## CONSTITUTION

Article I. - The Name

The name of this body shall be "The Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

## Article II. - The Purpose

The purpose of this Convention shall be to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closer co-operation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God.

The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention on May 9, 1963, shall be the doctrinal guideline for this Convention.

## Article III. - Membership

Section 1. The Convention shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist churches which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Convention, and which desire to co-operate with other churches through this Convention.

Regular Baptist churches are those Baptist churches which in doctrine and in practice adhere to the principles and the spirit of The Baptist Faith and Message as adopted by the 1963 session of the Southern Baptist Convention, and The Baptist Faith and Message shall not be interpreted as to permit open communion and/or alien immersion.

Section 2. Each co-operating church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for each additional one hundred members, or major fraction thereof above one hundred, provided however, that no church shall be entitled to a total of more than ten messengers.

Section 3. The Convention may appoint a committee on credentials at each session which shall make recommendations to the Convention with reference to seating messengers from any church not hitherto affiliated with the Convention.

## Article IV. - Authority

Section 1. While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, this Convention shall never exercise any authority whatever over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the constitution of any church, or with the exercise of its functions as the only ecclesiastical body, but will cheerfully recognize and uphold the absolute independence of the churches.

## Article V. - Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Each officer of the Convention shall be elected annually, except the Recording Secretary and Treasurer who shall be the same as the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board, and shall continue in office until his successor in 'office shall have been elected and qualified.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the deliberations of the Convention and to discharge such other duties as may devolve upon the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all committees unless the Convention shall otherwise determine. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in his stead.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of the proceedings of the Convention, to edit and arrange publication of a suitable number of the minutes for distribution among the churches, as the Convention may direct, as soon as reasonably possible after the close of the session. He shall file and keep in order all papers deemed important to the work of the Convention.

## Artilce VI. - The Executive Board

Section 1. This Convention shall elect a Board of Trustees as provided for in the Convention's charter. This Board shall be known as the "Executive Board of Arkansas Baptist State Convention." This Board shall be composed of one member from the bounds of each co-operating association with a membership up to 5,000 , and one additional member for each additional 5,000 constituency, or major fraction thereof, provided however, that no association shall be entitled to more than five (5) members. In addition, the convention shall elect one lady from the bounds of each of the eight districts in the state to serve on the Executive Board. Upon the removal of any Executive Board member from the bounds of his or her association, his or her membership on the Executive Board ceases therewith; his or her successor in office may be named by the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board to hold office until the next meeting of the Convention. No member of this board shall hold any remunerative office under the Convention or any of its institutions. One-third of this board shall be elected annually to hold office for three years, and a majority of the board members shall constitute a quorum. Any member of the Executive Board who misses all the Executive Board meetings and the Executive Board committee meetings for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on the Board.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall be constituted and empowered by the Convention as its business and legal agent to administer all business committed to it by the Convention, and to employ such paid agents as it may deem necessary in carrying out the missionary, educational, benevolent and financial enterprises of the Convention. The Executive Board shall raise, collect, receive and disburse all the funds of the Baptist Cooperative Program, both state and southwide. The office of the Executive Board shall be a clearing house for administering the business affairs of the Convention, and a headquarters for Baptist information. Its books, records and files shall at all time be open for the reference and inspection of any co-operating church which may desire to examine them.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall render to the Convention annually a complete and detailed statement of all its busincss for the year.

## Article VII. - Trusteeships

The Convention shall elect trustees to manage and to operate institutions and agencies it may possess, as follows:

Section 1. Ouachita Baptist University, 24; Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services, 18; Baptist Memorial Hospital (Memphis,) 9; Southern Baptist College, 24; Arkansas Baptist Foundation, 15.

Section 2. One-third of the members of the Boards of Trustees shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three years. Any member of any Board of Trustees who misses all the meetings of that Board for one year shall be automatically dropped from membership on that Board.

Section 3. Each Board of Trustees shall elect from their membership a chairman and a recording secretary and such other officers as seems advisable.

Section 4. All trusteeships shall render to the Convention at each annual session complete and detailed reports of all transactions and business and any other activities for the year, and shall be subject to the direction of the Convention in all matters pertaining to administering the affairs of the institution with which their trusteeship is concerned.

## Article VIII. - Operation of Agencies

Section 1. Each board, agency, and institution of this Convention shall submit to the Executive Board at its annual budget planning meeting, which is to be held prior to the annual meeting of the Convention, a detailed statement of its sources of income, and a budget of proposed expenditures for the ensuing year. When received and adopted by the Convention, these budgets shall become the basis for the operations for the ensuing year.

## Article IX. - Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall meet annually, "if God permit," on a date to be fixed by the Convention. The Executive Board is empowered in emergencies to call special sessions of the Convention and to change either the time or place of meeting or both should the occasion demand.

## Article X. - Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of this Convention, two-thirds of the members voting concurring in the measure, except Article IV which shall remain forever unalterable in substance.

Section 2. Any proposed amendment to this Constitution shall be presented to the Convention in writing, for its consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, and may be voted on, on any subsequent day during the session, provided adequate publicity has been given in previous announcement.

## Article XI. - Parliamentary Authority

Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard for deciding questions of parliamentary procedure.

## Article XII. - Districts

The Convention shall establish such geographic districts as it may deem wise to facilitate its promotion, administration, and organization of its objec-tives, provided, it will never violate in any way the boundaries of any association within the area of the convention. The boundaries of such districts shall be drawn so as to provide equitable geographical and numerical voice and representation on all convention committees, commissions, boards, except the Executive Board, all trusteeships. Each tenth year hereafter, the whole matter of districts shall be readjusted to take in consideration the flow of membership in our Baptist churches.

## BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are enacted for the government of the Convention.

## 1. Enrollment of Messengers

The Secretary of the Convention shall enroll, upon arrival, messengers who present proper credentials from the churches. These messengers, together with others who may be enrolled upon presentation of approved credentials during the session, shall constitute the Convention. Any contention concerning seating messengers shall be presented to a committee appointed by the President for recommendation to the Convention for its action.

## 2. Officers

'The President, First Vice-President, and Second Vice-President shall be elected on the second day of the Convention, their terms of office to begin with the final session of the Convention.

The election of all officers shall be by ballot; provided, however, there is only one nomination for the office, then the Secretary or any other present may be directed to cast the ballot of the entire assembly for the single nominee.

The first vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after balloting for the president has been completed and the winner announced, and the second vice president shall be nominated and voted upon and elected after the balloting for the first vice president has been completed and the winner announced.

Each officer of the Convention shall be elected by a majority of all votes cast.

In case of removal from office, by death or otherwise, of the President, the Vice-Presidents shall automatically succeed to the office of President in the order of their election. The President may not bc elected for more than two consecutive terms.

The Treasurer of the Executive Board shall be also Treasurer of the Convention.

All elected officers of this Convention shall be members of churches cooperating with this Convention. This must also apply to members of the Executive Board and the institutional boards of this Convention.

## 3. The Executive Bcard

The Executive Board, being the legal trustee of the Convention, shall be empowered by the Convention to administer all business committed to it by the Convention.

The Executive Board is empowered to act for the Convention between sessions of the Convention, provided that it shall never exercise any authority contrary to the expressed will of the Convention.

When any unforeseen emergency occurs in any of the affairs of the Convention, or in any of the interest it controls, that in the judgment of the Executive Board requires action before the next session of the Convention, the Executive Board shall have full authority to take such action as may seem necessary, and all interests concerned shall be governed by such action, provided the Executive Board shall make full report of all matters pertaining thereunto to the next session of the Convention for its approval, and provided further, that nothing in this article shall be construed as giving the Executive Board authority to execute any matter already committed by the Convention to any of its Boards of Trustees or its institutions unless such Board when so commissioned shall decline to act on the orders of the Convention.

All proposals requiring the expenditures of money by the Convention, or the Executive Board of the Convention, from the annual budget, shall be considered by the Executive Board, before being presented to the Convention.

This Board shall be charged with the responsibility to have the books and financial affairs of each and all of the boards and institutions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention audited annually by an accredited firm of auditors, all audits to be accessible to the Executive Board at its budget planning session, and to be included in the institution's report to the Convention.

Members of the Executive Board, having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

The various associations of Arkansas whose churches are affiliated with this Convention, may submit to the committee on nominationsnames of those whom they believe should be considered for membership on the Executive Board as members from that association.

## 4. Trusteeships

All trusteeships of this Convention shall be amenable to the Convention on all matters, through its Executive Board. No trusteeship shall conduct extra movements to raise money outside its regular revenue-producing sources, nor shall a deficit in running expense or debt be incurred without the approval of the Convention in session or of the Executive Board in case of aforementioned emergencies, except, as follows: when an emergency arises concerning the opportunity to purchase needed property for expansion, the president of the Convention, the president of the Executive Board and the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board (all three concurring) believing such an emergency exists and deeming it wise to incur indebtedness, may give the Trustees of an institution such permission, and make a full report to the Executive Board and to the next Convention in session.

Members of Boards of Trustees having served two full terms of three years each shall not be eligible for re-election until as much as one year has elapsed.

Not more than two (2) members of a Board of Trustees shall at the same time be members of the same local church, nor shall more than six (6) members reside in any one association.

A member of a Board of Trustees of one institution of the Convention may not at the same time be a member of any other Board of Trustees of another institution of the Convention.

No member of a Board of Trustees of any institution of this Convention may at the same time be a member of the Executive Board of the Convention.

## 5. Committee Members

1. A nine-member rotating Nominating Committce, comprised of at least three laymen, will place in nomination at each annual convention names of persons to fill vacancies on all convention boards. At each annual convention, the president will appoint one-third of this committee to three-year terms to replace the one-third rotating off, plus filling any vacancies that may exist on the committee at that time. Nominations for all boards from this Nominating Committee must be as equitably divided as possible between the eight existing districts of our state convention. The president shall also name the chairman, who shall come from a one-year term member.
2. A member filling an unexpired term not having served the full term of years as provided by the Constitution, shall be, at the discretion of the Nominating Committee, eligible for election to a full term.
3. No member of a commission or committee delegated to study or make recommendations concerning our institutions shall be a member of any Board of Trustees of such institutions.
4. All associational missionaries or mission pastors receiving all or part compensation from the Convention through the Executive Board shall be considered employees of the Convention and shall not be members of any Convention or institutional board. The president of the Convention by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Board for the duration of his term of office.

## 6. Constitution and By-Laws Committee

A standing Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be composed of six (6) members to be nominated by the Nominating Committee. One-third of the membership (2) shall be elected annually to serve for a term of three (3) years. No member shall be eligible to serve more than two terms until one year has elapsed.

The president of the convention shall appoint the chairman of the Committee each year. The chairman must be one who has been a member of the Committee for at least one year and may succeed himself until his tenure of eligibility shall expire.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of advising the presiding officer concerning constitutional matters during the annual session of the convention with reference to matters which may arise from the floor or from other committees. The committee will act ad interim in all matters concerning the Constitution and By-Lawsreferred to it by the boards and agencies of the convention. The committee will receive all proposed constitutional changes before the convention and will be responsible for presenting them in writing, for convention consideration, upon the first day of the annual session, after adequate publicity has been given. The duties of the committee in no way preclude amendments to the constitution by messengers to the convention.

