled to more than five (5) members. In addition, the convention shall elect one lady from the bounds of each of the eight districts in the state to serve on the Executive Board. Upon the removal of any Executive Board member from the bounds of his or her association, his or her membership on the Executive Board ceases therewith; his or her successor in office may be named by the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board to hold office until the next meeting of the Convention. No member of this board shall hold any remunerative office under the Convention or any of its institutions. One-third of this board shall be elected annually to hold office for three years, and a majority of the board members shall constitute a quorum. Any member of the Executive Board who misses all the Executive Board meetings and the Executive Board committee meetings for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on the Board.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall be constituted and empowered by the Convention as its business and legal agent to administer all business committed to it by the Convention, and to employ such paid agents as it may deem necessary in carrying out the missionary, educational, benevolent and financial enterprises of the Convention. The Executive Board shall raise, collect, receive and disburse all the funds of the Baptist Cooperative Program, both state and southwide. The office of the Executive Board shall be a clearing house for administering the business affairs of the Convention, and a headquarters for Baptist information. Its books, records and files shall at all time be open for the reference and inspection of any co-operating church which may desire to examine them.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall render to the Convention annually a complete and detailed statement of all its business for the year.

Article VII. — Trusteeships

The Convention shall elect trustees to manage and to operate its colleges, hospitals, orphanages and any other institutions it may possess, as follows:

Section 1. Ouachita Baptist University, 24; Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services, 18; Baptist Memorial Hospital, 9; Southern Baptist College, 24.

Section 2. One-third of the members of the Boards of Trustees shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. Any member of any Board

of Trustees who misses all the meetings of that Board for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on that Board.

Section 3. Each Board of Trustees shall elect from their membership a chairman and a recording secretary and such other officers as seems advisable.

Section 4. All trusteeships shall render to the Convention at each annual session complete and detailed reports of all transactions and business and any other activities for the year, and shall be subject to the direction of the Convention in all matters pertaining to administering the affairs of the institution with which their trusteeship is concerned.

Article VIII. — Operation of Agencies

Section 1. Each board, agency, and institution of this Convention shall submit to the Executive Board at its annual budget planning meeting, which is to be held prior to the annual meeting of the Convention, a detailed statement of its sources of income, and a budget of proposed expenditures for the ensuing year. When received and adopted by the Convention, these budgets shall become the basis for the operations for the ensuing year.

Article IX. — Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall meet annually, "if God permit," on a date to be fixed by the Convention. The Executive Board is empowered in emergencies to call special sessions of the Convention and to change either the time or place of meeting or both should the occasion demand.

Article X. — Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of this Convention, two-thirds of the members voting concurring in the measure, except Article IV which shall remain forever unalterable in substance.

Section 2. Any proposed amendment to this Constitution shall be presented to the Convention in writing, for its consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, and may be voted on, on any subsequent day during the session, provided adequate publicity has been given in previous announcement.

Article XI. — Parliamentary Authority

Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard for deciding questions of parliamentary procedure.

Article XII. — Districts

The Convention shall establish such geographic districts as it may deem wise to facilitate its promotion, administration, and organization of its objectives, provided, it will never violate in any way the boundaries of any association within the area of the convention. The boundaries of such districts shall be drawn so as to provide equitable geographical and numerical voice and representation on all convention committees, commissions, boards, except the Executive Board, all trusteeships. Each tenth year hereafter, the whole matter of districts shall be readjusted to take in consideration the flow of membership in our Baptist churches.

BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are enacted for the government of the Convention.

1. Enrollment of Messengers

The Secretary of the Convention shall enroll, upon arrival, messengers who present proper credentials from the churches. These messengers, together with others who may be enrolled upon presentation of approved credentials during the session, shall constitute the Convention. Any contention concerning seating messengers shall be presented to a committee appointed by the President for recommendation to the Convention for its action.

2. Officers

The President, First Vice-President, and Second Vice-President shall be elected on the second day of the Convention, their terms of office to begin with the final session of the Convention.

The election of all officers shall be by ballot; provided, however, there is only one nomination for the office, then the Secretary or any other present may be directed to cast the ballot of the entire assembly for the single nominee.

The first vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after balloting for the president has been completed and the winner announced, and the second vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after the balloting for the first vice president has been completed and the winner announced.

Each officer of the Convention shall be elected by a majority of all votes cast.

In case of removal from office, by death or otherwise, of the President, the Vice-Presidents shall automatically succeed to the office of President in the order of their election. The President may not be elected for more than two consecutive terms.

The Treasurer of the Executive Board shall be also Treasurer of the Convention.

All elected officers of this Convention shall be members of churches co-operating with this Convention. This must also apply to members of the Executive Board and the institutional boards of this Convention.

3. The Executive Board

The Executive Board, being the legal trustee of the Convention, shall be empowered by the Convention to administer all business committed to it by the Convention.

The Executive Board is empowered to act for the Convention between sessions of the Convention, provided that it shall never exercise any authority contrary to the expressed will of the Convention.

When any unforeseen emergency occurs in any of the affairs of the Convention, or in any of the interest it controls, that in the judgment of the Executive Board requires action before the next session of the Convention, the Executive Board shall have full authority to take such action as may seem necessary, and all interests concerned shall be governed by such action, provided the Executive Board shall make full report of all matters pertaining thereunto to the next session of the Convention for its approval, and

provided further, that nothing in this article shall be construed as giving the Executive Board authority to execute any matter already committed by the Convention to any of its Boards of Trustees or its institutions unless such Board when so commissioned shall decline to act on the orders of the Convention.

All proposals requiring the expenditures of money by the Convention, or the Executive Board of the Convention, from the annual budget, shall be considered by the Executive Board, before being presented to the Convention.

This Board shall be charged with the responsibility to have the books and financial affairs of each and all of the boards and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention audited annually by an accredited firm of auditors, all audits to be accessible to the Executive Board at its budget planning session, and to be included in the institution's report to the Convention.

Members of the Executive Board, having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

The various associations of Arkansas whose churches are affiliated with this Convention, may submit to the committee on nominations names of those whom they believe should be considered for membership on the Executive Board as members from that association.

4. Trusteeships

All trusteeships of this Convention shall be amenable to the Convention on all matters, through its Executive Board. No trusteeship shall conduct extra movements to raise money outside its regular revenue-producing sources, nor shall a deficit in running expense or debt be incurred without the approval of the Convention in session or of the Executive Board in case of aforementioned emergencies, except, as follows: when an emergency arises concerning the opportunity to purchase needed property for expansion, the president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board and the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board (all three concurring) believing such an emergency exists and deeming it wise to incur indebtedness, may give the Trustees of an institution such permission, and make a full report to the Executive Board and to the next Convention in session.

Members of Boards of Trustees having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

Not more than two (2) members of a Board of Trustees shall at the same time be members of the same local church, nor shall more than six (6) members reside in any one association.

A member of a Board of Trustees of one institution of the Convention may not at the same time be a member of any other Board of Trustees of another institution of the Convention.

No member of a Board of Trustees of any institution of this Convention may at the same time be a member of the Executive Board of the Convention.

5. Committee Members

1. A nine-member rotating Nominating Committee, comprised of at least three laymen, will place in nomination at each annual convention names of persons to fill vacancies on all convention boards. At each annual convention, the president will appoint one-third of this committee to three-year terms to replace the one-third rotating off, plus filling any vacancies that may exist on the committee at that time. Nominations for all boards from this Nominating Committee must be as equitably divided as possible between the eight existing districts of our state convention. The president shall also name the chairman, who shall come from a one-year term member.

2. A member filling an unexpired term not having served the full term of years as provided by the Constitution, shall be, at the discretion of the Nominating Committee, eligible for election to a full term.

3. No member of a commission or committee delegated to study or make recommendations concerning our institutions shall be a member of any Board of Trustees of such institutions.

4. All associational missionaries or mission pastors receiving all or part compensation from the Convention through the Executive Board shall be considered employees of the Convention and shall not be members of any Convention or institutional board. The president of the Convention by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Board for the duration of his term of office.

6. Constitution and By-Laws Committee

A standing Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be composed of six (6) members to be nominated by the Nominating Committee. One-third of the membership (2) shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three (3) years. No member shall be eligible to serve more than two terms until one year has elapsed.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of advising the presiding officer concerning constitutional matters during the annual session of the convention with reference to matters which may arise from the floor or from other committees. The committee will act ad interim in all matters concerning the Constitution and By-Laws referred to it by the boards and agencies of the convention. The committee will receive all proposed constitutional changes before the convention and will be responsible for presenting them in writing, for convention consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, after adequate publicity has been given. The duties of the committee in no way preclude amendments to the constitution by messengers to the convention.

APPENDICES

1. **Doctrinal Guidelines (1970 Annual, page 61)**

Report of the Committee of Twenty-Five adopted, including the recommendation that the SBC statement of faith of 1963, *The Baptist Faith and Message*, be adopted as doctrinal guidelines for our convention.

2. **Appendices (1967 annual, page 40)**

Resolution adopted that a search be made of the minutes of the convention to discover policies and interpretations which have been adopted in past years, and these interpretations and policies be added at the end of the constitution and by laws of the convention as appendices.

3. **Church Ordinances (1965 annual, page 31)**

Resolution adopted, Whereas, in the past, the most general interpretation of the New Testament, and the most general interpretation of the Word 'principles' as it is used in Article 3, Section 1, of our constitution, and the most prevalent practice of Baptist churches in Arkansas with reference to the church ordinances, has been what is commonly called "close baptism" and "close communion", and

Whereas, it is recorded on page 57 of the minutes of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention meeting in Fort Smith in 1937 that the Convention officially objected to the teaching of alien immersion and open communion in one of our seminaries, thereby establishing a precedence for future conventions, therefore,

Be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in its 112th annual session, go on record as objecting to the reception of alien immersion and the practice of open communion, and

Be it further resolved that we urge churches everywhere to re-examine the New Testament teaching on baptism and the Lord's Supper.

4. **Federal Aid (1965 annual, page 43)**

Resolution adopted, Whereas, Arkansas Baptists have been faced with the issue of Federal aid to private institutions, and, whereas, many feel that the acceptance of such funds violates the cherished Baptist position of the separation of church and state, therefore, be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention go on record as reaffirming our traditional Baptist position on the separation of church and state, and that we urge all of our Baptist institutions and programs to respect this principle.

5. **Executive Board Recommendations (1963 annual, page 35)**

Voted that all recommendations of the Executive Board shall be published in the *Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine* one month prior to the meeting of the state convention.

6. **Book of Reports (1959 annual, page 28)**

Voted that the convention constitution and by-laws be printed each year in the **Book of Reports** for the convenience of our messengers.

7. Baptist Memorial Hospital Trustees (1959 annual, page 29)
Voted that the members of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, not be included in the ruling which would prevent their serving on this board and one other convention board.
8. Capital Indebtedness (1959 annual, page 30)
Voted that all requests for capital indebtedness by any convention institution or agency must be submitted to the Executive Board at least 90 days in advance of the July meeting of the Executive Board.
9. Out-of-state participation by Executive Board staff (1953 annual, page 22)
Voted that we recommend the Cooperative Program as the best method of giving financial support to the Baptist work at home and abroad. We discourage any of the departments of our Arkansas Baptist work in accepting invitations to participate in the work of missions outside of our regular work within our state territory, at the expense of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention Departments involved. Further, we request our Executive Secretary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the President of the Executive Board confer with the heads of all Southern Baptist agencies expressing our concern about the practices of asking State Convention departments to give employees to such efforts outside our state, unless expenses and salaries are provided for by the agencies that use such workers.
10. Seating of Messengers (1949 annual, page 92)
Resolution adopted that this convention refuse to seat any messengers from any church that accepts alien immersion; practices open communion; or affiliates with any branch of the Federal Council of Churches, World Council of Churches; or any other organization similar to or growing out of such.

THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE

I. THE SCRIPTURES

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is the record of God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. It reveals the principles by which God judges us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. The criterion by which the Bible is to be interpreted is Jesus Christ.

A. God the Father

God as Father reigns with providential care over His universe, His creatures, and the flow of the stream of human history according to the purposes of His grace. He is all powerful, all loving, and all wise. God is Father in truth to those who become children of God through faith in Jesus Christ. He is fatherly in His attitude toward all men.

B. God the Son

He will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission. He now dwells in all believers as the living and ever present Lord.

C. God the Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of God. He inspired holy men of old to write the Scriptures. Through illumination He enables men to understand truth. He exalts Christ. He convicts of sin, of righteousness and of judgment. He calls men to the Saviour, and effects regeneration. He cultivates Christian character, comforts believers, and bestows the spiritual gifts by which they serve God through His church. He seals the believer unto the day of final redemption. His presence in the Christian is the assurance of God to bring the believer into the fulness of the stature of Christ. He enlightens and empowers the believer and the church in worship, evangelism, and service.

III. MAN

Man was created by the special act of God, in His own image, and is the crowning work of His creation. In the beginning man was innocent of sin and was endowed by His Creator with freedom of choice. By his free choice man sinned against God and brought sin into the human race. Through the temptation of Satan man transgressed the command of God, and fell from his original innocence; whereby his posterity inherit a nature and an environment inclined toward sin, and as soon as they are capable of moral action become transgressors and are under condemnation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human

personality is evident in that God created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore every man possesses dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

IV. SALVATION

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, sanctification, and glorification.

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace. Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer into a relationship of peace and favor with God.

B. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.

C. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

V. GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility.

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sancti-

fied by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, bring reproach on the cause of Christ, and temporal judgments on themselves, yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is a local body of baptized believers who are associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel, observing the two ordinances of Christ, committed to His teachings, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth.

This church is an autonomous body, operating through democratic processes under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. In such a congregation members are equally responsible. Its Scriptural officers are pastors and deacons.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages.

VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

VIII. THE LORD'S DAY

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed

in exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements, and resting from secular employments, work of necessity and mercy only being excepted.

IX. THE KINGDOM

The Kingdom of God includes both His general sovereignty over the universe and His particular kingship over men who willfully acknowledge Him as King. Particularly the Kingdom is the realm of salvation into which men enter by trustful, childlike commitment to Jesus Christ. Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

X. LAST THINGS

God, in His own time and in His own way, will bring the world to its appropriate end. According to His promise, Jesus Christ will return personally and visibly in glory to the earth; the dead will be raised; and Christ will judge all men in righteousness. The unrighteous will be consigned to Hell, the place of everlasting punishment. The righteous in their resurrected and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavor to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

XII. EDUCATION

The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

XIII. STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-

operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XV. THE CHRISTIAN AND THE SOCIAL ORDER

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in his own life and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus. The Christian should oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice. He should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

XVI. PEACE AND WAR

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace

with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love.

XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

*(Convention enrollment and organization –
Committees appointed – Christian education)*

1. The One Hundred Twentieth Annual Session (125th Year) of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, was opened at 6:45 p.m. on Tuesday, November 6, 1973, with Rheubin L. South, North Little Rock, president, presiding.

Music for the convention was coordinated by Jim Raymick, North Little Rock. James Hogan, North Little Rock, and Ronnie Ballard, Little Rock, served as organists, Mrs. George Vandegrift, Little Rock, and Mrs. Don Salmon, North Little Rock, as pianists. The theme was "Share the Word Now."

2. Prelude music in the opening session was provided by the Handbell Choir of First Church, Osceola.

Jim Raymick led the messengers in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." Special music was by the Ouachita Baptist University Choir and the Ouachita Band, directed by Charles Wright, Arkadelphia.

Wilbur Herring, chairman, Order of Business, set the time for a report from the "Spirit of '76" committee to be included in the miscellaneous business during the Wednesday morning session.

Don Hook, parliamentarian, stated that the messengers from the two challenged churches are entitled to vote until the question of their seating is resolved, except for the vote on their own seating.

The Credentials Committee called for a meeting and requested one representative from one of the two challenged churches as well as W. L. Williams, who made the challenge.

6. Fraternal greetings were received from Dr. G. R. Mazique, Helena, president, and O. C. Jones, North Little Rock, recording secretary, Regular Arkansas Missionary Baptist Convention Inc.; York Williams, Dermott, president, Morris Booker College; Dr. J. C. Oliver, Little Rock, president, Arkansas Baptist College brought greetings from Dr. Fred T. Guy, president, Consolidated Missionary Baptist Convention, who could not be present.

The president noted fraternal greetings from several sister conventions and reported that warm Christian greetings have been sent to all the conventions in session during the week. Foreign missionaries and other visitors were recognized.

7. Jim Tillman, Little Rock, director, Phase Two, Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign, gave a progress report on the campaign. Pledges to date total more than three million dollars from 605 churches, about 51% of our total churches involved in the campaign. 93 churches have accepted the challenge during the past year. Over \$900,000 has actually been paid to date on the campaign.

Associational recognition was made with plaques as follows: Independence Association, 90% participation; Dardanelle-Russellville, 88%; Little Red River, 85%; Ashley County, 84%; Ouachita, 81%. Special recognition with appropriate plaques was made to all the churches in Carroll County Association which had reached 100% participation.

8. Daniel R. Grant, Arkadelphia, president, Ouachita Baptist University, called attention to the report in the **Book of Reports** and spoke briefly on "what's happening now" at Ouachita, recounting progress in all areas of the physical plant, academic achievement, and finances. A genuine choice is offered to parents and students who are concerned with all the above as well as moral concerns.

9. D. Jack Nicholas, Walnut Ridge, in his first appearance before the convention as president of Southern Baptist College, referred the messengers to the **Book of Reports** and then gave his philosophy on Christian higher education. He pledged his efforts to keep Southern Baptist College close to the cross and close to the denomination.

10. President South called for resolutions or constitutional amendments to be brought before the convention for first reading. Carbon Sims, Monticello, read a resolution on SB 895, the labeling of alcoholic beverages, which was referred to the Resolutions Committee.

11. Voted: to invite Billy Graham to Arkansas

W. O. Vaught, Little Rock, reported on a group planning to go to St. Louis soon to visit with Billy Graham and invite him for a future crusade in Arkansas. Dr. Vaught moved that we heartily and prayerfully join together to invite Billy Graham to come to Arkansas for a meeting and support such a meeting. Second and carried.

12. The Southern Baptist College Choir, Marty Sewald, director, sang a medley. Jim Raymick led the messengers in singing, "To God Be the Glory." Special music was by Russell Newport, layman from Springfield, Missouri.

13. Padgett Cope, Little Rock, introduced the speaker of the hour, Harper Shannon, pastor, Huffman Church, Birmingham, Alabama. Dr. Shannon's message was to highlight the evening's emphasis on Christian higher education, "Teaching Them to Observe," with the text from Matthew 28: 18-20. Benediction was by Earl Verser, Eudora layman, second vice president.

SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION**Wednesday, November 7, 1973**

*(Memorial Moments – President's Address – Election
of President – Annual Sermon)*

14. E. E. Boone, Wynne, First vice president, called the session to order. Jim Raymick led the messengers in singing "Blessed Assurance."

15. H. L. Lipford, Mabelvale, retired pastor, led in observing Memorial Moments and after a moment of silent prayer, led in prayer.

MEMORIAL MOMENTS

It is good to pause in this early session of the meeting of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention to pay tribute to those members of our churches who have answered the call from our Lord to "come up hither" in that experience that is called death. Words are inadequate to express the emotions that come when we think of the passing of those whom we have loved and labored with in the past days, months, and years. We can say with the apostle Paul that the departure of our beloved comrades "to be with Christ is far better."

We thank God for those who have labored and served so well as pastors and other leaders in our churches and denomination. Also for the great number of Christians who were found faithful in their places of service and worship. We are reminded that their labor and service "was not in vain in the Lord." He that takes note when a sparrow falls knows and properly evaluates in spiritual terms the services of every Christian.

The faithful and sacrificial services of our departed loved ones and friends challenge us to know that we may reap where others have sown and labored. We have "entered into their labors" to be found "always abounding in the work of the Lord."

We are encouraged by the many examples of faithful ones who have achieved in life and have conquered in death. For "we are more than conquerors through him that loved us." We are conscious of the blessings that their lives have brought to us and to the kingdom of God. We sense a great loss but are mindful of their great gain. "And I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me. Write, Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from Henceforth; yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors; and their works do follow them" (Rev. 14:13).

We are reminded of the comforting words of Jesus and the apostle Paul when we think of the deep loss and sorrow in the hearts of loved ones who remain.

May the comforting and sustaining grace of God through the Holy Spirit be with everyone who has experienced the death of a loved one. May we look to the words from the Bible for future hope.

May we stand in honored memory of and salute to those who have passed into the eternal presence of our God while the following words from the Bible are read. "Let not your hearts be troubled; ye believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also" (John 14:1-3).

"But I would not have you to be ignorant, brethren, concerning them which are asleep, that ye sorrow not, even as others which have no hope. For we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with him. For this we say unto you by the word of the Lord, that we which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord shall not prevent them which are asleep. For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God; and the dead in Christ shall rise first; then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air; and so shall we ever be with the Lord" (1 Thess. 4:13-17).

16. The first in a series of Bible study from Colossians was led by Curtis A. Vaughan, professor of New Testament, Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas. The study was from Colossians 1:15-23, the Supremacy of Christ.

17. W. O. Vaught, host pastor, welcomed the messengers to Immanuel Church. Dr. Vaught urged the messengers to plan to attend the Foreign Mission Board service on April 9, 1974 to commission new missionaries. This service will be held at the Little Rock Convention Center in connection with a Foreign Mission Board meeting in Little Rock and will be open to the public.

19. E. E. Boone introduced Rheubin L. South for the President's Address. Special music was by Mrs. William Rice, North Little Rock, with violin accompaniment by Mrs. Wesley McCoy, Little Rock, "I Know That My Redeemer Liveth."

President South expressed gratitude to Mrs. South, to his deacons and to the Park Hill Church for their help during his two years as president of the

convention. The message, "The Best of Times; the Worst of Times" had a text from Isaiah 42:1-16.

20. Election of Officers

R. L. South called for nominations for president. Those nominated were: Don Moore, Fort Smith; Padgett Cope, Little Rock; and Dillard Miller, Mena. Ballot #1 was designated and the ballot vote was taken. The Tellers retired to tally the vote. A runoff vote was taken between Don Moore and Dillard Miller. Don Moore was elected president on the runoff ballot.

