# CONSTITUTION 

Article I. - The Name

The name of this body shall be "The Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

## Article II. - The Purpose

The purpose of this Convention shall be to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer co-operation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God.

The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention on May 9, 1963, shall be the doctrinal guideline for this Convention.

## Article III. - Membership

Section 1. The Convention shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Convention, and which desire to co-operate with other churches through this Convention.

Regular Baptist churches are those Baptist churches which in doctrine and in practice adhere to the principles and the spirit of The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the 1963 session of the Southern Baptist Convention, and The Baptist Faith and Message shall not be interpreted as to permit open communion and/or alien immersion.

Section 2. Each co-operating church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for each additional one hundred members, or major fraction thereof above one hundred, provided however, that no church shall be entitled to a total of more than ten messengers.

Section 3. The Convention may appoint a committee on credentials at each session which shall make recommendations to the Convention with reference to seating messengers from any church not hitherto affiliated with the Convention.

## Article IV. - Authority

Section 1. While independent and sovereign in its own sphere; this Convention shall never exercise any authority whatever over any churchi', nor shall it in any way interfere with the constitution of any church, or with the exercise of its functions as the only ecclesiastical body, but will cheerfully recognize and uphold the absolute independence of the churches.

## Article V. - Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Each officer of the Convention shall be elected annually, except the Recording Secretary and Treasurer who shall be the same as the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board, and shall continue in office until his successor in office shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the
deliberations of the Convention and to discharge such other duties as may devolve upon the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all committees unless the Convention shall otherwise determine. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in his stead.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of the proceedings of the Convention, to edit and arrange publication of a suitable number of the minutes for distribution among the churches, as the Convention may direct, as soon as reasonably possible after the close of the session. He shall file and keep in order all papers deemed important to the work of the Convention.

## Article VI. - The Executive Board

Section 1. This Convention shall elect a Board of Trustees as provided for in the Convention's charter. This Board shall be known as the "Executive Board of Arkansas Baptist State Convention." This Board shall be composed of one member from the bounds of each co-operating association with a membership up to 5,000 , and one additional member for each additional 5,000 constituency, or major fraction thereof, provided however, that no association shall be entitled to more than five (5) members. In addition, the convention shall elect one lady from the bounds of each of the eight districts in the state to serve on the Executive Board. Upon the removal of any Executive Board member from the bounds of his or her association, his or her membership on the Executive Board ceases therewith; his or her successor in office may be named by the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board to hold office until the next meeting of the Convention. No member of this board shall bold any remunerative office under the Convention or any of its institutions. One-third of this board shall be elected annually to hold office for three years, and a majority of the board members shall constitute a quorum. Any member of the Executive Board who misses all the Executive Board meetings and the Executive Board committee meetings for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on the Board.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall be constituted and empowered by the Convention as its business and legal agent to administer all business committed to it by the Convention, and to employ such paid agents as it may deem necessary in carrying out the missionary, educational, benevolent and financial enterprises of the Convention. The Executive Board shall raise, collect, receive and disburse all the funds of the Baptist Cooperative Program, both state and southwide. The office of the Executive Board shall be a clearing house for administering the business affairs of the Convention, and a headquarters for Baptist information. Its books, records and files shall at all time be open for the reference and inspection of any co-operating church which may desire to examine them.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall render to the Convention annually a complete and detailed statement of all its business for the year.

## Article VII. - Trusteeships

The Convention shall elect trustees to manage and to operate institutions and agencies it may possess, as follows:

Section 1. Ouachita Baptist University, 24; Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services, 18; Baptist Memorial Hospital (Memphis,) 9; Southern Baptist College, 24; Arkansas Baptist Foundation, 15.

Section 2. One-third of the members of the Boards of Trustees shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. Any member of any Board
of Trustees who misses all the meetings of that Board for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on that Board.

Section 3. Each Board of Trustees shall elect from their membership a chairman and a recording secretary and such other officers as seems advisable.

Section 4. All trusteeships shall render to the Convention at each annual session complete and detailed reports of all transactions and business and any other activities for the year, and shall be subject to the direction of the Convention in all matters pertaining to administering the affairs of the institution with which their trusteeship is concerned.

## Article VIII. - Operation of Agencies

Section 1. Each board, agency, and institution of this Convention shall submit to the Executive Board at its annual budget planning meeting, which is to be held prior to the annual meeting of the Convention, a detailed statement of its sources of income, and a budget of proposed expenditures for the ensuing year. When received and adopted by the Convention, these budgets shall become the basis for the operations for the ensuing year.

## Article IX. - Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall meet annually, "if God permit," on a date to be fixed by the Convention. The Executive Board is empowered in emergencies to call special sessions of the Convention and to change either the time or place of meeting or both should the occasion demand.

## Article X. - Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of this Convention, two-thirds of the members voting concurring in the measure, except Article IV which shall remain forever unalterable in substance.

Section 2. Any proposed amendment to this Constitution shall be presented to the Convention in writing, for its consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, and may be voted on, on any subsequent day during the session, provided adequate publicity has been given in previous announcement.

## Article XI. - Parliamentary Authority

Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard for deciding questions of parliamentary procedure.

## Article XII. - Districts

The Convention shall establish such geographic districts as it may deem wise to facilitate its promotion, administration, and organization of its objectives, provided, it will never violate in any way the boundaries of any association within the area of the convention. The boundaries of such districts shall be drawn so as to provide equitable geographical and numerical voice and representation on all convention committees, commissions, boards, except the Executive Board, all trusteeships. Each tenth year hereafter, the whole matter of districts shall be readjusted to take in consideration the flow of membership in our Baptist churches.

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are enacted for the government of the Convention.

## 1. Enrollment of Messengers

The Secretary of the Convention shall enroll, upon arrival, messengers who present proper credentials from the churches. These messengers, together with others who may be enrolled upon presentation of approved credentials during the session, shall constitute the Convention. Any contention conceming seating messengers shall be presented to a committee appointed by the President for recommendation to the Convention for its action.

## 2. Officers

The President, First Vice-President, and Second Vice-President shall be elected on the second day of the Convention, their terms of office to begin with the final session of the Convention.

The election of all officers shall be by ballot; provided, however, there is only one nomination for the office, then the Secretary or any other present may be directed to cast the ballot of the entire assembly for the single nominee.

The first vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after balloting for the president has been completed and the winner announced, and the second vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after the balloting for the first vice president has been completed and the winner announced.

Each officer of the Convention shall be elected by a majority of all votes cast.

In case of removal from office, by death or otherwise, of the President, the Vice-Presidents shall automatically succeed to the office of President in the order of their election. The President may not be elected for more than two consecutive terms.

The Treasurer of the Executive Board shall be also Treasurer of the Convention.

All elected officers of this Convention shall be members of churches co-operating with this Convention. This must also apply to members of the Executive Board and the institutional boards of this Convention.

## 3. The Executive Board

The Executive Board, being the legal trustee of the Convention, shall be empowered by the Convention to administer all business committed to it by the Convention.

The Executive Board is empowered to act for the Convention between sessions of the Convention, provided that it shall never exercise any authority contrary to the expressed will of the Convention.

When any unforeseen emergency occurs in any of the affairs of the Convention, or in any of the interest it controls, that in the judgment of the Executive Board requires action before the next session of the Convention, the Executive Board shall have full authority to take such action as may seem necessary, and all interests concerned shall be governed by such action, provided the Executive Board shall make full report of all matters pertaining thereunto to the next session of the Convention for its approval, and
provided further, that nothing in this article shall be construed as giving the Executive Board authority to execute any matter already committed by the Convention to any of its Boards of Trustees or its institutions unless such Board when so commissioned shall decline to act on the orders of the Convention.

All proposals requiring the expenditures of money by the Convention, or the Executive Board of the Convention, from the annual budget, shall be considered by the Executive Board, before being presented to the Convention.

This Board shall be charged with the responsibility to have the books and financial affairs of each and all of the boards and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention audited annually by an accredited firm of auditors, all audits to be accessible to the Executive Board at its budiet planning session, and to be included in the institution's report to the Convention.

Members of the Executive Board, having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

The various associations of Arkansas whose churches are affiliated with this Convention, may submit to the committee on nominations names of those whom they believe should be considered for membership on the Executive Board as members from that association.

## 4. Trusteeships

All trusteeships of this Convention shall be amenable to the Convention on all matters, through its Executive Board. No trusteeship shall conduct extra movements to raise money outside its regular revenue-producing sources, nor shall a deficit in running expense or debt be incurred without the approval of the Convention in session or of the Executive Board in case of aforementioned emergencies, except, as follows: when an emergency arises concerning the opportunity to purchase needed property for expansion, the president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board and the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board (all three concurring) believing such an emergency exists and deeming it wise to incur indebtedness, may give the Trustees of an institution such permission, and make a full report to the Executive Board and to the next Convention in session.

Members of Boards of Trustees having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

Not more than two (2) members of a Board of Trustees shall at the same time be members of the same local church, nor shall more than six (6) members reside in any one association.

A member of a Board of Trustees of one institution of the Convention may not at the same time be a member of any other Board of Trustees of another institution of the Convention.

No member of a Board of Trustees of any institution of this Convention may at the same time be a member of the Executive Board of the Convention.

## 5. Committee Members

1. A nine-member rotating Nominating Committee, comprised of at least three laymen, will place in nomination at each annual convention names of persons to fill vacancies on all convention boards. At each annual convention, the president will appoint one-third of this committee to three-year terms to replace the one-third rotating off, plus filling any vacancies that may exist on the committee at that time. Nominations for all boards from this Nominating Committee must be as equitably divided as possible between the eight existing districts of our state conventior. The president shall also name the chairman, who shall come from a one-year term member.
2. A member filling an unexpired term not having served the full term of years as provided by the Constitution, shall be, at the discretion of the Nominating Committee, eligible for election to a full term.
3. No member of a commission or committee delegated to study or make recommendations concerning our institutions shall be a member of any Board of Trustees of such institutions.
4. All associational missionaries or mission pastors receiving all or part compensation from the Convention through the Executive Board shall be considered employees of the Convention and shall not be members of any Convention or institutional board. The president of the Convention by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Board for the duration of his term of office.

## 6. Constitution and By-Laws Committee

A standing Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be composed of six (6) members to be nominated by the Nominating Committee. One-third of the membership (2) shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three (3) years. No member shall be eligible to serve more than two terms until one year has elapsed.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of advising the presiding officer concerning constitutional matters during the annual session of the convention with reference to matters which may arise from the floor or from other committees. The committee will act ad interim in all matters concerning the Constitution and By-Laws referred to it by the boards and agencies of the convention. The committee will receive all proposed constitutional changes before the convention and will be responsible for presenting them in writing, for convention consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, after adequate publicity has been given. The duties of the committee in no way preclude amendments to the constitution by messengers to the convention.

1. Doctrinal Guidelines (1970 Annual, page 61)

Report of the Committee of Twenty-Five adopted, including the recommendation that the SBC statement of faith of 1963, The Baptist Faith and Message, be adopted as doctrinal guidelines for our convention.
2. Appendices (1967 annual, page 40)

Resolution adopted that a search be made of the minutes of the convention to discover policies and interpretations which have been adopted in past years, and these interpretations and policies be added at the end of the constitution and by laws of the convention as appendices.
3. Church Ordinances (1965 annual, page 31)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, in the past, the most general interpretation of the New Testament, and the most general interpretation of the Word 'principles' as it is used in Article 3, Section 1 , of our constitution, and the most prevalent practice of Baptist churches in Arkansas with reference to the church ordinances, has been what is commonly called "close baptism" and "close communion", and

Whereas, it is recorded on page 57 of the minutes of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention meeting in Fort Smith in 1937 that the Convention officially objected to the teaching of alien immersion and open communion in one of our seminaries, thereby establishing a precedence for future conventions, therefore,

Be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in its 112 th annual session, go on record as objecting to the reception of alien immersion and the practice of open communion, and

Be it further resolved that we urge churches everywhere to re-examine the New Testament teaching on baptism and the Lord's Supper.
4. Federal Aid (1965 annual, page 43)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, Arkansas Baptists have been faced with the issue of Federal aid to private institutions, and, whereas, many feel that the acceptance of such funds violates the cherished Baptist position of the separation of church and state, therefore, be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention go on record as reaffirming our traditional Baptist position on the separation of church and state, and that we urge all of our Baptist institutions and programs to respect this principle.
5. Executive Board Recommendations (1963 annual, page 35)

Voted that all recommendations of the Executive Board shall be published in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine one month prior to the meeting of the state convention.
6. Book of Reports (1959 annual, page 28)

Voted that the convention constitution and by-laws be printed each year in the Book of Reports for the convenience of our messengers.
7. Baptist Memorial Hospital Trustees (1959 annual, page 29)

Voted that the members of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, not be included in the ruling which would prevent their serving on this board and one other convention board.
8. Capital Indebtedness (1959 annual, page 30)

Voted that all requests for capital indebtedness by any convention institution or agency must be submitted to the Executive Board at least 90 days in advance of the July meeting of the Executive Board.
9. Out-of-state participation by Executive Board staff (1953 annual, page 22)

Voted that we recommend the Cooperative Program as the best method of giving financial support to the Baptist work at home and abroad. We discourage any of the departments of our Arkansas Baptist work in accepting invitations to participate in the work of missions outside of our regular work within our state territory, at the expense of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention Departments involved. Further, we request our Executive Secretary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the President of the Executive Board confer with the heads of all Southern Baptist agencies expressing our concern about the practices of asking State Convention departments to give employees to such efforts outside our state, unless expenses and salaries are provided for by the agencies that use such workers.
10. Seating of Messengers (1949 annual, page 92)

Resolution adopted that this convention refuse to seat any messengers from any church that accepts alien immersion; practices open communion; or affiliates with any branch of the Federal Council of Churches, World Council of Churches; or any other organization similar to or growing out of such.

# THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE 

## I. THE SCRIPTURES

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is the record of God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. It reveals the principles by which God judges us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. The criterion by which the Bible is to be interpreted is Jesus Christ.

## II. GOD

There is one and only one living and true God. He is an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Redeemer, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe. God is infinite in holiness and all other perfections. To Him we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. The eternal God reveals Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

## A. God the Father

God as Father reigns with providential care over His universe, His creatures, and the flow of the stream of human history according to the purposes of His grace. He is all powerful, all loving, and all wise. God is Father in truth to those who become children of God through faith in Jesus Christ. He is fatherly in His attitude toward all men.

## B. God the Son

Christ is the eternal Son of God. In His incarnation as Jesus Christ he was conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. Jeaus perfectly revealed and did the will of God, taking upon Himself the demands and necessities of human nature and identifying Himself completely with mankind yet without sin. He honored the divine law by His personal obedience, and in His death on the cross He made
provision for the redemption of men from sin. He was raised from the dead with a glorified body and appeared to His disciples as the person who was with them before His crucifixion. He ascended into heaven and is now exalted at the right hand of God where He is the One Mediator, partaking of the nature of God and of man, and in whose Person is effected the reconciliation between God and man. He will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission. He now divells in all believers as the living and ever present Lord.

## III. MAN

Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human
personality is evident in that Cod created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore every man possesses dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

## IV. SALVATION

Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace. Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God Falth is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the cntire personality to llim as lord and Saviour Justification is Cond's gracious and full acquittal upon primeqpes of His rightersusness of all simers who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer into a relationship of peace and favor with Cod.
13. Sanctification is the evperience, begiming in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to Cod's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual perfertion through the presence and power of the Hold Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate nerson's life.
C. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abirling state of the redeemed.

fied by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they griese the Spirt, impair their graces and comforts, bring reproach on the cause of Christ, and temporal judgments on themselves, yet they shall be kept by the power of God through fath unto salvation.

## VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

It is an act of obedience symbolizug the believer's faith in a cracified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to $\sin$, the buriai of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ lesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

## XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

## XII. EDUCATION

The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proprortionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

## XIV. COOPERATION

Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denomanations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-
operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

## XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and H . has left it frec from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

# FIRST DAY - EVENING SESSION 

Tuesday, November 16, 1976
(Enrollment of messengers - Committees appointed)

1. The One Hundred Twenty-third Session (128th Year) of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in Park Hill Baptist Church, North Little Rock, was opened at 6:30 p.m. with R. Wilbur Herring, Jonesboro, presiding. The theme for the convention was "The Church Ministering" depicting the church as "a lighthouse on the hill of knowledge and a beacon in the valley of despair." The scripture was Ephesians 4:11-12, "And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ." The music for the convention was coordinated by Ervin Keathley, Little Rock. Joe Santo, Pine Bluff, was organist and Tim Blann, Little Rock, pianist, for the opening session.
2. The meeting opened with the Singing Men of Arkansas in concert, directed by Ervin Keathley. The messengers were led in singing "Come Christians Join to Sing." Prayer was by Harold White, Pine Bluff.

Ron Dunn, Life Style Ministries, Irving, Texas brought the first of five Bible study periods from II Cor. 2:12-17.

## Voted: To Seat Messengers

5. W. H. Jenkins, Atkins, moved that we seat only the messengers from regular Baptist churches whose policies, statements and practices are in agreement with the constitution as listed in the Book of Reports, page 4, Article III, Section 1, paragraph 2. Second and carried.

The question was raised by Brother Jenkins as to how the convention would determine whether messengers are representing such churches.

## Voted: Committee to assist Churches reported not in agreement in Policy, Statement, Practice

The president entertained the following motion, made by W. H. Jenkins:
I move that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention authorize and instruct the president of this convention along with the Credentials Committee appointed in this session to visit any and all

> churches who are not complying with Article III, Section 1 of the Constitution of the convention and to assist the church or churches to full compliance with both statement and practice with this portion of the constitution and to report to the convention in 1977 those churches who have failed to so comply that they may not be seated.

Second by Don Moore. J. T. Harvill objected to the portion of the motion involving the seating of messengers in the 1977 convention. Brother Jenkins and Brother Moore agreed to strike that portion and it was carried as thus corrected.

## Voted: To affirm previous actions before seating messengers

Kenneth Threet moved that actions taken by the convention before the body was constituted be affirmed, the appointment of committees and the adoption of the order of business. Second and carried.

Andrew Setliffe, Little Rock, president, Exccutive Board, requested the messengers to read the Executive Board Recommendations concerning the 1977 budget and the Annuity Agreement before the Wednesday afternoon session to save time during the time for the Executive Board for discussion on other items.
6. With John E. Miller, Melbourne, Second Vice President, presiding, the call was given for the reading of resolutions and proposed amendments to the Constitution. The following resolutions were read and referred to the Resolutions Committee: (1) John Finn, Harrison, resolution concerning messengers to the Arkansas Constitutional Convention; (2) David Wood, Harrison, concerning the sale of alcohol in public and private facilities in dry counties; (3) Larry Stevens, Centerton, resolution on financing the Lord's work; and (4) W. O. Vaught, Jr., Little Rock, Resolution on proposed goals for Ouachita Baptist University's Centennial Decade, 1976-1986.

Don Hook, Little Rock, chairman, Constitution and Bylaws Committee, read a proposed amendment to the constitution which was referred to the committee by the 1975 convention in session:
"That Constitution Bylaws 2, paragraph 5, sentence 2, be amended to read: 'The president may not be elected for more than one consecutive term and will be elected from the floor.' "

The Committee on Order of Business was instructed to set the time for voting on the proposed amendment.
7. Ervin Keathley led the messengers in singing "I Am Resolved." Special music was one selection by the Singing Women of Arkansas directed by Jean Pilcher, Little Rock, and the Singing Men and Women of Arkansas in a medley directed by Ervin Keathley.

John E. Miller, Second Vice President, introduced our president, R. Wilbur Herring, for the message of the hour, the President's Address, "Our Major Distinctives." Closing prayer was by Johnny Jackson, Little Rock.

10. The Arkansas Baptist Foundation report was presented by Harry Trulove, president, and Carbon Sims, member of the Board of Directors. The four recommendations were adopted as follows on motions by Carbon Sims, second and carried:
(1) That the 1977 earned income from undesignated receipts be distributed through the Cooperative Program, Arkansas Baptist State Convention.
(2) That the Arkansas Baptist Foundation be authorized, without requiring that it be immediately implemented, to amend Paragraph 2 of its Charter to allow the Foundation to hereafter manage endowment funds for any benevolent, charitable, educational or missionary undertaking, institution, or agency.
(3) That the Arkansas Baptist Foundation be authorized to amend Paragraph 7 of its Charter to conform with the expansion of the Board of the Foundation as approved in the 1974 convention.
(4) That the bylaws of the Arkansas Baptist Foundation be updated and amended. (see page 96)

Harry Trulove spoke to the report briefly followed by testimonies concerning the work of Arkansas Baptist Foundation: David Posey, Little Rock, a medical missions scholarship recipient; Jack Nicholas, Walnut Ridge, representing Arkarssas and Southern Baptist agencies benefiting from gifts and earnings; and Ernest Ward, Little Rock, representing donors.

## Voted: To elect President

11. President Herring called for nominations for president of the convention. Ledell Bailey, Paragould, placed in nomination the name of R. Wilbur Herring for a second term. With James A. Walker, Warren, First Vice President, presiding, Kenneth Threet moved that Dr. Herring be elected by acclamation. Second, carried. The convention clerk, Nadine Bjorkman, North Little Rock, cast the vote of the convention for Dr. Herring.

## Voted: To elect First Vice President

The president called for nominations for first vice president. Woodrow Nutt, Monticello, nominated Carl Overton, Hot Springs. Winfred Bridges, Bentonville nominated H. D. McCarty, Fayetteville. Ballot No. 1 was designated for voting. Carl Overton was elected first vice president by ballot.
12. Harold Bailey, vice president, Annuity Board SBC, presented a service award to Thurman K. Rucker, Annuity field representative in Arkansas since 1969 who will be retiring on December 31, 1976.

## Voted: To Table Proposed Constitutional Amendment

A proposed amendment to the constitution to limit the term of the president to one year which was referred from the 1975 convention was read by Don Hook, chairman, Constitution and Bylaws Committee. J. C. Myers, North Little Rock, moved the proposed amendment be tabled. Second, carried.

American Bible Society representative, H. Shaw Scates, Memphis, was recognized for brief greetings.

## Voted: Committee to Study Constitution

13. Oscar N. Golden, Benton, moved "that a committee of three pastors, three laymen, and two ladies, who are not members of the Executive Board, be appointed by the president of the state convention; the purpose of this committee will be to make a study of the constitution and bylaws of our convention to determine the power that the executive board has to spend money and transact business that has not been authorized by the convention at its annual meeting. The committee will make its report together with any recommendations considered necessary at the 1977 convention." Second. Brother Golden spoke to the motion. The motion was carried.

## Voted: To Elect Second Vice President

14. President Herring called for nominations for Second Vice President. Those nominated were Homer Shirley, Crossett, and Don Dunavant, Jonesboro. Ballot No. 2 was designated for voting. Homer Shirley was elected second vice president by ballot.

Voted: To Request Quiet in Foyer During Sessions
Johnny Jackson, Jr., Chidester, attending his first convention, read the following motion and moved its adoption:

> "Whereas the W'ord of God exhorts us to do all things decently and in order; and whereas, the "talkathon" which persists in the foyer during our sessions is discourteous to our speakers and dishonoring to our convention, I move that the foyer be declared an inappropriate area for such conversational visiting during convention sessions and that those who wish to visit be instructed by this assembly to do so outside the building, or in areas of the building remote from the sanctuary. I urge the seconding and passage of this motion in the interest of courtesy and order.

The motion was seconded and carried.
15. Edward W. Harris, executive director, Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, spoke briefly to the report in the Book of Reports. Ronnie Sparks, educational assistant, was introduced and requested that he be allowed to assist the churches, schools, civic organizations by invitations to speak on his work on alcohol-narcotics education program.
16. Ervin Kcathley led the messengers in singing, "Teach Me, O Lord, to Care". President Herring led in prayer. Roy Chatham, Magnolia, brought special music, "Lovest Thou Me More 'Than These."

The Annual Sermon was by Loyd Hunnicutt, Magnolia, "Like a River Glorious" with the text from Ezekiel 47:1-9. The session was dismissed in prayer by Conway Sawyers, El Dorado.

Ray Wells, Smackover, moved the 1977 budget be adopted as recommended:

The motion was seconded. Raymond Reed, Warren, moved to amend the budget for Annuity to restore the total provisions of salary, housing and travel listed in the 1976 budget with the intention of continuing the position of a field representative in Annuity programs. The move to amend was seconded. The budget as proposed for Annuity provided a lesser amount for the operating budget with a minimum of travel but with full time office in the Baptist Building with Nadine Bjorkman as Annuity Representative. There was discussion. The amendment was defeated. The motion to adopt the budget as recommended was carried. (see page 61)

## Voted: Third Century Endowment Campaign For Student Work

Cline Ellis moved that the Baptist Student Union be authorized to launch a Third Century Endowment Campaign, with a goal of one million dollars, with earnings to be used for Baptist Student ministry. Second. In response to questions by Charles Mayo, Benton, and Loyd Hunnicutt, Magnolia, the plan was further explained, the projected calendar calls for solicitation of individuals in 1977 and to go to the churches in 1978. The funds will be placed with the Arkansas Baptist Foundation where a small endowment for Baptist Student work is set up. Motion was carried.