1. Performance of wedding ceremonies (1975 Annual, page 37)

The proper standard recommended by our State Convention for Southern Baptist ministers to perform wedding ceremonies in Arkansas (shall) be ordination.
2. Retired ordained minister's compensation (1972 Annual, page 38)

Actual expense for housing up to one-third of the total retirement received through the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention shall constitute a rental allowance paid as part of the retired ordained minister's compensation for past services.
3. Doctrinal Guidelines (1970 Annual, page 61)

Report of the Committee of Twenty-Five adopted, including the recommendation that the SBC statement of faith of 1963, The Baptist Faith and Message be adopted as doctrinal guidelines for our convention.
4. Appendices (1967 annual, page 40)

Resolution adopted that a search be made of the minutes of the convention to discover policies and interpretations which have been adopted in past years, and these interpretations and policies be added at the end of the constitution and by laws of the convention as appendices.
5. Church Ordinances (1965 annual, page 31)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, in the past, the most general interpretation of the New Testament, and the most general interpreta tion of the Word 'principles' as it is used in Article 3, Section 1, of our constitution, and the most prevalent practice of Baptist churches in Arkansas with reference to the church ordinances, has been what is commonly called "close baptism" and "close communion", and

Whereas, it is recorded on page 57 of the minutes of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention meeting in Fort Smith in 1937 that the Convention officially objected to the teaching of alien immersion and open communion in one of our seminaries, thereby establishing a precedence for future conventions, therefore,

Be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, meeting in its 112th annual session, go on record as objecting to the reception of alien immersion and the practice of open communion, and

Be it further resolved that we urge churches everywhere to re-examine the New Testament teaching on baptism and the Lord's Supper.
6. Federal Aid (1965 annual, page 43)

Resolution adopted, Whereas, Arkansas Baptists have been faced with the issue of Federal aid to private institutions, and, whereas, many feel that the acceptance of such funds violates the cherished Baptist position of the separation of church and state, therefore, be it resolved that the Arkansas Baptist Convention go on record as reaffirming our traditional Baptist position on the separation of church and state, and that we urge all of our Baptist institutions and programs to respect this principle.
7. Executive Board Recommendations (1963 annual, page 35)

Voted that all recommendations of the Executive Board shall be published in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine one month prior to the meeting of the state convention.
8. Violations of the Constitution (1960 Annual, page 29)

Where there are violations of the Constitution on the Boards the Convention Nomina ting Committee (shall be) requested to make proper corrections.
9. Book of Reports (1959 annual, page 28)

Voted that the convention constitution and by-laws be printed each year in the Book of Reports for the convenience of our messengers.
10. Baptist Memorial Hospital Trustees (1959 annual, page 29)

Voted that the members of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, not be included in the ruling which would prevent their serving on this board and one other convention board.
11. Capital Indebtedness (1959 annual, page 30)

Voted that all requests for capital indebtedness by any convention institution or agency must be submitted to the Executive Board at least 90 days in advance of the July meeting of the Executive Board.
12. Out-of-state participation by Executive Board staff (1953 annual, page 22)

Voted that we recommend the Cooperative Program as the best method of giving financial support to the Baptist work at home and abroad. We discourage any of the departments of our Arkansas Baptist work in accepting invitations to participate in the work of missions outside of our regular work within our state territory, at the expense of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention Departments involved. Further, we request our Executive Secretary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the President of the Executive Board confer with the heads of all Southern Baptist agencies expressing our concern about the practices of asking State Convention departments to give employees to such efforts outside our state, unless expenses and salaries are provided for by the agencies that use such workers.
13. Seating of Messengers (1949 annual, page 92)

Resolution adopted that this convention refuse to seat any messengers from any church that accepts alien immersion; practices open communion; or affiliates with any branch of the Federal Council of Churches, World Council of Churches; or any other organization similar to or growing out of such.

# THE BAPTIST <br> FAITH AND MESSAGE 

## I. THE SCRIPTURES

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is the record of God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. It reveals the principles by which God judges us; and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. The criterion by which the Bible is to be interpreted is Jesus Christ.

## II. GOD

There is one and only one living and true God. He is an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Redeemer, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe. God is infinite in holiness and all other perfections. To Him we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. The eternal God reveals Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nıture, essence, or being.

## A. God the Father

God as Father reigns with providential care over His universe, His creatures, and the flow of the stream of human history according to the purposes of His grace. He is all powerful, all loving, and all wise. God is Father in truth to those who become children of God through faith in Jesus Christ. He is fatherly in His attitude toward all men.

## B. God the Son

He ascended into heaven and is now exalted at the right hand of Cod where He is the One Mediator, partaking of the nature of God and of man, and in whose Person is effected the reconciliation between God and man. He will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission. He now divells in all believers as the living and ever present Lord.

## III. MAN

Man was created by the special act of God, in His own image, and is the crowning work of His creation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human
personality is evident in that God created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore every man possesses dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

## IV. SALVATION

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of ciod's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit throagh conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Repentance and faith are inseparable evperiences of grace. Repentunce is a genumie turning from sill toward God Fath is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to I!im as Lord and Saviour Justification is Cond's gracions and full acquitial upon principles of His rightentsness of all simers who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the belicver into a relationship of peace and fanor with Cod.
B. Sanctification is the experience, begimming in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to Cod's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual perfection through the presence and power of the FolySpirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.
C. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding st ate of the redeemed.

All tue believers endure to the encl. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sancti-
fied by His Spirit, wall never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the encl. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, bring reproach on the cause of Christ, and temporal judgments on themselves, yet they shall be kept by the power of God through fatith unto salvation.

## VI. THE CHURCH

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is a local body of baptized believers who are associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel, observing the two ordinances of Christ, committed to His teachings, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and secking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth.

This church is an autonomous body, operating through democratic processes under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. In such a congregation members are equally responsible. Its Scriptural officers are pastors and deacons.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages.

## VII. BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sing the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Iesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return oi Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

The righteous in their resurrected and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

## XI. EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

## XII. EDUCATION

The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

## XIII. STEWARDSHIP

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Hım. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for hel ping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proprortionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

## XIV. COOPERATION

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-
operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and H is Word as revealed in the New Testament.

Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus. The Christian should oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness, and vice. He should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love.

## XVII. RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and $H$. has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alonefor the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. Afree church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

6. John Wright, host pastor, welcomed the messengers to the First Baptist Church of Little Rock.
7. Fraternal greetings from our sister conventions in Tennessee, California, Northern Plains, Indiana, District of Columbia, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, and New Jersey were noted. Greetings from James Hampton, second vice president and missionary to Kenya, were received.
8. Convention visitors recognized by Brother Jackson were: W.C. Dudley, Home Mission Board; Gomer Lesch, Sunday School Board; W. C. Fields, Executive Committee; Gilbert Nichols, Foreign Mission Board (missionary to Paraguay); Frank Groner, Baptist Hospital, Memphis; W. T. Hendrix, Glorieta, New Mexico; Darrel Garner, missionary to Balaka Malawi; Don Orr, missionary to Columbia; Russell H. Dilday, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary; Don Stewart, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary; Jimmy Millikin, Mid-America Baptist Theological Seminary.
9. l'ormer state convention presidents were recognized and the following were present: W. O. Vaught, 1954-55, Bernes K. Selph, 1960-61, Don Hook, 1966-67; Thomas Hinson, 1968-69; Don Moore, 1974-75; and R. Wilbur Herring 1976-77.

Don Hook, Little Rock, moved that T. L. Harris, president of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, 1943-44, be sent greetings from the messengers of the Convention at his residence in Camden.
10. Gomer Lesch, special assistant at the Sunday School Board, presented Mrs. Rosalie Givens Alderman of Hope with a copy of her book Take Heart published by Broadman Press.
11. President Jackson then instructed the messengers infilling out a statistical survey compilied by the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine.
12. President Jackson called for the presentation of any resolutions or proposed constitutional amendments. The following resolutions were read: (1) Don Hook, Little Rock, resolution concerning separation of church and state; (2) John R. Maddox, Wynne, presented for Richard L. Proctor, Wynne, a resolution concerning divorce laws; (3) John Matthews, Fort Smith, resolution concerning smoking on Arkansas Bap tist Assembly grounds; (4) Gary S. Urich, Fayetteville, presented resolutions on abortion, ordination of women, filthy television programming, pornography, and the Equal Rights Amendment.

No amendments to the constitution were presented. David Branton then led the messengers in singing, "To God Be The Glory".
13. Following a selection of choral praises from the Singing Women directed by Jean Pilcher, Little Rock, Jamie Jones, Third Century Campaign Director, and Tom Logue, Baptist Student Union Director, introduced an excellent multi-media presentation of the B.S.U. Third Century Endowment Campaign. The theme was related to the parable of the sower in Luke 8 and the emphasis in 2 Cor. 9:6 - "He which sowe th sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully."

It traced the small beginnings of the B.S.U. Endowment to its present total of $\$ 750,000$ in pledges and gifts. Most of this, $\$ 564,000$, is in pledges, and the balance, $\$ 186,000$, is gifts.

Following the media presentation Co-Chairman Jon Stubblefield and John Finn and Tom Logue brought brief messages of challenge, appeal, and gratitude to the convention.
14. Special music for the first session, and all subsequent sessions, was by Jack Price, music evangelist, Garland Texas, accompanied by Don Reasons. The session was concluded with a message from the President of the Southern Baptist Convention and pastor of First Baptist Church in San Antonio, Texas, Jimmy Allen. The text for the message was taken from Nehemiah. Closing prayer was led by Charles Atkinson, Little Rock.

## Voted: To Adopt Executive Board Recommendations

17. Kenneth Threet, president of the Executive Board, read the following request from the Annuity Board and moved its adoption.

The Executive Board recommends to the 1978 Arkansas Baptist State Convention that actual expense for housing, up to forty percent ( $40 \%$ ) of the total retirement annuity received through the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention shall constitute a rental allowance paid as part of the retired ordained minister's compensation for past services, effective January 1, 1979.

The motion was seconded and carried with no question being asked. Brother Threet stated that each recommendation from the Board would be brought separately by an Executive Board member.
18. Leslie Riherd, Newport, moved that in compliance with the resolution that appears in the Book of Reports from the State Convention of Baptists in Indiana (see page 64) the Executive Board recommends that -

The Arkansas Baptist State Convention respond to the request of the State Convention of Batists in Indiana by endorsing the April 1-8, 1979, Evangelism crusade by encouraging 125 pastors to accept the invitation of Indiana Baptists to come at their own expense to preach in the 1979 crusade and that encouragement be given in the interest of developing new missions and churches in Indiana.

The motion was seconded and carried with no questions being asked.
19. John Finn, Harrison, moved that the proposed objectives and goasl for Bold Mission Thrust, 1979-1982, be approved as outlined in the Book of Reports (see page 66). The purpose being that every Southern Baptist understand, accept, and become involved in the mission to enable every person in the world to have the opportunity to hear and to respond to the gospel of Christ by the year 2000. The motion was seconded and carried on with no questions being asked.
20. Ray Wells, Smackover, moved the 1979 budget be adopted as recommended (see pages 67).

The motion was seconded. Ray Wells and Kenneth Threet both spoke to the recommendation. With no questions being asked the recommendation was voted on and carried with no opposition.
21. The messengers were led in singing "ToGod Be the Glory." First Vice President Bill Lewis was presented to preside over the remainder of the session.

## Voted: To Elect President

22. Jack Bledsoe, Des Arc, nominated Johnny Jackson, Little Rock for a second term in office. Kenneth Threet, Mountain Home, moved that nominations cease and Brother Jackson be elected by acclamation. The motion was seconded and carried.

## Voted: To Elect Second Vice President

24. John Finn, Harrison, nominated John Gearing, Blytheville. Dillard Miller, Mena, moved that nominations cease and that Brother Gearing be elected by acclamation. Motion seconded and carried.
25. First Vice President Bill Lewis recognized Dr. Ken Lilly in being first runner-up as family physician of the year by Good Housekeeping.

Robert Barnett, Book Store manager, spoke concerning the Book Store exhibit and various books of our convention speakers that were available.
W. C. Fields, assistant to Executive Secretary and director of Public Relations Executive Committee, Southern Baptist Convention, reported that Arkansas was the only state to increase Cooperative Program giving to the Southern Baptist Convention for eight consecutive years.

## Voted: To Appoint Baptist Building Study Committee

26. Ferrell Morgan, Crossett, moved that a committee be appointed by the president of the convention to study the space needs of our Baptist Building and report back to our convention in session next year. T.K. Rucker, Little Rock, seconded the motion. Brother Rucker and John Wright, Little Rock, spoke to the motion. Following a brief discussion, the question was called for. The motion was voted on by the raising of hands and carried by a large majority.

## Voted: To Dedicate 1978 Annual

27. Dillard Miller, Mena, moved that the 1978 Arkansas Baptist State Convention Annual be dedicated to Dr. Ed McDonald, Jr., former director of the Arkansas Baptist Foundation and pastor of several churches in Arkansas. Bill Lewis, Jonesboro, also requested that the annual be dedicated to the former pastor of First Baptist Church Harrisburg and several other churches in Arkansas to Rev. J. I. Cossey. Brother Miller agreed to a codedication of the annual. Motion as amended was second and carried.

## Voted: To Send Telegram to Mrs. Jim Ranchino

28. Freeman McMenis, Udora, moved that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention send a telegram to Mrs. Jim Ranchino conveying the Convention's sympathy in the untimely death of her husband. Motion seconded and carried.
29. William Good, Heber Springs, suggested that Baptist laymen across the state who have experience in the area of architecture, design, engineering, etc. . . be sought out to assist the study committee for the Baptist Building.

