## CONSTITUTION

## Article I. - The Name

The name of this body shall be "The Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

## Article II. - The Purpose

The purpose of this Convention shall be to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer co-operation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God.

The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention on May 9, 1963, shall be the doctrinal guideline for this Convention.

## Article III. - Membership

Section 1. The Convention shali be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Convention, and which desire to co-operate with other churches through this Convention.

Regular Baptist churches are those Baptist churches which in doctrine and in practice adhere to the principles and the spirit of The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the 1963 session of the Southern Baptist Convention, and The Baptist Faith and Message shall not be interpreted as to permit open communion and/or alien immersion.

Section 2. Each co-operating church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for each additional one hundred members, or major fraction thereof above one hundred, provided however, that no church shall be entitled to a total of more than ten messengers.

Section 3. The Convention may appoint a committee on credentials at each session which shall make recommendations to the Convention with reference to seating messengers from any church not hitherto affiliated with the Convention.

## Article IV. - Authority

Section 1. While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, this Convention shall never exercise any authority whatever over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the constitution of any church, or with the exercise of its functions as the only ecclesiastical body, but will cheerfully recognize and uphold the absolute independence of the churches.

## Article V. - Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Each officer of the Convention shall be elected annually, except the Recording Secretary and Treasurer who shall be the same as the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board, and shall continue in office until his successor in office shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the deliberations of the Convention and to discharge such other duties as may devolve upon the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all committees unless the Convention shall otherwise determine. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in his stead.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of the proceedings of the Convention, to edit and arrange publication of a suitable number of the minutes for distribution among the churches, as the Convention may direct, as soon as reasonably possible after the close of the session. He shall file and keep in order all papers deemed important to the work of the Convention.

## Artilce VI. - The Executive Board

Section 1. This Convention shall elect a Board of Trustees as provided for in the Convention's charter. This Board shall be known as the "Executive Board of Arkansas Baptist State Convention." This Board shall be composed of one member from the bounds of each co-operating association with a membership up to 5,000 , and one additional member for each additional 5,000 constituency, or major fraction thereof, provided however, that no association shall be entitled to more than five (5) members. In addition, the convention shall elect one lady from the bounds of each of the eight districts in the state to serve on the Executive Board. Upon the removal of any Executive Board member from the bounds of his or her association, his or her membership on the Executive Board ceases therewith; his or her successor in office may be named by the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board to hold office until the next meeting of the Convention. No member of this board shall hold any remunerative office under the Convention or any of its institutions. One-third of this board shall be elected annually to hold office for three years, and a majority of the board members shall constitute a quorum. Any member of the Executive Board who misses all the Executive Board meetings and the Executive Board committee meetings for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on the Board.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall be constituted and empowered by the Convention as its business and legal agent to administer all business committed to it by the Convention, and to employ such paid agents as it may deem necessary in carrying out the missionary, educational, benevolent and financial enterprises of the Convention. The Executive Board shall raise, collect, receive and disburse all the funds of the Baptist Cooperative Program, both state and southwide. The office of the Executive Board shall be a clearing house for administering the business affairs of the Convention, and a headquarters for Baptist information. Its books, records and files shall at all time be open for the reference and inspection of any co-operating church which may desire to examine them.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall render to the Convention annually a complete and detailed statement of all its business for the year.

## Article VII. - Trusteeships

The Convention shall elect trustees to manage and to operate institutions and agencies it may possess, as follows:

Section 1. Ouachita Baptist University, 24; Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services, 18; Baptist Memorial Hospital (Memphis,) 9; Southern Baptist College, 24; Arkansas Baptist Foundation, 15.

Section 2. One-third of the members of the Boards of Trustees shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. Any member of any Board of Trustees who misses all the meetings of that Board for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on that Board.

Section 3. Each Board of Trustees shall elect from their membership a chairman and a recording secretary and such other officers as seems advisable.

Section 4. All trusteeships shall render to the Convention at each annual session complete and detailed reports of all transactions and business and any other activities for the year, and shall be subject to the direction of the Convention in all matters pertaining to administering the affairs of the institution with which their trusteeship is concerned.

## Article VIII. - Operation of Agencies

Section 1. Each board, agency, and institution of this Convention shall submit to the Executive Board at its annual budget planning meeting, which is to be held prior to the annual meeting of the Convention, a detailed statement of its sources of income, and a budget of proposed expenditures for the ensuing year. When received and adopted by the Convention, these budgets shall become the basis for the operations for the ensuing year.

## Article IX. - Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall meet annually, "if God permit," on a date to be fixed by the Convention. The Executive Board is empowered in emergencies to call special sessions of the Convention and to change either the time or place of meeting or both should the occasion demand.

## Article X. - Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of this Convention, two-thirds of the members voting concurring in the measure, except Article IV which shall remain forever unalterable in substance.

Section 2. Any proposed amendment to this Constitution shall be presented to the Convention in writing, for its consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, and may be voted on, on any subsequent day during the session, provided adequate publicity has been given in previous announcement.

## Article XI. - Parliamentary Authority

Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard for deciding questions of parliamentary procedure.

## Article XII. - Districts

The Convention shall establish such geographic districts as it may deem wise to facilitate its promotion, administration, and organization of its objectives, provided, it will never violate in any way the boundaries of any association within the area of the convention. The boundaries of such districts shall be drawn so as to provide equitable geographical and numerical voice and representation on all convention committees, commissions, boards, except the Executive Board, all trusteeships. Each tenth year hereafter, the whole matter of districts shall be readjusted to take in consideration the flow of membership in our Baptist churches.

## BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are enacted for the government of the Convention.

## 1. Enrollment of Messengers

The Secretary of the Convention shall enroll, upon arrival, messengers who present proper credentials from the churches. These messengers, together with others who may be enrolled upon presentation of approved credentials during the session, shall constitute the Convention. Any contention concerning seating messengers shall be presented to a committee appointed by the President for recommendation to the Convention for its action.

## 2. Officers

The President, First Vice-President, and Second Vice-President shall be elected on the second day of the Convention, their terms of office to begin with the final session of the Convention.

The election of all officers shall be by ballot; provided, however, there is only one nomination for the office, then the Secretary or any other present may be directed to cast the ballot of the entire assembly for the single nominee.

The first vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after balloting for the president has been completed and the winner announced, and the second vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after the balloting for the first vice president has been completed and the winner announced.

Each officer of the Convention shall be elected by a majority of all votes cast.

In case of removal from office, by death or otherwise, of the President, the Vice-Presidents shall automatically succeed to the office of President in the order of their election. The President may not be elected for more than two consecutive terms.

The Treasurer of the Executive Board shall be also Treasurer of the Convention.

All elected officers of this Convention shall be members of churches cooperating with this Convention. This must also apply to members of the Executive Board and the institutional boards of this Convention.

## 3. The Executive Board

The Executive Board, being the legal trustee of the Convention, shall be empowered by the Convention to administer all business committed to it by the Convention.

The Executive Board is empowered to act for the Convention between sessions of the Convention, provided that it shall never exercise any authority contrary to the expressed will of the Convention.

When any unforeseen emergency occurs in any of the affairs of the Convention, or in any of the interest it controls, that in the judgment of the Executive Board requires action before the next session of the Convention, the Executive Board shall have full authority to take such action as may seem necessary, and all interests concerned shall be governed by such action, provided the Executive Board shall make full report of all matters pertaining thereunto to the next session of the Convention for its approval, and provided further, that nothing in this article shall be construed as giving the Executive Board authority to execute any matter already committed by the Convention to any of its Boards of Trustees or its institutions unless such Board when so commissioned shall decline to act on the orders of the Convention.

All proposals requiring the expenditures of money by the Convention, or the Executive Board of the Convention, from the annual budget, shall be considered by the Executive Board, before being presented to the Convention.

This Board shall be charged with the responsibility to have the books and financial affairs of each and all of the boards and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention audited annually by an accredited firm of auditors, all audits to be accessible to the Executive Board at its budget planning session, and to be included in the institution's report to the Convention.

Members of the Executive Board, having served two full terms of three years each shall not be cligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

The various associations of Arkansas whose churches are affiliated with this Convention, may submit to the committee on nominations names of those whom they believe should be considered for membership on the Executive Board as members from that association.

## 4. Trusteeships

All trusteeships of this Convention shall be amenable to the Convention on all matters, through its Executive Board. No trusteeship shall conduct extra movements to raise money outside its regular revenue-producing sources, nor shall a deficit in running expense or debt be incurred without the approval of the Convention in session or of the Executive Board in case of aforementioned emergencies, except, as follows: when an emergency arises concerning the opportunity to purchase needed property for expansion, the president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board and the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board (all three concurring) believing such an emergency exists and deeming it wise to incur indebtedness, may give the Trustees of an institution such permission, and make a full report to the Executive Board and to the next Convention in session.

Members of Boards of Trustees having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

Not more than two (2) members of a Board of Trustees shall at the same time be members of the same local church, nor shall more than six (6) members reside in any one association.

A member of a Board of Trustees of one institution of the Convention may not at the same time be a member of any other Board of Trustees of another institution of the Convention.

No member of a Board of Trustees of any institution of this Convention may at the same time be a member of the Executive Board of the Convention.

## ő. Committee Members

1. A nine-member rotating Nominating Committee, comprised of at least three laymen, will place in nomination at each annual convention names of persons to fill vacancies on all convention boards. At each annual convention, the president will appoint one-third of this committee to three-year terms to replace the one-third rotating off, plus filling any vacancies that may exist on the committee at that time. Nominations for all boards from this Nominating Committee must be as equitably divided as possible between the eight existing districts of our state convention. The president shall also name the chairman, who shall come from a one-year term member.
2. A member filling an unexpired term not having served the full term of years as provided by the Constitution, shall be, at the discretion of the Nominating Committee, eligible for election to a full term.
3. No member of a commission or committee delegated to study or make recommendations concerning our institutions shall be a member of any Board of Trustees of such institutions.
4. All associational missionaries or mission pastors receiving all or part compensation from the Convention through the Executive Board shall be considered employees of the Convention and shall not be members of any Convention or institutional board. The president of the Convention by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Board for the duration of his term of office.

## 6. Constitution and By-Laws Committee

A standing Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be composed of six (6) members to be nominated by the Nominating Committee. One-third of the membership (2) shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three (3) years. No member shall be eligible to serve more than two terms until one year has elapsed.

The president of the convention shall appoint the chairman of the Committee each year. The chairman must be one who has been a member of the Committee for at least one year and may succeed himself until his tenure of eligibility shall expire.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of advising the presiding officer concerning constitutional matters during the annual session of the convention with reference to matters which may arise from the floor or from other committees. The committee will act ad interim in all matters concerning the Constitution and By-Laws referred to it by the boards and agencies of the convention. The committee will receive all proposed constitutional changes before the convention and will be responsible for presenting them in writing, for convention consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, after adequate publicity has been given. The duties of the committee in no way preclude amendments to the constitution by messengers to the convention.

## APPENDICES

1. Doctrinal Guidelines (1970 Annual, page 61)

Report of the Committee of Twenty-Five adopted, including the recommendation that the SBC statement of faith of 1963, The Baptist Faith and Message, be adopted as doctrinal guidelines for our convention.
2. Appendices (1967 annual, page 40)

Resolution adopted that a search be made of the minutes of the convention to discover policies and interpretations which have been adopted in past years, and these interpretations and policies be added at the end of the constitution and by laws of the convention as appendices.
3. Church Ordinances (1965 annual, page 31)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, in the past, the most general interpretation of the New Testament, and the most general interpretation of the Word 'principles' as it is used in Article 3, Section 1, of our constitution, and the most prevalent practice of Baptist churches in Arkansas with reference to the church ordinances, has been what is commonly called 'close baptism" and "close communion'", and

Whereas, it is recorded on page 57 of the minutes of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention meeting in Fort Smith in 1937 that the Convention officially objected to the teaching of alien immersion and open communion in one of our seminaries, thereby establishing a precedence for future conventions, therefore,

Be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in its 112 th annual session, go on record as objecting to the reception of alien immersion and the practice of open communion, and

Be it further resolved that we urge churches everywhere to reexamine the New Testament teaching on baptism and the Lord's Supper.
4. Federal Aid (1965 annual, page 43)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, Arkansas Baptists have been faced with the issue of Federal aid to private institutions, and, whereas, many feel that the acceptance of such funds violates the cherished Baptist posi-
tion of the separation of church and state, therefore, be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention go on record as reaffirming our traditional Baptist position on the separation of church and state, and that we urge all of our Baptist institutions and programs to respect this principle.
5. Executive Board Recommendations (1963 annual, page 35)

Voted that all recommendations of the Executive Board shall be published in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine one month prior to the meeting of the state convention.
6. Violations of the Constitutions on the Boards (1960 annual, page 29)

Voted that where there are violations of the constitution on the boards that the Convention Nominating Committee be requested to make the proper corrections.
7. Book of Reports (1959 annual, page 28)

Voted that the convention constitution and by-laws be printed each year in the Book of Reports for the convenience of our messengers.
8. Baptist Memorial Hospital Trustees (1959 annual, page 29)

Voted that the members of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, not be included in the ruling which would prevent their serving on this board and one other convention board.
9. Capital Indebtedness (1959 annual, page 30)

Voted that all requests for capital indebtedness by any convention institution or agency must be submitted to the Executive Board at least 90 days in advance of the July meeting of the Executive Board.
10. Out-of-state participation b y Executive Board staff (1953 annual, page 22)

Voted that we recommend the Cooperative Program as the best method of giving financial support to the Baptist work at home and abroad. We discourage any of the departments of our Arkansas Baptist work in accepting invitations to participate in the work of missions outside of our regular work within our state territory, at the expense of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention Departments involved. Further, we request our Executive Secretary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the President of the Executive Board confer with the heads of all Southern Baptist agencies expressing our concern about the practices of asking State Convention departments to give employees to such efforts outside our state, unless expenses and salaries are provided for by the agencies that use such workers.
11. Seating of Messengers (1949 annual, page 92)

Resolution adopted that this convention refuse to seat any messengers from any church that accepts alien immersion; practices open communion; or affiliates with any branch of the Federal Council of Churches, World Council of Churches; or any other organization similar to or growing out of such.

# THE BAPTIST FAITH AND MESSAGE 

## I. THE SCRIPTURES

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is the record of God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. It reveals the principles by which God judges us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. The criterion by which the Bible is to be interpreted is Jesus Christ.

## II. GOD

There is one and only one living and true God. He is an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Redeemer, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe. God is infinite in holiness and all other perfections. To Him we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. The eternal God reveals Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nıture, essence, or being.

## A. God the Father

God as Father reigns with providential care over His universe, His creatures, and the flow of the stream of human history according to the purposes of His grace. He is all powerful, all loving, and all wise. God is Father in truth to those who become children of God through faith in Jesus Christ. He is fatherly in His attitude toward all men.

## B. God the Son

Christ is the eternal Son of God. In His incarnation as Jesus Christ he was conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. Jesus perfectly revealed and did the will of God, taking upon Himself the demands and necessities of human nature and identifying Himself completely with mankind yet without sin. He honored the divine law by His personal obedience, and in His death on the cross He made
provision for the redemption of men from $\sin$. He was raised from the dead with a glorified body and appeared to His disciples as the person who was with them before His crucifixion. He ascended into heaven and is now exalted at the right hand of God where He is the One Mediator, partaking of the nature of God and of man, and in whose Person is effected the reconciliation between God and man. He will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission. He now drvells in all believers as the living and ever present Lord.

## C. God the Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of God. He inspired holy men of old to write the Scriptures. Through illumination He enables men to understand truth. He exalts Christ. He convicts of $\sin$, of righteousness and of judgment. He calls men to the Saviour, and effects regeneration. He cultivates Christian character, comforts believers, and bestows the spiritual gifts by which they serve God through His church. He seals the believer unto the day of final redemption. His presence in the Christian is the assurance of God to bring the believer into the fulness of the stature of Christ. He enlightens and empowers the believer and the church in worship, evangelism, and service.

## III. MAN

Man was created by the special act of God, in His own image, and is the crowning work of His creation. In the beginning man was innocent of $\sin$ and was endowed by His Creator with freedom of choice. By his free choice man sinned against God and brought sin into the human race. Through the temptation of Satan man transgressed the command of God, and fell from his original innocence; whereby: his posterity inherit a nature and an environment inclined toward sin, and as soon as thes are capable of moral action become transgressors and are under condemnation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man tofulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human
personality is evident in that Cod created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore every man possesses dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

## IV. SALVATION

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by: His own blood obtaned eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation inclucles regeneration, sanctificiation, and glorification.
A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of cod's grace whereby belicuers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit througl! conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward Cod and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Repentance and fath are inseparible experiences of grace. Repentance is a genume turning from sin toward God Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as hord and Siviour. Justification is Cond's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of $H$ is righterusness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer into a relationship of peace and faror with God.
13. Sanctification is the experience, begiming in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to Cod's purposes, and is enabled to progress loward moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the Holl. Spirit dwelling in him. Growlh in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.
C. Glorification is the culmation of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

All tue believers endure to the end Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sancti-
fied by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirt, impair their graces and comforts, bring reproach on the cause of Christ, and temporal judgments on themselves, yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

## VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is a local body of baptized believers who are associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel, observing the two ordinances of Christ, committed to His teachings, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth.

This church is anautonomous body; operating through democratic processes under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. In such a congregation members are equally responsible. Its Scriptural officers are pastors and deacons.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the body- of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages.

## VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Tesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

## VIII. THE LORD'S DAY

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed

Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and Cod's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

## XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavor to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

## XII. EDUCATION

The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

## XIII. STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, sy'stematically, proprortionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

## XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great oblects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-
operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His W'ord as revealed in the New Testament.

Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in his own life and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus. The Christan should oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice He should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

## XVI. PEACE AND WAR

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love.

## XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and H . has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

## PROCEEDINGS

# FIRST DAY - EVENING SESSION 

## Tuesday, November 8, 1977

1. The One Hundred Twenty-fourth Session (129th Year) of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, was opened at 6:30 p.m. with President R. Wilbur Herring, Jonesboro, presiding. The theme for the convention was "Let the Church Reach Out". The music for the convention was coordinated by Ervin Keathley, Little Rock. Lyndon Finney, Little Rock, was organist and John Dresbach, Osceola, pianist, for the opening session.
2. The meeting opened with a duet by John Dresbach, Osceola, and Dunaway Conner, Blytheville. The messengers were led in singing "To God Be the Glory".

Before the opening prayer President Herring read a letter from Porter Routh, executive secretary/treasurer of the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee; stating that, "the total receipts for the Southern Baptist Convention Program were $\$ 51,940,459$, an $11.16 \%$ increase over the 1975-76 year. Arkansas sent $\$ 1,991,075$ of this amount, an increase of $17.22 \%$ over last year." Prayer was led by Bernard Beasley, Marked Tree.

Bill Tolar, professor of Biblical Backgrounds, Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, led the first of four Bible study periods. The text for the first Bible study was taken from Exodus 3 and 4.
W. O. Vaught, Jr., host pastor, welcomed the messengers, noting that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention had been held ten times at Immanuel in his 33 year pastorate there.
3. Convention visitors recognized by Dr. Herring were: Frank Groner, Baptist Hospital, Memphis; James Hampton, missionary to Tanzania; Reid Hardin, Home Mission Board; I. D. Maricle, Annuity Board; Alta Morrow, Midwestern Seminary; Lynn May, Historical Commission; Ralph McIntyre, Sunday School Board; and Ray Rust, New Orleans Seminary.
4. Fraternal greetings from our sister conventions in Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan, New Mexico, Northern Plains, Ohio, Pennsylvania-South Jersey, Utah-Idaho, and Bob Denny, Baptist World Alliance were noted.
5. Former state convention presidents were recognized and the following were present: Lloyd A. Sparkman, 1952-53; W. O. Vaught, Jr., 1954-55; T. K. Rucker, 1958-59; Bernes K. Selph, 1960-61; Don Hook, 1966-67; Thomas A. Hinson, 1968-69; and Don Moore, 1974-75.

## Voted: To Seat Messengers

6. Mason Craig, McGehee, moved that the messengers of Faith Baptist Church, Texarkana, and all other messengers in regular Baptist churches in Arkansas be seated. Motion second.

8. With Carl Overton, first vice president, Hot Springs, presiding, the call was given for the reading of resolutions and proposed amendments to the constitution. Don Hook, chairman of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee, Little Rock, suggested that the Committee on Order of Business find a time for the constitutional amendments to be voted on. The following resolutions were read and referred to the Resolutions Committee: (1) Don Hook, Little Rock, resolution concerning the on premise beer permit for motion picture theater; (2) Carbon Sims, Monticello, resolution concerning alcoholic beverages; and (3) Margaret Kolb, Little Rock, resolution concerning the establishment of a World Hunger Committee.

Brother Hook read two amendments to the constitution which had been distributed earlier to the messengers.
(1) Paragraph 6 of Article 3 (Executive Board) of the Bylaws of our Constitution reads, "Members of the Executive Board, having served two full terms of three years each, shall not be eligible for reelection until as much as one year has elapsed."

Brother Sam Turner of Hamburg would amend this paragraph to read, "Members of the Executive Board, having served ONE full term of three years, shall not be eligible for reelection until as much as one year has elapsed."
(2) Since there is no provision in the Bylaws for a chairman of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee, Don Hook, presently serving as chairman by presidential appointment, would amend Article 6 of the Bylaws (Constitution and Bylaws Committee) by inserting as paragraph 2 the following: "The president of the Convention shall appoint the chairman of the Committee each year. The chairman must be one who has been a member of the Committee for at least one year and may succeed himself until his tenure of eligibility shall expire."
9. Laverne Pickett, Little Rock, led the messengers in singing "Blessed Be the Name". Special music by the Music Men and Singing Women directed by Ervin Keathley and Jean Pilcher, ending with a solo by Laverne Pickett singing "The Greatest of These".

Carl Overton, first vice president, introduced President R.Wilbur Herring for the message of the hour, the President's Address, "If It Is To Be".
J. W. L. Adams, chairman of Committee on Order of Business, reported that the constitutional amendments would be presented Wednesday afternoon immediately following the report of the Nominating Committee at 2:30 p.m. Closing prayer was led by Curtis Smith, Pocahontas.

## SECOND DAY - MORNING SESSION

## Wednesday, November 9, 1977

10. The session was opened at 8:45 a.m. at Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock. Organist was Lyndon Finney of Little Rock and pianist was Mrs. Jesse Sutton of Van Buren. The District IV Men sang followed by Jesse Sutton, Van Buren, leading the messengers in singing "Love Is the Theme". The opening prayer was led by R. Fred Selby, Jr., Texarkana.

William Tolar led the second Bible study period. The text was taken from Ezekiel 33.

The time for Memorial Moments was led by Elmer Griever, Jr., Berryville.
11. Executive Secretary Charles H. Ashcraft extended a welcome to the following who have come to the work and fellowship of Arkansas Baptists since the last convention meeting:

## Voted: To Adopt the Recommendation of Study Committee On Ministry

12. Paul Sanders, chairman of the Study Committee on Ministry, read the names of the people who had served on the Committee (see page 16) and gave a brief introduction (Item No. 30, page 45-46, 1976 Annual). After a statement from Bill Probasco and Thomas Hinson, sub-chairmen of the Committee, the following recommendation was read -
"Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ." Galatians 6:2

We recommend:

1. That a ministry of crisis support be created by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention;
2. That its purpose will be to provide concerned, confidential and Biblical counseling for any person or family member of said person who is or has been in a church-related vocation within our state convention and who, in going through a period of personal crisis, needs the support and fellowship of such a ministry;
3. That the state convention's Executive Board, upon recommendation from its Operating Committee and the Study Committee on Minsitry, select an individual who will be responsible for coordinating such a ministry among Arkansas Baptists, and for personal counseling among our ministers and their families;
4. That, in addition to said coordinator, resource persons be sought out among pastors and other ministers and qualified laymen within the state who give unusual evidence of the gifts and anointing of the Holy Spirit in the area of Christian counseling, and who would make themselves available, on a voluntary basis, to assist the coordinator by giving time to fellow ministers or their families for counseling and personal support in times of crisis;
5. That the proposed coordinator of crisis ministries meet the qualifications given below;
6. That, to insure mobility of said coordinator, so that he can be over the state counseling, training and otherwise encouraging our church and denominational workers, he be required to live in a part of the state easily accessible to the other parts of the state;
7. That, to insure confidentiality with respect to his ministry, and with respect to those who may seek his help, his office not be located in the Baptist Building, or in any other place frequented by ministers or denominational workers.