21. Voted: Life and Liberty Crusades

R. Wilbur Herring, chairman, Spirit of '76 Committee, moved that the state convention, in preparation for the observance of the 200th anniversary of the nation, set aside the following dates: March 14-28 for one week Life and Liberty Crusades in the Eastern half of the state and April 4-18 for one week Life and Liberty Crusades in the Western half of the state; that July 3, 1976 be reserved for a statewide rally in Little Rock; that Sunday, July 4, 1976 be designated Life and Liberty Sunday and used for an all time high attendance in Sunday School. Second and carried.

22. Voted: Report of Credentials Committee

Don Moore, chairman, read Article III, Section 1, of the constitution. He read the following report of the Credentials Committee, and moved its adoption. Second.

In response to the protest against seating of messengers from the First Baptist Church, Malvern, and First Baptist Church, Russellville, the Credentials Committee reports the following findings and recommendations:

- (1) With reference to the First Baptist Church, Russellville, we find that no messengers from this church have been sent or registered as messengers.
- (2) With reference to the First Baptist Church, Malvern, we wish to make the following statement and recommendation:

Your Credentials Committee has felt that our jurisdiction and responsibility is limited only to the present. We have no desire and have made no attempt to reconstruct the events or struggles of the past. We have only sought, as servants of the convention, to discover the facts concerning the present practice of this church under the leadership of pastor Zane Chesser, who has served the church for the past year and a half.

After much time in discussion and questioning, we find that the present practice of the First Baptist Church, Malvern, is not in violation of the constitutional requirement for membership in the convention.

Therefore, we, the Credentials Committee, on basis of present practice recommend that the messengers of the Malvern, First Baptist Church, be seated in the 120th annual convention of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

Charles Holcomb, Lavaca, requested a ruling from the chair concerning whether the Malvern Church has a written policy which violates the convention constitutional requirement. President South ruled in favor of the committee report. Charles Holcomb moved the matter be referred to the convention. On a standing vote the messengers from First Baptist Church, Malvern, were seated with light opposition.

23. Voted: to extend time for discussion.

The time for Miscellaneous Business had expired. A motion to extend the time 12 minutes for the purpose of discussing the Office of Information Services was seconded and carried. Wayne Davis, Van Buren, read the following motion:

Because the Executive Board of the Arkansas Baptist Convention has approved an office of Information Services to become operational January 1, 1974; and,

Since this office has never been approved by the Arkansas Baptist Convention in annual session; and,

Since the historic Baptist position on this matter of calling pastors and workers to a local church has been left to each church;

And since this action is a radical change in the policy of Arkansas Baptists;

I move that this 1973 annual session of the Arkansas Baptist Convention rescind the action of November 14, 1972 of the executive board establishing the Office of Information Services and instruct the executive board to abandon the idea of a formal procedure in regard to pastor and staff placement in the churches.

The motion was seconded. Wayne Davis spoke to the motion. The extended time expired. Don Hook, Little Rock, moved that the matter be placed on the table until the afternoon session at 2:35 p.m. during the time for Miscellaneous Business, just prior to the Executive Board report. Second. The motion to table was carried.

24. Wesley McCoy, Little Rock, led in singing "God of Grace, God of Glory." Special music was by Mrs. David Scott, Arkadelphia, "I Talked to God Last Night." Leroy French, Barling, read scripture selections from John 20; Matt. 28 and Acts 1. Ernest (Buddy) Coleman, Barling, led in prayer.

25. The annual Convention Sermon was by George T. Blackmon, Arkadelphia, "You Shall Be My Witnesses." The session was closed in prayer by Harry Wigger, Bella Vista.

SECOND DAY – AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, November 7, 1973

(Vice Presidents elected – Nominating Committee Report – Executive Board report)

26. Following the organ prelude, with E. E. Boone, second vice president, presiding, Amon Baker led the messengers in singing "I Will Not

Forget Thee." Special music was a medley of gospel songs by Mr. and Mrs. Amon Baker, Little Rock.

Robert Ferguson, Little Rock, director, Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists, read Romans 15:1-6 and led in prayer.

Curtis Vaughan led in Bible study from Colossians 2:8-23, the Sufficiency of Christ.

28. Voted: to elect vice presidents.

The election of officers was continued and nominations were called for First Vice President. E. E. Boone was nominated for re-election. A motion that nominations cease was seconded and carried and the vote by acclamation was cast for E. E. Boone as First Vice President.

Nominations for Second Vice President were called for. H. Lee Lewis, Warren, was nominated. Motion that nominations cease was seconded and carried. The vote was cast by acclamation for H. Lee Lewis for Second Vice President.

29. Miscellaneous Business

Voted: to adopt report of Abortion Committee

Robert Parker, Batesville, chairman, read the report of the Abortion Committee and moved its adoption. Second and carried.

Whereas the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in regular session on November 16, 1972 did express itself with reference to the problem of abortion in Arkansas in the resolution which follows:

Resolution # 12 – Abortion

WHEREAS in recent years the State of Arkansas has adopted laws which have broadened the base for securing legal abortions, and

WHEREAS these changes in the law have increased the potential for misinterpretation and abuse, and

WHEREAS grave dangers are attendant upon improperly regulated abortions, and

WHEREAS it is essential to the welfare of society that the sacredness of human life be affirmed and protected in all of its aspects,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that all agencies and personnel responsible for authorizing abortions be urged to give scrupulous regard to the letter and intent of the new laws, and particularly we request that they give every resistance to making abortions available simply on demand.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the convention president appoint a committee to assemble authentic materials on the complex abortion issue and make this information, along with the present resolution available to our churches and to medical personnel, societies, and agencies in Arkansas, as well as to

governmental agencies, officials, and legislators in the state so that Christian insights on this subject may be more widely disseminated and influential.

—Adopted by Arkansas Baptist State Convention
November 16, 1972

Whereas this resolution contains essentially two parts:

Part One: related to the attention of agencies and personnel responsible for authorizing abortion to the intent of the new law. Part Two: related to the assembly of materials related to the issue and the dissemination of said information of appropriate agencies.

Be the fact noted that said resolution, including this document, will be circulated to public media, the State Medical Society, the Arkansas Hospital Association, the religious press, and others.

Be the fact also noted that the second part of the instruction to this committee presents some special problems.

1. The literature related to abortions is so voluminous and new material is being printed so fast that a final collection of material related to the problem of abortion is not anticipated in the near future. Therefore, to develop a final compilation of data related to the problems is an impossible task. Therefore, the committee feels that this part of the committee's responsibility should be eliminated, with the following recommendation: that the Baptist State Convention suggest that all concerned parties to the problem of abortion such as the medical profession, social scientists, theologians, etc., continue to produce research findings related to the problem and to make such findings available to the general public.

2. The state of the law, both in the Federal and the State courts, is being challenged to the extent that the law may be altered in the near future. Should this alteration occur, new interpretation of the law would be brought to the attention of the general public through the already established public media.

3. With reference to the part of the resolution concerning "Christian insights", the committee feels that we should make the following response: The Bible is the rule of faith and practice for Baptists; there is no standard or credal statement which adequately expresses Baptist positions in matters such as abortion. Be it resolved that churches, medical personnel, societies, and agencies in Arkansas, as well as governmental agencies, officials, and legislators refer to the Bible for guidance in such matters.

Voted: to rescind Executive Board action on Information Services

President South called the matter from the table and the previous motion by Wayne Davis was read by the convention clerk:

I move that this 1973 annual session of the Arkansas Baptist Convention rescind the action of November 14, 1972 of the executive board establishing the Office of Information Services and instruct the executive board to abandon the idea of a formal procedure in regard to pastor and staff placement in the churches.

Dillard Miller, Mena, president of the Executive Board, gave a resume of the study which was made at the request of the executive secretary in May, 1972, and the recommendation which came from the study. The executive secretary made a statement concerning the need of such a service.

Amos Greer, Pangburn, spoke against the service. A standing vote was taken on the motion to rescind the action of the executive board in setting up the office of Information Services. The motion was carried.

Voted: to adopt History report.

George T. Blackmon moved the report of the Arkansas Baptist History Commission be adopted as printed in the Book of Reports. Second and carried.

30. Voted: to adopt the report of the Nominating Committee.

Andrew Setliffe, Little Rock, chairman, Nominating Committee, read the recommendations of the Nominating Committee and moved its adoption. Second and carried. (All boards and committees listed on pages 9-15)

31. Voted: State Joint Committee for Work with National Baptists

Andrew Setliffe moved to amend the 1972 action of the convention in forming the permanent state joint committee for cooperative ministries with National Baptists to include the president of the convention, Mrs. R. A. Coppenger, Arkadelphia, and Dr. James Sawyer, Benton. Second and carried.

Robert Bauman, Manager, Baptist Book Store, Little Rock, made a brief announcement concerning the book store.

32. Voted: Executive Board report and recommendations as amended.

Dillard S. Miller, president, and the following committee chairmen brought the executive board report: Wilbur Herring, Program Committee; Gerald Trussell, Finance Committee; Loyd Hunnicutt, Operating Committee; and Harold O'Bryan, Nominating Committee.

Recommendation #1, Operation One.

Loyd Hunnicutt moved that we encourage our churches to become involved in Operation One (SBC emphasis) by increasing Cooperative Program giving by a minimum of 1% (suggested 1/3% yearly) of their undesignated church budget income over the next three years and that we engage in a real "Operation Understanding" of the Cooperative Program. Second. W. O. Vaught, Jr. spoke to the motion noting that 1975 would be the 50th anniversary of the Cooperative Program. Motion was carried.

Recommendation #2, Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine.

Wilbur Herring moved that a special day of prayer for the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine be included in the denominational calendar and that a

target date of 1976 be set for a total circulation goal of 70,000 subscribers. Second and carried.

Recommendation #3, 1974 Budget.

Dillard moved that the 1974 budget item for Information Services in the amount of \$20,000 be deleted; that \$5,000 be added to Business Services to take care of fixed items including the provision for office secretarial help; and that the balance of \$15,000 be added to Reserve Funds. Second and carried.

Gerald Trussell moved that the 1974 budget in the amount of \$3,681,428 be adopted as amended. Second and carried.

33. Duke McCall, president, Southern Seminary, Louisville, Ky. brought a word of greeting and expressed appreciation to Arkansas Baptists for Cooperative Program support.

34. Amon Baker led the messengers in singing, "Make Me a Blessing." Special music was by Mrs. Don Rice, Little Rock, "The Lord is My Light."

The session was closed with the theological address by Milton Ferguson, president, Midwestern Seminary, Kansas City. Tommy Bridges, North Little Rock, led in the closing prayer.

SECOND DAY – EVENING SESSION

Wednesday, November 7, 1973

(Baptist Building report – People to People and theme emphasis)

35. Rheubin L. South called the session to order at 6:45 p.m. in the Little Rock Convention Center. Prelude music was by a brass choir directed by Jim Raymick.

Mr. Raymick led the messengers in singing "Onward Christian Soldiers." Don Cooper, Little Rock, assistant director, Sunday School Department, read the scripture, examples of sharing the Word from Mark 16:15, Acts 5:42, Romans 8; and led in prayer.

36. Allen B. Comish, director, Church Services and Materials Division, Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee, brought the message "People to People" with the text from Matthew 9:35.

Jim Raymick led in singing "I Love to Tell the Story."

37. The Baptist Building report was a slide presentation with a taped narration produced by the staff, using Lonnie Gibbons, North Little Rock, and Dave Woodman, Little Rock, as narrators. Special music was a music medley arranged and conducted by Jim Raymick, called "People to People" using a mass choir and the brass choir accompaniment.

38. The message of the hour, "The Imperative Mission of the Church," following the theme, Share the Word Now, was by Franklin Paschall, pastor, First Baptist Church, Nashville, Tennessee.

The session was closed with prayer by Rheubin L. South.

THIRD DAY – MORNING SESSION

Thursday, November 8, 1973

(Report of Resolutions Committee)

39. Following the prelude music President South opened the session by expressing the thanks and appreciation of the messengers to Jim Raymick

and all the convention musicians for assuming the responsibility for Ervin Keathley, state music secretary, along with several other Arkansas Baptist musicians who were participating in the Alaska Music Crusade.

40. Bob Hatzfeld, Little Rock, led the messengers in singing "Holy Bible, Book Divine." Special music was by Mr. Hatzfeld, "Great Peace Have They."

Wilson Deese, Little Rock, director, Chaplaincy Ministries, read the scripture and led in prayer.

41. The final Bible study by Curtis A. Vaughan was from Colossians 3:1-4:6, The Life of the Christian.

42. Representatives of Southern Baptist Convention agencies were recognized. Porter Routh, executive secretary, Executive Committee, brought a brief greeting with a "thank you" for what Arkansas Baptists mean to the total outreach of our denomination. He congratulated the messengers on the fact that gifts to SBC causes from Arkansas reflected a 15.2% increase last year, the largest increase of any of the older established conventions.

Orrin Morris, regional coordinator, Planning and Coordinating Section, Home Mission Board, Atlanta, Georgia was present to recognize Rev. and Mrs. C. F. Landon who will retire December 31, 1973 after completing almost 40 years as workers with the deaf.

Rev. and Mrs. Gilbert Nichols, Arkansas missionaries serving in Paraguay, were representatives in the Foreign Mission Board booth during the convention. Other visitors present were Don Corley, Baptist Medical Center Systems, Little Rock, and Charles R. Baker, Vice President, Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis.

43. Voted: to adopt recommendation of Arkansas Baptist Foundation Carbon Sims, president, Board of Trustees, Arkansas Baptist Foundation, brought a brief report of the Foundation and moved the report be adopted as found in the Book of Reports with the recommendation that all undesignated receipts of the Foundation be utilized in the operation of the Foundation. Second and carried.

44. Johnny Biggs, Little Rock, executive director, Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services, brought a brief report.

45. Miscellaneous business.

R. L. South expressed his appreciation for the help and cooperation from the Baptist Building staff, the executive board and committees; and the vice presidents during his two year tenure as president.

Voted: to send letter to Russellville, First Church

Bob Parker, Batesville, read the following motion:

"I move that the convention send a letter of appreciation for Cooperative Program gifts sent by the First Baptist Church in Russellville and add to this our assurances of continued prayers and concern that this great church soon be associated with the Arkansas Baptist State Convention as during many years past." The motion was seconded and carried.

46. Paul Sanders, chairman, Resolutions Committee, read the report of the Committee. All resolutions were adopted on a motion by Paul Sanders, second and carried.

Resolution #1, Appreciation to Host Church.

WHEREAS, we have received a warm welcome and most adequate provisions by the Immanuel Baptist Church of Little Rock in the 120th Annual Convention of its 125 years of existence.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we express our gratitude to the Immanuel Baptist Church and to their congenial pastor, Dr. W. O. Vaught, for helping make this a most pleasant and rewarding experience.

Resolution #2, Appreciation to Convention President and State Executive Secretary

WHEREAS, we have received some of the finest spiritual blessings in an atmosphere of genuine Christian love and fellowship, and

WHEREAS, we messengers this 120th Annual Convention, recognize the superb job that has been done by Dr. Rheubin L. South and Dr. Charles Ashcraft in preparing for these meaningful days.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we express to both Brother Rheubin South and Brother Charles Ashcraft our sincere appreciation as messengers to this convention for the Christ-like way in which they have led us.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that as messengers, we will give the incoming president, Brother Don Moore, our Executive Secretary, Brother Charles Ashcraft, and all the convention officers our fullest cooperation and support and lead our churches to do the same in this coming year as we serve our Lord and Saviour together.

Resolution #3, Appreciation to Dillard Miller

WHEREAS, during the past two years Brother Dillard Miller has served with distinction as president of our State Executive Board.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we express to him our appreciation for his outstanding leadership and to the First Baptist Church of Mena for their unselfishness in sharing him with us.

Resolution #4, Operation One

WHEREAS, under the leadership of our Executive Board and in cooperation with the Southern Baptist Convention we have entered into a Cooperative Program emphasis identified as "Operation One."

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we encourage every cooperating Baptist Church in Arkansas to increase its mission giving through the Cooperative Program at least one percent during the three-year period, 1973-1975.

Resolution #5, Labeling of Beverage Alcohol

WHEREAS, Senator Strom Thurmond of South Carolina has introduced in the United States Senate a bill (S. 895) which will require the labeling of beverage alcohol containing 14% or more alcohol as being possibly habit forming and dangerous to the user.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT we, the messengers of this 120th session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, express our approval of this bill and that we write our representatives in Congress (House and Senate) asking them to actively support Senate Bill 895 and work for its passage.

Resolution #6, Fuel Allocations

WHEREAS, the moral fiber of the nation is at low ebb as exemplified by the Watergate affair, high drug consumption, sex immorality, etc.

WHEREAS, the churches are the recognized moral, character building institutions of the nation and their services are vital to the ethical standards of the land along with the homes and the schools.

WHEREAS, the Committee on Fuel Allocation has not placed the churches on the priority list.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention go on record favoring the position that churches be placed on the priority list that their doors may be kept open for prayer and praise and worship this time of national crises.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we ask our Executive Secretary to convey to the Office of Oil and Gas, U.S. Department of Interior, P.O. Box 19407, Washington, D.C., 20036, our concern in this matter.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT, the pastors and other leaders of our church and denominational institutions make every effort to conserve our nation's energy resources and endeavor, in consultation with competent authorities, to find ways of reducing fuel consumption in the heating and lighting of our church buildings and in travel.

Resolution #7, Communism in the Classroom

WHEREAS, we are faced with the question of those who advocate the Communist form of society and government teaching in our state supported schools and

WHEREAS, we believe in the separation of Church and State we also believe that Christians in our churches are also citizens of our state and nation and not only have the right, but also the responsibility to speak out against matters in our nation that affect our young people and ultimately our great nation, and that if the Supreme Court can rule that Bible reading and prayers in the classroom are unconstitutional that they should certainly

not allow the Godless philosophy of Communism or those who openly advocate the Communist form of government to be a part of any tax supported school.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we go on record as being opposed to any known Communist or one who advocate the Communist form of government teaching or serving in any of our state supported schools, and

FURTHER, that we give our encouragement to the school boards and officials of all of our schools in ridding our classrooms of those who believe in and teach the Communist point of view.

Resolution #8, Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign

WHEREAS, the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign is continuing to be blessed by our Lord in Phase II with more than 600 churches in our state participating in this campaign for higher education, and

WHEREAS, five associations already have over 80% of their churches participating,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we commend and express our appreciation to Brother Jim Tillman for his splendid leadership as director of Phase II and Mrs. Reynolds for her faithful service as campaign secretary, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT we commend Dr. Daniel Grant, President of Ouachita Baptist University and Dr. Jack Nicholas, President of Southern Baptist College, for their wonderful spirit, their expressed love for Arkansas Baptists, their superb leadership in their respective schools, and their devoted commitment to our Lord.

47. Bob Hatzfeld led in singing "I Am Bound for the Promised Land." Special music was by Mrs. Duke Dougan, North Little Rock. Introduction of the speaker was by Earl Verser.

H. G. (Jerry) Clower, Baptist deacon and well-known humorist from Yazoo City, Mississippi, was the final speaker for the convention.

The newly elected president, Don Moore, adjourned the 120th Annual Session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention with prayer.

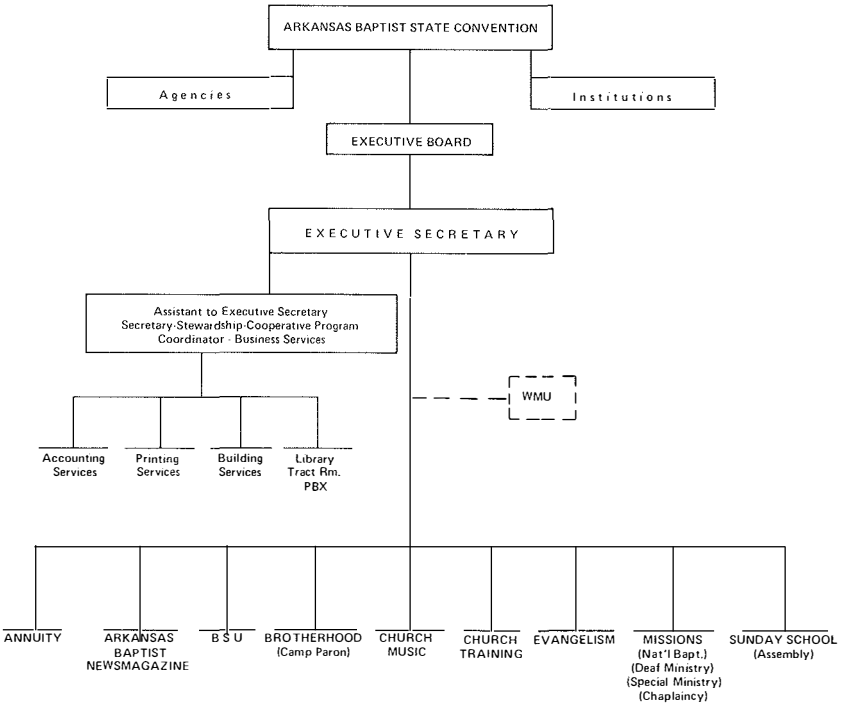

Cooperative Program

Arkansas Baptists have responded generously to the 1973 Cooperative Program budget needs. Receipts through August total \$2,212,134.06. This amount represents a 10.93% increase over the same period last year and is only slightly under the total budget needs. In addition, receipts during this same period for special causes amount to over one million dollars, \$333,974.53 for the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign, and \$821,612.47 to all other special mission causes. We express our gratitude to you for your support in every area of our work.

Executive Board

Under the leadership of Dillard S. Miller, president, the executive board committees have completed a thorough study and evaluation of every phase of the work of the executive board staff. Position descriptions of employees have been updated and the following new organizational plan adopted:



This new plan is designed to relieve the executive secretary of some administrative responsibility and Roy F. Lewis has been named Coordinator of Business Services with additional responsibilities added to supervise Accounting Services, Printing Room Services, and Baptist Building Services.

Staff Changes

The following new staff personnel have begun service with the convention during 1973: Harold Vernon, Children's Consultant, and Freddie Pike, Youth Consultant, Sunday School Department; Doyle Lumpkin, Chaplain, Girls' Training School; and Dick King, Pre-college Associate, Evangelism. C. H. Seaton, who has served as Brotherhood Associate since 1956 was named director of the department with additional duties as director of RA and Camp Paron. Robert Holley, Church Training Associate since 1968 has been elected Church Training Director, to be effective January 1, 1974. Ralph W. Davis, Director, since 1945 will continue to serve in the department until the date of his planned retirement, May 1, 1974.