An extensive discussion followed concerning where the funds would come from for the feasibility study and investigations.

Dillard Miller, Mena, moved that we refer the funding of this committee to the Operating Committee of the Executive Board. Motion seconded.

Paul Sanders, Little Rock, requested that the Operating Committee report back to the convention before adjournment.

Kenneth Threet, president of the Executive Board, requested that the Operating Committee be instructed to how much money will be necessary.

Dwayne Fischer, Little Rock, moved that a speculative figure of $\$ 25,000$ be used for the investigation. Motion seconded. Parliamentarian Carl Overton called for a point of order as another motion was already on the floor. Fischer's motion was withdrawn. The discussion continued.
W. W. Dishongh, Gentry, moved that we amend Brother Miller's motion to place a $\$ 15,000$ ceiling on the investigation. Motion seconded and carried. The previous motion as amended was voted on and carried.
30. Other miscellaneous business included a request that the state convention meeting be scheduled around the elections if at all possible.

Don Nall, Batesville, asked if the convention policy of two years in Little Rock and one year outside of Little Rock would be continued. C. A. Johnson, Little Rock, noted that the Convention Nominating Committee recommended where the convention would be meeting each year.

Bill Griffith, Yellville, encouraged the messengers to ask questions on any motions or recommendations before passing them and not debate the matter after the passing.
31. Harry D. Trulove, President of the Foundation, reported assets managed by the agency had reached $\$ 2,600,000$, an increase of $51 \%$ over the previous year. Since the operating budget of the Foundation is provided through the Cooperative Program all of the income earned from investments is allocated to the causes designated by the donor or selected by the convention. For 1978 the earnings will exceed by $\$ 76,000$ the amount the agency receives through the Cooperative Program.

In the report Bro. Trulove indicated the Foundation is (1) the trust agency of the convention serving all Baptist causes, (2) an extension of the local church extending and expanding her ministries, (3) a channel through which individual stewards could provide continuing support for any cause or causes related directly or indirectly to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, and (4) a service agency to individuals in estate planning.

The theme for the ministries of the Foundation in 1979 would be "Investing In Love".

The charter of the Foundation requires that the convention select the beneficiary for the income earned from undesignated gifts.

Dillard Miller, chairman of the Institution Liaison Committee for the Foundation, recommended that during 1979 this income be allocated to the scholarship fund established by Ouachita Baptist University to honor Dr. Ben Elrod when he left to become President of Georgetown College in Kentucky. Recommendation was seconded and carried. (See pages 101 for report).
32. Special music by Jack Price followed the Foundation report. Bill Lewis, first vice president, introduced President Johnny Jackson, Sr., for the message of the hour, the President's Address, 'Possessing Our State for Our Lord". The text was taken from Numbers 13:30. The closing prayer was led by Terrel Gordon, Fayetteville.

# SECOND DAY - AFTERNOON SESSION 

"Wednesday, November 8, 1978 ,
"Boldness in Worship and Praise"
33. The session opened at 1:30 p.m. at First Baptist Church, Little Rock, with Pulaski Heights Handbell Choir, Little Rock, performing. Ray McClung, Little Rock, led the congregation in singing "To God Be the Glory", "Blessed Be the Name", and "My Jesus, I Love Thee".

The scripture reading, taken from Revelations 5:8-14, and prayer was by Aaron Carter, Austin. Dale Moody gave the Bible Study for the session. First Vice President Bill Lewis was asked to preside at this point.

## Voted: To Adopt Report on Resolutions

34. The report of the Resolutions Committee was given by Eddie McCord, chairman. Chairman McCord moved the adoption of Resolution No. 1. Seconded and carried.

## Resolution No. 1, Appreciation for Program Committee

WHEREAS, The 1978 convention program has been used of the Lord to challenge and inspire us in Bold Missions, to witness to every person on earth by the year 2000; be it

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That we express our appreciation to the program committee for their excellent work.

Chairman McCord moved the adoption of Resolution No. 2. Seconded and carried.

## Resolution No. 2, Appreciation to Convention Officers

WHEREAS, We the messengers recognize the dedicated leadership of our 1978 convention officers; Rev. Johnny Jackson, president; Rev. Bill Lewis, first vice president; Rev. James Hampton, second vice president; Dr. Charles H. Ashcraft, executive secretary; and

WHEREAS, They express a deep love and concern for our fellowship, be it

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That all express warm appreciation for the excellent way they have led us.

Chairman McCord moved the adoption of Resolution No. 3. Seconded and carried.

## Resolution No. 3, Appreciation to Host Church and Pastor

WHEREAS,The one hundred twenty-fifth annual session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention has been enriched by the prayers, fellowship, and facilities of the First Baptist Church of Little Rock, be it

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That all express our deep appreciation to the host church, her pastor and staff for their gracious contribution to this convention.

Chairman McCord moved the adoption of Resolution No. 4. Motion seconded.

A brief discussion folled conceming if our institutions and agencies were presently complying with the resolution. The resolution was voted on and passed.

## Resolution No. 4, Separation of Church and State

WHEREAS, The traditional and time-honored "wall" of separation of church and state in America is constantly in danger of being breached, and

WHEREAS, The most precious freedom any individual can possess in religious liberty and freedom, and

WHEREAS, Religious liberty and freedom as a guarantee of the constitution of the United States of America is gradually being eroded, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That this 125 th Annual Session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention reaffirm the unanimously approved action of the 1966 Convention as recorded on page 41 of the Annual of the 1966 Session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention: "we recommend that the Arkansas Baptist State Convention continue the practice of refusing grants of funds by the government to any church related institution'; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That we ask the trustees of our Baptist institutions to abide by the convictions of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in this matter; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That we call the attention of all state and national legislators to the 1947 ruling of the United States Supreme Court in the Everson Case of 1947: "No tax in any amount, large or small, can be levied to support any religious activities, or to support any religious institutions, whatever they may be called or whatever form they may adopt to teach or practice religion'"; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That all of our affiliated churches be asked to oppose all efforts to channel any tax money to private or parochial schools.

Chairman McCord moved the adoption of Resolution No. 5. Motion seconded. Lawson Hatfield, Arkansas Baptist Assembly manager, spoke to the resolution. A discussion followed with Al Sparkman, Crossett, suggesting the words "our state assembly grounds" be changed to "our Arkansas Baptist State Assembly grounds". The resolution was voted on and passed.

## Resolution No. 5, No Smoking Policy

WHEREAS, The body has been specified in the Bible as the temple of God and an holy habitation of the Spirit of God for every Christian; and

WHEREAS, smoking has been proven to be harmful to one's health and a destroyer of the body; and

WHEREAS, Smoking has been unofficially restricted in the past on our state assembly grounds; and

WHE REAS, smoking upon our Arkansas Baptist State Assembly grounds presents the high risk of fire upon the grounds;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That we call upon our state leaders to seek to enforce a no smoking policy upon all people (young and old alike) who use the state assembly grounds.

Chairman McCord moved the adoption of Resolution No. 6. Motion seconded. Brother McCord spoke to the resolution. The resolution was voted on and carried.

## Resolution No. 6, Divorce Laws

WHEREAS, The divorce rate is growing at an alarming rate due to the breakdown in the home; and

WHEREAS, The messengers to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention feel that our current divorce laws allow those seeking a divorce to do so with relative ease; and

WHEREAS, There is a bill proposed to be presented at the 1979 term of the Arkansas General Assembly, repealing the present divorce laws and allowing dirorce on only one ground, "irreconcilable difference, which have caused the irremedial breakdown of the marriage," and that it is popularly referred to as "no fault" divorce; be it

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That the Arkansas Baptist Convention go on record as being opposed to the proposed change in the divorce laws, especially to that portion which allows divorce regardless of fault of either party; be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That we encourage our churches to utilize every means to strengthen and sustain the unity and sanctity of family life.

Chairman McCord further reported that the remainder of the resolutions would be presented at 9:30 a.m. Thursday. Ray McClung led the congregation in singing "Onward Christian Soldiers".

## Voted: To Adopt Report of Nominating Committee

35. John R. Maddox, Wynne, chairman, brought the report of the Convention Nominating Committee and moved its adoption. Second and carried. (See pages 11-17 - for all boards and committees.) President Jackson presided over the remainder of the session.
36. Mrs. Margaret Kolb, Little Rock, reported that the World Hunger Committee was appointed by President Johnny Jackson, Sr., and met at the Baptist Building on May the 16 th to consider their work. The committee set as a primary goal the promotion of the first World Hunger Day on our Southern Baptist Calendar, on August the 2nd. This was done by mailout to pastors and associational missionaries and articles in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine. In the first seven months of 1978 , we received $\$ 12,660.64$ for World Hunger. During the months of August and September, we received a total of $\$ 22,746.82$ for a total for the first nine months of $\$ 35,407.46$. This added to the money that came in earlier puts us very near the $\$ 100,000$ mark that Dr. Ashcraft challenged us with in his editorial in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine. We also made the following statement which was carried in the Arkansas Baptist Newsmagazine, "To commend to the churches the Relief Programs of the Foreign and Home Mission Boards and to encourage their participation in special efforts related to these and not to be unmindful of the hungry people in Arkansas'. We make the following recommendations to the convention for their approval:
37. That the present committee continue their work until the Arkansas Baptist State Convention annual meeting in 1979.
38. That there be a continuing convention committee of six on World Hunger to be appointed by the Nominating Committee at the 1979 Convention.

Mrs. Kolb moved the adoption of the recommendation. Motion seconded and carried. Mrs. Kolb also reported that the Committee endorsed and are enthusiastic about Agricultural Missions Fellowship, consisting of farmers and preachers, being formed. Also the World Hunger Committee wishes to assist the Foreign Mission Board with our missionaries through this Fellowship of Arkansas Baptists.
37. Mrs. Joe Hogan, Harrison, brought the following recommendation from the State Joint Committee Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists and moved its adoption. Seconded and carried.

## Arkansas Baptists <br> Boldly Declare Their Faith*

We believe that we have one Father who created all mankind from one blood, one Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, one Holy Spirit, one commission to disciple all people, and one desire, which is to do the will of God; therefore, we will boldly declare our faith in 1979-1980.

THR OUGH a Cooperative State Evangelist Conference - January 29-31, 1979: Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas.

THROUGH Cooperative Associational Fellowship Meetings or Evangelistic Crusade;

THROUGH Cooperative Associational Surveys to determine areas of specific church program needs;

THROUGH a Cooperative State Convention session in Little Rock, November 1980, which will emphasize "Our Baptist Family of Faith".
*To be voted by the three cooperating conventions in their respective sessions November, 1978.
38. A brief report was heard from Paul Sanders, Little Rock, chairman of the Ministry of Crisis Support Committee, and R. H. Dorris, director of missions, concerning the State Convention of Baptists in Indiana Crusade.
39. Leslie Riherd, chairman of the Operating Committee, reported that the Operating Committee recommends that we authorize up to $\$ 15,000$ from the Reserve Fund to be used by the study committee on our Baptist Building. Seconded and carried.
40. David Wood, Harrison, brought the following statement:

Whereas, a part of the proposal agreed upon in the Kansas City Convention of 1977 was for the State Convention to turn back $50 \%$ of the undersignated funds to the national Southern Baptist Convention organization, and

Whereas, it will be at least 1993 before we reach that position if we conduct business as usual

I move that this 1978 Arkansas Baptist State Convention request the Executive Board to submit a plan to the 1979 Arkansas Baptist State Convention that would move us toward the goal of $50 \%$ of all undesignated receipts to our National Southern Baptist Convention by 1985.

David Wood spoke to the motion. The motion was seconded and carried with no discussion.
41. Steve Landers, Hope, moved that the President of the Convention ask a standing committee or appoint a committee to investigate the feasibility of expanding the current ministerial loan fund at Ouachita Baptist University to include all students pursuing church vocations. Motion seconded and carried.
42. Following miscellaneous business Jack Price brought the special music for the session. The annual sermon was by Kendell Black, Conway. The text was taken from Mark 1:29-2:12. Closing prayer was led by H.T. Ball, Little Rock.

## SECOND DAY - EVENING SESSION

## Wednesday, November 8, 1978 <br> "Boldness in Missions"

43. The session was opened at 6:30 p.m. at First Baptist Church, Little Rock, with choral praised by the Little Rock First Baptist Church choir directed by Jean Pilcher, Little Rock. This was followed by Glen Ennes, Little Rock, leading the congregation in singing "We Have Heard the Joyful Sound" and People to People".