## Voted: To Cancel Plans For Proposed Building

Andrew Setliffe moved that plans for the proposed eight level structure at Sixth and Arch be approved at the estimated cost of $\$ 3,650,000$. Second. At the request of President Herring, Roy F. Lewis spoke to the proposal. Plansfor the building and proposed financing were explained with the use of an overhead projector.

A lengthy discussion followed. Opposition was expressed by Kendall Black, Conway and Oscar Golden, Benton. Tom Jones, layman from Geyer Springs, spoke for the proposal. John Maddox, Wynne, inquired about the tax liability and whether the cost estimate was a firm figure.

## Voted: To Extend The Time For Discussion

The time allowed for the Executive Board report was used. Don Hook moved the time be extended twenty minutes for discussion. The president ruled that the call for "question" was not the "move for previous question" required to close debate. The motion to extend time for debate was carried. President Herring announced that the preferred item set for four o'clock, a message by Jack Stanton, would be honored.

As discussion on the building proposal continued Bill Probasco, Conway; W. O. Vaught Jr., Little Rock; and Don Moore, Fort Smith, spoke against the proposal. Those speaking for the recommendation were Don Fuller, Brinkley, who served as chairman of the parking lot development committee; Elmer Griever, Jr., Berryville, and T. K. Rucker, Little Rock, who appealed for unity after the vote.

There was a move for previous question, second, carried. Ballot No. 3 was designated for voting for or against the proposal. The vote recorded was 614 against, 217 for, thus cancelling the board's proposal to build.

Nathan Porter, Arkadelphia, requested the president to express for the convention an apology to Tom Jones and beg his forgiveness for the discourtesy shown by some of the messengers during his appeal for approval of the project. The president so agreed.
20. Laverne F. Pickett Jr. and "Unity" opened the worship time of the session. The message was by Jack Stanton, Bolivar, Missouri, "The Church Ministering to the World Through Evangelism and Missions" with a text from Mark 16:15.

The session was dismissed in prayer by Larry Baker, Fayetteville.

# SECOND DAY - EVENING SESSION

(Christian Education Emphasis - Life and Liberty Report)
21. The meeting on Wednesday evening was a joint session with the messengers from Arkansas Baptist State Convention, The Consolidated Baptist

State Convention, and the Regular Arkansas Missionary Baptist State Convention meeting together for the first time in history. The meeting was held at Barton Coliseum, Little Rock, where more than three thousand persons from the three conventions gathered at 6:30 p.m. The three convention presidents shared the presiding officer's chair, R. Wilbur Herring along with P. J. James, Blytheville, Consolidated; and G. R. Mazique, Helena, Regular.

Dr. Herring called the meeting to order and Ervin Keathley led the messengers in singing the Life and Liberty Hymn. Accompaniment was provided by the Ouachita Band directed by Charles Wright, Arkadelphia. O. C. Jones, North Little Rock, led in opening prayer. Ron Dunn led in the Bible study from Phil. 1:27-30.
22. P. J. James presided during an emphasis on Christian education. Institutions represented and recognized were: Morris Booker Memorial College, Dermott, York Williams, president; Southern Baptist College, Walnut Ridge, Jack Nicholas, president; Arkansas Baptist College, Little Rock, J. C. Oliver, president; and Ouachita Baptist University, Arkadelphia, Dan Grant, president. Each of the college presidents spoke briefly and each school choir presented musical selections.
23. G. R. Mazique presided during the time allotted for the report on the Life and Liberty Campaign which was the Bicentennial effort of all three conventions emphasizing evangelism and patriotism with R. Wilbur Herring, chairman. Ervin Keathley led in singing "To God Be the Glory." Don Moore, who served as vice chairman, reported 596 Arkansas Baptist State Convention churches reported revivals with 3,103 professions of faith and 2,500 baptisms during the simultaneous revivals in the spring. Total baptisms for the year are expected to exceed 13,000 . Reports from the National Baptist churches were not complete.
W. Russell Miller, Mountain Home, reported on outreach activities during the year and a testimony of conversion was given by Mrs. Jean Ford, Little Rock, who had been employed by the television ministry during the campaign. The report on the Life and Liberty Campaign was concluded by a visual presentation with taped narration prepared by Marvin Black, Magnolia, and Tom J. Logue, Little Rock.
24. The messengers were led in singing "Amazing Grace". The closing message for the evening was by Grady Cothen, president, Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee, "'The Church Ministering Through Education and Training."

The session was dismissed in prayer by T. W. Barnes, Newport.

# THIRD DAY - MORNING SESSION

25. The final session of the Onc Hundred Twenty Third meeting of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention was opened at 8:45 a.m. at Park Hill Baptist Church, North Little Rock, with organ and piano prelude by Tim Blann, Little Rock, at the organ and Roger Copeland, Little Rock, pianist. Phil Lineberger, Little Rock, led in opening prayer.

The Bible study for the final session by Ron Dunn was from Exodus 15:22-27.
26. Charles H. Ashcraft, executive secretary, brought a message to the convention from Heb. 6:1.

## Voted: To Adopt Report on Resolutions

27. The report on Resolutions was read by Paul Dodd, chairman. Resolutions No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 were read and Paul Dodd moved they be adopted. Second and carried.

## No. 1, Appreciation to Host Church

WHEREAS, the Arkansas Baptist State Convention has enjoyed the comfort, convenience, congeniality and cooperation of the people and facilities of the Park Hill Baptist Church, North Little Rock, as our host during this one hundred twenty-third annual session,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we express our warmest appreciation to the pastor, Dr. Cary Heard, the staff and members of Park Hill Baptist Church for their significant contribution to the life of this convention.

## No. 2, Appreciation to Convention Officers and Program Committee

WHEREAS, we have received spiritual blessings in an atmosphere of Christian love and fellowship, and

WHEREAS, we recognize the excellent job that has been done by Wilbur Herring, Charles Ashcraft, the Program Committee and other officers of our convention.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we express to these, our colaborers in Christ, our sincere appreciation for the fine way in which they have led our convention.

## No. 3, Concerning The Life and Liberty Campaign

WHEREAS, our nation's Bicentennial year of 1976 saw the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, the Regular Arkansas Missionary Baptist Convention and the Consolidated Missionary Baptist Convention engaged in a united effort to share the message of Christ in Arkansas through the Lifc and Liberty Campaign, and

WHEREAS, the Life and Liberty Campaign has confronted men, women and children of Arkansas with the message of salvation through Jesus Christ, by every available means of communication, and

WHEREAS, there are many encouraging indications of a genuine moving of the Holy Spirit in our state,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we express our sincere appreciation to the ' 76 Life and Liberty Campaign Stecring Committee and its General Chairman, R. Wilbur Herring, and the leaders of our Statc Convention, for the excellent manner in which they coordinated events of the Campaign, and for effectively conducting the special events associated with the Campaign, and to the many churches across the State of Arkansas that accepted the opportunity to be part of this joint witnessing endeavor for Christ, and to all who individually and collectively made this Bicentennial year a time of personal encounter with Christ as Saviour and Lord.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we, the messengers of this convention, recommit ourselves and that we lead Arkansas Baptists to recommit themselves to the main task of leading people to a personal commitment to Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, and that we encourage our convention to
continue the emphasis of evangelism and commitment that has been inspired by the Life and Liberty Campaign.

Motion by Paul Dodd to adopt Resolution No. 4 was seconded, carried.

## No. 4, Election of Christian Delegates to Constitutional Convention

WHEREAS, the voters of the State of Arkansas have called for a constitutional convention, and

WHEREAS, Christian pcople should be interested in the well being of their neighbors, and

WHEREAS, a new constitution for the State of Arkansas will affect all of us.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the messengers of this convention be encouraged to seck out Christians from their areas to run as delegates to this convention in the next election and that we support their work with our prayers.

Motion to adopt Resolution No. 5 was seconded and carried.

## No. 5, Permitting Alcohol in Diy Counties

WHEREAS, in view of the ncwspaper reports of the May 17 th meeting of The Arkansas State Economic Dcvelopment Study Commission which records the unanimous recommendations to be presented to the Governor and General Assembly on October 1st.
> "It is recommended that both public and private overnight recreational facilities located in a dry county be declared exempt from the law prohibiting the sale of alcoholic beverages; State laws should be changed so that alcohol can be served at public and privatc overnight recreational facilities located in dry counties; The change would allow these facilities, including all of the stateowned park lodges, to compcte for conventions and business group meetings during the winter to help offset high overhead cost."

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we, the Messengers to the 123 rd Session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention respectfully request the Governor of Arkansas, the Honorable David Pryor, the members of the Legislative Council of the General Assembly, the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of Arkansas to oppose as economically unnecessary and morally indefensible any legislative attempts to exempt public or private recreational facilities in dry counties from compliance with the existing Statutes governing Alcoholic Beverages in the State of Arkansas.

FURTHER WE RESOLVE that all efforts to involve the State of Arkansas in the granting or holding of permits for the sale of alcoholic bevcrages on State owned or State leased property be opposed as attempts to make the State of Arkansas a "Pusher" for the drug called alcohol, recognized generally as the number one drug problem of America.

FURTHER WE RESOLVE that no legislation should be considered that would negate or deny the votes recorded by the
citizens of dry counties under Initiated Act Number 1 of 1942, thereby choosing to make 44 counties of Arkansas "Dry".

FURTHER WE RESOLVE that alcoholic beverages should not be used as enticement in seeking the "economic development of our state".

FURTHER WE RESOLVE that recognition be given to the fact that Tourism in Arkansas has grown in dollar volume until it is the third largest industry in Arkansas, reaching this high goal during the 34 years that 44 of our counties have been officially "Dry".

THEREFORE WE RESPECTFULLY REQUEST the Governor, The Legislative Council, and the members of The General Assembly to reject that portion of the report of The Arkansas State Economic Development Study Commission which deals with the exemption of State and Private Recreational facilities in dry counties from present State Laws governing Alcoholic Beverages in the State of Arkansas.

Motion and second to adopt Resolution No. 6 on proposed goals for Ouachita Baptist University Centennial Decade, 1976-1986. A question was asked whether this resolution calls for or is for the purpose of a fund-raising campaign for Ouachita. Dr. Grant replied that approval was not committing the convention to such a fund-raising effort. The motion was carried.

## No. 6, Proposed Goals for Ouachita Baptist University Centennial Decade, 1976-1986.

WHEREAS, the future of Ouachita Baptist University means so much to the life and work of Arkansas Baptists,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we endorse the following goals recommended by Ouachita Baptist University and distributed to the messengers of the convention.

Having been led, in 1970-71, as we believe, by the providential guidance of God to plan for the future of Christian higher education in Arkansas; and, having been blessed beyond our most optimistic hopes; and, having been led to the conclusion that Christian higher education will be of even more critical importance in the third century of the life of our nation; we therefore resolve to seek to achieve the "Goals for Ouachita" as stated herein during the decade, 1976-86, which decade will culminate in the celebration of Ouachita Baptist University's one hundredth year in 1986. We adopt these goals with full realization that, having come thus far by faith, we must exercise even more faith in the leadership and blessings of our Lord toward the accomplishment of the goals, and for their accomplishment, we must give to Him the glory and honor due.

## Goals for Ouachita

1. Reaffirmation and strengthening of Ouachita's Christian distinctives and role in service to the denomination.
2. Strengthening and improvement of Ouachita's unique combination of liberal arts education and career preparation in such ways that both values are maximized to the benefit of the student and the world of work.
3. Establishment of a comprehensive faculty and administrative development program to help the individual members fulfill their responsi-
4. Commitment to maintenance of diversity within the student body with reference to race, academic attainment and potential, geographic and national origin, and career goals.
5. Improvement of faculty and staff salaries, teaching load and other working conditions to exceed the level of state colleges in Arkansas and comparable private universities and colleges in the region.
6. Maximum development of the beauty and usefulness of the Ouachita campus, with special emphasis on relating the physical facilities to the unique potential of the Ouachita River, ravine, and other natural environmental resources.
7. Commitment to working with Arkansas Baptist churches and convention leadership to:
(1) Increase Cooperative Program giving to all Arkansas Baptist causes, including Christian higher education, with a resulting continuation and improvement of the annual rate of increase ( $10 \%$ ) experienced during 1970-75.
(2) Encourage churches and individuals to continue and improve the level of "over and above" gifts to special causes within Christian higher education, such as church scholarships for worthy young people from their congregations and endowments.
8. Strengthening and broadening the existing programs of faculty research stimulation by providing increased incentives and support for the kind of research that enriches the educational experiences of the students, and that relates uniquely to the resources and needs of our region and to Ouachita's institutional distinctives.
9. Commitment to the concept of a "24-hour-day" education for all Ouachita students, with increased provision for creative ways to interrelate their classroom and extra-classroom educational experiences.
10. Provision of increased opportunities for the growth and development of the Ouachita "family" relationship through encouragement of interpersonal relationships between all members.

## Conclusion

The "Goals for Ouachita" previously stated reflect three basic emphases. The first is the obvious commitment of the institution to retain and build upon its affirmation of its Christian distinctiveness, and, deliberately and diligently to promote those programs, attitudes and actions which unapologetically emphasize such a commitment. The determination to be an institution under the Lordship of Jesus Christ is clearly reflected in the goals.

The second is a greater emphasis on quality than on quantity. This emphasis includes the quality of faculty and staff members employed, the programs to be promoted, and the level of student leadership to be sought. The implications are that no rapid expansion in enrollment will be sought, and no proliferation of courses of study on a large scale will be undertaken. The aim is to do a limited number of things extremely well, but not to attempt to do more things than the resources of the institution can support adequately.

The third basic emphasis follows the first and second quite naturally. In addition to construction of additional buildings which are needed, an
increasing emphasis will be placed on endowment and other non-brick-andmortar purposes. It is anticipated that, among the buildings to be constructed, there will be a new auditorium, expanded health, physical education and recreation space, library space, and other projects of high priority. Scholarships, endowed chairs of instruction, endowed programs of religious activities, instructional enrichment programs, and other ingredients of improvement in the quality of the program will also be emphasized.
28. Johnny Biggs, Little Rock, executive director, brought the report of the Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services.

Ervin Keathley led the messengers in singing "Do You Really Care?"
29. The president called for items in miscellaneous business.

## Voted: To Adopt Amended Report of Nominating Committee

Cline Ellis brought the amended report for the Convention Nominating Committee and moved to adopt. Second and carried.

## Voted: To Adopt Report of Credentials Committee

Mason Craig, chairman, read the following report of the Credentials Committee and moved it be adopted.

Your Credentials Committee has reviewed the petition of the Faith Baptist Church, Texarkana, which was constituted in July, 1976. The committee recommends that action on this petition be delayed for one year.

In response to a question the church was reported as not presently affiliated with the local association. The motion to adopt the committee's recommendation was carried.

Mason Craig made a statement on behalf of the Credentials Committee and the assignment by the convention for the next year, that the committee would be conciliatory and not on a witch hunt, that any churches visited would come after official request from within the convention reporting that a church's "policies, statements and practices" are not in agreement with the convention constitution. W. H. Jenkins expressed concern and urged the chairman next year to see that the constitution is the guide in dealing with churches not conforming, noting such churches would be welcome visitors but should not be named to convention boards.

## Voted: Item Concerning Arrangements For Business Sessions

Don Nall, Batesville, moved that those responsible for arrangements during the sessions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention when business is conducted be instructed to place standing microphones in every aisle and in the balcony when applicable, in order that every messenger who desires to speak may be clearly heard. Second and carried.

## Voted: To Continue Study Committee on Ministry

30. Paul Sanders, chairman, Review Committee on Ministry, read the following report and moved it be adopted. Second and carried.

The committee has reviewed the work of the Study Committee on Ministry and recommends that the original committee be instructed to continue its study for another year, and the president
of the convention be authorized to appoint people to fill any vacancies on the committee.
(see committee listed on page 13)
Ben Elrod, Arkadelphia, made a statement to clarify one point on Ouachita's goals for the Centennial decade. The fund raising will not go to the churches without permission in some future year but will be continued as at present.
31. The Southern Baptist Convention emphasis, Our Larger Family, featured a message by Porter Routh, Executive Secretary, Executive Committee SBC, Nashville. Dr. Routh presented President Herring with a copy of the new Broadman book on former SBC presidents. Dr. Routh expressed appreciation to Arkansas Baptists for the increase in Cooperative Program giving, an average larger than the convention-wide average.

Ervin Keathley led the messengers in singing "Like A River Glorious." Special music was by Tanner Riley, Fayetteville, accompanied by Carol Gaddy, "Take Up Your Cross, Christian."
32. The message for the final session of the 1976 convention was by Jim Henry, pastor, Two Rivers Baptist Church, Nashville, Tennessee, "The Church Ministering to Her Families," with the text from Acts 6.

Dr. Herring expressed his gratitude for all the courtesies extended to him, and to the vice presidents and program committee, the entire Baptist Building staff for the cooperation during the year. He paid a special tribute to his own church staff whose unselfish devotion made his service to the convention possible.
33. The motion to adjourn was seconded and carried. The One Hundred Twenty-third Annual Session in the 128th year was adjourned in prayer by Clayburn Bratton, Stamps.

## EXECUTIVE BOARD

Charles H. Ashcraft, Executive Secretary

Andrew Setliffe has served as Executive Board president this year. Meetings have been held on December 9, 1975, March 9 and August 17, 1976, with the various committees meeting at their customary times.

One major action of the Executive Board in 1976 requires that a detailed report of all programs and plans, including individual salaries (including executive heads) from all our institutions shall be given to the Finance Committee and Program Committee when budgets are submitted.

The individual salaries of all Executive Board staff have been published since a like action of the Executive Board was taken on J anuary 10, 1967:
"All salaries and expense allowances of Executive Board employees (shall) be presented annually in detail in the budget presentation to the convention and the same to be included in the audit report presented in the state annual of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

The installation of a computer for our Accounting Services during this year brings to a high degree of efficiency and economy in this important function of administration.

## Personnel Matters

Robert Parrish became Director of Language Missions with enlarged responsibilities, formerly serving as Director of Deaf Ministries.

Roy F. Lewis, at the invitation of the Foreign Mission Board, enlisted two Arkansas pastors, James A. Walker, Warren, and Jerry M. Wilson, El Dorado, and made a trip to Malawi, East Africa in May, 1976, to develop a stewardship program for missionaries and National churches, and conducted stewardship conferences in churches.
W. H. Heard took early retirement in April, 1976, after serving as chaplain since 1966, first at the State Sanatorium, Booneville, and later with the Children's Colony, Booneville.

The Executive Board authorized a separate department for Stewardship to begin January 1, 1977 and personnel will be employed for this responsibility. Roy F. Lewis will have increased responsibility as Associate Executive Secretary and Cirector of Business Services and continue the promotion of the Cooperative Program.

Thurman K. Rucker will retire December 31, 1976 after serving since October, 1959, as field representative in Arkansas for the Annuity Board.

Nadine B. Bjorkman was elected by the Board to serve as Annuity Representative effective January 1, 1977 offering fulltime assistance through the office in the Baptist Building. Any field work required will be handled by another staff member or through the Dallas office. Mrs. Bjorkman has been employed since January, 1958, in the office of the executive secretary, was named Administrative Secretary in 1970.

The Board has approved the following percentage distribution of any 1976 overage after one-half has been sent to the Southern Baptist Convention according to the budget formula: $7 \%$ to establish an Emergency Relief Fund for Arkansas Baptist pastors, wives, etc., 10\% to Parking Lot Development expenses; $11 \%$ to Continuing Education Fund for Boyce Bible School tuition ( $\$ 50$ for 6 hours); $20 \%$ to the Missions Department rotating Small Church Loan Fund; 3\% for Extreme Mission Needs such as pioneer missions; $30 \%$ for remodeling of Cone Bottoms Dormitory for girls at Ouachita; and 19\% to Southern Baptist College.

In the August 17th meeting the Executive Board employed architect John Jarrard, Little Rock, for remodeling, enlarging and redecorating the 20-year old Baptist Student Center at the University of Central Arkansas, Conway. The cost of this work is not to exceed $\$ 55,000$ and the money is in hand. The plans are to be drawn this year, construction completed in 1977. The following were named to the Building Committee: Dana Whitfield, E. A. Pipkins, W. T. Byrum, Richard Boyles, Tom J. Logue and Charles H. Ashcraft. At the end of the 1977 budget year $\$ 10,000$ from Advance funds for the Baptist Student Union is to be placed in the Arkansas Baptist Foundation, with earnings to be used for utilities in this enlarged center.

The Program Committee of the Executive Board has authorized two study committees relating to Camp Paron, one for immediate needs and one for long range planning for Arkansas camping needs.

An updated history of Arkansas Baptists has been authorized with Jerry. Wilcox and Mrs. Bob Wright serving on this committee.

## RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE CONVENTION:

1. The Executive Board recommends that plans for the eight-level structure to be placed on convention property at Sixth and Arch be approved at the cost estimated $\$ 3,650,000$.
2. The Executive Board recommends that the Baptist Student Union be authorized to launch a Third Century Endowment Campaign, with a goal of one million dollars, with earnings to be used for B aptist Student ministry.

## 4. ANNUITY AGREEMENT

Recognizing that the welfare of our people who serve our Lord in the ministry and other denominational work is a joint responsibility of the church, the state convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention; and further recog. nizing that the continued increase in the cost of living has created a pressing need for broader benefits at retirement and more flexible survivor and dis.. ability benefits, we join with other state conventions and associations in accepting the program suggested by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Therefore, upon the recommendation of the Annuity Board, we accept the following recommendations:

1. That we close the present Southern Baptist Protection Plan to new members as of January 1, 1978.
2. That the present members of the Southern Baptist Protection Program and the Southern Baptist Benefit Program may remain in their present plan or elect to transfer to the new Southern Baptist Retirement Program or the Southern Baptist Retirement Plan effective January $1,1978$.
3. That the new Southern Baptist Retirement Program be promoted through the individual churches urging them to contribute an amount equal to $10 \%$ of the career ministerial personnel's compensation for retirement purposes. The state convention's contribution to this Program (\$200 annually per member) will provide the survivor and disability benefits. Further, that the new Southern Baptist Retirement Plan be promoted through the churches urging them to contribute an amount equal to $10 \%$ of compensation of the nonministerial personnel for retirement purposes. (The state convention makes no contribution to this Plan.)
4. That this Convention pledge to actively promote this program and that it seek to maintain and improve as a minimum its present percentage of participation and its present level of average age (not lower than the Southern Baptist Convention level) and that, in the event it fails to do so, this convention recognize and absorb any actuarial liability caused by such failure to do so. (The convention already has this obligation.)
5. That each church may, at its own election, pay dues on a $\$ 4,000$ salary basis even though the minister's salary is less than $\$ 4,000$.

# ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE 

J. Everett Sneed, Editor

From the earliest beginnings of Baptists in Arkansas, the Baptist paper has had an important role in Baptist life. The role of the Baptist state paper today is as important or more important than it has ever been in Arkansas Baptist history. The Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine continues to serve as the official publication of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

The Arkansas Baptist was established by a vote of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in 1858. The first issue was printed in January, 1859, with a subscription cost of $\$ 2.00$ a year. Although the price has remained almost the same, the types of payment have varied during the years. In the days of the depression many people paid for the paper with produce. Since 1858, the publication has been influenced by war, fire, and private ownership. The present Newsmagazine has had five successors. In 1902, the Convention established the Baptist Advance and since that time Arkansas has had a Baptist state paper on a continuous basis.

The Newsmagazine has had a good year. As of September 15, our subscriptions total 70,500 . But more than a thousand of these are on a special offer. It appears that the Newsmagazine will conclude the year by reaching the goal of 70,000 subscribers which was set four and one-half years ago when we had 59,400 subscribers.

One of the real problems in operating the Newsmagazine is that of economic inflation. In the past three years newsprint alone has increased more than $\$ 19,000$. Postage is also a major problem. Five years ago our postage to mail the Newsmagazine was $\$ 14,000$. This year we budgeted $\$ 26,000$ but will have to find an additional $\$ 5,000$ in order to meet the increase in postal cost. But we pledge to you to maintain a balanced budget and to make every dollar count to the best of our ability.

Each church is again requested to elect a reporter so that news may be rapidly obtained. It is our desire to provide greater coverage of church news through the feature entitled "Arkansas all over. . . .people. . . .briefly." This is carried to give recognition to such things as ordination of deacons, licensing of ministers, groundbreakings, remodelling of property, etc. It is our wish to obtain sufficient material to develop a full page of these brief statements each week.

The Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine has a current cost of only $\$ 2.16$ per year in churches using the Every Resident Family plan. The Club Plan where 10 or more families pay annually in advance is only $\$ 2.76$ per year, and individual subscriptions are $\$ 3.00$ a year. Where the Every Resident Family plan is used the Newsmagazine has increased only 16 cents annually since 1902.

We appeal to pastors and church leaders to assist us in increasing our circulation to an even higher level. We believe that in so doing each church will be helping themselves as well as the entire kingdom's work. We believe that it is essential for every Baptist individual to have information and explanation of the current issues which confront us. We believe, particularly with inflation, that the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine is one of the best bargains available to churches today.

# BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

## Project '76

1. Students have presented the Gospel and shared the Word with students at the University of Arkansas, Arkansas State University, University of Southern Arkansas, Henderson State University, Ouachita Baptist University, Arkansas Tech University, University of Arkansas at Monticello, and the University of Central Arkansas. In most of the cities where the colleges and universities are located, there was also a visitation of the homes.
2. Two hundred college students worked at the Life and Liberty Rally as ushers, counsellors, etc.
3. The Baptist Student Directors of the state manned the telephones during the Life and Liberty Rally and counseled with people who witnessed the rally on television.
4. Our directors and students were involved in the Joy Explosion where 117 decisions were made. ( 11 professions of faith).

## International Students

1. Our directors are working to find Christian families who will "adopt" each of the 500 international students studying in the state who desire to have a host family.
2. Friendship House International will be held during the Christmas holidays in Conway for internationals who need a place to stay during the holidays.
3. One of our summer missionaries worked on the University of Arkansas campus with international students for ten weeks this past summer.

## Campus Evangelism

1. Many of our campuses continue to have Share Seminars and WIN conferences, enabling students to more effectively share their faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour.
2. Our Student-To-Student workers this year are Rusty Jones at University of Arkansas at Little Rock and Mary Ann Cooper at Henderson State University.

## Missions

1. There were 72 Arkansas students who served as summer missionaries last summer.
2. Our summer missionaries reported 194 professions of faith. (Many final reports are not in at the time of this report).

## Personnel Changes

1. Don Norrington, State Associate BSU Director, resigned during the year to become Baptist Student Director at his alma mater, Southwest Missouri State University.
2. Allan Rankin is our new Baptist Student Director at University of Arkansas at Little Rock.
3. Jerry Bass has resigned as Baptist Student Director at Southern Arkansas University.

## BROTHERHOOD

## C. H. Seaton, Director

The basic task of the local church is the involvement in missions. This, of course, is reaching people with the gospel message ministering to their needs and teaching them to work and act like followers of Christ, or Christians.

Assisting churches in carrying out their task is the task assignment of the Brotherhood Department.

Brotherhood material is designed to enlist and assist men and boys through Royal Ambassadors and Baptist Men, in mission education and mission activities. Mission activities include sharing the message of Christ with the lost. Mission activities also include ministering to the needs of the total person.

Brotherhood and involvement of men and boys in missionary education and activities last year showed an increase of 3.6\% Southwide. In Arkansas we are happy to report the increase was $5.9 \%$. For this increase, we are grateful.

Indication, by request for materials, is pointing to a similar growth for the present year.

The Brotherhood Department enlisted and made travel arrangements for 16 men to go as a work crew to Guatemala to assist in rebuilding church facilities destroyed in the earthquake.

The group departed on April 17 and returned to the state on April 25. They came from every section of the state and did a tremendous job. We are grateful for the men and their willingness to give of their time and abilities in this great mission task. More work projects of this nature are under consideration, including some in pioneer areas of our country.

Many of the men going to Guatemala have indicated a desire to become part of a permanent task force to work when needed.

The Brotherhood Department, since the last report, has also conducted a State Royal Ambassador Fellowship Supper, attended by 400 boys, counselors, and pastors. On November 8, at Immanuel Church the 1976 Supper will be held.

A Baptist Men's Meeting was held at Camp Paron on March 12-13. Some 100 men from across the state spent the week-end in conference on "Family Life and the Role of the Father in the Home." The Conferences were led by Dr. Ted Dowell from Southwestern Seminary. It was a very profitable and inspiring time for those attending. Many young husbands and fathers attending expressed appreciation for the conference.

## C. J. Bennett, attorney from Batesville, brought a challenging message on Baptist Men and Christian Citizenship responsibilities.

On May 7-8, the State-wide Royal Ambassador Congress was held at Calvary Church in Little Rock. Attendance was about 400.

Twenty-eight boys participated in the speakers contest. Sixteen of the boys were in the Pioneer age division, the largest number to participate thus far. It is encouraging to see older Royal Ambassadors doing extra advancement work, which is required for the speakers contest.

Royal Ambassador Camps were held in June. The Lord blessed in many ways. Visible results were: fourteen (14) boys saved, six (6) surrendering to be a missionary, four (4) to full-time Christian vocation, one to music ministry and some 18 rededications.

The thrilling aspect of the decisions is the positive commitment of the older boys to missions and the service of personal witnessing.

Most of the boys who accepted Christ were won through their influence and by other boys. From the group will come our future leaders in Baptist life and world wide missions.

Only eternity will reveal the truly great impact of the camps in the life of each person attending, including staff and counselors.

We give thanks to God for his blessings and for a great staff of workers who help in camp and make them possible. Plans are already under way for a great camping season in 1977.

Upcoming in September will be a training session for both associational and church Brotherhood officers, on September 17-18, at Camp Paron. Last year we had 52 in attendance.

The challenge to men and boys in the area of missions, as taught by Christ, is tremendous. The opportunities for service through involvement in mission activities is unlimited. The willingness of men and boys to respond, when opportunities for mission study and activities are provided, is unparalleled. They will respond when the church challenges them. Slowly, but surely, churches are accepting their responsibility to provide missionary education for men and boys. As the church provides and challenges, men and boys respond.

Missions and missionary personnel for tomorrow depend on boys who are enlisted and trained today.

The Brotherhood Department is ready to assist every church in providing missionary education for men and boys. We have the material available. Call on us, it will be our privilege to serve.

The director, C. H. Seaton, and office secretary, Jeanie Weber, consider it an honor to serve you.

CAMP PARON

1976 has been a busy year for Camp Paron. Through October the facilities have been in use by various groups 66 days, plus the months of June, July, and August when the camp was in use by Royal Ambassadors, G.A.'s and Acteens. Several tentative bookings during November and December will complete a full schedule.

Royal Ambassador, G.A. andActeen camps utilize all the time in June, July, and August. These organizations have first priority on use of the facilities. Other departments in the Baptist Building have second priority and use the facilities several times during the year.

# CHURCH MUSIC

The Church Music Department exists to assist churches and associations in developing and improving their music programs and music leadership for maximum effectiveness in meeting the needs of the church and community.

Baptist churches in Arkansas continued to show an increase in enrollment and participation in their music ministries last year. The total enrollment in music organizations now stands at 38,381 . We thank the Lord for giving us another increase this year, and we covet your prayer that we may be sensitive to His leadership and always responsive to His call.

## 1975-76 State Music Highlights

We attempt to accomplish our purpose of training and development through serveral different types of events each year. Some of these are described below:

1. Area Clinics for choir Leadership:

This event was scheduled in four different areas in order to reach a maximum number of choir leaders. Leadership training was offered in all age groups. Mr. LeRoy McClard, former State Music Secretary for Arkansas, headed up our outstanding faculty. The clinics were well attended.
2. State PraiSing Clinic for Associational Directors:

This was an event to give specialized training to associational music directors in order to help them do their work more effectively. The major emphasis was on improvement of congregational singing.
3. Volunteer/Part-Time Music Leadership Retreat:

This is always one of the most popular events of the year. Working with these volunteer people is very thrilling. We had 93 present for the two-day training period for music directors, instrumentalists, and pastors. Each group receives help in their own area of work, plus an opportunity to understand the needs of the other groups. The best leadership available is enlisted for this training time.

## 4. Associational Music Tournaments:

This event is promoted each year in cooperation with the associations. It is an opportunity for young people to compete with other youth in their association in the development of their church-oriented music talents.

Nine associations reported tournaments this year, and a record number of associational winners came to Arkadelphia to compete in the State Music Tournaments during Music Camp. Here is a list of the winners from each category:

## 5. Music Festivals:

In cooperation with the Bicentennial and evangelistic thrust this year, we changed the format of our Youth Choir Festivals to make them more of an outreach project. Simultaneous festivals were held in shopping centers in West Memphis, Fort Smith, Pine Bluff, and Little Rock.

After the parade of choirs and other preparation in the morning, the choirs gathered in the shopping centers where they gave a 30 minute religious and patriotic concert. The next 30 to 45 minutes were spent in sharing their witness with the shoppers and handing out tracts. After this, the choirs came together again and presented the program a second time.
Five Older Children's Choir Festivals were conducted with a total attendance of 1092.

The Third Annual Handbell Festival was conducted at Marble Falls in March. There was a total of 236 in attendance from 16 choirs. Mr. Don Allured, the foremost authority on handbell ringing, was the clinician. The ringers from the First Baptist Church of Osceola rang in concert on the opening night.

## 6. Music Camps:

We conduct two music camps each year on the campus of Ouachita and in the facilities of First Baptist Church of Arkadelphia.
Youth and Adult Music Camp featured "I Love America", a patriotic musical. Mr. Don Wyrtzen, co-author of the work, was our guest conductor. We had a total enrollment of 272. The performance on Friday night was well attended by several groups from over the state, as well as many local people.

Music Camp for Young Musicians had a total of 552 this year. We prepared four different choral works and sang performances of them on Wednesday and Thursday.
Most of our camp faculty is made up of ministers of music and other church musicians each year. We certainly could not conduct these camps without them, and we offer them our heartfelt thanks.

## 7. Life and Liberty Rally:

This was an exciting event and we appreciate the opportunity to be involved in it. We had a total of 2030 choir members to enroll, and approximately 1250 of them showed up on Rally Day. There were also about 100 band members present. Our thanks to all these, and the fine leaders who directed and accompanied.

## CONCLUSION

This is the 35th annual report of the Arkansas Baptist Music Ministry. Ours is the oldest such organization in the Southern Baptist Convention, organized in 1941 as the "Arkansas Baptist Musicians". Mrs. Ruth Nininger was the first department director.

Our department stands ready to give assistance whenever and whereever we can, to churches or to associations. We do covet your prayers that our work among you will honor the Lord and build up His church.

# CHURCH TRAINING 

Robert Holley, Secretary

## I. Department Tasks

Assisting churches to either establish or strengthen their Church Training Program has been a priority for the Church Taining Department of your State Convention during the year 1975-76. Again this year our state has experienced an increase in these areas of Church Training: (1) total Church Training enrollment, (2) average attendance, (3) number of churches reporting a Church Training Program. This indicates a renewed concern for growth in discipleship in many of our churches. Every Church Training project conducted by the Church Training Department is designed to help churches develop the kind of training program that will lead church members to grow in Christian discipleship and equip them for "the work of Christian service, to build up the body of Christ." This is what Church Training is all about.

In support of the Life and Liberty Campaign, the Church Taining Department gave emphasis to three areas of training. (1) Witness training materials, provided by the department, were made available for use by the churches in training youth and adults in witnessing during the quarter prior to the simultaneous revivals. Churches requested and received copies of these materials. (2) New Member Training Conferences were conducted in ten areas of the state during the week of January 26 in an effort to help churches conserve the results of their evangelistic efforts. (3) A strong, continuing emphasis on training for growth in discipleship is being projected as a followup to the Life and Liberty Campaign. The Church Training Department will continue its efforts to help churches pursue a strong program of discipleship training in order to "teach them to obey everything I have commanded you (Matt. 28:20 TEV)."

The Church Training Department is also assigned responsibility for the programs of Church Administration, Vocational Guidance, Family Ministry, Church Library, and Church Recreation. Projects in these areas are planned and conducted in our state in cooperation with the Church Administration, Church Library, Family Ministry, and Church Recreation Departments of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

## II. Review of 1975-76

1. Church Training Program

According to the 1975 Arkansas Baptist State Convention annual, there were 1205 churches in our state convention with a total Church. Training enrollment of 83,514 . Forty-five churches reported a Church Training program that did not report having Church Training the previous year.
(2) The annual Church Training Convention was held at Immanuel Church, Little Rock on October 23 with conferences for all Church Training leaders. A Church Training Fair was conducted in connection with the convention. The conferences were attended by 275 leaders from 112 churches and 37 associations.
(3) '"M" Night was observed in 37 associations with a total attendance of 7,984 . This represents an increase over the previous year. There were 559 churches represented at "M" Night.
(4) In an effort to help churches conserve the results of the evangelistic thrust of the Life and Liberty Campaign, New Member Training Conferences were conducted in 10 areas of the state during the week of January 26-29, 1976. These were attended by 240 leaders from 128 churches representing 33 associations. A conference on New Member Training was also conducted at the State Evangelism Conference.
(5) Associational Church Training Clinics were conducted in 13 associations. Church Training leaders from over 100 churches participated with a total attendance of over 500.
(6) In an effort to help start new Church Training programs, an associational Church Training Blitz, a supper meeting for pastors whose churches do not have Church Training, was conducted in six associations.
(7) District Bible Drills and Speakers' Tournaments were conducted in each of the eight districts of our state March 29-April 9. There were 114 participants from 35 churches representing 24 associations. The first place winner in the Youth Bible Drill was Jamie Fowler from East Side Church, Paragould. The first place winner in the Speakers' Tournament was Melinda Hendricks from Central Church, Magnolia. These young people represented our state at Ridgecrest in July.
(8) The State Youth Convention was held at Little Rock's Robinson Auditorium on April 16 with over 4,000 youth participating.
(9) "New Day for Training," an emphasis on starting new Church Training programs, was observed on April 4. Nine new Church Training programs were started between January 1 and April 4.
(10) Arkansas' first Associational Church Training Leadership Conference was held August 20-21 for all associational Church Training leaders in the state with 140 persons attending representing 27 associations.
(11) Church Training workshops have been conducted in five local churches and department personnel have provided personal assistance to an additional 20 churches.
2. Church Administration
(1) ABC's of Church Administration Conferences have been conducted in five associations for the pastors of one-staff churches. Sixty-five pastors participated.
(2) A State Deacon Chairmen Conference was conducted October $3-4$. There were 62 pastors, deacon chairmeri and their wives who participated.
(3) Associational Deacon Conferences have been conducted in three associations with 280 participants.
(4) A Youth Ministry Conference was conducted at Camp Paron April 30 - May 1 for youth directors. Approximately 50 persons participated.
(5) Church Vocations Conferences have been conducted in two associations and at each of the assemblies at Siloam Springs. A Church Vocations Conference was held in connection with the State Youth Convention with 50 participants.
(6) A regional Conflict Management Workshop was conducted at the Baptist Building July 8 with 33 participants.
(7) A Church Secretaries' Seminar was held at Park Hill Church, North Little Rock, August 23-27 with 23 participants.
(8) On September 2-3 eight pastors in our state participated in a Deacon Trainer Conference to prepare them to assist churches and associations with deacon training projects.
(9) A Church Communications Conference was conducted at the Baptist Building September 13-14 with 35 participants.
3. Family Ministry
(1) A Marriage Enrichment Retreat was conducted at Hot Springs with 12 participants from 6 churches.
(2) A Marriage Enrichment Retreat Leadership Training Conference was conducted for 10 persons who will lead Marriage Enrichment Retreats.
(3) A Family Enrichment Conference was held May 6-7 at First Church, Little Rock with approximately 70 participants from 18 churches and 9 associations.
(4) A Retreat for Engaged Couples was held on the Ouachita campus.
(5) Assistance was provided to three cnurches in planning and conducting family ministry projects.
4. Church Library
(1) A Church Library Conference was conducted in connection with the State Church Training Convention with 27 participants from 17 churches and 10 associations.
(2) A Regional Library Conference was held at First Church, North Little Rock, February 27-28 with 34 participants from 23 churches in 14 associations.
5. Church Recreation

A conference on Association Camp Planning and Administration was conducted at Camp Paron April 30 - May 1 for superintendents of missions and associational camp committee members.

## IV. Summary

The Church Training Department's role is primarily that of leadership training. The department is committed to assisting churches and associations in those areas assigned to the department. This is achieved, for the most part, through training projects for pastors, staff members, Church Training leaders, deacons, church officers and committee members and for associational leaders. Our concern is helping churches "........ to prepare all God's people for the work of Christian service, to build the body for Christ" (Eph. 4:12 TEV).

# EVANGELISM 

Jesse S. Reed, Director

Arkansas Baptists and our two National Baptist Conventions majored on our Bicentenniar by cooperating in the Life and Liberty Campaign.

In the Arkansas Baptist State Convention 596 churches participated in the Life and Liberty Crusades. During the five weeks period there were over 3100 professions of faith with more than 2500 joining our churches for baptism and four associations not reporting. Many people have been saved since then in Vacation Bible Schools, Siloam Springs Assembly, Associational Camps, Royal Ambassador and Girls in Action camps, summer revivals and at Joy Explosion '76.

The associational year of 1976-77 the Evangelism Department will emphasize "Growing an Evangelistic Church." The emphasis will include:

1. "A Spiritual Life Conference," with the entire church studying An Evangelistic Church by John F. Havlik.
2. "Lighting Revival Fires," which prepares churches for revival.
3. "C.A.R.E. Revivals" which focus on inactive resident members and deacons.
4. "Linked Lives," which is a way to keep revival fires going in a careshare relationship between church members and deacons.

This is also the year of preparation for "Bold Mission Thrust" which is a concerted national emphasis to make it possible for every person in the United States of America to hear and respond to the Gospel and become a part of the fellowship of believers. It is also a challenge for every Christian to share his faith with an unsaved person.

There were 920 in attendance at four Life and Liberty Area Evangelism Conferences. There were 832 present who do not usually attend the Statewide evangelism conference.

The Joy Explosion '76 of our youth was a spiritual blessing, with 11 professions of faith, 19 decisions for special service and 87 other decisions. Some of the most talented people in the United States were on the program.

# COOPERATIVE MINISTRIES WITH NATIONAL BAPTISTS

National and Southern Baptists in Arkansas comprise more than onefourth of the state population. As such, we are obligated to lead in programs of Christian concern. We seek to relate as brothers and sisters in Christ, and co-workers in the various Christian ministries in order that churches and associations may be strengthened and non-Christians brought to a saving faith in Christ.

Four STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONARIES spent 10 weeks in black churches, conducting VBS's, youth camp, and youth programs, enrolling 1,009 youth and resulting in 38 professions of faith.

28 college students and four seminary students were assisted with SCHOLARSHIP funds totaling $\$ 4,300$.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION activities at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, Rev. Lacy Solomon, Director, enrolled 200 students in Bible classes, and others were engaged in various BSU-sponsored activities.

Eight EXTENSION CENTERS for in-service training enrolled 231 pastors and laymen in Little Rock, El Dorado, Helena, West Memphis, Lewisville, Fordyce, and Augusta.
"HART OF THE HILLS" Camp at Paron was attended by 328 campers in a two-week program with 26 professions of faith.

Twenty-four LEADERSHIP CLINICS AND INSTITUTES across the state enrolled 1,888 persons.

JOINT COMMITTEES are formed in Arkansas Valley, Central, Pulaski, North Pulaski, Calvary, Tri-County, Bartholomew, and Harmony associations, with other associations studying the idea.

The STATE JOINT COMMITTEE has met twice with representatives from all three cooperating conventions in attendance.

The LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE at Paron this year attracted 125 registered persons.

Joint Baptist WOMEN'S DAY OF PRAYER programs were held in Camden, Little Rock, Dumas and Pine Bluff, with plans being made to enlarge this activity.

Dwight McKissic, A NATIONAL BAPTIST MINISTERIAL STUDENT from Ouachita Baptist Unviersity served as ASSISTANT to the CHAPLAIN at Tucker Intermediate Reformatory where young Black first offenders are housed. Forty-three professions of faith and numerous rededications are registered.

The LIFE AND LIBERTY CRUSADE of 1976 is a jointly sponsored program of Arkansas Baptists. Jointly sponsored Evangelistic services, the Life and Liberty Rally in Little Rock on July 3rd, The Joy Explosion August 6-7, and the Historic Joint State Convention meeting November 17th in Little Rock have all served to strengthen our ties as Christians.

## STATE MISSIONS

## R. H. Dorris, Director

The purpose and objective of the Department of Missions is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its task of bringing men to God through Jesus Christ by developing and promoting, in cooperation with churches and associations, old and new outreach ministries into all changing facets of modern life in response to the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20).

## Direct Missions

The following statistical report is a summary of the work of this division within the past year (ending 8/31/76):

BUILDING AID GRANTS have been approved and paid or pending for 12 churches totaling $\$ 22,500$, while other requests await consideration.

THE REVOLVING LOAN FUND, as of this date, totals approximately $\$ 118,000$. Within the past year, three churches have been loaned $\$ 26,000$. The Fund's assets are about half sufficient to meet requests of churches awaiting consideration. The WMU has designated $\$ 25,000$ of its $\$ 150,000$ goal for the Dixie Jackson Offering for State Missions to this Fund. This will bring some relief.

NEW PROPERTIES for the establishment of missions and church growth required $\$ 15,500$ on 3 locations, and 3 others are pending.

PROGRAM SUPPLEMENTS have assisted 4 associations with salary aid to provide a Director of Associational Missions.

CHURCH PASTORAL AID has been paid to 22 churches and missions, and by the end of this budget year will require the total allocation of $\$ 22,000$. In addition, $\$ 9,500$ will be used for this purpose from the Emergency Fund for special needs of 3 missions and churches.

STUDENT PREACHING AID has been provided 9 student pastors who are enrolled in undergraduate work in colleges in the state.
" 50 FOR THE FUTURE" ended 1975 with 18 new churches and missions established during the year. As of September 1, 1976, an additional 9 new works begun brought the total to 27. It is hoped that by the end of 1976 the goal of 50 will be reached. This is in contrast to the annual average of 7.3 churches begun in the Convention from 1963-73. The net gain in churches in 1975 brought the total number in the Convention to 1205 from the 1974 figure of 1198.

CONTINUING EDUCATION has involved assistance to the establishment and growth of the Little Rock Center, Boyce Bible School. It is directed by Dr. W. T. Holland. Total enrollment since it opened has reached 73. Scholarship assistance has been given to 9 students.

BOLD MISSION THRUST for 1977-79 is being planned now in cooperation with the Evangelism Department and corresponding divisions of the Home Mission Board. Input was provided by respective associational leaders at special sessions held just before the area Evangelism Conference in September, 1976.

## Language Missions

A cooperative agreement between the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the Home Mission Board instituted the Language Missions division of the Missions Department under the direction of Robert Parrish who previously served as Director of Deaf Ministries. This became effective January 1, 1976, adding to the Department's ministry to the deaf a ministry to Spanish and Vietnamese and direction in establishing other language congregations or groups.

Three churches have established NEW MINISTRIES to the deaf, bringing to 19 the total number of churches with deaf ministries. Two other churches are in the process of training workers to establish deaf ministries.

Lakeshore Drive Church, Little Rock, the State Missions Department, the Home Mission Board, and Pulaski County Association sponsor a SPANISH CONGREGATION under the leadership of Rev. Donoso Escobar, pastor.

A two-day INTERPRETERS WORKSHOP for the deaf was attended by 80 interpreters and deaf persons. Fifteen SIGN LANGUAGE CLASSES have been taught through deaf ministries over the state. ARK-LA-MISS BAPTIST DEAF YOUTH CAMP was held June 21-26 at Beech Springs Camp, Liberty Association, making the second year of this tri-state deaf youth camp. ARKANSAS BAPTIST CONFERENCE OF THE DEAF was held at Levy Church June 18-20, 1976, with 95 in attendance.

Several churches in the state are sponsoring Vietnamese families, and some have incorporated Vietnamese persons into their regular Sunday School and worship services. Grand Avenue church, Ft. Smith, provides Sunday norning worship services through a Vietnamese interpreter and Tuesday morning English and cooking classes.

Uniontown Church, Uniontown, AR, is working with the Cherokee Indian association in eastern Oklahoma in ministering to Cherokee Indians in eastern Oklahoma and western Arkansas.

The Language Missions program has resulted in 82 professions of faith during the past year, 57 with the deaf and 25 with the Vietnamese.

Special Missions Ministries
CONFERENCES ON WITNESSING TO OTHER FAITHS were held in Hot Springs, Benton, and Harrison with more than 1,000 in attendance.

Twenty STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONARIES, two SOJOURNERS, and one US-2 MISSIONARY served in resort-recreational areas and innercity ministries for ten weeks this summer.

A US-2 MISSIONARY will begin serving in Pulaski County Association in the area of Special Missions Ministries in September.

The MIGRANT MISSION CENTER at Hope has witnessed 121 professions of faith from September 1, 1975, through August 31, 1976.

The ministry of the Hot Springs Mission Center to needy families has resulted in 44 professions of faith from September 1, 1975, to August 31, 1976.