Property

The executive board authorized the sale of property on South Main Street in Camden which has been used for Work with National Baptists. The poor location made the sale a wise move and funds from the sale have been placed in a separate fund for future use in this work. The adult education program in the area will be conducted in a local church. Arrangements have been concluded also in the exchange of lots near the University of Arkansas at Little Rock with the University providing a more desirable location for the proposed new student center.

Tornado Relief

The executive board unanimously approved assistance to the Jonesboro area in June following the disastrous tornado there. Payment of \$5,000 was made with convention funds to the Mt. Zion Association for this purpose, matching a gift in the same amount by the Home Mission Board.

Annuity Board Agreement

The agreement with the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention was amended in executive board session to (a) increase the "Widow Benefit", and (b) add a new benefit called the "Temporary Income Benefit."

General Publishing Company

The executive board commended the executive secretary in the out-of-court settlement of the lawsuit filed in 1971 by the General Publishing Company against the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine in a contract dispute.

Study Committees Working

The executive board has committees now making studies in the following areas: (1) improvements of the Baptist Building parking lot; (2) advertising guidelines for the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine; (3) employees' policy manual; (4) a committee of laymen studying the salaries of pastors, church staff and superintendents of missions; and (5) the idea of enlarging the state assembly to a "full" assembly from the "youth" assembly concept.

Information Services

In May, 1972, the Executive Board Program Committee authorized the study of the "possibility and practicality" of an Information Services in our

state whereby preachers and other church workers could be assisted in finding positions of service. This followed the example of six sister conventions.

A thorough study was made by the sub-committee composed of three pastors and two laymen. In November, 1972, on the recommendation of the Program Committee, the Executive Board adopted the following recommendation:

“We recommend that the Executive Board encourage the churches and church staff members to cooperate with the office of the Executive Secretary in providing a file of biographical information.

“We recommend that the Executive Board encourage the churches and ministers, while seeking the leadership of the Holy Spirit, to ethically seek the counsel of respected denominational leaders.

“We recommend that the Executive Board see that an office of Information Services be created in the Baptist Building and that a job description for personnel to fill this office be drawn up by the Operating Committee and developed through the ordinary channels used for enlisting new personnel and that, when approved, this service be operational by January 1, 1974.”

The implementing of this directive of the Executive Board has been carried out by the allocation of funds for this service in the 1974 budget proposal. This work will be under the supervision of the Executive Secretary with the assistance of one man with status comparable to department associates and a half-time office secretary.

Executive Board Recommendations

1. **Operation One** – The Executive Board recommends that we encourage our churches to become involved in **OPERATION ONE** (SBC emphasis) by increasing Cooperative Program giving by a minimum of 1% (suggested 1/3% yearly) of their undesignated church budget income over the next three years and that we engage in a real “Operation Understanding” of the Cooperative Program.
2. **Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine** – The Executive Board recommends that a special day of prayer for the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine be included in the denominational calendar and that a target date of 1976 be set for a total circulation goal of 70,000 subscribers.
3. **1974 Budget** – The Executive Board recommends the following 1974 budget:

ARKANSAS BAPTIST ASSEMBLY

Lawson Hatfield, Director

The objectives of the state assembly is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose . . . "to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer cooperation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God."

The program of the state assembly seeks to reach its objectives by:

1. Providing facilities and operating the assembly as a service to the programs of the convention.
2. Offering training for church leaders, church members, and others of all age groups in Bible study, stewardship and missions.
3. Provide worship, witnessing and evangelistic opportunities.
4. Planning fellowship and recreational activities.
5. Encouraging all boards, agencies and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention to provide an informal meeting place for denominational leaders, and members.
6. Cultivating and training young people, our leaders of tomorrow.

A report and evaluation of the four 1973 assemblies follows.

The total registration of 4,181 reflected in the following figures which are listed for the four consecutive weeks: 848, 1,188, 942, 1,203. This is 714 more than last year. In addition there were many visitors in the services each week.

The assembly program reflects a variety of study and fellowship opportunities for the many people in attendance. The Children's Building was well staffed for good learning experiences for 108 preschool children.

A Children's Assembly (Grades 3 through 6) is conducted in a separate area by a good staff of leaders, and registered 108.

The Youth-Adult Assembly is the largest in attendance. Bible study classes for young people and special studies and organizational work was offered for adults. Several special studies were provided for some groups and adult recreation was expanded to include a craft's class. A large special choir produced "Real", a contemporary folk-type musical for youth on Friday night of each week, 3,264 were registered.

During the four assemblies 331 of those in attendance recorded decisions. Of these 253 were professions of faith, 78 were surrenders to special service.

A family building of 12 units and two new dormitories were opened for the 1973 summer session. Additional improvements in facilities are underway for 1974.

Mrs. Mildred Merryman was a special camper for 1973. Mrs. Merryman attended the first assembly at Siloam Springs 50 years ago. In her comments she mentioned that the schedule then was very much the same as today's. This included morning-watch worship, two classes, a recess and morning services. Afternoons were given to recreation and the day ended with an evening worship service hour. Attendance in 1923 reached 553.

Plans for 1974 include expanding from four to five weeks; improvements will include many projects such as some black top walkways, drives and pavilion floors, and a 6-unit dormitory for 150 campers will be constructed if the total capital needs budget for 1973 is met.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE

J. Everett Sneed, Editor

The purpose of the ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE is to undergird and strengthen the churches of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Religious news of local, state, and national interest is featured. It is our goal to inform the Baptists of our state so that they may be more responsive to the cause of Christ.

Except at the very beginning of the Convention and during the Civil War, Arkansas Baptists have provided a paper without interruption. It is felt that the quality which the ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE has maintained across the years will serve as a foundation for future advance.

The NEWSMAGAZINE has had an excellent year. In September there were 63,948 subscribers which is the largest number in its history. This represents an increase of over 4,000 since last year. (Of this number approximately 1,000 are on a two-month free trial. Several of these 13 churches have already entered the Budget Plan.)

Although printing and mailing costs have steadily increased during the past year, no increase in subscription price is anticipated. It is hoped that the publication can and will be available to every Baptist in Arkansas.

Several changes have been made during the past year. Each of these are designed to give more coverage to local church news or to make the magazine more readable.

Each church has been asked to elect a church reporter so the news may be more readily obtained. A new feature entitled "News Briefs," has been begun. It is hoped that this section will provide a new and needed dimension. This is carried to give recognition to such things as ordination of deacons, licensing of ministers, groundbreaking, remodeling of property, etc. It is our desire to obtain sufficient material to develop a full page of these one and two-sentence statements each week.

The paper continues to provide coverage of the Ouachita-Southern Higher Education Campaign. It is our intent to inform the people of the progress of this important undertaking for our Lord.

We appeal to the pastors and church leaders to assist us in increasing our circulation to an even higher level. We believe that in so doing each church will be helping themselves as well as the entire kingdom's work. For Baptists are at their best when they are informed. We believe that the ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE is one of the best bargains available to a church today.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

Project '76

1. Goal: To present the Gospel and share the Word with everyone in the major college centers of Arkansas.
2. Students at the University of Arkansas and at State College of Arkansas are sharing their faith with each student in campus housing and presenting them with a portion of Scripture entitled "Jesus" and a brochure about Baptist Student Union.
3. During Spring Break, students from all over the state will come to Fayetteville and Conway to:
 - (1) Share their faith in a door-to-door visitation with a Scripture presentation and a brochure about the local Baptist churches.
 - (2) Accomplish manual work projects in needy areas of the city.
 - (3) Share in Bible study and renewal experiences at night.
4. Two new campuses and cities will be attempted each year through 1976.

International Students

1. Goal: To find Christian families who will "adopt" each of the 300 International students studying in the state who desire to have a host family.
2. Mrs. Fred Williams will serve as coordinator for the International students in the Little Rock area.
3. Miss Maureen Thompson will serve as coordinator for the schools in Conway.

Campus Evangelism

1. Goal: To have a full time Student-To-Student worker on each of the major Arkansas campuses to lead in personal witnessing.
2. Our campuses reported 166 professions of faith during last school year.

Missions

1. Goal: To have 100 summer missionaries by 1976, with half serving in the state.
2. Our 51 summer missionaries this past summer reported 942 professions of faith.
3. Our students during Spring Break projects reported over fifty professions of faith as they worked at:

BROTHERHOOD

C. H. Seaton, Director

In the past year Brotherhood again showed an increase in the number of organizations and total membership. This marks the third year to show an increase, not a large one but reflects a steady growth. For this continued growth we are grateful.

Indications point to an increase during the present year. Several new organizations have been formed already. Churches are coming to realize the value of providing missionary education and involvement in missions for men and boys.

We thank God for this continued growth and interest in missions for men and boys through Brotherhood. Baptist Men and Royal Ambassadors is the key to a vital missionary education program.

Since the last report several events of interest to and for Brotherhood work have been held.

In January the Brotherhood director and several men attended a seminar for Mission Bible Fellowship sponsored by the Home Mission Board. Some of those attending have started one or two Mission Bible Fellowship classes in their areas.

A regional Mission Activities Leadership Training Institute was held at Texoma Lodge on Lake Texoma for a five state area. Twelve men from Arkansas attended the Thursday through Saturday meeting. At least two associational mission workshops have been conducted.

In March, Dr. Baker Cauthen spoke to about 300 men attending the state Baptist Men's Meeting in Little Rock. Although the attendance was not up to expectations the meeting was a good one. Those attending were challenged to a greater commitment to missions.

On May 4-5 some 400 Royal Ambassadors met for the state Congress. Following a hot dog supper on Friday evening the boys heard Glendon Grober, Missionary to Brazil. On Saturday morning, Gilbert Nichols was the missionary speaker. These men presented mission needs as a tremendous challenge and urged boys to get involved.

June is Royal Ambassador Camp month. Four weeks of camp were held. Visible results include: 58 accepting Christ; 12 surrendering for full-time Christian vocational service; 4 definite called to be a missionary and 41 rededications. The total attendance was 317 an increase over the previous year.

The fall program promises to be a busy one. September 28-29, a state-wide training clinic will be held at Camp Paron. October is the time for district meetings for all associational and church Brotherhood officers.

As the Lord continues to bless, many more churches will become involved in providing missionary education and mission activities for men and boys through Brotherhood. Brotherhood reaches men and boys for Christ and His work.

CAMP PARON

Camp Paron has been exceedingly active during the past year. Eleven full weeks of camp were held. These were all Royal Ambassadors and Girls in Action camps.

The camp has been utilized almost every week-end by various church groups. Several departments have used the facilities during the other days of the week.

The facilities are already booked for most of the time for the coming year, there are a few week-ends available.

Food supplies have been adequate but expensive. We were able to maintain the quality of food. In fact, the food service and meals were the finest. It has been necessary to increase the fees due to the rising costs.

Improvements include a new heating-cooling system for the dining hall and a new unit for the activities building.

An infirmary, for the use of the G.A.'s, is under construction and should be completed by November 1st. Painting the interior of cabins will be started soon and continue during the fall, winter and spring, getting camp ready for next summer.

The urgent need at the present time is an auditorium, meeting rooms building and a crafts building. Hopefully these will be possible within the next few years.

Some additional outdoor recreation equipment will be provided for use next summer.

Continue to pray for the camp program and development.

CHURCH MUSIC

Of the various programs of a church, music is the one which has grown up within the church. The programs of Bible teaching and other activities have started as laymen's movements or programs outside the church. As years passed, the church recognized the value of these programs and made them a part of church activities. The Bible tells of the Savior, presents God to man, and brings to focus the eternal doctrines and truths of God. The hymn book witnesses to the saving grace of the Savior, praises God for the revelation of himself at work in his world, and helps to translate the doctrines and truths of the Bible.

The use of music in our worship services today calls for maximum participation. Through hymn singing, choral music and the use of various musical experiences, people can actively and audibly participate in worship. Music is an important part of *worship, proclamation, education, ministry*, and the *application of Christian principles*. All churches use it today because of its proved effectiveness in involving people in these functions.

3. **Volunteer/Part Time Music Directors Retreat:** A total of 56 part-time music directors took advantage of the training offered to them in February this year at Camp Paron. 5. **Youth Choir Leadership Clinics:** One-Day Youth Choir Leadership Clinics were conducted in five areas of the state in August. Mr. Don Wright, director of vocal music in the high school of Fayetteville, led the sessions in a reading session of new music and then led out in a discussion of "Trends in Youth Music" to conclude the clinics. Attendance was very good in most areas.

III. ASSISTANCE GIVEN AND SERVICES OFFERED

1. **Church Music Workshop:** This department and the Church Music Department of Ouachita University jointly sponsored this event for ministers of music, graded choir workers, and church soloists. Outstanding leaders in the workshop this year included Dr. Frank Stovall, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary; Bob Burroughs, Samford University; Dr. Austin C. Lovelace, Dallas; Mr. Ken Robinson, Plano, Texas.
2. **Choir Day:** Choir Day at Ouachita in September is a program our department helps promote each year. This is always an exciting time for the youth choirs of the state. Over 2400 participated in the rehearsals and the half-time program of Ouachita's first home game last season.
3. **Program Assistance:** This department offers assistance to all the other programs of work in our state as they plan special events where music is involved.
4. **Lending Library:** Our department has a limited amount of choral music which is available for use by the churches through our Lending Library. The cost for this service is very nominal and is used to repair old music and to purchase new. A listing of what we have is available from our office. We will be glad to mail you one upon request.

V. ALASKA COOPERATIVE MUSIC MISSION PROJECT

Through the cooperation of the Alaska Baptist Convention and the Music department of the Baptist Sunday School Board, the Music Men of Arkansas were invited to participate in a Music Mission project with the churches of Alaska. This invitation came in 1971 and is becoming a reality this year. Twenty men and seven women are committed to this project which is scheduled for October 26 – November 10.

The two main thrusts will be music in revival and establishing a music program in the churches, but we also want to offer help in any other area

where there is a need we can fill. We go praying that God will use us beyond our abilities so that He may receive the glory and that the churches will be strengthened.

VI. CONCLUSION

This is the 32nd Annual Report of the Arkansas Baptist Music Ministry, the oldest such state music organization in the Southern Baptist Convention, begun in September 1941 as the "Arkansas Baptist Musicians".

CHURCH TRAINING

Ralph W. Davis, Secretary

The objective of the Church Training Department is to assist churches and associations in establishing, enlarging, conducting, and improving the church training program in the churches. In addition to Church Training, the department has been assigned the following work in cooperation with the Sunday School Board:

Vocational Guidance
Church Administration
Family Ministry
Church Library
Church Recreation

The work of the department is made possible by the assistance of over 40 approved workers who are enlisted and trained by the Department personnel. On March 3, 1973, 64 workers attended the Approved Workers' and Missionaries' Meeting in Little Rock where they received training in preparation for conducting 28 UpGrade Conferences. Special training was given to 33 approved workers who attended the Special Workers' Clinic in Tulsa, Oklahoma, March 19-21, 1973.

The Church Training Department has enlisted counselors or approved workers for the other programs listed above.

The Church Training Department works in cooperation with the Church Training Department of the Sunday School Board. The definite study areas which determine the curriculum materials include Christian theology, Christian history, Christian ethics, church polity, and performance of the functions of the church such as witness, worship, and ministry.

1. State Meetings.

(1) State Church Training Workshop.

The State Church Training Workshop was conducted on Thursday, October 26, 1972, at First Baptist Church, Little Rock. Conferences were held for each age group division. There was also a conference for general officers and library workers. Approximately 100 attended the meeting.

(2) Youth Workshop.

The second Wide-Area Youth Workshop was conducted on

January 29-30, 1973, at Second Baptist Church in Little Rock with a registration of 166.

Twenty-Eight UpGrade Conferences were conducted with 1,116 total attendance from the different churches. There were 272 churches represented in these conferences.
 - (3) **Drills and Tournaments**
The Bible Exploring Drill (for older children), the Youth Bible Drill (for younger youth), and the Youth Speakers' Tournament (for older youth) were held in the eight districts, April 2-13. District winners in the Bible Drill and Speakers' Tournament participated in the state drills and tournaments. In the Youth Bible Drill, Paula Van Meter, Central Baptist Church, Magnolia, placed first and represented Arkansas at Ridgecrest. In the Speakers' Tournament, Sherry Millwood, First Baptist Church, Nashville, won first place and represented Arkansas at Ridgecrest.
4. **Personal Consultations.**
Seventy-one churches were visited by the secretary or associate during the past year.
5. **Church Administration Workshops.**
Five Area-Wide Church Administration Workshops were conducted in October, 1972. These were held at El Dorado, Texarkana, North Little Rock, Blytheville, and Springdale. These were planned for pastors, staff members, deacons, and church secretaries. Four Church Administration Workshops are planned for 1974.

6. Vocational Guidance.

The second state-wide Church Vocations Conference, known as DISCOVERY II, was held on the Ouachita campus August 20-23. This conference was for senior high school and college youth who were seeking direction in vocational choice.

A Church Vocations Conference was conducted at each of the four assemblies at Siloam Springs. A vocational guidance counselor was present at each of the four weeks to counsel the young people interested in church vocations.

7. Church Recreation.

A conference for youth leaders was conducted at each of the four assemblies at Siloam Springs dealing with the summer youth program and the day-camping program.

8. Library Work.

An Area-Wide Church Library Workshop was conducted at Immanuel Church, Little Rock, May 4-5, 1973. Workers from the Church Library Department, Baptist Sunday School Board, conducted the conference.

The main emphasis for the next three years will be "CHURCH: the Sunday Night Place." This is a new promotional effort designed to help churches experience a new consciousness about Church Training and increase attendance on Sunday night. Over 375 churches are participating in this emphasis in Arkansas.

THE MAIN OBJECTIVES

Keep a concern for the unsaved upon the hearts and minds of our members.

Continue a program of personal witnessing that will reach every member of our churches.

Promote a program of spiritual growth.

Progress of Last Year

The laity were used as never before in personal witnessing and bus evangelism. Hundreds of our members were trained in Lay Evangelism Schools how to share their faith.

Two hundred and fifty (250) people have been trained as qualified directors of Lay Evangelism Schools using WIN materials. Thirty-seven of those are laymen and seven are women.

State Evangelist, Clarence Shell, Jr., continues to bless the lives of hundreds of people in revivals, Lay Evangelism Schools, camps and assemblies.

Richard (Dick) King was graduated from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in May. He started May 16 as associate in charge of pre-college evangelism. He is an expert in training our youth in personal witnessing. W.O.W. (Win Our World) Schools are becoming very popular in local churches.

Emphasis for 1973-74

The State Evangelism Conference will be held at the Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, January 21-22, 1974. Dr. Wayne Ward will be the Bible Teacher. Mrs. Robert Fling, of New York, will speak. Miss Amanda Tinkle will challenge us to renew our efforts in recruiting foreign mission volunteers.

Mr. Owen Cooper, president of the Southern Baptist Convention, will speak and challenge us to enlarge our vision and do more in missions and evangelism.

The Pastors' Witnessing Retreat will be held at Camp Paron September 5-6.

MISSIONS

Direct Missions

Purchase of six NEW MISSION SITES and aid in relocating one church has amounted to \$25,250.

BUILDING AID GRANTS have been made to seven churches totaling \$11,500.

Loans from the REVOLVING LOAN FUND have gone to five churches and total \$27,450.

SALARY SUPPLEMENTS for superintendents of missions have gone to seven associations.

PASTORAL SALARY AID has been awarded to 23 churches.

PASTORS' RETREATS were held in four areas of the state, and one workshop retreat was held for superintendents of missions.

Work with National Baptists

Five STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONARIES spent 10 weeks working in 14 black churches, youth camps, and programs, enrolling over 1250 youth and resulting in a total of 106 professions of faith.

Five college and one seminary student were assisted with Home Mission Board SCHOLARSHIP program.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION activities at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff enrolled 220 students in Bible classes, and others were engaged in various BSU-sponsored activities.

Two National Baptist CHURCH LOANS have been approved by the Home Mission Board for churches in Little Rock and Earle.

EXTENSION CENTERS for in-service training enrolled more than 100 pastors and laymen in Little Rock, Lewisville, and Helena.

"HART OF THE HILLS" CAMP at Paron was attended by 269 campers in a two-week program.

Twenty LEADERSHIP CLINICS and institutes across the state enrolled more than 1500 persons.

JOINT COMMITTEES are now functioning in Arkansas Valley, Liberty, Pulaski County, and Harmony associations.

The STATE JOINT COMMITTEE has met twice with representatives from all three cooperating conventions in attendance.

Special Missions Ministries

The MIGRANT MISSION CENTER at Hope has witnessed more than 75 professions of faith since opening for this year on February 1.

In Hot Springs, the MISSION CENTER continues to reach many needy families with material and spiritual help resulting in 29 professions of faith through July.

A MISSION CENTER has been established in Augusta in cooperation with the First Church and Calvary Association.

Fourteen STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONARIES worked in resort/recreational areas for ten weeks.

DISASTER RELIEF amounting to \$5,000 was provided Mt. Zion Association to be used to aid victims of the tornado in the Jonesboro area.

Assistance was given to numerous churches and associations interested in developing WEEKDAY MINISTRIES, LITERACY, AND REHABILITATION programs.

CAMPERS ON MISSION enrolled 140 families and held two meetings to enlist and train campers in witnessing and winning others during summer family outings.

Chaplaincy Ministries

Chaplains now employed by the Convention serve in the following INSTITUTIONS: Booneville Unit of the Children's Colony, Boys' Training School, Cummins Prison, Girls' Training School, and the Hot Springs Rehabilitation Center.

STUDENT CHAPLAINS serve on the staffs of the Arkadelphia and McRae Units of the Children's Colony.

A PART-TIME CHAPLAIN serves Craighead and Greene County jails and other agencies.

Through July this year, the chaplains reported 168 professions of faith.

Deaf Ministries

Thirteen Arkansas Baptist churches and one black church cooperate with MINISTRIES TO THE DEAF by providing transportation, interpreters and adequate Bible teaching and worship.

SIGN LANGUAGE CLASSES have been taught in 15 churches and communities this year.

A Convention-wide CONFERENCE ON TOTAL COMMUNICATION was held in Little Rock and sponsored by the Home Mission Board.