The scripture reading, taken from Matthew 28:16-20, and prayer was by Wayne Davis, Van Buren.

The Woman's Missionary Union report was given by Mary Sawyer, state WMU president.

Charles H. Ashcraft, executive secretary of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, spoke on "Bold Missions in Arkansas". Following the message the congregation was led in singing "One World, One Lord, One Witness".

Jimmy Anderson, home missionary in Shawnee, Oklahoma, spoke on "Bold Missions in America". Following the message the congregation was led in singing, "Am I a Soldier of the Cross". Special music was by Jack Price.

Cal Guy, professor of missions at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, spoke on "Bold Missions in all the World".

A closing prayer was led by John Miller, Camden.

## THIRD DAY - MORNING SESSION

Thursday, November 9, 1978
"Boldness in Evangelism"
44. The session was opened at 8:45 a.m. at First Baptist Church, Little Rock, with Amon Baker, Little Rock, leading the congregation in singing "Heavenly Sunlight", "O Happy Day That Fixed My Choice", "I Will Sing the Wondrous Story", "God of Grace and God of Glory", and "No, Not One".

The scripture reading, taken from Romans 10:9-13, and prayer was by Dickson Rail, Benton. Dale Moody led the Bible study.

President Jackson announced that John Wright, Little Rock, had been added to the Resolutions Committee.

## Voted: To Adopt Resolutions

45. Eddie McCord, chairman of the Resolutions Committee, moved that Resolution No. 7 be adopted. Seconded and carried.

## Resolution No. 7, Television Programming

WHE REAS, we are surrounded with many indications of declining moral, ethical, and spiritual standards in our nation, and

WHEREAS, This lowering of such standards has resulted in the portrayal in mass media of immoral and questionable practices of normal life-styles, and

WHEREAS, there is an urgent need for Baptists and other concerned Christians to stand for high moral principles, be it therefore

RESOLVED, That this 125 th annual session protest television's use of illicit sex, casual violence, alcohol promotion, vulgarity, and profanity, and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to ABC, CBS, and NBC, the Arkansas television stations and the Federal Communications Commission.

Joe Hogan read Resolution No. 8 and moved its adoption. Seconded and carried.

## Resolution No. 8, On Pornography

WHE REAS, we are created in the image of God and our body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, and

WHEREAS, the body is to be used in every way to glorify God, and
WHEREAS, pornography seeks to exploit the body and desecrate the mind of both young and old, and

WHEREAS, pornography is a tool of Satan and a growing detriment to the moral climate of our state, nation, and world, and

WHE REAS, the University of Arkansas has allowed sexually explicit films to be shown in the Union, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that this Convention go on record as being diametrically opposed to pornography in any form, and be it further

RESOLVED, that we encourage our churches to become involved in the fight against pornography, and be it further

RESOLVED, that we commend Dr. Bishop, President of the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville campus, for his statement that such films will not again be shown.

Chairman McCord reported that the Committee had decided that the Resolution on the Ordination of Women had been thoroughly discussed last year during the convention meeting (see 1977 Annual, page 44) and the Committee did not feel it needed to be acted upon again this year.

David Crouch read Resolution No. 9 and moved its adoption. Following a second John Miller, Camden spoke for the resolution. The resolution was voted on and carried.

## Resolution No. 9, On Abortion

WHE REAS, Baptists are "People of the Blood", and
WHEREAS, the Bible teaches that all life is of God (Jer. 1:4-5; Ex. 21 : 22-25) from the moment of conception, and

WHE REAS, the practice of abortion wantonly destroys fetal life, dulls our society's moral sensitivity, and leads to a cheapening of all human life, and

WHEREAS, the practice of abortion encourages and supports the practice of permissive sex outside of marriage, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the messengers of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention go on record as being opposed to the practice of abortion, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the presiding officer of this convention write the Arkansas Hospital Association, the State Medical Board, and Arkansas NewsMedia, informing them of our position, and be it further

RESOLVED, that we as pastors and churches of this convention inform our people of the wrong of this practice.

John Wright read Resolution No. 10 and moved its adoption. Following a seocnd John Wright and Marilyn Simmons, Little Rock spoke for the resolution. No one spoke against the resolution. The resolution was voted on and carried with only a few votes in opposition.

## Resolution No. 10, Equal Rights Amendment

WHEREAS, we as Baptists, are "People of the Book", and
WHEREAS, we accept the Bible as the sole authority for matter of faith and practice and as a guide in matters of moral and soical issues, and

WHEREAS, the Bible teaches that we are all spiritually equal in the eyes of God, male and female (Galations 3:28), and

WHEREAS, the Bible also teaches roles and positions in life differentiating between male and female (Gen. 2:18; 3:16; 20; I Cor. 11:3; Ephesians 5:22-33), and

WHEREAS, the Equal Rights Amendment would undermind the Biblical teaching and damage the homes of America, be it therefore

RESOLVED, that the messengers of the 1978 Arkansas Baptist State Convention go on record as being opposed to the Equal Rights Amendment, and be it further

RESOLVED, that we encourage our pastors to warn the flock of the undermining effects that this amendment will have upon the homes and families of our nation, and be it further

RESOLVED, that we encourage our church and people to become involved in the fight against this amendment, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the presiding officer of this body inform our state and federal representatives of our position by sending them a copy of this resolution.
46. The Ouachita Baptist University report was given by Ed Coulter, vice president of Administration.
47. Johnny Jackson asked the convention to send a copy of the Equal Rights Amendment Resolution to President and Mrs. Jimmy Carter. The convention agreed by common consent. Bill Lewis was asked to preside at this point.
48. The Southern Baptist College report was given by Jack Nicholas, president.
49. The Christian Civic Foundation report was given by Edward W. Harris, executive director.
50. The Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care report was given by Johnny Jackson, executive director, with 12 year old Laura Dunn singing "I Am a Promise". President Jackson returned to preside for the remainder of the session.
51. A message was given by Jesse Reed, director of Evangelism, entitled "Building Evangelistic Churches in Arkansas". The text was taken from Deuteronomy 31 and Luke 19. Special music was by Jack Price.

The closing message was given by W. A. Criswell, pastor, First Baptist Church, Dallas Texas, entitled "The First Century Church".
52. A motion was made to adjourn, seconded, and carried. The One Hundred Twenty-fifth Session in the 130th year was adjourned with prayer by Harrison Johns, Conway.

## EXECUTIVE BOARD

## Charles H. Ashcraft, Executive Secretary

Dr. Kenneth Threet has served as Executive Board president this year. Serving with him were John Finn, chairman of the Program Committee; Ray Wells, chairman of the Finance Committee; Leslie Riherd, chairman of the Operating Committee; and Nodell Dennis, chairman of the Executive Board Nominating Committee. Meetings of the Board were held December 6, 1977, and August 15, 1978.

In the December 6, 1977, meeting the present housing allowance for ordained employees of the Executive Board was revised as follows, effective January 1, 1978.
"Each ordained staff employee of the Executive Board shall receive either $\$ 3,600$ or $\$ 4,500$, or $25 \%$ of his total compensation designated as a housing allowance, with each employee being given the option of determining which of the three amounts is applicable to his family circumstances. It is understood that this option does not increase or decrease the employee's total compensation, but only determines which portion of that total compensation is designated as a tax free housing allowance. It is also understood that each employee, and not the employer, is responsible to justify to Internal Revenue Service, if called upon to do so, the amount used and claimed for this purpose.
Each employee may change his option from year to year, but such changes must be requested in writing prior to January 1 of the year affected, and the option may not then be changed again during that calendar year."

## Personnel Matters

Benny Clark, Baptist Student Union Director at Arkansas State University, was given leave of absence with full salary considerations to serve as pastor of the distressed Kearns Baptist Church in Utah for one year as Arkansas' first participation in the Bold Mission Thrust.

Pete Petty, former director of missions in Washington-Madison Association, was employed as Director of Special Mission Ministries in the Missions Department, January 1, 1978.

Glen E. Ennes, was employed as associate in the Church Music Department effective June 15, 1978.

Lehman Webb was employed as Field Missionary in Church Extension, Missions Department, November, 1977.

Martin Babb was employed as Youth Consultant in the Sunday School Department effective August 15, 1978.

The Church Training Department employed an additional associate, Bill Falkner, effective in September of 1978.

Neal Guthrie, presently Pre-College Evangelism Associate, was elected Director of the Brotherhood Department effective January 1, 1979.

Dr. Bob Ferguson, director of Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists, was assigned the responsibility of Camp Paron Manager starting January 1, 1979.

Job descriptions were approved by the Board in the August 15, 1978, meeting: Feature/News Writer, ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE; Staff Reporter-Photographer, ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE; Assistant in Printing Services; and Director of Ministry of Crisis Support.

There was an extensive study done on the present Brotherhood Department. Areas of work to be included in the 1979 Brotherhood Department programs are:
(1) Responsible for men and boy's programs, including camp programs.
(2) Assignment for lay renewal programs and lay witness involvement.
(3) Responsible for World Mission Conferences.
(4) Responsible for developing church resources for human needs.

A permanent committee was appointed by the President of the Board to study the possible establishment of a retirement complex built and operated by Arkansas Baptists.

The Board also approved that a Christian Life Council of seven members from the Executive Board be nominated by the Nominating Committee of the Executive Board to serve staggered three year terms. The Christian Life Council will be under the direction of a staff person with the rank of associate.

The history of Arkansas Baptists is still in the process of being written due to some cancellations and delays.

Two new items were placed in the 1979 budget $\$ 35,000$ for the State Christian Life Commission and $\$ 50,000$ for the Ministry of Crisis Support.

## RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE CONVENTION:

1. The Executive Board recommends to the 1978 Arkansas Baptist State Convention that actual expense for housing, up to forty percent (40\%) of the total retirement annuity received through the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention shall constitute a rental allowance paid as part of the retired ordained minister's compensation for past services, effective January $1,1979$.
2. In compliance with the following resolution from the State Convention of Baptists in Indiana:

WHEREAS, Dr. E. Harmon Moore and Dr. Charles Ashcraft have discussed a linkage between the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the State Convention of Baptists in Indiana, to promote the Bold Mission Thrust and to help Indiana in its Bold Mission Thrust; and

WHEREAS, The Missions Director from Indiana and the Evangelism Director have met with the Missions Director from Arkansas and the Evangelism Director from Arkansas in the presence of Dr. Charles Ashcraft, the Executive Director from Arkansas and discusse the possibilities of a linkage between the two states to promote a Bold Mission Evangelistic Thrust; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Executive Board of the State Convention of Baptists in Indiana officially ask the Arkansas Baptist State Convention to help us by inviting 100 to 125 of their choice pastors to look at the fields which are white unto harvest in Indiana with the idea in mind that they will ask their congregations to enter into co-sponsorship with a church in Indiana to establish a new mission and that the same pastor be invited to participate in one of our churches in simultaneous revival effort April 1-8, 1979; and be it

RESOLVED FURTHER, That we ask the churches in Arkansas to pay the expenses of their pastor while on a mission visit or mission revival in Indiana and that we invite these churches to send mission groups, volunteers, their pastor and lay people to participate in the establishment of a mission or missions in Indiana.

The Executive Board recommends that the Arkansas State Convention respond to the request of the State Convention of Baptists in Indiana by endorsing the April 1-8, 1979, Evangelism crusade by encouraging 125 pastors to accept the invitation of Indiana Baptist to come at their own expense to preach in the 1979 crusade and that encouragement be given in the interest of developing new missions and churches in Indiana.
3. The Executive Board recommends that the proposed objectives and goals for Bold Mission Thrust, 1979-1982, be adopted as follows:

## PROPOSED <br> OBJECTIVES AND GOALS FOR BOLD MISSION THRUST <br> 1979-1982

Purpose: That every Southern Baptist understand, accept, and become involved in the mission to enable every person in the world to have the opportunity to hear and to respond to the gospel of Christ by the year 2000.
I. BOLD GROWING . . . by providing New Testament based churches and missions for all people . . .