DISASTER RELIEF amounting to $\$ 3,000$ was made available to the Old Austin Church, Cabot, the Centerville Church, Dardanelle-Russellville Association, and to Delta Association to aid tornado victims.

A SPECIAL MINISTRIES CONFERENCE and a RESORT MINISTRIES CONFERENCE were held with an emphasis on training and utilizing volunteers in various Special Missions Ministries witnessing projects.

## Chaplaincy Ministries

INSTITUTIONAL CHAPLAINCY is the area of most involvement of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Five positions are authorized by the Convention: Cummins Prision; Boys’ Training School, Pine Bluff; Girls’ School, Alexander; Rehabilitation Center, Hot Springs, and the Booneville Unit of the Children's Colony. The Colony at Booneville does not have a chaplain at this time.

One STUDENT CHAPLAIN serves week ends at the Wrightsville Boys' School. Another student served fulltime at Tucker Prison the entire summer. One parttime jail chaplain is supported.

HOSPITAL CHAPLAINCY boasts 7 fulltime chaplains in 6 units, all supported by the units they serve.

INDUSTRIAL CHAPLAINCY enjoys two in Arkansas. They are former pastors employed by the industries.

MILITARY CHAPLAINCY has one active duty in the state and 16 National Guard and Reserve chaplains.

VOLUNTEER CHAPLAINS serve in every area mentioned above witnessing and blessing the lives of those in jails, industries, hospitals, motels, planned communities, city and country government, nursing homes, and resort areas.

The annual CONFERENCE FOR CHAPLAINS was conducted in May with some 35 chaplains and guests attending.

PROFESSIONS OF FAITH reported by the chaplains totaled 120 from September 1, 1975, to August 31, 1976.

## STEWARDSHIP-COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

Cooperative Program receipts in January exceeded the budget requirements for that month, and that same trend has continued in succeeding months. Arkansas Baptists have set records in mission giving through the Cooperative Program for the past five consecutive years, and it appears that 1976 will not only be another record year but will exceed previous records by a much larger proportion.

During 1975, which was the fiftieth anniversary year of the Cooperative Program, many special efforts were made to highlight the Cooperative Program and to re-educate our people concerning it. A renewed interest in the Cooperative Program and a new concern for cooperative giving is in evidence in our churches. This enlarged missionary vision is being tangibly demonstrated in many ways, including the record gifts to the Cooperative Program.

During the year several new audiovisual aids were released for use in Cooperative Program promotion. One of these was a unique film produced by the Foreign Mission Board titled "Mission Safari." The undersigned was one of the participants in the film and also had a part in the recorded narration.

Arkansas also contributed its pro rata share to the production of a Cooperative Program presentation which was made at the Southern Baptist Convention in Norfolk. A filmed and edited version of that presentation is now available for showing in our state.

Lehman F. Webb, associate missionary to Singapore, completed a year of service as missionary-in-residence through the Stewardship-Cooperative Program Department. He is the third such missionary to serve in that relationship. Marvin Reynolds, missionary to Botswana, is currently serving in the same capacity.

Each year during the five Assembly weeks at Siloam Springs Baptist Assembly, one program is devoted to presentation of the Cooperative Program. This has proven very effective in being able to expose over 5,000 of our youth to the main channel of Southern Baptist missionary giving.

During the year the department secretary was invited by the Foreign Mission Board to enlist two other pastors and for the three of them to spend three weeks in Malawi in southeast Africa. The assignment was to assist the Malawi convention and the missionaries in developing and implementing a stewardship program for the churches in that convention. The assignment was completed in May, and, while history will have to reveal the actual results, all concerned believe that it was a highly successful undertaking. Thus, Arkansas Baptist have had a part in providing a stewardship program of permanent benefit to fellow Baptists in another nation at relatively little cost.

During the year the department has been increasingly called upon for counsel and assistance to churches involved in fund raising. Much counsel has been given and some personal assistance on a limited basis. The needs in this area appear to be growing rapidly, and plans are currently under study to make available to our churches some additional assistance in this specialized area of stewardship.

Part of the stewardship education provided by the department are weekly articles published in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine. During the year a series of fifteen was written and published concerning financial support of the pastor and church staff members. The series proved to be so popular and so helpful that it was subsequently reprinted in booklet form and is still being distributed to the churches.

During the year the Executive Board approved a reorganization of the department which will be effective January 1, 1977. At that time the undersigned will relinquish all general stewardship responsibilities, but will retain
responsibility for Cooperative Program promotion in his capacity as Associate Executive Secretary. A new department head will be employed to head the re-named "Stewardship Department," and this will help to strengthen stewardship work in all the churches and associations.

The Southern Baptist Convention has recently emphasized the centrality of stewardship in any challenging missionary endeavor. The growing interest in the concern for stewardship among Arkansas Baptists put us in an ideal position to accept and meet the challenge given to us by our Lord in the Great Commission.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL

Lawson Hatfield, Director

OUR OBJECTIVE

The objective of the Sunday School Department is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose - "to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closest cooperation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God."

## GROWTH IN 1974-75

For the fourth consecutive year, the churches of Arkansas reported a net gain in Sunday School enrollment - a net gain of 3,828 for the 1974-75 year. With a net gain of 6,699 in 1971-72; 3,373 in 1972-73; and 6,624 in 1973-74, the 1974-75 figure brings a gain of 20,524 for the four-year period.

As churches continue to reach people for Bible study through normal means and through ACTION and in organizing Life and Liberty Adult Bible Classes, another net gain is anticipated for 1975-76.

As of September, 1976, 118 Life and Liberty Adult classes had been reported since January, 1975. Hopefully, the goal of 200 will be reached by the close of the national bicentennial year.

A total of 1,017 Vacation Bible Schools was conducted in 1975, with 103,956 enrolled. A long-time goal of the department to report $1,000 \mathrm{Vac}$ ation Bible Schools in a year has been attained.

This is an increase of 111 schools and 8,090 in enrollment over the 1974 report.

## THE 1975-76 PROGRAM

Following is a summary of the projects the department promoted during the past year.

1. SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION
2. State Projects

Associational Faculty Training Clinic - A training session was held on January 13 in Immanuel Church, Little Rock to train associational teams in leading conferences in the "Understanding" series.


#### Abstract

Associational Briefing Meetings - Briefing meetings were conducted in each of the eight districts. These meetings were designed for the Sunday School director and the director of missions in each association. Adult-Youth Workshops - First, Arkadelphia and First, Forrest City hosted Adult-Youth Workshops on May 24 and 26. These workshops were designed to improve the teaching and reaching skills of workers with youth and adults.

Youth Interpretation Meetings - Five meetings interpreting the 13 church projects in the Youth Sunday School Emphasis for 1976-77 were held in Grand Avenue, Fort Smith, First, Jonesboro; First, Monticello; First, North Little Rock; and Central, Monticello.

Sunday School Convention - The 1976 convention was designed to help teachers and officers get ready for the new year. The Getting Ready series was used as the basis of study for the age-group conferences. The convention was held in Park Hill, North Little Rock.


2. Associational Projects

Department personnel assisted 22 associations in 30 training and planning projects.

## 3. Local Church Projects

Department personnel assisted 55 churches in 68 training and planning projects.

## II. VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL PROMOTION

The state VBS Clinic conducted on February 17 in Immanuel, Little Rock trained 250 associational team members to lead conferences in the associational VBS Clinics. 40 associations reported training 4,440 workers in 49 associational clinics.

## III. WEEKDAY EARLY EDUCATION

Approximately 50 churches provide Weekday Early Education ministries. In conjunction with the state Missions department, the Sunday School department conducted a WEE workshop in Pulaski Heights Church, Little Rock.

Seventy-seven directors and teachers from 20 churches registered for the workshop.

## IV. CHURCH ARCHITECTURE CONSULTATION

Architectural consultation was given to approximately 60 churches through personal visits and correspondence.

## DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL

Lawson Hatfield has been director of the department since October, 1959. He serves as general officers' consultant, church architectural consultant, and director of the Arkansas Baptist State Assembly. In keeping with the

Executive Board study-leave p olicy he has participated in three separate months of graduate study at Southwestern Seminary, Ft. Worth since October 1975.

Don Cooper began his work with the department June, 1968. In addition to serving as assistant director of the department, he is adult consultant, associational coordinator, and assistant director of the assembly. He relates directly to work in these associations: Ashley, Bartholomew, Benton, Buckner, Carey, Clear Creek, Concord, Dardanelle-Russellville, Delta, Harmony, Liberty, North Arkansas, Ouachita and Washington-Madison.

Freddie Pike, youth consultant, began his work with the department January, 1973. His other duties include training and achievement guide records and relating directly to these associations: Big Creek, Black River, Current-Gains, Greene, Independence, Little Red River, Mississippi, Mt. Zion, North Pulaski, Rocky Bayou, Searcy, Trinity, and White River.

Harold Vernon, with the department since January, 1973, is children's consultant. His other areas of responsibility include Vacation Bible School, bus outreach, and work with the mentally retarded. He also relates to the following associations: Arkansas Valley, Buckville, Caddo River, Calvary, Caroline, Centennial, Central, Conway-Perry, Faulkner, Hope, Little River, Pulaski, Red River, Tri-County and Van Buren.

Pat Ratton began her work in the department October, 1967. In addition to being the preschool consultant, her other areas of responsibility include kindergarten, tracts and publication of the monthly Sunday School News.

Mrs. Harold Haley has served as office secretary since August 1966. Debbie Combs began her work as office secretary May, 1975.

# WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION 

Julia Ketner, Excutive Secretary-Treasurer

As members of Woman's Missionary Union reflected on their watchword for 1975-76, "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty," they were reminded constantly of the freedom which comes from knowing Jesus as Lord and Saviour. As the hymn for the year, "My Country, 'Tis of Thee," was sung, they praised God for the Christian heritage and religious liberty enjoyed in the United States. But as members studied missions, they learned of millions who have not experienced such liberty. What a challenge and joy it has been to share our freedom in Christ with those in bondage.

Woman's Missionary Union had two special emphases for 1975-76: a tempo and TIME (Training In Missions Education). A tempo highlighted the Baptist Young Women's organization (ages 18-29) with purposes to enlist more young adult women in mission study and involvement and strengthen existing work of BYW organizations. The number of BYW organizations in Arkansas increased more this year than in any of the last four years.

TIME was an emphasis on leader and member training. Training was given in many associations and churches upon request. Other training opportunities included:

Missions Adventures and Studiact Workshops for GA and Acteens leaders, with 80 in attendance, April 10.

A chartered bus to Glorieta for WMU, SBC Conference, July 10-16. Forty Arkansans received training while twelve others attended WMU week at Ridgecrest, August 7-13.

One day statewide Leadership Conference, September 9, at Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock. Eighteen (18) different conferences were offered with 541 attending and an additional 71 preschoolers in the nursery.
Four Area Leadership Conferences for church WMU leadership held at First Baptist, Fayetteville; First Baptist, Newport; First Baptist, Pine Bluff, and Central Baptist, Magnolia. Attendance totaled 397.

Four area Leadership Conferences for associational WMU leadership with 98 attending.

Other special organizational activities included: promotion of '76 Day Prayer Vigil for the Life and Liberty Campaign; Annual Meeting of Arkansas WMU at First Baptist Church, Little Rock with over 800 attending, and Mrs. James Sawyer, of Benton, being elected state WMU president; two chartered buses with 79 women attending WMU, SBC, Annual Meeting, and one day of SBC in Norfolk, Virginia.

Activities for Acteens (for girls in grades 7-12) included ACT IV for high school girls held at First Baptist Church, Arkadelphia and Ouachita Baptist University with 317 in attendance; ACT V for girls in grades 7-9 held at Burns Park, North Little Rock with 485 attending; and one week of camp at Paron with 77 attending. These were under the direction of Betty Jo Lacy, state Acteens director.

Activites for members of Girls in Action (grades 1-6) included the first GA Mother-Daughter Camp for younger GAs held at Camp Paron with 100 attending. Three weeks of camp for older GAs were held at Paron in July and August with 300 in attendance.

Two new Nancy Cooper Scholarships were granted to Ladeana Hency, Oran, Missouri, and Geneva Tindell, Perryville, students at Southern Baptist College. Scholarships were renewed for four young women attending Ouachita Baptist University: Susan Brumley, Benton; Nancy Huskey, Midwest City, Oklahoma; Phyllis Mitchael, Fort Smith; and Nancy Legreid Shock, North Little Rock. The scholarship fund is administered through the Arkansas Baptist Foundation. Scholarships are available to volunteers for missions or church related vocations studying at OBU or SBC . Preference is given to young women applicants.

Scholarships from the Lillian May Scholarship Fund (a gift scholarship for native Arkansans under regular appointment by either the Foreign or Home Mission Board, who desire to study for credit in seminary of college) were granted to Mrs. Johnny Burnett, Brazil, and Mrs. Carl Hall, Kenya.

Woman's Missionary Union promoted plans for Weeks of Prayer for Foreign and Home Missions and initiated plans for Season of Prayer for State Missions. Program materials on state missions work were developed and plans made for prayer observance in WMU organizations, and churchwide, with assistance given by staff personnel of the State Missions Department.

The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions and Dixie Jackson Offering for State Missions were promoted in connection with the respective seasons for prayer. Gifts of Arkansas Baptists through these special mission offerings as of September 14,1976 , were the largest on record, totaling $\$ 1,256,281.23$ (an increase of more than $\$ 152,000$ ), divided as follows:

The objective of Arkansas state Women's Missioniary Union is to assist churches and associations in establishing, conducting, and improving WMU organizational programs in the churches. Those organizations responsible for missionary education are: Baptist Women, B aptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Nission Friends. Missionary education was reported in 598 churches and in all but two associations with enrollment of 26,276 .

Thank you for the opportunity and privilege of serving you, for we are "laborers together with God."

## ANNUITY BOARD <br> T. K. Rucker, Field Representative

This has been a very gratifying year in our annuity work. The atmosphere has cleared considerably in settling many problems with our Life Insurance, disability insurance, health insurance and our pension plans. There has been a tremendous increase in interest in all plans and readiness to enroll.

We have 643 enrolled in Plan A. We have 157 enrolled in Plan B, and we have 43 enrolled in Plan C. We have 92 enrolled in our medical insurance. We have 196 people insured in our group life insurance with a total of $\$ 4,871,500$ coverage.

# ARKANSAS BAPTIST FAMILY AND CHILD CARE SERVICES

Life and Liberty has been a meaningful emphasis for Arkansas Baptist Convention during this Bicentennial year. As we look over our 82-year history, we are grateful for the concern of our founders for the life and rights of children. It began in 1894 when a group of concerned Christians of First Baptist Church in Monticello concluded that "a Baptist orphans home in Arkansas is an absolute necessity". This was a heart of love response for the needs of children of that day. Arkansas Baptists responded to that challenge, and thus, the beginning of a ministry of love for dependent and needy children. For 82 years our child care ministry has been an effective caring ministry helping to heal the hurts of children whose parents were unable or unwilling to love and care for them. Arkansas Baptists have undergirded this ministry with a strong foundation through their prayers, money, and personal involvement. Thousands of children have received personal life and liberty through this ministry.

The Arkansas Baptist Home for Children is still the center of our child care ministry. We try to provide a loving, therapeutic setting where a child can find acceptance and the emotional support he needs to work through his problems and face the demands of growing up. Undergirding this program is the Christian concept of caring and the hope that comes through our Lord. Ninety-seven children received care and direction by living at the Home during the year. Our workers were unable to respond to an additional 80 requests for children needing our services due to lack of space. Children needing this kind of service continues to increase in our society. We are happy to have Royce Aston join our staff during this year to serve as Director of Social Work Services for the Home and to coordinate the agency-wide work with the families of the children in our care.

Religious Life on the Campus. Twenty-two youth made professions of faith in Christ and joined local Baptist churches in Monticello last year. The Christian faith continues to make our child care program distinctive. Two summer missionaries from B.S.U. assist with religious training and recreation each summer. Sponsors provide funds for a week of intensive training for our young people at Siloam Springs Baptist Assembly. We are grateful to be able to present Christ to children in need.

Sponsorship. The sponsorship program is a vital part of our child care ministry. Two hundred and twenty groups have participated in providing clothing, allowances, special needs and gifts for birthdays and Christmas. We are grateful for Christian friends who help us to share the love of Christ by helping us to meet the material, emotional and spirtual needs of our youth and children.


#### Abstract

Alumni Association. The Baptist Children's Home had its first alumni homecoming on May 8,1976 , with approximately 170 in attendance. The oldest former resident attending was Mrs. Lois Campbell, age 78, from Houston, Texas. Mrs. Campbell lived at the Home from 1901-1918. An organizational meeting to elect officers to direct the alumni association culminated the day of meaningful activities. The alumni homecoming is to be an annual event. Many of the alumni seemed especially happy over the physical improvements made at the Home and that the children now are involved in community activities.


Foster Homes and Group Home. Foster care was provided for 19 children through our foster home ministry. Foster care provides a family a wonderful opportunity to give of themselves to a child who needs them. Our Group Home for Boys in Jonesboro provided care for eight boys during this period.

Area Offices. Through our area offices, 497 new referrals, representing a variety of personal and family problems, were presented. Workers are in touch with the needs of children and families and offer effective services when called upon. Referrals come from schools, courts, mental health centers, from and through our churches throughout the state. Parent-child conflicts and marriage problems are frequent referrals to these offices, in addition to referrals on children needing residential care. Our staff has also been involved in leading conferences on effective parenting and conducting parent education groups. We are grateful to have Tom Stafford join our staff as Director of our Jonesboro area office during this year.

Finances. In 1975, 1,000 of the 1,207 churches in the Convention made some contribution to our agency, for a total of $\$ 175,850.98$. Fifty-five percent of the churches gave $\$ 100$ or less. Efforts will continue to be made to make the work of our agency and its ministry better understood by the churches in order that a broader base of financial support may be given to this ministry. We are grateful for the increasing support received from the churches.

During the year we have been faced with a greater demand for our services than we have been able to meet. Projections for the immediate future indicate an even greater need for children needing residential care. We have received requests to expand our child care facilities, particularly in the western part of the state. Such a facility is available to Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services near Mansfield, Arkansas. If financial resources were available for acquiring this facility and staffing it, it could be filled to capacity in a very short time. This would greatly enhance and increase the services of this agency to the residents of Arkansas. We are grateful to Rev. and Mrs. Floyd Harris for their gift of Kyle's Boys Ranch at Elkins, Arkansas. This is a partially completed ranch house and 17 acres of land. Our Board is evaluating this facility and our financial resources to determine how we might utilize this ranch in our ministry to troubled children and youth. We covet your prayers as we evaluate these unusual opportunities for expanded ministry.

# ARKANSAS BAPTIST FOUNDATION 

Harry D. Trulove, Executive Director

The Board of Directors and staff of the Foundation express appreciation to Arkansas Baptists for their continuing support. As a result, the ministries have been expanded and the gains gratifying.

First, there has been a signif icant gain in money placed with the Foundation. Since the office was reopened on a full time basis two years ago, the increase has been as follows:

This gain cannot be contributed to a single factor. The ground work of various leaders; a wider interest in estate planning; a re-emphasis on the leadership role of the Foundation Board are a few of the factors.

Another area of gain is the appreciation from investments. As a result of quality decisions made by the Investment Committee a $12.9 \%$ capital gain has been realized.

Improved income is also an encouraging area. Since June 1, 1974, \$184,681 has been earned from investments. All of the income is allocated to the accounts as designated by will, contract and/or trust instrument. This is possible since the Foundation's operating fund is provided through the Cooperative Program.

Based on a current analysis, investments are currently earning 7.7\%. This added to the capital gains brings the total gains to $20.6 \%$.

The Foundation offers to individuals counsel on writing a will and the management of trust funds through gift annuities, annuity trust, and unitrust contracts. These contracts allow a person to make a gift and retain the income personally or for some other designated beneficiary. Currently, $\$ 383,000$ are invested for this purpose.

The agencies and institutions of Arkansas and the Southern Baptist Convention have the privilege of using the Foundation in the management of their endowment funds. Again, no fees are charged for this service.

During 1976 a policy manual was adopted. It sets out management procedure for personnel and the administration of funds.

All of this has been possible because of the able leadership of officers and board members. Each man is active in his local church and has a broad knowledge of the work of the denomination. Each is a leader in his own right, having experience in banking, finance, business, and investment.

We rejoice in the progress, but are not satisfied. The mistakes and failures point out the frailness of humanity and the need for constant improvement. Progress with dedication is our goal. The service of the Foundation is available to associations, local churches, and individuals upon request.

The Board makes the following recommendations:

1. It is recommended that in 1977, the income earned from undesignated receipts be distributed through the Cooperative Program, Arkansas Baptist State Convention.
2. It is recommended that the following resolution be adopted by The Arkansas Baptist State Convention and placed in the minutes of this meeting: "Resolved that the Arkansas Baptist Foundation be authorized, without requiring that it be immediately implemented, to amend Paragraph 2 of its Charter to allow the Foundation to hereafter manage endowment funds for any benevolent, charitable, educational or missionary undertaking, institution, or agency so that Paragraph 2 of the Charter shall hereafter read as follows:

Paragraph 2 - The purpose for which it is formed is to serve any benevolent, charitable, educational or missionary undertaking, institution or agency, fostered by, or having the official sanction of, The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, such conjoined purposes to be executed simultaneously in the futherance and development of benevolent, charitable, educational and missionary, activities in, and for the benefit of, schools, hospitals, orphanages, and other enterprises operated under the supervision of, or supported by, The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, and to such end may receive by bequest, devise, gift, purchase or lease, either absolutely or in trust, any property, real, personal or mixed; and to administer such property, to convey such property, to invest and reinvest the same, or the proceeds thereof, in such manner as in the judgement of the Directors will best promote such objects. Where a substantial portion is for the benefit of Baptist causes, the corporation may also receive and administer any property for any benevolent, charitable, educational or missionary undertaking, institution, or agency, provided the undertaking, institution or agency is organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational purposes, and qualifies as a publicly supported organization as defined in the Internal Revenue Code and the regulations thereunder, and is compatible with the purpose of the corporation.

## Explanation

This proposed change, if approved would allow the Foundation to provide a broader base of service to our people. There are those who have indicated a desire to provide a very small percentage for ministries that are compatible with the work of Arkansas Baptists, but not directly related to the Convention. One case in point is an estate in excess of one-quarter million dollars. Over ninedy percent of the income is to go to Baptist work, with the remainder for ministries that are compatible, but not Baptist by name. This charter change would allow us to serve as trustee for the total estate.
3. It is recommended that the following resolution be adopted and placed in the minutes of this meeting: "Resolved, that the Arkansas Baptist Foundation be authorized, to amend Paragraph 7 of its Charter to conform with the expansion of the Board of the Foundation as approved in the 1974 Convention, so that Paragraph 7 of the Charter shall hereafter read as follows:

Paragraph 7 - The number of Directors shall be a minimum of fifteen (15) and they shall be elected by The Arkansas Baptist State Convention at its annual meeting. One-third (1/3) shall be elected by the State Con-
vention at each annual session. In the event there should be a vacancy on the Board of Directors by reason of death, resignation or otherwise, the remaining Directors shall fill such vacancy until the annual meeting of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

The corporation is without capital stock and no shares of stock are issued. The members thereof shall be the accredited messengers of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, and shall at all times include the Directors of the corporation, each of whom shall be a faithful member of a Baptist Church which is in active cooperation with the The Arkansas Baptist State Convention. No Director of this corporation shall receive, or be lawfully entitled to receive, any salary or remuneration for services connected with the administration of the affairs of this corporation. Actual expenses incurred by such person may be refunded when authorized by the Directors.

## Explanation

There are two reasons for this recommendation. (1) In 1974, the Convention approved a bylaw change that allowed the Board to be increased from nine to fifteen. The change in the charter was inadvertently overlooked at that time.
(2) The current charter allows for the Foundation Board to fill the vacancy of any unexpired term. The proposed change would limit this authority until the annual meeting of the Convention.
4. In order that the bylaws of the Foundation may more clearly conform to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention and to use titles for officers compatible with those used in the business world, it is recommended the bylaws of the Foundation be updated and amended as follows:

Members of the corporation shali consist of fifteen (15) or more directors; the members of the Executive Board of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention; and accredited messengers to the annual meeting of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, such membership to continue until their successors are elected.

## ARTICLE II Annual Meeting

This corporation shall, at the annual meeting of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, elect board members, receive reports and act on recommendations from the Board of Directors.

## ARTICLE III <br> Board of Directors

The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by the Board of Directors. At least two-thirds (2/3) of the Directors shall be laypersons.

Section 1 -- Qualifications: Each Director shall be an active member of a Baptist Church cooperating with The Arkansas Baptist State Convention. In light of the purpose of the Foundation, this person should be one with proven business ability. Diversification is desired in such professional fields as accounting, estate planning, business, management, finance, legal, investment, real estate, and similar fields.