## Qualifications for coordinator of crisis ministries

1. Spiritual - A person considered for this ministry must be commonly known for his obedience to the Holy Spirit, for the transparency and integrity of his moral life, and for his conscious and consistent practice of the presence of Christ. He must not be a spiritual novice, but evidence maturity in the New Testament faith both in doctrine and works.
2. Theological - A person considered for this ministry must be known for his faithful and consistent commitment to the Holy Bible as the inspired and inerrant Word of God, and to that theological persuasion epitomized by our historic Baptist faith, and expressed in "The Baptist Faith and Message", adopted May 9, 1963, by the Southern Baptist Convention.
3. Denominational - A person considered as coordinator of crisis ministries must be known for his faithful acceptance of, and participation in, the cooperative ministries of Southern Baptists, Arkansas Baptists, his association and his local church.
4. Professional - A person considered for this ministry must himself have been involved in vocational ministries in a Southern Baptist Church for such time as would be necessary to make him identifiable with the pressures, problems and special calling of ministers. His ministry must have been of a sustained duration, and not evidencing insecurity in his own life, nor uncertainty as to his calling to the ministry. He must have received training in college or university, and seminary, and he must have had such specialized training and experience in counseling as to make him thoroughly knowledgeable of the spiritual, psychological and physical makeup of the human person, and of his
liabilities to error and failure as a result of the Adamic nature. He, furthermore, must have had such specialized training and experience as to qualify him for dealing with the spiritual and emotional problems of ministers and their families. He will be expected to supplement his present training and experience with such ongoing study and experience as is needed for him to deal with the increasingly complex problems of our ministers and their families.
5. Personal - A person considered for this ministry must meet the personal qualifications given for elders (bishops) in I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:6-9.

## Relationship to Arkansas Baptist State Convention

The proposed ministry of crisis support will be a ministry by and for the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and shall be responsible to the Convention proper, and the Executive Board of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

Relationship to this ministry to any form of "placement service" disclaimed
The proposed ministry of crisis support will not be a ministerial placement service, nor will it serve in this capacity.

## Continuation of Study Committee on Ministry

The present Study Committee on Ministry recommends that this Study Committee on Ministry be kept intact and active for at least one more year following the inauguration of the proposed ministry of crisis support, so as to offer that ministry the committee's assistance, in interviewing and recommending a coordinator, to oversee the organization and development of said ministry, and to continue research in the areas of ministerial stress that must be dealt with by said ministry. This, we feel, will be consistent with the directives given to the Study Committee on Ministry by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in 1974. Coexistent with the discontinuation of the Study Committee on Ministry, we recommend the formation of a permanent rotating committee of six to oversee this ministry, recommended by the Nominating Committee of the State Convention, and approved by the State Convention, which committee would be under the direction of the Executive Board of our Convention. - Paul Sanders, chairman; William Probasco, sub-chairman; and Thomas Hinson, sub-chairman.

Paul Sanders moved that the recommendation be adopted. Motion seconded. President Herring asked for any discussion. Don Moore, Fort Smith, spoke in favor of the recommendation. There was no further discussion. The motion carried.

## Voted: To Dedicate Annual

13. Jesse Reed, Little Rock, moved that the 1977 Arkansas Baptist State Convention Annual be dedicated to Dr. C. W. Caldwell former Director of Missions at the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Second and carried.

## Voted: To Send Anita Bryant Telegram

14. Bob G. Crabb, Kensett, recommended that the President of our Convention be instructed to send Anita Bryant a telegram supporting her Christian conviction on homosexuality. Second and carried.

## Voted: On Recommendation Concerning the Ordination of Women

15. Jerry Cothren, Greers Ferry, presented a recommendation and letter as follows:

In view of the fact, the Home Mission Board is currently paying $\$ 200.00$ per month to an ordained woman preacher by the name of Suzanne Coyle, who serves in the South Jersey-Pennsylvania Convention, and this is in total disregard to the precepts of the New Testament, and in contradiction to the historic Baptist position on ordination of preacher, and it has already caused much unrest and dissatisfaction among the brethren who support the Home Mission Board through their gifts to the Cooperative Program, I therefore move that the messengers of this One Hundred and Twenty Fourth Session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention send the following letter to the Directors of the Home Mission Board.

Directors of the Home Mission Board
1350 Spring Street, N.W.
Atlanta, Georgia 30309
Brethren
There is a matter that greatly concerns us which we would like to call to your attention. We are opposed to the ordination of women as ministers or deacons. Further, we are distressed and discouraged that the Home Mission Board has hired some of these women.

We are opposed to the ordination of women on the fundamental premise that it is contrary to the Word of God. We feel this to be so fundamental and basic that any argument to the contrary would not be worthy of our attention.

We are fully aware of the autonomy of the local church. No one tells a church what they can or cannot do. However, what the Home Mission Board does is another matter. That affects us. Therefore, we are asking that the Board refrain from supporting or employing any more ordained women.

And now may the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen.

Leroy Rogers, second the motion and a discussion followed. Nathan Porter, Arkadelphia, moved to refer the matter to the Resolutions Committee. Second and carried.
16. Robert Bauman, Memphis (former manager, Baptist Book Store, Little Rock), introduced Robert Barnett, the new manager of the Baptist Book Store in Little Rock.
17. The Baptist Student Union Third Century Campaign presentation at the Thursday morning session of the Convention was a multi-media presentation prepared by Tom Logue, Arliss Dickerson, and Marvin Black. It was introduced by Jamie Jones, Third Century Campaign Director.

The presentation included a brief resume of the purposes, plans, and organization of the Third Century Campaign. It featured testimonies of Roy Fish, Professor of Evangelism at Southwestern Seminary, Norman Cheung, a Chinese student who has become a Christian through the witness and concern of BSU students at Conway; and students, the faculty advisory, and the parttime BSU Director, D. C. McAtee, from East Arkansas Community College in Forrest City.

It reported that more than $\$ 200,000$ in cash and pledges toward the $\$ 1,000,000$ goal had already been received, and that church pledges are just beginning to come in.

## Voted: To Elect President

18. President Herring called for nominations for president of the convention. John Finn, Harrison, nominated Kenneth Threet, Mountain Home. C. A. Johnson, Paragould, nominated Johnny Jackson, Little Rock. Phil Lineberger, Little Rock, nominated Larry Baker, Fayetteville. Motion made that
nominations cease. Second and carried. Ballot No. 1 was designated for voting. After a count, Daniel Threet, chairman of Tellers Committee, reported that there would be a runoff between Johnny Jackson and Kenneth Threet. Ballot No. 2 was designated for voting.
19. Jesse Sutton led the messengers in singing "Love Lifted Me". The District IV Men followed with special music.

Don Nall, Batesville, read the scriptures for the annual sermon taken from Hebrews 11 and Proverbs 3. The annual sermon was by Johnny Jackson, Little Rock, and was entitled "The Christian Life of Faith". The session was dismissed in prayer by Truman R. Spurgin, Parkin.

## SECOND DAY - AFTERNOON SESSION

## Wednesday, November 9, 1977

20. The session was opened at 1:30 p.m. at Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, with Curtis Shatley, West Memphis, leading the messengers in singing, "My Faith Has Found a Resting Place". Mrs. Antony Borrell, Wynne, followed with a solo. Organist was Lyndon Finney and pianist Diane Shatley for the third session of the convention.

The Bible study for the session by William Tolar was taken from Psalms 19 and John 17.

## Voted: To Elect First Vice President

21. Daniel Threet, chairman of the Tellers Committee, reported that Johnny Jackson, Little Rock, had been elected as the new president of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

President Wilbur Herring called for nominations for first vice president. Mason Bondurant, Jacksonville, nominated Bill Lewis, Jonesboro. Forrest Bynum, Warren, moved that nominations cease and that Bill Lewis be elected by acclamation. Motion carried.

## Voted: To Elect Second Vice President

22. President Herring called for nominations for second vice president. H. E. Williams, Walnut Ridge, nominated James Hampton, missionary inresidence from Tanzania. Motion made that nominations cease and that James Hampton be elected by acclamation. Motion carried.

## Voted: To Adopt Report of Nominating Committee

23. Johnny Jackson, Little Rock, chairman, brought the report of the Convention Nominating Committee and moved its adoption. Second by Bill Lewis, Jonesboro, and carried. (See pages 10-17 for all boards and committees.) tees.)

## Voted: On Constitutional Amendments

24. A proposed amendment to the constitution to limit Executive Board members to only serving one full term of three years was read by Don Hook, chairman of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee. Second by Cecil Sutley, Arkadelphia. President Herring called for any discussion.

Sam Turner, Hamburg, spoke in favor of the amendment. Dillard Miller, Mena, and Andy Kerr, Malvern, spoke against the amendment. A vote on the constitutional amendment was called for after no further discussion. The amendment was defeated.

Don Hook moved the adoption of the proposed constitutional amend-
ment concerning the appointment of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee chairman. Motion seconded and carried.

Voted: To Adopt 1978 Budget
25. Ray Wells, Smackover, moved the 1978 budget be adopted as recommended (see pages 58-59):

The closing message for the afternoon was by Jim Plietz, pastor, Park Cities Baptist Church, Dallas, Texas, entitled 'Not My God, But Thy God". Text taken from Ruth.

The session was dismissed with prayer by James C. Wright, Camden.

# SECOND DAY - EVENING SESSION 

## Wednesday, November 9, 1977

The session was opened at 6:30 p.m. at Robinson Auditorium, Little Rock. The theme was "Let the Church Reach Out ...IN BOLDNESS". Special music for the beginning of the session was presented by Ouachita Baptist University and Southern Baptist College choirs. President R. Wilbur Herring welcomed the messengers and gave the program introduction. The opening prayer was led by J. C. Myers, North Little Rock.

The program consisted of a live newscast presentation of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, its institutions and agencies. It concluded with a reaffirmation of commitment, the Lord's prayer, and a joint presentation by Ouachita Baptist University and Southern Baptist College choirs entitled "Let the Church Reach Out'".

## THIRD DAY - MORNING SESSION

Thursday, November 10, 1977
27. The final session of the One Hundred Twenty-fourth meeting of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention was opened 8:45 a.m. at Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, with a solo by Steve Landers, Hope. Organist for the session was Lyndon Finney, Little Rock, and pianist, Linda Landers, Hope. Andy Kerr, Malvern, led in opening prayer.

The Bible study for the final session by William B. Tolar was from Colossians 1. Second Vice President Homer Shirley presided.

## Voted: To Adopt Report on Resolutions

28. The report of the Resolutions Committee was given by Lloyd Cloud, chairman. Chairman Cloud moved the adoption of Resolution No. 1, Appreciation to Host Church. Second and carried.

WHEREAS, The Immanuel Baptist Church of Little Rock, has provided its buildings, facilities, and services to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting November 8-10, 1977; and

WHEREAS, The City of Little Rock, serving as host city, has made its facilities available; and

WHEREAS, The members of the host church and other Baptist churches in the area have added to the welcome and enjoyment of the messengers; and be it

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That we express our deep appreciation to host pastor, W. O. Vaught, the host church, the host city, and the host association, and to all individuals who have contributed to the enjoyment and success of the convention.

Chairman Cloud moved the adoption of Resolution No. 2, Appreciation to Convention Officers. Second and carried.

WHEREAS, We have been blessed by the dedicated leadership of our State Executive Secretary, Dr. Charles Ashcraft, our convention officer, Dr. R. Wilbur Herring, president; Rev. Carl Overton, first vice president; Rev. Homer Shirley, second vice president; and

WHEREAS, These leaders have promoted peace, harmony, and love within our fellowship; and be it

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That we express our deep appreciation for these good leaders.

Chairman Cloud moved the adoption of Resolution No. 3, On Pornoggraphy and SOAP.

WHEREAS, The dissemination of pornography is on the increase and is being promoted by books, magazines, and television; and

WHEREAS, The consumption of pornography leads to the destruction of morality, the increase of illicit sex, homosexuality, and the destruction of homes; and

WHEREAS, Baptists have long stood for Biblical morality; and
WHEREAS, Our Christian Life Commission is leading in a fight against all forms of pornography, specifically SOAP and kindred television programs; and be it

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That the 1977 annual session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, representing more than 400,000 church members, goes on record as opposing SOAP and all other forms of pornography; and be it

THEREFORE FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be sent to all television stations in Arkansas that are carrying SOAP, to all national broadcasting systems, and to the Federal Communications Commission; and be it

FINALLY RESOLVED, That in adopting this resolution all reaffirm a commitment to Biblical morality and to the opposition of pornography in all forms.

Carbon Sims, Monticello, motioned to amend resolution that all sponsors of SOAP receive a copy of this resolution. Second and carried as amended.

Chairman Cloud moved the adoption of Resolution No. 4, Establishment of a World Hunger Committee. Second and carried.

WHEREAS, The people of God, as responsible stewards in following God's leadership, seek to overcome the disorders and injustices which cause hunger; and

WHEREAS, The Foreign Mission Board has established a channel for support and is working around the world to help people feed themselves; and

WHEREAS, The ad hoc committee on World Hunger of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the Baptist participants in the recent "Hope for the Hungry" meeting endorse this action; and be it

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That we, the messengers of the 124 th session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention instruct the president of this body to appoint a committee on World Hunger to help enable us as Arkansas Baptists and as churches to become informed on the conditions and some of the possible solutions to help alleviate this condition among so many of our neighbors in our world.

Chairman Cloud moved the adoption of Resolution No. 5, On Premise Beer Permit for Motion Picture Theater. Second and carried.

WHEREAS, There is presently before the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board of the State of Arkansas an application by Mr. James Skillern Porter, Jr., for an On Premise Beer Permit for a motion picture theater located at 407 Main Street, Little Rock; and

WHEREAS, Such a Permit would constitute a grave danger to the safety and peace of downtown Little Rock by serving beer to patrons who attended programs of two to four hours in length, thereby resulting in serious problems when patrons must be evacuated in case of fire, and in problems of traffic control of drinking drivers when they leave the theater; and

WHEREAS, For a theater dedicated to children's and family type programs, the enforcement of legal age requirements for drinking alcoholic beverages would be virtually impossible; and be it

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Baptist State Convention does hereby express strong opposition to this application for an On Premise Beer Permit for this motion picture theater, because of the precedent that it would set for other such applications throughout the State of Arkansas; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That we respectfully request that the Arkansas Alcoholic Beverage Control Board deny the application above described at the public hearing on Wednesday, November 16, 1977, and any future applications for On Premise Beer Permits in motion picture theaters in the state of Arkansas; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be presented to Mrs. Karen Jones, Administrator of the Alcoholic Beverage Board, to the Board Chairman, with a request that copy be read at the public hearing on Wednesday, November 16th.

Chairman Cloud moved the adoption of Resolution No. 6, Concerning Alcoholic Beverages. Second and carried.

WHEREAS, The harmful effects of alcoholic beverages upon the human body are well known; and

WHEREAS, An increasing number of the fatal accidents on our nation's highways are caused by drivers under the influence of alcoholic beverages; and be it

RESOLVED, By the messengers of the 1977 annual session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention that we urge our elected representatives of the United States Congress (the House and Senate) to initiate and support legislation to require the labeling of alcoholic beverages as being potentially harmful to the health and safety of the user and that copies of this resolution be sent to Arkansas congressional delegation and to the chief administrator of the Food and Drug Administration.

Chairman Cloud moved the adoption of Resolution No. 7, Concerning the Financial Support of Ordained Women by the Home Mission Board.

WHEREAS, It has come to our attention that the Home Mission Board is giving financial support to an ordained woman; and

WHEREAS, This is contradictory to the past practice of the Home Mission Board; and now be it

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Baptist State Convention meeting in Little Rock, Arkansas this November 10, 1977, go on record as looking with disfavor toward this practice; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Home Mission Board.

A discussion followed with Mrs. Molly Marshall, Little Rock, Mrs. W. Payton Kolb, Little Rock, and W. O. Taylor, Melbourne, speaking against the resolution. David Miller, Heber Springs, spoke for the resolution. W. O. Taylor moved that the resolution be tabled. Second. The motion to table was defeated. Resolution No. 7 was approved as presented.

## Voted: To Adopt Recommendation from Special Constitution Study Committee

29. Ray Crews, Heber Springs, chairman, summarized the background for the appointment of the Committee (Item No. 13, page 37, 1976 Annual) and moved that the recommendation be adopted. Second and carried.
30. That the Executive Board request a budget allocation in the annual budget of the Convention for planning, development, and other studies which are necessary to fully support the recommendations to be made by the Executive Board to the State Convention.
31. That the charter of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention as a nonprofit organization in the State of Arkansas as granted and approved on November 19, 1956, by the Pulaski County Circuit Court be amended to comply with the present Constitution and Bylaws.
32. That any future questions regarding the actions of the Executive Board and their authority should be referred to the Constitution and Bylaws Committee, since the Constitution and Bylaws are the sources from which the Executive Board derives its authority.
33. Steve Landers lead the messengers in singing "The Solid Rock". The four institutions and agencies spoke followed by a report from the Christian Civic Foundation.

The messengers were led in singing, "To God be the Glory". The message for the final session of the 1977 convention was by Ralph M. Smith, pastor of Hyde Park Baptist Church, Austin, Texas, "More Than Conquerors", with the text from Romans 8.

Dr. Wilbur Herring conveyed to the messengers of the convention his appreciation for the opportunity of serving as President and for the gratefulness for their support during his tenure of office.
31. After the changing of the gavel, Carl Overton, Hot Springs, moved to adjourn, second, and carried. The One Hundred Twenty-fourth Session in the 129 th year was adjourned with prayer by Anton Uth, Pine Bluff.

## EXECUTIVE BOARD

## Charles H. Ashcraft, Executive Secretary

Andrew Setliffe has served very capably as Executive Board president the last two years. Serving with him were James Lindsey, chairman of the Program Committee, Ray Wells chairman of the Finance Committee, Leslie Riherd chairman of the Operating Committee, and James Hill chairman of the Nominating Committee. Meetings were held on December 7, 1976 and August 16, 1977 with the various committees meeting at the customary times.

There were many actions taken during the year but one of major relativity was the revision of the present policy on severance pay. The following addition was approved by the Executive Board, August 16, 1977:

Full-time employees who terminate their employment for any reason, except for cause, other than retirement shall be given severance pay at one half the rate indicated above for retiring employees, as follows:

For 5-9 years' service - $1 / 2$ month's salary
For 10-14 years' service $\quad-1$ month's salary
For 15 years' service or more $\quad-11 / 2$ month's salary
Another action of the Executive Board with significance was the mailing of Executive Board minutes to the Directors of Missions and Moderators of our associations.

## Personnel Matters

James A. Walker of Warren was employed as Stewardship Secretary beginning his work on March 1, 1977.

Arliss Dickerson, Baptist Student Director of Henderson State University at Arkadelphia, was given a month study leave this summer. Arliss has been with Henderson since 1970.

George Sims was elected associate director of the Student Department. He was previously Baptist Student Director at University of Arkansas at Monticello.

The Executive Board authorized a new staff position, Field Missionary in Church Extension, in the Mission Department. The Department of Church Extension, Missions Division, Home Mission Board, will provide $40 \%$ of the position's budget for house, salary, and travel.

Church Music's request for an associate was approved by the Executive Board August 16, 1977.

Tom McLain, was moved to Southern Arkansas University at Magnolia and Southwest Tech at Camden.

Mike Weaver of Ft. Worth, Texas was elected Baptist Student Director at University of Arkansas at Monticello and Danny McCauley of Aiken, South Carolina was elected Baptist Student Director at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock.

# ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE

The ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE is happy to give Arkansas Baptists an accounting of our stewardship during the past year. The paper exists to serve God and Arkansas Baptists. It is our hope that we have been faithful stewards of our responsibility. During the year we have had a great deal of good news and some that is not so good to share with Arkansas Baptists.

## Good News:

We are gratified that both our circulation and the number of churches receiving the ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE have reached the largest number in the history of the Newsmagazine. As of July 1, there were 70,766 subscribers. This represents an increase of more than 1900 since last year. There are also currently 870 Every Resident Family plan churches, representing an increase of 29 since last year.

Beginning in January of this year, we have significantly increased the coverage of our church news. It had long been our desire to provide greater coverage of our churchesthrough the features "Arkansas all over . . . people . . . briefly." The employment of an additional staff member has made it possible for us to provide this needed coverage. This section is carried to give recognition to such things as ordination of deacons, licensing of ministers, groundbreakings, remodelling of property, etc. If your church has a mailout please make sure that it is sent to the ABN . If your church does not have a regular mailout please elect a reporter so that your news may be shared with the other Baptists of Arkansas.

The staff assisting Editor Sneed consists of Betty Kennedy, managing editor; Mary Giberson, secretary to the editor; Ann Taylor, bookkeeper; and Millie Gill, staff writer. During the past year Mrs. Kennedy received five state awards and one national award for her excellence in layout and design. Other members of the staff maintain the same quality of high prof essional excellence.

## Not So Good News:

The major problem confronting the Newsmagazine is that of economic inflation. Newsprint alone has increased more than $\$ 20,000$ in the past three years. Second-class mailing cost has increased from $\$ 14,000$ in 1972 to $\$ 34,000$ this year. Next year, the projected cost of mailing the Newsmagazine is $\$ 50,000$. In order to maintain a balanced budget it has become necessary for the Newsmagazine to increase its subscription cost one cent per subscriber per month.

The projected cost for the ABN in 1978 will be $\$ 2.28$ per year for the Every Resident plan; the Club Plan, where ten or more families pay annually in advance will be only $\$ 2.88$; and the individual subscription rate will be $\$ 3.25$. Where Every Resident Family is using the Newsmagazine the cost has only increased 28 cents per year since 1902.

## Conclusion:

We believe that even with increased prices due to inflation, that the ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE is one of the best bargains available to churches today. The Newsmagazine informs churches as to the activity of their sister churches, the ministries of the State Convention, and the activity of our Southern Baptist mission efforts around the world. We appeal to pastors and church leaders to assist us in increasing our circulation to an even higher level. We believe that good Baptists are informed Baptists. Let's join hands so that all of our people may have proper information.

## Third Century Campaign

1. Adopted unanimously by the 1976 Arkansas Baptist State Convention.
2. A successful Campaign will provide . . . .
(a). . . up to five Student-to-Student workers, recent college graduates, who spend one year in campus evangelism, Bible study, and dorm visitation.
(b). . . . up to five part-time BSU Directors at our five new community colleges at Harrison, Blytheville, Forrest City, Hot Springs, and Helena.
(c).... utilities at our proposed furloughing missionary residence at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville.
(d). . . more money to work with our 700 International Students in Arkansas.
(e). . . . two hundred dollars extra for each of our Arkansas BSU Summer Missionaries.
(f)....enrichment money for special campus programs, speakers, etc.

## International Students

1. It is estimated that over 700 International Students will be studying in the state of Arkansas this year. Our BSU Directors are working to find Christian families who will "adopt" those International Students who desire to have a host family for visits on some weekends and holidays.
2. Friendship International House will again be provided during the Christmas holidays in Conway for Internationals who need a place to stay between school semesters.
3. An International Retreat is held each fall as a time of fellowship and sharing of the Christian faith with Internationals.
4. A ministry to wives of international students, Friendship International, is operated in Little Rock and Fayetteville in cooperation with local church groups.

## Campus Evangelism

1. Mạny of our Baptist Student Unions continue to have Share Seminars and WIN Conferences to offer students the training they need to more effectively share their faith in Jesus Christ as Savior.
2. Our Student-to-Student workers who will be leading out in the areas of Bible study and campus evangelism this year are: Karen Allred at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville, Kathy Pack at the University of Central Arkansas in Conway, and Lonette Gibbons at Henderson State University in Arkadelphia.

## Missions

1. There were 50 Arkansas students who served as summer missionaries last summer.
2. Our Summer Missionaries reported great experiences with many professions of faith again this year. (Final tabulation of reports is not complete at this time, but each year several hundred conversions are reported by our summer missionaries.)

## BSU Centers

A complete renovation of the BSU Center at the University of Central Arkansas has recently been completed.

## Personnel Changes

1. George Sims, who has served for eight years as BSU Director at the University of Arkansas at Monticello, has transferred to Little Rock to serve as Associate State BSU Director.
2. Dan McCauley is our new Baptist Student Director at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock.
3. Mike Weaver, a recent graduate of Southwestern Seminary, has been employed as BSU Director at the University of Arkansas at Monticello.
4. Tom McClain is now serving as BSU Director at Southern Arkansas University, after two years as Director for the campuses at Beebe, Batesville, and Searcy.
5. Jamie Jones, BSU Director at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville for 26 years, has moved to Little Rock to serve as Director for the BSU Third Century Campaign for two years.