A two-day WORKSHOP FOR INTERPRETERS was attended by 45 interpreters and pastors.

The ARKANSAS BAPTIST CONFERENCE OF THE DEAF met to set goals, lay plans, and provide fellowship for deaf persons across the state.

STEWARDSHIP-COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

Arkansas Baptists continue to set new records in the support of world missions through the Cooperative Program. Receipts this year have been exceeding those of a year ago by more than ten percent, and, in all probability, another record will be set in 1973 for the third consecutive year.

A three year emphasis identified as Operation One was approved by the Southern Baptist Convention and later by the Executive Board for use in Arkansas. This is an effort to encourage each church to increase its mission giving through the Cooperative Program at least one percent sometime during the three year period. It also encourages increased giving to associational missions. The emphasis will be accelerated in the months ahead and will climax in 1975 with the fiftieth anniversary of the Cooperative Program.

During the year a record number of tracts on stewardship and mission giving have been purchased and distributed, along with various other related materials. Most of these were purchased from the Stewardship Commission, but a number of them were produced locally.

During each of the four program weeks at Siloam Springs Assembly a Cooperative Program drama was presented. The drama was written by staff personnel and produced with the help of youth and student workers at the assembly.

A major accomplishment of the department has been the securing of the services of Gilbert Nichols, missionary to Paraguay, as a missionary-in-residence serving with the department. Under this arrangement the Foreign Mission Board continues Mr. Nichols on full salary, but relieves him of all other usual responsibilities while he is on furlough in order that he might serve through this department. His responsibilities have included a number of matters related to stewardship, but have been primarily in the area of Cooperative Program promotion. He has spoken in churches, and associations, and camps, and in other special places, where he jointly represented the Foreign Mission Board and the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

The ministry of Mr. Nichols in this relationship has been exceptionally well received and has been most productive. Because of this Mr. Nichols was invited to speak briefly during the report of the Stewardship Commission at the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Portland, Oregon.

When Mr. Nichols returns to his mission field at the end of 1973, it is anticipated that this same working relationship can be maintained with other furloughing foreign missionaries in succeeding years.

While mission giving on a state-wide level has been increasing, stewardship in the individual churches has also been steadily improving. Many churches have reported record annual receipts and budgets. In some cases the increase is attributable to an increase in membership, but in many cases the increased financial support is greater than the proportionate increase in membership and represents additional spiritual growth and maturity on the part of Arkansas Baptists.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Looking Back to 1971-72

During 1971-72, the enrolment of Arkansas Baptist Sunday Schools grew to 212,255, a net gain of 6,702 over the year before. Vacation Bible Schools also gained from 79,241 to 90,369, a net increase of 11,128. These two factors were strong elements in the increase of baptisms for the year.

Looking Back to 1972-73

With a continued emphasis on People-to-People, the Sunday School department enjoyed another year of assisting churches, associations, and the state convention in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving Sunday School programs. Assistance was given churches through the promotion of Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, weekday Bible study, bus outreach, and church architecture consultation.

Following is a summary of the projects the department promoted during the past year:

I. Sunday School Promotion

1. Projects

(1) State

Creative Bible Teaching Clinic, April 24, First Church, Little Rock – 190 teachers and officers trained.

Briefing Meeting – August 7 – registered 28 associational superintendents of missions and Sunday School directors from 16 associations.

State Sunday School Convention, September 24-25, Grand Avenue Church, Fort Smith – 450 teachers and officers registered from 125 churches.

(2) Associational

Department personnel assisted in leadership training efforts in 28 associations, with 2,479 leaders participating.

(3) Church

Department personnel assisted 36 churches in training and planning sessions with 1,544 registered.

(4) Convention

Department personnel participated in 7 convention-wide planning and training meetings.

2. Achievement Guide

As of July 31, 1973, 77 units in 10 churches had received Merit, Advanced or Distinguished recognition. Two associational Sunday School organizations, North Pulaski and Concord, had received Merit recognition.

3. New Church Study Course Awards

As of August 31, 1973, 486 requests had been made and processed for 914 credits in Subject Area 63 (Bible Teaching Program) of the New Church Study Course.

II. Vacation Bible School Promotion

The state VBS Clinic conducted on February 6, in Park Hill church, North Little Rock, trained 310 associational leaders to conduct associational VBS clinics.

18 associations reported training 2,100 workers in 23 associational VBS clinics.

III. Weekday Bible Study Program

Sixty churches provide kindergarten ministries. A kindergarten worship was conducted November 20-21 in Park Hill Church, North Little Rock. Eighty-five directors and teachers from 28 churches registered for the workshop.

IV. Church Architecture Consultation

Through personal visits and correspondence, 35 churches were referred to the Church Architecture Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

V. Bus Outreach Ministry

Many churches in our state are reaching people for Christ through a Bus outreach ministry. A Bus Outreach Clinic was held April 10, 1973 in the Baptist Building. One hundred people from 55 churches registered for the clinic.

Looking Ahead to 1973-74

The major denominational emphasis for 1973-74 has been assigned to the Sunday School department under the theme "Share the Word Now." The supportive programs for this emphasis will be "People-to-People NOW," Sunday School department; "Extend NOW," Missions department; and "Witness NOW," Evangelism department.

The following projects will support "People-to-People NOW."

- A bold new "People Search," — July, 1973 or Spring, 1974
- A bold new high attendance plan, called "Great Day In the Morning" — October 7, 1973 plus 3 other high attendance days the first Sunday of each quarter.
- A bold new "Literature Distribution Plan", either by the individual or family plan prior to each of the four high attendance Sundays each quarter.
- A bold new "Associational Launch Night" — September, 1973
- A bold new "Sunday School People-to-People Commitment Week" — September, 1973, teaching a new book, *Using the Sunday School to Reach People*.
- A bold new January Bible Study Week emphasis — January, 1974 — Colossians
- A bold new associational Pastor-Led Growth Campaign — Fall, 1973 or Spring, 1974
- A bold new "New Member Drive" — 1 for 1 growth for 6 or 8 weeks — Spring and/or Fall.
- A bold new "Attendance Campaign" — 12 out of 13 Sundays — Spring or Fall.
- A bold new Bus Outreach Ministry promotion for evangelism — Clinic March '73 and '74.
- A bold new Bible Reading Project — "Read the Bible Through" — October '73 — September '74, or "Read It Through in 1974." 70,000 Arkansas Baptist Convention readers. Local church bulletins carry "where you ought to be" weekly.

This program was printed in more detail in nine issues of the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine during August and September, 1973. Over 1,300 new reader families were added to the Newsmagazine subscription in the People-to-People NOW promotion plan.

Another state-wide project being promoted by all departments of Baptist Building is the scripture distribution plan. A special Arkansas issue of the JESUS book has been produced by the American Bible Society. This is a synopsis of the life of Jesus through selected passages from the Gospels. The 107 page book is the text of *Good News for Modern Man — The New Testament in Today's English Version*. The special order number for this 10¢ book is 06833. If a church was led by its leaders and the Lord to do even some of these basic projects, many people will be brought to Jesus and the churches in 1973-74.

This program has grown out of and relates to the basic objectives and purposes of the Sunday School department.

The objective of the Sunday School is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose . . . "to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer cooperation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God."

The Sunday School Department seeks to accomplish its objective by helping the churches establish, conduct, enlarge and improve their program of Bible teaching. The Bible teaching program includes two major areas: Sunday School and extension activities.

Sunday School, the basic approach of the Bible teaching program, consists of age-graded Bible classes meeting regularly on Sunday morning, or, in some mission situations, on Sunday afternoon.

Additional facets of the Bible teaching program which are provided for organizationally by the Sunday School are called extension activities. The following extension activities may be included in a church's program of Bible teaching: Vacation Bible School, Weekday Bible Study, Bible Conferences, Fellowship Bible Classes, Bible Study Course, New Sunday Schools, Family Bible Study, and Correspondence Bible Study.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Nancy Cooper, Executive Secretary and Treasurer

In the year 1972-73 when the denominational theme was "Living the Spirit of Christ in Faith and Conquest," Woman's Missionary Union chose as watchword for the year a Bible verse which could have been written to fit the denominational theme. The verse is: "Ask of me (faith) and I will make the nations your heritage, and the ends of the earth your possession (conquest)." (Psalm 2:8 RSV)

From this watchword came the theme for the weeks of prayer for foreign and home missions and the season of prayer for state missions. "Ask of Me . . ." And the spirit of it was experienced through development of the two WMU emphases: witnessing through mission action, and WMU enlistment and enlargement. Each contributed toward development of the objectives which evolved from the denominational theme.

GIANT STEP is a two year campaign initiated this year in an effort to increase the number of churches having missionary organizations . . . to increase number of organizations in churches . . . to increase number of members enlisted . . . and to increase use of WMU magazines.

State goals adopted are ambitious! They call for 25% increase in these four areas. Mrs. Roy E. Snider of Camden was appointed to serve as state director of the two year GIANT STEP thrust. As such she chairs the state GIANT STEP committee composed of the eight district representatives on the state WMU executive board. Plans call for involvement of all associational WMU directors who in turn work with corresponding local church leaders.

Advances are noted! WMU organizations are reported in 645 churches. There is at least one of each of the five WMU organizations in 59 churches. Of the 2,176 organizations reported, 669 are Baptist Women, 86 Baptist Young Women, 423 Acteens, 605 Girls in Action, and 393 Mission Friends.

Forty eight churches merited recognition for attainment on WMU Achievement Guide (14 Merit, 13 Advanced, 21 Distinguished). In addition, hundreds of age-level units attained. A total of twelve associations met requirements for recognition as follows: One Merit, Ouachita: one Advanced, Benton County; ten Distinguished, Arkansas Valley, Ashley, Clear Creek, Independence, Liberty, Mississippi County, Mt. Zion, No. Pulaski, Washington-Madison, White River.

Training for church leaders was offered on state level in a one day conference held at Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, where attendance exceeded 600. In addition, associational WMU and age-level directors engaged in an over-night conference at Paron. Scores of training sessions were conducted by staff members in associations and churches. Chartered bus was provided for 40 of the 69 Arkansans who attended WMU Conference, Glorieta. The other WMU, SBC Conference at Ridgecrest was attended by 28 from the state.

An all day and an evening meeting were held in each of the eight districts. In addition to the missionary speaker, Glendon Grober of Brazil, denominational and organizational emphases were featured. Attendance totaled 1,342.

Other state promoted activities included: Annual WMU Meeting, Baring Cross Church, No. Little Rock; Junior High Acteen Celebration, Pulaski Heights Church, Little Rock; Three Girls in Action Camps, Paron; one Acteens Camp, Paron.

Promotion materials for the weeks of prayer for foreign missions and the season of prayer for state missions, and attendant offerings, were distributed through the State WMU Office. Gifts received by the treasurer of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and designated for these three areas of mission work totaled \$839,279 and were divided as follows:

With a staff of three age-level directors and two office secretaries, Arkansas WMU is equipped to render her best service to associations and churches through leader development and program interpretation.

ANNUITY BOARD

T. K. Rucker, Field Representative

Retirement plans and retirement benefits were improved during the past year, according to Darold H. Morgan of Dallas, president of the Southern Baptist Convention Annuity Board.

For annuitants on the roll December 31, 1972, income from retirement benefits has been increased permanently by 6 per cent. The more than 7,000 retirees, widows, or disabled persons generally receive their benefits monthly.

These annuitants have served Christ and Southern Baptists as pastors, as some other paid staff person in a church, or as an employee of a state or national denominational agency. They also include the widows of those who served.

In addition, shortly before Christmas, 1972, annuitants received "13th checks" which amounted to two extra months' benefits, Morgan said.

About 20,000 participants in Plan A, the basic state convention retirement program for ministers, received two boosts as of January 1, 1973, in the funds they are accumulating for their retirement. First, in late 1972, they received an increase of 10 per cent in their accrued retirement credits. A few months later they received another 8 per cent increase. These increases were made possible because of good experience on investment earnings. "Never before has the Board provided two such increases so close in time to each other," Morgan pointed out.

Further, the Board approved, and state conventions endorsed, an increase in widow benefits under Plan A to 50 per cent of potential or actual retirement benefit; it had been 40 per cent. At the same time, a temporary income benefit under Plan A was established for a widow, child, or dependent parent of members who die before early or normal retirement, or after disability retirement and who meet required participation.

The Board also administers life, health, and disability insurance plans for persons serving churches and agencies but does not underwrite the insurance itself.

More than 9,000 insurance policyholders transferred from the previous Health Benefit Plan (hospitalization) with Blue Cross-Blue Shield to the new plan launched January 1, 1973 with Aetna Life Insurance Co.

The Board, based in Dallas, reported several records for the 12 months ended June 30, 1973. Funds held in trust for about 38,000 participants total \$336,791,874; benefits paid surpassed \$10 million and investment income reached a new high of \$22 million.

There are 21,477 churches and associations with 24,075 employees currently participating in the Southern Baptist Protection Program. Arkansas has 571 churches and associations, with 691 employees participating. The following state Baptist agencies participate in the retirement program:

ARKANSAS

1973 has been a very good year. Nothing sensational, but good solid gains all along the line. We have processed 50 applications in our basic Protection Plan A. We have worked with many others who for personal reasons or church problems have delayed to follow through. Last week I signed up a man I have worked with four years. Yesterday I enlisted a man with whom I have worked ten years. Much of our work is education and cultivation and waiting until the right circumstances arise before consummating the enlistment.

We signed up 10 in Plan B, 6 in Plan C. We have delivered life insurance checks to four widows whose husbands carried life insurance for their protection. Our Health Insurance program has become stabilized and is functioning smoothly. We are now in a new thrust to enlist new members during the fall, winter and spring. Our primary objective for the next year will be to enlist more in the Health Insurance, Life Insurance, and Long Term Disability protection programs.

It has been most gratifying the response of the Associations in increasing their contributions beyond the basic Plan A protection for their Superintendents of Missions. We are getting much more interest and action in the churches in putting the total staff in our programs. There is much interest also in putting up more money in Plan B or C to give adequate protection. We are having many meetings with deacons, budget committees, finance committees, and others helping them in this area.

There have been two men to retire thus far this year. Four have chosen to take early retirement for various reasons.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT

Jim E. Tillman, Director

This is the second report to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention of the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign. The first progress report appears in the 1972 Convention Annual. A complete historical description of the Campaign from its inception is in the 1972 report.

This 1973 report will include a resume' of the Campaign, the progress of Phase 2, and a general statement regarding special gifts and pledges received during the Campaign period.

The Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign is a Capital Funds Campaign authorized by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention to raise four million dollars for Ouachita Baptist University at Arkadelphia, and Southern Baptist College at Walnut Ridge through the churches of Arkansas. A progress report of this Campaign as of September 20, 1973 by category follows:

It should be noted that the promotional time designated for the completion of the Campaign has not been reached; therefore this is to be considered a progress report. The last months of 1973 will be a critical period in the final success of this effort.

CAMPAIGN RESUME'

The Arkansas Baptist State Convention voted unanimously in November 1970 to conduct the largest fund raising campaign in the history of the Convention in 1971 through 1973. In a meeting early in 1971, the Campaign Steering Committee, which included representatives from both institutions, recommended a goal of four million dollars for Christian Higher Education, with 75% of the undesignated receipts allocated to Ouachita Baptist University and 25% to Southern Baptist College. This plan was recommended by the Executive Committee of the State Convention and adopted by the Convention in session at Little Rock on Wednesday, November 17, 1971.

Pledges of 20% of the undesignated 1970 receipts are being asked of the churches with \$50,000 or more income for that year; this pledge to be paid over a three to five year. These churches are designated as the Advance Division. Churches with less than \$50,000 income have been given a suggested goal of 13 1/3% of their undesignated 1970 income to be paid over a three to five year period. These churches are the General Division. As these churches of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention accept these suggested goals, a total of \$3,978,339.00 will be contributed.

The solicitation responsibility of the Advance Division Churches has been given to twenty Co-Chairmen selected by the Campaign Steering Committee. For purposes of coordination, leadership, and communication, the General Division Churches are assigned to regions in keeping with the eight existing Arkansas Baptist Convention Districts. The Regional Chairmen are: Region I, Dr. Bill G. Bruster; Region II, Mr. Paul Henry; Region III, Judge Edward Maddox; Region IV, Mr. Roy Gean, Jr., Chairman and Mr. Jeral Hampton, Vice Chairman; Region V, Reverend W. PROGRESS OF PHASE 2

At the close of the first thrust of the Advancement Campaign, the Director, Mr. Alvin “Bo” Huffman, under the leadership of God, accepted a similar responsibility with the Radio and Television Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention whose offices are located in Fort Worth, Texas. “Bo” Huffman will always be remembered by Arkansas Baptists as the personality used of God to lead in this victorious venture of faith for Christian Higher Educations.

Depending on the same Divine Leadership, the Director of Phase 2 of the Advancement Campaign, Jim E. Tillman, was called from the pastorate of

the First Baptist Church of Walnut Ridge. This Phase began in October 1972.

Phase 2 has concentrated on the General Division. This has called for the "extra mile" of service of the Associational Chairmen and Coordinators. "Phase 2 Dinners" have been conducted in most of the 44 Associations. The non-participating churches were represented at these dinners by the pastor and deacons. The agenda included the meal, an up-date on the Campaign, and a slide presentation of Phase 2. A representative from one of the Institutions shared relevant remarks regarding the Campaign and Christian Higher Education. Dr. Daniel Grant, President of Ouachita, and Dr. D. Jack Nicholas, President of Southern, shared this responsibility most of the time. The dinner meetings closed with the Associational Leadership challenging the churches to become involved in this historic Campaign.

During this year of Phase 2, we have had seven churches in the Advance Division to enter the Campaign. The General Division has responded by 63 churches becoming involved in this phase. This brings the total of new participants during Phase 2 to 70. This new involvement represents a total of \$75,355.16 in new pledges and gifts. This Phase will continue in order to allow other churches to become involved.

The Steering Committee of the Campaign has given tireless support and leadership to this endeavor. The present committee members are: Dr. W. O. Vaught, Jr., Chairman; Dr. Rheubin L. Recognition of the churches participating in the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign was made at Associational Annual Meetings in 1973. Special recognition to Associations with 100% participation and Associations with 80% or above participation will be made at the 1973 Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST FAMILY AND CHILD CARE SERVICES

Johnny G. Biggs, Executive Director

For a young person to face the future without undue anxiety and fear, someone has to be concerned about him and take responsibility for meeting his needs. To give a young person purpose and direction for living and a Christian foundation on which to build his life is to give him something far greater than wealth and material benefits. Arkansas Baptists have been making this kind of investment in the lives of children for over seventy-five years.

Within recent years, our child care ministry has expanded to offer services to families as well as children. Our goal is to reunite, in a healthy way, families that have been broken. While we offer help to a child in one of our residential programs, we also work with his parents to help them unravel their own problems and find workable solutions. Our staff works diligently to help these young people gain a healthy acceptance of the realities of their life situation and to develop emotional and spiritual strengths to make a satisfactory life adjustment.

Arkansas Baptist Home for Children. During the past year, we provided care for 92 children at the Arkansas Baptist Home for Children. The children who live at the Children's Home come with problems more complex than in past years. In addition to nourishment and nurturing, these children need consistent, planned guidance in dealing with their problems. A qualified social worker counsels or supervises the counseling of each young person. Our new Director of Social Work Services is Mr. Mike Nomura, who is a graduate of

Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and Kent School of Social Work. Many young people get a second chance in life at the Arkansas Baptist Home for Children. The Home is still the center of our child care ministry. Fourteen of the young people from the Home have accepted Christ as their Savior during this past year.

Our staff and children were saddened this year by the loss of Mrs. Vivian Peacock, our dedicated Child Care Worker who directed our sponsorship program.

Graduates. Four of our young people living at the Children's Home graduated from high school this year. These four young people collectively spent thirty-five years at the Arkansas Baptist Home for Children. Each young person has been helped to secure a job or training.

Area Offices. An increase in referrals and activities has characterized the work of our area offices during this past year. Five-hundred and twelve (512) new referrals were processed through these area offices, representing a variety of problems. On an average, each referral represents services to three people. In addition to conducting intakes for the Children's Home, foster homes, and Group Home for Boys, our area workers provide counseling services to families and children as well as being involved in community and church projects related to the needs of children.

June 4, 1973, marked the opening of our Fayetteville area office to expand services to northwest Arkansas. Washington-Madison Baptist Association has provided us office space in their new associational office building. Mr. Gary Gray, former social worker at the Children's Home, is serving as director of this office.

Foster Homes-Group Home. We were privileged to join hands with Christian Baptist families in our state in providing foster care for twenty children during this year. These children needed the experience and warmth of a Christian family setting to meet their particular needs. Some needed only short-term care, while others continue to need this type of care under our supervision.

Eight boys received care and direction by living in our Group Home for Boys in Jonesboro. After being with the Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care agency for eight years, and living the last two years at our Group Home, one of our young men finished Jonesboro High School this year.

Child Care Representatives. We began this year to revive an old program by asking each association to appoint a Child Care Representative. During 1974, each associational representative will enlist a Child Care Representative from each church in the association. We look forward to a state-wide child care organization, made up of caring individuals, who will work with us in strengthening our total outreach ministry to families and children who need our help.

Our hearts are lifted in gratitude to Arkansas Baptists for their thoughtfulness in sharing throughout the year that makes our child care ministry possible. Gifts received through the Cooperative Program, sponsorship, Thanksgiving offering and other gifts from churches and individuals are deeply appreciated. Without your giving, our services would be greatly reduced in scope and effectiveness. It is our desire and commitment to be good stewards of your gifts as we channel them into appropriate services that exemplify the love and caring of Christ.

We continue to need your support and prayers as we give our best in this ministry, established and sustained by Christian people who believe that child care is a part of the total ministry of the Christian community.

The Arkansas Baptist Foundation assists individuals and families in continuing their Christian stewardship on a permanent basis through wills and trusts. It represents and serves all agencies and causes and ministries of both the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Foundation has been without an Executive Director since the resignation of Dr. Ed McDonald early in 1972. During this interim period the administrative affairs of the Foundation have been conducted by Dr. Charles Ashcraft and his assistant, Roy F. Lewis.