Section 2 - Method of Election and Term of Office: One-third (1/3) shall be elected annually by The Arkansas Baptist State Convention to hold office for three (3) years. No person shall serve more than two (2) consecutive terms. One (1) year must elapse before being eligible for re-election.

The Executive Secretary of the Executive Board of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention shall be an ex-officio member with full voting privileges.

The President of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the President of the Executive Board of the Convention shall be advisor members.

Any member who misses all of the board and committee meetings for a period of one (1) year shall be dropped from membership of this Board.

With the exception of the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, no person shall be a member of this Board who is an employee of any board or institution of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, or who is receiving financial aid from the State Convention.

Section 3 - Vacancies: Vacancies shall be filled as provided in the Charter of the corporation, "In the event there should be a vacancy on the Board of Directors by reason of death, resignation, or otherwise, the remaining Directors shall fill such vacancy until the annual meeting of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

## Section 4 - Duties:

(1) Investments - It shall be the duty of the Directors to invest and reinvest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devise, bequests, or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment. The Investment Committee acts on behalf of the full Board in matters relating to buying and selling of securities.
(2) Distribution - The Board of Directors shall allocate all designated income that is available for distribution at least once each three months. This distribution is made only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise such distribution shall be made as provided in the Charter of the corporation, namely upon the approval and with the authority of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention.
(3) Reports - The Directors shall make an annual report of the affairs of the corporation to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and upon request furnish any interested institution information concerning the investment of funds for such institution. The books of the corporation shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant recommended by the Executive Committee and approved by the Board of Directors. This report shall be published in The Arkansas Baptist State Convention Annual.
(4) Depository - The Board of Directors shall see that a safe deposit box is maintained for the safekeeping of all legal papers, stocks, bonds, and other appropriate assets of the corporation. This box shall be entrusted to the President of the corporation and shall be entered only when he is ac-
companied by a member of the Board of Directors, or the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention or another bonded employee. The location of this depository shall be determined by the Board of Directors or its Executive Committee. The Directors may authorize some other financial institution to hold in safekeeping certain assets of the corporation.
(5) Extent of Authority - The Directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment, and administration of the principal and undistributed income of all funds and property of the corporation. Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation, with specific conditions as to the administration of the fund or the distribution of income, said Directors shall have full authority to carry out those directions. All investments shall comply with the Arkansas Statutes, Section $58-302$, being prudent man rule for investments.

With the consent of the Board of Directors, the Chairman of the Board and the Secretary shall have the authority to execute necessaiy instruments to accomplish the foregoing transactions.

The Board of Directors shall be empowered to employ as they deem necessary an adequate staff for the effective and efficient management of this corporation.

## ARTICLE IV Officers and Duties

Section 1-Officers: The officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairman of the Board/Vice-President, Vice-Chairman, President, one or more Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and such other officers as the Board of Directors may select. Each officer shall hold office for one year provided that the term of salaried employees and officers shall be fixed by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer may also be the chief executive officer of the corporation.

## Section 2 - Duties:

(1) Chairman of the Board/Vice President - The Chairman of the Board shall preside over all meetings of the Directors, shall be their official spokesman, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
(2) Vice-Chairman - In the absence of the Chairman of the Board the Vice-Chairman is to preside over all meetings of the Directors. He shall also serve as Chairman of the Budget Planning Committee.
(3) Secretary - The Secretary shall cause to be kept a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and to perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office of secretary.
(4) President - The President shall be the chief executive officer of the corporation, and shall perform such duties as the Directors may from time to time direct.
(5) Treasurer - The Treasurer shall have custody of the funds, securities, and property of the corporation, subject to the provisions hereof and to such regulations as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors. Funds belonging to the corporation shall be deposited in such bank, banks, or trust companies as may be designated by the Board of Directors or its Executive Committee. Such funds may be withdrawn by check or draft as ex-
ecuted by the Treasurer, the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, or by such persons as may be desig. nated by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer shall cause to be published at least quarterly, a financial statement of the corporation. The Treasurer and such other persons entrusted with the handling of funds, securities, and other property shall be bonded in such sum as may be fixed by the Directors; the expense of this bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

## ARTICLE V Meetings

Section 1 - Regular Meetings: The Board of Directors shall meet at least four times each year and one of these meetings shall be in conjunction with the annual meeting of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

Section 2 - Called Meetings: Called meetings may be held upon the request of the Chairman of the Board and any three members of the Board of Directors. The Chairman of the Board or the President shall give sufficient notice of the time and place thereof to enable the Directors to attend.

Section 3 - Quorum: A majority of the Board members shall constitute a quorum and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

## ARTICLE VI <br> Committees

Section 1 - Appointment: Unless otherwise specified, the Chairman of the Board shall cause such committee or committees to be appointed as the Directors may specify. The Directors shall delegate such authority as may be deemed advisable so long as the same shall be within the limits of their own authority and discretion.

Section 2 - Committee Responsibility: Each committee is to discharge their responsibilities as outlined in the Policy Manual of the Foundation.

## ARTICLE VII Distributees

All funds received and administered by the corporation and distributed às herein provided, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of charitable institutions or agencies as defined in the Internal Revenue Code and the regulations thereunder. The principal agencies being Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Arkansas, and of causes, agencies, and institutions fostered by and having the official sanction of THE ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION or THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION, except where a trust shall provide for training in a professional school not operated by an Arkansas Baptist School; in such case the income may be directed to an institution selected by the Board of Directors with the approval of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention or its Executive Board, and for no other purpose.

## ARTICLE VIII Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form, and with the name, "Arkansas Baptist Foundation" around the outside border, and the word, "Corporate Seal" in the center.

## ARTICLE IX <br> Amendments

These bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of members present and voting at any annual meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall be voted on until the same has first been presented at a meeting of the Board of Directors for their consideration and examination before being submitted to the general meeting.

## ARKANSAS BAPTIST HISTORY COMMISSION

Composition: One member for each of eight (8) districts, and one member at large as the chairman, plus an executive secretary who does not rotate.

Duties: Acting as agent in the history field, it locates, collects and preserves articles of Baptist history.

Property: The commission has a sizeable microfilm file, a collection of pictures, and documents. copyrighted books and bound volumes of church bulletins. These are stored in Riley Library at Ouachita Baptist University.

Activities: Many requests for information from Baptist Churches have been filled by the Librarian and staff of the library. Our files and books have been made available to interested persons for research. The commission owes a debt of thanks to Mrs. Juanita Barnett, Librarian and her staff for voluntarily giving of their time and assistance in meeting these requests.

Dr. George T. Blackman is retiring as Executive Director this year. He has served on the commission since 1956, served two terms as chairman and as Executive Director since 1960.

# OUACHITA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY <br> Arkadelphia, Arkansas

The year of the American Bicentennial has been a truly outstanding year, not only for our country but for our senior Christian institution of higher education, Ouachita Baptist University. Thanks to the greatest support ever from Arkansas Baptists, Ouachita has reached new heights of Christian excellence and academic excellence. In addition to a record of outstanding achievements in the year 1975-76, Ouachita joined some 70 other Baptist colleges and schools in a rededication conference at Williamsburg, Virginia, last June. Ouachita is proud to make the ten "Reaffirmations" that grew out of this meeting. The following excerpts help to remind us all of the Christian purposes to which Ouachita is committed:

## REAFFIRMATIONS OF CHRISTIAN PURPOSE

1. Our Covenant Relationship. . . . .we reaffirm . . . .the covenant relationship between our churches and our schools, a covenant which finds its unity in the purpose of God, the mind of Christ, the work of the Spirit, and the authority of the Scriptures, and which causes the churches and the schools to work together in freedom and faithfulness.
2. Unity in Diveristy. We reaffirm the unity in diversity that has enabled Baptists to witness in faithfulness and creativity. . . We reaffirm our belief in, and support of, the Cooperative Program as the best instrument yet devised for the support of the complex work of our cienomination.
3. Christian Witness in a Secular Culture . . . .believing as we do that God through Christ has intervened directly in the world . . . .f or the salvation of his children, our schools and our churches confront the secular views of materialism and nihilism with the Christian message of faith, hope, and love, and with the Christian principle of the individual's inf inite worth.
4. The Christian Idea of a Liberal Education. We reaffirm that liberal arts studies have provided the context in which the Christian view of education can make its greatest impact.
5. Stewardship of Finance. We reaffirm the Biblical view of Christian stewardship that all persons and all things, and all places belong to God and that all things are to be used. . . .for His honor and glory.
6. Christian Absolutes. We reaffirm that there are Christian absolutes which history does not change nor time erode. . . that the Ten Commandments are not man made but God given, and that they cannot be modified or amended.
7. The Great Commission. We reaffirm our responsibility for . . . .the Great Commission. . . .and for creating an atmosphere on our campuses in which young people can be made aware of, and challenged by, the opportunity for missionary service.
8. Student-Teacher Relationships. We reaffirm our responsibility. . . .to instill in students a thirst for knowledge; to enable them to develop life goals;
to help students to discriminate among values; and to encourage in them a Christian world view, responsible Christian citizenship, active participation in the life of their church, and the development of a sense of vocational mission . . . .We reaffirm our commitment to seek and employ the Christian teacher.
9. Stewardship of Management. We reaffirm our responsibility for the stewardship of management in every area of institutional operation . . . .to make the best use possible of all institutional resources . . . committed to our care.
10. Christian Citizenship. We reaffirm our commitment. . . in developing moral courage, social sensitivity, and ethical responsibility as an inseparable part of Christian citizenship. . . (and) to provide training for responsible Christian leadership in every area of life.

## CONTINUED INCREASE IN STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Enrollment trends at Ouachita continued to be strong in the fall of 1976, with an increase of 44 in the number of undergraduate students over the fall of 1975. The enrollment of 1640 includes a larger freshman class (504), a record number of "full-time equivalent" students (1523), and a record number of students living in University housing (1270). Total non-duplicating enrollment during the twelve months' period was 2,053 . These students came from 70 of Arkansas' 75 counties, 32 different states of the nation, and 17 foreign countries. The largest number came from Pulaski County (236), followed by Clark (173), Jefferson (71), Garland (66), Hempstead (47), Union (46), Hot Springs (44), Ouachita (38), Saline (33), and Lonoke (28). Student housing facilities at Ouachita are crowded for the first time since the extensive construction of new dormitories in the late 1960's. Leading authorities on private higher education advise against expanding dormitory facilities, reminding us of the decline in birthrate and the changing student perferences in favor of living off campus. Even so, with Ouachita's enrollment growth and with more than 75 percent living in campus housing, it is possible that additional dormitory facilities will be needed.

## OPPORTUNITIES FOR CHRISTIAN GROWTH AND SERVICE

The number of students preparing for church-related vocations reached a record of 306 in the fall of 1976 with 126 of these being ministerial students. In addition there were 78 church music students, 35 in religious education, 27 mission volunteers, and 28 preparing for youth ministry. Ouachita is equally proud of its role in preparing dedicated Christian lay persons, with approximately 80 percent of its students majoring in some 25 different academic departments. Ouachita continues to be one of the leaders in the nation in number of students selected for summer mission work, and students were placed in part-time positions during the year in more than 200 churches.

There is no way to measure the Christian influence of a campus in a statistical report, but among the more visible things contributing to the Christian dimension at Ouachita are the required weekly Chapel for all students; two semesters of requried Old and New Testament study; Christian Focus Week; student-led revival services; the personal interest of Christian faculty members; the campus involvement of missionaries-in-residence (Rev. and Mrs. Paul

Mosteller of Thailand last year, with Rev. and Mrs. Murray Smith of Uruguay coming for 1976-77); a campus-wide program of religious activities sponsored by the Baptist Student Union including an outstanding daily "Noonday" service, retreats and conferences, a jail ministry, nursing home ministry, a big brothers and big sisters program, drama, puppets, etc.; and an impressive number of Christian personalities from inside and outside the state who spoke in Chapel, classes, dorm discussions, and other meetings on campus. The Christian influence of students witnessing to students continues to be a vital part of the Ouachita educational experience.

## IMPROVEMENT IN BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

Visitors to the Ouachita campus continue to marvel at the remarkable changes in the facilities and physical appearance of the buildings and grounds. Improvements during the past year include the construction of a beautiful pedestrian bridge spanning the ravine to connect the north campus with the central campus; the completion of the paved and lighted campus drive to make a full circle along the Ouachita River and ravine; the construction of a much-needed maintenance building, replacing what had been the "slums" of the campus; construction of an attractive addition to the Tiger Field House, providing modern dressing facilities for football, baseball, and track; remodeling portions of Mitchell Hall to provide much-needed offices for Admissions Counseling, Student Aids, Data Processing, and the Department of Romance Languages; the air conditioning of Conger Dormitory; further improvements in Moses-Provine Science Center; provision of additional parking space; and many other campus improvements.

## STRENGTHENING ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

The academic program at Ouachita continues to grow stronger in the professional preparation and competence of the faculty, their interest in students as individual persons, and their personal example in the Christian faith and life. The number having the doctor's degree continues to grow. Their loyalty in spite of the salary gap between Ouachita and the state colleges is truly remarkable. Few colleges do a better job of giving special attention both to gifted students and those in academic difficulty (with an Honors Program and an Academic Skills Development Program). The Ouachita-in-Japan Program got off to an excellent start with three Ouachita students attending the Baptist university in Fukuoka, Japan, (Seinan Gakuin) and three Japanese students spending the year at Ouachita. Ouachita's membership in the computerized Ohio College Library Center has already proved to be highly beneficial in expediting cataloging and inter-library loans. Our Water Research Program continues to expand, with many benefits to students and faculty members. Under the able leadership of Dr. Kenneth Locke, Ouachita has a full-time counseling service for the first time and it is proving to be a valuable university resource. Ouachita's excellence in music continues to be recognized nationally and internationally, with the Chamber Singers performing in Washington, the Singing Men in a three weeks' series of concerts in Poland, and the outstanding "America 200" choral, instrumental, and speech program performed in five Arkansas cities.

Complementing its high academic standards is Ouachita's outstanding athletic program. Tiger teams are in competition for the championship in most of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference athletic events. A small but fighting Tiger football team won the "Battle of the Ravine" against Henderson and went on to play in the national NAIA play-offs for the first time. Ouachita also represented District 17 in the national tennis tournament.

## NEEDS AND CHALLENGES IN OUACHITA'S "CENTENNIAL DECADE": 1976-1986

Ouachita will celebrate its 100 th birthday in just ten years. For the past year we have been asking faculty, students, administrative staff, trustees, members of Baptist churches in Arkansas, and other friends to help us examine our needs and set worthy and challenging goals for Ouachita during a "Centennial Decade" climaxing in 1986. Some of the emerging goals are very tangible and clear; a new auditorium with adequate space to seat the entire student body; a new classroom and of fice building that will appropriately house and display the official papers of Senator John L. McClellan, provide facilities for the Edward Maddox Public Affairs Center, and house several academic departments; the remodeling and improvement of historic old Cone-Bottoms Dormitory; continued improvement and enlargement of science facilities; and more adequate facilities for our fine athletic and physical education programs. An equally urgent goal is to find a financial solution to the widening gap between tuition costs at the Christian college and the state college. The two most hopeful answers to this problem are (1) the continued strengthening of the Cooperative Program with Christian education benefiting each year from the growing Christian stewardship of Arkansas Baptists working together to support all Convention programs; and (2) an increasingly strong development program for support through alumni and other friends. Other needs are perhaps less tangible but no less important: strengthening Ouachita's role in service to the denomination; greater emphasis on Ouachita's unique combination of liberal arts education and career preparation in such ways that both values are maximized; and commitment of an increasing proportion of Ouachita's budget to non-bricks-and-mortar purposes such as student scholarships and strengthening of the faculty.

Arkansas Baptists already have a right to be proud of the growing strength of Ouachita Baptist University in the cause of Christian education in 1976. With faith in God's leadership and a commitment to pray and work together even more in the years ahead, Arkansas Baptists can look forward with even greater pride to Ouachita's "Centennial Decade" of 1976-86.

# SOUTHERN BAPTIST COLLEGE Walnut Ridge, Ǎrkansas

Southern Baptist College continues to be proud of and grateful for her identity as a member of the family of Arkansas Baptist institutions, and continues in her resolve to make a contribution to Arkansas Baptist life that is worthy of that cherished relationship.

## ENROLLMENT CLIMBS AGAIN

Although enrollment trends were mixed at SBC this year, the college showed an over-all increase of $6 \%$. The non-duplicating enrollment at Southern Baptist College for the 1975-76 academic year was 858 as compared to 826 during the 1974-75 period.

The on-campus enrollment increased astronomically. Of the 858 students enrolled during the year, 523 were enrolled on the Walnut Ridge campus as compared to 367 for 1974-75. constituting an incredible increase in the on-campus enrollment. The enrollment in both the Blytheville Air Force Base Resident Center and the extension centers decreased during the period. Of the 858 total. 254 were enrolled at the SBC Resident Center at Blytheville Air Force Base and 80 were enrolled at the extension centers at Malden and Senath, Missouri. This decline is not surprising, especially in the case of the Blytheville Air Force Center. With the new community college at Blytheville, it is feared that the program there will continue to decline in the numbers enrolled. It is hard for a prospective student to make the decision to pay almost three times as much for a course at the SBC Resident Center as he would pay at the community college.

## PROGRESS MADE IN PHYSICAL PLANT

In late April of 1975, the new Maddox Fine Arts Center was completed and occupied. On May 6, in conjunction with our Graduation Exercises, this lovely facility was formally dedicated. This spacious structure represents a most significant addition to the physical plant of Southern Baptist College, as it now houses all classes except those conducted in the Science Building. For this beautiful facility, SBC is grateful to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the OBU/SBC Campaign. The building will stand for years to come as another monument to that magnificant effort.

The next major new construction, according to the college report in the 1974 Arkansas Baptist State Convention annual, was to have been a Fieldhouse/Recreation Facility. With the loss of the Student Center by fire in December, 1975, the priorities had to be restructured to allow for the immediate construction of a Student Center.

As a result of the responsiveness of the Executive Committee of The Arkansas State Convention in making available S40,000 from the 1975 and 1976 overage, and as a consequence of the generosity of the supporters of the college, construction of the new Student Center was started during August, 1976 and the new facility will be occupied during the Spring of 1977.

One of the large old buildings which was located at the entrance of the college was demolished with the effect improving the appearance of the campus at its entrance. As financial conditions will allow, other old and unuseable buildings of the World War II period will be razed, and existing permanent buildings will be improved.

Plans now exist in embryonic stage which would provide 20 new units of married student housing. Such housing is desperately needed because many married couples express interest in attending Southern Baptist College but change their minds in favor of another institution upon examining the SBC married student housing.

## ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENTS STRENGTHEN THE COLLEGE

In an effort to better meet the needs of students by providing more alternatives in degree programs, five more degree programs were developed and adopted during the academic year. Those were: the Associate in Science in Business Management, the Associate in Arts in Music, the Associate in Arts in Recreation, the Associate in Arts in Church Recreation, and the Associate in Secretarial Science. A new certificate program in recreation was also approved. The Music and Church Recreation degrees are in response to the growing number of calls from churches that the college receives for persons skilled in youth, music, and recreation programs.

A major concern in the development of these new programs was that they not result in a careless proliferation of new courses as the new degrees were added. It was possible to structure strong, sound degree programs in the areas named above with the addition of only 15 new courses.

A program of comprehensive student evaluation of instruction continues to apprise faculty members of their respective strengths and weaknesses and to stimulate continuously improved instruction.

The Felix Goodson Library accessioned 2,264 volumes during the year bringing the total number of volumes to 40,216 . This far exceeds the holdings of the typical junior colleges of the region and rivals the holdings of some of the four-year institutions. In addition to the book collection, the Felix Goodson Library also houses a sizeable array of audio-visual materials, journals, and periodicals.

## THE COLLEGE ENDS ANOTHER YEAR IN THE BLACK

The Vice President for Business Affairs has reported that Southern Baptist College has completed another year in the black. No one who is not closely related to a church-related college can fully appreciate that accomplishment in these times. That SBC is able to report that achievement is due in part to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention's increased level of support of this institution. Also of significance is another increase in tuition. It has been necessary for SBC to increase tuition by $40 \%$ in a period of three years in order to maintain solvency in a period of runaway inflation and spiraling costs. Those who are responsible for making such decisions concerning changes are hopeful that further increases can be avoided lest those students who need to attend a Baptist college shall be forced to go elsewhere because of the cost differential between a Baptist college and a state institution.

## a GROWING COMMITMENT TO CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Most of the activities normally cited as evidence that a college is serious in her commitment to Christian education and denominational service occur at Southern Baptist College - required Chapel attendance, required Bible courses, Religious Emphasis Weeks, revivals, religious lectures, etc. However a college can provide and require all of these activities, and others, and remain essentially secular in its pervading climate. In addition to these religious activities, there is about Southern Baptist College something extra. It is sensed and commented upon by many people who come on the campus only for brief visits. That something extra is a Christian atmosphere, not perfectly Christian by any means, but profound in its effect. This Christian atmosphere is derived from an unqualified institutional commitment to Christian purposes and values and a faculty of dedicated Christians ready to relate redemptively with students.

It is not surprising then that over 25 young men and young women made professions of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ on the campus of Southern Baptist College last year - in the Men's Dorm, the Women's Dorm, in the offices of the faculty and administration, and elsewhere on campus. Neither is it surprising that SBC attracted 126 students who are preparing for church related vocations. Of these, 92 are ministerial students, more ministerial students than are enrolled in any other Southern Baptist affiliated junior college though some have twice the student enrollment of SBC. In fact the number of ministerial students attending Southern Baptist College exceeds the number attending many of the four-year Southern Baptist affiliated instituions. Of course, we are equally proud of the remaining students who are preparing themselves at SBC to become Christian teachers, lawyers, businessmen, etc.

The foregoing discussion could leave a wrong impression unless given balance. The students at Southern Baptist College are not passive recipients of Christian influence but are rather active participants in the process of Christain education. They conduct one of the most active BSU Programs in the state of Arkansas. They took a musical drama, "The Clown", to scores of churches, high schools, and colleges and saw hundreds of people make significant personal decisions in response to the message of the performances. They went out in student revival teams in an effort to share their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ with their peers. In short, they are an essential ingredient of that special spirit that prevails on the campus of Southern Baptist College.

Southern Baptist College remains grateful to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention for her support and reaffirms her commitment to provide a quality, two-year higher education which is thoroughly enriched by the redemptive purpose and moral values of Christianity.

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## BAPTIST MEMORIAL HOSPITAL Memphis, Tennessee

During 1975 a number of advancements were made in the patient care program of Baptist Memorial Hospital. Some of the more note-worthy of these improvements were:

Fifty additional general-acute beds were opened increasing the hospital's capacity to 1850 beds.

A 20-bed medical-surgical sub-intensive care unit was opened.
The hosptial's 81 -bed psychiatric unit was completely renovated.
A new ten-story physicians' office building, containing over 140,000 square feet of space, was opened for occupancy.
Four new cardiovascular operating rooms were placed in service. Each room has a ceiling column which has outlets for oxygen, suction, nitrous oxide and electricity plus connections for leads which permit monitoring of all the patient's vital signs. As Baptist Memorial Hospital develops as a heart center for this area of the country, its diagnostic and treatment facilities are second to none.

A very complex laboratory procedure which predicts the effectiveness of treatment methods in cases of breast cancer is now being offered to Mid-South physicians. The Baptist Memorial Hospital laboratory is one of the few in the world performing this procedure.
Other program developments included the following:
The visiting hostess office began subscribing to the braille issue of Guideposts for the benefit of blind patients.
The American Cancer Society's "Reach to Recovery" program was instituted at the hospital. Mastectomy (surgical removal of the breast) patients now have available tro them trained volunteers to counsel with them regarding exercises, clothing and breast prostheses in addition to providing emotional support that can come from someone who has undergone the same type of surgery.

A decision was made by the hospital's medical staff and board of trustees to move the entire obstetrical service to the new community satellite hospital that is planned to be in operation by late 1978. This decision was reviewed and approved by the local planning agency and the State Hospital Licensing Board.

Baptist Memorial Hospital took pride in a scientific survey conducted by the Commercial Appeal aimed at determining what the citizens of Memphis thought about their city. In publishing the results, the Commercial Appeal stated, "The survey showed that Memphians rated health care first. It didn't just top the list, it stood in a category by itself - the only area of life in Memphis that rated better than good."

A program has been established in cooperation with the Memphis Board of Education whereby school age patients who will be hospitalized two weeks or longer will receive special tutoring from a special education teacher.

The hospital embarked on a program of filling all of its blood needs through volunteer donors. Blood from volunteer donors has been found to be safer than blood from paid donors. The hospital uses over 25,000 units of blood per year.
Dr. Hugh C. Moore joined the Department of Pathology on July 1 as Medical Director of the Blood Bank.

The Community Rehabilitation Council, a division of the regional health planning agency, designated the hospital's Lamar Unit as the inpatient rehabilitation treatment center for this area.