## BROTHERHOOD

## C.H. Seaton, Director

The basic task of the local church is the involvement in missions. This, of course, is reaching people with the gospel message ministering to their needs and teaching them to work and act like followers of Christ, or Christians.

Assisting churches in carrying out their task is the task assignment of the Brotherhood Department.

Brotherhood material is designed to enlist and assist men and boys through Royal Ambassadors and Baptist Men, in mission education and mission activities. Mission activities include sharing the message of Christ with the lost. Mission activities also include ministering to the needs of the total person.

Brotherhood and involvement of men and boys in missionary education and activities last year showed an increase of $.9 \%$ Southwide. In Arkansas we are happy to report the increase was $3.5 \%$. For this increase, we are grateful. In one association in January and February six new units were organized. The first three months of the year showed an increase of 2 new units per week.

Indication, by request for materials, is pointing to a similar growth for the remainder of the present year.

The Brotherhood Department, since the last report, has also conducted a State Royal Ambassador Fellowship Supper, attended by 400 boys, counselors, and pastors. On November 7, at Immanuel Church the 1977 supper will be held.

A Baptist Men's Meeting was held at Camp Paron on March 11-12. Some 100 men from across the state spent the week-end in conferences on "The Bible and Missions." The conferences were led by Dr. Larry Baker, pastor, First Baptist Church, Fayetteville, Arkansas. It was a very profitable and inspiring time for those attending. Many of the men attending were confronted for the first time with the Biblical teachings concerning missions and their responsibility. They expressed appreciation for the conference. Dr. James Bryant, pastor, Second Church, Russellville, challenged the men to ministry in nursing and retirement homes.

Marvin Reynolds, missionary on furlough, brought a message on missions-now. This was a real challenge to those attending. Men who made the trip to Guatemala shared something of their experiences.

On May 6-7, the State-wide Royal Ambassador Congress was held at Markham Street Church in Little Rock.

Fourteen boys participated in the speakers contest. Six of the boys were in the Pioneer age division. It is encouraging to see older Royal Ambassadors doing extra advancement work, which is required for the speakers contest.

Royal Ambassador Camps were held in June. The Lord blessed in many ways. Visible results were: Ten (10) boys saved, four (4) surrendering to be missionaries, six (6) to full-time Christian vocation, and fourteen (14) rededications.

The thrilling aspect of the decisions is the positive commitment of the older boys to missions and the service of personal witnessing.

Most of the boys who accepted Christ were won through their influence and by other boys. From the group will come our future leaders in Baptist life and world wide missions.

Only eternity will reveal the truly great impact of the camps in the life of each person attending, including staff and counselors.

We give thanks to God for his blessings, and for a great staff of workers who help in camp, at a real sacrifice, and make them possible. Plans are already underway for a great camping season in 1978.

Upcoming in September will be a training session of both associational and church Brotherhood officers, on September 16-17, at Camp Paron. Last year we had 42 in attendance.

The challenge to men and boys in the area of missions, as taught by Christ, is tremendous. The opportunities for service through involvement in mission activities is unlimited. The willingness of men and boys to respond, when opportunities for mission study and activities are provided, is unparalleled. They will respond when the church challenges them. Slowly, but surely, churches are accepting their responsibility to provide missionary education for men and boys. As the church provides and challenges, men and boys respond.

Missions and missionary personnel for tomorrow depend on boys who are enlisted and trained today.

The Brotherhood Department is ready to assist every church in providing missionary education for men and boys. We have the material available. Call on us, it will be our privilege to serve.

## BUSINESS SERVICES

The Division of Business Services functions in a supportive role to all other Baptist Building departments and to Arkansas Baptists as a whole. It provides services that enable other areas of ministry to perform efficiently, and in the process seeks to economize on necessary costs.

In early 1976, an IBM System/32 computer was leased and installed in the Accounting Services office. It has proven to be very efficient and functional and continues to be operated without any increase in personnel. It has proven to be so satisfactory that the Executive Board authorized the purchase of the computer, which can be effected in forty-six months without any increase in monthly payments over the amount presently being paid on the lease.

A new IBM copy machine was leased and has proven to be very efficient and economical, as well as providing a much higher quality of copy work. Consequently, a larger copy machine seems entirely feasible in the near future.

After extensive consultation and research by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, a new telephone system was installed. It will not only increase efficiency by adding a number of new services, but will also make possible some savings in cost on long distance telephone calls. It will also be expandable and adaptable to future needs.

A number of minor renovations were completed in the Baptist Building, making possible desk space for several new staff positions already authorized. However, it should be noted that there is no additional available space for any new department or major expansion which the Executive Board or convention may see fit to authorize in the future.

A number of improvements were also completed in the Baptist Building parking lot. All parking spaces were re-striped, and concrete bumpers were added to those that did not previously have one. This made possible a reassignment of all spaces in a more efficient manner and a better utilization of spaces for visitors during peak periods of use.

New identification signs were installed at both entrances to the parking lot, and chains were placed around the perimeter, providing better security and control of the space. These changes should provide better parking facilities for all persons who work at or visit the Baptist Building.

The Division of Business Services is pleased with the changes and improvements it can report for the past year. While its budget continues to grow larger, due to increases in utilities and supplies, it has at the same time been able to save a considerable amount of mission funds for the convention as a whole by providing efficient, supportive services in an economical manner. While the effect may be indirect, it provides a distinct contribution to the total missionary task of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

## CAMP PARON

1977 has been a busy year for Camp Paron. Through October the facilities have been in use by various groups for 62 days, plus the months of June, July, and August when the camp was in use by Royal Ambassadors, G.A.'s, and Acteens. Several tentative bookings during November and December will complete a full schedule.

Royal Ambassador, G.A. and Acteen camps utilize all the time in June, July, and August. These organizations have first priority on use of the facilities. Other departments in the Baptist Building have second priority and use the facilities several times during the year.

Many churches across the state use Camp Paron for youth retreats, adult choirs, young married groups and Senior Citizen retreats.

The camp facilities are available for use by church groups, etc., when available, on a first-come, first-served basis.

At this date (July 7) it is impossible to know how many people have been involved in use of the camp facilities. Indications are, however, that more than 3,200 will have been involved before the year is over.

Mrs. Opal Doughty serves as kitchen supervisor. She and her helpers provide excellent meals for camps and retreats. She is an active member of Harmony Baptist Church.

Jeanie Weber, Brotherhood Department office secretary, also serves as secretary for Camp Paron facilities.

## CHURCH MUSIC

The Church Music Department of our Convention exists for the purpose of assisting individuals, churches and associations in enlarging their ministry through music. This involves assistance in establishing, maintaining and improving the work presently being done. We strive to accomplish this through counseling, training, and by providing and interpreting information about the most effective and up-to-date techniques available.

The Music Ministry of our churches continues to show an increase in enrollment. Our total enrollment now stands at 38,740. We are grateful for the continued interest in the music ministry. God has given us a delightful tool with which to work, our prayer is that we will use it most effectively for His glory.

## 1976-1977 State Music Highlights

The events described below are some of the programs we sponsored this year to empliment our purpose of training and developing the musical membership and leadership of Arkansas Baptists.

1. Associational Music Directors' Workshop

The work of the Associational Music Director is important to the total state program. This event was scheduled to give training and set up times for assistance to our associations. The main emphasis is on how to organize and do an effective Associational Music Program. Next year's workshop is January 13-14.
2. Volunteer - Part-Time Music Leadership Workshop

One of our most effective events is this workshop for volunteer and part-time music leaders. We strive to give very practical help and information which can be taken back to the churches and used immediately.

Attendance was down this year, but we had a fine group. The 59 who attended were very enthusiastic about what was being done and we look for a much larger crowd next year.
The workshop is scheduled for February $3-4,1978$, and is open to Song Leaders, Organists, Pianists, and Pastors.

## 4. Associational Music Tournaments

This associational event is sponsored each year to give the young people in all of our churches an opportunity to use their musical talent and to hear young people from other churches do the same. It is conducted and promoted by the associational music director and is to be held before the end of April.
12 Associations held tournaments this year, and reported a total of 61 first and second place winners. These winners were invited to participate in the State Tournament in June.

## 6. Music Camps

Two Music Camps are conducted each year at Arkadelphia in the facilities of Ouachita Baptist University and First Baptist Church.
Youth and Adult Music Camp this year was one of the finest in every respect. We had 285 enrolled, and the performances at the conclusion of the camp were excellent.

Dr. Duncan Couch, Southwest Baptist College, Bolivar, Missouri conducted the Senior High and Adults in "Hallelujahs", a compilation of choruses from the works of eight master composers. Morris Ratley, Central Baptist in Magnolia, did his usual fine work with the Junior High campers as they sang "Lightshine".
Charles Butler directed the band in a fine program at the end of the week, and Barney Larry directed the Handbell Choir concert. Most of our faculty is made up of ministers of music and musicians from our own churches.
Music Camp for Young Musicians was conducted the first week in August. We had a total of 605 enrolled, which we feel is the maximum number we can handle in the available facilities.
The music campers were divided into four choral groups, and each group memorized a musical or cantata. Besides these choir groups, each camper was involved in a class of music activities where he learned some basic rudiments of music, and also an Introduction to the Instruments of the Orchestra class. Actual demonstrations were given by qualified instructors.
This year's choral conductors were Mr. and Mrs. Ray Burdeshaw, Mobile, Alabama; Mrs. Betty Woodward, Shawnee, Oklahoma; and Mr. Glen Ennes, Willard, Missouri. Our camp pastor was Rev. Lamar Lifer, Olivet Baptist, Little Rock. There were 17 public decisions made in the last worship service.

## 7. Northwest Convention Evangelistic Crusade - April 2-9, 1978

A request has come jointly from the Home Mission Board and the Northwest Convention for assistance from the Ministers of Music in Arkansas for their Evangelistic Crusades next April. We are in the process of enlisting all the help we can for this mission endeavor.
Our convention theme next year is "Let the Church Reach Out". This might be just the opportunity you are looking for, a real mission opportunity which your church can take part in.

## CHURCH TRAINING

## I. Department Tasks

The department is assigned responsibility for the Church Training Program, Church Administration, Family Ministry, Church Library and Church Recreation. In planning and conducting projects in Arkansas related to these programs, the department works in close cooperation with these departments at the Baptist Sunday School Board.

In each of these areas the department's primary responsibility lies in the area of leadership development. The department's program is directed to pastors, church staff members, Church Training leaders, church library and church recreation leaders, church officers and committees, deacons and church secretaries. In each of our training projects it is our objective to assist churches in their efforts to "prepare all God's people for the work of Christian service, to build up the body of Christ" (Eph. 4:12 TEV).

## II. Review of 1976-77

1. Church Training Program

This past year (1976-77) has been the first year of a three-year emphasis on training in discipleship. The emphasis has been on "CHURCH: the Sunday Night Place for Exploring Discipleship." The projects conducted by the Church Training Department have been planned to help strengthen the training program in the churches of our state convention or to begin a Church Training Program where there is none.
(1) According to the 1976 Arkansas Baptist State Convention annual, there were 1213 churches in our state convention with a total Church Training enrollment of 83,173 . The average attendance for 1976 was 41,803 .
(2) The annual Church Training Convention was held at Immanuel Church, Little Rock, on October 28. The convention included a Church Training Fair and age-group conferences for all Church Training leaders. The conferences were attended by 181 leaders from 85 churches and 33 associations.
(3) A Leader Training Seminar was conducted at the Baptist Building on December 2-3 with 19 participants from 17 churches.
(4) " M " Night was conducted by 38 associations with a total attendance of 7,556 from 611 churches. Concord Association received the high attendance plaque. Independence Association received the efficiency plaque for the largest percentage of their enrollment present.
(5) During the week of January 31 - February 3, fifteen Area Youth/Adult Workshops were held in our state. In addition, the workshop faculty led nine local church conferences. A total of 1,186 youth and adult leaders participated in these workshops from 35 associations.
(6) District Bible Drills and Speakers' Tournaments were conducted in each of the eight districts March 21 - April 1. There were 83 participants from 29 churches and 21 associations. The first place winner in the Youth Bible Drill was Lori Keenen from First Church, Rogers. The first place winner in the Youth Speakers' Tournament was Rhonda Millikin from First Church, West Memphis. These young people represented our state at Glorieta and Ridgecrest.
(7) Associational Church Training Leadership Conferences were conducted in eight associations.
(8) Church Training Workshops were conducted in five churches and personal consultations were held with a number of other churches.
(9) Covenant Fellowship Emphasis Conferences were conducted in three associations with 130 participants.
(10) Growth Interpretation Conferences were conducted in four associations in preparation for Growth Projects.
(11) The State Youth Convention was held on April 8, with approximately 4,500 youth participating. The theme was "Youth Exploring Discipleship."
(12) An Associational Church Training Leadership Conference was conducted August 19-20, 1977, for all associational Church Training leaders.
2. Church Administration
(1) Deacon Training Conferences were conducted for 13 churches and associations with over 300 participants from 34 churches.
(2) The State Deacon Ministry Conference was conducted October 1-2 with 265 deacons, pastors, and wives attending from 44 churches and 20 associations.
(3) The State Pastor-Deacon Retreat was held at Camp Paron May 20-21 with 85 pastors and deacons participating.
(4) An ABC's of Church Administration Conference was conducted in the Washington-Madison Association on January 28-29 with 12 pastors participating.
(5) Five Area Pastoral Ministries Workshops were conducted Feb. 21-25. Seventy-seven pastors participated in the two-day workshops.
(6) A Baptist Youth Research Clinic was conducted in Little Rock on May 6 with 40 participants from 36 churches and 15 associations.
(7) A Summer Youth Ministry Conference was conducted at Ouachita on May 6-7 with 54 participants.
(8) A Pastoral Leadership Seminar is scheduled for Fairfield Bay, September 12-14, 1977.
(9) "Discovery Day" washeld on the Ouachita Campus on October 23 for senior high youth considering a church vocation. Eightyfive youth and youth leaders participated.
(10) Church vocations conferences were conducted during four of the youth assemblies at Siloam Springs during the summer of 1977.
(11) A conference on church vocations was conducted at the Baptist Student Center at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff.
3. Family Ministry
(1) A Marriage Enrichment Retreat was conducted at Horseshoe Bend in March. Eleven couples participated in the retreat. Nine persons have been trained to lead Marriage Enrichment Retreats for associations and churches in our state.
(2) A Retreat for Engaged Couples was conducted for students at Ouachita and Henderson State University with eight couples participating.
(3) Marriage enrichment projects were conducted in six other churches and assistance was given in planning two other family enrichment conferences for churches and associations.
4. Church Library
(1) A Church Library Conference was held in connection with the Church Training Convention in October.
(2) Four Area Library Conferences were conducted in April with 61 participants from 37 churches.
(3) Personal consultation was provided to two other churches.
5. Church Recreation

Four Area Recreation Workshops were conducted November $1-4$ with 116 persons from 62 churches in 28 associations participating.

# COOPERATIVE MINISTRIES WITH NATIONAL BAPTISTS 

Robert U. Ferguson, Director

National and Southern Baptists in Arkansas are making progress in jointly sponsored ministries. We seek to relate as brothers and sisters in Christ, and co-workers in the various Christian ministries in order that churches and associations may be strengthened and non-Christians brought to a saving faith in Christ.

Six STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONARIES spent 10 weeks in black churches, conducting VBS's, youth camp, and youth programs, enrolling 1,740 youth and resulting in 69 professions of faith.

24 college students and 2 seminary students were assisted with SCHOLARSHIP funds totaling $\$ 5,300$.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION activities at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff Rev. Lacy Solomon, Director, enrolled 200 students in Bible classes, and others were engaged in various BSU-sponsored activities.

Seven EXTENSION CENTERS for in-service training enrolled 218 pastors and laymen in Little Rock (2), El Dorado, Pine Bluff, West Memphis, Lewisville, and Fordyce.

HART OF THE HILLS' Camp at Paron was attended by 222 campers in a two-week program with 20 professions of faith.

Thirty-two LEADERSHIP CLINICS AND INSTITUTES across the state enrolled 2,050 persons.

JOINT COMMITTEES are formed in Arkansas Valley, Central, Pulaski, North Pulaski, Calvary, Tri-County, Bartholomew and Harmony associations, with other associations studying the idea.

The STATE JOINT COMMITTEE has met twice with representatives from all three cooperating conventions in attendance.

Joint Baptist WOMEN'S DAY OF PRAYER programs were known to be held in Camden, Hot Springs, Little Rock, and Pine Bluff, with plans being made to enlarge this activity.

Dwight McKissic, A NATIONAL BAPTIST MINISTERIAL STUDENT from Ouachita Baptist University served through June as ASSISTANT to the CHAPLAIN at Tucker Intermediate Reformatory where young Black first offenders are housed. Fourteen professions of faith and numerous rededications are registered. A successor to Dwight will be employed soon.

The Annual EVANGELISTIC CONFERENCE this year was a jointly sponsored event with National Baptists on the Program and in the audience. I am grateful for the response of Arkansas Baptist Convention staff and pastors, church members as we cooperate in Kingdom efforts.

## COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The convention's Cooperative Program budget for 1977 represented a sizable increase over the previous year's budget. This means that meeting the budget for 1977 represents a greater challenge than in previous years.

During the early months of 1977, severe weather conditions hindered church attendance in many parts of the state and consequently drastically reduced the income of many churches. This in turn adversely affected Cooperative Program receipts for the state as a whole. Yet, in spite of these two factors, Cooperative Program receipts are still more than seven percent ahead of those for the previous year, and in all probability 1977 will be another record year in mission giving for Arkansas Baptists.

The Cooperative Program budget for 1978 being recommended to the messengers at the 1977 convention includes a percentage increase in those gifts going outside of Arkansas for missions and ministries around the world. If approved by the messengers, this will be the seventh consecutive year that Arkansas Baptists have increased the percentage, and, from all records available, no other state convention can equal that claim.

The entire Southern Baptist Convention is involved in a bold mission effort to take the gospel to every person by the year 2000. This will involve outstanding stewardship on the part of Arkansas Baptists, but steps have already been taken toward this end.

During the past year a new Stewardship Department was authorized and staffed, but responsibility for Cooperative Program reporting and promotion was retained in the office of the Associate Executive Secretary. This minor reorganization strengthens both stewardship in the local church and also Cooperative Program promotion on a statewide basis.

An important resource for Arkansas Baptists are the furloughing foreign missionaries residing in the state at any given time. Most of these are native Arkansans, but an increasing number of missionaries from other states are choosing to spend their furlough period here. To better serve and utilize these missionaries, an arrangement was developed with the Foreign Mission Board for joint sponsorship of periodic orientation sessions. The first such session ever held in the Southern Baptist Convention was initiated in Little Rock on September 8, and other sessions will be scheduled in the future, as determined by current needs.

The sessions are designed to give the furloughing missionary a more personalized orientation for his state of residence, thus making his furlough period more productive. It will also enhance his contribution to the promotion of the Cooperative Program.

During the year the Executive Board approved the sponsorship of an annual Cooperative Program missions tour, the first of which will be planned for the summer of 1978. At the time of this report no further details are available for the first such tour, but it is anticipated that these annual tours will provide an opportunity for greater exposure to mission work on the part of travelling Baptists and will result in more knowledge of and greater support for the Cooperative Program.

The missionary vision of Arkansas Baptists continues to grow, as evidenced by Cooperative Program giving, and the Cooperative Program continues to provide an economical and efficient extension of each church's missionary outreach.

## EVANGELISM

The Celebration Evangelism Conference with the three state conventions that participated in the Life and Liberty Campaign was a great climax to the Life and Liberty effort. The crowds were great and the spirit of evangelism was felt in every message.

December 1-2 an Evangelism Workshop will be held at Paron. Directors of Missions and Chairmen of Evangelism will be guests of the Department of Evangelism. Clarence Shell and Neal Guthrie will lead the workshop. Twelve special selected men will be trained as leaders to aid pastors in revival preparation.

Clarence Shell has written a manual entitled, Area Crusades Preparation Manual.

Joy Explosion '77 will be December 29-30 at Park Hill Baptist Church, North Little Rock. This is for Junior and Senior High School students and their leaders. The main speaker will be Bob Turnbull, the Chaplain of Waikiki Beach, Honolulu, Hawaii. The theme is: "Obey my voice, and I will be your God. . ." Jeremiah 7:23.

The program is designed to reach and train leadership and young people to share their faith effectively, plus a time of creative, inspirational worship experiences together, climaxed with a Joy Explosion Celebration.

One hundred fifty five young people were trained in W.O.W. at Siloam Springs Assembly the Summer of '77. Thirty-four W.O.W. Schools have been held or will be held before ' 77 is over.

Commitment Witnessing Day will be held January 8, 1978. Pastors are expected to preach on some phase of personal witnessing and challenge their people to become more personally involved in eyeball to eyeball confrontation.

Renewal Evangelism has seen great progress in Arkansas this past year. Churches in Renewal have a new spirit of ministry and evangelism. The ultimate goal of this movement is the Parable Church. As spiritually awakened Christians commit themselves to this new life of authentic discipleship and to lifestyle evangelism and ministry, they will more effectively and naturally penetrate every relationship of life in redemptive ministry to the total needs of persons in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

January 23-25, the Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held at First Baptist Church, Fort Smith. It will start Monday night, January 23 and close Wednesday noon, January 25 . The general theme will be: "The Evangelistic Church On Bold Mission." Five of our own men will do the Bible Study. Dr. William Tanner, Executive Secretary of the Home Mission Board and James Pleitz of Florida will be our main speakers.

Area Evangelism Conferences were held September 6-12. W.B. Oakley, formerly Secretary of Evangelism in Michigan was the preacher for the adults and Clarence Shell, State Evangelist was the Bible teacher. John Hicks and Luke Flesher led the program for the youth. The attendance in four sessions averaged 165.

## SILOAM SPRINGS ASSEMBLY

The records of the summer sessions of the state assembly reveal the following measurable results.

This is 29 more campers than last year.
We do not make written records of persons making rededications, but by far there were more decisions of rededication than of any other kind.

There are many improvements that need to be made at the assembly. In recent years we have improved the housing for campers. Now more family units are needed. We plan to renovate the old faculty dorm into family units for use next summer. There are 1600 beds on the grounds, but about 1500 of them need to be replaced. This will take time due to the expense involved.

One of the greatest needs is for air-conditioning in the dining hall and tabernacle. Likely the dining hall is the greatest need. We need to replace the floor and tables in the dining hall, too.

The teaching pavilions are about worn out. A new design and placement of these facilities need attention.

Long range planning in recreation should include the need for a new swimming pool and a gym.

Keep these facility needs in your mind and pray for us as we work to improve the program for more and more adults and youth who attend. The assembly looks more and more like a full family and full denominational program every year.

Thank you for your prayer support for the spiritual ministry of the assembly. Six weeks in 1978 are scheduled from mid-June through July.

Winterized facilities are available for smaller group use during the months of September, October, November, March, April and May. Facilities are not available during December, January or February. All use of the facilities are scheduled through the director of the assembly, Lawson Hatfield, Box 552, Little Rock.

## STATE MISSIONS

R.H. Dorris, Director

The purpose and objective of the Department of Missions is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its task of bringing men to God through Jesus Christ by developing and promoting, in cooperation with churches and associations, old and new outreach ministries into all changing facets of modern life in response to the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20).

In pursuit of this objective 38 of the state's 42 associations are currently being "touched" by one or more of the mission divisions of this department.

## Direct Missions

The following statistical report is a summary of the work of this division within the past year:

BUILDING AID GRANTS have been approved and paid or are pending for 14 churches totaling $\$ 31,200$, while other requests await consideration.

The REVOLVING LOAN FUND, at the end of May, 1977, had total assets of $\$ 172,232$. This sum was enhanced by $\$ 25,000$ from the 1976 Dixie Jackson Offering and $\$ 25,300$ from the overage to the Cooperative Program budget. Consequently, from January 1, 1977, through June, loans have been made to 14 churches totaling $\$ 106,950$. All money is on loan. As it accumulates it is loaned to churches on the waiting list. Ten churches are currently on the list for a total of $\$ 80,500$. For this year, $\$ 10,000$ of the State Mission Offering is designated to the Fund.