However, in December of 1972 the Board of Directors asked Mr. Lewis to assume a greater responsibility as Acting Executive Director, and he has continued to serve in that capacity since that time. This is on a part time basis for the Foundation and is in addition to his other duties, but it gives stability and continuity to the affairs of the Foundation while a permanent Executive Director is being sought. This arrangement has also relieved the Board of Directors of any possible pressure in making a hasty decision in the selection of an Executive Director.

Several candidates have been considered for the position of Executive Director, but no final decision has yet been made. At the time of this report negotiations are underway with one individual, and it is hoped that some public announcement can be made in the near future.

Prior to the last report the Foundation had been named as executor of the will of the late Earl E. Pippen of Harrison, Arkansas, and that estate is still in probate. The funds left in trust with the Foundation represent the largest single contribution ever received by the Foundation, and, when added to its assets, will almost double the total assets.

Several other new wills have also been prepared, which will ultimately result in sizable bequests and/or trusts for the Foundation. Other wills have been revised at the request of the testators, resulting in larger bequests for several Southern Baptist causes.

During the year a number of administrative changes and improvements were effected. All of the Foundation files were reviewed and sorted and updated to provide greater efficiency.

Professional assistance from two different sources was used in evaluating and improving the Foundation's accounting system. The Foundation continues to have these accounting services performed by the Accounting Department of the state convention, but, effective August 1, 1973, began reimbursing the convention for these services at the rate of \$50.00 per month.

The funds of the Foundation were separated from the convention's funds in order to more adequately comply with laws and accounting procedures necessary in the handling of trust funds.

The Foundation's Board of Directors reflect, through their individual professions, a high degree of expertise in matters related to Foundation work. Two of the directors are attorneys; one is a bank president, and two are bank vice presidents and trust officers; one is a C.P.A.; one is a businessman and city mayor; one is a pastor, and another is a minister of music.

Along with the skills and expertise inherent in the directors themselves, additional professional counsel is utilized by the Investments Committee. At least annually the portfolio of investments is submitted to a national investment counseling firm for review and evaluation.

Promotional efforts by the Foundation have of necessity been somewhat more limited than normal. Yet, even with this limitation, a number of effective promotional aids were utilized during the year.

A quality brochure describing the purpose and services of the Foundation was published and distributed. A worksheet was prepared for individuals to use in preparation for a will. Copies of a film promoting Foundation work were purchased and made available to the churches. Biweekly columns appeared regularly in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine projecting the work and services of the Foundation.

Improvements were made in the investments portfolio of the Foundation, and its investments continue to reflect very worthy, and yet very stable, earnings. Additional plans are being made to further improve the investment record of the Foundation.

Arkansas Baptists and other Christian friends have demonstrated a growing willingness to utilize the services and ministries of the Foundation to strengthen the cause of Christ. With adequate leadership, which will be provided by the new Executive Director, the future of the Foundation in Arkansas is virtually unlimited.

The Board of Directors recommend that undesignated receipts of the Foundation be utilized in the operations of the Foundation.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST HISTORY COMMISSION

I. ORGANIZATION

The History Commission was set up by a resolution in the 1960 annual session of the Convention. It is composed of nine (9) members — one (1) from each of eight (8) districts and one (1) member-at-large as chairman. Each member is elected to a three (3) year term; one third rotate off each year. The Executive Secretary does not rotate.

II. FUNCTIONS

The commission is the agency of the Convention in the field of history. It is engaged in locating, collecting, and preserving on positive microfilm documents of Baptist churches, associations, and state and national bodies. Its greatest achievement has been in collecting files of associational minutes of each of eleven (11) separate national Baptist denominations which have affiliate churches in Arkansas.

III. HOLDINGS

The old Historical Society, superseded by the Commission, left forty (40) reels of positive microfilm of associational minutes. The Convention now holds two hundred forty-one (241) reels of associational minutes alone and several reels of other documents of Baptist history.

The Commission in cooperation with Riley Library, OBU, has continued to have forty (40) or fifty (50) volumes bound of Baptist documents, including minutes and print-outs of Baptist associations and local churches. The Commission urges these organizations to continue regular participation in this project.

The Commission holds over two hundred (200) reels of positive microfilm of association and local church minutes. Unless much of the material is preserved on microfilm, it will be lost to posterity for it is held individually. All are urged to cooperate fully in this project.

BAPTIST MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Memphis, Tennessee

On July 20, 1972, Baptist Memorial Hospital celebrated its 60th anniversary. The hospital has grown from a 150-bed facility to a medical complex of 1,623 beds as of December 1972. The year 1972 saw a number of improvements in medical services. Included among these were:

A newly enlarged and equipped Cardiac Laboratory. One of the primary procedures performed in this area is a cardiac catheterization. This is a diagnostic procedure in which a catheter is introduced into the vein and advanced into the heart while being carefully observed through the use of X-ray. This procedure permits the physician to detect abnormalities of the heart and blood flow through it.

A Pulmonary Rehabilitation Clinic was established as a new service of the Pulmonary Physiology Laboratory. This clinic provides rehabilitation, treatment, and instruction to patients with chronic lung disease.

A new and improved Gamma camera was acquired by the Radioisotope Laboratory. This instrument is used primarily for the detection of tumors. This is the third such camera to be acquired by this department and cost approximately \$100,000.

A 5-bed Neurosurgical Sub-Intensive Care Unit was opened on the neurosurgical patient floor. The development of this unit promotes a more refined level of nursing care for neurosurgical patients and enables the general Intensive Care Unit to be utilized more efficiently.

Three new patient floors which were in shelled construction form were completed and opened, providing for an increased capacity of 156 beds.

The hospital's Respiratory Therapy Department was remodeled and expanded to provide for the increased demands on this service.

A program to completely renovate and modernize the Madison East patient floors was begun. This section of the hospital was opened for service in 1955.

Other hospital construction not directly related to patient care included the following:

Completion of a 695-car, 4-level parking garage designed for use by employees and visiting ministers.

Installation of three new high-speed service elevators.

Refinishing and weatherproofing of the exterior of the Madison West complex. Units in this complex were opened between 1912 and 1938.

In addition to these completed projects, plans were announced for the construction of a 5-level, 1,087-car public parking garage, a 10-story office building, and a 360-seat auditorium and seminar center.

In addition to being an outstanding medical facility, Baptist Memorial Hospital is fortunate to have an exceptional hospital and medical staff.

Serving as president of the medical staff during 1972 was Dr. Russell Patterson, general surgeon, and serving as chief of staff was Dr. H. K. Turley, urologist.

Miss Charlene McGee, senior student nurse, was elected "Lady of the Links" by the School of Nursing student body. This award is presented each year to the student who is felt to most closely personify the Christian ideals which the School of Nursing attempts to foster.

Mr. Lamon Bethune, personnel director, was elected president of the Tennessee Society of Hospital Personnel Directors.

The hospital's 4,142 employees made a record contribution to the United Way fund drive.

At the annual employee recognition service, 180 employees were honored for employment anniversaries of 10, 15, 20, 25, and 30 years of service to the hospital.

The many friends of Dr. John E. Whiteleather, director of the hospital's Radiology Department since 1936, were saddened by his death on December 23, 1971.

A record number of students graduated from the hospital's 12 medical education programs. Among these were 55 student nurses, 40 of which elected to work at Baptist Memorial Hospital after graduation. The School of Nursing commencement speaker was Dr. Harold Fisher, president of Blue Mountain College in Mississippi.

The hospital was surveyed by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals and received full accreditation. The hospital was commended "for maintaining standards deserving of accreditation and for your effort to improve the quality of patient care." The hospital is surveyed every two years by this national non-profit organization.

The most recent survey (1971) by the American Hospital Association indicated that Baptist Memorial Hospital continues to maintain the lowest cost per patient day of all non-tax-supported hospitals in the United States of 1,000 or more beds.

Dr. Paul D. Simmons, Assistant Professor of Christian Ethics at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, was the guest speaker during Religious Emphasis Week. His messages were heard by personnel, students, and medical staff and were televised to all patient rooms by the hospital's closed circuit television system.

As an indication of the extent of the ministry of Baptist Memorial Hospital, the following statistics for 1972 are presented:

OUACHITA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Arkadelphia, Arkansas

The year 1972-73 at Ouachita Baptist University was one of which Arkansas Baptists have a right to be proud. It is not always possible to see the results of hard work and sacrificial support by churches in a particular cause, but the year brought visible results of Arkansas Baptists' commitment to the cause of Christian higher education. The gifts and pledges of hundreds of churches through the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign, in combination with special contributions from devoted friends, made possible the construction of two beautiful new buildings for use in the fall of 1973. It is always risky to try to name those who are responsible in special ways for this progress in 1972-73, but Executive Secretary Charles Ashcraft, Convention President Rheubin South, Campaign Chairman W. O. Vaught, Jr., Campaign Director Jim E. Tillman, and OBU Vice President for Development Ben Elrod, all have provided indispensable inspired leadership.

One very visible result is the beautiful Evans Student Center which gives Ouachita students an attractive and spacious headquarters for campus social

and religious life, with bowling lanes and other game rooms, a snack room, banquet room, post office, book store, formal and informal lounge rooms, BSU and Student Senate offices, conference rooms, a reception room, guest suites, a prayer chapel, and an "overlook" on the banks of the Ouachita River. It also provides better accommodations for churches and other off-campus groups (music camps, conferences, workshops, etc.) A new campus drive was begun and it will eventually carry traffic along the edge of the central campus, following the riverfront and ravine. The second unit in the proposed five-building "megastructure" is Lile Hall, a classroom building housing primarily the business, economics, accounting, and office administration departments. This has made possible the tearing down of Lakeside, a barracks-type structure at the edge of the ravine.

Progress in Phase Two of the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign, under the able leadership of Jim E. Tillman, and faith in its successful conclusion, caused the Ouachita Board of Trustees to give the go-ahead in the summer of 1973 for construction of a new fine arts center. This four-story building, the third unit in the megastructure, will house the School of Music and the Art Department, and is being constructed adjoining the north wing of the new student center. It should be ready for use by the beginning of the fall semester, 1974.

The tremendous Arkansas Baptist support for the Campaign has had other good effects in addition to the brick-and-mortar benefits. The largest number of students in seven years (1633) enrolled in Ouachita in the fall of 1973. This eight percent increase over the 1972 enrollment is all the more encouraging in the light of enrollment decreases in many of the state colleges and universities in Arkansas. If the nursing school enrollment (dropped in 1967) is excluded, the Freshman Class size (507) and the total enrollment are the largest in Ouachita's history. Non-duplicating enrollment during the 12-month period in 1972-73 — all graduate, undergraduate, and special students — was 1860. All dormitory rooms are filled and part of Blake Hall has been remodeled and is being used for men's housing for the first time in many years.

It is always more difficult to measure spiritual and academic progress than building or enrollment progress. However, Ouachita Baptist University, through its Board of Trustees, administration, faculty, and student leadership, continues its strong commitment to academic excellence and Christian excellence. The goal is a healthy balance between requirements, rules, and regulations, on the one hand, and freedom for students to mature, learn responsibility, develop initiative and creativity, and make occasional mistakes. During 1972-73 the long-standing Christian distinctives at Ouachita were continued: required Bible courses for all students, required chapel attendance, Christian Focus Week given preference over all other classroom and campus activities, daily noonday prayer services — best attended in many years, and strong emphasis on special opportunities for Christian witness and service by students and faculty, on and off the campus. The Ralph Smith Lectures were given by Dr. Ray Summers, Dean of the Graduate School and Chairman of the Department of Religion at Baylor University, with a discussion of 1st and 2nd Peter. A new series of religious lectures, endowed as a memorial to Mr. J. E. Berry, were inaugurated by Dr. John Newport, Professor of Christian Philosophy at Southwestern Seminary, on the theme of "Christianity, Demons, and the Occult." The Arkadelphia-area Jack Hazelwood Crusade was held on the Ouachita campus in Walton Gymnasium in the spring. Dr. and Mrs. Glenn Hickey, from Brazil, were Southern Baptist missionaries-in-residence at Ouachita in the fall of 1972, Dr. and Mrs. Clarence Allison during the summer of 1973, and Rev. and Mrs. Charles M. Hobson during 1973-74.

A total of 239 students are preparing for church-related vocations, including 123 ministerial students, 34 in church work, 24 in religious education, 18 mission volunteers, and 16 in youth work or church recreation. More than 19 student revival teams served the various churches of Arkansas during the year, including two "Contact Teams" full time during the summer of 1973. A highly successful project in the spring of 1973 was a one-day workshop for Ouachita students interested in being summer youth workers in churches. A program directed by Bill Elliff, a student at Ouachita, aimed at coordinating the efforts of students to find places for work in churches, and the efforts of churches to find qualified and dedicated students for staff positions, has proved to be very helpful. Ouachita was in the top ten colleges in the nation in number of students engaged in summer mission work in 1973. Youth Choir Day was attended by more than 2,000 persons from 99 churches, and contributed to an inspiring mass choir performance with the Ouachita Band at half time during the Tigers' opening football game.

Ouachita strengthened its academic program in 1972-73. Eleven faculty members did advanced graduate work for one or more semesters, and three new faculty members with the doctor's degree were added, bringing the total having the doctorate to 35 percent of the faculty. The first major reorganization of the required general education courses will give students a wider range of choices beginning in 1973-74. A gift of the Ross Foundation to Ouachita and its Arkadelphia neighbor, Henderson State College, made possible the establishment of a distinguished lecture series that brought national personalities to the campus, such as John Hart, CBS television news anchor man, and syndicated columnist Carl Rowan. Degrees were given to 275 students last year — 245 bachelor's degrees and 30 master's degrees. Ouachita students continue to do outstanding work in graduate school, seminary, summer missions, the US-2 Program, and the Missionary Journeyman Program, and are a credit to Arkansas Baptists.

Ouachita's budget for 1972-73 was \$3,424,000, and is \$3,840,936 for the year 1973-74. Although tuition and fees are still the largest single source of funds for this budget (more than 40 percent of the total), the annual tuition charge would have to be \$420 greater for each student if it were not for the strong financial support from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. This appropriation in the 1973 Convention budget included \$460,593 in the Operating Budget and \$175,519 in the Advance Budget. Ouachita's tuition and fees, and its endowment income, continue to be among the lowest of the four-year Baptist colleges in the Southern Baptist Convention area, so the generous support of Arkansas Baptists through the Cooperative Program becomes doubly important. Furthermore, the growing enrollment will require additional faculty members, faculty salaries are still significantly lower than at the state colleges, and the new air-conditioned buildings have added to the annual budget requirements for maintenance and staff. Inflation costs during 1973 have added an estimated \$48,000 in unbudgeted operating costs and more than \$200,000 in unanticipated construction costs. Alumni and other friends of Ouachita are helping to close this gap in finances.

The ultimate measure of the Christian stewardship of Ouachita Baptist University and of the Arkansas Baptists who support Christian higher education, is the influence on the lives of the young people who attend. They join in expressing gratitude for those who make possible a Christian university like Ouachita.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST COLLEGE

Southern Baptist College enjoyed one of her best years during the 1972-73 academic year. The student-faculty relationship was probably the very finest in the history of the college. The non-duplicated enrollment of Southern Baptist College during the 1972-73 year was 931. This included 385 on the Walnut Ridge campus, 388 at the Resident Center at Blytheville Air Force Base, 143 in extension classes at Senath, Mo., and 15 in extension classes at Little Rock Air Force Base. It does not include 180 students in a cooperative program with Parsons College at Blytheville AFB.

The college experienced a substantial growth in academic honor students during the year, and it is the feeling of the administration that more and more students with high achievement records as well as strong commitment to the basic philosophy of the college are being attracted to Southern.

The year was also marked by substantial contribution on the part of the students to the religious welfare and activities of the region. Many revival teams were out month by month providing programs and conducting revival services at hundreds of churches over the area.

The Student Government Association, under the capable leadership of the first woman president, Miss Paula Cooper, of Cherokee Village, Arkansas, made the most outstanding advancement in the history of the college in developing student-oriented and student-sponsored programs calculated to improve student moral and assist the college administration in the educational process.

The building program of Southern, through funds provided by the Ouachita-Southern Advancement Campaign, resulted in several improvements on the campus. The Fine Arts building has continually progressed and will be ready for occupancy sometime in 1974. The gymnasium floor has been renovated with a new modern rubber suspension hardwood maple playing court valued at more than \$12,000, and other improvements have also been carried out in the gymnasium. A \$30,000 addition was made to the cafeteria, providing a new serving line area, two dining rooms, offices and other refinements including modernization of the air-conditioning system. Improvements in the dormitory for men will make it one of the finest dormitories in this section of the country for two-year colleges. A large number of the rooms have been refurbished and furnished with Holiday Inn furnishings.

The local Lawrence County OBU-SBC Campaign produced very gratifying results with pledges in excess of \$113,000.00 The college is indeed grateful for this impressive demonstration of local support and good will.

The 1972-73 year witnessed the retirement from the Presidency of Dr. H. E. Williams, who founded the college and served as its President for thirty-two years. Dr. Williams, who was named President-Emeritus and Special Representative for Development, will work primarily in the area of development, seeking to secure wills and larger gifts for the institution. His successor was named in May of 1973 in the person of Dr. D. Jack Nicholas. Dr. Nicholas is a graduate of Southern, Arkansas State University, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, and North Texas State

University. Dr. Nicholas has been on the staff of Southern Baptist College for seven years, coming to the institution from California Baptist College. He served three years as Executive Vice-President of the college and has been Chairman of the Psychology Department of Southern the other four years.

Dr. Jerol Swaim, a graduate of Union University and Memphis State University, succeeded Dr. Woodrow Behannon as the Academic Dean of Southern on July 1, 1973. Dr. Swaim has been a member of the faculty of SBC, teaching in the field of Social Science, for nine years. Dr. Behannon was named Coordinator of Federal Service Programs and Assistant Director of the Upward Bound Program.

In August the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools announced, following the periodic examination of the college, that the accreditation of Southern Baptist College has been continued. The report of the North Central Evaluation Team commented upon the faculty as follows: "The faculty of Southern Baptist College is academically well-prepared, dedicated to the welfare of the college, and deeply interested in helping students achieve their goals."

Total assets during the year ending July 30, 1972, rose to the high level figure of \$4,750,144.06, according to the auditors report. Despite the critical problems incidental to inflation and other related economic pressures, Southern showed a gain in net worth of \$122,573.25. Her operating budget has been pressed hard for the last three years. Southern Baptist College has felt through the years that it was giving Arkansas Baptists the very best possible stewardship in providing a fully accredited college program on the smallest income from the state convention provided any college in the Southern Baptist Convention family of institutions of higher education.

Southern Baptist College is indeed grateful for the continuing support from Arkansas Baptists through the Cooperative Program and OBU-SBC Campaign. The college proposes to express appreciation to Arkansas Baptists by reaffirming its commitment to remain "The Campus of Christian Purpose."

These new specially tailored buying guides represent our new approach to cataloging. Our purpose is to pinpoint areas of need with precise product and service suggestions. Keep these valuable tools accessible at all times and give us the opportunity to be more effective PARTNERS IN GROWTH.

Since October, 1971, the Book Store Division has been under the direction and leadership of Dr. W. O. Thomason. Through his concepts and ideas and, also, those of other dedicated leaders, we feel the Baptist Book Store has unlimited resources to help people witness for Christ and to grow toward spiritual maturity.

CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS, INC.

Beginning with the fall school semester last year, our Educational Assistant, Mr. Paul Ramsey, carried the FOUNDATION'S ALCOHOL-NARCOTICS EDUCATION PROGRAM to a total of eighty-five schools, reaching approximately 45,000 students. This year, with the current school session less than a month old, 94 schools are already confirmed, which is 59% of those contacted, and we are receiving more confirmations each day. Of these, 67% are in the classroom.

Mr. Ramsey presented the program to 21 camp groups this summer, more than doubling the number of camps reached in the past. He spent one day in each camp, with the exception of Siloam Assembly, where he, his wife, and daughter spent the whole week during the second period.

In addition to the school and camp work, during the last twelve months, Mr. Ramsey has presented a program on alcohol and drug abuse to 17 church groups and 13 civic clubs and other organizations. He also attended a drug abuse workshop at Southern Methodist University at Dallas in March.

In our last report, several counties were mentioned as facing possible LOCAL OPTION ELECTIONS. General Election day passed with only two of these counties having the legal liquor question on the ballot. They were Baxter and Stone Counties, both of which remained "dry" by the vote of their citizens. Thus, 44 Arkansas Counties remain dry.

One of the important functions of the Foundation during the past year was the work with the 1973 ARKANSAS GENERAL ASSEMBLY. The Executive Director, Rev. Edward W. Harris, attended all eighty-nine days of the 69th General Assembly, and spent more than forty hours in Committee meetings. He was aided on two occasions by Rev. Roy H. Galyean, as Legislative Assistant.

Our chief concern was with legislation aimed at lowering the Majority Age from 21 years to 18, and granting all rights and privileges, including those relating to Alcoholic Beverages. Six bills relating to this matter were introduced. We appreciate deeply the contacts made by our Baptist friends with the Legislators on these Majority Bills. Although we succeeded in blocking this legislation, we can expect this same issue to be presented again when the Legislature reconvenes in January, or in the next regular session in 1975.

HB 568, known as the "Wine Bill", which would have enabled grocery stores to obtain wine permits without possessing a beer or liquor permit, was rushed through the House. Pressure from our people upon the Legislators accounts in large measure for success in blocking the powerful forces promoting this bill, by keeping it in a Senate Committee. We will certainly face this issue again next session.

Other legislation which we watched closely or with which we were actively involved were: Senate Bill 9 (Act 189) which stiffened the requirements for beer and liquor permits granted by the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, and will be helpful to all Christian people who want to oppose objectionable applications for permits; Senate Bill 220 (Act 186) amended the Controlled Substance Act 590 of 1971 (Drug Abuse Bill), making it stronger and more effective; House Bill 47, which sought to repeal the State Sunday Closing Law, was killed in the Committee, however, Christians will have to fight continually on this issue; HB 447 (Act 387) which gave local city councils power to extend closing hours for hotels and restaurants with liquor and beer permits, and extended Saturday night closing to 2:00 a.m. Sunday. This bill virtually canceled the ABC Board's control over closing hours and, by making these exceptions in Pulaski, Garland, and Carroll Counties, can result in some units remaining open all night.