Dr. William T. Satterfield, Jr. was named Medical Director of the Lamar Rehabilitation Unit.

The hospital again sponsored a Junior Achievement company. Junior Achievement teaches high school students about the free enterprise system by actual experience in establishing a company, making and selling a product.

Service pins were received by 216 employees for anniversaries of 10,15 , 20, 25 and 30 years with Baptist Memorial Hospital. Forty percent of all fulltime employees have at least five years of service and 20 percent have ten or more years of service. Sixteen employees joined the Quarter Century Club.

The School of Nursing enrolled 121 freshman students.
The following members of the active medical staff distinguished themselves by being elected to high offices:

Dr. R. A. Calandruccio was elected president of the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons.

Dr. G. Daniel Copeland was elected president-elect of the Memphis Heart Association.

Employees recognized for honors and achievements included:
Frank S. Groner, hospital president, received the Memphis Rotary Club's Vocational Service Award for "outstanding service to his profession." He was cited for his leadership in the health service industry and specifically for his assistance in establishing the Memphis Rotary Kidney Club.
Hugh Hodgson, assistant vice president, was elected president of the Tennessee Chapter of the Hospital Financial Management Association.

Charles Baker, vice president, advanced to Fellowship in the American College of Hospital Administrators. Fellowship is the highest level of membership in this professional organization.

Maurice Elliott, vice president, was elected president of the board of directors of the Mid-South Eye Bank for Sight Restoration.
Joseph Powell, executive vice president, assumed duties as chairman of the board of trustees of the Tennessee Hospital Association.

Newly elected officers of the hospital's board of trustees are:
Henry C. Self, Marks, Mississippi, was elected chairman of the board of trustees. Mr Self has served terms on the board since 1957 and served as chairman of the board's Executive Committee for the last five years.

Elected first vice chairman of the board of chairman of the Executive Committee was Alvin Huffman, Jr. of Blytheville, Arkansas.
Elected second vice chairman was Ralph R. Lawler, State Trial Judge from Trenton, Tennessee.

The year 1975 was an eventful one for the Department of Religion. The department had a full complement of 13 visiting hostesses and one director, two ministers who completed their internships and have subsequently been placed elsewhere, and two new interns who have begun training.

The format of Religious Emphasis Week was changed to periodic days of spiritual emphasis and these services have proven very effective. The closed circuit television broadcasts from the various chapel services has continued to be very well received.

The chaplaincy department is operating on a 24 -hour call basis, seven days a week, and the interns have been very helpful in giving broader and more effective coverage.

The Department of Religion remains actively involved in preaching through the services in the chapel, teaching through the various schools, and working in the healing ministry to the patients, as the hospital believes in care for the total person - body, mind, and soul.

Baptist Memorial Hospital serves the medical needs of a large portion of the Mid-South population. Over half of the patients admitted during 1975 came from outside Shelby County, Tennessee.

The Bicentennial of the American Revolution is here, and churches across the country are planning how they will participate in this great celebration.

The American Bible Society can help them. Forty years younger than our country, the ABS (born in 1816) grew up with the new nation and made sure that its citizens always had available copies of God's Word to guide them. Pilgrim to pioneer, farmer to factory worker, - the ABS was ready with the Word for everyone.

Today the goal of the ABS is the same - the translation, publication and distribution of the Scriptures in the language of the people withcut doctrinal note or comment and without profit. As a vital resource agency to the churches, the ABS works with the United Bible Societies around the world to provide the Scriptures to more people than ever. At least one book of the Bible has now been translated into 1577 languages, and the number of Bibles, New Testaments, Portions and Selections distributed throughout the world annually runs into the hundreds of millions of copies.

Here are highlights of what the ABS and its partners in the Bible cause did in 1975.

## TR ANSLATION AND PUBLICATION UPDATE 1975

A milestone in the development of the common language translation will be reached late in 1976 when "The Good News Bible," the entire Bible in Today's English Version is published. To be released during the 160th anniversary of the American Bible Society, this translation will be the Society's Bicentennial gift to the people of the United States. The TEV Bible is the culmination of years of painstaking translation work. It makes available for the first time the entire text in easily understood language.

During 1975, the ABS supported 562 translation projects around the world. Highlights of these projects were the publication of the New Testament in Today's Chinese, and the completion of the New Testament in Today's Arabic.

## GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS - TWO YEARS AND GROWING!

The dilemma of the new reader unable to improve upon his reading skills for lack of suitable materials is a problem all too familiar to the Bible Societies. Governmental programs aimed at improving literacy are falling short of their goals. The Societies therefore realize that if "bridge materials" such as Good News for New Readers Scripture Literacy Selections are not available, most of these new readers will return to illiteracy and may never again have the opportunity to read God's Word.

This is where Good News for New Readers can help. Its New Reader Scripture Selections, translated in several progressive reading levels, take a new reader from the primer level to a reading skill that will enable him to understand Scriptures available in his or her own language. Translation of Scripture Literacy Selections has been undertaken in a total of 247 languages and has been finished in Arabic, English, Nepali, Si-Swati, Sudanese and Spanish.

Both church and government interest in this program has increased rapidly around the world, and though Good News for New Readers is only two years old, it has already made its mark among those who support the Bible cause. Here are some examples:

North America/Europe - There are as many as 20 million people in the U.S. who can't read God's Word. Scripture Literacy Selections are being brought to new readers in the first three levels of English and Spanish, as well as the first two levels in French and the first level in Portuguese.

Africa - Good News for New Readers projects are underway in 53 African languages spoken in almost half of the African countries. Scripture Literacy Selections are being distributed in 21 of these languages at the first level and in 19 at the second.

A Way To The Word - In September of 1975, the ABS released a sequel to "New Light, New Hope" entitled "A Way To The Word". This 16 mm color film photographed on location in Brazil, Bolivia, Guatemala and Mexico, shows how these Scripture Literacy Selections are changing the lives of new readers in South America and around the world. The popularity of this film has exceeded all expectations.

## BIBLE SOCIETY ACTIVITES - U.S.A.

## Scripture Distribution

Scripture distribution in the United States during 1975 reached a total of 109,469,781 copies. This represents an increase of $11,181,000$ over 1974.

Taking advantage of opportunities for distribution when they arose, the ABS reached many individuals, churches and other local organizations with copies of Scripture. One such opportunity came with the start of America's Freedom Train on a 21 month, 17,000 mile journey around the U.S. At stops along the way, friends of the Bible Society presented copies of Scripture to the city's leading citizens and officials, as well as to visitors.

## Good News for Modern Man

Nearly ten years ago the new translation of the New Testament called "Good News for Modern Man" was published to be used especially in evangelistic outreach. On the eve of its tenth anniversary, distribution of the New Testament in Today's English Version has passed the fifty million mark, an achievement unmatched in U.S. paperback publishing history.

## New Publications

The Bible Society expanded its service to the handicapped in 1975, with the production of a Scripture Selections for the deaf. The new Selection, "Jesus Stops A Storm," translates Mark 4:35-41 in Signed English. In November, the Bible Society's new publication, "The ABC's of Proverbs," became the most popular addition yet to the series of children's Scriptures that the ABS has published in recent years.

## Scripture Imprints

Custom and imprinted Scriptures constitute a significant part of the Society's national distribution program. Requested especially by individuals and church organizations, these Scriptures are circulated in a variety of life sit uations, including sports events, state and county fairs and programs of evangelistic outreach. Of the 8.5 million Scripture Imprints poduced by the ABS in 1975, 2,259,000 copies were imprinted for Southern Baptist churches and agencies.

## Bible-a-Month Club

Members of the Bible-a-Month Club continued their support of Bible Society work in 1975. By year's end, more than 226,000 members were enrolled helping to get the Word into the hands of those who need it.

## Volunteer Activities

The ranks of ABS Volunteers continue to swell. The number of men and women serving the ABS now stands at 14,367 . They are at work in all parts of the country, bringing Scriptures to churches, hospitals, nursing homes, schools and businesses. Volunteers now operate 1,347 Scripture Courtesy Centers, with at least one Good Newsstand in each of the fifty states.

## Armed Forces

A highlight of last year's activities was the presentation of a specially embossed ship's pulpit Bible to the commanding officer of the nuclear aircraft carrier USS Nimitz. The ABS has placed more than 20 million copies of Scripture in the hands of men and women serving in America's Armed Forces since 1817.

## BIBLE SOCIETY ACTIVITIES ABROAD

The American Bible Society contributed over $\$ 5,600,000$ to the UBS World Service Budget in 1975, giving crucial support to the Bible cause in many parts of the world. More and more of these funds are being used by Bible Societies of Latin America and Africa to undertake local production of the Scriptures.

World Scripture distribution by the United Bible Societies totalled 156,445,597 copies of Scripture in 1975.

## ABS SERVICE TO THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

Here are a few ways the Bible Society is assisting the missionary activities of the Southern Baptist Convention abroad.

Brazil - For Brazil's literacy organization MOBRAL, the Good News for New Readers Scripture Literacy Selections have become the best material available to give to its students just learning to read. Already 600,000 Selecttions have been distributed. Meanwhile, translation work continues on the Common Language Version Old Testament in Portuguese. "The Book of Proverbs" in this new translation was published recently in an edition of 100,000.

Hong Kong - In 1975 churches throughout Hong Kong launched a campaign to place a copy of Scripture in each home in the city. The Bible Society of Hong Kong shared in this effort by publishing 500,000 copies of Mark in Today's Chinese Version. These were distributed by members of over 400 churches prior to the Billy Graham Crusade held in November.

Kenya - Many groups of people in Kenya benefited during 1975 from new translations of the Scriptures. Among these were the 600,000 Kimeru people of the Meru District, and the 530,000 Ekegusii people in southwestern Kenya, who received up-to-date translations of the New Testament.

## Eastern Europe Update

Eastern Europe has posed special problems for the United Bible Societies in their effort to provide Scriptures for the millions of people in need of them, but the work of getting the Word into these eager hands is going on with encouraging results.

In the last decade almost 4.5 million copies of Scripture have been distributed through the Eastern European countries.

In Poland a vigorous program of distribution has developed and with the release of the new Polish 'Millenium" Bible, a long needed supplement to the less easily understood "Gdansk" Bible published 343 years ago, Bible work is receiving a greater impetus.

## Vietnamese Refugees - Filled with Hope

As a result of the turmoil in Southeast Asia, 130,000 refugees fled to the United States, creating a new audience for Christian witness. In quick response to the requests of church groups working in the refugee centers, the ABS printed 50,000 copies each of two Scripture Selections in Vietnamese on the theme of hope. Copies of the New Testament in Today's English Version and New Reader Scripture Selections were also distributed throughout the centers as aids in teaching English to the refugees.

## FINANCIAL SUPPORT

For the American Bible Society and its sister organizations around the world, 1975 was a year of outstanding events and developments. However, inflation has continued to hamper the progress of Bible Society activity.

Higher costs have led to postponement of Bible Society projects in many countries. The Executive Committee of the United Bible Societies recently pledged $\$ 11.2$ million for the support of its worldwide program in 1976, but these funds are not enough. More are needed if the Society is to continue its vital work. The ABS, therefore, requires continued and increased support from the churches.

Contributions from churches in 1975 increased 9.4 per cent over last year to a total of $\$ 1,453,920$. For this the American Bible Society is especially grateful. Nearly 16.5 per cent of this total is represented by the support received from the Southern Baptist Convention a slight decrease from the previous year, as shown below:

## HOW CAN THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION HELP THE BIBLE CAUSE?

The Southern Baptist Convention can help the Bible cause in 1976 by striving for a level of support of $\$ .03$ per member per year. This increase of just $\$ .01$ over the present level of support would provide a total of $\$ 350,000$, helping significantly to take advantage of today's opportunities for sharing the Word, and fostering growth in ABS programs, particularly in the Good News for New Readers program.

We ask your continued prayers, that the Bible Society, in partnership with the Southern Baptist Convention and with all willing Christians may fulfill more effectively its task of bringing the Word of God to all those who ask for it and need it.

## ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION Dallas, Texas <br> Darold H. Morgan, President

"Helping Hands." That's one way to describe the Southern Baptist Convention's Annuity Board in Dallas, Texas.

There are about 175 employees at the Board, so there are 350 hands. The hands work together for one reason: supplying retirement and protection for employees throughout the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Board has plans for pastors and other staff in churches, as well as employees of Baptist hospitals, colleges, homes for children or for the aged and others.

Through the Board's programs, Baptist state conventions place more than $\$ 4$ million in Cooperative Program funds to undergird retirement programs for ministers.

Recently, the Annuity Board's 'helping hands" have been busy fashioning a strong new church retirement program for pastors and other employees. The new program is more realistic for SBC church employees retiring in today's society.

In the new program, the Board recommends the church pay 10 per cent of a member's annual salary and other compensation.

During the first six months of 1976, the Annuity Board continued operating on solid financial ground. Funds held in trust as of June 30, 1976 stood at a record $\$ 439,593,837$.

Premium and dues income reached a record $\$ 18,525,722$ the first six months of 1976. The Board has distributed $\$ 8,749,173$ to 11,502 annuitants through June of this year.

There are 20,704 churches and associations with 27,974 employees currently particpating in the Southern Baptist Protection Program. The following Baptist agencies particpate in the retirement program:

The Report of The Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention covers the twelve month period from September 1, 1975, to September 1, 1976. The fiscal year covers January 1 st to December 31 st, but the dates of this report are necessary to meet the printing deadline of the Convention Minutes, which is September 15 th.

The present three-member staff is composed of an Executive Director, the Reverend Edward W. Harris, an Educational Assistant, Reverend Ronnie P. Sparks, and an Office Secretary, Mrs. Beverly B. Williams.

THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM: The 1975-76 school year saw a staff adjustment in the Alcohol-Narcotics Preventive Education Program. Michael S. Gipson, Baptist Layman, served from September 1, 1975, to October 15, 1975. In that period of service, he filled thirteen Public School appointments. He also attended two Drug Abuse Workshops.

February 1, 1976, Mr. Ronnie P. Sparks began his employment as Educational Assistant and spent the month of February in training, under the supervision of the Executive Director. The announcement of his employment and the biographical material were included in the winter issue of The Christian Citizen, our quarterly newsletter. Among these qualifications listed was a B.A. Degree in Pastoral Ministries at Ouachita Baptist University. He is also an ordained Baptist minister. With these qualifications, he will be welcome in pulpits, Sunday Schools, Youth Groups, and any Church group that desires to hear a dedicated Christian talk about the relation of the Gospel to the problems of addiction to Alcohol or other Drugs. During the months of his employment with the Christian Civic Foundation, we have received glowing reports of the effectiveness of his leadership in the Public Schools and in local churches.

Mr. Sparks has filled a total of twenty-nine appointments in the Public Schools, seven in local churches, two with P.T.A. groups, and one with a Civic Club. During the summer months, Mr. Sparks served in a total of eleven youth camps for the Methodist and Baptist Churches throughout the state of Arkansas.

Mr. Sparks attended a two-day Workshop on Drug Abuse, at Marble Falls, sponsored by the Arkansas State Drug Abuse Authority. He also attended a two weeks course at Chautauqua Institute, Chautauqua, New York, sponsored by the Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

Plans for the 1976-77 School Year are developing rapidly. We anticipate that the number of schools reached during the next twelve month period will reach 100, and the number of pupils, 45,000 . It is our hope that Mr . Sparks will remain with our program and give to us a much-needed sense of continuity in leadership. Increased cost in the Alcohol-Narcotics program has continued to be a matter of real concern. The rising cost of gasoline, food, and lodging makes travel costly for our Educational Assistant. We have continued to pay actual costs in travel expense, providing weekly vouchers for actual expense, based upon a mileage allotment for travel and actual cost of fond and lodging. If our churches continue to support us during these critical days of inflation, it is our hope that we may be able to continue to furnish our services in the program of Alcohol-Narcotics Education without charging the Public Schools for our services. This is truly vital to our program, for we are convinced that any such charge, even a nominal charge, would mean the suspension of our program in local school districts that are already stretching budget dollars to meet basic program features.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL BOARD: One of the most significant developments in the work of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board during 1976 was an application for a Private Club Permit in Clark County by Nancy H. Armstrong, "Island Club", at DeGray State Park Lodge. This is a stateowned and state-leased facility. This opened for consideration a whole new area of operation in our state parks and recreational facilities, if permitted. We immediately alerted our Board members and all ministers in Clark County, and we requested the opportunity to appear at a public hearing on this permit. Joining in this request and in all-out opposition to this application was Dr. Daniel R. Grant, President of Ouachita Baptist University, located in Clark County. He and his staff members gave outstanding leadership in this
matter and in opposition to a threat by the liquor forces to initiate a Local Option election to vote Clark County wet. As of this date, no hearing has been called, and no permit has been granted. No Local Option election appears likely in Clark County either.

House Bill 1176, now Act 1016, sponsored by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, amended Act 132, the Mixed-Drink Bill, requiring that notice of application for all Private Club Permits be published in local newspapers, is now in effect, and will aid in publicizing such applications. The DeGray application was filed before the new law took effect, and we are indebted to the ABC Board Director, Mrs. Karen Jones, for supplying The Christian Civic Foundation with the information needed.

The last recodification of The Rules and Regulations of the State of Arkansas, relating to Alcohol Beverages, was done under the leadership of | Mr. R. E. Brians. New attempts are almost certain to be made at the forthcoming session of the General Assembly.

The Christian Civic Foundation, through its Executive Director, is always available to assist any local group in dealing with permit applications before the $A B C$ Board, if requested, by counsel, by personal appearances before the Board, and by supplying information needed by local groups.

PERMIT ALCOHOL IN DRY COUNTIES: An Economic Development Study Commission was authorized by the 70th General Assembly, to prepare recommendations to improve the state's economic development through 1985, to report to the Governor and the General Assembly by October 1, 1976. One of its recommendations, adopted unanimously on May 17, was the exemption of Public and Private recreational facilities in Dry Counties from the law prohibiting the sale of alcoholic beverages in Dry counties. Resolutions opposing such action were passed unanimously by the Little Rock and North Arkansas Methodist Conferences, and by the Executive Committee of The Christian Civic Foundation. Letters were sent to the Governor and members of the General Assembly opposing such action.

If legislation to implement the recommendation of the Study Commission is passed and signed by the Governor, it will virtually mean the end of the Local Option Law, Initiated Act 1 of 1942, so far as effective control of the Liquor Industry in Dry Counties is concerned.

The Christian Civic Foundation, through its Executive Committee, is requesting that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, in its November meeting of 1976, pass a resolution similar to that of the Methodist Conferences, and, thereby, express the opposition of church bodies representing some onehalf million voters in Arkansas. In our opinion, this is the most important issue that may come before the 71 st General Assembly. To win in this fight, our Legislators and Governor must know our feelings on this matter before the 71st General Assembly opens in January 1977.

LOCAL OPTION ELECTIONS: The Local Option picture for the November 2 General Election shows the following possible elections:

Initiated by the "Drys": Precincts 180 and 180-A, at Sylvan Hills (Pulaski Country), led by our own Rev. W. A. Blount; Greenfield Township, (Poinsett Country); Washburn Township, (Logan County).

Initiated by the "Wets": Bradley County, Cleburne County, Hempstead County, Scott County, Van Buren County, Yell County, and a 'MixedDrink" election in Jefferson County.

The Christian Civic Foundation gives every assistance possible to the "Dry" forces in opposition to the "Wets", without assuming local leadership, which belongs to local forces always. This is the largest number of elections in many years, and reflects the intention of the Liquor Industry to reduce the number of dry counties (44), especially in the areas were there are resorts and other recreational facilities. Such a number puts a heavy strain upon the small staff of The Christian Civic Foundation, and may necessitate the organization of "Task Forces" of laymen and ministers to assist in those counties that are threatened by the "Wets", by November 1978.

LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY: The General Assembly of 1976, which was really an extended session of the 70th General Assembly of 1975, met January 13, and adjourned sine die January 28, meeting for thirteen working days. There were two matters of particular interest to the Christian Civic Foundation and to our Baptist supporters, which we supported, and which were passed with little or no opposition. This was remarkable, in view of the brevity of the meeting.
(1) The Private Club Permit Bill, House Bill 1176, by Representative Logan of Harrison, in Boone County, was the bill which implemented the resolution presented to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention by the Rev. Carroll D. Caldwell, requesting an amendment to Act 132, the Mixed-Drink Bill. It passed the House 78-0, January 20, and the Senate 27-0, January 21. It was signed by Governor Pryor January 27, as Act 1016. With no emergency clause, it went into effect ninety days later.

Senate Bill 841, by Senator Russ, of Conway, in the 21 st District, was indentical to House Bill 1176. This bill passed the Senate 27-0 and the House 87-0. Because this bill was a duplicate, Governor Pryor vetoed this bill February 11.

The above bills included two significant changes in Act 132:

1. A provision for the publication of a notice of a $n$ application for a private club permit by the applicant, at his own expense, to be published at least three weeks prior to the date of the hearing on the application, in a newspaper published in the county wherein the premises to be permitted are located and of general circulation in that county.
2. Upon filing of an application for a private club permit with the Arkansas Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, the Director of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board shall set a date for hearing the application and notify the applicant of such date and the place of the hearing, the date of the hearing to be no earlier than 30 days nor later than 60 days after receipt of the application. At the hearing, the Director shall hear all parties interested and upon conclusion of the hearing, the Director shall issue a written order stating the reason for such decision. Before issuing a permit, the Director must also determine that the application is in the public interest.

The above changes in Act 132 will enable citizens of dry counties, as well as wet counties, for the first time, to be aware that an application has been
made for a private club permit. We are indebted to Brother Caldwell and the Arkansas Baptist State Convention for initiating this important legislation. It is the first time that a public notice and public hearing have been required for private club permit applications.
(2) The Public Drinking Bill, House Bill 1171, by Representative Lipton, of Warren, in Bradley County, was requested by a number of Prosecutors and judges, to restore specific language that was left out of the 1975 Criminal Code Revision, defining public drinking. It was considered to be a strengthening of the public drinking law, by using specific language that would remove the ambiguities that existed after the Criminal Code Revision was passed in 1975.

The Executive Director, as the Legislative Representative for the Christian Civic Foundation, gave every assistance possible in promoting the passage of House Bill 1176, Senate Bill 841 , and House Bill 1171. We saw no evidence of any attempt to extend pari-mutuel betting at this session. We believe that the quick and massive response to this question by Baptists. Methodists, the Assembly of God Church, and the Christian Civic Foundation helped to block the threatened extension before it could be launched into a full-blown movement. In both the Regular and Extended Sessions of the 70th General Assembly, we were solicited by proponents and opponents of measures that were outside the four areas of our direct concern. Alcohol, Gambling, Narcotics, and Obscene Literature, the areas which our Constitution outlines as the limits of our public statements of policy ir legislative action. They included Equal Rights Amendment. Scholarship Funds for students in private and religious schools, and Prayer in the Public Schools. In each case, the Executive Director provided personal counsel, copies of bills on these subjects, and any other help requested by our supporters, short of legislative support or opposition.

During the 71 st General Assembly, Legislators will not face the threat of the Primary and General Elections, as in 1976. They, therefore, will be more independent in their support of issues in 1977. We have published and mailed to all of our Board members and to every Baptist minister copies of the names, districts, addresses, telephone numbers of each Legislator or Nominee for the 1977 session. If they hear from their constituents, we will see the results in the votes they cast. The best support that can be given to the Legislative activity of the Christian Civic Foundation and the prograrn of civic righteousness comes when our suppo:ters contact their Senators and House members and let them know personally their convictions on all vital questions that have to do with public morality. The passage of House Bill 1176, sponsored by the ABSC, is ample evidence of the effectiveness of this approach.
"THE CHRISTIAN CITIZEN", QUARTERLY NEWSLETTER: With the Summer Issue of The Christian Citizen, the quarterly newsletter of the Christian Civic Foundation, the number of issues reached six. The first issue was mailed May 2, 1975. From the reports that we have received from our readers, this important line of communication has more than justified the cost of the newsletter. The Spring and Summer Issues of 1976 carried mater-
ials that were aimed specifically at current elections in various counties, at the problems of a "Mixed-Drink" election, and the efforts to exempt Public and Private recreational facilities in Dry counties from the laws prohibiting the sale of Alcoholic Beverages. Anticipating requests for additional copies, we doubled our usual printing. We have supplied hundreds of extra copies, free of cost, to local groups engaged in County elections. Costs continue to rise, but, thusfar, our Non-Profit Bulk Mailing Permit makes it possible to meet mailing costs. Since we do not charge our supporters for this newsletter, we must depend entirely upon the voluntary contributions of local churches to meet these growing costs. The preparation of copy, addressing, mailing puts a heavy burden upon a small staff, but our work is made possible by the wonderful cooperation of the Baptist and Methodist Headquarters in allowing us to use their mailing lists and addressing facilities. Without it, we could not publish and distribute The Christian Citizen. We say thanks, again!