NEW PROPERTIES for the establishment of missions and churches required $\$ 28,614$ on 4 locations, and 3 others are pending.

PROGRAM SUPPLEMENTS have assisted 2 associations with salary aid to provide a Director of Associational Missions.

CHURCH PASTORAL AID has been paid to 32 churches and missions, and by the end of this budget year will require the total allocation of $\$ 22,770$. In addition, $\$ 15,700$ will be used for this purpose from the Emergency Fund for special needs of 3 missions and 2 churches.

STUDENT PREACHING AID has been provided 8 student pastors who are enrolled in undergraduate work in colleges in the state.

The CHURCH EXTENSION campaign for 50 new churches and missions in 1975-76 resulted in 43. This was a net gain of 15 new churches in the Convention during the biennium. This somewhat unprecedented gain is in stark contrast to the previous 10-year period beginning in 1964 when the average net growth was one church each year. The Convention yearbook shows 1213 churches at the end of September, 1976.

For Bold Mission Thrust, the goal of Church Extension is 20 new churches and missions for each of the three years, 1977-79. From October, 1976, through July, 1977, a new church or mission has been organized on the average of one every other Sunday somewhere in the state.

CONTINUING EDUCATION has involved assistance to the establishment and growth of the Little Rock Center, Boyce Bible School. It is directed by Dr. W.T. Holland. Total enrollment since it opened until it recessed for the summer reached 89 men and women. Scholarship assistance has been given to 13 students. One student graduated at the end of the spring term, becoming the first for the Little Rock Center.

Five area conferences on "Stress in the Ministry" provided some valuable insights and suggestions for use by the Convention in assistance to pastors.

BOLD MISSION THRUST FOR 1977-79 is now underway in cooperation with the Evangelism Department and corresponding divisions of the Home Mission Board. Specific assistance is being given especially to Church Extension, but to other divisions of State Missions, as well.

## Language Missions

MINISTRIES TO THE DEAF are currently provided by 17 churches. INTERPRETERS WORKSHOPS were held in Little Rock and Jonesboro, and five 12 -week SIGN LANGUAGE CLASSES have been taught in the past year. The ARKANSAS BAPTIST CONFERENCE OF THE DEAF met on the campus of Ouachita Baptist University at Arkadelphia, June 17-19, with 90 in attendance. The DEAF YOUTH CAMP was held this year at Forest Hill, Louisiana. Two STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONARIES spent 10 weeks working with the deaf.

The SPANISH CONGREGATION in Little Rock outgrew its facilities at Lakeshore Drive Church and moved to a building owned by Pulaski Association. The group is sponsored jointly by Lakeshore Church, Pulaski Association, the State Missions Department and the Home Mission Board. Donoso Escobar is pastor.

Several churches are sponsoring resettled VIETNAMESE families, and others are ministering to them through the services of the church. The growing ministry of Grand Avenue Church, Ft. Smith, provides worship services through a Vietnamese interpreter and various other activities for Vietnamese families in the area.

Uniontown Church cooperates with a Cherokee Indian association in Oklahoma to provide a ministry to CHEROKEE INDIANS in eastern Oklahoma and western Arkansas.

The Missions Department and Pulaski County Association have been working with several churches on an in-reach ministry among ASSYRIAN refugees in the Little Rock area.

Special Missions Ministries
Twenty-eight STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONARIES and 8 SOJOURNERS served in resort-recreation areas and inner-city for 10 weeks this summer.

US-2 MISSIONARY James Crookham is serving in the Special Missions Ministries program of Pulaski County Association.

The MIGRANT MISSION CENTER reports 45 professions of faith among the migrant farm laborers to whom it ministers, during the past year.

A SPECIAL MINISTRIES CONFERENCE on Ministering in a Senior Adult Care Facility was held in Little Rock.

INTERFAITH WITNESS AWARENESS CONFERENCES were held in Fayetteville and Rogers with more than 500 in attendance. An INTERFAITH WITNESS ASSOCIATES TRAINING CONFERENCE trained 39 associates.

Chaplaincy Ministries

INSTITUTIONAL CHAPLAINS employed by the Convention serve in five state institutions: Cummins Prison, Boys’ Training School at Pine Bluff, Girls’ Training School, Hot Springs Rehabilitation Center, and Booneville Unit of the Children's Colony.

A STUDENT CHAPLAIN from Ouachita University serves at Tucker Prison.

Chaplaincy Ministries resulted in 82 PROFESSIONS OF FAITH during the past year.

Pastors throughout the state serve as VOLUNTEER CHAPLAINS in county jails, industries, hospitals, motels, planned communities, housing developments, segments of city government, nursing homes, and resort areas.

The annual CONFERENCE FOR CHAPLAINS was held at Camp Paron with 30 in attendance.

## STEWARDSHIP

## James A. Walker, Secretary

Southern Baptists faced and responded to the challenge of mission outreach. Baptists agreed, at the Kansas City Convention, on an outreach priority in keeping with Christ's commission.

The newly formed Stewardship Department is at the heart of Bold Mission Thrust. Plans to plant a Baptist witness in more than 600 counties and double the number of foreign missionaries by 2000 A.D., call for stewardship education and promotion. The goal of doubling Cooperative Program gifts by 1982 requires increased awareness of biblical stewardship principles.

A reorganization of the Stewardship-Cooperative Program Department is the Convention's response to the need of increased emphasis on stewardship. James A. Walker assumed leadership of the newly formed Stewardship Department March 1, 1977.

All general stewardship responsibilities are now under the direction of the Secretary of Stewardship. He works with churches and associations in the development of biblical stewardship.

## AWARENESS

Response to mission outreach starts with awareness. The Stewardship Department informs Arkansas Baptists of giving trends through articles published in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine. The department emphasizes the grace of proportionate giving.

## SERVICES

These services inform Arkansas Baptists of needs and opportunities:

1. Literature. The department provides free literature to the churches. General stewardship tracts present a biblical approach to giving. Tracts on the Cooperative Program trace mission dollars in action. Stewardship catalogs, calendars, and budget plans offer suggestions to churches seeking to develop effective programs. Films and filmstrips dramatize the joys of giving.
2. Missionary-in-Residence. James Hampton will serve through July of 1978. Gilbert Nichols will repeat a term with the department beginning in August of 1978.
3. Personnel. Your department secretary initiates and responds to requests from churches and associations. This ministry covers stewardship clinics, counsel to church committees, budget planning conferences, stewardship revivals, family money management conferences, and resource information.
4. Building Fund Campaigns. The department will have qualified men to lead churches in "Building for Today's Challenge" campaigns.

GOALS
The Stewardship Department is committed to leading Baptists to underwrite Bold Mission Thrust. These goals give direction:

1. An increased awareness of biblical stewardship, and out of this awareness, an increased giving by our people.
2. Increased mission support for associational missions and the Cooperative Program.
3. Development of a Christian lifestyle consistent with world needs and mission opportunities.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL

Lawson Hatfield, Director
OUR OBJECTIVE
The objective of the Sunday School Department is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose - "to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closest cooperation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God."

## CONTINUED GROWTH REPORTED

Arkansas Baptist churches reported a net enrollment increase of 6,824 in Sunday School during the 1975 church year. This is the fifth consecutive year that an enrollment increase has been reported, with a total increase of 27,348 .

This growth can be attributed to the response of the churches to the department's promotion of ACTION, the bus ministry, the Arkansas Standard of Excellence, growth in small churches, and the emphasis on improvement of Bible teaching and learning. The department is committed to continued agressive promotion in these areas.

## STANDARD OF EXCELLENCE REINSTATED

The Arkansas Standard of Excellence has aroused new interest in training and reaching more people for Bible study. It was introduced to the churches in the fall of 1976. As of September 1, 1977 the following churches had met the requirements for Standard recognition:

Many other churches will use the Standard as a guide to better teaching for more people.

Department personnel assisted 60 churches in 77 training and planning projects.

## II. Vacation Bible School Promotion

The state VBS clinic conducted on February 15 in Pulaski Heights Church, Little Rock trained associational team members to lead conferences in the associational VBS clinics. Thirty-nine associations reported training 4,425 workers in 47 associational clinics.

A total of 989 Vacation Bible Schools, mission schools, and Backyard Bible Clubs was conducted in 1976, with a total enrollment of 98,205.

## III. Weekday Early Education

Fifty-one churches provide Weekday Early Education ministries. In conjunction with the state Missions department, our department conducted a WEE workshop in Pulaski Heights Church, Little Rock on November 22-23, 1976.

## IV. Church Architecture Consultation

Architectural consultation was given to approximately 60 churches through personal visits and correspondence.

## DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL

Lawson Hatfield has been director of the department since October, 1959. He serves as general officers' consultant, church architectural consultant, and director of the Arkansas Baptist State Assembly. In keeping with the Executive Board study-leave policy he has participated in three separate months of graduate study at Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth since October, 1975.

Don Cooper began his work with the department June, 1968. In addition to serving as assistant director of the department, he is adult consultant, associational coordinator, and assistant director of the assembly. He relates directly to work in these associations: Ashley, Bartholomew, Benton, Buckner, Carey, Clear Creek, Concord, Dardanelle-Russellville, Delta, Harmony, Liberty, North Arkansas, Ouachita and Washington-Madison.

Freddie Pike, youth consultant, began his work with the department January, 1973. His other duties include training and achievement guide records and relating directly to these associations: Big Creek, Black River, Current-Gains, Greene, Independence, Little Red River, Mississippi, Mt. Zion, North Pulaski, Rocky Bayou, Searcy, Trinity, and White River.

Harold Vernon, with the department since January, 1973, is children's consultant. His other areas of responsibility include Vacation Bible School, bus outreach, and work with the mentally retarded. He also relates to the following associations: Arkansas Valley, Buckville, Caddo River, Calvary, Caroline, Centennial, Central, Conway-Perry, Faulkner, Southwest Arkansas, Little River, Pulaski, Red River, Tri-County and Van Buren.

Pat Ratton began her work in the department October, 1967. In addition to being the preschool consultant, her other areas of responsibility include kindergarten, tracts and publication of the monthly Sunday School News.

Mrs. Harold Haley has served as office secretary since August, 1966. Mrs. Richard Weatter began her work as office secretary January, 1977.

## WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Julia Ketner, Executive Director

During 1976-77, members of Woman's Missionary Union have been challenged to follow the Lord's example set forth in the watchword for the year, "Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand."

Two special emphases have strengthened the work of Woman's Missionary Union: Teach Missions and Minding the Future. Teach Missions is a three year plan seeking to improve the image and quality of teaching missions and to encourage greater participation in mission study. A third objective changes each year to emphasize each aspect of the teach missions task. This year WMU helped women and girls learn about and appreciate the Biblical basis and history of missions.

Leader training opportunities were programmed to strengthen the Teach Missions emphasis. These included:

Associational WMU Directors' Retreat, August 19-20, with twenty-two (22) associational WMUs represented.
One day Statewide Church WMU Leadership Conference, September 15 at Immanuel Baptist, Little Rock. Seventeen (17) conferences were offered with 567 attending.

Five area Church WMU Leadership Conferences held at First Baptist, Van Buren; First Baptist, Hope; First Baptist, Monticello; Wynne Baptist, Wynne; and First Baptist, Mountain Home. Attendance totaled 404.

Six area Leadership Conferences for Associational WMU Leadership with 145 attending and 25 associations represented.

Leader training was also provided in fifteen associations and many churches upon request. Approximately one hundred (100) Arkansas WMU women attended WMU Week at Glorieta and Ridgecrest for a time of training, inspiration, and fellowship. A chartered bus went to Glorieta.

The second emphasis, Minding the Future, sought to increase adult awareness of personal responsibility for preschoolers, children, and youth in missions organizations and to enlist more of them in their respective organizations (Mission Friends, Girls in Action, and Acteens). Statewide activities related to these age-level organizations included:

> GA Mother-Daughter Camp for younger GAs held at Camp Paron with 178 attending. There will be two GA MotherDaughter camps in 1978 , April $7-8$ and May $19-20$. This year approximately 85 were not able to attend because of full camp. Thee weeks of camp for older GAs held at Paron in July. These activities were under the direction of Karen Russey, state GA director.

ACT VI for high school Acteens held at Park Hill, North Little Rock with 231 in attendance; ACT VII for younger Acteens at Burns Park, North Little Rock with 367 attending; and a mission tour to New Orleans for Acteens in grades $9-12$. These were under the direction of Betty Jo Lacy, state Acteens director.

Other organizational activities included: the first State BYW Meeting held at First Baptist, North Little Rock with 108 attending; and State Annual Meeting at First Baptist, Jonesboro, with Mrs. A. Harrison Gregory, WMU, SBC president as a program guest and over 800 in attendance.

Woman's Missionary Union promoted plans for Weeks of Prayer for Foreign and Home Missions and initiated plans for Season of Prayer for State Missions. Program materials on state missions work were developed for churchwide and organizational prayer observance. Assistance was given by staff personnel of the State Missions Department.

The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions and Dixie Jackson Offering for State Missions were promoted in connection with the respective seasons of prayer. Gifts of Arkansas Baptists through these special mission offerings as of September 14, 1977 totaled \$1,400,045.46 (an increase of more than $\$ 143,700$ ), divided as follows:

As part of WMU's participation in BOLD MISSION, BOLD state offering goals have been set for each of the special mission offerings for 1977-78: Dixie Jackson, \$175,000; Lottie Moon, \$1,000,000; and Annie Armstrong, $\$ 350,000$. We encourage each church to also set BOLD GOALS for each of these offerings.

Nancy Cooper scholarships were granted to Olive Lightbourne, Laura Dewbre, and Ann Etheridge, students at Ouachita Baptist University; and to Wilma Brogdon and Geneva Tindell, students at Southern Baptist College. Additional monies received from several members of First Baptist, Hope, made it possible to grant scholarships to three alternates: Kathy Snyder, Connie Edmondson, and Vickie Jo Smith, students at Southern Baptist College. The scholarship fund is administered through the Arkansas Baptist Foundation. Scholarships are available to volunteers for missions or church related vocations studying at OBU or SBC. Preference is given to young women applicants.

The objective of Arkansas state Woman's Missionary Union is to assist churches and associations in establishing, conducting, and improving missionary education in the churches. Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends provide the structure for women, girls, and preschoolers to learn about and become involved in local, home, and foreign missions. A BOLD MISSION project for Arkansas WMU will be to help establish a missions education program in every Southern Baptist church in Arkansas.

Thank you for the opportunity and privilege of serving you for we are "Labourers together with God."

# ARKANSAS BAPTIST FAMILY AND CHILD CARE SERVICES

"You can take the child out of the family, but you can't take the family out of the child". "Since 1894 - A History of Caring" was the theme of our child care ministry during the Bicentennial year of our nation's history. We are grateful for the caring spirit of Arkansas Baptists who have, historically, undergirded our child care ministry with prayerful concern and financial resources. Eighty-two years of caring represents Arkansas Baptists reaching out to heal the hurts of thousands of children and families. Eighty-two years of caring represents, for our agency, our pilgrimage of developing appropriate services to meet the changing needs of children and their families in our changing society. From an orphanage in 1894 to a multiple family and child care agency in 1977 has been our pilgrimage. These intervening years and changing societal conditions have taught us that to be of maximum help to the child in need, we must include his family in our circle of caring. Our staff has made a renewed commitment to this basic value of the family as we provide services to children and their families.
Arkansas Baptist Home for Children. During this twelve-month period, ninety children and youth received care and direction by living at the Arkansas Baptist Home for Children. Thirty-four children, from all areas of the state, were admitted during this period. Each of these new admissions were made after a thorough study was made of the child's needs and his family circumstances. Work with the family, if there was one, continued while the child was in our care. Many of these children come to us with emotional problems as a result of the traumatic events of their past. Our staff, with compassion and professional skills, work hard in helping these young people work through these difficult feelings to move toward a more realistic acceptance of themselves and more effective ways of coping with life. Fortyfive children were released during this period, a majority of which were reunited with their families.

The Christian message of God's love continues to make our child care ministry distinctive. Twenty-one of the young people living at the Home this year accepted Christ as their personal Savior and joined one of the local Baptist churches. Some of our young people attended Siloam Springs which provided a week of good Christian fellowship and Bible study. Leading young people to find Christian principles on which to build their lives is a priority of our staff.

Recognizing the importance of our children being involved with inspirational people who care about them, our social work staff has developed a Big Brother/Big Sister program involving students from the University of Arkansas at Monticello. There has also been a renewed effort at recruiting families to serve as friends to our children.

The interior of the cottages took on a new look during the year with new furniture being added to each living unit. The Board of Trustees were happy to make this expenditure possible which resulted in a more cheerful living atmosphere for the children.

Faithful sponsors have continued to enrich the lives of our children by providing money for clothes, allowances, and special needs. Sponsors are very important people to our children and we are gratef ul for the many individuals, Sunday School classes and churches who have been involved in this important aspect of our ministry.

The second annual Alumni Association meeting was held in May of 1977, with approximately eighty-five in attendance. The alumni have voted to provide financial support for tutorial aid for the young people at the Children's Home.

It is hoped that the present volunteer tutorial program can be expanded and the quality of aid improved by hiring additional tutors and purchasing teaching aids that are needed.

Foster Homes - Group Home. Sixteen children were cared for in our approved foster homes during this period and eleven boys were helped by living at our Group Home for Boys in Jonesboro.

Area Offices. Through our area offices, 449 new referrals were processed, representing a variety of personal and family problems. In addition to conducting intake evaluations for children needing one of our residential programs, and working with the families of the children we have in care, our area workers received increased requests for marriage counseling and continue to work cooperatively with other community agencies in delivering services to families and children.

We are happy to have Doug McWhirter, graduate of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and Louisiana State University School of Social Work join our staff as director of our Little Rock office.
Finances. Gifts to our child care ministry from the churches increased 8.7\% over 1975, with a total received of $\$ 191,175.00$. We are grateful for the Cooperative Program support which provides a firm financial floor on which we can build to meet the total needs of our child care ministry. We have a working relationship with Arkansas Social Services in meeting the needs of children under their custody. Children for whom they are legally responsible, and who are in need of services we provide can be helped because of this relationship. After determining that our program is appropriate to meet the child's needs, we can bring the child into care and Arkansas Social Services can purchase these needed services for the child. This represents a spirit of cooperation in providing quality care for troubled children and their families.
Our Board of Trustees, under the leadership of its Long Range Planning Committee, has focused attention on two new areas of ministry: (1) emergency shelter for children in the Little Rock area, and (2) services to the elderly (retirement village). The Board has approved the emergency care shelter program and these services will become a reality during the coming year. We will be able to provide immediate emergency care for children in need any time, day or night. This will meet a pressing need for children in the Little Rock area.

The need for a retirement village for senior citizens and our convention's response to this need will be jointly studied by our Long Range Planning Committee and a subcommittee of the Program Committee of the Executive Board during the coming year. We solicit your prayers as we seek God's guidance in developing ministries to meet these needs. Thank you, Arkansas Baptists, for your continued prayerful interest and support of Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services.

# ARKANSAS BAPTIST FOUNDATION 

Harry D. Trulove, President/Treasurer

The year 1977 brought new challenges and opportunities to your Foundation.

There was the challenge to provide service. During 1977, over 100 families requested specific information on estate planning. More than half of these placed the original copy of their wills in the Foundation file. This brings to over 350 the number of individuals who have recorded their intent to make a gift under will by placing the original copy in our fireproof file. Through estate planning these fine Christian stewards have said, "Whether I live or whether I die, my estate is to be used for Gods purpose."

Due to the increased request for services, it became necessary to employ Secretary/Receptionist.

The management of the funds also brought new challenges. A tax law change in late 1976 opened the possibility to use a more conservative investment tool. The proceedure was studied thoroughly and during a two day workshop guidelines were formulated. The investment committee was instructed to test the proceedure. At the end of the first five months some $\$ 7,000.00$ of additional income had been realized by using this technique.

The growth of your Foundation brought a third challenge in planning the 1978 budget. An analysis of the past few years is an interesting study in the ratio of growth to financial support. The following figures are taken from the audits of 1973-76. They speak for themselves.

Income
Prior to 1975, the Cooperative Program allocation for our budget was minimum. Little money was available for promotion or church program material. In 1974, your Foundation Board decided it was time to make a change and to demonstrate confidence in the ministry of the Foundation. An adequate budget was projected through the use of the Foundation Reserve Funds (remember the office had been vacant for some $31 / 2$ years). Half of the reserves were used in one year.

The demonstration of confidence became the turning point. Some additional funds were provided from the Cooperative Program enabling the Foundation to provide service and materials. The assets managed by the Foundation increased and for the first time investment income exceeded the
amount the Foundation received from the Cooperative Program. By 1976 the investment income was more than twice the amount received from the Convention. This income is allocated in keeping with the instructions of the donor or where there were no instructions by you - The Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

There was the challenge of new programs. During 1977, your Foundation pioneered the creation of a television spot to be used during 1978. The office distributed over 97,000 pieces of material that were ordered by $15 \%$ of our churches. The total assets have exceeded 2 million dollars this year.

The growth realized over the last several years is a result of the cooperation from the various agencies within the Arkansas Baptist Family; a dedicated staff; a committed board; undergirded with your support through the Cooperative Program. Since we represent all Baptist causes, gifts are not actively solicited for ourselves.

We are pleased but not satisfied. Although there has been much accomplished there are many others who have yet to discover the joy that comes with the knowledge that their stewardship will extend beyond their lifetime. Our committment is to broaden the base of participation that all may share in the ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ. No gift is to small nor none too large.

The Foundation Board is composed of dedicated businessmen, pastors and church staff personnel from across the state. They serve faithfully and without compensation. The current board and officers are as follows:

The report of your Historical Commission is not as inclusive as your director had hoped it might be. It consists, primarily, of two items.

First, an effort was made to gather materials for the Commission's Library, located at Ouachita University. Early in the year I wrote a series of articles for the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine concerning the accumulation and preservation of historic materials. As a result, quite a number of books and other writings were given. One retired chaplain gave his library. Such effort must be our constant aim.

Second, the director has given a good deal of his time to the Committee assigned by the Executive Board to write a new history of Arkansas. Besides his work on the Committee he wrote one of the papers. This Committee secured the services of Dr. E. Glenn Hinson of Southern Seminary to edit the new history which we hope will be published next year.

# THE CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS, INC. 1007 Donaghey Building - Little Rock, Arkansas 72201

The fiscal year of the Christian Civic Foundation coincides with the calendar year. In order to provide the latest information on the activities of the Christian Civic Foundation for the Convention Yearbook, this report covers the twelve-month period from September 1, 1976, to September 1, 1977. The full-time program of the Foundation is led by a three-member staff, composed of the Executive Director, Rev. Edward W. Harris, the Educational Assistant, Mr. Ronnie P. Sparks, and the Office Secretary, Mrs. Beverly B. Williams.

Educational Program - Mr. Ronnie P. Sparks, our Educational Assistant, completed his first full year of school appointments on May 18, 1977. During the 1976-77 school year, he appeared in ninety schools. Evaluation forms returned by the school officials expressed highest appreciation for the quality of work and the dedication of our Educational Assistant.

Other engagements included civic clubs, WCTU meetings, including the State WCTU Convention, the State Teachers' meeting, the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, and a panel for the Pulaski County Association Pastors' Conference on Alcoholism, held at Immanuel Baptist Church, in Little Rock. He also filled speaking dates in eighteen churches, including worship services, youth group meetings, youth rallies, and five local Option meetings. In addition to the above engagements, Mr. Sparks also attended night classes at UALR two nights a week, majoring in speech communications.

During the first three weeks of June, Mr. Sparks attended classes in Drug Abuse Education at the University of Central Arkansas in Conway. During the summer, he also presented the Alcohol-Narcotics Education Program to twelve church youth camps, including four of the five Baptist assemblies, at Siloam Springs.

Confirmations for school engagements for the 1977-78 school year are being received daily. For the first time since the Alcohol-Narcotics Education Program began in 1962, the School Directory provided by the State Education Department contains the names and principals of all schools in the state, from Kindergarten through the twelfth grade. This is most timely, since the Alcohol-Drug scene is shifting rapidly from the high school and junior high school level to elementary-age groups. This year, we are including the fifth and sixth grades in our schedule. Of the 164 schools contacted this year, 62 include grades five and six.