1. Through increasing Bible Study enrollment in existing churches by $3 \%$ each year.
2. Through providing opportunities for all persons in their localities to hear the gospel, resulting in baptizing one person for every 27 Southern Baptists.
3. Through establishing 80 new church-type mission/churches.
4. Through establishing 20 points of witness in new geographic/cultural areas.
II. BOLD GOING . . . by seeking out the called and cooperating in the support of persons participating in the activities of Bold Mission Thrust.
5. Through churches seeking out the called and cooperating in the support of career mission volunteers.
6. Through encouraging the churches to seek out the called and to cooperate in supporting 5,000 Mission Service Corps and 250 other short-term mission volunteers.
7. Through encouraging the churches to seek out the called and to equip 25,000 church members to participate in presenting the gospel in their own localities.
III. BOLD GIVING . . . by providing adequate financial resources to accomplish Bold Mission Thrust.
8. Through enlarging the financial base in each church by an annual $15 \%$ increase.
9. Through doubling gifts through the Cooperative Program by 1982 (from 1977).
10. Through enlarging gifts for work through the associations by at least fifteen percent each year.
11. Through increasing the special mission offerings (foreign, home, state, associational) by $15 \%$ each year.
12. Through securing adequate gifts over and above regular gifts to send 5,000 Mission Service Corps missionaries.

## ANNUITY

The work of the Annuity Board in Arkansas is experiencing a slow, steady growth. The calendar year 1977 closed with a record number of new participants in the retirement program and with 24 new churches enlisted.

To this date (Sept. 12) for 1978 we have had 59 new members in the retirement program with 12 new churches enlisted. I am pleased to report that our churches are beginning to recognize the importance of this protection for all employees. This concern is reflected in the new members who are staff persons other than pastors, numbering almost one half of the new members this year.

Our work in September is concentrated on upgrading plans for those members still paying on the basis of a top salary of $\$ 4,000$ per year. Some churches who cannot go the full "Route 10" are beginning upgrading on a gradual basis with the ten percent as the goal.

Insurance plan applications have flooded our Dallas office this year.

For the first time the assembly met in six week-long sessions from mid-June through July. The following table reflects in part what happened this season. Some weeks were larger than others; however, all weeks were good experiences.

Compared to past records the attendance is down 210 from last year, professions of faith are 83 more than last year and church related vocational decisions are 43 less than last year. The record of 70 professions of faith in the sixth week may be an all time high record. Professions of faith are recorded in both the children's assembly (4-5-6 grades) and the youth-adult assembly.

The children's building (birth through 3rd grade) report a total of 258 persons enrolled. A total of 950 were enrolled in the children's assembly (4-5-6 grade). In the children's assemblies, there were 109 professions of faith. The youth-adult assemblies enrolled 4003 campers and reported 158 professions of faith. The result in evangelism, training, Bible study, stewardship, and missions is incalculable.

The assembly requires many hours of planning by members of the Sunday School department and others. Many pastors, staff members, denominational leaders, and a host of lay persons give time and effort to make the assembly a success.

An innovation occurred during the 5th week this summer. Glenn Stewart of Ft. Smith (Grand Ave. Church) organized an instrumental band which accompanied part of the evening music and presented a mini-concert. Hopefully an instrumental band may become a regular feature each week next summer.

Campers this summer enjoyed for the first time air-conditioning in the dining hall and tabernacle (youth-adult). We plan to air-condition the children's assembly next summer. Plans for insulating the dining hall and tabernacle will further improve the effect of the air-conditioning next summer. A new roof on the tabernacle is a must, too. Three volley ball courts were surface with the W. E. Gill memorial gazebo were new and helpful improvements. Also, the dining hall has a new floor and table tops.

Plans are underway for 1979 providing for six weeks, starting June 18 and closing July 28.

# ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE 

## J. Everett Sneed, Editor

The ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE has been in continual existence under the direction of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention since 1902. The paper exists to serve God and Arkansas Baptists. The editor and staff of the ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE are happy to give an accounting of our stewardship during the past year. It is our hope that we have been faithful stewards of our responsibility. During the year we have had a great deal of good news and some that is not so good to share with the Baptists of Arkansas.

## Good News:

We are grateful that both our circulation and number of churches receiving the ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE have reached the largest number in the history of the magazine. As of July 1, our circulation was 72,206, representing an increase of 1440 since the same time last year. There are currently 916 Every Resident Family plan churches, representing an increase of 46 churches since last year.

We have had an excellent response to the increased coverage that we have provided of our churches. It is our continuing desire to provide even greater coverage through the feature "Arkansas all over . . . people . . . briefly." It is our hope that in 1979 we will be able to provide an increasing number of small features spotlighting people in Baptist life in Arkansas.

The staff assisting Editor Sneed consists of Betty Kennedy, managing editor; Mary Giberson, secretary to the editor; Ann Taylor, bookkeeper; Millie Gill, staff writer. During the past year Mrs. Kennedy received seven state awards and one national award for her excellence in layout and design. Other members of the staff maintain the same high quality of professional excellence.

## Not So Good News:

The major problem confronting the Newsmagazine is economic inflation. Our greatest immediate problem is the increase in second class postage. The dramatic increase in this budget item is best shown by the fact that in 1972 our postage cost was less than $\$ 14,000$. This year, it will exceed $\$ 54,000$ ( $\$ 4,000$ more than we had anticipated and budgeted for), and next year it will exceed $\$ 60,000$. Almost every year unexpected increases are tacked on to the already heavy ones which we expect. In order to maintain a balanced budget it has become necessary for the Newsmagazine to increase its subscription cost two cents per subscriber per month.

The projected cost of the ABN in 1979 will be $\$ 2.52$ for the Every Resident Family plan; the Club plan, where 10 or more families pay annually in advance, will be only $\$ 3.12$; and the individual rate will be $\$ 3.50$. Where Every Resident Family is using the Newsmagazine the cost has increased only 52 cents since 1902.

## Conclusion:

We believe that even with increased prices due to inflation, the ARKANSAS BAPTIST NEWSMAGAZINE is one of the best bargains available to churches today. The Newsmagazine informs our churches as to the activity of their sister churches, the ministries of the State Convention, and the activity of our Southern Baptist mission efforts around the world. We appeal to pastors and church leaders to assist us in increasing our circulation to an even higher level. We believe that in so doing each church will be helping themselves as well as the entire kingdom's work. We believe that good Baptists are informed Baptists. Let us join hands so that all of our people may have proper information.

(a) . . . up to five Student-to-Student workers, recent college graduates, who spend one year in campus evangelism, Bible study, and dorm visitation.
(b) . . . up to five part-time BSU Directors at our five new community colleges at Harrison, Blytheville, Forrest City, Hot Springs, and Helena.
(c) . . . utilities at our proposed furloughing missionary residence at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville.
(d) . . . more money to work with our 850 International Students in Arkansas.
(e) . . . two hundred dollars extra for each of our Arkansas BSU Summer Missionaries.
(f) . . . enrichment money for special campus programs, speakers, etc.

## International Students

1. Our BSU Directors are working to find Christian families who will "adopt" those International Students who desire to have a host family for visits on some weekends and holidays.
2. An International Retreat is held each fall, in cooperation with WMU, as a time of fellowship and sharing of the Christian faith with Internationals.
3. A ministry to wives of international students, Friendship International, is operated in Little Rock and Fayetteville in cooperation with local church groups.

## Campus Evangelism

1. Many of our Baptist Student Unions continue to have Share Seminars and WIN Conferences to offer students the training they need to more effectively share their faith in Jesus Christ as Savior.
2. Our Student-to-Student workers who will be leading out in the areas of Bible study and campus evangelism this year are: Kathy Pack at the University of Central Arkansas, Steve Sarrett at Arkansas Tech University, Leigh Thurman at Henderson State University, and Richard Young at Ouachita Baptist University.

## Missions

1. There were over 50 Arkansas students who served as summer missionaries last summer.
2. Our Summer Missionaries reported great experiences with many professions of faith again this year. (Final tabulation of reports is not complete at this time, but each year several hundred conversions are reported by our summer missionaries.)

## Personnel Changes

1. Karen Allred, S-T-S worker at Fayetteville last year, is working as associate at Fayetteville during the time Jamie Jones leads the Third Centruy Endowment Campaign.
2. Mrs. Pat Herrin is now serving as BSU Director at Arkansas State University Beebe Branch.
3. Snow Donmoyer, a student at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, is serving as a seminary intern while Benny Clark serves one year as pastor in Kearns, Utah.

## BROTHERHOOD

## C. H. Seaton, Director

The basic task of the local church is the involvement in missions. This, of course, is reaching people with the gospel message ministering to their needs and teaching them to work and act like followers of Christ, or Christians.

Assisting churches in carrying out their task is the task assignment of the Brotherhood Department.

Brotherhood material is designed to enlist and assist men and boys through Royal Ambassadors and Baptist Men, in mission education and mission activities. Mission activities include sharing the message of Christ with the lost. Mission activities also include ministering to the needs of the total person.

Brotherhood and involvement of men and boysin missionary education and activities last year showed a small decrease Southwide. However, in Arkansas we are happy to report the increase was $7.9 \%$. For this increase, we are grateful. In three associations in J anuary and February, five new units were organized. The first three months of the year showed an increase of 2 new units per week.

Indication, by request for materials, is pointing to a steady growth for the remainder of the present year.

The Brotherhood Department, since the last report, has also conducted a State Royal Ambassador Fellowship Supper, attended by 350 boys, counselors, and pastors. On November 6, at Immanuel Church the 1978 supper will be held.

A Baptist Men`s Meeting was held at Camp Paron on March 10-11. Some 100 men from across the state spent the week-end in conferences on "Bold Missions." Bible study was led by Dr. W. W. Dishongh, pastor, First Baptist Church, Gentry, now at Immanuel, Vimy Ridge, in Alexander. It was a very profitable and inspiring time for those attending. Many of the men attending were confronted for the first time with the Biblical teachings concerning missions and their responsibilities. They expressed appreciation for the conference.

Mr. Forrest Sawyer, Brotherhood Director for Kentucky, challenged the men to become involved in mission activities in their church community. He of fered many suggestions for men and boys involvement.

James Cecil, from the Foreign Mission Board, shared ways and means for men to become involved in missions overseas either in a short or a long term period. A time of sharing ideas and experiences was provided at each session of the meeting.

On May 5-6, the State-wide Royal Ambassador Congress was held at First Baptist Church in Little Rock. Sixteen boys participated in the speakers contest. Thirteen of the boys were in the Pioneer age division. It is encouraging to see older Royal Ambassadors doing extra advancement work, which is required for the speakers contest. A new feature at the Congress was the Royal Ambassador car races.

Royal Ambassador Camps were held in June. The Lord blessed in many ways. Visible results were: Eight (8) boys saved, four (4) to full-time Christian vocation, and four (4) rededications.

The thrilling aspect of the decisions is the positive commitment of the older boys to missions and the service of personal witnessing.

Most of the boys who accepted Christ were won through the influence of the other boys. From the group will come our future leaders in Baptist life and world wide missions.

Only eternity will reveal the truly great impact of the camps in the life of each person attending, including staff and counselors.

We give thanks to God for his blessings, and for a great staff of workers who help in camp, at a real sacrifice, and make them possible.

Upcoming in September will be a training session of both associational and church Brotherhood officers, on September 15-16, at Camp Paron. Last year we had 35 in attendance.

The challenge to men and boys in the area of missions, as taught by Christ, is tremendous. The opportunities for service through involvement in mission activities is unlimited. The willingness of men and boys to respond, when opportunities for mission study and activities are provided, is unparalleled. They will respond when the church challenges them. Slowly, but surely, churches are accepting their responsibility to provide missionary education for men and boys. As the church provides and challenges, men and boys respond.

Missions and missionary personnel for tomorrow depend on boys who are enlisted and trained today.

The Brotherhood Department is ready to assist every church in providing missionary education for men and boys. We have the material available. Call on us, it will be our privilege to serve.

The director, C. H. Seaton, and office secretary, Jeanie Weber, consider it an honor to serve you.

## BUSINESS SERVICES

Roy F. Lewis, Director

The Division of Business Services functions in a supportive role to all other Baptist Building departments and to Arkansas Baptists as a whole. It provides services that enable other areas of ministry to operate efficiently and economically.

Several years ago an IBM System/32 computer was leased and installed in the Accounting Services office. The computer proved to be so satisfactory that the Executive Board authorized its purchase, and this has been accomplished without any change in the budget. The computer has been operated without any increase in accounting personnel, even though the volume of work has increased considerably. The operation has been so successful that several other state conventions and several Southern Baptist agencies have visited our offices to observe first hand our computer operation.

A year ago it was reported that a new copy machine had been rented. That machinc proved to be so efficient and economical that a larger and more sophisticated copy machine was leased when the lease on the first one expired. It, too, has increased efficiency at relatively little cost.