THE ANNUAL BOARD MEETING: The Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors of The Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, Inc., was held Monday, March 15, 1976, at the Second Baptist Church, Little Rock, with a luncheon meeting at 12:30 p.m., preceded by a fellowship period from 12:00 to 12:30 p.m. Presiding was Mr. Dale Ward, President.

The speaker was Dr. Charles H. Ashcraft, Executive Secretary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Dr. Ashcraft's message was in answer to the question, "What Moral Foundations will America need, if we are to survive during the next 200 years?" He emphasized the moral foundations upon which the nation was founded, the erosion of these foundations, and the steps in ré-establishing them. Dr. Ashcraft pointed out that the inadequacies of having secular humanism as a foundation can be seen in the moral decline of our nation. He stressed that it is not too late to reclaim America, pointing out steps needed to return the nation to the proper moral foundations. These steps were (1) Start where our forefathers left off; (.2) Give the church the proper place in our nation; (3) Follow the example of the Good Samaritan in all of our activities; (4) Re-emphasize the importance of obeying the laws of the land; and (5) Re-establish personal commitment on the part of the citizens.

Following Dr. Ashcraft's message, reports of the officers were received, guests introduced, and the business was concluded at the luncheon table with the installation of the following off icers:

# FOREIGN MISSION BOARD

## MISSIONARY SUPPORT

The sending out and maintaining of missionaries is primary in Southern Baptist overseas missions through the channel of the Foreign Mission Board. At the close of 1975 the Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,667 (including 206 missionary associates, 156 missionary journeymen, and 5 special project medical workers). The 265 reinforcements for the missionary staff established a new high point in the number of missionaries sent forth in a single year. The new missionaries included 134 career missionaries, 20 who were reappointed, 29 missionary associates, 80 missionary journeymen, and 2 special project medical workers. These bring the total number appointed since 1845 to 5,641 .

More than 1.200 lay volunteers served overseas in 1975, in evangelism, medicine, touring choirs, construction, youth work, teaching, business management, and agriculture.

On January 1, 1976 Southern Baptist missionaries were assigned to 82 geographical or political entities.* El Salvador was added during the year and 1975 was the first year of Foreign Mission Board responsibility for the work in Panama. Laos was removed from the list after the communist takeover of that country. Missionaries are no longer in Vietnam, but some are still assigned there and are working with Vietnamese refugees while on furlough and pending reassignment. Due to political unrest, missionaries have withdrawn from Angola and Mozambique, but stand ready to return to these countries whenever possible. Entry to Madagascar has been delayed due to the politicial situation. The name of Dahomey has been changed to Benin.

The division of South America into two administrative areas became effective at the beginning of 1975.
*Anogola, Antigua, Argentina, Austria, Bahamas, Bangladesh, Barbados, Belgium, Benin, Bermuda, Botswana, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Ethiopia, France, Gaza, Germany, Ghana, Greece, Grenada, Guadeloupe, Guam, Guatemala, Guyana, Honduras, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Iran, Israel, Italy, Ivory Coast, Jamaica, Japan, Jordan, Kenya, Korea, Lebanon, Liberia, Libya, Macao, Madagascar, Malawi, Malaysia, Mexico, Morocco, Mozambique, Niger Republic, Nigeria, Okinawa, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Portugal, Rhodesia, Senegal, Singapore, South West Africa, Spain, St. Lucia, Surinam, Switzerland (Baptist Center), Taiwan, Tanzania, Thailand, Togo, Trinidad, Turkey, Uganda, Upper Volta, Uruguay, Venezuela, Vietnam, Yemen, and Zambia, (Work in Libya, Greece, and Turkey is with an English-language Baptist church in each country.)

## BOLD NEW PLANS

The Foreign Mission Board, in addition to its regular programs of work, has been engaged in comprehensive strategy studies to develop plans for the remainder of the century. The formal strategy statement, to be presented to the Executive Committee in early 1976 and then to the Southern Baptist Convention at Norfolk, was near completion at the end of the year.

It is fully anticipated that Southern Baptists will respond to the bold new plans for mission advance both by increased giving through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering and by earnest prayer that the Lord of the harvest may thrust laborers into his harvest.

## EVANGELISM AND CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

Evangelism and church development are central to the objectives of missions: making disciples, maturing disciples in the fellowship of local churches, and developing churches into a cooperative effort for a continued outreach. Churches overseas are stimultated by the Foreign Mission Board and its missionaries, but rather than being extensions of, they stand in fraternal relationship with the Southern Baptist Convention. Accomplishments are largely those of national churches, leaders and conventions, with the assistance of missionary co-workers and resources from Southern Baptists.

Representative of activites in evangelism and church development during 1975 were work in: radio and television, religious education promotion, lay leadership training, stewardship, camps and conferences, women's work, men's work, youth work, and music.

Broadcasting workshops were held in Panama for nationals and missionaries from all Latin America and locally in several other countries. Free time was made available to Baptists in Equatorial Brazil for a weekly broadcast. Programs were broadcast over international stations, in Vietnamese from the Philippines, in Spanish to all of Latin America, and from Swaziland to several African countries.

In many lands, teams of evangelists and lay witnesses from the United States, persons from neighboring countries, or local evangelists provided leadership for evangelistic campaigns.

An urban evangelism specialist was assigned to Singapore and a pilot project in major city evangelization in South Brazil is in planning stages.

New Baptist associations were developed in Malawi; conventions were restructured in Venezuela and Colombia. Ugandan Baptists sent out a home missionary; Argentine Baptists made plans for sending missionaries to Peru; and Brazilian Baptists entered Uruguay and made plans to send missionary personnel to Argentina.

## SCHOOLS AND STUDENT WORK

Strong indigenous churches must have capable and well-trained leadership from among their people. Educational institutions under Baptist auspices in various lands may include all levels from kindergarten through university.

Baptists also sponsor theological schools and Bible institutes to prepare men and women for church and denominational leadership. Theological education by extension has expanded into many countries, with new plans being developed in the French-speaking areas of West Africa and in the Yoruba language in Nigeria.

There were new seminary buildings in 1975 in Venezuela, Nigeria, and Korea; new housing at the Equatorial Brazil Seminary; and the offering of new degrees in religious education and music in Venezuela. The first graduates were reported by the Luzon Baptist Bible School in the Philippines; night theological institute classes were begun in Guatemala.

There were new buildings for Baptist schools in Equatorial Brazil and Liberia and a new science building at Southern Baptist College in the Philippines. Schools at Sanyati, Rhodesia, became a convention project and two Baptist colleges in Nigeria were turned over to the government.

Student work continued to progress during 1975 with new programs developed in Spain, Okinawa, and Benin; student center property purchased in Jamaica; and the restructuring of the student program in Thailand.

## PUBLICATION WORK

Adequate supplies of all kinds of Christian literature are needed for the developing of vigorous churches; therefore publication ministries are an integral part of Southern Baptist overseas missions.

In 1975 the Baptist Spanish Publishing House (El Paso, Texas) began implementation of new organizational plans. The Baptist Publishing House in Brazil, having weathered a financial crisis, was operating on a stable cash basis.

Major developments in literature work included a Central America Literature Conference, production of lesson materials in Dutch for Surinam, Bible translation work in Uganda, and a new publications building in Malawi.

Book deposits were established in Panama and El Salvador and a missionary couple arrived in El Salvador to begin a literature ministry. A new bookmobile in Costa Rica will travel also to Panama and Nicaragua. More bookmobiles were added in Malaysia and Singapore. Ten bookstore outlets were developed in churches in Colombia.

## HOSPITALS AND MEDICAL CARE

While meeting the physical needs of thousands of people who might otherwise be neglected, Baptist medical work often opens strategic doors for evangelism. In cooperation with national medical personnel, this witness is expressed by Southern Baptists through hospitals, dental clinics, dispensaries and day clinics, nursing schools, and other health care ministries in overseas lands.

Near the end of 1975, after several years of negotiation and prayer, Immanuel Hospital at Bukittinggi, Indonesia, received official approval. Outpatient clinic ministries began on December 1 .

Medical training programs at Gaza Hospital were organized into a School of Health Science. Hospitals at Ogbomosho and Shaki, Nigeria, were placed under government administration.

Also reported in 1975 were a new wing under construction at the hospital in Korea, construction of a laboratory in Paraguay, an X-ray building and a new pediatrics clinic at Ogbomosho, a family planning project in Bangladesh, and the first Thai medical director at the hospital in Thailand.

Medical projects involving groups of physicians or dentists from the United States were carried out in Antigua, Barbados, Dominica, Trinidad, and Guyaná.

## BENEVOLENT MINISTRIES

Social service ministries, closely related in motivation and results to medical work, include agricultural programs, good will and community centers, orphan homes, and direct relief.

Awareness of the growing world hunger problem led to greatly increased relief contributions in 1975. Major relief operations during the year were those in Vietnam and with Vietnamese refugees, in Bangladesh, and in Angola. Reconstruction following the Honduras hurricane continued into 1975. There was work with Cambodian refugees and with refugees from Mozambique and Angola. Help was given after floods in Thailand and Brazil, an earthquake in Turkey, and fire in the Dominican Republic. Wells were dug in drought areas of Senegal and Benin.

Other developments included a new agricultural missions program for Antigua, remodeling of the Baptist orphanage in Italy, and the beginning of weekday ministries in Equatorial Brazil.

## CONTRIBUTIONS

At the end of 1975, Southern Baptists' contributions for foreign missions totaled $\$ 48,527,407$. The 1975 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering goal was $\$ 24$ million - an increase over the $\$ 23,234,093.89$ contributed (as of May 1 , 1975) through the 1974 of fering.

Approximately 50 percent of the Southern Baptist Convention Cooperative Program funds is made available annually for foreign missions. This is the basis upon which sustained advance can be built. Still needed urgently on overseas fields are land, buildings, and equipment, amounting to several million dollars' worth.

## BOLD MISSION THRUST

In keeping with the denomination's 1977-79 theme, "Sharing Christ in Bold Mission in the Secular Society," the Home Mission Board gave major attention last year to planning a "Bold Mission Thrust" in the homeland. Most of the state conventions are planning for major advances in reaching counties without an effective evangelistic witness, correlation of mission resources in key cities among groups such as ethnics, apartment dwellers and various subculture groups in our nation, and in transitional communities with churches in crisis. There are more than 600 counties in the United States that do not have a Southern Baptist congregation. Many do not have an adequate evangelical witness from any source. Direct objectives of the "Bold Mission Thrust" are to "Let every person in our land have an opportunity to hear and accept the gospel of Jesus Christ," and to "Let every person in our land have an opportunity to share in the witness and ministry of a New Testament fellowship of believers.

## TWO NEW EVANGELISM PROGRAMS

The Home Mission Board's Program of Evangelism Development was joined by two more programs (Personal Evangelism and Mass Evangelism) approved at last year's annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Program of Personal Evangelism promoted the "Lifestyle Evangelism" project in the denominational emphasis, developed a central strategy for personal evangelism in the local church, assisted 23 state conventions in developing renewal evangelism strategy and conducted a research conference on evangelism with young adults. The Program of Mass Evangelism in 1975 provided plans and support materials for the local church, "Proclamation '76" revivals, trained five area crusade directors, received 21,932 mail responses from the viewing audiences of the syndicated television series, "Spring Street, USA," conducted a conference for Southern Baptist vocational evangelists, and conducted three mass evangelism consultations.

## ANNIE ARMSTRONG EASTER OFFERING, A RECORD OFFERING

In a year when living costs were continuing to rise and unemployment was high, both the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering (AAEO) and Cooperative Program support were up from 1974. Cooperative Program receipts were up 8.95 percent and AAEO advanced 4 percent. The 1975 AAEO receipts totaled $\$ 8,491,653$, a record offering, but missing the $\$ 8.5$ million goal by less than one tenth of one percent. The 1976 goal is $\$ 9.5$ million.

## \$44,000 IN DIASTER RELIEF

Disaster relief needs in five states were assisted in being met with funds totaling $\$ 44,000$ distributed through the Department of Christian Social Ministries. The department conducted state and regional conferences on Christian Social Ministries, plus conferences dealing with specialized areas
such as youth and family services, ministering to older adult and literacy missions. It conducted a workshop to train Spanish-speaking people to help Spanish non-readers. In cooperation with the Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood Commission, and the Christian Life Commission, the Department of Christian Social Ministries conducted workshops on ministry in the small church, and the church ministering to the alcoholic and drug abuser and their families.

## 200 CHAPLAINS ENDORSED

Southern Baptist chaplains relating to the Chaplaincy Division conducted 45,439 worship services and 22,689 Bible classes in 1975. A total of 200 denominational endorsements were granted to include military, active duty and reserves, Civil Air Patrol, hospital, veteran's administration, industrial and institutional chaplaincy; and 15 volunteer chaplaincy ministries were established in 1975. Military and civilian chaplains in active service totaled 837, plus 510 in various reserve categories. "Operation Denomination" continued to gain support with various state conventions establishing chaplains advisory groups, holding conferences for chaplains, placing chaplains on their regular mailing list and sending them the state paper. Southern Baptist chaplains reported 11,689 professions of faith in 1975.

## NE W DIRECTOR SOUGHT

In October, 1975, a search committee was named by the Board of Directors to begin seeking a new executive director to replace Arthur B. Rutledge who retires at the end of 1976. Rutledge has spent 18 years at the Home Mission Board, first as missions director, and since 1965 chief executive. His ministry and the effects his life has had on home missions are detailed in the June, 1976 issue of Home Missions magazine.

## 1,300 CHURCHES COUNSELED ON LOANS

During 1975 the Division of Church Loans gave counsel to approximately 1,300 churches, assisting many to receive local financing. Where local financing was not available, loan applications from 185 churches were processed and approved for $\$ 12,190,095$. In October, 1975, the interest rate on loans was raised to 9.5 percent. During 1975 its loan portfolio increased from $\$ 43,019,484$ to $\$ 46,132,838$ and the delinquency ratios remained steady at 7.2 percent of loans delinquent 90 days or longer. Less than one percent of the funds were represented by delinquent loans.

## BLACK CHURCHES, AGENCIES ASSISTED

The Department of Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists continued to work with and assist Southern and National Baptists churches, associations, state conventions and agencies in their efforts to effect cooperative and reconciling relationships designed toward the development of stronger churches and better ways of working together. It assisted in the support of 71 missionary personnel and provided 174 scholarships and four internships to black students. It sponsored a National Baptist Student Retreat that reached 500 students, sponsored a conference on "New Directions in Black Evangelism" and planned the 1976 conference on Black theological opportunities.

## INTERFAITH AWARENESS PROMOTED

With a research and resource staff of four and with four regional directors based in different parts of the nation, the Deparment of Interfaith Witness conducted 69 awareness conferences in 25 states and 18 statewide training workshops for volunteer resource persons. It distributed 128,409 copies of various pamphlets and 121,000 copies of its booklet B.O.O.K. (Beliefs of Other Kinds), and produced pamphlets on the Orthodox, Black Cults, and one on changes in Roman Catholicism. The department conducted one dialogue with leaders of the Reorganized Church of Latter Day Saints and another with Roman Catholics.

## 2,124 MISSIONARIES ON FIELD

At the close of 1975 a total of 2,124 missionaries were under HMB appointment, most jointly employed with state conventions. This employed force was augmented by 1,208 student summer missionaries, 28 semester missionaries, and 34 Sojourners (high school students doing home mission work at no cost to the Board). The list was swelled further by more than 10,000 youths and adults who served one or two weeks through churchsponsored mission programs and by 141 adults who served in the Christian Service Corps.

## REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT

More than 137,000 Vietnamese and other Southeast Asians entered the U.S. last year. Immediate steps were taken by the Home Mission Board's Immigration and Refugee Service Staff, in cooperation with Southern Baptists living in the camp areas in Arkansas, California and Florida, to assist with camp ministries and resettlement. By December, almost 800 churches had particpated in resettling 2,777 persons in 768 family units. The Foreign Mission Board loaned former missionary to Vietnam Lewis Myer, Jr. to the HMB to assist the Language Missions Department in establishing spiritual ministries among the refugees. Currently, there are more than 20 groups meeting regularly for Bible study and worship, in addition to Vietnamese who identified with English-language churches.

## ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS PROVIDE TRAINING BASE

The Division of Associational Missions, with its three program assignments: Associational Administration Services, Metropolitan Missions and Rural-Urban Missions, assisted in the support of 490 missionaries. It enlisted 500 associations in annual planning using the Associational Planning Guide, enlisted 63 directors of missions to participate in Associational Leadership Developement courses, and provided orientation courses for 59 new directors of missions. It enlisted and trained 20 volunteers to serve as Urban Training Cooperative staff, participated in seven community-in-crisis projects, and compiled and distributed the book, "The Mobile American in Multifamily Housirg." And the division assisted in six statewide small church conferences involving 450 persons, conducted a conference for In-Service Guidance directors involving 40 men representing 21 Baptist institutions in 12 state conventions and provided opportunities for church extension strategies to be presented to 275 Directors of Missions, 50 Moderators and 40 associational missions committee chairmen.

# THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD 

Southern Baptist Convention Nashville, Tennessee

During the 1974-75 ficasl year Dr. Grady C. Cothen was formally installed as president of the Sunday School Board, assuming full responsiblity for that position, and Dr. W. O. Thomason assumed the duties of executive vice-presiḍent.

The Office of Finance and the Office of Planning were established during the year to give greater cohesiveness to all of the Board's program assignments. E. DeVaughn Woods was elected vice-president for the Office of Finance and Morton Rose was elected director of the Office Planning.

A major highlight of the 1974-75 year was the development of ACTION: A Reach Out Enrollment Plan for Sunday School. As of September 30, 1975, 4,800 copies of the ACTION materials had been sold and major meeting for ACTION interpretation had been held in 16 states.

Broadman Press introduced 381 new products this year including 72 books, 10 motion pictures, 24 filmstrips, 32 audio aids, nine recordings, 11 instrumental tapes, seven choral or vocal collections, seven choral works, four pieces of sheet music, four songbooks, three music cassettes, 90 octavos, seven instrumental works, and 101 new church supply items.

The first Baptist Book Store Mail Order Center was scheduled to open October 1, 1975, in Greensboro, North Carolina. By October 1, 1978, 11 Baptist Book Store Mail Order Centers will be in operation in or near cities where the United States Postal Service is building its Bulk Mail Centers. A new Baptist Book Store was opened in April in Asheville, North Carolina

Among significant accomplishments for the 1974-75 year was the release of the new Baptist Hymnal at a national PraiSing celebration in Nashville on March 15, 1975. Enthusiastic acceptance was immediate and by the end of September more than $1,000,000$ copies were in churches throughout the Convention.

The establishment of the Family Ministry Department, previously part of the Program of Church Administration Development, also is of great significance. This new department immediately will launch a major emphasis of helping churches to strengthen and enrich family life.

Shipping schedules for Church Literature were moved 10 days earlier allowing more time for orders to reach customers.

Priority continues to be given to providing consultation and resources to pastors of small churches who do not have employed staff members. A major strategy for reaching these pastors with church administration assistance is through the "ABC's of Church Administration Plan" which provides practical training to meet basic administration needs. To date 1,633 pastors have completed training.

The conference centers at Ridgecrest, North Carolina, and Glorieta, New Mexico, registered 86,300 guests and these stayed a total of 373,756 guest days.

An average of 283 campers each week enrolled in Camp Crestridge for Girls and Camp Ridgecrest for Boys.

The Sunday School Board provided at total of $\$ 1,384,666$ to state conventions for 1974-75. Contribution to the operating expense of the Southern Baptist Convention was accomplished by the transfer of $\$ 371,800$ to the Convention.

This report deals only with several major situations in the ministry of the Board. Its trustees, administration, and workers continue their commitment to meet the needs and wants of Southern Baptist churches in reaching out to the lost with a saving faith, and in educational programs to lead Christians to Christlike maturity. CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION<br>Southern Baptist Convention Nashville, Tennessee<br>Foy Valentine, Executive-Secretary

In this Bicentennial year of 1976, the attention of the nation has been focused on Christian citizenship in particular and moral issues in general. Both are of continuing concern to Southern Baptists and to the Christian Life Commission. It is the responsibility of the people of God to strengthen and extend a Chrisitan witness in a morally confused world where Christian morality is desperately needed.

Concern of Christian morality development is growing significantly among Southern Baptists. An increasing number of individuals, pastors, and churches are substantially expanding their commitment of applying the gospel and their involvement in a responsible penetration of the world and permeation of society with the whole gospel of Jesus Christ. Baptist commitment to a balanced and Biblical faith is deepening, concern for Christian morality development is growing, and commitment to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world is increasing.

Communication of the moral imperatives of the gospel has been undertaken by the Christian Life Commission and others of like mind and heart in the past year through a continuing output of sermons, articles, lessons, books, news releases, pictures, curriculum materials, pamphFet Iiterature, and actions related to applied Christianity. Special attention has been given in local churches to applying the gospel as programs have been developed for Christian social action in the local church.

Conferences on applied Christianity have emphasized Christian citizenship, Christian answers to family problems, public education, and moral issues of particular concern in this year of national elections.

Five areas of Christian social concern have required the special attention of the Christian Life Commission. (1) Family life has been emphasized through conferences, sermons, pamphlets, specialized meetings for leaders, participation in national meetings where a Baptist witness for Christ has been borne, some major addresses, and guest editorials. (2) Race relations has been emphasized by distributing study materials and photographs related to Race Relations Sunday, by encouraging and assisting Baptists in the development of continuing dialogue, mission action, and ministries across racial lines, and by the continued distribution of educational materials and suggestions for action related to the Christian way in race relations. (3) Christian citizenship has been emphasized through the special promotion of Christian Citizenship Sunday, the dissemination of three books on Christian citizenship, heavy involvement in helping Baptists responsibly celebrate the nation's Bicentennial observance, preparation and wide distribution of special materials related to Christian citizenship, and the development of a new consciousness and a new commitment related to Christian citizenship. (4) Economics and daily work have received attention through articles written, literature distributed, messages delivered, special emphasis on Christians and daily work at Labor Day, and continued study and research to help Baptists apply Christian principles in this important arena. (5) Special moral concerns have received attention through education and action on such important moral issues as immoral television programing, violence, obscenity, pornography, abuse of alcohol and other drugs, the ecological crisis, gambling, criminal justice, abortion, divorce, sexual morality, and hunger.

In these and many other ways, the Christian Life Commission continues its task of helping changed people to change the world.

## EDUCATION COMMISSION

## Southern Baptist Convention Na shville, Tennessee

## INTRODUCTION

Denominational relations. - Created a new staff position, Director of Denominational Relations. Establishing this position fulfills a long-standing need for someone to be full time in assisting Baptist colleges and schools in having a broader participation in Southern Raptist life and work and to become more fully involved in achieving denominational goals.

National Colloquium. - Plans have been completed for a National Colloquium on Christian Education to be held at the Phi Beta Kappa Auditorium on the College of William and Mary campus, Williamsburg, Virginia, June $9-12,1976$. The main concern of the Colloquium is the Christian purpose for Baptist schools. The Colloquium will be an introduction to a three-year
study of such major considerations as the biblical and theological basis for Christian education, understanding the Christian purpose of a Baptist school, developing academic excellence, transmitting values and developing Christian citizenship, assisting the students to develop a Christian world view, and a new look at the Baptist schools' responsibility for training both professional and lay leadership.

New campus missions strategy. - Representative Baptist college presidents held a two-day meeting with Baker James Cauthen at the Foreign Mission Board in Richmond, Virginia. Also attending the meeting were area secretaries. The purpose of the meeting was to hold a two-day conference for developing a new mission strategy for Baptist college campuses.

Academic Recognition for Hong Kong Baptist College and Seinan Gakuin University. - An academic visitation team including Ben C. Fisher, executive director of the Education Commission; Gordon W. Sweet, executive secretary of the College Delegate Assembly of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools; Daniel R. Grant, president of Ouachita Baptist University; and John E. Johns, president of Stetson University, made an intensive oncampus study and produced reports which have resulted in wide recognition of the academic excellence of these institutions.

State education committee chairmen. - Sponsored a fourth annual workshop of the state education committee chairmen, using as the major theme The Responsibility of the Christian College for Transmitting Values.

Student recruitment workshop. - Held fourth annual student recruitment workshop with another record attendance. An important feature of this workshop was hearing what local pastors had to say concerning the recruitment of Baptist students in Baptist churches.

Trustee orientation. - Conducted on-campus workshops in trustee orientation and provided special consultative services for state secretaries who wish to develop a convention sponsored statewide orientation program for all institutional trustees.

Teacher placement. - A record-breaking year in placing Baptist teachers and administrative personnel in Baptist colleges and seminaries. Have begun a study of placement service and registry with a view to reorganization of function.