The cost of the Alcohol-Narcotics Education Program is provided for in an Expense Account, which is dispersed to our Educational Assistant upon receipt of weekly Vouchers covering actual cost of travel, food, and lodging. No charge is made to any school or church for his services or that of other staff members. The income from our supporting churches has made it possible to continue this approach, although inflationary rises in program costs make it increasingly difficult. We hope to be able to continue this policy in the future, and to be able to avoid any charges for services as a supplement to our income. We believe that the churches also prefer this approach, and will help us to remain strong financially.

Alcoholic Beverage Control Board - We have advised each local group who requested our help, and have assisted them in their contacts with the ABC Board. Of special concern was an application by Mr. James Skillern Porter, Jr., for an on-premises beer permit for a theatre located at Fourth and Main in Little Rock, the site of the old Center Theatre. They will feature children's matinees in the daytime, and will cater to adults at night, at which time the beer would be served. All shows are supposedly to be of "family-type" entertainment. A person could sit for two to four hours without seeing the same program twice, meanwhile sipping beer throughout the program. We believe the granting of this permit would open the way for every theatre in Arkansas to follow suit. One hearing on this permit was postponed, and we have requested that we be notified when the rehearing is set. We have asked Brother Don Hook and Mrs. Margaret Kolb to represent the Foundation in opposition to this application, if and when a public hearing is granted. Churches throughout the state should express their convictions to the ABC Board, if they do not wish theatres in their town to sell beer to their patrons.

1976 Local Option Elections - Local Option Elections, instituted by Wet forces in seven Dry counties, were keld on November 2, 1976, and all seven counties voted to remain dry. This continued the record established by the voters of 44 counties in Arkansas, of first voting their counties dry, and never failing to vote to remain dry. These counties were: Cleburne, Faulkner, Montgomery, Pike, Scott, Van Buren, and Yell. Two new dry areas resulted from elections in Washburn Township in Logan County, and Precinct 180 in Pulaski County. Tyronza Township in Crittenden County voted to remain dry. Two townships voted to remain wet, Menifee, in Conway County, and Greenfield, in Poinsett County. In a mixed-drink election in Jefferson County, the voters rejected mixed drinks by a majority of 1,742 . We assisted in each of the eight county elections, when requested by local groups.

Legislative Activity - The regular session of the Seventy-first General Assembly of Arkansas convened on January 10, 1977, and recessed on March 18th. A total of 1,594 bills were introduced, and 958 became law. The following bills were of special concern to those interested in Civic Righteousness, because their passage would have affected directly the future moral and spiritual life of the state of Arkansas:
(1) Private Club Permits in Dry Counties. Senate Bill 566 was introduced by Senator Caldwell, of Rogers, and Senator Bookout, of Jonesboro. This bill would have authorized a Local Option Election to be called whenever proper petitions were presented, to vote on a precinct, ward, township, or county level "For" or "Against" authorization for the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board of the State to grant Liquor Permits to Private Clubs in Dry Counties in that particular unit of the county which voted in the election. We opposed this bill with all of our resources. It was soundly defeated on two separate votes, and a third vote was not attempted. We are deeply grateful to Dr. Charles H. Ashcraft, who sat with us through the long hours and days of active opposition and watchful waiting. In addition, Dr. Ashcraft wrote personal letters to legislators, made telephone facilities of the Convention available, and gave fïnancial assistance in meeting the heavy cost incurred.
(2) Private Club Permits in Wet Counties. Senate Bill 595, by Senator Canada, of Hot Springs, was a comprehensive bill that would have re-enacted the main features of Act 132 as it applied to Wet Counties, and would have provided for "lounges" or "open bars", a new feature. This bill received a "Do Pass" from the Committee, but was not presented for a vote in the Senate. We would have opposed it.
(3) Minors and the Sale of Beer and Wine. House Bill 419, by Representative Thompson, of Marked Tree, would have permitted 17-year-olds to mark, shelve, display, and check out Beer or Wine in Retail Grocery Stores. This bill was defeated by a decisive vote of 66-18. We strongly opposed this bill.
(4) Local Option Elections. Senate Bill 319, now Act 341, by Senator Russ, of Conway, amended Initiated Act 1 of 1942 (Local Option Law) with respect to the preparation of petitions, clarifying and updating the language. Senate Bill 108, now Act 208, by Senator Russ, dealt with the clarification of Ballot titles. These two bills, added to the Arkansas Supreme Court Ruling on the time limit for filing petitions ( 60 days before the election), will make for much less confusion in the 1978 elections. We supported both of Senator's Russ's bills.
(5) Self-Induced Intoxification. Self-induced Intoxification, as a defense in Criminal Prosecution, was prohibited by Senate Bill 152, by Senator Ralph Patterson, of North Little Rock.
(6) State Alcoholic Beverage Control Regulations. A twelve-month study by the Legislative Council produced three Senate Bills. Bill 439 clarified and updated language; Bill 440 was a repealing bill; Bill 441 was a Penalty bill. All three died in the House Rules Committee. Apparently, the ABC Board will continue to operate under the existing Regulations that reflect the "patchwork" nature of Arkansas Liquor Statutes.
(7) Distance Between Churches and Liquor Permits. House Bill 359, by Representative Charles Stewart, of Fayetteville, would have added to the present law requiring 200 yards distance between churches and schools and Liquor permits the words, "from the property line of the church or school". This good bill passed the House, received a "Do Pass" from the Senate Judiciary Committee, but was not acted upon in the closing days of the session.
(8) A Comprehensive Obscenity Law. House Bill 473, now Act 464, by Representative Earl Jones, of Texarkana, provided Statewide standards for Obscenity, clarified definitions of terms, incorporated present Arkansas Statutes, and, as amended, provided for civil injunction, under the supervision of the courts. Since enactment, questions about the constitutionality of the Statute have been raised, and, thusfar, no successful prosecutions under the Act have taken place.
(9) Sodomy. House Bill 117, by Representative Stancil, of Ft. Smith, amends the Uniform Criminal Code, to make Sodomy a crime and prescribes the penalty. The National Committee For Sexual Civil Liberties has announced that a legal challenge will be made of House Bill 117, now Act 828. We who have suffered vicariously with Anita Bryant, in her battle against homosexuality, will find the national spotlight turned upon our State during the coming year, if this Committee is successful.
(10) Repeal of State Sunday Closing Law. Two bills, House Bill 103, by Representative Henry Osterloh, and House Bill 438, by Representative Cliff Hoofman, both of North Little Rock, would have repealed the existing State Sunday Closing Law and permitted the purchase of all items on Sunday except alcoholic beverages. We strongly opposed both bills, and both bills died in Committee. This issue is raised in every session of the legislature. We recommend that every church be constantly alert to the continuing effort to erase all Sunday closing laws, including those which control the sale of alcoholic beverages.
(11) Other Items. Legislation to decriminalize possession and use of Marijuana did not materialize. With the public support of this position by President Carter, we are certain to face the issue in the next session. Legislation that would have decriminalized public drunkenness was defeated on the floor of the House. A bill to withhold Liquor Tax Revenues from Dry counties died in the House Rules Committee. No attempt was made to implement the report of the Arkansas State Economic Development Committee Report, calling for Public and Private Recreational Facilities in Dry Counties to be exempt from Alcoholic Beverage Statutes. Had Senate Bill 566, the Private Club Liquor Permit Bill, passed, the main features recommended in their report would have been accomplished in a series of Local Option Elections to grant permits in Dry Counties.
Private Club Permit Ruling by the Arkansas Supreme Court - On July 18, the Arkansas Supreme Court, by a vote of 4-3, reversed the ruling by Judge Tom Digby, issued in February, nullifying liquor permits for Private Clubs in Dry Counties. One Justice, Frank Holt, disqualified himself without any explanation, and Governor Pryor appointed Maurice Mitchell to hear the appeal. Justice Mitchell wrote the opinion for the majority, and his vote was the deciding vote. The opinion also represented Justices Byrd and Hickman. Justice Fogleman wrote a separate opinion, reversing Judge Digby. Dissenting were Justices Harris, Roy, and Smith. Justice Carleton Harris wrote a separate dissent.

The ruling of the majority sidestepped the question of the constitutionality of Act 132, and ruled that the "Mandamus Action" granted by Judge Digby was not the proper remedy, ruling on a technicality instead of the central issue. Chief Justice Carleton Harris took what we feel to be the correct position, namely, that Act 132 did amend Initiated Act 1 of 1942, and that it was unconstitutional, since it did not receive the required two-thirds vote of the elected members of the General Assembly, needed to amend any Initiated Act, such as Initiated Act 1 of 1942.

The Harrison group who initiated the challenge of Act 132, have requested a rehearing of their suit before the Supreme Court. We sincerely hope that such a rehearing will establish the unconstitutionality of Act 132, as an Act that sought to amend Initiated Act 1 of 1942, and did not receive two-thirds vote of the elected members of the General Assembly. If unsuccessful in this attempt, then another suit should be brought by some group in the very near future. Otherwise, Initiated Act 1 of 1942 (our basic Local Option law) will be impotent and subject to dissection by any individual who proposes legislation similar to Act 132. We are deeply indebted to Rev. David Woods
and each of the other Harrison supporters of the challenge of Act 132, and we urge all churches and Christian citizens to support them in every way possible. We pledge to you an all-out effort, at all times, to oppose any and all efforts to maintain Private Club Liquor Permits in Dry counties in the State of Arkansas.

Local Option Elections in 1978 - We were told that to oppose the passage of legislation that would return private club liquor permits to Dry Counties would be to insure that the Dry Counties would vote wet in 1978. This argument was based upon the idea that the powerful interests involved in Private Club memberships had permitted Dry Counties to remain dry because they were allowed to have their special privileges. These same powerful interests were said to be ready to step forth and lead the effort in each of the Dry Counties to vote them wet, in order to restore their special privileges. This is pure speculation. They could be right or they could be wrong. In any case, the leadership of Dry Forces in Dry Counties should be forewarned. The time between now and November, 1978, should be spent in preparation for such a possibility in every Dry County in Arkansas.

The Christian Citizen - We continue to publish our quarterly newsletter, The Christian Citizen, which is mailed to our Board of Directors, to all Baptist and Methodist pastors in the state, and to all who requested their names to be added to our mailing list. Two of the issues, the Summer and Autumn issues of 1976, carried names, addresses, phone numbers, and religious preferences of members of the 71st General Assembly. These issues were also mailed to the members of the General Assembly. We have had many expressions of appreciation from lawmakers during the 1977 legislative session. It is our intention to continue mailing future issues to them. Again, we want to express our appreciation for the cooperation of the Baptist and Methodist Headquarters in allowing us the use of their mailing lists and addressing facilities.

The Annual Meeting - The Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors was held on Monday, March 21, 1977, at the First United Methodist Church in Little Rock, at 12:00 Noon. A fellowship period preceded the luncheon from $11: 30$ to $12: 00$. Mr. Raymond Hillis, President, presided. Featured speaker for the occasion was Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks, Resident Bishop of the Arkansas Area of The United Methodist Church. Following Bishop Hicks' message, committee reports were received, guests introduced, and officers and Board members elected. The meeting concluded with installation of the following officers:

Dr. Earl Carter, Director of the Program Council of the North Arkansas Conference, was named to replace Brother Gatlin on the Executive Committee. Dr. Paul Bumpers, District Superintendent of the Conway District, was elected to serve on the Executive Committee.

Finances: Our income has remained strong, even through the normally slow summer months, for which we are grateful. Except for the purchase of new office equipment, our heaviest disbursements for the year are behind us. Income and disbursements for the twelve months from September 1, 1976, to September 1, 1977, are as follows:

# OUACHITA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY <br> Arkadelphia, Arkansas

#### Abstract

Arkansas Baptists for more than 91 years have worked together in the cause of Christian higher education through Ouachita Baptist University. It has been a growing covenant relationship, and Ouachita's growing strength in numbers, service to the denomination, financial stability, and commitment to academic and Christian excellence, are illustrated by this 1977 report to those who have made it possible. Only six Baptist colleges or universities receive higher dollar support through the Cooperative Program than Ouachita, and none receives greater support in prayer, good will, or the encouragement and support for our faculty, staff, students, and trustees. It is hoped that the stewardship demonstrated in this 1977 report will be the most appropriate way of showing our appreciation for Arkansas Baptists.


## STRENGTH IN STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Enrollment in the fall semester, 1977, is a record 1667, and the non-duplicating enrollment for the entire previous 12 months' period reached a total of 2082. The breakdown of the fall enrollment was 501 freshmen, 339 sophomores, 259 juniors, 384 seniors, 144 graduate and post-graduate students, and 40 special students. Students in 1976-77 came from 32 different states, 17 foreign countries, and from 70 of Arkansas' 75 counties. Pulaski County has the largest number of students with 236, followed by Clark with 173, Jefferson with 71, Garland with 66, and Hempstead with 47. Housing of Ouachita students in the men's and women's dormitories and married students' housing reached 1292, an all-time high. Since the pool of high school graduates in Arkansas, and in the nation, is predicted to decline in the next decade, all colleges are extremely cautious in building new dormitories. Even so, Ouachita is committed to responding to the needs of our Baptist young people, and will do whatever is necessary to provide a Christian education for those who seek it.

## CHRISTIAN TRAINING AND GROWTH FOR STUDENTS

A total of 303 students are preparing for church-related vocations, including 117 ministerial students, 74 preparing for church music, 52 for religious education, 24 mission volunteers, 28 for ministry of youth and recreation, and eight others. In cooperation with the Home Mission Board and the State Missions Department, and under the direction of Dr. Vester Wolber, Ouachita has instituted a new and more comprehensive In-Service Guidance Program for ministerial students. Ouachita continues to require chapel, two semesters of formal study of the Old Test ament and New Testament, and provides a variety of institutional supports for one of the strongest religious activities programs of any college in the country, directed by Elmer Goble. A total of 18 committees or areas of service involve several hundred students in such programs as Christian Focus Week, Big Brothers and Big Sisters, Bible study, married students minist ry, puppet ministry, drama group, fall retreat (at tended by 300), social ministries on and off campus, noonday devotions, summer missions, and international student ministry. Dr. and Mrs. Murray Smith, furloughing missionaries from Uruguay, served as missionaries-in-residence on the Ouachita campus during the entire year. They will be succecded in January, 1978, by

Dr. and Mrs. Orlynn Evans, of Monrovia, Liberia. Among the outstanding Christian personalities and guest speakers at Ouachita during the year were: David Meece, The Imperials, Sam Cathey, The After Dinner Players, Roger Copeland, Charles Baker, Larry Taylor, Alexei Bichkov, Michael Zhidkov, John Wright, Tom Logue, Bill Lawson, Ed Seabough, James Dunn, Cecil Sherman, Harold Cassidy, Ray McKissic, Bailey Smith, Frank Roughton, Charlie and Debbie Cruce, Richard Kleiman, Sheila Rogers, and Charles Trentham.

One of the highlights of the year for Ouachita was participating in the "McGrath Study" of 49 Baptist colleges and universities. Distinguished educator Dr. Earl McGrath, director of a program funded by the Lilly Foundation, became interested in discovering why so many of the Southern Baptist colleges and universities seem to be growing in strength, rather than fitting the stereotype of gloom and doom for many private colleges and universities. Forty-nine of our Baptist colleges and universities participated in one of the most comprehensive studies of a group of institutions of higher education that has ever been made. Dr. McGrath's report on June 27 at the Mobile meeting of the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools was very complimentary and encouraging to a group of schools committed to accomplishing not only educational purposes but distinctly Christian purposes as well. One of the most encouraging things for Ouachita is confirmation in the McGrath Report that a university can be strong academically while at the same time strong in its commitment to Christian purposes. The study gives us the opportunity to "see ourselves as others see us," and the wealth of data will be useful for faculty, staff, and trustee planning for years to come.

## BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS IMPROVEMENTS

Buildings and grounds are obviously not the most important part of a Christian college, but they can either support or handicap the achievement of institutional purposes. New construction, renovation, and campus beautification in recent years have given a tremendous boost to all phases of Ouachita's programs and activities. Construction was begun on the fourth building in the Ouachita "mega-structure," a classroom and office building for four major departments, the Maddox Public Affairs Center, and the official papers of Senator John McClellan, for whom the building will be named. It should be completed before the end of 1977. The year was an active one for improvement of the buildings and grounds in a variety of ways: the addition of paved parking space behind Daniel Dormitory and south of the Home Economics House; improvements made possible by the Athletic Facilities Improvement Fund, including a three-hole golf course, two new tennis courts, and the construction of Eddie Blackmon Field House (enlarged dressing facilities for football, baseball, and track); another step in the renovation of ConeBottoms Dormitory; remodeling of the President's Office with the assistance of a gift from the Little Rock Ouachita Club; a new roof and boiler for Conger Hall; and continued beautification improvements on the campus.

## ACHIEVEMENTS IN ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Ouachita continued to make progress in the quality of the academic program during the past year. New faculty members are employed only after extensive search for persons who combine the qualities of outstanding professional competence and genuine Christian commitment. Ouachita is especially fortunate to have Dr. Winston Beard, formerly director of graduate studies at U.A.L.R., to join the faculty as Chairman of the Division of Business and Eco-
nomics and Director of Special Programs. Riley Library continues to grow stronger under the able direction of Juanita Barnett, with increasing involvement in the computerized services of the "O.C.L.C. System" (Ohio College Library Consortium). Extensive use of Ouachita's Arkansas Baptist historical material has been made by those involved in the writing of a new Arkansas Baptist history. One of the trademarks of a Ouachitakind of education continues to be giving special attention not only to gifted students (with the Honors Program) but also to those in academic difficulty (with the Academic Skills Development Program). The Japan Exchange Program provides excellent benefits both to our students who spend a year in Japan at the Baptist university in Fukuoka, and also to our own students and faculty who enjoy the presence of three Japanese students who spend the year at Ouachita. The Water Research Program, under the direction of Dr. Joe Nix, has continued to grow in reputation and service, and has many benefits to students and faculty members. Our Maddox Public Affairs Center again made it possible for a group of students to attend a Washington Seminar early in January, giving firsthand information on our national government at a time of transition of power. Ouachita's music program continues to be recognized for its excellence, and a record number of 32 degrees in music were awarded during the year - the largest number by any college or university in Arkansas. Ouachita's Department of Education, in cooperation with Hope Middle School, was chosen by the U.S. Office of Education for a contract Teacher Corps program in innovative teaching methods.

The 1976-77 year was an outstanding one in intercollegiate and intramural athletics. State A.I.C championships were won in track, tennis, and golf, and Ouachita represented Arkansas well in the national N.A.I.A. championship meet in these fields. Gerald Masterson, outstanding both in athletic performance and Christian witness, was voted outstanding performer in the N.A.I.A. indoor track meet in Kansas City.

## OUACHITA'S LONG-TERM GOALS AND FINANCIAL NEEDS

The goals of Ouachita Baptist University for the next ten years are summarized in a brochure separate from this report. Ouachita's "Centennial Decade Goals" are the result of more than a year of study and planning by the faculty, staff, students, trustees, alumni, and Baptist leadership, and were adopted by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in November, 1976. Specific needs to achieve each goal will be developed as the decade moves forward, but certain long-term needs are already apparent: (1) a new auditorium large enough to seat our entire student body, which now must be divided for two separate chapel services; (2) a new building to house classes and activities in health, physical education, recreation, and military science; (3) continued renovation and improvement of Cone-Bottoms Hall (the oldest building on campus), and Moses-Provine Science Center, both of which have had "phase one" improvements during the past two or three years; and (4) an operating reserve adequate to sustain Ouachita's minimum operating needs for a reasonable time in the event of unanticipated financial adversity. Arkansas Baptists can take pardonable pride in the growing strength of Ouachita Baptist University in the cause of Christian education in 1977. As we continue to work together and pray together, we can look forward with even greater pride to the years leading up to Ouachita's Centennial Celebration in 1986.

# SOUTHERN BAPTIST COLLEGE <br> Walnut Ridge, Arkansas

#### Abstract

"Southern Baptist College is a two year, liberal arts co-educational institution sponsored by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and committed to the Christian faith as expressed by that Convention. Since the philosophy of the college emanates from the doctrine of the Christian faith, the college perceives its primary purpose as the search for and the dissemination of truth, of which God is the source. The college purposes to guide the intellectual growth of a student by introducing him to the history and the institutions of man and his universe. As the "Campus of Christian Purpose," Southern Baptist College exists for service to and development of her students."


The foregoing paragraph comprises the introductory paragraph of a Mission Statement for the college developed during the past year by a Special Task Force consisting of members of the administration and faculty and approved by the Board of Trustees. The Mission Statement was produced as a result of a continuing vigilance aimed at re-examining and refining a statement of purpose which will assure that the college will continue to accomplish the goals for which she is chartered and which Arkansas Baptists have a right to expect.

## PROGRESS CONTINUES IN PHYSICAL FACILITIES.

Visitors on the campus of Southern Baptist College consistently comment upon the beauty which the campus is assuming. The new buildings, the trees planted ten to twenty years ago, and the increasing interest in care of buildings and grounds, all combine to make for a most lovely campus setting.

The beautiful new Mabee Student Center was completed and occupied in August, 1977, and is proving to be a popular facility with the students of the college.

Also completed and recently occupied are eight new apartments for married students. These very attractive, two-bedroom, centrally heated and air conditioned, brick-veneer structures will greatly enhance the appearance of the Southside housing area for married students.

In addition to the new facilities mentioned above, the Board of Trustees has authorized construction of a President's Home for Southern Baptist College having, upon Dr. Williams's retirement, made the old President's Home available to Dr. and Mrs. Williams for the remainder of their lives.

At the present time a program of renovation is underway which will improve the appearance of the existing permanent buildings on the campus.

Two of the greatest needs of the college are an Athletic/Recreation Complex and a Convocation Facility for chapel, graduation, lyceum and such activities. Had the college not sustained the loss of the old Student Center, efforts would now be underway for the construction of the Athletic/Recreation Complex. That loss will probably delay the construction of both the Athletic/Recreation Complex and the Convocation Facility for several years.

## THE ENROLLMENT PICTURE WAS MIXED.

Although the on-campus resident enrollment increased last year, the overall enrollment decreased as the result of the termination of the Blytheville Air Base Resident Program in January and a decrease in the number of commuting students. Enrollment at the BAFB Center began decreasing two years ago with the establishment of the Mississippi County Community College and reached a level in January which made continued operation of the Center unfeasible.

The total non-duplicating students for $1976-77$ was 796 compared to 858 for 1975-76, and the non-duplicating on-campus enrollment was 471 . Although the overall enrollment decreased, there is reason to rejoice in the fact that the trend reflected an increase in the number of on-campus resident students. Obviously, the college's most effective work is accomplished with those students who live and study on the campus, who are involved in the total life of the college, and who are more deeply influenced by the campus atmosphere. It is most unfortunate, nonetheless, that annually increased tuition charges have caused many commuter students to drive to state colleges to take advantage of cheaper tuition.

## ACADEMIC CHANGES BENEFIT STUDENTS.

The five new degree programs adopted and reported last year have been received enthusiastically by the students. During the very first year of its existence, four students earned Associate in Arts in Music degrees and fifteen declared themselves as Recreation majors. Among the new courses offered in support of the new programs were: Church Recreation; Campcraft Skills; Recreation Music and Song Leading; Introduction to Journalism; Introduction to Theater Play Production; and a Church Vocation Seminar. A cursory examination of the new courses will reflect their relatedness to the life and work of Arkansas Baptists.

Another development in the academic sector is the effort on the part of the Dean and Registrar to develop agreements with four-year institutions which will facilitate easy transfer to the degree programs of those four institutions. Discussions are presently underway with two Baptist senior colleges, and negotiations with other colleges will be pursued until Southern Baptist College can assure a student of an easy transfer to a senior institution without loss of a single credit whatever his or her intended major.

The Felix Goodson Library added to its collection 2,541 volumesin addition to a wide array of films, filmstrips, tapes, recordings, slides, and transparencies, and government documents. The library now holds a grand total of 42,031 volumes, after weeding and discarding old and obsolete volumes.

In addition to the library's accessions, the Learning/Media Center continues to build strength in the area of audio-visual aids for both teachers and students.

## FISCAL AFFAIRS.

The college finished the 1976-77 year in the black. A favorable cash flow pattern was experienced which assured that the college did not have to borrow from outside sources to meet payroll or to pay off short term or long term debts. Nor has it been necessary to make inter-fund transactions to meet any obligations.