Both the name and position of the Christian Civic Foundation are known and clearly recognized in the State Capitol, and this is a source of real strength and authority in our dealings at all levels of state government.

We are deeply grateful to all Baptist pastors and churches who, under the leadership of the State Convention, have engaged in a program of study and action in challenging OBSCENITY in movies, television, magazines, and other literature. A favorable ruling by the United States Supreme Court on June 21, 1973, in the case of Miller vs. California, gave communities across the nation new hope in the critical battle against obscenity in all forms. Actions by Prosecutors and Law Enforcement Officers in several cities, especially in Little Rock and Fort Smith, are commendable. These attempts to deal with hard core pornography have led many of our elected officials to question the adequacy of the present Arkansas Statutes. A state Legislative Session may become necessary to enact a new statute. Although public officials are reluctant to call the Assembly into session, the urgency of this battle against Obscenity may force such action.

The EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR preached, on invitation, a total of forty times in local Baptist and Methodist Churches, spoke at two Local Option Election Rallies, spoke to the W. C. T. U. Convention, the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, attended public hearings before the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board on several occasions, attended three days of public hearings conducted by an Ad Hoc Committee of the Legislature covering Drug Abuse and the revision of Act 590, the Controlled Substances Act, attended the Tane-Baylor University Workshop on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, and attended a nine-week class on "Drug Abuse" at UALR.

In the month of November, 1972, we moved our offices from the Waldon Building to the new location at 1007 Donaghey Building. The result was a more modern office situation at a reduced monthly cost in rent.

Other changes in our program included the date of the ANNUAL MEETING changed from the third Monday in January to the third Monday in March, which fell on March 19, 1973. We were graciously entertained by Second Baptist Church in Little Rock. The 1974 date of the Annual Meeting will be March 18.

Much of the time and energy of the Executive Director was given during the closing months of 1972 to the FINANCIAL emergency which he found June of 1972, when he assumed leadership. We are deeply grateful to Baptist leaders, pastors, and laymen, and churches for the fine response in emergency aid given to keep us from closing our doors, and for the increased giving by the Convention for 1973. If local Baptist Churches can match the increase by the Convention, we may be able to put a firm financial foundation under our program. The fiscal year for the Foundation was changed to correspond with the calendar year, the practice followed by the Convention and most of the Baptist churches. If giving by local churches remains strong through the last four months of 1973, there is a possibility that we may be able to conclude the financial year without asking for additional emergency funds. This has been accomplished by rigid adherence to budget figures, which were the same as those of the previous year. Each day of inflation makes this more difficult and increased giving more essential. The financial picture for the period covered by this report, October 1, 1972 through September 30, 1973, is as follows:

The Baptist World Alliance is a fellowship of 27 million Baptist believers in all parts of the world. Individually and collectively they acknowledge the Lordship of Jesus Christ, and through the Alliance they work cooperatively toward fulfillment of the Great Commission (Matthew 28: 19-20).

Ninety five Baptist conventions and unions in 75 countries are linked together in this voluntary association: "to show the essential oneness of the

Baptist people in the Lord Jesus Christ, to impart inspiration to the brotherhood, and to promote the spirit of fellowship, service, and cooperation among its members.”

Eight programs of activity are being pursued in an effort to achieve these goals. The association is wholly voluntary, and the Alliance is pledged to “in no way interfere with the independence of the churches or assume the administrative functions of existing organizations.”

Dr. Robert S. Denny, a native of Kentucky, is General Secretary of the Alliance. Dr. V. Carney Hargroves of Philadelphia, a graduate of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, is President.

Members of the Alliance are working 1973-75 in a World Mission of Reconciliation Through Jesus Christ, an evangelistic emphasis aimed at reconciling man with God and with his fellow man. The Mission has been many years in the planning, and is stirring spiritual revival in various areas. It is the largest and most widespread evangelistic crusade ever attempted by Baptists.

The Alliance is a channel also for a vast program for relief and rehabilitation of suffering peoples in every part of the world. Member bodies are alerted to catastrophes and other points of need as soon as they occur, and assistance is channeled through the Alliance to Baptist missions in the area of need.

Meetings of the BWA Executive Committee and five study commissions annually bring together a total of about 300 representative leaders from 30 or more countries for regular periods of sharing and planning. In addition there are larger world conferences at regular intervals.

The 8th Baptist Youth World Conference will meet in Portland, Oregon, July 31-August 4, 1974, with an attendance of 10,000 young people from 60 countries expected. A World Conference of Baptist Men is planned for Hong Kong November 19-25, 1974. The 13th Baptist World Congress will meet in Stockholm, Sweden, July 8-13, 1975.

Missionary Support

The sending out and maintaining of missionaries is primary in Southern Baptist overseas missions through the channel of the Foreign Mission Board. At the close of 1972 the Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,507. This included 174 missionary associates, 2 special project medical personnel, and 128 missionary journeymen. Appointments during the year totaled 171 (83 career, 11 associates, 66 journeymen, 2 special project medical workers, and 9 career reappointments).

Southern Baptist Missions (organizations of missionaries) and national Baptist groups in dozens of countries continue to call for reinforcements in missionary personnel. Some requests are still not filled, even though they have been repeated for several years and are still urgent.

On January 1, 1973, Southern Baptist missionaries were under appointment to 76 geographical or political entities.* During 1972, missionaries took up residence in Barbados, where they will assist with church development there and in neighboring islands. A missionary associate couple went to Greece to work with an English-language congregation in Athens. At year's end, personnel assigned to Mozambique were still awaiting official government permission for residence and work in that country.

(Work in Libya, Greece, and Turkey is with an English-language Baptist church in each country.)

Evangelism and Church Development

Underlying all our missionary endeavors is the ultimate purpose of leading people to new life in Jesus Christ and the cultivation of New Testament churches. Organized churches with which Southern Baptist missionaries are related on mission fields now total 6,554, of which more than 75 percent are self-supporting. Work and accomplishments reported are largely those of national churches, leaders, and conventions, with the assistance of missionary co-workers and resources from Southern Baptists.

The program of evangelism and church development includes many types of ministry: radio and television, English-language churches, lay-leadership training, stewardship promotion, camps and conferences; work with women, men, and youth; music, and religious education.

In several countries, increased emphasis is being placed upon the transfer of responsibility from missionaries to capable national leaders. Local conventions are sending their own missionaries and starting new outreach ministries. The Colombian Convention established a mission board in 1972, and Brazilian Baptist leaders met to evaluate their home and foreign mission program. In Ghana, the first Baptist pastors to emerge from indigenous work there were ordained.

Radio-television ministries continued to expand during the year. A new communications center in Colombia held its first training course, with participants from several nations. Increased opportunity for radio ministry has come in Spain, as several local stations now welcome Baptist broadcasts.

Baptist encampment facilities around the world play an important role in evangelism and church development. Such facilities in Malaysia were expanded and improved during the year, as were those in several other lands.

The Baptist Convention of Ecuador was organized in 1972, with representatives of 27 churches attending the meeting.

Regular Sunday morning worship services were started at the Baptist Center in Senegal, one of Southern Baptists' newest mission points. Response to the invitation of the gospel message was outstanding in many places last year, especially in Korea and Malawi.

Schools and Student Work

The training of national leaders is a prerequisite to strong indigenous churches. Educational institutions under Baptist auspices in various lands may include all levels from kindergarten through university. Of special importance is the development of pastors and other church leaders through theological schools and also in programs below the full seminary level.

The new Baptist seminary in Portugal graduated its first class in 1972. During the year, Vietnamese Baptists held a special program of lay leadership training. In Angola, plans were under way for a small Bible school for training African pastors. The Brazilian Baptist radio-television board opened the first term of its language school, located in Campinas. A Southern Baptist missionary couple in India was given the opportunity to teach at Serampore College, an institution founded by William Carey.

Work among students and youth continues to receive encouraging response. Coffeehouses, reading rooms, student centers, retreats and camps, all play a part in this significant ministry among young people.

Publication Work

Publication ministries are an integral part of Southern Baptist overseas missions, as all kinds of Christian literature are provided for purposes of evangelism and the developing of vigorous church life. Our missionaries are related to publishing centers in 25 lands and to informal literature production programs in a number of other countries. They assisted in producing over 23 million pieces of literature: tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, hymnals, and other items.

Reading clubs, libraries, and correspondence courses continued to provide means of reaching thousands of people with the gospel, especially in Africa and the Middle East. During 1972, plans were completed for the launching of a Bible correspondence course in the French language in Upper Volta and in Dahomey, two new fields in West Africa.

The Baptist Spanish Publishing House in El Paso, Texas, has initiated an English-language ministry to provide materials for ministerial training in the Caribbean area. In Costa Rica, a national Baptist worker was named to assist an expanding literature and book store ministry in that country.

Hospitals and Medical Care

The program of hospitals and medical care serves the physical needs of thousands of people who would otherwise be neglected and often opens strategic doors for evangelistic witness. During 1972, missionaries and national workers engaged in this ministry treated nearly 55,000 inpatients and saw more than 890,000 outpatients.

Construction for two new Baptist hospitals was completed in 1972, in Bukittinggi, Indonesia, and Bangalore, India. Hospitals in Mexico and in Jordan dedicated new buildings, and a full-time physical therapy facility opened at the hospital in Gaza.

The oldest Baptist hospital in South America, at Asuncion, Paraguay, observed its twentieth anniversary in 1972, and also inaugurated a private outpatient clinic. In Honduras, the rural medical ministry was being expanded in order to provide medical service to remote areas of the country.

Benevolent Ministries

Benevolent ministries include agricultural programs, good will and community centers, children's homes, and direct relief work. During 1972, Southern Baptists, through the Foreign Mission Board, provided funds for victims of disease, war, and natural disasters in several countries, among them Rhodesia (a mine disaster) and the Philippines (floods). A program of relief and rehabilitation continued in Bangladesh as missionaries helped people rebuild their homes and reclaim their land for crops. A social service program in Kenya was encouraging Baptists to open small businesses and develop the economic potential of the African community, and a missionary social worker in Zambia was seeking to help African women adjust to urban life as they move from villages to the cities. In Vietnam, Baptists formed groups to aid civilian refugees from towns and villages.

Contributions

At the end of 1972, Southern Baptists' contributions for foreign missions totaled \$35,439,514. The 1972 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering goal was \$18 million — an increase over the \$17,833,810 contributed (as of May 1, 1972) through the 1971 offering.

Approximately 50 percent of the Southern Baptist Convention Co-operative Program funds is made available annually for foreign missions. This is the basis upon which sustained advance can be built. Still needed urgently on overseas fields are land, buildings, and equipment, amounting to several million dollars' worth.

A strong secular spirit influences the nation, but there is a turning inward by the people. There is an introspection, an obsession with feeling and passion. At the same time there is an easing of institutional alienation, coupled with an awareness that the ills which plague our society are deep and pervasive. There is also a headlong push for security or for pleasure coupled with a sense of apathy.

The people of the nation hunger for values, meaning in life, purpose, and for God. Southern Baptists are committed to meeting these needs, to make disciples of all persons through faith in Jesus Christ.

Missionary Force Stays At 2,200

An effective, well-trained mission force, for the most part supported and supervised in cooperation with the state mission boards, serves in all fifty states, Panama, and Puerto Rico. For the third year this force remained at 2,200, not because of a lack of volunteers, but because inflation cut away at the agency's ability to finance a larger number. More than 150 qualified workers have contacted the Board for appointment, but funds are not available.

Volunteer Force Increases

More effective ways to conduct missions in the United States through volunteers and with no increased funds continue to be found by the Home Mission Board. The laity have become the key force within the three major emphases of the Board: evangelism has activated a force of more than 125,000 lay evangelists through the lay evangelism schools; Christian social ministries depend 90 percent on the volunteer for their work; and church extension enlists the lay person to lead in Bible fellowships in homes, many growing to form the basis for new missions and churches.

Baptist Record Set At 452,000

The national turn to meet deep spiritual needs, coupled with the emphasis upon lay training, new methods in witnessing, and a turning outward to go where the people are enabled Southern Baptists to baptize 23,000 more persons than at any time in history. The Division of Evangelism during the year has strengthened its ministry on the campus, in outreach to high school young people, and in establishing a life-style evangelism through renewal evangelism.

Televangelism Series Starts

Through a special over-and-above offering in the Arnie Armstrong Easter Offering and through allocations from the Cooperative Program, the

Division of Evangelism in April launched "Spring Street, USA," the denomination's first evangelistic TV variety program. Kenneth Chafin hosts the show with guests including Pat Boone, Norma Zimmer, James Irwin, Dale Evans, and other nationally known persons with Christian testimonies.

"Joy" Tells Mission Story

A commissioned home missions musical, "Joy," written by HMB staffer Ed Seabough and free-lance composer Bill Cates, was produced by the Sunday School Board and presented at the assemblies during Home Missions Week. In 1973 the musical was presented throughout the nation, as well as at the Southern Baptist Convention.

Students Swell Mission Staff

The student summer missions force in 1972 totaled 1,002, of which 350 were sponsored and supported by state BSU's. New innovative ways have strengthened their ministries and semester missions have the students serving year-round.

"Operation Denomination" For Chaplains

The Division of Chaplaincy launched "Operation Denomination" to acquaint state convention leadership with the chaplains serving within their states and to encourage involvement of chaplains in denominational programs. There are 882 Southern Baptist chaplains now serving -- 539 with the military, 57 with the Veterans Administration, 183 in hospital chaplaincy, 88 with institutions such as prisons, and 15 as industrial chaplains. The denomination expects the number of chaplains serving with the military to decrease with the reduction in Armed Forces.

Church Loans Assists Churches

More than 1,000 churches received counseling from personnel of the Division of Church Loans which processed during the year loans to 237 churches for more than \$9.4 million. In addition, about 100 churches were aided in securing loans from other institutions, and the division implemented the special loan fund for Negro and other ethnic churches. Loans were made to 10 black churches for a total of \$250,000 and 50 additional applications are on hold.

Extend Now Emphasized

The denomination's emphasis in church extension, called Extend Now, received a major thrust through the Department of Church Extension which assisted 450 churches and missions with pastoral support. During the year 75 churches became self-supporting and phased out pastoral aid. The world's largest high-rise complex, Co-op City, Bronx, New York, was entered with a pastoral ministry. Four state capitals had been without an SBC ministry, but two of these (Albany, New York, and Montpelier, Vermont) were entered during the year.

National Conferences Planned And Held

A national convocation on associations, planned in cooperation with the Sunday School Board and other agencies, will be sponsored by the Home Mission Board's Division of Associational Services in 1974. In 1973 the rural-urban missions program and other denominational groups held the Small Church Conference at Ridgecrest, pointing to the denomination's renewed interest in the needs of the small churches — all 22,000 of them. A New Towns Conference held at Columbia, Maryland, highlighted the needs of many states for more information and aid in ministering to persons in a highly mobile society.

First Work Started With Arabs, Yemenites, and Samoans

The Department of Language Missions, which supports more than 1,000 missionary personnel in cooperation with the state conventions, started work during the past year for the first time with Arabs in the Northeast and with Yemenites and Samoans in California. The department has worked with others in preparing materials in Spanish and Chinese languages, and work has started on Navajo, Hungarian, and Romanian. A manuscript has been prepared on religious signs for the deaf, and a hymnal is being produced.

Work Becomes Cooperative Ministries

The Department of Work with National Baptists has been renamed the Department of Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists. The change reflects the changes in relationship with black Baptists and the emphasis upon joint projects. The 87 missionary personnel with this department and the state conventions led in what the department leadership personnel term one of their "finest years" of understanding and cooperative ministries. One project of the year was a book, **Black Christian Experience**, already in its second printing by Broadman Press, which aided in new understandings.

Mission Action Workshops

Fifteen mission action workshops were conducted by the Department of Christian Social Ministries for Woman's Missionary Union throughout the nation. Similar type workshops are planned for the Brotherhood in many areas as ways of strengthening the work of the churches in their mission outreach. Such efforts multiply by the effectiveness of the 285 missionaries supported by this program of work.

Thousands Study Interfaith Witness

The Department of Interfaith Witness distributed 180,000 pamphlets on various religious groups during 1972, but that will be only a small part of what was distributed in the spring of '73 as part of the March Week of Prayer emphasis when the study sponsored by the Woman's Missionary Union focused on this program. The department has sponsored a Jewish-Baptist Scholars' Conference in North Carolina and a Baptist-Catholic Conference in Texas as part of a growing dialogue with other religious groups.

It may well be that the most significant challenge of our time is the challenge to help claim America for Christ

to a degree never before true. What happens in and through the churches of this land has supreme significance, humanly speaking, in the programs of the missionary causes around the world.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD
Southern Baptist Convention

The purpose of the Sunday School Board is to support the Southern Baptist Convention in its task of bringing men to God through Jesus Christ by making available Bibles, lesson books, films and filmstrips, music and recordings, and church supplies and by fostering education and service programs which will help the churches to establish, conduct, enlarge, and improve their ministries of Bible teaching and Christian training.

The Southern Baptist Convention has assigned to the Board 15 programs of work through which it works toward this purpose.

A new internal organization was established October 1, 1971. A degree of efficiency and productivity has been attained beyond that which was possible under the former organization.

Each division accepted responsibility for reaching challenging goals and making improvements in its work. The program reports indicate the progress which has been made by the divisions in reaching their goals.

Through curriculum materials and field service activities the Board gave support to the Southern Baptist Convention theme *Living the Spirit of Christ in Expectancy and Creativity*. In addition to carrying on the activities related to the theme for the current year, most of the time of field consultants was spent in preparing church leaders for use of 1972-73 theme, *Living the Spirit of Christ in Faith and Conquest*.

Promotional plans have been developed and launched for such projects as People-to-People, Witness Involvement Now (WIN), CHURCH: the Sunday Night Place, Summer Youth Program, and Church Rally to ReaLife. All of these projects should contribute to church growth and spiritual development during 1972-73.

Net sales for the year of \$44,043,000 exceeded the preceding year by \$2,261,000.

The purpose of the Program of Book Store Operation is to operate strategically located stores for the profitable distribution of Bibles, books, audiovisuals, music, church supplies, and other appropriate products to assist churches and individuals in their growth.

The first pilot operation of Lifeway was opened in the Jackson Mall, Jackson, Mississippi, in August. Feasibility plans were completed for Lifelite, a channel of retailing through churches.

The purpose of the Program of Broadman Book Publishing is to contribute to the effectiveness of churches through profitably producing and

distributing products of Christian content and purpose, such as Bibles, Testaments, Scripture portions, books, audiovisuals, music, church supplies, and equipment.

The purpose of the **Program of Church Services and Materials** is to develop and distribute, profitably, services and materials acceptable to Southern Baptist churches, campus organizations, associations, and state conventions in meeting their wants and needs in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving Sunday School, Church Training, Church Music, Church Administration, Church Architecture, Church Library, Church Recreation and Student Work.

The organization of the Church Services and Materials Division was accomplished and began smooth operation with the direction of its work established. Promotion plans for growth of the church organization were developed and implementation begun. Actions were initiated to bring curriculum materials offered to the churches in line with the wants and needs of the churches based on the research project "Talk Back." The time involved in processing churches' orders for materials was shortened considerably and better service inaugurated. Division personnel spent more days on the field in servicing churches, campus organizations, associations, and state conventions.

The purpose of the **Program of Sunday School Development** is to develop services and materials acceptable for use by Southern Baptist churches, associations, and state conventions in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving the church Bible teaching program of Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, Weekday Bible Study, and other special Bible teaching emphases, such as the bus ministry and other similar projects.

The major emphasis for the Sunday School Department in 1971-72 was upon new materials and methods designed to enlarge the Sunday Schools in the churches.

The purpose of the **Program of Church Training Development** is to develop services and materials acceptable for use by Southern Baptist churches, associations, and state conventions in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving the Church Training Union program for church members, church leaders, and new church members.

The major emphasis for the Church Training Department for this year was upon growth and training church members to witness. Seventeen WIN institutes were conducted. Sixteen Church Training revivals and 26 growth projects were conducted. Consultants participated in 274 field service projects for strengthening and enlarging the program of Church Training.

Major energies were invested in the design of growth plans to continue throughout the mid-seventies. The department initiated promotion of "CHURCH: the Sunday Night Place," and added a growth coordinator to the department staff.

The purpose of the **Program of Church Music Development** is to develop services and materials acceptable for use by Southern Baptist churches, associations, and state conventions in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving music experiences of congregation services, church music performance groups, music activity groups, and music study groups.

The major emphasis for the Church Music Department during this year was upon growth and leadership training. To support this emphasis,

consultants participated in 12 ReaLife conferences, 11 associational briefing/planning meetings, and 121 administration and age division field service projects.

The purpose of the **Program of Church Administration Development** is to develop services and materials acceptable for use by Southern Baptist churches, associations, and state conventions in establishing, conducting, and improving Church Administration services of church planning and evaluation, church organization, volunteer and employed church personnel, church business administration, administrative controls, church communications, church officers and committees, and church institutional services including day care and kindergarten work.

The highest priority was given to helping pastors of small churches who serve as the only employed church staff member. Special emphasis was placed on the pastor's work with Sunday School and Training Union. Both emphases were featured in seminars, workshops, and conference center meetings.

The purpose of the **Program of Church Architecture Promotion** is to assist churches, associations, state conventions, and denominational agencies by providing consultative guidance and architectural service for planning, financing, and securing of property and buildings; furnishing, equipping, and utilizing them.

The department engaged in consultation with 3,684 individual churches and denominational organizations, an increase of 52 over the previous year. Of this number, 908 were first-time requests. Services were provided for 90 churches and/or missionaries in 16 foreign countries.

The purpose of the **Program of Church Library Development** is to develop services and materials acceptable for use by Southern Baptist churches, associations, and state conventions in establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving the Church Library Services of providing and promoting the use of printed and audiovisual media, and consulting with church leaders and members in the use of media.

The purpose of the **Program of Church Recreation Development** is to develop services and materials acceptable for use by Southern Baptist churches, associations, and state conventions in establishing, enlarging, and improving the church recreation service and resources in recreation.

The purpose of the **Program of National Student Ministries** is to develop services and materials acceptable for use by churches, campus organizations, associations, and state conventions in establishing, strengthening, conducting, and improving their ministries with college and university students and faculty members, including internationals.

The department selected a four-year cycle of emphases for student ministries: (1) evangelism, churchmanship, and ministry; (2) Bible study, international students, and social action; (3) stewardship, fellowship, and evangelism; (4) missions, worship, and Bible study.