At the time of the last report, a new telephone system was in process of being installed in the Baptist Building. The installation has been completed and all personnel have been trained in the use of the new equipment. It has increased efficiency by adding a number of new services, as well as eliminating a number of serious weaknesses in the old telephone system. The new system also makes possible some savings in costs on long distance telephone calls, and it is expandable and adaptable to future needs.

During the year a number of physical repairs were completed on the Baptist Building, including the roof. The building is still structurally and physically sound, and should provide years of good service with proper maintenance.

Some minor renovations were completed in the building during the year to make available some additional space. However, it should be noted that there is no additional available space for any new department or major expansion which the Executive Board or convention might see fit to authorize in the future.

Some changes in procedures were effected in the use of the parking lot, making possible a better utilization of total spaces. However, during times when meetings are in progress or many visitors are in the Baptist Building, parking space is still extremely limited.

Inflation is a continuing problem for all families and organizations. The cost of utilities has escalated rapidly, and the Building Services personnel have implemented several energy-saving procedures to keep these costs as low as possible.

Another area of unexpected cost increases has been in insurance coverage. A review of our insurance coverage revealed that many of our properties, including the Baptist Building itself, were under-valued. In each case coverage was increased to a realistic value, so that adequate coverage can be maintained. This necessitated an increase in premium costs.

In addition to the premium cost increase, the rates were increased in Ar kansas, primarily due to severe weather and tornado losses. This raised the rates for everyone and is beyond the control of anyone.

Economic conditions have made the functions of the Business Services Division more difficult, but, notwithstanding that fact, the past year has been one of progress and improvement. The personnel employed in the division are happy with the contribution that their efforts make toward the total missionary task of the Baptist State Convention.

## CAMP PARON

1978 has been a busy year for Camp Paron. Through October the facilities have been in use by various groups for 30 days, plus the months of June, July, and August when the camp was in use by Royal Ambassadors, G. A.'s, and Acteens. Several tentative bookings during November and December will complete a full schedule.

Royal Ambassador, G. A. and Acteen camps utilize all the time in June, July, and August; these organizations have a first priority on use of the facilities. Other departments in the Baptist Building have second priority and use the facilities several times during the year.

Many churches across the state use Camp Paron for youth retreats, adult choirs, young married groups and Senior Citizen retreats.

The camp facilities are available for use by church groups, etc., when available, on a first-come, first-served basis.

At this date (July 7) it is impossible to know how many people have been involved in use of the camp facilities. Indications are, however, that more than 3,200 will have been involved before the year is over.

For the many words of appreciation for the fine facilities at Camp Paron, that have come to us, we are grateful. People attending meetings express appreciation for the fine facilities provided by Arkansas Baptists.

The camp staff seeks to render a real Christian service to all who come to Camp Paron.

Horace Pruitt serves as resident manager. He is an ordained minister and a graduate of Ouachita.

Mrs. Opal Doughty serves as kitchen supervisor. She and her helpers provide excellent meals for camps and retreats. She is an active member of Harmony Baptist Church.

Jeanie Weber, Brotherhood Department office secretary, also serves as secretary for Camp Paron facilities.

We are grateful for a fine dedicated staff. Call on us if we may be of further service. It will be our pleasure to serve you.

## CHURCH MUSIC

## Ervin Keathley, Secretary

Church Music is alive and growing in Arkansas. Our department experienced a 5.7 percent increase last year, which amounted to 2,195 more persons enrolled in the music ministry of the local churches. The total enrollment of the music ministry of Arkansas Baptist churches now stands at 40,935.

This 5.7 percent increase represents the second largest numerical gain in music enrollment in the Convention. The credit for this must go to the local churches for the continuing efforts of their music leadership. We praise the Lord for His continued blessing of the music ministry among Arkansas Baptists. The aim of our department is to provide leadership on the state level to assist local churches and associations to maintain, enlarge, and strengthen their ministry through music.

Mr. Glen Ennes joined our department staff in June. His major responsibilities will lie in the areas of instrumental work and work with small churches. Mr. Ennes' background in public school band work and his many years of serving churches on a part-time basis as music director has prepared him well for his work among Arkansas Baptists.

The snow let up just enough for us to have a very fine workshop this year. Mr. Leroy McClard, former State Music Secretary, was our clinician. ## 5. Music Camps

Youth/Adult Music Camp was an excellent experience for the 196 who attended. This camp is actually divided into two groups: Senior High and adults together and Junior High in a group to themselves. Both groups studied anthem literature covering the full range of musical history.

Dr. Charles Wright conducted the Sr . High/Adult group and Mr. Morris Ratley conducted the Jr. High group. Performances of each group were excellent.

Young Musicians Camp was crowded this year. 637 enrolled for the 600 available beds. The campers were divided into four choral groups, and each group memorized a musical or cantata. Basic music theory was taught each day, as well as a study of some Great Hymns.
6. Bold Missions: Northwest Simultaneous Crusade

Approximately 25 ministers of music from Arkansas assisted the churches of the Northwest Convention in simultaneous revivals this spring as a part of our Bold Mission involvement. Arkansas churches bore the expenses of their ministers of music in each case. Most of them served in very smallmission situations, and each reports good response to their ministry. We want to express our appreciation to these staff members for their willingness to be involved in Bold Mission, and to their churches for catching the vision and providing the funds.

## 7. Central Training Team

The Central Training Team is available to help churches and associations train their music leadership. They are available individually or as a team to assist you and you may schedule them through the music department. The department will pay their transportation, and the church or association is responsible for their room, board, and a modest honorarium.

# CHURCH TRAINING DEPARTMENT 

Robert Holley, Secretary

## I. Department Tasks

The department has responsibility for the Church Training Program, Church Administration, Family Ministry, Church Library and Church Recreation. In each of these areas the department's primary responsibility lies in the area of leadership development. The department's program and projects are directed to pastors, church staff members, Church Training leaders, church library and church recreation leaders, church officers and committees, deacons and church secretaries.

In planning and conducting projects in these areas, the department works in close cooperation with these departments at the Sunday School Board. It is our objective to assist the churches to train their leaders for effective leadership so they in turn will be able to lead their members to grow in Christian discipleship. In each of our training projects it is our objective to assist the churches in their efforts to "prepare all God's people for the work of Christian service, to build up the body of Christ (Eph. 4:12 TEV).

## II. Review of 1977-78

1. Church Training Program

This past year (1977-78) has been the second year of a three-year emphasis on training for discipleship. The emphasis has been on "CHURCH: the Sunday Night Place for Experiencing Discipleship." The projects that have been conducted by the Church Training Department have been planned to help strengthen the church's program of discipleship training.
(1) There are 1229 churches in the Arkansas Baptist State Convention with a total Church Training enrollment of 80,321. Arkansas ranks second in the Southern Baptist Convention in the percentage of churches with a Church Training Program.
(2) The annual Church Training Convention was held at Immanuel Church, Little Rock, on October 27, 1977, with participants from 90 churches representing 29 associations.
(3) Church Training Growth Projects were conducted in three associations. These were Ashley, Southwest and N. Pulaski Associations.
(4) Pastor-Director Fellowships were conducted in three associations.
(5) The second annual Associational Church Training Leadership Conference was conducted on August 19-20, 1977, with 86 associational leaders participating.
(6) Associational "M" Night was conducted in 39 associations with a total attendance of 6,618 representing 581 churches. Trinity Association received the High Attendance Plaque. Big Creek Association received the Efficiency Plaque.
(7) Church Training Leadership Conferences were conducted in eleven associations.
(8) The annual State Youth Convention met on March 24, 1978, in Little Rock with approximately 4,500 in attendance.
(9) Preschool-Children's Workshops were conducted in nine areas of the state with 270 participants from 54 churches and 16 associations.
(10) District Bible Drills and Speakers' Tournaments were conducted in each of the eight districts with 110 participants from 21 associations participating. Steve Chasteen from First Church, Garfield, was selected to represent our state in the Youth Bible Drill at Ridgecrest. Donna Ginn from First Church, West Memphis, was chosen to represent our state in the Youth Speakers' Tournament at Glorieta.
(11) Church Training Leadership Training Conferences were conducted in 15 churches and personal consultations were held with a number of other churches.
(12) Arkansas' first Pastor-Director Retreat was held at Camp Paron on August 11-12, 1978.
(13) The third annual Associational Leadership Training Conference was held at Park Hill Church, North Little Rock, on Aug. 25-26, 1978.
2. Church Administration
(1) A State Deacon Ministry Conference was conducted on Sept. 30October 1, 1977. In addition, deacon training conferences were conducted in five churches and one association.
(2) A Pastors' Planning and Leadership Seminar was conducted at DeGray Lodge on February 27-March 1, 1978.
(3) A Personal Growth Conference for Ministers of Education was conducted at DeGray Lodge on May 25-26, 1978, with 19 participants.
(4) A Youth Ministry Conference was held at Camp Paron on April 28-29, 1978, with 65 participants.
(5) Church Vocations Conferences were conducted for church vocations volunteers during each of the weeks at Siloam Springs during the summer of 1978 and in one association.
(6) A Church Officers and Committee Clinic was conducted for one association and a Nominating Committee Clinic was held in two churches.
(7) An ABC's of Church Administration Conference was held on the Ouachita Campus on October 21-22, 1977.
3. Family Ministry
(1) Two Marriage Enrichment Retreats were conducted with 20 couples participating.
(2) Two Family Ministry Workshops for pastors and staff members were conducted with 30 participants.
(3) Family Enrichment Conferences were conducted in three churches.
(4) Marriage Enrichment "Mini-Retreats" were conducted in three associations.
(5) Marriage Enrichment Interpretation Conferences were conducted in five churches and associations.
(6) Consultation was provided to four churches and associations in planning for Family Enrichment Conferences.
4. Church Library
(1) A Church Library Conference was conducted during the annual Church Training Convention with 19 participants.
(2) A Regional Library Clinic was held in North Little Rock on February 24-25, 1978.
(3) Five Area Church Library Conferences were held April 10-15, 1978, with 58 participants from 33 churches.
(4) Workshops were conducted for three churches.
5. Church Recreation
(1) Four Area Church Recreation Workshops were conducted November 14-18, 1977, with 132 participants.

Mrs. Bill Gresham, office secretary and receptionist, has served in the department for the past seven years. Mrs. Leslie Wilfong has served as a part-time secretary in the department for the past three years and serves as a Special Youth Worker.

# COOPERATIVE MINISTRIES WITH NATIONAL BAPTISTS 

Robert U. Ferguson, Director

Cooperative Ministries is a cooperative program of Arkansas National and Southern Baptists with support from the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. As members of the Baptist family of faith we are supportive of one another and interested in sharing the message of Jesus Christ with all persons in our state. We seek to strengthen churches and associations in their work of Christian ministry.

Six STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONARIES spent 10 weeks in black churches, conducting VBS'S, youth camp, and youth programs, enrolling 2,065 youth resulting in 31 prof essions of faith.

Eighteen college students and 12 seminary students were assisted with scholarship funds totaling $\$ 5,400$.

BAPTIST STUDENTS UNION activities at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, Rev. Lacy Solomon, Director, enrolled 200 students in Bible classes, and others were engaged in various BSU-sponsored activities.

Nine EXTENSION CENTERS for in-service training enrolled 231 pastors and laymen in Blytheville, El Dorado, Fordyce, Lewisville, Little Rock (two), Malvern, Pine Bluff, and West Memphis.
"HART OF THE HILLS" Camp at Paron was attended by 217 campers in a two-week program with 14 professions of faith.

Sixty-two LEADERSHIP CLINICS AND INSTITUTES across the state enrolled 2,386 persons.

JOINT COMMITTEES are formed in Bartholomew, Calvary, Central, Pulaski, North Pulaski, Harmony, Southwest, and Tri-County associations, with other associations studying the idea.

The STATE JOINT COMMITTEE has met twice with representatives from all three cooperating conventions in attendance.

Joint Baptist WOMEN'S DAY OF PRAYER programs and Race Relations Days are encouraged.

Ricky Armstrong, A NATIONAL BAPTIST MINISTERIAL STUDENT from Ouachita Baptist University served as ASSISTANT to the CHAPLAIN at Tucker Intermediate Reformatory where young black first offenders are housed. Fourteen professions of faith and numerous rededications are registered.

National and Southern Baptists AREA FELLOWSHIP MEETINGS were held in El Dorado, Dermott, Hot Springs, and Texarkana. Plans are to enlarge this activity to other areas of the state.

## COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

Roy F. Lewis, Associate Executive Secretary

At the end of June, as 1979 budgets were being prepared, Cooperative Program receipts were 11.49 percent over those for the same period during the previous year, and all indications point to another record year in mission giving for Arkansas Baptists.

The early months of 1978 provided some severe weather conditions for Arkansas, but church receipts did not seem to be affected as seriously as happened in 1977. Consequently, Cooperative Program receipts from the churches continued at a much better rate than might have been expected.

For the past seven consecutive years the state convention has increased the percentage of its receipts going to the Southern Baptist Convention. The budget being recommended to the convention will provide another increase of one-half percent, which, if approved, will make the eighth consecutive year.

The utilization of a furloughing foreign missionary as a missionary-in-residence for Cooperative Program promotion continues to be a blessing to Arkansas Baptists. James Hampton completed a year of service in June and returned to East Africa, where he is now serving as field representative for the Foreign Mission Board. His election and promotion to that position took place while he was on furlough in Arkansas.

Gilbert Nichols, missionary to Paraguay, began a year of such service in June. Mr. Nichols served as the first missionary-in-residence in Arkansas under this program and is repeating the service for a second time. So far as is known, this is the first time in the Southern Baptist Convention that a missionary has served two successive furloughs in the same arrangement, and this will represent an experiment for the Foreign Mission Board.

Every state convention has some churches which do not contribute to missions through the Cooperative Program. However, the ratio in Arkansas compares quite favorably with other states and continues to be reduced in number each year. Seven years ago the number of churches that did not contribute to the Cooperative Program was over one hundred; that number has now been reduced to fewer than fifty.

The efforts of Southern Baptists to evangelize the world by the year 2000 are being structured in an emphasis known as Bold Mission Thrust. Financial support is vital to the success of this effort, and the Cooperative Program continues to be the main channel of support for Southern Baptist ministries. Arkansas Baptists are continuing to demonstrate their commitment to the Great Commission through their financial support of missions at home and abroad.

## EVANGELISM

Jesse S. Reed, Director

The Evangelism Workshop at Paron was a great success with 38 leaders in evangelism present.

We have 12 Arkansas leaders in evangelism trained as PREP men. This stands for Presenting Revival and Evangelism Preparation in the local church.

Several WIN schools have been conducted by Clarence Shell and Jesse Reed in local churches and Siloam Springs Assembly. Our lay people have shown a keen interest in learning how to witness.

194 youth were trained to share their faith more effectively during WOW training at Siloam Springs this past season. There were several professions of faith due to the witness of these classes.

There have been approximately 25 WOW schools this year. One of these was to over 200 in Michigan, taught by Neal Guthrie.

Clarence Shell has conducted 15 revivals and helped several others prepare for revival and crusades.

Renewal Evangelism has taken strides as more churches become interested. This emphasis will be moved into the Brotherhood Department as Neal Guthrie, the newly elected Director takes this position January 1, 1979.

The tent is an exciting new feature in Arkansas evangelism. Great interest has been shown in the use for Area Crusades, new churches and reaching the lost who do not come to our churches.

Area Evangelism Conferences were held September 10-14. There were 573 people in attendance. The purpose of these conferences is to reach people who are too far removed from Little Rock to get in on our Statewide Evangelism Conference. Almost everyone in the state can attend an Area Evangelism Conference every three years and not have to drive over 50-70 miles.

Clarence Shell's new manuals, Associational Simultaneous Revival Prepparation Manual for Association and Local Church and Area Crusades Preparation Manual, are really moving in a great way.

There will be a Revival Preparation Seminar during the Evangelism Workshop, November 30-December 1, 1978. This will train the Directors of Missions, Chairmen of Evangelism and PREP men in total mass evangelism.

Joy Explo '78, Youth Evangelism Conference will be held December 28-29, 1978 at Second Baptist Church, Hot Springs. Dave Bennett, the new consultant for Youth Evangelism at the Home Mission Board will be the feature speaker. Other speakers include Glen Iglehart of Home Mission Board Interfaith Witness Department and Neal Jeffrey of the F.C.A. in Texas. Special music and Drama plus activities at "The Place" are all planned again.

January 14 is Commitment Witnessing Day. I challenge all pastors to preach on some phase of equipping the saints in personal witnessing.

January 29-30 will be the time for our Statewide Evangelism Conference. We shall have several special conferences such as "A People Search," "Women in Direct Evangelism," "Revival Music," "Revival Countdown for the Local Church," "Using the Sunday School in Evangelism," "Preparation for Baptist Doctrinal Study," "Bus Ministry," "Renewal in Revival," "The Work of the Chairman of Evangelism," "The Deacons Roll in Evangelism." There will be two periods of these conferences which will be identical. One will be on Monday afternoon and the other on Tuesday night. Dr. John Havlik of the Home Mission Board Division of Evangelism will be our Bible Teacher. Dr. Frederick Sampson from Detroit, Michigan will be one of the main speakers. Dr. James Semple, First Baptist Church, Paris, Texas will be another guest speaker and W. B. Oakley, former Secretary of Evangelism in Michigan will be one of the main speakers.

The theme of the conference will be "The Doctrines of Salvation." The conference will begin Monday afternoon, January 29 at 1:45 and close Tuesday night, January 30.

Area Evangelism Conferences will be held September 10, 11, 13, and 17. In conjunction with our Area Evangelism Conferences will be Stewardship Conferences under the leadership of Bro. James Walker. W. B. Oakley will be the preacher and Dr. Ernie Perkins, Director of Missions in Concord Association, will be the Bible Teacher. There is one exception to this. Dr. Roy Fish will be the preacher for the service on the 17 th at First Baptist Church, Heber Springs.

## STATE MISSIONS

## R. H. Dorris, Director

The purpose and objective of the Department of Missions is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its task of bringing men to God through Jesus Christ by developing and promoting, in cooperation with churches and associations, old and new outreach ministries into all changing facets of modern life in response to the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20).

## Direct Missions

Beginning with 1978, several mission actions previously included in Direct Missions have been transferred to the new division of Church Extension within this department. The following is a summary of Direct Mission ministries from September 1, 1977, to August 31, 1978:

CHURCH PASTORAL AID has provided 36 numerically small missions and churches with $\$ 45,249$ to supplement salaries to their pastors. Much of this assistance is given to enable the congregation to have a full-time pastor and move toward being self-sufficient. The Home Mission Board began this year providing some aid through Direct Missions according to the basic 60/40 cooperative agreement.

STUDENT PREACHING AID is given currently to churches using students enrolled in undergraduate work in colleges within the state.

ASSOCIATIONAL PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT is now being provided only one association to help provide a full-time director of missions. The trend has consistently been toward self-support among the state's associations.

BOLD MISSION THRUST goal for new congregations is 20 annually through 1982. During the period covered by this report, 19 new churches and missions have been organized.

Emphasis on new work began in 1975 and has resulted in a total net gain of 31 churches in the Convention through 1977. This contrasts vividly with the net growth of only 10 churchesfrom 1965-74. October 1, 1977, there were 1229 churches and 35 missions affiliated with the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

LINKAGE WITH INDIANA CONVENTION of Southern Baptists for 1979 will provide Arkansas pastors and churches evangelism and mission opportunities in keeping with Bold Mission Thrust. One hundred or more pastors are expected to participate in simultaneous revivals in Indiana April 1-8, 1979. Several Arkansas churches will join with an Indiana church in the co-sponsorship of a new congregation that will grow out of the revival.

MISSION SERVICE CORPS will enlist volunteer missionaries for 1 to 2 years to serve at home or abroad. This will be a part of the attempt of Southern Baptists to place 5000 volunteer missionaries in service by 1982. Arkansas will need to provide at least 200.

IN-SERVICE GUIDANCE is a cooperative venture between the Missions Department and the Home Mission Board at Ouachita Baptist University to provide counseling and "on the job" training for ministerial students. A faculty member assists in placing students in church-related vocations and guides their development. This program will be expanded to Southern Baptist College campus as quickly as funds are available.

CONTINUING EDUCATION includes the offer of conferences and seminars for pastors and other church staff persons in addition to Seminary Extension and the Little Rock Center of the Boyce Bible School.

## Chaplaincy Ministries

INSTITUTIONAL CHAPLAINCY: The Convention still employs five chaplains to serve Cummins Prison, Boys and Girls Training Schools of the Youth Services Division, the Hot Springs Rehabilitation Center, and the Booneville Unit of the Children's Colony.

STUDENT CHAPLAINS: Two Ouachita University students serve the Tucker and Cummins units of the Department of Corrections. They work on weekends under the supervision of the senior chaplain and are paid as student pastors are paid.

PROFESSIONS OF FAITH: The chaplains witnessed 111 persons saved during the past year. This is an increase of 29 over the previous year. Many of these were baptized into local Baptist churches.

VOLUNTEER CHAPLAINS: Many pastors are becoming involved in volunteer ministries in institutions, local and county jails, industries, hospitals, etc., as part of greater involvement in Bold Mission Thrust.

## Church Extension

REVOLVING LOAN FUND benefited nine churches from September 1, 1977 to August 31, 1978, with loans amounting to \$69,480, while eight other churches are on the waiting list.

BUILDING AID GRANTS were made to eight churches during the same period of time for a total of $\$ 26,000$.

NEW MISSION SITES funds for the establishing of missions and churches required $\$ 47,000$ on five locations.

SEMINARY EXTENSION, a part of Continuing Education, has 11 centers in Arkansas. Many of these are under the direction of the associational director of missions in the association where they are located. A steady increase is being experienced in the number of students in Seminary Extension by Home Study.

## Special Missions Ministries

STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONARIES: Thirty-seven Student Summer Missionaries and eight Sojourners were trained in orientation June 6-9, 1978, and served the following 10 weeks in resort, inner city, and outreach ministries.

US-2 MISSIONARY James Crookham completed his term of service with Special Missions Ministries of Pulaski County Association in August.

ASSOCIATIONAL SPECIAL MINISTRIES DIRECTORS are serving two associations.

THE MIGRANT MISSION CENTER reports 158 professions of faith among the migrant farm laborers to whom it ministers, during the past year.

A SPECIAL MINISTRIES CONFERENCE on ministering to the wheelchair person was held in Little Rock.

INTERFAITH WITNESS AWARENESS CONFERENCES were held in Texarkana and El Dorado with 300 in attendance.

## Language Missions

MINISTRIES TO THE DEAF are currently provided by 19 churches.
THE STATE INTERPRETERS WORKSHOP was held at Life Line Baptist Church, Little Rock.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST CONFERENCE OF THE DEAF met on the campus of Ouachita Baptist University in Arkadelphia, June 23-25.

INTRODUCTION TO AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE classes were taught by Robert Parrish, Director of Language Missions, during the spring semester at Ouachita Baptist University. He will teach an introductory class and an advanced class in sign language in the fall semester. Several 14 -week sign language classes have been taught in the state this year.

YOUTH CAMP: The Arkansas-Louisiana Deaf Youth Camp disbanded for the 1978 summer session, but an Arkansas Deaf Youth Camp will be established in 1979.

WORK WITH HISPANICS: Grupo Cristiano Latinoamericano, Hispanic congregation sponsored by Lakeshore Drive Church, Little Rock, and the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, continues to grow under the leadership of Donoso Escobar. Elias Pantoja, catalytic missionary living in Memphis, has been working in the Hughes area, Arkansas Valley Association, teaching Friday night Bible studies to Hispanic people, with an average attendance of 49. A Hispanic Vacation Bible School was conducted the week of June 12-16 with an enrollment of 89 and an average attendance of 65 . Two students at Ouachita University, Debbie and John Maygar, worked with Bartholomew Association in providing Bible study and worship services for migrant workers in the Warren area. A strong interest is growing in providing ministries to the 26,000 Spanishspeaking people in Arkansas.

VIETNAMESE MINISTRY: Several churches are sponsoring resettled Vietnamese families. Grand Avenue Church, Ft. Smith, provides worship services through a Vietnamese interpreter and other activities for families in the area. This year they extended their ministry to Laotians and Cambodians. Jim Files is pastor.

PROFESSIONS OF FAITH among language congregations numbered 152.

## STEWARDSHIP

## James A. Walker, Secretary

Bold Mission Thrust calls Baptists to action. It is more than a slogan conceived by visionaries. Bold Mission Thrust is mission. Every church, every denominational organization, and every believer can take seriously the call to present the gospel to all people by 2000 A.D.