This happy fiscal condition results from Convention support which has increased by over $100 \%$ since 1973, by increased tuition which has increased from $\$ 25.00$ to $\$ 37.50$ since 1973 , and from a growing development program. Increases in all three of these areas have been necessary to keep pace with inflation. For, though tuition has increased from $\$ 25.00$ to $\$ 37.50$ since 1973, income from tuition during 1973 at $\$ 25.00$ per hour amounted to $51 \%$ of the income for general operations; whereas, at $\$ 37.50$ per hour in 1976, it accounted for only $49 \%$ of income for general operations.

As an example of the inflation referred to earlier, the cost of utilities at Southern Baptist College increased by $82 \%$ from 1974 to 1976. The cost of utilities in $1974-75$ was $\$ 32,447.00$ and by $1976-77$ had increased to a projected figure of $\$ 49,300.00$.

It can be seen, therefore, in view of such circumstances that completing the year in the black constitutes an occasion for gratitude and celebration.

## DEVELOPMENT.

In 1975, in the college's report to the Convention, reference was made to the determination of the college to respond to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention's increased support of Southern Baptist College with intensified efforts in the area of development. The then new Development Program set out to complement the increased support of the Convention with college generated development revenues.

The effort which was pledged has been made and with gratifying results, as the development income of the college contimues to grow. An essential part of that growth was the "Sacrifice Begins on Campus" campaign conducted during October, 1976 when the administration, faculty, and staff pledged in excess of $\$ 10,000$ in contributions for that year. It should be reassuring to Arkansas Baptists and others who support the ministry of Southern Baptist College to realize that those who work for the institution believe this strongly in its work.

During the first eleven months of this academic year, \$257,339.52 came through the Development Office to support the construction of the new student center and general operations. That amount came from 396 individuals, churches, foundations, and businesses. One hundred and five of those 396 donors gave last year for the first time ever. Thus, the base of support is broadening and the development income increases year by year.

Southern Baptist College continues faithfully to fulfill that work dictated by her charter and her motto - "The Campus of Christian Purpose." Lives of young men and women are still being touched day by day by the salutary influence of this campus. Each year young people come to know the Lord Jesus Christ as Savior, enter into a deeper fellowship with Him, and consecrate their lives to His service, while receiving a sound, quality, liberal arts college education.

The college continues in its appreciation for the support of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, the churches of Arkansas, and the leadership in our denomination for their confidence in and support of the good work of this institution.

# BAPTIST MEMORIAL HOSPITAL <br> Memphis, Tennessee

During 1976 Baptist Memorial Hospital continued to provide a complete program of medical care to the population of Memphis and the Mid-South. Some of the more noteworthy developments during the year include:

A neurological disease unit was established at the Lamar Rehabilitation Unit with Dr. Charles Cape as medical director.
A new 20-bed Coronary Intensive Care Unit was opened with cardiac monitoring available in each room.

Approval was received from the Tennessee Health Commission for the acquisition of a "whole body" X-ray scanner. This device transfers X-ray beam information to a computer which in turn makes possible an image which can be photographed. This new generation of radiology equipment opens up an entire new vista of diagnostic capability.

Construction was begun on the remodeling of a 25 -bed general patient unit that was originally opened in 1955.

Work was started on the development of a new 36 -unit outpatient hemodialysis unit to be located on the 5th floor of the Lamar Rehabilitation Unit. When completed this will be the second largest hospital-based outpatient dialysis unit in the country.

On August 11, 1976 a contract was signed with Huber, Hunt, \& Nichols, Inc. of Indianapolis, Indiana in the amount of $\$ 26,611,000$ to construct a 400 -bed satellite hospital in the heavily populated eastern suburb area of Memphis. The new hospital is designed to replace some older beds in the Medical Center unit and to make hospital facilities more convenient to many of the patients that depend on Baptist Memorial Hospital.
Elected as president of the Medical Staff was Dr. John Nash, a general surgeon, and appointed as chief of staff was Dr. J. D. Upshaw, specialist in internal medicine.

Dentists and oral surgeons were approved for full Medical Staff membership. This change permits dentists and oral surgeons to admit patients to the hospital and establish their own staff department.
Sixty-seven students graduated from the School of Nursing with $85 \%$ of the graduates electing to work at the hospital.

Service awards were conducted and 274 employees received recognition pins for employment anniversaries of $10,15,20,25,30$, and 35 years.

The hospital received full accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals as a result of a three-day survey conducted in December 1975. Conducting the intensive survey was a physician, a nurse and a hospital administrator.

The hospital employee publication Baptiscope received an award for excellence from the Tennessee Society for Hospital Public Relations.

According to the most recent statistics published by the American Hospital Association, Baptist Memorial Hospital has the highest average inpatient census of any hospital in the country as well as the lowest cost per patient day of a!l hospitals averaging 1,000 or more patients per day.

Alvin Huffman, Jr., executive vice president of the Southern Baptist Radio and TV Commission, was elected chairman of the Board of Trustees. Mr. Huffman was first elected to the hospital's Board of Trustees in 1948 and served as chairman of the Board's Executive Committee for the year prior to his election as chairman of the Board.

The Department of Religion continued to minister to the patients,employees and Medical Staff on a 24 -hour basis. Two student chaplains completed their training during the year and two new student chaplains began the clinical portion of their training.

Baptist Memorial Hospital was fortunate to have a number of denominational leaders participate in programs throughout the year. These individuals included: Dr. Charles H. Ashcraft, executive secretary, Arkansas Baptist State Convention; Dr. R. Wilbur Herring, president, Arkansas Baptist State Convention; Dr. Ralph E. Norton, executive secretary-treasurer, Tennessee Baptist Convention; Rev. Carroll Owen, president, Tennessee Baptist Convention; and Dr. James Richardson, president, Mississippi BaptistConvention.

The "Good News Bible" is here! In the fall of our Bicentennial year, the American Bible Society completed and published the "Good News Bible" in Today's English Version. This is the culmination of years of precise, painstaking translation work. It makes available for the first time, a faithful translation of the sacred text in a style of language readily understood by most people.

It was in November, 1961 when the Reverend M. Wendell Belew wrote to Dr. Eugene A Nida indicating a need for Scriptures "translated for the fourth grade level." A month later the project was underway under the direction of Dr. Robert G. Bratcher, a Southern Baptist. The New Testament was published in 1966. Acceptance of this common language translation was widespread and immediate. However, nowhere was there more enthusiastic reception than from Southern Baptists. The General Baptist Convention of Texas immediately made plans to distribute over one million copies. Such reaction made the translation of the whole Bible imperative and led to the publication of the "Good News Bible" in December, 1976.

The purpose of the American Bible Society has remained unchanged throughout the years - the translation, publication, and distribution of Scriptures without doctrinal note or comment and without profit. Since 1816 the American Bible Society has been making God's Word available to spiritually hungry people everywhere. At least one book of the Bible has been translated into more than 1,600 languages as of December 31, 1976.

Here are a few highlights of what the American Bible Society and its partners did in 1976 to meet the challenge.

## GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS - THREE YEARS AND STILL GOING STRONG

Just over three years ago, GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS was launched in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. The goal of the Bible Societies was to provide Scripture Portions and Selections on graded levels for new readers in 100 languages. By the end of 1976 work had been undertaken in 286 languages. Not only are these Selections available in languages like English, Spanish, French and Portugese, but you can also find them in Dangme, Isizulu, Punjabi and Jacalteco. In Africa alone, there are 79 GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS projects.

In 1976 the American Bible Society released a new filmstrip entitled "Lives Filled With His Love." Shot on location in Brazil, Bolivia, Guatemala and Mexico, this color filmstrip shows the progress the GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS program is making in the lives of new readers in South America and around the world. The 611 bookings in 1976 made this one of the most popular of all the American Bible Society filmstrips.

## TRANSLATION AND PUBLICATION UPDATE, 1976

A major item in the budget of the American Bible Society is translation of the Scriptures. At present, the Bible Societies are giving help directly and indirectly in 560 languages. Fifty-two of these translation projects are in Europe.

Three major projects completed were the "Good News Bible" in Today's English Version, the "Millenial Bible" in Polish, and the common language New Testament in Today's Chinese Version.

## AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY ACTIVITIES - U.S.A.

Scripture Distribution - Scripture distribution in the United States during 1976 reached a total of $114,769,046$ copies, an increase of $5,229,265$ over 1975. One million copies of the "Good News Bible" were circulated in the month of December alone, one month after publication.

Scripture Imprints - In 1976 the American Bible Society produced $15,227,850$ Scripture imprints, of which $4,636,000$ were requested by various Southern Baptist organizations.

## BIBLE SOCIETY ACTIVITIES ABROAD

The American Bible Society contributed $\$ 5,649,892$ to the United Bible Societies World Service Budget in 1976, thus giving crucial support to the Bible cause throughout the world. This made it possible for more than $330,000,000$ Scriptures to be distributed by member societies of the United Bible Societies - a new record.

Here are just a few of the ways the American Bible Society is assisting the missionary activities of the Southern Baptist Convention:

Brazil - The GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS Scripture Literacy Selections are widely used by MOBRAL, Brazil's literacy organization, with the newly literate. They are now available in two languages, Kaingang and Portugese. Translation into Makuchi, Ninam, and Sanuma is now underway. Distribution of these Selections more than doubled in the last year from 479,372 in 1975 to 999,304 in 1976.

Indonesia - Two training seminars were held for the New Reader Program in Central and Eastern Java. There were 700 teachers in attendance at the seminar in Central Java representing Catholic, Protestant, and government schools. 100,000 children were involved in these programs. Each child was able to read 55 different Bible Selections over a period of a few weeks. These training seminars were regarded as highly successful, and many of the teachers became very enthusiastic about the program.

Eastern European Update - In spite of unique and difficult obstacles, the Bible cause in Eastern Europe is advancing. At present there are 12 translation projects underway in these countries. In the last decade, over five million Scriptures, most of them complete Bibles or New Testaments, have been distributed throughout Eastern European countries. Recently, German speaking Baptists received 3,000 German language Bibles from the United Bible Societies.

Europe - The European Baptist Federation has proclaimed 1977 as the "Year of the Bible" for Baptist Churches in Europe by asking its members to emphasize Bible Reading in their churches throughout the year. Europe's Bible Societies are ready to assist Baptist churches in distributing the Bible during this special year.

## HOW CAN THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION HELP PROMOTE THE BIBLE CAUSE?

Financial support - The American Bible Society thanks the Southern Baptist Convention for its support in 1976. The ABS budget for 1976 was $\$ 13,625,000$ which is the largest ever in its history, representing an increase of \$675,000 over 1975.

Income from the churches was also greater than the previous years. A total of $\$ 1,739,195$ was received, of which $\$ 275,631$ came from the Southern Baptist Convention.

Contributions from the Southern Baptist Convention since 1965 have been as follows:

This report shows a steady level of support from the Southern Baptist Convention. An increase is needed in this time when inflation is driving up the costs and demands for Scriptures are rising. If the 9,300,000 resident members of the Southern Baptist Convention were to raise their level of annual support to $\$ .05$ per member, total giving would reach $\$ 468,100$ per year. This modest amount per member is really needed in order to help make certain that the Bible Society will have the Scriptures needed by the Southern Baptist Convention for its ministries around the world.

The Bible Society asks for your continued prayers that, together with the Southern Baptist Convention and all willing Christians, we will be blessed by God in our combined efforts to bring His Word to all those who are in desperate need of it.

Dr. Darold H. Morgan, Annuity Board president, describes the present as a "pivotal time" in the ministry of the Board. The reason is clear.

On January 1, 1978, the Annuity Board officially launches the new Southern Baptist Retirement Program.

Approved by all state conventions, the new plan is especially designed for career ministerial personnel serving churches throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. It is expected to become "the standard" for ministers all over the denomination.

The new retirement program represents only one example of progress in planning being made by the Board, as it fulfills its purpose of administering insurance and retirement programs for Southern Baptist churches and agencies.

Besides career ministerial personnel, the Board also has plans for salaried church lay personnel, as well as employees of Southern Baptist hospitals, colleges and universities, seminaries, homes for children and the aged, and many other institutions.

Through the Board's programs, Southern Baptist state conventions provide more than $\$ 4$ million in Cooperative Program funds to undergird retirement plans for ministers.

In the first six months of 1977, the Annuity Board operated on solid footing financially. Funds held in trust (assets) reached a record \$484,182,027.

Premiums and dues income amounted to a record $\$ 20,532,025$ through the first six months of 1977 . The Board has distributed $\$ 8,935,058$ to 12,511 annuitants through June of this year.

A total of 21,236 churches and associations are participating currently with 28,693 employees in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program. In this state convention, the number of new members enrolled in the Family Benefit Section (Plan A) during the first six months of 1977 is 44 . The following Baptist agencies participate in the retirement program.

In accord with the constitution and stated purpose of the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs, primary attention was given during 1976 to the program of government relations, which involves the representation of Baptist concerns to governments (federal and state) and to non-Baptist groups for influence in public affairs on matters affecting public policy. Considerable attention was given to maintaining, broadening, and strengthening this agency's contacts with the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of government. Frequent opportunity was also found to communicate Baptist concerns in public affairs to various religious offices and organizations, the mass media, and other non-governmental organizations.

The Baptist Joint Committee "Resolution on Religion and Public Policy," along with action of the Committee "that no member of the staff register as a lobbyist or provide financial information under any new law to be enacted hereafter" as well as its action on possible causes of IRS abuse of discretion affecting religious organizations or clergy were forwarded to the IRS, the Secretary of the Treasury, and appropriate Senate and House committees.

Personal contacts were maintained and relations strengthened with the U.S. State Department and the United Nations for giving greater focus to religious liberty and human rights in international relations.

Throughout the year numerous services were provided by the staff to Baptist pastors, agencies, churches, associations, state conventions, and denominational leaders. The agency continued to provide research services, news services, and a variety of public affairs services to Baptists on a regular and sustained basis. The staff participated in various Baptist conferences and consultations throughout the year. The staff participated in state convention-sponsored programs in Alabama, Arkansas, Maryland, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Virginia.

Particular attention was given by the staff to communication through various publications. These have included the monthly staff periodical, Report from the Capital, and numerous feature articles for a variety of publications.

In January 1976 the Baptist Joint Committee coordinated and sponsored "A National Bicentennial Convocation." All eight U.S.A. Baptist bodies of the Baptist Joint Committee were well represented among the participants of this historic gathering of Baptists of America. One permanent contribution of the Convocation was the publication of a ma jor volume on Baptists under the title of the Convocation's theme:Baptists and the American Experience (Valley Forge: Judson Press, 1976.)

Among the organizations in which the staff participated this past year on behalf of the Baptist Joint Committee were: the National Council on Religion and Public Education; the NCC International Affairs Work Group on Human Rights; the National Coalition on Public Education and Religious Liberty; the Baptist World Alliance Commission on Freedom, Justice and Peace; the Washington Council of UN Representatives; the Policy Committee of Project FORWARD '76; the NCC Ecumenical Task Force on the Bicentennial; and the National Bicentennial Conference on Religious Liberty.

# CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION <br> Southern Baptist Convention Nashville, Tennessee

Christian concern about the moral issues of our day has continued to mount in the past year. The moral problems plaguing contemporary society are increasingly grave. Immorality on television has continued to be a particularly sore spot which numerous groups have organized to fight against. The gambling industry has made steady inroads in many states and threatens in still others. Alcohol abuse worsens year by year. Capital punishment once again has become an important issue in 1977 with the occurrence of the first American execution in a decade. Race relations is a concern that languishes in a state of benign neglect. Hunger and poverty continue to take their toll on millions. Other serious moral problems, from the energy crisis to nuclear proliferation, confuse and endanger us. They must not be allowed to immobilize us. The mounting Christian concern of our day must be marshalled to combat this advancing immorality, for only in Christ is hope to be found.

The Christian Life Commission has been active this year in an effort to help Christians apply the gospel. Through holding conferences, distributing literature, making speeches, and preaching sermons, the Commission and its staff have sought to aid Baptists in becoming aware of and acting to solve the moral problems of our day.

A major thrust has been undertaken in the area of television morality. Early in 1977 members of the Christian Life Commission staff traveled to four cities across the nation and listened to what Baptists had to say about current television programing. The level of concern was even higher than expected. The Christian Life Commission also enlisted the aid of church members in four other areas to monitor network programs for their moral content. The information from this research has now been used to prepare a packet entitled "Help for Television Viewers." This packet has been distributed to Southern Baptist churches and a wave of concerned actions has resulted. In addition, information gathered in the Commission's research is being shared with responsible of ficials of the television networks and the government. Continued involvement by all Southern Baptists is greatly needed.

In other activities as well, the Christian Life Commission sought to further the cause of Christian morality. This year's national seminar was held in Jackson, Mississippi, and dealt with setting moral priorities in the Christian life. A specialized conference in Nashville sought to help pastors and physicians come to grips with the awesome moral problems now emerging in the field of medical science. Also, a number of regional conferences held in various locations aimed at helping pastors and church leaders in the important task of "Applying the Gospel." Race Relations Sunday and Christian Citizenship Sunday were observed in many churches across our land; and the Christian Life Commission provided literature, posters, and other materials to support these observances.

The response of the Baptist churches to these and other efforts related to applied Christianity has been gratifying. The Christian Life Commission recognizes that only vigorously involved, changed people can change the world for Christ's sake. By God's grace, the Christian Life Commission will continue to help in this vital task.

## EDUCATION COMMISSION

## INTRODUCTION

National Colloquium. - The highlight of this year was the National Colloquium in Williamsburg, Virginia, that drew more than 800 registrants and counting visitors, more than 900. Every Southern Baptist institution was represented: seminaries, universities, colleges, Bible schools, and academies. Participants came from as far away as Hong Kong, Hawaii, and England. Reaffirmations of the theological and biblical presuppositions of Christian education were adopted unanimously by our schools and are now being used by state conventions and individual educational institutions as guidelines in the reaffirmation of Christian purpose.

McGrath Study. - As a direct result of the National Colloquium, the Program in Liberal Studies of the University of Arizona which is supported by the Lilly Foundation, made an unsolicited grant of $\$ 100,000$ to assist Southern Baptist colleges and schools to engage in a self-study which will have as a central concern Christian purpose and values.

Teacher Placement. - A new and vigorous search for and recruitment of qualified Baptist teachers has resulted in a rapid increase with a number of qualified school personnel who have placed their names in our files. This year has broken all previous records in the number of teachers and administrators placed and in the recruitment of additional qualified personnel.

Trustee Orientation. - Calls for assistance in trustee orientation both from individual institutions and Baptist state conventions increased greatly during this past year. The Commission is also receiving specialized requests for information, particularly in the area of the legal responsibilities of trusteeship. The fourth edition of the trustee manual is also in progress.

Student Recruitment. - The overall enrollment of Southern Baptist colleges and schools this year has increased slightly; however, nationally, student enrollment is generally down. Admissions officers and institutional presidents agree that promoting the observance of Southern Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day, holding the annual student recruitment workshop, utilizing the vast resources of the Baptist Sunday School Board and the Home Mission Board, and offering counseling services to the individual institutions have played a major part in stabilizing and maintaining enrollment.

Admissions Workshop. - The fifth annual admissions workshop for Baptist school recruitment personnel was held in conjunction with the National Colloquium. By meeting with the larger group, the admissions personnel will be able to relate admissions policies to a new understanding of the purpose of a Christian college as developed in the Colloquium.

These are some of the highlights but do not include the staff work which is carried on a year-round basis for the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools, and additional staff work for the following: the administration and disbursement in accounting for all convention funds of the American Baptist Theological Seminary; the Opdyke Fund and the Farmer-Robertson scholarship programs. Staff participated in National Student Ministries Dialogue, the Bicentennial National Convocation sponsored by the Baptist Joint Committee, the national meeting of Baptist student directors and other conferences. This also does not include a wide range of service programs to state secretaries, state conventions, associations, and individual Baptist schools.

Institutional Changes. - Howard C. Bennett retired as president of East Texas Baptist College; Jerry F. Dawson assumed the presidency. Craven Edward Williams was elected president at Gardner-Webb College succeeding E. Eugene Poston who had resigned. Elwin L. Skiles, president of Hardin-Simmons University, announced his retirement for June, 1977. Robert S. Sutherland was elected president of Missouri Baptist College, having served as acting president since August, 1974. William G. Tanner, president of Oklahoma Baptist University, was elected executive director-treasurer of the Home Mission Board. William E. Neptune was named interim president. John E. Johns, Stetson University president, was elected to the presidency of Furman University succeeding Gordon W. Blackwell who retired. George R. Borders was named chief administrative officer at Stetson University. Harold K. Graves, president of Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary, will retire July 31. Robert E. Naylor, president of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, announced his retirement effective August, 1978. James E. Southerland, president of Baptist Bible Institute, announced his retirement for June, 1977. H. B. Ram-
sour, Jr., retired as president of Mexican Baptist Bible Institute and Daniel R. Rivera was elected to the presidency. Woodson Armes, secretary, Christian Education Commission of Texas, has announced his retirement for 1977.

Support. - During the past year the state conventions and Southern Baptist Convention gave the schools $\$ 35,684,079$ for operations and capital needs for an increase of $\$ 4,455,690$. In addition to the support for operations and capital needs, the Georgia schools received $\$ 569,213$ for addition to their endowment funds. Donations, gifts, and grants increased by $\$ 4,925,720$, amounting to $\$ 37,571,526$. Endowment funds amounted to $\$ 342,212,143$; property was valued at $\$ 715,976,861$, making total assets of $\$ 1,058,289,004$. This is an increase of $\$ 72,638,726$ from last year.

Church Vocation Volunteers. - Church vocation volunteers increased to 21,091 for $1976-1977$, or a 9.75 percent increase.

## PROGRAM REPORT

## The Program of Christian Education, Leadership, and Coordination

Program Accomplishments, 1975-76:

1. Completed plans for and conducted the National Colloquium on Christian Education - over 800 registrants. Began implementing program follow-up:
(1) Developed materials for faculty workshops, SBC periodicals, state Baptist papers, and other news media, etc.
(2) Published special editions of The Southern Baptist Educator presenting resource material for schools, conventions, associations, and churches.
(3) Developed plans for Colloquium follow-up including seminars, regional Colloquium-type meetings, a handbook on Baptist colleges and schools, and a study course book that might be used by various organizations within the local church for understanding the role of Christian higher education.
2. Worked with Vocational Guidance Section of the Baptist Sunday School Board in a general recruitment and training program of the vocational Christian worker.
3. Developed plans for a new program with the Home Mission Board in relation to the recruitment of ethnics.
4. Coordinated the development of a new mission strategy and emphasis by Baptist schools.
(1) Continued preparation for National Missions Conference for Southern Baptist educators.
(2) Developed pilot models on several campuses.
(3) Continued to develop correlation and communication of the programs of boards and programs of schools, particularly at the points of common interests.
5. Continued to work with college directors of extension regarding adult education and continuing education.
6. Continued to work with the Home Mission Board in developing inservice training programs on Baptist college campuses.
7. Continued to work with National Student Ministries of the Baptist Sunday School Board in developing more effective programs on Baptist college campuses.
8. Served as liaison with national educational organizations: American Association of Colleges, Association of Governing Board, Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges, National Council of Independent Colleges, American College Public Relations Association, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, House Ways and Means Committee.
9. Met with other national leaders of Christian higher education for a conference on the role of church-related colleges in American education.
10. Assisted in the formation of N.A.I.C.U. (National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities).
11. Assisted prospective students, parents, and church leaders in supplying information regarding our Baptist schools (e.g. locations, subjects offered, accreditation, etc.).
12. Published with Baptist Sunday School Board, Faith and Higher Education, by Grady Cothen.

## The Program of College Studies and Services

Program Accomplishments, 1975-76:

1. Developed models for implementing new mission strategies in cooperation with the Foreign Mission Board and the Home Mission Board.
2. Conducted faculty workshops.
3. Continued to assist Baptist colleges and schools in maintaining their accreditation by offering special helps prior to and following self-studies required by the regional accrediting agencies.
4. Continued to send teams of special consultants of Southern Baptist college educators to Baptist college campuses when institutions needed and requested help on accreditation.
5. Began a series of special editions of The Southern Baptist Educator, publishing major Colloquium papers, studies, and other materials to support Colloquium follow-up.
6. Conducted surveys: course offerings in Baptist colleges, comparative percentage distribution of Cooperative Program funds to Baptist schools of total funds contributed and also of Cooperative Program funds kept within the state.
7. Attended and provided assistance for ABTS Commission meetings, ABTS Executive Committee meetings, ABTS Holding Board meetings, and ABTS Board of Trustees meetings.
8. Continued to give direct assistance to schools in management, curriculum development, denominational relations, public relations, student recruitment, development, and alumni organization.
9. Administered scholarship-loan programs: the Opdyke Fund, the Farmer-Robertson scholarship program.
10. Conducted fifth annual workshop for state education committee/ commission chairmen.
11. Conducted trustee orientation workshops and provided special literature for trustee orientation.