Tax reform. - Proposals for radical tax reform which would be of great harm both for schools and churches are still being made in Washington. Great pressure is being exerted to lower the limit of taxable deductions to charitable causes and to place serious limitations on estate giving. Much work has been done in preparing materials for the Congressional House Ways and Means Committee and in serving as liaison between the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools and the Congress.

These are some of the highlights but do not include the staff work which is carried on a year-round basis for the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools and additional staff work for the following: the administration and disbursement in accounting for all funds of the American Baptist Theological Seminary, the Opdyke Fund, the Farmer-Robertson scholarship programs. Staff participated in Impact ' 80 Conference, National Seminar on

Support of Missions, Consultation on Foreign Missions, and other conferences. This also does not include a wide range of service programs to state secretaries, state conventions, associations, and individual Baptist schools.

Institutional Changes. - Robert L. Lynn was named president of Louisiana College. W. E. Thorn was elected president of Dallas Baptist College replacing Charles E. Pitts had resigned. George Silver was named to the presidency of North Greenville College.

Support. - The state conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention increased their support of the schools for operations and capital needs by $\$ 2,605,832$ or a total of $\$ 31,228,389$. The Georgia schools received $\$ 356,483$ for addition to their endowment funds. Donations, gifts, and grants amounted to $\$ 32,645,806$. Total assets of the schools amounted to $\$ 985,550,278$, or $\$ 302,412,322$ endowment and $\$ 683,127,956$ property value.

Vocational Christian Volunteers. - Vocational Christian volunteers totaled 21,127 for 1975-1976 or an increase of 1,997 . This represents a 10.44 percent increase.

3. Met with other national leaders of Christian higher education for a conference on the role of church-related colleges in American education.
4. Assisted parents and church leadership in supplying information on location and subjects off ered in Baptist schools.
5. Worked with Home Mission Board on in-service training programs for vocational Christian volunteers on Baptist college campuses.

## The Program of College Studies and Services

Program Accomplishments 1974-75:

1. Have assisted Baptist colleges and schools in self-studies for accreditation and in correcting weaknesses revealed by such self-studies and in developing statements of Christian purpose.

(6) Monitored financial, legal, and other affairs of ABTS.
(7) Provided consultative services for ABTS, ABTS Commission, ABTS Board of Trustees, ABTS Holding Board, and Executive Committee SBC (regarding ABTS)

## The Program of Teacher-Personnel Placement Services

Program Accomplishments 1974-75:

1. Record-breaking year in placing Baptist teachers and administrative personnel in Baptist colleges and seminaries.
2. Continued intensive search for executive talent, including presidents, academic deans, business managers, public relations directors, admissions officers, development directors, and others.
3. Assisted the Foreign Mission Board in faculty recruitment for overseas service.

## The Program of Student Recruitment <br> Program Accomplishments 1974-75.

1. Held fourth admissions workshop with emphasis on recruiting in Baptist churches.
2. Developed new methods of recruitment in and through the recruitment workshop for states not having Baptist schools.
3. Participated in Acteens Conference for 11,000 young people and counselors where materials were distributed and personal conferences were conducted in behalf of all Baptist schools.
4. Worked with state education committee chairmen to develop new plans for recruiting in churches.
5. Improved utilization of Baptist state papers as a channel for communicating news and information about Christian education to churches.
6. Continued to assist church librarians in building files concerning Christian education and Baptists schools.

## The Program of Convention Relations

Program Accomplishment 1974-75:

1. Enlisted pastors, state convention leadership, and SBC agencies in support of the National Colloquium to be held in 1976.
2. Gave special assistance to state executive secretaries, state education committees, SBC agencies, and individual colleges and schools on request. Received an average of three to five requests each week.
3. Prepared a special issue of The Southern Baptist Educator and mailed to all associational missionaries.
4. Continued to work with the Denominational Relations Committee of the Commission with special emphasis on better communications with Baptist pastors and denominational leaders.
5. Worked with committees within the Education Commission members to study present and future goals and programs.
6. Prepared statistical summaries for annual report to Convention including enrollment, number of ministerial students, home and foreign mission
volunteers, church music and minister of education volunteers and number of other church-related volunteers, endowment, property value, etc.
7. Continued work on tax reform legislation and Title IX before the Congressional House Ways and Means Committee, distributing material to state executive secretaries, state education committee/commission chairmen and other selected leaders.
8. Served as director for United College Board (black colleges).
9. Conducted workshop for the chairmen of Christian education committees in state conventions with primary emphasis on convention relations.
10. Prepared a special tract on Christian education and mailed to all pastors.
11. Prepared and distributed materials for promoting and supporting Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day for February 15, 1976.

# THE RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION 6350 West Freeway, Fort Worth, Texas 76116

In five years, Baptist radio and television programs may very well have disappeared from the "Sunday ghetto" of today's religious programming. Instead, they are expected to compete with soap operas, made for television movies, and televised sports events.
"It is the aim of the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission to produce multiple five-days-a-week programs, leaving the Sunday scene, insofar as the stations will allow this shift," Paul M. Stevens, Commission president, reported to delegates attending the 119th Southern Baptist Convention recently.
"Baptists, through the Radio and Television Commission, are trying to convey that religion is an everyday business and should not be relegated to a single day a week, and especially not to the Sunday morning ghetto," Stevens said.

The "Sunday ghetto" is an industry term used to designate the day most religious programs are broadcast. While Sunday evening is considered prime television time, because of recreation habits, Sunday mornings and afternoon time slots are not. Religious broadcasters long have sought a place for religious productions in regular programming during weekday broadcasts.

Stevens indicated the Radio and Television Commission, which now produces programs aired weekly on 2,699 radio stations and 187 television stations, "aims to expand its ministry" through radio and television.
"The agency also wants to be a media resource supply center for the denomination, and to offer consultation on the technical aspects of using radio, television, film, videotape, and cable television," he said.

This will be possible through the utilization of production studio and training center being built. The studio-training center is expected to be ready in August, with equipment installation and staffing to be complete by late 1976.

A consultation on the use of the new studio was held in May at the Radio and Television Commission. Agency heads and a cross section of Southern Baptists were introduced in depth to the resources available to them.

Among these resources will be two half-hour television series of 13 films which will be completed this year and offered back to back in January, 1977, to TV stations.
"The Athletes" takes advantage of the public's hero worship of sports figures and features some of these men at home with their families, involved in hobbies and recreational activities, and sharing their spirtual involvement.

Some of the athletes already filmed include baseball's Don Kessinger of the St. Louis Cardinals; Tim Foley of the Miami Dolphins football team; weightlifter Paul Anderson, billed as the world's strongest man; and coaches Tom Landry of the Dallas Cowboys football team and Grant Teaff of the Baylor Baptist University Bears football team.
"Listen" explores some of mankind's discoveries about the universe and springboards them into a strong evangelistic message. Dr. Charles G. Fuller, pastor of First Baptist Church, Roanoke, Va., will bring these thoughts.

An additional 13 dramas and documentaries were added to the Commission's present television series, "The Human Dimension." Four of the 13 were produced in cooperation with the Foreign Mission Board. One featured Dr. Robert Lindsey, Baptist missionary to Israel. The other three spotlighted mission work in Japan dealing with education, literature, and urban problems.

Radio programs produced by the Radio and Television Commission include "The Baptist Hour," approaching its 35th anniversary; "Powerline", now in its seventh year; the award-winning "MasterControl"*; "Country Crossroads," described by Billboard magazine as the most widely listened to country music radio show in the nation; "SoulSearchers," designed to reach black young people, and "Nightsong, " featuring "The Centurymen" and designed for airing five nights a week.

In addition to television productions, Baptists were represented on $A B C$, CBS, and NBC for a total of nine and a half hours of network time during 1975.

The beginning of 1976 saw increased network activities with NBC launching a series of programs celebrating the Bicentennial. The NBC series, titled "Under God" featured eight special programs - two each produced by the four faith groups recognized by the networks.
(These four groups are the Southern Baptists, the U.S. Catholic Conference, the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, Inc., and the National Council of Churches, USA.)

The Lily Endowment made a $\$ 100,000$ grant to the faith groups to fund the promotion and educational follow-up of these programs. It was called "an unprecedented opportunity for cooperation among the faith groups."

Other Commission activities noted in the report included the work of TimeRite Inc., in films for the Arkansas Baptist Convention, the Virginia Baptist Homes, the Mississippi Baptist Convention, and television spots for churches in Louisiana and Virginia.

# GOLDEN GATE BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Mill Valley, California 

Harold K. Graves, President

During the 32nd year for Golden Gate Baptist Seminary there has been a record enrollment of 441 . Of these, $33 \%$ came from Baptist colleges. Thirtyfive states and 11 foreign countries were represented in the student body. Non-Baptist enrollment was 72.

The Los Angeles Center is now the Southern California Center which enrolled 108 students in the first three years of its operation. Several individuals who began their work at the Center have come on to the Seminary and graduated.

Dr. G. W. Schweer, Associate Professor of Evangelism joined the faculty this year. Three men whose service to Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary totals 76 years retire in July - Dr. Jack W. Manning, Church History; Dr. C. Arthur Insko, Ethics; and Dr. Fred L. Fisher, New Testament.

Elected to join the faculty this year were Dr. W. Morgan Patterson, Academic Dean (also to teach Church History) and Dr. Naymond H. Keathley, New Testament. Dr. John P. Johnson has resigned and his replacement should be announced soon. Dr. Richard B. Cunningham is joining the faculty at Southern Seminary. Dr. James R. Patterson has been secured to teach Theology for the year here at Golden Gate. Dr. Manning will offer a few History courses to assist Dean Morgan Patterson. Dr. Fisher will assist part-time in the Southern California Center.

Visiting professors during the year included Gordon E. Robinson of Nigeria and Miss Mildred Blankenship of the Home Mission Board.

Resources in students and finance remain critical at Golden Gate, but hopes are high with the new prospects of greatly increased support from the Cooperative Program. The Cooperative Program is our lifeline. Thank you for this support and for your prayers and encouragement and sending us students.

There were 10 students at Golden Gate this year from Arkansas.

# MIDWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Kansas City, Missouri 

Milton Ferguson, President
Midwestern Seminary experienced significant gains during 1974-75 in: (1) student enrollment, (2) financial progress, and (3) program development.

There were 611 persons enrolled in training for various ministries at Midwestern during the 1974-75 academic year, including 429 in degree credit work and 182 in special evening class programs. The 429 in degree credit work constituted the third consecutive year in which enrollment reached a record high: 370 in 1973, 407 in 1974, and 429 in 1975.

The significance of Midwestern's growth is more clearly evident when fulltime equivalent enrollment is considered. This is based on the total number of class credit hours completed, thereby giving a more adequate picture of an institution's productivity and efficiency. In 1970 the FTE enrollment at Midwestern was 215; in 1975 it was 371 - - a $72.5 \%$ increase!

The Seminary completed its $1974-75$ financial year solidly "in the black" for the second year in a row. The current 1975-76 operating budget projects complete elimination of indebtedness and the initiation of an operating reserve.
C. W. Scudder, professor of Southwestern Seminary, was elected as Administrator of Internal Affairs, a new office at Midwestern, effective August 1, 1975.

Midwestern trustees, administration, faculty and students seek to be good stewards of the responsibilities with which they are charged by Southern Baptists. Enrollment continues to grow, new curricula and degree programs receive increasing interest and response, and financial progress is clearly evident.

Midwestern Seminary is grateful to SouthernBaptists for their prayers and support through the Cooperative Program.

## PROGRAM REPORT

## General Seminary Program Analysis

1975-76 Program Goals. -

1. Enrol 550 students in leadership training in theology and religious education.
2. Addition of faculty personnel in the areas of ministry (pastoral, educational, evangelism, and church growth) and theological-historical studies.
3. Initiate and staff an institutional development program to provide annual financial supplement for operating purposes, increase financial endowment, and undergird long-range planning.
4. Effect cost of living and salary increases for all seminary personnel.
5. Secure staff to facilitate programs of continuing education and in-service training in evangelism and church development.
6. Initiate third phase in development of a personnel retirement program consonant with those presently established in other Southern Baptist Convention agencies.

1974-75 program accomplishments. -
For the third consecutive year, Midwestern recorded the highest enrollment in its history, 429 students plus 182 additional students participating in evening school classes (non-degree); this constitutes a total of 611 persons enrolled in training for various ministries at Midwestern during the academic year ending in July 1975.

## The Program of Leadership Training in Theology

1976-77 Program Goals. -

1. Enrol a minimum of 450 students in leadership training in theology, including Diploma in Theology, Master of Divinity, and Doctor of Ministry candidates.
2. Enhance the professional training of pastors at Midwestern by developing on-campus workshops and off-campus programs of training in evangelism, missions, pastoral care, and urban ministries in which Midwestern students and local pastors and church staff members may participate jointly.

1974-75 Program Accomplishments. -

1. 1975 graduates - At the May commencement 1975, Midwestern graduated 87 students, including 15 receiving the Doctor of Ministry degree, 48 receiving the Master of Divinity degree, and 3 receiving the Diploma in Theology.
2. 1974-75 enrollment - The total cumulative enrollment of 429 included 24 Diploma of Theology, 233 Master of Divinity, 1 Master of Theology, 53 Doctor of Ministry candidates, and 25 special students for a total of 336 enrolled in leadership training in theology.

## The Program of Leadership Training in Religious Education and Music

1976-77 Program Goals. -

1. Enrol a minimum of 100 students in leadership training in religious education and music.
2. Continue development of offerings in basic church music training within the Master of Religious Education degree program to meet the increasing area demand for part-time staff leadership in the churches.

1974-75 Program Accomplishments. -

1. 1975 Graduates - At the May commencement 1975, Midwestern graduated 87 students, including 17 receiving the Master of Religious Education degree and 3 receiving the Diploma of Religious Education.
2. 1974-75 E nrollment - The total cumulative enrollment of 429 for the year included 9 Diploma of Religious Education, 72 Master of Religious Education candidates, and 12 special students for a total of 93 enrolled in leadership in religious education.

# NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY New Orleans, Louisiana

The phrase "going and growing" best describes the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary in this it's 59th year of ministry to America's second largest port city, New Orleans, Louisiana.

In the annual Board of Trustees meeting, held the first of this year, the Trustees adopted a budget of $\$ 2,627,300$ (of which $67 \%$ is provided by the Cooperative Program), a reorganization of the School of Christian Training, and complete revision of the Diploma in Pastoral Ministry program.

In addition, five new faculty members have joined the staff of the New Orleans Seminary: Dr. Billy E. Simmons, former professor at East Texas Baptist College; Dr. Carlton Winbery, former professor at the Baptist College at Charleston, Charleston, South Carolina; Dr. Cos Davis, Jr., named professor of Childhood Education; Dr. Harold T. Bryson, former pastor of the Eastdale Church, Montgomery, Alabama; and Dr. Billie K. Smith, a pastor for more than 15 years, elected as associate professor of Old Testament and Hebrew.

The programs and facilities of the New Orleans Seminary won a 10 year accreditation from both the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada.

Construction was begun in April on the expansion of the Pre-School Education facility. Funds for this project are being provided by the Capital Needs section of the Cooperative Program budget.

The off-campus Doctor of Ministry program has been operated in Tampa, Florida, Jackson, Mississippi, and Birmingham, Alabama. Requests for the D-Min. seminars have recently come from Jacksonville, Florida, Nashville, Tennessee, Atlanta, Georgia, and Alexandria, Louisiana.

Enrollment of new students for the 1976 Summer session has set a new NOBTS record and the current flow of applications indicate a record enrollment this Fall at the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, "The School of Providence and Prayer".

## SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Louisville, Kentucky

Duke K. McCall, President

When classes began at Southern Seminary last August 25, they opened with the largest entering class in the seminary's history - up 46 per cent from the preceding year - and the largest number of students ever to gather on the Louisville campus at any one time. By spring, total enrollment for this academic year reached an all-time high of 2,217, surpassing the 2,000 mark for the first time.

This rapid and unprecedented growth caused certain growing pains, as might be expected: full classrooms, overcrowded parking lots, insufficient housing. Despite the challenges that confronted Southern Seminary this year, a spirit of fellowship and cooperation set the stage for an outstanding year of preparing God-called men and women to minister in Christ's name.

As the year continued, the seminary gradually took on a new look as construction continued in an attempt to keep pace with the burgeoning student population. A modern teaching amphitheatre, equipped with the latest audiovisual teaching equipment, took its place in Norton Hall next to a newlyredecorated student lounge area. Remodeling of the campus post office, cafeteria, and Baptist Book Store was completed by the beginning of the spring semester.

Still under construction are 70 new student apartments on campus to accommodate the increasing number of seminary couples ( 70 per cent of all students are married). Completion of this apartment complex is expected by January 1, 1977. Plans are now underway for the renovation of Seminary Village, a 265 -unit apartment development owned by the seminary.

Several new faculty members began their teaching duties at Southern Seminary in the fall, including Edward E. Thornton (psychology of religion), Douglas Smith and Michael Hawn (church music), Bill J. Leonard (church history). Russell Bennett (field education), and Robert Hartsell (communication). Roy Lee Honeycutt, Jr., former academic dean at Midwestern Seminary, was named dean of theology and was elected provost of the seminary this spring by the Board of Trustees. The trustees also elected five new faculty for the coming academic year: Walter Shurden (church history), James Blevins (New Testament), Richard Cunningham (Christian philosophy). Glen Stassen (Christian ethics), and Lucie Easley (social work).

One of the most exciting developments at Southern Seminary is the continuing development of the Boyce Bible School, begun in the fall of 1974. This year total enrollment topped 200 and an extension center was begun in Little Rock, Ark. Another center is scheduled to open in Columbus, Ohio, this fall. The Boyce School, now under the direction of James Ryan, is committed to providing theological training for Southern Baptist ministers who do not have college degrees. With more than half of the pastors in the Southern Baptist Convention serving without formal theological training, the Boyce Bible School continues to meet a vital need.

The largest number of graduates ever to receive degrees from Southern Seminary - 493 in all - departed from the historic Louisville campus this year armed with a call from God and a determination to reach a lost world with the good news of Christ. They joined 12,000 other alumni now in service.

Yet denominational studies show that the need for seminary-trained ministers will continue to grow in the future, especially in music, youth, and education ministries and in the growing Southern Baptist work in the northern and western United States.

There are many bright new things going on at the SBC's oldest seminary, but there are many challenges yet to be overcome: inflation has created a severe financial pinch which makes it harder each day to maintain the highest educational quality; ever-increasing enrollment requires parallel growth in facilities and faculty; the changing face of ministry, with its increasing specialization, requires special efforts to prepare students for the areas of greatest need.

Yet challenges are nothing new at Southern Seminary. For 117 years, we've been seeking to meet the challenges of theological education for the sake of a lost world that needs a Savior. With God's help and with your support, we will continue to prepare men and women to be used of God to minister to that world.

## SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Fort Worth, Texas

EIGHT BY EIGHTY! This phrase keynotes the report of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary for the year 1975-76. The slogan is for a campaign to raise $\$ 8$ million by 1980 and is the first phase of the seminary's long range plan, IMPACT: 2000. The plan projects the seminary through the last 25 years of the Twentieth Century.

Total enrollment for 1975-76 was 3,470, shattering all previous records and representing a $21 \%$ increase over the previous year. The total included 2,049 in the Schooi of Theology, 1,049 in the School of Religious Education and 372 in the School of Church Music.

The Diploma program, traditionally strong at Southwestern, is for men and women beyond thirty years of age. There were 270 in this program. There were 577 graduates graduates for the year with 1,360 new students registering for the first time.

Eight new members were elected to the faculty including Bobby Ell Adams, Profession of Christian Ethics; Ebbie Smith, Professor of Christian Ethics; Thomas Nettles, Assistant Professor of Church History; Lorin Cranford, Assistant Professor of New Testament; Oscar Thompson, Assistant Professor of Evangelism; Bruce Corley, Assistant Professor of New Testament; William G. Caldwell, Associate Professor of Educational Administration; A. Joseph King, Associate Professor of Church Music. T. M. Bennett, Professor of Old Testament, retires on August 1. J. M. Price, founder of the School of Religious Education, died January 12, 1976.

A new program call SET was launched in the fall of 1975. It is Southwestern Seminary in Southeast Texas with degree level classes being taught at the Houston Baptist University by regular members of the seminary faculty. Enrollment for the two semesters was 125.

The report also reflects the plans for capital improvements. The first program which is anticipated immediately is the construction of 48 married student housing units.

The number one priority in construction is the physical fitness center. A grant of $\$ 447,000$ from the capital needs of the Cooperative Program plus a challenge gift from the Mabee Foundation along with the Eight by Eighty Campaign promise the beginning of construction of this center during 1976.

Other projects reported included a maintenance building, improvements to present academic facilities, parking and other improvements.

In this report President Rober E. Naylor said, "The report of the institution reflects victories and needs. We will want to register our deepest gratitude to Southern Baptists for the large support they give Southwestern Seminary through the Cooperative Program."

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES
THE EXECUTIVE BOARD MAINTAINS ITS RECORDS ON THE BASIS OF CASH RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS; CONSEQUENTLY, CERTAIN REVENUE AND RELATED ASSETS ARE RECOGNIZED WHEN RECEIVED RATHER THAN WHEN EARNED, AND CERTAIN DISBURSEMENTS ARE RECOGNIZED WHEN PAID RATHER THAN WHEN THE OBLIGATION IS INCURRED.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH ACCOUNTING PRACTICES FOLLOWED BY NON-PROFIT denominational organization, no provision has been made in the accompanying FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR DEPRECIATION OF PROPERTIES.

NOTE 2: FUND OVERDRAFTS
THE ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION IN ITS NOVEMBER, 1967, MEETING APPROVED THE BORROWING FROM OUTSIDE SOURCES OF UP TO \$900,000 FOR THE PURCHASE OF A BAPTIST BUILDING SITE WITH THE INDEBTEDNESS TO BE LIQUIDATED FROM THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM BUDGET. AT DECEMBER 31, 1976, THE BALANCE OF THE FUND OVERDRAFT RESULTING FROM THESE BORROWINGS WAS \$399,966.

THE EXECUTIVE BOARD, ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION, IN ITS AUGUST, 1974, MEETING AUTHORIZED THE PURCHASE OF A MOTOR HOME FOR USE BY THE EVANGELISM DEPARTMENT AND THE RESULTANT FUND OVERDRAFT. AT DECEMBER 31, 1976, THIS OBLIGATION HAD BEEN PAID.

## NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

At the advice of the American Hospital Association the Baptist Memorial Hospital obtained independent appraisals in 1962 and 1964. These appraisals are reflected in the accompanying financial statements by showing a net increase of $\$ 9,224,607.25$ in value of properties. Depreciation expense is computed on the appraised values.

The Hospital has consistently used a straight-line method of depreciation, except for the Medical Center Plaza Building. Accelerated depreciation on historical cost has been used for Medicare purposes. The additional reimbursement resulting from accelerated depreciation has been deferred and will be taken into income in future years.

Revenues received under cost reimbursement agreements are subject to audit and retroactive adjustment by third party payors. Provisions for estimated retroactive adjustments have been made. dn estimate of the current year cost reimbursement has been included in Accounts Receivable.

## NOTE 2

## COMAITMENTS:

The Hospital has entered a contract in the amount of $\$ 26,611,000.00$ for construction of Baptist Memorial Hospital East. Estimated completion date of the facility is December, 1978. Land and construction costs incurred to date aggregate $\$ 2,656,226.63$. Construction and permanent financing has been negotiated in an amount not to exceed $\$ 36,000,000$. This financing will be repaid in semi-annual installments over twenty years and will bear interest at nine and one-half percent. ( $91 / 2 \%$ )

Aggregate rental commitments at September 30, 1976 under noncancellable leases for medical and other equipment require payments of $\$ 589,782.23$, $\$ 487,398.61, \$ 409,260.72, \$ 294,443.08$ and $\$ 148,826.72$ during years ended September 30, 1977 through 1981, respectively.

No provision for depreciation has been taken into consideration in the Property, Plant and Equipment as set forth in the Combined Balance Sheet - Exhibit A.

Farm land included above is pledged as collateral on a mortgage with a balance of $\$ 199,592.90$ payable to Citizens National Bank of Walnut Ridge in participation with Citizens Bank of Batesville and First National Bank of Lawrence County. Certain other properties included above are pledged as collateral on a mortgage with a balance of $\$ 5,215.16$ at June 30 , 1976 payable to Western Pioneer Life Insurance Co. Other land and property is pledged as security on bonds payable with an outstanding unpaid balance at June 30, 1976 of $\$ 241,500.00$. Construction money to complete the Fine Arts Building was borrowed from Citizens Bank of Jonesboro. The unpaid balance on this loan at June 30 was $\$ 143,000.00$.

In December, 1975 the Student Center and all furnishings were destroyed by irire. The value of the destroyed property was shown as $\$ 87,030.77$. At audit date a total of $\$ 40,395.67$ had been recovered from the insurance company. The natter has been referred to legal counsel for further handing and eventual settlement with the insurance company.