The 50th anniversary of Student work was observed for the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Philadelphia and was noted in periodicals.

The purpose of the **Program of Conference Center Operation** is to provide, on a break-even basis, the physical facilities of Ridgcrest and Glorieta Baptist Conference Centers for the use of church and denominational programs.

Registered attendance for the regular denominational conferences during the summer season was 29,530 at Ridgecrest and 26,225 at Glorieta.

The names of the program and the assemblies were changed by action of the Sunday School Board trustees at the July meeting. The assemblies became Ridgecrest and Glorieta Baptist Conference Centers. The change was made primarily to reflect the year-round conference type operation now characteristic of these centers.

A Day Camp site was developed at Glorieta, making Day Camping available at both centers. This facility, along with the Ridgecrest Day Camp, relieved the crowding in the Children's Building. These buildings have been renamed Preschool Buildings and given exclusively to programing for this age.

A total renovation of Spilman Auditorium at Ridgecrest, at a cost in excess of \$1,000,000, will be complete in time for summer operation in 1973.

Both Camp Ridgecrest for Boys and Crestridge for Girls showed increases in the number of campers who attended them.

The purpose of the **Program of Sunday School Board General Management** is to provide executive direction and centralized services for the division and department programs of the Board.

The Executive Office gave general direction to the total work of the Board through regular meetings of the Administrative Staff, the installation of a new organization plan designed to assign accountability and a corresponding degree of autonomy to the division, the establishment of corporate goals to give direction to division planning, and the development of an annual management plan within the wage-price-earnings guideline of the federal government.

Accomplishments in central services of particular interest are (1) reduced the number of employees 26; (2) reduced absences 569 days; (3) news stories occurred 1,049 times for a total of 8,810 column inches; (4) 4,095 visitors toured the Board; (5) letters of criticism were received from only 961 persons; (6) employee participation in personal development activities increased from 694 to 982; (7) photography services broke even; (8) 18 internal audits were completed; (9) a comprehensive maintenance plan for Board-owned book store buildings was implemented; and (10) a 5.2 percent paper inventory turnover was achieved. Routine services were performed in the areas of personnel, public relations, legal, financial, accounting and control, insurance, manpower development, library, procurement, property management, systems, and administrative services.

The purpose of the **Program of Cooperative Education and Promotion Work with State Conventions** is to provide funds to assist state conventions in the promotion of Sunday School, Church Training, Church Music, Student, Church Administration, Church Architecture, Church Library, and Church Recreation work.

The goal was to provide a base amount of \$7,200 plus \$3,000 for each full-time professional employe who works in the programs named in the statement of purpose. This goal was accomplished.

The purpose of the **Program of Southern Baptist Convention Support** is to provide the Sunday School Board's share of the operating expenses of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The goal was to provide an amount equal to one third of the Board's contribution to Cooperative Education and Promotion work with state conventions. This goal was met by the transfer of \$326,000 to the Southern Baptist Convention for operating expenses.

BROTHERHOOD COMMISSION

Southern Baptist Convention

Programs: High Tide of Creativity

The membership increase of 29,011 during 1971 was no happenstance, nor is it all due to the transfer of six, seven and eight year olds to Brotherhood sponsorship (this is responsible for about 4% of the 7% increase). The departments of work have given written reports to the proper committees of the Commission and will report other emphases of their work at the time the budget is discussed, but I have singled out some items to present to you here.

The entire staff has been involved to an unprecedented degree in public relations, field engagements and material preparation. In the area of press relations, news features concerning the work of this agency have flowed to news outlets at the amazing rate of one feature every four days. The Brotherhood exhibit at the Southern Baptist Convention won first place in its division in competition sponsored by the Baptist Public Relations Association. This agency won other significant awards during the year and recognition will be given to those responsible during this Annual Meeting.

Baptist Men

During the year the Baptist Men's Department:

1. Sent two staff members and helped enlist 100 Baptist men to attend the Pan American Union of Baptist Men in Cali, Colombia.
2. Worked with the Stewardship Commission in preparing material for the second "Cooperative Program Day" for use by churches, Baptist men and Stewardship chairmen.
3. Began promoting "The Baptist Hour" and continued consultations with the Radio and Television Commission on this and other projects.
4. Coordinated a Brotherhood mission tour of Mexico Baptist laymen to the United States.
5. Worked with the Evangelism Division of the Home Mission Board in Lay Evangelism.
6. Prepared tract, "Tell and Win through Brotherhood."
7. Planned six mission action conferences with the Home Mission Board for 1973.

8. Helped supply needed laymen to assist in rebuilding following the flood disaster in South Dakota.

Royal Ambassadors

The staff of the Royal Ambassador Department made 1971 a significant year for Southern Baptist boys.

Among other significant things they:

1. Became the first church program organization to provide leadership training through the means of a cassette tape.
2. Worked with the Home Mission Board in assigning student summer missionaries to work in state RA camps.
3. Provided Royal Ambassador pages for the Southern Baptist Convention.
4. Conducted mission tour of Mexico for pioneer age boys.
5. Published new book on Royal Ambassador Day Camping.
6. Updated Royal Ambassador Campcraft book.

Supporting Services

The reorganization of this division during the year primarily provided for the work to be divided by function instead of by product. Additional responsibilities of the division include:

Supervision of the building and grounds and

Responsibility for telephone service and personnel.

The merchandise area lists 141 different items. These, for the most part, are handled through the Baptist Bookstores. A schedule for periodic visits to all the Baptist Bookstores is now being implemented with satisfying results.

In periodicals the April-May-June quarter for this year indicates the following subscriptions:

Handling these 249,466 subscriptions, the promotion, the art work, the mailing and endless other chores, add up to quite an assignment.

The Home Mission Board has assigned a US-2 missionary to our staff for two years to research and creatively formulate plans for a Baptist Young

Men's Organization; the Foreign and Home Mission Boards have extensively explored and studied ways of better promoting and involving us in the World Mission Conferences. They will bring a report regarding our involvement to the Executive Committee of the SBC in September. Definitive plans for joint work with other agencies are also well along in their development.

We intend to assume a leadership role in developing a lay movement in Southern Baptist life, the scope of which we have not even dared hope for to this point in time.

Planning Strategies and Priorities For the Future

Goals for the agency for the 1972-73 year were worked out by the staff and have been reviewed by the Program Development Committee. There was not enough involvement by the Commission itself. This is the last time this can happen. The proper committee should be involved along with the Commission staff and state leadership in formulating 1973-74 goals. The Program Development Committee has already begun this process.

I feel we are compelled to move beyond this one year planning stage. I am, therefore, recommending that the Commission authorize the Chairman to appoint a "Direction-84" committee to bring a recommendation to the 1973 meeting for long-range goals covering the next decade. This special committee should include in its membership Commission staff, state leadership and Commission members, along with others whom they may co-op. Several work sessions will be necessary during the year. This committee should outline a sound theological basis for the work of the laity and then chart carefully its direction. While we are a service organization, this does not distract from our responsibility to provide prophetic leadership and assume a creative stance in Southern Baptist life.

All committees should be working committees. Budget has been provided for one work session for each committee, leaving only final drafting of the reports and recommendations for the meetings at this annual session.

We are launching out into a major expansion of the Baptist Men's work. These plans call for three new departments in what we have structured in the new organization as the Baptist Men's Division. These departments include a Lay Witnessing Department, a Lay Ministries Department and a Young Men's Department. Though we cannot budget full time staff for all of these, we do plan to implement the Lay Witnessing Department as soon as the right leader can be found. These plans are, of course, contingent upon the approval of the budget. The organizational plans have already been approved.

The National Royal Ambassador Congress is being planned for St. Louis during the Summer of 1973. Plans for this important meeting have been underway for two years.

CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION

Southern Baptist Convention

The Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention continued its emphasis on the development of Christian morality among Southern Baptists.

The Commission is instructed by the Convention to assist Southern Baptists in their efforts to bear faithful Christian witness and render effective service in the areas of family life, race relations, daily work and economics, Christian citizenship, peace, and special moral concerns such as alcohol and other drugs, gambling, and pornography.

The agency sought to carry out the mandate of the Convention through the preparation of curriculum materials for use by other agencies, the preparation and promotion of cassette materials on applied Christianity, the writing of articles, guest editorials, and reports for the state Baptist papers and other mass media, and the filling of a broad range of speaking engagements in local churches, colleges, seminaries, and various types of convention workshops and conferences.

The Commission's weekly column, "On the Moral Scene," was carried in many state Baptist papers.

Race Relations Sunday was observed by thousands of churches using the special packet produced by the Commission.

For the first time, Christian Citizenship Sunday has been placed on the denominational calendar; its observance is sponsored by the Commission.

In 1972 a national seminar, "SALT 72," was held in St. Louis, Missouri, and was well-received. In the spring of 1973, another national seminar, "A Future for the Family," was held in Charlotte, North Carolina, and was attended by more than 700 Southern Baptists — students, lay persons, ministers, and denominational leaders. Materials from these conferences have been widely disseminated by radio, tapes, and through printed **Proceedings**.

Regional conferences, sponsored by the Commission, on "The Local Church and Christian Social Concern," were held in four states.

A vital working relationship was maintained with the state Christian Life Commissions and Committees.

Two new staff members, one a replacement, have joined the Commission during the past year: Lee Porter, coming from a pastorate in Houston, Texas, serves as Director of Organization; and Welton Gaddy, coming from a pastorate in Louisville, Kentucky, fills a newly-created position as Director of Christian Citizenship Development.

New literature was prepared including 15 titles in a new series called "Christian Life Style for Families" and six titles in a new series called "Christian Life Style for Youth"; and an important new handbook was revised for use by churches committed to application and choosing to involve themselves in Christian social concern.

Especially encouraging is the growing interest on the part of Baptists at the associational level in being more faithfully involved as concerned Christians in "helping changed people change the world." The staff of the Christian Life Commission wants to be of assistance to Baptist associations and churches in developing Christian Life Committees and maintaining a continuing emphasis on applied Christianity.

EDUCATION COMMISSION

Southern Baptist Convention

Nineteen hundred and seventy-two was a record-breaking year for Southern Baptist colleges and schools. For the first time in history all Southern Baptist colleges are fully accredited. The total enrollment in Baptist colleges showed an increase of more than 5,000 students over 1971. All Southern Baptist seminaries showed an increase in enrollment.

Nineteen hundred and seventy-two was also a year of great achievement for the Education Commission. Here are some of the highlights:

Developed one of the most successful promotions of the Convention-wide emphasis for Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day in the history of the Commission.

Promoted a record-breaking national student admissions involving more than 80 Baptist college personnel.

Held a workshop for state education committee chairmen, dealing with promotion, denominational relations, church-college relations, use of Baptist state papers, and Baptist Press — the group voted unanimously to make this an annual event.

Assisted 47 out of 53 Baptist colleges and universities in securing faculty members and administrative staff. Interviewed graduate students on 27 college campuses.

Conducted three trustee orientation workshops and provided materials for a number of others.

Increased circulation of *The Southern Baptist Educator* by more than 15 percent.

Increased liaison and set up more intensive cooperative programs with Foreign Mission Board, National Student Ministries, Church Administration Department of the Sunday School Board, Seminary Extension Department, and In-Service Training Program of the Home Mission Board.

Set up the H. I. Hester Endowed Lecture Series for Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools.

These are the highlights and do not include staff work for the annual and semiannual meetings of the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools, staff work for the administration and for the disbursement and accounting of all funds of American Baptist Theological Seminary, staff work for Opdyke, M. May Robertson-Joseph L. Sheppard, and J. W. Farmer

scholarship programs, staff response for assistance for individual colleges and schools, state conventions, assistance for accreditation, foundation contacts, news releases, material for displays and exhibits, representation at Baptist state conventions, staff response to invitations for commencement, chapel, faculty workshops, curriculum development, convocations, et cetera.

Report On Operating Programs And Request For Cooperative Program Allocations For Operations

Institutional changes. — Atlanta Baptist College merged with Mercer University becoming Mercer University at Atlanta. University of Corpus Christi asked to be no longer affiliated with the Texas Baptist Convention. Missouri Baptist College, St. Louis campus, moved from junior college to senior college status. Arthur K. Tyson, president of Grand Canyon College, resigned to become head of the development office at Dallas Baptist College. William R. Hintze, vice-president for academic affairs, was named interim president. Last May, Guy D. Newman was named chancellor of Howard Payne College. Roger L. Brooks has assumed the presidency. Jess C. Moody resigned as president of Palm Beach Atlantic College and Warner Earle Fusselle, formerly president of Truett-McConnell College, was named president. Ronald E. Weitman was named president of Truett-McConnell College. John E. Rouse, president of Anderson College, retired and J. Cordell Maddox, executive vice-president, assumed the presidency. Milton Ferguson was elected president of Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary to succeed Millard J. Berquist who retired. Barkley Moore was named president of Oneida Baptist Institute for one year succeeding David C. Jackson who resigned.

Support. — During the past year schools received \$20,205,192 from the state conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention, or a decrease of \$2,430,911. Donations, gifts, and grants totaled \$22,794,302, increasing by \$343,720 over the previous year. Endowment increased to \$302,915,563, or \$72,450,841 more than 1970-71. Total assets were \$829,523,034 or \$74,048,135 more than the previous year.

Church-related vocations. — All church-related volunteers totaled 16,438 for an increase of 1,661 over the previous year. The largest gain was in ministerial students, for an increase of 935.

PROGRAM GOALS IN 1973-74

The Program of Christian Education Leadership and Coordination

1. To follow-up conferences with college and seminary leadership seeking solutions to critical problems that have arisen in reference to transcript definition, credit transfer, change in degree requirements, and off-campus studies.

2. To follow-up conferences with representatives from the colleges and seminaries in the field of religious education to seek solutions to major problems in course offerings: to study ways and means of making better use of college talent in writing for the Sunday School Board; to assist local churches and associations in leadership trainings.

3. To sponsor the first joint meeting between college representatives and Home Mission Board personnel responsible for the In-Service Training Program in order to encourage colleges to make wider use of this program; to become more aware of the necessity for providing special assistance to the vocational Christian workers while in college; and to encourage Baptist colleges to develop full-time professional staff to assist student vocational Christian workers in finding opportunities to practice their calling while in college.

4. To continue to work with the National Student Ministries Department of the Sunday School Board for more effective witness to students on Baptist college campuses.

5. To continue regular meetings with the Vocational Guidance Section of the Sunday School Board in order to assist faculty and students to become more familiar with literature and other aids for helping young people on Baptist college campuses to make a decision for full-time vocational Christian service; to use the resources of the Sunday School Board to assist in actively recruiting Baptist students who are already committed to full-time service; and to work with the Sunday School Board in creating special programs on the local campus which will deal with the Christian vocational responsibility of laymen and laywomen.

6. To continue working with Foreign Mission Board recruiting teachers on sabbaticals from Baptist colleges for overseas assignments; by mutual agreement to hold a conference in early 1973 with top Foreign Mission Board personnel and representatives from Baptist colleges to determine how the program of the Foreign Mission Board can be more effectively presented to students and family; to give special consideration to the Baptist colleges' responsibility in recruiting students for foreign mission service; and to identify general areas where the Foreign Mission Board and Baptist colleges can be mutually helpful.

The Program of College Studies and Services

1. To develop a consulting team of Baptist school presidents, business managers, deans, faculty members, pastors, and denominational leaders who will give at least three days a year to assist Baptist colleges and schools with problems in curriculum development, management, accreditation, denominational relations, financial support, and community relations.

2. To strengthen **The Southern Baptist Educator** by advance programming which will contain material more directly related to the Commission's program statement and to give high priority to better informing Baptist faculty members, trustees, and administrators of the goals and objectives of the denomination.

3. To conduct the following surveys: Teaching Load; Recruiting (budget including salaries); State Formula for Division of Funds; Tuition and Fees; Fringe Benefits; Convention and College Aid to Ministers and Other Church Vocational Workers; Interinstitutional Cooperation; Adult Education; Alumni Support; Cooperative Program Support (comparative analysis for ten years); In-Service Training; Special Programs in Denominational Relations; Recruitment Techniques; and Community Service Programs.

4. To establish from selected college personnel a committee on self-study and accreditation; to do the staff work in developing the annual and semiannual programs of the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools; to represent Southern Baptists at annual meeting of the executives of national church boards of higher education.

The Program of Teacher-Personnel Placement Service

To intensify the search for qualified Baptist teachers by enlisting the aid of pastors, National Student Ministries, and college personnel with a concrete plan of action for each group; by recruiting doctoral candidates at selected topflight private and public universities throughout the country; by producing special literature, and by publishing articles on the challenge which teaching in a Baptist college provides.

The Program of Student Recruitment

1. To hold third annual recruitment workshop; to lead Baptist schools in a national program of intensified recruitment of vocational Christian student volunteers; to produce at least one piece of literature demonstrating the advantages of the Christian volunteer attending a Baptist college; to sponsor the third annual conference of state education committee chairmen to exchange ideas and information on current state programs; to seek ways and means to improve denominational relations; to explore ways and means of making better use of Baptist Press, Baptist state papers, and the publications of various Southern Baptist boards and agencies; and to explore how our Baptist schools can serve better the overall denominational program.

2. Develop theme and overall plan for observing Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day; prepare literature, coordinate general promotion through state education committee chairmen and enlist support of state editors.

The Program of Convention Relations

1. To hold public relations workshops for Baptist school public relations personnel.

2. Prepare special articles for Baptist state papers.

3. Work with state executive secretaries, on request, in special problem areas.

4. Work with individual institutions in designing program of better denominational relations.

5. To provide through *The Educator* for an exchange of ideas among our Baptist colleges and schools on programs in denominational relations, and community relations.

"If the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission didn't exist, the broadcast industry would have to invent it!" Vincent T. Wasilewski of Washington told Dr. Paul M. Stevens, president of the Radio-TV Commission.

Mr. Wasilewski, president of the prestigious National Association of Broadcasters, was speaking for his organization and citing the professionalism of the Radio and Television Commission. The Commission's variety of Bible-centered religious programs have earned it the unofficial title, "Religious Department," of numerous radio and television stations across the country.

"Broadcasters across the nation have accepted our programming — so much that in 1972 the Radio and Television Commission was given \$7 1/2 million worth of public service broadcast time," said Dr. Stevens.

"In the past 10 years, the industry has given an estimated \$47 million dollars for programs produced by the Radio-TV Commission in the name of Southern Baptists."

The Radio-TV Commission moves, through its programming, into the cracks and crevices of the world, where churches often cannot go — for many people will listen to a radio and television program who would never hear a preacher.

Each show produced by the Commission is carefully designed to present the claims of Jesus Christ in today's world, Dr. Stevens said. A show's success is measured by the letters that pour into Commission offices daily.

"Our mail response in 1972 was exciting," said Dr. Stevens. "Mail response to major Commission radio and television programs increased dramatically, from 89,502 to 178,679 letters from first time respondents during the year. This didn't include all subsequent counseling letters, correspondence Bible studies, etc. The Commission received during the year, every week, an average of 30 signed commitments to follow Christ. During the entire year 1,752 decisions were recorded. This does not include the numerous un-recorded decisions made for Christ and shared with local churches.

"Estimates based on station surveys indicate that Southern Baptists, through their radio and television programs, reach more than 100 million people per week," said Dr. Stevens.

Listeners write for program offers ranging from copies of "The Baptist Hour" sermons to Bible study correspondence courses and brightly-colored posters to JOT fun kits.

"Program offers do two things," said Dr. Stevens. "They help us gauge our audience and they help us minister to listeners as we offer material for Christian growth."

One response to a Baptist Hour offer came from a prisoner on deathrow in a Caribbean jail. He had had a conversion experience before hearing a Baptist Hour program. His letter requesting a Bible study course began a correspondence that has resulted in outstanding Christian growth. His jailers describe him as "a model prisoner, who stands a good chance of eventual pardon."

The Radio and Television Commission now distributes 3,334 programs weekly for broadcast all over the world. This totals 207,480 separate broadcasts per year — 11.4% over last year's totals and an all-time high. These gospel programs are heard on 1,992 radio stations across the United States and on 252 television stations in this country.

Highlights of this year's outreach include the addition of 13 half-hour color films to "The Human Dimension" series (inaugurated with 13 films in 1972). In addition, a JOT segment has been produced in Spanish in cooperation with the Foreign Mission Board, and the Commission has produced a series of half-hour entertainment specials, "Spring Street, USA," for the Home Mission Board. These bright programs, featuring the Spring Street Singers and a different show-business personality each episode, with Kenneth Chafin as host, are now being marketed across the country.

In addition, the Radio and Television Commission produces other regular programs, including "Powerline," for young people, the award winning "MasterControl"* which features interviews with exciting people; "Country Crossroads," a half-hour of country entertainment and inspiration.

The Commission's newest radio program, "Nightsong," is a 15-minute late night show designed for airing three nights a week. It features the voices of The Centurymen, under the musical direction of Buryl Red. Released last spring, it is expected to be extremely popular with FM stereo stations.

And SASH, JOT's older sister is making the test rounds. A pilot program, included in the JOT packages, was released in January, 1973. Results are still being tabulated.

Thousands of letters that pour into the Radio and Television Commission from around the world attest to the success of Commission programs. Letters come from Alaska, Mississippi, Kansas, Florida, Arkansas, Oklahoma. A Texas teenager wrote:

"It was your program (Powerline) that helped me make the decision to accept Christ and His teachings. Your program taught me that Christ's teachings apply to the individual (me) and to the individuals in my life.

"Before, I thought that only little old ladies and 'goody-goodies' went to church. Now that I have gone, I have learned that people who go to church usually feel as deeply as I, and my friends, do about Christ. If they appeared hypocritical, it's only because they weren't perfect and I looked at them through unloving eyes."

Southern Baptists help that girl apply solutions to the problems of the present. They help because they are involved — and because Baptists are involved, the Radio and Television Commission exists.

HISTORICAL COMMISSION

Southern Baptist Convention

The year 1971-72 witnessed among Southern Baptists a growing awareness and appreciation of their heritage. Two state conventions, the South Carolina and Georgia state conventions, conducted meaningful observances of their sesquicentennials. Alabama and Virginia laid plans for such observances in 1973. A growing number of churches, associations, conventions, and agencies are compiling and publishing their history. These and other evidences of a growing historical awareness among Southern Baptists are encouraging the Commission in its ongoing task of serving the history needs of Southern Baptists.