The Program of Teacher-Personnel Placement Service
Program Accomplishments, 1975-76:

1. Completed a study of the recruitment program and developed new plans of action for recruiting and placing competent Baptist faculty members.
2. Reorganized records system and files for a more efficient operation and to meet government requirements and guidelines.
3. Developed a more intensive search for qualified Baptist administrative personnel.
4. Placed a greater emphasis on the in-service training program for furloughing missionaries and explored possibilities for new types of on-the-field assistance from Baptist educational institutions.
5. Continued to cooperate with the Foreign Mission Board in recruitment of teachers on sabbaticals in Baptist colleges for overseas assignments.
6. Made visits to selected campuses more fruitful by involving local pastors and laypersons in preliminary contacts.
7. Record-breaking year in placing Baptist teachers and administrative personnel in Baptist colleges and seminaries.
8. Continued to assist Foreign Mission Board in faculty recruitment for overseas service.

## The Program of Student Recruitment <br> Program Accomplishments, 1975-76:

1. Held fifth annual Admissions workshop in connection with National Colloquium to broaden base for student recruitment.
2. Assisted schools in securing names of church-related vocational volunteers.
3. Produced special materials on Christian education and Baptist schools for assemblies, conferences, workshops, conventions, and churches.
4. Developed new methods of recruiting in churches as determined in state education committee meeting.
5. Planned a consultation with selected state editors regarding Colloquium publications and further development of statements of purpose and programs for Baptist schools in the follow-up.
6. Published, by request, a new edition of Southern Baptist Campus Directory for use by pastors, librarians, youth leaders, school guidance counselors, denominational workers, and others.
7. Prepared materials for use in Southern Baptist publications.
8. Continued to furnish church libraries materials on Christian education and Baptist schools.
9. Improved utilization of Baptist state papers as a channel for communicating news and information about Christian education to churches.

## The Program of Convention Relations <br> Program Accomplishments, 1975-76:

1. Conducted National Colloquium with more than 900 selected pastors, associational missionaries, state convention representatives, and Baptist school leadership in attendance.
2. Planned and promoted Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day emphasis.
(1) Prepared and distributed materials for promoting and supporting Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day in the churches February 15, 1976.
(2) Assisted and encouraged state conventions and school leaders in their support of Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day.
3. Prepared promotional and informational materials.
(1) Prepared and distributed materials showing the purpose, programs, and benefits of Baptist schools (Christian education).
(2) Assisted schools in their development and improvement of promotional and informational materials.
4. Conducted annual workshopforchairmen of state education committees /commissions.
(1) Assisted the chairman in securing counsel and assistance for the meetings of the state education committee in each state convention.
(2) Evaluated and improved materials and methods used in promoting and supporting Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day.
(3) Began a study of the state convention's role in providing, evaluating, and upgrading trustee orientation.
(4) Began a review of denominational relations and ways of improving relations of schools with churches, associations, and state conventions.
5. Prepared statistical tables for the SBC Annual of all Southern Baptist colleges and schools.
6. Continued follow-through with previous adopted goals of The Southern Baptist Educator which included developing a clearer understanding of the work of our denomination by Baptist school faculties, administrators, and trustees.
7. Enlisted pastors, state convention leadership, Baptist school representatives, and SBC agencies in support of the National Colloquium.
8. Gave special assistance to state executive secretaries, state education committees, SBC agencies, and individual colleges and schools on request.
9. Continued to work with the Denominational Relations Committee of the Commission with special emphasis on better communications with Baptist pastors and denominational leaders.
10. Worked with committees with the Education Commission membership to study present and future goals and programs.
11. Prepared statistical summaries for annual report to Convention including enrollment, number of ministerial students, home and foreign mission volunteers, church music and minister of education volunteers, and number of other church-related volunteers, endowment, property value, etc.
12. Served as director for United College Board (black colleges).

## MISSIONARY SUPPORT

The sending out and maintaining of missionaries is primary in Southern Baptist overseas missions through the channel of the Foreign Mission Board. The 268 reinforcements for the missionary staff in 1976 resulted in a net missionary personnel gain of 48 for the year.

Three missionaries, Martha Pippin(Argentina), Dallas Bateman (East Africa), and Ernelle Brooks (Nigeria), died in active service in 1976. Nine missionaries came to normalretirement, and one was placed on medical disability retirement.

Besides the entering of new fields and some temporary locations and reassignments due to crisis situations, Southern Baptist missionaries expanded their efforts in 1976 in several lands already entered, opening at least twelve new stations of missionary residence.

Increase in missionary personnel automatically means the Foreign Mission Board assumes responsibility for support of the new missionaries (including travel to the field, language study, medical expenses, means of transportation on the field, housing). This responsibility, along with spiraling inflation, lays an increasingly heavy budget demand on the Foreign Mission Board. The proportion of the Board's total expenditures allocated to the operating budget for the program of missionary support has increased from approximately 35 percent a little more than a decade ago to more than 60 percent today. The Board has continued to give special attention to the strengthening of support for missionaries through interim adjustments in furlough cost-of-living supplement and housing allowances along with normal adjustments in field supplements and fringe benef its.

Although the rate of inflation in the United States moderated in 1976, and the value of the American dollar improved in relation to some currencies, inflation continued at a very high rate in many places. The currencies of several European countries and Japan gained strength in relation to the dollar. Thus there were continuing strong pressures on the funds available for support of missionaries.

## EVANGELISM AND CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

Evangelism and church development are central to the objectives of Total Missions Thrust. Missions is concerned with making disciples, maturing disciples in the fellowship of local churches, and developing churches into a cooperative effort for continued outreach. These developments, though stimulated by the Foreign Mission Board and its missionaries, are not extensions of, but rather stand in fraternal relationship with, the Southern Baptist Convention. Work and accomplishments are largely those of national churches, leaders, and conventions, with the assistance of missionary co-workers and resources from Southern Baptists.

In 1976 the efforts of the Baptist churches with which the Foreign Mission Board has cooperative relationships resulted in growth from 7,584 churches with 896,063 members to 8,017 churches with 906,542 members. Field reports indicated a total of 84,449 baptisms.

Outreach to new areas included expansion into the interior of Benin, projection of work in a new region of Ethiopia, and a beginning of ministry in tribal areas of South West Africa. Work among Cambodian ref ugees in Thailand continued to show unusual response. A special evangelism project with Giryama tribe in eastern Kenya also was exceptionally effective. Near the end of the year, arrangements for ministries to Eastern Europe were restructured; this would especially strengthen cooperative work with Baptists of Yugoslavia.

Significant special evangelistic campaigns were conducted in many lands (including Honduras, Panama, Bahamas, Grenada, Guyana, Venezuela, Peru, Paraguay, Brazil, Liberia, Upper Volta, Ghana, Tanzania, Belgium, Gaza, the Philippines, and Korea). In some cases, teams of evangelists and lay witnesses from the United States participated. In other cases, persons from neighboring countries or local evangelists provided leadership. In addition, Southern Baptist missionaries were deeply involved in preparation for Billy Graham Evangelistic Association campaigns in the Philippines and Mexico.

The plan for major city evangelism in the years ahead was already well along in a pilot project in South Brazil and was at various stages of consideration or planning in the Philippines, Hong Kong, Korea, Argentina, Germany, and other places.

A strategy for continuing evangelization in concentrated urban settings was being developed under the guidance of an urban evangelism specialist in Singapore, Bangkok, and Jakarta.

English-language church work was projected at two new places in Iran, and a congregation was begun also in Sanaa, Yemen.

The program of evangelism and church development includes a wide variety of activities and emphases, among them radio and television, religious education promotion, lay leadership training, stewardship, camps and conferences, women's work, men's work, youth work, music, and the like.

Progress in broadcasting was especially noteworthy. The annual workshop for furloughing missionaries with responsibilities in broadcasting was conducted again at the offices of the Radio and Television Commission, Fort Worth, Texas. Early in 1976 the Board's regional mass media representatives held a special workshop. There plans were developed for broadcasting approaches and projects to implement the Board's long-range objective.

A mass media consultation was held in 1976 in Jap an, and three workshops were conducted for broadcasting workers in West Africa. Communication centers or broadcasting studios were in various states of development in Upper Volta, Ghana, Uruguay, Paraguay, Brazil, Venezuela, Guadeloupe, and Mexico.

In other developments, a missionary coordinator assumed responsibility for broadcasting plans for the French-language countries of Africa; a weekly Baptist radio program went on the air in Senegal; broadcasting was begun to four countries of Southern Africa over international facilities in Swaziland; and Bengali-language broadcasts were projected from Sri Lanka.

More than 30 missionaries have broadcasting work as a major assignment. Latest available reports show a total of 28,539 radio broadcasts and 1,668 television broadcasts in 42 different countries in 1976.

Bible Correspondence Courses have been used in broadcasting followup on many fields. Reports for 1976 included 11,600 persons enrolled in such courses in Brazil and almost 8,000 in Venezuela. In the Philippines regional Bible correspondence rallies were used as a further step in followup.

Lay training programs, especially those using the WIN materials in lay evangelism, continued in a prominent role, with special WIN schools reported from the Bahamas, Guyana, and Brazil. A nationwide lay training conference was held in Korea. Special lay leadership courses were conducted in Grenada.

Much of the most significant progress in evangelism and church development is the maturing of national Baptist bodies and the working out of relationships between such bodies and mission organizations. Such developments were unusually numerous in 1976. New Baptist associations were organized in Costa Rica, Venezuela, Brazil, Uruguay, Benin, and India. In India the Baptist Union, involving all Baptist groups in the nation, met for the first time in ten years. A national Baptist convention was organized in Thailand. The Baptist Union of Italy elected a secretary of evangelism, and home mission boards were reported in Austria and Portugal. New foreign mission outreach was reported with the implementing of plans for Argentine missionaries to Peru and for Brazilian missionaries to Uruguay.

Next to the program of missionary support, the program of evangelism and church development has the largest financial requirements, both for current operating expenses and for capital needs. These needs are land, buildings, and equipment for churches, chapels, and other purposes related to the program.

## SCHOOLS AND STUDENT WORK

The training of national leaders is a prerequisite to strongindigenous churches. In some lands where general educational opportunity has not been readily available, missionaries and loyal Baptists have developed extensive school systems. In other fields schools have developed to supplement available national education. These general educational institutions under Baptist auspices in various lands may include all levels from kindergarten through university. In addition to their leadership training values, they are of ten highly effective instruments of evangelism as well.

In many lands, particularly at the upper educational levels, Baptists have not undertaken to develop their own schools but project student-center ministries, both for their evangelistic and their leadership enlistment values.

The training of pastors and other church leaders through theological schools is of special importance. Such schools are of varying grades - from Bible institutes to full seminaries of fering graduate degrees. Southern Baptists join with local Baptist bodies in the sponsoring of 71 theological schools around the world, plus 6 women's training schools.

Among developments in 1976 were the opening of a seminary in Liberia and installation of an Argentine national as president of the international seminary at Buenos Aires.

Theological Education by Extension was begun in Malawi in 1976. The extension program in Ecuador was reorganized. Those in Venezuela and North Brazil flourished.

Provision for the training of ministers includes important programs at academic levels below the full seminary level. The Togo Pastor's School is being developed into a school of theology for all of French-speaking West Africa. A new theological academy has been opened in Indonesia, and Costa Rica institute was reopened.

General educational work at elementary and secondary levels encounters increasing government competition and financial pressures. The secondary section of the Girls' School at Ajloun, Jordan, has been closed. However, facilities at the Nazareth School in Israel have been expanded.

Continued progress was reported in student ministries. A student center building was completed at Bangalore, India. New student centers were opened at Guadalajara, Mexico, and in Benin. A full-time student program was under way at the University in Ghana.

## PUBLICATIONS

Adequate supplies of all kinds of Christian literature are needed for the developing of vigorous churches; therefore, publication ministries are an integral part of Southern Baptist overseas missions. There are formal publishing centers in 20 lands and informal literature production programs in a number of other lands.

In 1976 the publishing work at the Philippines Baptist Center was reorganized. A new building was under construction for the Publishing Board in Brazil.New bookstores or book deposits were reported from Taiwan, Nicaragua, and Brazil. Negotiations were taking place for the purchase of an evangelical bookstore at Fez, Morocco.

Other new developments in publishing ministries included the first production of the full Bible by the Baptist Spanish Publishing House; progress on a new Spanish hymnal; a hymn book for Rhodesia, WIN, Theological Education by Extension, and stewardship materials in French for West Africa; and expanded correspondence courses for Venezuela, Botswana, and India. An overwhelming response to correspondence work was reported from Ethiopia.

## HOSPITALS AND MEDICAL CARE

Baptist medical work serves the physical needs of thousands of people who would otherwise be neglected and of ten opens strategic doors for evangelism. In medical ministries, the most significant event of the year was the transfer of responsibility for the Baptist Hospital in Guadalajara, Mexico to the National Baptist Convention of Mexico.

A residency program was reestablished at the hospital in Paraguay. New clinics were opened in Bangladesh, Ethiopia, and India. Visiting physicians from the United States manned the Bangladesh clinic. Visiting medical and dental teams continued occasional ministries in Grenada, Dominica, and Guyana. Mobile clinic ministries were renewed in Paraguay and Korea. Additions to hospital buildings were reported during 1976 in India, Korea, Paraguay and Nigeria.

## BENEVOLENT MINISTRIES

Social service ministries are closely related in motivation and results to medical work. Such ministries include agricultural programs, goodwill and community centers, orphan homes, and direct relief.

Direct relief work is not handled as a budget item, but allocations are made for emergency and recurring relief needs mainly from relief funds available as contributions by Southern Baptists for such purposes. Increasing awareness of the growing world hunger problem on the part of Southern Baptists and response to special disasters led to greatly increased relief contributions in 1975 and 1976. In 1976 the total amount received in relief funds by the Foreign Mission Board was $\$ 1,646,130$. Disbursements totalling $\$ 1,626,295$ were used in 34 countries.

Relief ministries continued on a large scale. The largest disaster response during the year was to the earthquake in Guatemala. Major ongoing relief efforts centered in Bangladesh. And there were significant relief projects in many other lands: with refugees from Angola, Mozambique, and Lebanon; following the earthquake and tidal wave in the Philippines and the hurricane in Mexico; in flooding in North Brazil, Zambia, Korea, and Mexico; in the wake of earthquakes in Turkey, Indonesia, and Ecuador; and through a major hunger project in North Brazil.

Other developments reported in connection with benevolent ministries include: land secured and put into production in agriculture work in Venezuela; nutrition courses in Ecuador; literacy programs in Ghana and Ecuador; and the digging of wells in Senegal, Upper Volta, Malawi, and Rhodesia.

All the foreign missions activities reported in the previous paragraphs indicate progress already being made toward the bold objectives of Total Missions Thrust.

With God's blessings and help, and by the committed wills, lives, and action of all Southern Baptists, these new thrusts in foreign missions can become realities in our lifetime.

# HISTORICAL COMMISSION 

Southern Baptist Convention<br>Nashville, Tennessee<br>Lynn E. May, Jr., Executive Director-Treasurer

For twenty-five years the Historical Commission has functioned as a unique denominational service agency which undergirds every facet of Baptist life and work by helping Baptists preserve and make known their history. The continuing efforts of the Commission to develop among Southern Baptists a growing awareness and understanding of their history were especially fruitful during the 1976 USA Bicentennial. Churches and associations from across the nation called on the Commission for assistance in preserving their records, writing their histories, and celebrating anniversaries. Highlights of the Commission's ministry during the past year are given below.

Baptist Observance of USA Bicentennial. - Taking advantage of the historical awareness generated by the USA Bicentennial, the Historical Commission provided Southern Baptists with an unprecedented amount of material to help them learn about their religious heritage. The Commission assisted thousands of churches, associations, organizations, and institutions in conducting a Baptist observance of the Bicentennial.

Baptist Information Retrieval System (BIRS). - The two-year pilot project launched in January, 1974, to develop a centralized computer system for information storage and retrieval was completed during the year with the establishment of the Baptist Information Retrieval System (BIRS) as an ongoing system to help serve the information needs of Southern Baptists. Under the direction of the Historical Commission, BIRS produced the 1975 indexes to three Baptist newspapers and forty-six periodicals, generated bibliographical printouts of information in response to specific inquiries, and developed a revised edition of the BIRS Thesaurus.

Oral History. - To train church and denominational leaders in conducting tape recorded oral history interviews with persons who have contributed significantly to the life and work of Baptists over a lifetime of service the Historical Commission conducted four state Baptist oral history workshops, provided personal consultation, and printed materials to assist persons in instituting oral history projects.

Publications. - The Commission published four issues of its quarterly journal, Baptist History and Heritage, historical sections in three issues of The Quarterly Review, the annual Southern Baptist Periodical Index-1975, and a revised edition of "Baptists," a 16 -page pamphlet on the history of Baptists.

Baptist Research Center. - The Historical Commission enlarged the historical resources of Dargan-Carver Library, a Baptist Research Center in Nashville, jointly operated by the Commission and Sunday School Board. Denominational leaders, editors, writers, professors, students, pastors, and other researchers utilized the historical resources of this library to study and write about numerous phases of the life and work of Baptists.

# HOME MISSION BOARD

## A NEW DIRECTOR

The top news item of 1976 was the retirement of Arthur B. Rutledge as executive director-treasurer of the Home Mission Board. He was succeeded by William G. Tanner. Rutledge headed the agency during 12 of the most stormy years it has faced since being founded in 1845. The storm was not internal, but was in society. Race, changing lifestyles, war and poverty headed the list of social problems faced by the HMB. Tanner, 46, is the youngest man to head the SBC agency in a century. He came to the HMB from the presidency of Oklahoma Baptist University. Previously, he was president of Mary Hardin Baylor College in Texas and pastor of churches in Texas and Mississippi.

## STAFF AND MISSIONARIES

At the year's end, the Home Mission Board staff had reached 101 persons. The staff has enlarged an average of two positions a year for the past eight years, climbing from 84 in 1969. The support staff - supervisory, technical, professional, clerical and maintenance - has climbed from 105 to 130 in the same period. During 1976, the missionary force increased by 368 , the most significant gain in eight years. There are now 2,492 missionaries. They are augmented by 1,282 student summer missionaries and 142 short-term Christian Service Corps volunteers.

## FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Southern Baptists were outstanding in their support of the Home Mission Board and its work in 1976. At the year's end, the 1976 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering topped its $\$ 9.5$-million goal, receiving $\$ 9,631,012$, a gain of 13.46 percent. Cooperative Program gifts increased 13.65 percent over the previous year. The Board received $\$ 7,680,150$ in the basic Cooperative Program allocation, plus challenge funds of $\$ 870,143$.

## NEW MISSION WORK

At mid-year, the Home Mission Board joined the Hawaii Baptist Convention in sending the first Southern Baptist missionaries to American Samoa. Preliminary visits indicated a need for such a ministry and receptivity by the people. Lefanoga (Ray) Viliamu, a native of American Samoa and educated in Southern Baptist institutions in Texas, together with his wife and children, moved to American Samoa from Hawaii. During the year, preliminary discussions were held about the possibility of beginning mission work elsewhere in the United States Trust Territories of the Pacific. The Hawaii Convention, Home Mission Board and Foreign Mission Board conducted the exploration. The discussions were furthered in early 1977, when HMB directors approved a detailed study of the area by Douglas and Ruth Clark, faculty members of Oklahoma Baptist University.

## PROGRAM-BY-PROGRAM SUMMARY

During the year, the 14 program areas and six support sectors performed a number of functions. Here is a program-by-program summary:

Evangelism Development - The program works with and assists churches, associations and state conventions in interpreting, promoting and properly relating the message, methods, motivation and spirit of New Testament evangelism. During 1976, the churches reported 384,496 baptisms, the first decline in six years. The program assisted with financial support in six states. It produced a book, The Evangelistic Church, provided 90,000 additional support pieces of resource material, increased enrollment in the Correspondence Bible Course, assisted 17 state conventions in training sessions for associational chairmen of evangelism, correlated and supervised the work of two national consultants for black and ethnic churches, and assisted five state conventions in long-range evangelism planning.

Personal Evangelism - The program works with churches, associations and state conventions in motivating, equipping and involving persons for a lifestyle of personal witnessing and the training of others for such a lifestyle. During the year, it placed major emphasis on the development of the Growing an Evangelistic Church strategy. It introduced a new process of witness training, "TELL Witness Training," a series of information units designed to develop personal skills to allow an individual to function effectively as a witness. It also produced three TELL film cartridges and produced and distributed a 30-minute color documentary, A Disturbing Silence.

Mass Evangelism - The program works with churches, associations and state conventions in all types of mass evangelism ministries and projects including local church revivals, area crusades, ethnic crusades, simultaneous revivals and other specialized types of mass evangelism, including use of mass media. During 1976, the program worked cooperatively with associations and state conventions in planning and conducting 27 crusades, including 11 ethnic crusades, two with black churches and one for American Indians. It also coordinated an Alaska simultaneous crusade. A national conference for vocational evangelists was held, the first time such a meeting has been held in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention. The program also developed a local church revival guidebook and worked on pilot projects for REAP, a rural evangelistic program.

Chaplaincy - The program provides Southern Baptists with a continuing liaison relationship and supporting ministry to chaplains serving in the military, in hospitals, institutions and industrial situations. Military and civilian chaplains in active service totaled 805, including Army 197, Navy 130, Air Force 111, Veterans Administration 52, hospitals 200, institutions 92 and industry 23. Reserve chaplains numbered 516 and 36 volunteer chaplaincy ministries were established.

Church Loans - The program serves churches, associations and state conventions by providing counsel on church loans and financing for church building construction and church site purchases. The program gave counsel to some 1,300 churches on church finance and assisted some of them in obtaining local financing. Loan applications from 249 churches were processed and long-term commitments totaling $\$ 12,968,039$ were made. During 1976, its loan portfolio increased $\$ 4,285,313$ to bring total assets to $\$ 50,401,122$. Approximately 2,000 churches are served by the program of Church Loans.

Associational Administration Service - The program relates to 1,190 associations with about 20,000 elected officials and 800 employed workers, of whom 245 are HMB missionaries. The program is not a general promoter of SBC programs, but it does work with and assist all SBC programs in communicating their services to and working effectively with associations. It participated in designing and implementing Bold Mission Thrust training for 386 directors of missions and 122 associational missions committee chairmen from 32 state conventions, sponsored orientation conferences for 38 new directors of associational missions and sponsored three associational leadership development clinics on SBC seminary campuses for 84 directors of missions. Also, the SBC approved an Associational Emphasis Week and the program was given responsibility for implementing the week, which will spotlight the role and function of the association.

Metropolitan Missions - The program relates to directors of associational missions, other associational staff members, pastors and leaders in 233 areas. It assists in the support of 144 missionaries. It conducted 10 Urban Training Cooperative events, including three which centered on churches in communities in crisis and three which stressed apartment ministry strategy. It also conducted one national Urban Training Conference, prepared a PACT (Project Assistance for Churches in Transition) kit. PACT is an interagency project to relate the total resources of church program organizations to churches in transitional communities. There are some 2,000 churches in crisis communities across the nation.

Rural-Urban Missions - The program relates to directors of associational missions, pastors and leaders in more than 600 rural-urban associations. It assists in the support of 120 missionaries. This program assisted in 10 state conventions and regional and small church conferences involving 1,675 persons. It assisted 20 associations in strategy planning. There were Bold Mission Thrust leadership training conferences involving 300 directors of missions and a conference for In-Service Guidance directors involving 47 persons representing 24 Baptist institutions in 13 state conventions.

Christian Social Ministries - The program works with and assists churches, associations and state conventions in expressing Christian love and witness through special ministries. It assisted in the support of 311 missionary personnel. Involved in the work is disaster relief and last year the program assisted seven state conventions by providing $\$ 55,500$ for disaster relief needs. Also, it set in motion the emphasis of training Spanish-speaking people to help Spanish-speaking non-readers and conducted a number of state, regional and associational literacy workshops. Other activities included assisting innercity churches in establishing weekday ministries, holding workshops on ministering to alcohol and drug abusers and their families, on ministering in small churches and on youth and family services. The department also published handbooks on ministry with the aging and on Christian social ministries.

Church Extension -- The program works with and assists churches, associations and state conventions in establishing and bringing new churches and missions to self-support. It assisted 656 congregations with Church Pastoral Aid and other financial help. Of these, 190 were new situations and 71 congregations achieved self-support. Twenty-four new church extension missionaries were appointed. A total of 372 new churches were reported on annual church letters, a net gain of 150 .

Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists - The program works with and assists Southern and National Baptist churches, associations, state conventions and agencies in their efforts to effect cooperative and reconciling relationships. The program assists in the support of 82 missionary personnel. One of the highlights of 1976 was a national meeting in which the "directions for the program" were determined. The direction involves three aspects: cooperative ministries of racial reconciliation and equipping ministries.

Interfaith Witness - This program works with and assists churches, associations and state conventions in witnessing to people of other religious groups. The promotion is done through a research and resource staff of four persons and four regional directors, based in different parts of the nation. It conducted 79 awareness conferences in 26 states and held 22 statewide training workshops for volunteer resource persons with a total attendance of 7,800. It also held the first national meeting of state coordinators for interfaith witness and held the first Baptist-Buddhist dialogue in the United States. Altogether, it sponsored six dialogues, involving 506 persons.

Language Missions - The program works with and assists churches, associations and state conventions in their efforts to bring persons identified with ethnic groups, other than English, into a right relationship with God, to establish language-culture congregations, and to bring them to self-support. During 1976, it assisted with the support of 830 appointed missionary personnel and 255 field personnel, for a total of 1,085 , among 33 ethnic groups. During the year, 220 new congregations were started. Among the groups involved were Spanish, Korean, Puerto Rican, Vietnamese, Chinese, Arab, Cambodian, Filipino, Greek and Laotian. The program also continued to work in the post-resettlement of Indochinese families. It also initiated HMB work in American Samoa.

Pioneer Missions - The program relates primarily to areas where Southern Baptist work has been initiated since 1940. It is implemented through other programs of the Home Mission Board and not through its own staff unit. The function of the program is to focus attention on the continuing needs that exist in the so-called pioneer fields and to give a composite report of work in these fields. Last year, the various programs of the HMB provided full or partial support of 1,249 missionaries and contributed $\$ 9,814,953$ to work in these areas.

Special Mission Ministries - The department has two major areas of concern: resort missions and recruitment and assignment of volunteers through the ministries related to various age groups. Last year, in the resort missions area, six state resort conferences and two resort think tanks were held. Also, some 14,000 volunteers were assigned, supporting the various programs of the HMB.

Planning Section - The planning section coordinates the HMB planning and budgeting with various state conventions. The section provides planning and research services to the state conventions for developing of planning processes and mission and evangelism goals. Three regional coordinators conduct annual planning and budgeting meetings with each of the state conventions and develop the cooperative budget shared by the agency and the respective state conventions.

Services Section - The section is composed of three divisions: Business Services, Communication and Personnel. The purpose of the section is to provide the financial and human resources necessary for the Board's work. Business Services continues to manage the business needs of the Board, its program and personnel. Communication is composed of Art Services, Audiovisuals, Editorial Services and Promotion. Personnel includes Missionary Personnel, Personnel Development, Personnel Recruitment and Personnel Employment. During 1976, Missionary Personnel processed and recommended for approval 632 candidates including 89 career missionaries, 196 missionary associates, 252 mission pastors and 95 short-term US- 2 missionaries.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

NASHVILLE - The Southern Baptist Sunday School Board, largest agency of the Southern Baptist Convention, reported a very encouraging year according to board president Grady C. Cothen.

In the area of Sunday Schools, it was reported that 7,000 churches secured ACTION materials for use in Sunday School enrollment, while approximately 2,000 churches reported having conducted one or more ACTION campaigns. The number of new persons enrolled in a church ACTION campaign has consistently held at more than 100.

Sunday School enrollment for the 1975-76 year increased by 90,000. A major effort to improve the quality of teaching and learning in the Sunday School was launched in the spring of 1977, accompanied by the release of 31 new products to support the emphasis.

Christian Home Week activities, conferences and retreats related to family enrichment and special attention for single adults were the primary efforts related to the Support and Enrichment of Family Life (Family Ministry). Publication of a magazine for senior adults, Mature Living, was begun in April.

The Bible Book Series, a new Bible book curriculum for adults and youth, was authorized and begun, with a scheduled release date of October 1978.

The development of a nationwide Bible Correspondence course for television and radio was authorized by board trustees, in cooperation with the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission.

Ridgecrest (N.C.) and Glorieta (N.M.) Baptist Conference Centers reported a total of 88,650 guests registered during the year. Both conference centers now operate on a year-round basis.

In the Program of Book Store Operation, sales for the year were $\$ 32,395,419$ which was $\$ 1,759,988$ above budget and $\$ 3,685,708$ above last year.

The first regional Baptist Book Store Mail Order Center was opened in Greensboro, N.C., and new Baptist Book Stores were opened in Greensboro and in Forest Park, Ga., near Atlanta.

Broadman Press introduced a total of 658 new products this year, including 96 books, six motion pictures, 39 audio cassettes and 25 filmstrips. During the same period, 176 old products were dropped, leaving Broadman with a net increase of 482 products.

Some of the most significant new books published included The Revelation of Jesus Christ by Ray Robbins, Why Not the Best? by Jimmy Carter, Companion to the Baptist Hymnal by William J. Reynolds, and Road to Augusta by Joe W. Burton.

Sales for Broadman were $\$ 7,749,320$, an increase of $\$ 1,164,639$ over last year.

In the program of Church Services and Materials Development, periodical circulations averaged $12,945,000$, an increase of 156,000 units. Sales of $\$ 31,400,000$ were 10.9 percent above last year.

The 1975 Southern Baptist Convention statistics showed a 39 percent increase in church music enrollment reported by churches. The total number of persons enrolled in church music is $1,354,944$, an increase of 50,876 over the 1974 enrollment.

The program of National Student Ministries reported that the number of campuses served by student ministries passed 1,000 by reaching a total of 1,026 . More than 570 campuses still need a ministry. Of the 819 directors presently working in campus ministries, 338 are full time, 116 part-time and 365 are volunteers.

The present value of all property reported in the Southern Baptist Convention is $\$ 6,221,128,761$, representing an increase of $\$ 606,222,358$ over last year.

The number of church libraries registered with the church library department reached 22,216 .

The Sunday School Board transferred a total of $\$ 394,480$ to the Southern Baptist Convention for operating expense.

A total of $\$ 1,611,470$ was provided through the Program of Cooperative Education and Promotion Work and State Conventions to provide funds to assist state conventions in the promotion of Sunday School, church training, church music, student, church administration, church architecture, church library and church recreation work.

Your Radio and Television Commission seeks to be instrumental in the glorious task of helping men and God confront each other. The Commission's goal is to bring its best efforts to bear on the problem of the effective use of the media for Christ.

The future of the Radio and Television Commission has never been brighter. There's a world within the reach of Southern Baptists, and this agency has new television capabilities which will enable the denomination to claim it for the Master.

The $\$ 3.3$ million dollar tv production studio, offices and training center was dedicated in April to the service of God. Following this, a Conventionwide consultation was held in the training center for nearly 100 representatives of churches who came seeking assistance in taking advantage of radio and television opportunities on their local field.

The Commission aims to expand its own television ministry through videotape production in the new facility, and to offer its resources to the denomination.

Radio continues to be a changing industry. To meet some of the emerging opportunities, three entirely new program formats have been developed by the Commission during the past year. Already in production is "Streams In the Desert," which utilizes contemporary essays, poetry, and a wide range of popular and religious stereophonic music.

Scheduled to come in the fall are "Good News," a five minute program on the positive, Christian aspects of the news, and "Country Corner," featuring country music stars as weekly hosts.

Dr. Herschel H. Hobbs completed 18 years as regular preacher on "The Baptist Hour" and retired in September, 1976. Dr. Frank Pollard, pastor of First Baptist Church, Jackson, Miss., and Dr. Jaroy Weber, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Lubbock, Texas, have served as preachers on the program intermittently since then. Dr. Pollard is slated to return to the air in October this year for another stint. This first and oldest of Commission programs is currently carried by 360 stations in the U.S. and several other countries.

The evangelistic thrust of the Commission is being felt throughout the nation with the launching of two quarter-hour television series during the first quarter of 1977. "The Athletes" takes advantage of the public's strong interest in sports and the claims of Christ made through the testimonies of athletic stars. "Listen" is shown in most cases in conjunction with "The Athletes." Dr. Charles Fuller of Roanoke, Va., is host and narrator on this program which features a variety of contemporary subjects. Dr. Fuller completes the program with a strong Christian appeal. An average of 25 stations will be airing these programs for 13 weeks at a time. Meanwhile, production continues on additional episodes for both series, the goal being 26 films in each.

The Commission received 12 hours of network television time on $A B C$, CBS, and NBC during the 13-month period from Sept. 1, 1975 to September 30, 1976 . . the best network period ever enjoyed by the denomination.

In 1976, if the Commission had been required to buy the broadcast time for its programs, it would have meant an expenditure of $\$ 9,825,493$ - about four times the agency's annual budget. This was the amount of public service time given Commission programs last year. The number of stations carrying at least one Commission-produced program during the year totaled 5,444 stations. This means Southern Baptist programs are heard on $60 \%$ of all the radio and television stations in America.

There is proof that the Christian message shared on Commission programs gets through to many listeners and viewers. Last year 205,000 people responded to the programs for the first time. Nearly 8,000 of these received personal counseling concerning personal and spiritual problems.

More than 2,143 correspondents last year said they had either accepted Christ as Saviour, or had renewed their commitment to follow Him in discipleship. Of course, only the Heavenly Father knows the countless numbers of individuals in whose hearts the message has found its mark.

Thank you for your great part in helping the Radio and Television Commission to be on the cutting edge of gospel proclamation in today's world.

# GOLDEN GATE BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY 

Mill Valley, California

Harold K. Graves, President
During the 33rd year of the life of Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary there were more than 500 enrolled in its various programs, A RECORD. It was the 25 th and final year of the presidency of Harold K. Graves.

The year was a significant one in many ways other than a record enrollment. Dean Morgan Patterson has led the academic program. Dr. Naymond H. Keathley was added in New Testament, Dr. D. Glenn Saul in Ethics, Dr. Ron Bostic in Music, and Dr. James R. Patterson in Theology. Dr. Fred L. Fisher, who retired last year, has served as Director of the Southern California Center and led it to a record enrollment.

Visiting professors included Dr. Samuel Tang, President of Hong Kong Baptist Seminary, Rev. A. L. 'Pete' Gillespie, missionary to Japan, Dr. Bob R. Taylor, Baptist Sunday School Board, Dr. A. Donald Bell, Dean Emeritus W. A. Carleton, and Dr. James Alfred Smith.

During the session 24 new one-bedroom apartments were added to the campus. This helps but that number of units needs to be added each year for the next four or five years to meet the critical housing shortage. Housing and the new library are the critical needs.

Endowment of the Chair of Evangelism is almost complete, but rising costs demand that at least an additional $\$ 100,000$ be secured to provide the services originally planned for this project.

Thank you for your support through prayer and the Cooperative Program. A new president should be elected and announced soon. The greatest days for Golden Gate Baptist Seminary are yet to be.

There were 11 students at Golden Gate this session from Arkansas.

# SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY 

Louisville, Kentucky

Duke K. McCall, President
Twenty-five years ago there were 1,034 students. Last year the total enrollment was 2,418. Southern Seminary is today the second largest accredited seminary in the world, and the largest independent institution of higher education in Kentucky.

Southern Seminary offers eight degree programs, including Master of Church Music, Doctor of Musical Arts, Master of Religious Education, Doctor of Education, Master of Divinity, Doctor of Ministry, Doctor of Philosophy.

In addition, diploma and certificate programs are provided to serve students who need special studies not leading to a degree.

The seminary is organized into three graduate, professional schools: the School of Theology, the School of Church Music, and the School of Religious Education. Degree candidates in each of these schools must already have a baccalaureate degree. Last year they were graduates of 671 different colleges and universities.

In addition, under its program of adult and continuing education, the seminary provides Boyce Bible School for mature ministers not eligible for a degree program. This venture is just two years old and reflects the new concern in American society for access to higher education for all. Dean Arthur Walker is responsible for the entire program of adult and continuing education, with Dr. James Ryan as director of the Boyce Bible School.

Twenty-five years ago, the seminary faculty counted 30 professors and 10 instructors. Currently, there are 143 faculty members and instructors, with 86 teaching in the School of Theology; 32 in the School of Church Music: and 25 in the School of Religious Education.

Partially reflecting an increase in enrollment, Library circulation soared upward to 116,251 units, an increase of 41 percent over the previous year. This welcome increase made new demands on staff, supplies, etc. Interlibrary loans among Kentuckiana Metroversity institutions rose to an all-time high of 648 units. There were 485 borrowers outside of the seminary family.

A record-breaking 14,230 volumes were catalogued during the past year. Significant additions were made to the Converse Hymnology Collection and the new Straughan Fund program was established.

Dr. O. Norman Shands served as Acting Dean of Student Affairs during the previous year until the election of Dean Arthur L. Walker, Jr.

The Student Affairs Office is involved in an extensive orientation and diagnostic testing program. The tests serve particularly as the basis of counseling.

Noteworthy is the fact that entering students for the Master of Divinity program in the fall averaged 1000.25 on the Graduate Record Exam. This indicates that the enrollment surge has not been at the expense of students with superior ability. The average G.R.E. score for all students during the past year was 945.99.

Vice President for Business Affairs Badgett Dillard reports that 70 units in the new Springdale apartments will be available during 1977. Architect Davis Byrd has been added to the seminary staff to develop a master campus plan in response to the growth in the student body. Renovation of the 265 apartments in Seminary Village will begin in 1977.

The clerical and manual staff of 278 persons received a total of $\$ 850,000$ in wages, up from $\$ 696,000$ the previous year.

Total operating expenses for theinstitution during the year were $\$ 4,135,000$ compared with a new budget for the ensuing fiscal year of $\$ 5,002,414$ plus capital expenditures anticipated to be $\$ 1,500,000$.

About one-half of the operating budget, or $\$ 2,615,000$, is requested from the Cooperative Program of the Southern Baptist Convention (twenty-five years ago the allocation was $\$ 200,000$ ). This Convention support will be provided in terms of a formula based on the average cost per student in accredited theological seminaries.

The remaining 50 percent of the budget must be provided by the seminary through charges to students, earnings on endowment, and gifts of friends.

Recognizing that the mix of growth in enrollment and inflation required the seminary to match Cooperative Program gifts with additional funds, the Southern Baptist Convention for the first time since 1925 approved during the past year a general campaign for endowment and capital improvements in the amount of $\$ 10$ Million.

The past quarter century has been a difficult time in American life and especially in all institutions of higher education.

For Southern Seminary, it has been a period of reaching out and growing taller in national reputation as a major theological school. It has been a Southern Baptist instrument for giving the churches and religious institutions leadership capable of responding to the changes and challenges of a turbulent era. As a result, Southern Baptist churches have themselves moved more and more to center stage in American life.

# SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Fort Worth, Texas 

Robert E. Naylor, President

Increased enrollment, the opening of a second off-campus center, and expansion of physical facilities highlight the 1977 annual report of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

A record enrollment of 3,851 is reported by Seminary President Robert E. Naylor. The figure represents a 107 percent increase in ten years. Included in the count are a record 1,320 new students. The report reveals 2,246 in the School of Theology, 1,221 in the School of Religious Education, and 384 in the School of Church Music. The increased enrollment has resulted in a record 616 graduates during the year.

The president reported 122 persons served on the teaching staff during the year, 103 who are fulltime faculty.

After nearly one year into the seminary's fund drive, "Eight by Eighty" more than $\$ 2$ million is reported to have been raised. The campaign goal of $\$ 8$ million is expected to be applied to capital expansion and endowment needs of the Fort Worth institution.

The report also describes the opening of a second off-campus center. Located on the campus of Oklahoma Baptist University, the center is designed to provide graduate level seminary training to Oklahoma area church staff persons.

Naylor notes the off-campus program underscores the seminary's commitment to provide seminary training to the many church staff persons who serve local congregations without the benefit of formal seminary training. The initial enrollment was 79 students. The first center, opened in Houston in 1975, reported 171 students enrolled during the year.

Expansion of campus facilities is a major concern also reflected in the report. Married student housing continues to be a priority item with 48 additional units under construction during the year.

With financial resources from the SBC Capital Needs Program, foundation grants, and "Eight by Eighty" contributions, ground has been broken for a new physical fitness center. The 39,000 square foot building is expected to provide individual fitness programs and group recreation activities for seminary students and faculty and their families.

Other expansions and improvement projects noted to be on the drawing board are a new maintenance building, improvements to the Memorial Building, renovation of Cowden Hall and construction of perimeter parking facilities.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES
THE EXECUTIVE BOARD MAINTAINS ITS RECORDS ON THE BASIS OF CASH RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS; CONSEQUENTLY, CERTAIN REVENUE AND RELATED assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain disbursements are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation IS INCURRED.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH ACCOUNTING PRACTICES FOLLOWED BY NON-PROFIT denominational organization, no provision has been made in the aCCOMPANYING FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR DEPRECIATION OF PROPERTIES.

NOTE 2: FUND OVERDRAFTS
THE ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION IN ITS NOVEMBER, 1967 MEETING, APPROVED THE BORROWING FROM OUTSIDE SOURCES OF UP TO \(\$ 900,000\) FOR THE PURCHASE OF A BAPTIST BUILDING SITE WITH THE INDEBTEDNESS TO BE LIQUIdated from the cooperative program budget. at december 31, 1977, The BALANCE OF THE FUND OVERDRAFT RESULTING FROM THESE BORROWINGS WAS \(\$ 328,526\).

THE EXECUTIVE BOARD, ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION, IN ITS AUGUST, 1976 ANNUAL MEETING, APPROVED THE OPERATIONS OF THE THIRD CENTURY ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN WITH FUNDING TO BE OBTAINED FROM FUTURE CONTRIBUTIONS. AT DECEMBER 31, 1977, THE FUND OVERDRAFT RESULTING FROM OPERATIONS WAS \(\$ 30,696\).

NOTE 3: FUNDS HELD IN ESCROW
THE EXECUTIVE BOARD'S POLICY IS TO HOLD ALL OFFERINGS FOR LOTTIE MOON FOREIGN MISSIONS WHICH ARE RECEIVED SUBSEQUENT TO OCTOBER IN ESCROW UNTIL THE FOLLOWING YEAR. FUNDS HELD IN ESCROW AMOUNTED TO \$149, 276 AND \$120,239 AT DECEMBER 31, 1977 AND 1976, RESPECTIVELY.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES
PROPERTIES AT MAY 31, 1960 WERE APPRAISED BY GLEN B. ESPY, APPRAISER, LITTLE ROCK, ARKANSAS AND THESE APPRAISED VALUES WERE RECORDED BY THE UNIVERSITY ACQUISITIONS SUBSEQUENT TO THE APPRAISAL DATE ARE STATED AT COST. IN ACCORDANCE WITH PRACTICES FOLLOWED BY NON-PROFIT EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, NO PROVISION HAS BEEN MADE FOR DEPRECIATION OF EDUCATIONAL PLANT AND EQUIPMENT. FUNDS RECEIVED DURING THE YEAR AND PUT INTO THE RESTRICTED FUNDS ARE NOT RECORDED AS INCOME OF THE UNIVERSITY. WHEN DISBURSEMENTS ARE MADE FROM THE RESTRICTED FUNDS FOR CAPITAL PURPOSES OR OPERATING PURPOSES, THE INCOME IS RECORDED AS GIFTS AND GRANTS AND IS SHOWN AS SUCH ON THE INCOME STATEMENT.

INVESTMENTS OF RESTRICTED AND PLANT FUNDS ARE RECORDED AT COST; INVESTMENTS RECEIVED BY GIFT ARE CARRIED AT MARKET VALUE AT THE DATE OF ACQUISITION.

BONDS PAYABLE ARE DUE IN ANNUAL INSTALLMENTS VARYING FROM \$43,000.00 TO \$73,000.00 WITH INTEREST RATES RANGING FROM $23 / 4 \%$ TO $33 / 8 \%$, THE FINAL INSTALLMENT BEING DUE IN 2006, COLLATERALIZED BY TRUST INDENTURE COVERING CERTAIN BUILDINGS CARRIED IN THE ACCOUNTS AT $\$ 1,860,906.26$ AND THE NET REVENUES FROM THE OPERATIONS OF THESE FACILITIES AS WELL AS A PLEDGE OF $\$ 42,000.00$ ANNUALLY OF CERTAIN OTHER REVENUES.

#### Abstract

The Arkansas Baptist Foundation was incorporated under the laws of the State of Arkansas in 1949. Its purpose is to encourage Baptists in the proper management and final distribution of accumulated possessions. The Foundation is authorized to receive by will or through trust, gifts for the benefit of any institution or agency supported by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention or the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Board of Directors is composed of fifteen persons. Five are nominated each year by the convention's nominating committee and elected at the annual session. The by-laws require that at least two-thirds of these be laymen. Investments are made through a committee after careful evaluation of recommendations from investment counsel.

There are no fees or commissions charged by the Foundation. The operational budget is provided by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Thus, gross income generated from investment is distributed to the designated beneficiary.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
YEAR ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 1977
NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES
The Hospital is exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Inventories are priced at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out method) or market.

At the advice of the American Hospital Association, the Hospital obtained independent appraisals of its property and equipment in 1962 and 1964. The appraisals are reflected in the accompanying statements by showing a net increase of $\$ 9,224,607.25$ in the assets. Depreciation is computed on the appraised values.

The buildings and equipment are depreciated principally under the straight-line method. Accelerated depreciation on historical cost has been used for Medicare purposes. The additional, reimbursement resulting from accelerated depreciation has been deferred.

Interest cost related to specific projects is capitalized during the period of construction.

Revenues received under cost reimbursement agreements are subject to audit and retroactive adjustment by third-party payors. No provisions for retroactive adjustment have been made. An estimate of cost reimbursement for the current years is included in accounts receivable.

The Hospital's interest in its wholly-owned subsidiary, American Industrial Development Corporation, (AIDC) is included in InvestmentsEndowment Fund in the amount of $\$ 6,811,688.38$ on the equity method. The Hospital received rent from a wholly-owned subsidiary of AIDC of $\$ 314,533.10$ during 1977 and purchased approximately $\$ 3,000,000.00$ of medica) supplies from the subsidiary under normal trade terms.

Marketable securities included, at cost, in Investments-Endowment Fund had aggregate market values of $\$ 6,453,344.11$ at September 30, 1977. There were net unrealized losses of $\$ 358,344.27$ comprised as follows:

## NOTE 2 - LONG-TERM DEBT



NOTE 3 - PENSION PLAN
The Hospital has a pension plan which covers all electing employees who have completed one year of service. The plan requires employer contributions of five percent of compensation. During the first twenty years of service the Hospital matches the employee contribution. At the end of twenty years the Hospital contributes an amount sufficient to bring its total payments to the participants accounts to ten percent per year. After twenty-five years, the participant is guaranteed an amount based on his last seven years average compensation. The fair market value of the plan assets is adequate to cover the actuarily computed vested benefits of the participants. Contributions to the plan for 1977 aggregated $\$ 2,602,211.23$. The Deposit-Annuity Board shown in Current Assets is unrestricted and is available to fund any unexpected deficiency in the plan assets.

NOTE 4 - PROVISION FOR SELF-INSURANCE
Effective September 10, 1975, the Hospital elected to establish a self insurance fund for essentially all of its professional and general liability. A trust agreement has been entered under which the Hospital'will annually contribute the actuarily-computed amount sufficient to cover claims.

NOTE 5 - COMMITMENTS
The Hospital has entered a contract in the amount of $\$ 26,922,740.00$ for construction of Baptist Memorial Hospital East. Estimated completion date of the facility is during the first quarter of 1979. Construction and permanent financing has been negotiated in an amount not to exceed $\$ 36,000,000.00$

Aggregate rental commitments at September 30, 1977 under noncancellable operating leases for medical and other equipment require payments of $\$ 95,852.76, \$ 86,316.64, \$ 75,198.87$ and $\$ 59,817.80$ during years ending September 30, 1978 through 1981, respectively.

The present value of minimum payments required under capital leases has been included under long-term debt and the related assets have been included in equipment at a cost of $\$ 1,087,154.84$