Research Services. — On January 1, 1972, Alfred Ronald Tonks joined the staff as research director, a position formerly held by Lynn E. May, Jr. For the previous five and one-half years Tonks had served as associate professor of history at Indiana Central College, Indianapolis, Indiana. The Commission conducted a total of 220 research projects providing historical data and biographical data requested by churches, denominational organizations, leaders, and other individuals.

Historical Pageant Presented to the Southern Baptist Convention. —

One of the most significant contributions made by the Historical Commission in serving the history interests of Southern Baptists in 1972 was the production and presentation of a thirty-minute historical pageant, "Philadelphia Heritage of Southern Baptists," at the annual meeting of the Convention in Philadelphia. This dramatic production helped more than 12,000 Southern Baptists attending to understand and appreciate significant events in the history of Baptists which took place in the Philadelphia area. The Commission further extended the impact of this presentation by producing and distributing 240 cassette recordings and slide sets of "Philadelphia Heritage" to churches and associations throughout the country.

Southern Baptist Historical Society. — Special promotional efforts have involved increasing numbers of Baptists as members of the Commission's auxiliary, the Southern Baptist Historical Society. The membership of 652 reported in October, 1972, represented an increase of approximately 50 percent during the year.

Publishing and Indexing. — The Commission continued publication of its quarterly journal *Baptist History and Heritage*; contributed three 30-page historical sections to *The Quarterly Review*; issued a 3-year supplement to *Index of Graduate Theses in Baptist Theological Seminaries, 1969-71*; compiled and published in cooperation with sixteen other Convention agencies a 356-page *Southern Baptist Periodical Index — 1971*; and published three new pamphlets and brochures designed to serve the history needs of Southern Baptists.

Expanding Resources of Research Center. — The resources of Dargan-Carver Library, Southern Baptist Research Center, were expanded during the year by adding 156,716 pages of materials on microfilm valued at \$1,567, and 2,387 books, pamphlets, periodicals, annuals, church histories, recordings, and archival items valued at \$3,844. Several valuable accessions were added to the Convention archives including the papers of Carl E. Bates during his tenure as president of the Southern Baptist Convention. Records of three historic churches in the Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, area are among the many church records microfilmed during the year. Increasing numbers of denominational leaders, writers, editors, professors, students, and others doing research in Baptist life and work are utilizing the resources of this major Baptist research center in Nashville.

Consultation on the Commission's Work. — At the request of the Historical Commission a group of 18 consultants met with the Commission staff in making a critical analysis of the history needs of the denomination, the objectives and programs of the Commission, and the implementation of these programs. Participants in the consultation included representatives of other national denominational historical agencies, state Baptist historical societies, Southern Baptist Convention agencies and the Convention's Executive Committee, and state conventions; also, professors of history and librarians of Baptist seminaries and universities, a graduate student, a state Baptist editor, a superintendent of missions, and a pastor. The findings of the consultation on the work of the Historical Commission have been most helpful in evaluating current programs and in planning for the future as the Commission seeks to serve the history interests of Southern Baptists with increasing effectiveness.

Book Award. — A book written by Lynn E. May, Jr., executive secretary, won national recognition in 1972. The National Awards Committee of the American Association of State and Local History awarded May a

Certificate of Commendation for his book *The First Baptist Church of Nashville, Tennessee, 1820-1970*, a sesquicentennial history of the church.

Program Report

The Program of Recording, Procuring, and Preserving

The Commission has continued to serve the history needs of Southern Baptists through its program of recording, procuring, and preserving Baptist historical materials. Major accomplishments during the year include the following: (1) Served the history interests of Southern Baptists by maintaining close cooperation with the agencies of the Convention and other Baptist bodies, and consulted with several agencies on the development and maintenance of adequate historical records. (2) Conducted a survey of the methods, procedure, policies, programs, and holdings of other denominational historical agencies to secure data for a self-study. (3) Determined more effective ways and means of conducting the work of the Historical Commission through a special study made with the help of consultants representing state and Southern Baptist Convention agencies and non-Baptist historical agencies. (4) Visited the libraries of six Southern Baptist seminaries; also held a joint meeting with the seminary librarians to discuss cooperation and coordination of the efforts of these libraries and the Historical Commission in the procurement and preservation of Baptist historical materials. (5) Visited seventeen states to consult with state convention executive secretaries and/or other state leaders concerning the development of comprehensive, well-organized Baptist historical collections and programs in these states; addressed one state convention and two associations. (6) Addressed a national interdenominational conference of church archivists and visited two of the largest denominational historical collections in the United States and one in Canada. (7) Consultation was offered on recording, procuring, and preserving historical records at Glorieta and Ridgecrest assembly conferences for associational clerks and a national meeting for state recording secretaries. (8) Microfilmed the records of three historic Baptist churches in the Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, area during the Southern Baptist Convention annual meeting. (9) Procured the papers of one Southern Baptist Convention president and the commitment of three others to turn their papers over to the Commission for the Convention archives in the near future. (10) Enlarged the resources of the Dargan-Carver Library as a Baptist research center by adding 156,716 pages (679 items) of materials on microfilm valued at \$1,567 and 2,387 books, pamphlets, annuals, church histories, periodicals, recordings, etc., valued at \$3,844. (11) Assured the preservation and distribution of basic Baptist historical materials by producing and purchasing a total of 314,249 pages of microfilm materials valued at \$2,769.

The Program of Utilization of Historical Materials

The Commission has conducted a broad program of utilization of historical materials to help Baptists understand their history and its meaning. The following program accomplishments for 1971-72 are noted: (1) Presented a thirty-minute historical pageant, "Philadelphia Heritage of Southern Baptists," at the annual meeting of the Convention in Philadelphia, and further extended the impact of this presentation by (2) producing and distributing 240 cassette recordings and slide sets of "Philadelphia Heritage," (3) Published four issues of the Commission's 64-page journal *Baptist History and Heritage*, and thirty-page historical sections in three issues of *The Quarterly Review* to help Baptists become more aware and appreciative of

their heritage, (4) Published the annual volume of the *Southern Baptist Periodical Index*, a 356-page author and subject guide to 49 Convention periodicals. (5) Published a three-year supplement, 1969-71, of the *Index of Graduate Theses in Baptist Theological Seminaries*. (6) Initiated a study to develop ways and means of coordinating current efforts to index Baptist materials and to investigate the development of a Baptist information system. (7) Conducted 220 research projects to provide historical and biographical data requested by churches, denominational leaders and organizations, and other individuals. (8) Consulted with the presidents, professors, and students of six Southern Baptist Convention seminaries and three colleges concerning the need of Baptists for a greater awareness and appreciation of their heritage. (9) Enlisted 230 new members in the Commission's auxiliary, the Southern Baptist Historical Society, during the last six months of the year. (10) Conducted a tour of Baptist and national historical sites in Philadelphia for messengers to the Southern Baptist Convention. (11) Applied history to contemporary issues through papers presented at the annual meeting of the Commission and Society on the theme: "Baptists and Social Revolution." (12) Conducted a conference at Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly on the history of Baptists. (13) Published three new pamphlets and brochures and distributed 24,500 copies of twelve leaflets, pamphlets, brochures, and other materials designed to serve the history needs of Southern Baptists. (14) Encouraged the Sunday School Board to publish a revised edition of *Our Baptist Story*, by Pope A. Duncan, for the Church Study Course.

Conclusion

The Commission is indebted to hundreds of individuals, churches, associations, conventions, and agencies for contributing materials for its Baptist Research Center. Grateful appreciation is expressed to the state Baptist historical agencies for their assistance in the Commission's work. The Commission is likewise grateful to Southern Baptists for providing financial resources through the Cooperative Program to enable the Commission to serve the history interests of the denomination with increasing effectiveness. The ministry of the Commission has been strengthened by the Southern Baptist Historical Society, auxiliary to the Historical Commission. Gratitude is expressed to the Society's officers: Rolin S. Armour, president; R. A. McLemore, vice-president; H. I. Hester, secretary, and to the more than 650 members involved in its work.

GOLDEN GATE BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary has completed 29 years of service with the enrollment this year at 323. Of these only 36% were from Baptist colleges with 22 such schools represented.

There were 76 students receiving degrees or awards at the June Commencement. Among these graduates were the first three men to receive the new Doctor of Ministry degree.

The number of International students decreased to 20 this year as more stringent entrance requirements affected several applicants. The non-Baptist students continue at about the normal level, 46.

Two new faculty members began service this year, Dr. Paul W. Turner in Pastoral Ministry and Director of Professional Training and Dr. John P.

Johnson in Church Music. In addition several visiting professors aided in the instructional program. These included Dr. E. H. Westmoreland, Dr. H. H. Hobbs, and Dr. Allen W. Graves.

Dr. John H. Parrott of Roswell, New Mexico has been elected to the faculty for Preaching and as Director of the Los Angeles Center for the seminary. Through this Center courses leading to the basic degrees as well as the new D. Min. program will be offered beginning in October. This is another effort of Golden Gate to provide training where it is needed in the West.

The new arrangement of library facilities has increased and improved these resources this year. Support is being sought for building the new Library/Learning Resource Center and for endowment of the Chair of Evangelism.

Resources in students and support remain critical at Golden Gate as efforts continue to improve the program of training. We are grateful for your support through prayer, sending students, and the Cooperative Program.

There were 10 students in the seminary this year from Arkansas.

MIDWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Midwestern Seminary has experienced a significant increase in student enrolment for the second year in a row. There is growing interest and response to the Seminary's restructured academic program of study called "The Midwestern Plan." This program which is based on eleven four-week terms throughout the calendar year offers a high degree of freedom and selectivity in the planning of curriculum offerings, in student study programs, and in faculty teaching schedules.

Two academic terms of experience with the four-week plan indicates that it is more than just an innovative idea; it offers the possibility of becoming an efficient academic model which will facilitate the current emphasis in theological education on bringing classroom teaching and the actual practice of ministry together in a creative learning situation. This is accomplished by bringing experienced pastors and leading specialists in evangelism, pastoral care, church administration and education, and contemporary social ministries, to the campus as adjunct professors. The functional aspect of this program has demonstrated its practical value.

The newly inaugurated Doctor of Ministry Program, fully accredited both by the American Association of Theological Schools and the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools has received such response that there is now a waiting list of applicants for admission. The Midwestern Plan facilitates the purpose of the D. Min. Program enabling the busy pastor to take advantage of four-week D. Min. Seminars in a planned program of continuing theological education.

The Midwestern Plan makes it possible for the Seminary to complement its regular teaching faculty of eighteen professors through a program of guest and adjunct professorships. John Mills, missionary in Africa, served as visiting Professor of Missions during 1972-73. Nineteen adjunct professors, specialists in their respective fields, have augmented the efforts of the regular faculty

this year. They are: Kenneth L. Chafin, Wayne Dehoney, James T. Draper, Jr., Donald B. Harbuck, William W. Lancaster, James Landes, Olan Hugh Runnels, and Robert L. Tremaine, all Southern Baptist pastors; Paul Russell Adkins, M. Wendell Belew, Frank Russell Bennett, Jr., and John Hopkins with the Home Mission Board; Arthur Driscoll, Milt Hughes, Charles M. Roselle and C. Benton Williams with the Sunday School Board; Harry N. Hollis, Jr., with the Christian Life Commission; Findley B. Edge, with Southern Baptist Theological Seminary; and William S. Garmon with Averett College, Danville, Virginia. The plan of using adjunct professors has been so successful that it is being continued with a like number for the next school year.

Guest lecturers for the H. I. Hester Lectureship series on biblical preaching were John Claypool, pastor of the Broadway Baptist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, in 1972; and Leander Keck, professor of New Testament, Candler School of Theology, Atlanta, Georgia, in 1973.

G. Temp Sparkman, Crescent Hill Baptist Church, Louisville, Kentucky, was elected associate professor in the Department of Religious Education and began his teaching responsibilities in August, 1972.

On November 3, 1972, the Board of Trustees unanimously elected Milton Ferguson, a professor for sixteen years at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary as President of Midwestern. He assumed office February 1, 1973.

Millard J. Berquist, President of the Seminary since its founding, was elected by the Trustees as President Emeritus, effective upon the date of his official retirement, August 1, 1972. President Berquist, at the request of the Trustees, continued in service as Acting President of the Seminary through January 31, 1973.

A modular housing project comprised of thirty-five units of two and three bedroom dwellings was completed in 1973. The completion of this project results in a total of 108 housing units for married students and their families helping to meet the critical need for housing due to the continuing increase in student enrolment.

Midwestern Trustees, Administration, Faculty and Student Body are eager to relate positively to the needs, life and fellowship of Southern Baptist churches and their related agencies. Enduring gratitude is expressed for the continuing interest, encouragement and financial support by means of funds provided through the Cooperative Program of our Southern Baptist Convention churches.

NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

First Year Finished Under Revised Curriculum: A group of courses embracing a wide range of subject matter focusing on the Christian Ministry in a modern setting has been developed and is now being required of all students enrolled in Master's degree and Diploma programs of NOBTS. This Basic Studies program has been received with good response.

First Doctor of Ministry Graduates: In graduation exercises May 19th, four men received the new Doctor of Ministry degree, a first in the history of the seminary.

Board of Trustees Approve Changes at NOBTS: Renovation projects estimated at a cost of \$309,000 were approved by NOBTS trustees. A new 18-20,000 square foot addition to the library plus renovation of four other buildings were included in these projects.

New Faculty Members Named: Dr. Bobby Dean Box, formerly pastor of Greenbriar Baptist Church, Arlington, Va., was named Assistant Professor of Old Testament and Dr. Bobby Ell Adams, who previously taught at International Baptist Theological Seminary in Cali, Colombia, South America, was named Associate Professor of Social Ethics.

Staff Changes: Dr. Paul W. Stevens was named Dean of Student Affairs and Director of Field Education and Dr. Paul William Gericke, former director of library services, was named Director of the library.

Increase in Enrollment: The student body enrollment showed an increase of 9.4% over last year's enrollment through the fourth term. NOBTS students represent 32 states and 13 foreign countries.

New Program Introduced: New Orleans Seminary provided two-week study opportunities in January and in May of 1973. These Interterms provide continuing education courses for seminary graduates and enrichment courses for students whose degree work is in progress. Such opportunities will be repeated annually.

SOUTHEASTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Wake Forest North Carolina

This Seminary was established for the education of ministers. Its primary objectives are (1) to facilitate the intellectual and spiritual growth of theological students and (2) to relate academic excellence to competence in Christian ministry. At the center of the seal of the school the founders placed 2 Timothy 3:17: "That the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work."

The pursuit of this purpose has been productive. During the first twenty-one years of its history (1951-1972), the school has required thorough work, and a total of 2,700 degrees and certificates have been awarded to 2,543 graduates. It is notable that 2,151 of the graduates earned the Master of Divinity degree or the Bachelor of Divinity degree.

There is a rising tide of vitality in the school as a whole. This vitality is observable in the growth of the student body, in the search for knowledge, and in creative projects in Christian ministry.

In 1968 the Southern Baptist Convention approved capital funds for this Seminary for the period 1969-1973 in the amount of \$710,000 for two projects: \$650,000 for a reconstructed and enlarged library building and \$60,000 for student housing. It is anticipated that these projects will be completed during the next year.

Thorwald Lorenzen has been elected assistant professor of New Testament. George Wilson is visiting professor of Christian Education this year. Archie Nations and George Shriver are on sabbatical leave. On July 31, 1972, John T. Wayland retired after eighteen years of service as professor of Christian Education.

The enrolment for the 1972 fall semester is 581, an increase of 29 students over the 1971 fall enrolment. The cumulative enrolment for the past academic year was 642.

This school is accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools and is supported by funds from the Cooperative Program of the Southern Baptist Convention. These funds are supplemented by student fees and gifts from alumni and other friends.

On this campus teachers and students appreciate the opportunity to participate in the learning process and to relate Christian wisdom to Christian action in the spirit of Christian love.

THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Louisville, Kentucky

The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary gratefully acknowledges the essential and prayerful support of the churches in the Southern Baptist Convention. Each student on the Louisville campus represents thousands of hours of dedicated service by pastors, Sunday School teachers and others.

Southern Seminary enrolled a record number of regular students in 1972-73. The current total of 1,326 surpassed the previous high of 1,319 established in 1956-57. When special students are added for the current session, the cumulative total is 1,422.

Candidates for the pastorate within the current student body represent a sharp increase over recent years.

Southern Seminary continues to be the most representative of the SBC-related seminaries, with students drawn from 41 states and 14 foreign countries. No single state or region dominates the student body. In fact, the home state of Kentucky produces only 12 per cent of the enrollment. The education advantages of a genuinely inter-regional style are apparent within the life of the seminary.

Carson-Newman College in Tennessee, Samford University in Alabama, and Baylor University in Texas currently claim the largest "alumni chapters" within the seminary student body.

The academic structure at Southern is divided into the Schools of Theology, Church Music and Religious Education.

For the first time, the Doctor of Ministry degree has been offered with 48 students enrolling for the first semester and 66 for the second semester. Approximately 75 per cent of those enrolled are in the functional major of pastor. The second largest category is chaplain-counselor. The Doctor of Ministry program is a vocationally related graduate emphasis designed to better equip various ministers for their service to God within the SBC.

In spite of a large annual gift from the SBC Cooperative Program, Southern Seminary's budget allows for only one-third as much investment in each student as in the average accredited seminary in America. This means much lower faculty salaries than in the typical seminary and not as much flexibility to develop new programs required by the needs of the churches.

The SBC Cooperative Program provides 46 per cent of the total operating budget; 22 per cent comes from auxiliary enterprises; 12 per cent comes from approximately \$10,000,000 of endowment; and 3 per cent comes from other funds functioning as endowment. Student fees provide 10 per cent, with gifts and grants providing 2 per cent. Income from other sources provides 5 per cent.

SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Record fall and spring enrollments, an institutional self-study, an administrative restructuring, new faculty members and the construction of a children's building are the major factors in the annual report of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary for 1972-73.

The 1972 fall enrollment of 2,019 and the 1973 spring enrollment of 1,959 were both all-time records for the seminary. In his report President Robert E. Naylor indicated that "no accredited theological seminary has ever sought to minister to as many bona-fide, full-time students . . ."

Total accumulative enrollment for the academic year was 2,406.

The seminary completed a two-year self-study required by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Trustees voted a restructuring of seminary administration with the creation of four vice presidential posts: administrative affairs, academic affairs, business affairs, and student affairs. Three vice presidents were elected: John Seelig, Jesse Northcutt, and Wayne Evans.

Joe Davis Heacock, who has been on the faculty since 1944 and dean of the School of Religious Education for 17 years retires July 31. Jack Terry will succeed Heacock. Huber Drumwright succeeds Northcutt as dean of the School of Theology.

New faculty members elected during the year include Theodore H. Dowell, professor of psychology and human relations; Clark Dean, assistant professor of social work; Alva Parks, assistant professor of education administration; Derrel Watkins, assistant professor of social work; George Wilson, professor of education administration; Yandall Woodfin, professor of philosophy of the Christian religion; and Larry Baker, assistant professor of Christian ethics and pastoral ministries.

Construction on the Goldia and Robert Naylor Children's Building began in January 1973 with occupancy anticipated for the spring 1974 semester. Price Hall will receive a complete renovation in 1973.

In his outlook for the future, President Naylor predicted a continuing increase in student enrollment and increasing support from the Cooperative Program.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

THE BANK IS TO INVEST THESE FUNDS IN INCOME PRODUCING SECURITIES APPROVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE ARKANSAS BAPTIST FAMILY AND CHILD CARE SERVICES. THIS CONTRACT CAN BE TERMINATED ON REQUEST OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

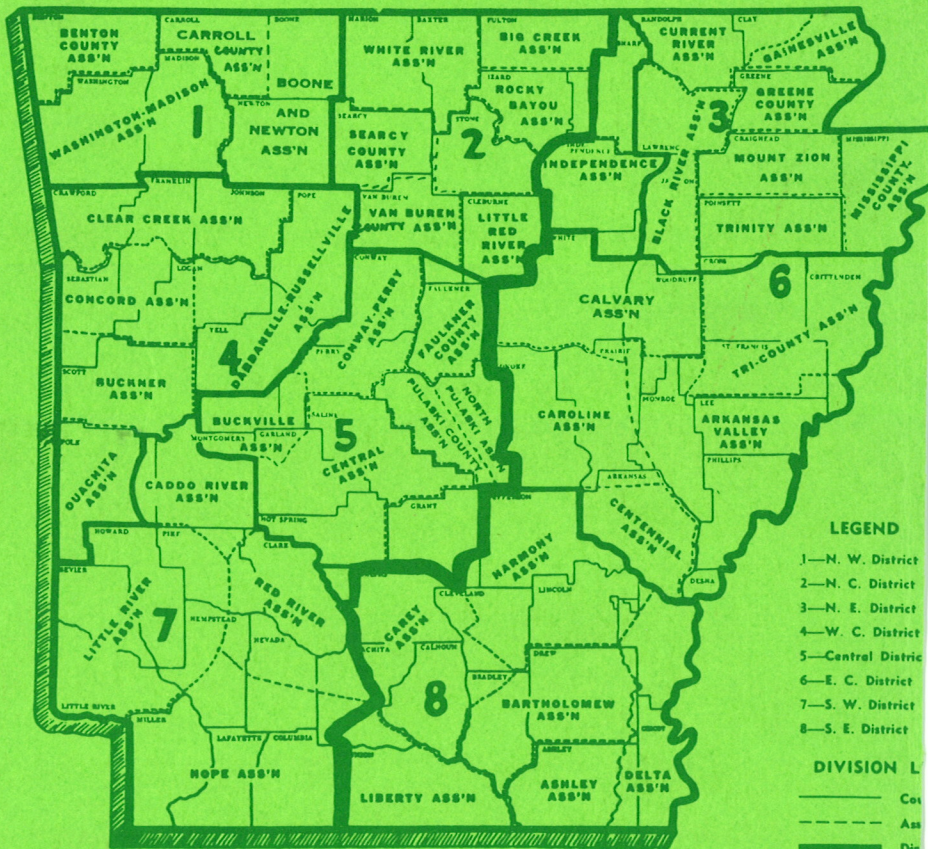