Stewardship is a vital part of Bold Mission Thrust. The Stewardship Department works with churches and associations in the development of Christian stewards. These services undergird Bold Mission Thrust:

- Over 230,000 pieces of literature, provided through Cooperative Program gifts, were given to the churches last year. Seventy-three churches requested eleven films and filmstrips.
- Each church received a packet of stewardship promotional materials.
- Forty-two churches used the services of the Stewardship Secretary for consultation on budget development and stewardship emphasis.
- Twenty-five associations called on the Stewardship Secretary for a special emphasis on stewardship development. The conferences focused on principles of budgeting, bookkeeping, stewardship materials, and stewardship sermons.
- A booklet on staff salaries was produced in cooperation with the Annuity Department. This is available to all churches.
- "Building for Today's Challenge" consultants were trained during the year. These men are available to assist the churches in building fund campaigns.
- Gilbert Nichols works with the Stewardship Department as a missionary-in-residence. He relates world mission support to the Cooperative Program through engagements with churches and associations.

The goals of Bold Mission Thrust will continue to direct the objectives of the Stewardship Department. Plans for 1979 include:

- A packet of materials to each church encouraging budget development and increases in mission support.
- Information on a new budget subscription program from the Stewardship Commission will be shared with the churches.
- Area Stewardship Conferences are scheduled in conjunction with Area Evangelism Conferences during September.


## SUNDAY SCHOOL

## Lawson Hatfield, Director <br> OUR OBJECTIVE

The objective of the Sunday School Department is to support the Arkansas Baptist State Convention in its constitutional purpose - "to awaken and stimulate among the churches the greatest possible activity in evangelism, Christian education, and benevolent work throughout its bounds and to the ends of the earth; to cultivate closest cooperation among the churches and to promote concert of action in advancing all the interests of the Kingdom of God."

## NEW STATEMENT OF TASKS

This report reflects the department's efforts to support the overall Sunday School tasks. A new statement of the tasks is as follows:

1. Reach persons for Bible study
2. Teach the biblical revelation
3. Witness to persons for Christ and church membership
4. Lead persons to worship daily
5. Minister to Sunday School members and non-members
6. Provide and interpret information concerning the work of the denomination

## DECREASE IN ENROLLMENT REPORTED

After having experienced an increase in enrollment for five years, Arkansas Baptist Sunday Schools reported a loss of 517 in enrollment during 1976-77. The Southern Baptist Convention Sunday School enrollment also showed a slight decrease. Hopefully, the churches will reverse this possible trend and again show a total gain for the state.

## A CORRECTION

For historical reference, two errors in the 1976 annual should be noted as follows: Summary - Part A, page 265; total for Sunday School Enrollment, 233,211 and Total Mission Expenditures, \$9,180,311.

## THE PEOPLE REACHER DESIGNED AND TESTED

To help small churches gain in enrollment, The People Reacher was designed and tested in Arkansas churches. Designed for churches with fewer than 150 enrolled in Sunday School, this project was the outcome of the continuing education program provided by the executive board for its employees. The department director earned the Doctor of Ministry degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in December, 1977, and designed and tested The People Reacher as a ministry project.

The Higginson Church (Calvary Association) tested the project and experienced an unprecedented growth of 150 percent in enrollment and $85 \%$ in attendance. The church led the Association in baptisms, with 43 baptized last year.

## STANDARD OF EXCELLENCE

Another pioneer project of the department was to rewrite a new Arkansas Standard of Excellence for evaluating Sunday School work. In the past two years about 12 churches each year have applied the Standard successfully in their work.

## ASSISTANCE TO ASSOCIATIONS AND CHURCHES

A inajor part of the department's work is helping associationsto strengthen their Sunday Schools. Department staff members assisted 23 associations in 45 projects.

Assistance was given to associational leadership in three state projects. (1) The Association Faculty Training Clinic was designed to help age-group team members reach the "Working" series of study course books in associational training schools. This clinic was held in Calvary Church, Little Rock on January 10, 1978. (2) The state Vacation Bible School Clinic, held on February 14, 1978 at Pulaski Heights Church, Little Rock, trained approximately 250 team members to lead conferences in associational VBS clinics. (3) Eight Briefing meetings around the state gave associational Sunday School directors and directors of missions an overview of the 1978-79 Sunday School program.

Assistance was given to 47 churches in 56 projects.

## ADDITIONAL TRAINING PROJECTS

A Weekday Early Education Workshop was held November 21-22 in Pulaski Heights Church, Little Rock. The workshop was held in conjunction with the Missions Department.

On April 11 a Weekly Planning Meeting Workshop was held in Olivet Church, Little Rock.

Two Creative Teaching Workshops were held, one in Immanuel Church, Pine Bluff, on May 9, and another in Grand Avenue Church, Fort Smith on May 11.

The annual Sunday School Convention was held in Olivet Church, Little Rock on September 18-19. The convention theme was "Witnessing Through Bold Reaching and Teaching."

## REGIONAL AND BSSB TRAINING PROJECTS

Department personnel and selected age-group workers participated in the Memphis Metro Reach Clinics held in conjunction with the Sunday School departments and neighboring associations in Tennessee and Mississippi and the Sunday School department of the Baptist Sunday School Board. These clinics were held in October, 1977.

Lawson Hatfield and Freddie Pike served on the faculty during Sunday School week at the Glorieta Conference Center.

Department personnel and selected conference leaders attended four training and planning projects sponsored by the Sunday School Board.

## CHURCH BUILDING CONSULTATION

Church building consultations are coordinated for churches and associations. Assistance is available for designing new building floor plans, remodeling, redecorating, and landscaping. Associational homes, offices, and camp ground drawings are also available.

## CHANGE IN DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL

Freddie Pike submitted his resignation, effective August 14, 1978, after having served as youth consultant in the department since January 1, 1973.

Martin Babb began his work as youth consultant on August 16, 1978.

## WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Julia Ketner, Executive Director

Arkansas Woman's Missionary Union has as its purpose to assist churches and associations in establishing, conducting, and improving missions education in the churches. Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends provide the structure for women, girls, and preschoolers to learn about and become involved in local, home, and foreign missions.

During 1977-78, Woman's Missionary Union's emphasis has been "Teach Missions: to be, to do." Among activities promoted to reinforce the emphasis were: churchwide studies of the Foreign and Home Mission Graded Series books, WMU Focus Week, Missions Night Out, regular weekly or monthly age-level meetings, Round Table Book Club, and North Central Missions Thrust prayer partners, study and mission projects.

In relationship to the Teach Missions emphasis, missions education in local churches was a priority for Arkansas WMU. A bold mission goal was set for beginning missions education in 150 churches without any WMU organizations. Each associational WMU was challenged to begin WMU in five such churches.

Leader training opportunities were programmed to strengthen the Teach Missions emphasis. These included:

One day Statewide Church WMU Leadership Conference, September 7 at Immanuel Baptist, Little Rock. Seventeen conferences were offered with 502 attending.
Five area Church WMU Leadership Conferences held at First Baptist, Stuttgart; First Baptist, Camden; First Baptist, Walnut Ridge; First Baptist, Rogers; and First Baptist, Mena. Attendance totaled 404. Gilbert Nichols, missionary to Paraguay, was program guest at Stuttgart, Camden, and Walnut Ridge, while Judy Robertson, Taiwan, spoke at Rogers and Mena.
Six area Leadership Conferences for Associational WMU Leaderslip with 119 attending and 26 associations represented.
Three GA Day Camp Workshops held at First, West Memphis; First, Little Rock; and Immanuel, Fort Smith.
Leader training was also provided in associations and churches upon request. Approximately one hundred and five (105) Arkansas WMU women attended WMU Week at Glorieta and Ridgecrest for a time of training, inspiration, and fellowship. A chartered bus went to Glorieta.

Other organizational activities included:
WMU Annual Meeting at Park Hill Baptist, North Little Rock, with approximately 900 attending.
State BYW Meeting at Pulaski Heights, Little Rock, with approximately one hundred (100) young women and men in attendance.
ACT IX for Acteens at Burns Park, North Little Rock with 360 attending, and a joint GA/Acteens Camp, July 24-28.
Four weeks of camp for older GAs at Camp Paron. Mission offering given by the 271 campers totaled $\$ 658.87$. For younger GA's, two GA Mother-Daughter Camps with 300 attending.

Woman's Missionary Union promoted plans for Weeks of Prayer for Foreign and Home Missions and initiated plans for Season of Prayer for State Missions. Program materials on state missions work were developed for churchwide and organizational prayer observance. Assistance was given by staff personnel of the State Missions Department.

The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions and the Dixie Jackson Offering for State Missions were promoted in connection with the respective seasons of prayer. On April 3, 1978, the Bold Mission state goal of one million dollars for the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering was reached with $\$ 1,000,818.17$ given. The Dixie Jackson Offering state goal of $\$ 175,000$ was surpassed, also. Gifts of Arkansas Baptists through these special mission offerings as of September 13,1978 , totaled $\$ 1,544,562.54$ (an increase of more than $\$ 144,500$ ), divided as follows:

Arkansas WMU has again set BOLD state offering goals for each of the special mission offerings for 1978-79: Dixie Jackson, \$200,000; Lottie Moon, $\$ 1,125,000$; and Annie Armstrong, $\$ 400,000$. We encourage each church to also set BOLD GOALS for each of these offerings.

Nancy Cooper Scholarships for the 1978-79 school year were granted to Donna McCoy, Elaine Skaggs, Peggy Dunn, Terri Edmonson, Peggy Green, Larna Jean Acklin, and Susie Robinson, students at Ouachita Baptist University; and to Jeanne Mathis and Mary Land, students at Southern Baptist College.

Scholarships from the Lillian May Scholarship Fund were also granted: a gift scholarship (for Arkansas missionaries who study for credit in seminary or college while on furlough) was given to Mrs. John Shepard, Japan; two loan scholarships (for young women from Arkansas doing graduate study in seminary) were granted to Miss Marsha Jewell of Ashdown, Southern Seminary, and to Miss Gennie Eldridge, Little Rock, at Southwestern Seminary.

Thank you for the opportunity and privilege of serving you for we are "Labourers together with God."

# ARKANSAS BAPTIST FAMILY AND CHILD CARE SERVICES

"This year more children will die from injuries inflicted by their own parents than will die from all infections and diseases combined. More than half of these children will die before they are three years old. Of the rest, fewer than $25 \%$ will reach the age of nine." These statistics from a reliable national resource are alarming. In Christian America we find these ugly facts hard to believe. How could anyone mistreat a child?

America`s families are in trouble - trouble so deep as to threaten the future of our nation, declared a major report during the most recent White House Conference on Children. Many are asking, "Can the family survive?" Older children and teens are on the run; it is estimated that last year $1 \frac{1}{2}$ million teen-agers ran away from home. These loud sounds from our society point to the pressing needs of America's families and children. Arkansas Baptists are responding to these needs with a relevant ministry in keeping with current trends and needs in services to families and children and based on the unchanging example of ministering to others as taught in God's Word.

Homer W. Shirley, Jr., was named by our Board of Trustees to serve as Director of Development for our agency effective July 18, 1977. Bro. Shirley, who has pastored churches in Arkansas since 1952, will communicate our ministry and needs to individuals and churches in our state. We are grateful for his tremendous abilities and dedication in sharing the exciting ministry of Family and Child Care.

Arkansas Baptist Home for Children. During this past year, we provided care and direction for 86 children at the Children's Home. These young people come with needs more complex than in past years. In addition to nourishment and nurturing, these young people need consistent, planned guidance in dealing with their problems. Of this number, there were 38 new admissions during the year. There were an additional 174 referrals and inquiries handled by this office.

Our staff was busy with bringing new children into care, discharge planning resulting in 30 children being released, and the daily work of counseling and direction for all the children in care. Our staff is dedicated to helping children come to grips with their personal and family problems; to help them grow and develop to realize their full God-given potential and to build and strengthen family relationships when possible.

Family friends, special friends, big brother-big sisters, and sponsors from throughout our state added warm, caring enrichment experiences for our young people living at the Children's Home. Two of our young people graduated from high school this year and both will be enrolled in college this fall.

The Christian message of God's love continues to make our child care ministry distinctive. Eleven of our young people living at the Home last year accepted Christ as their personal Savior and joined one of the local Baptist churches. Some of our young people attended Siloam Springs which provided a week of good Christian fellowship and Bible study. Leading young people to find Christian principles on which to build their lives is a priority of our staff.

Area Offices. Through our area offices located in Little Rock, Jonesboro, and Fayetteville, many families turned for help and direction with family and marriage problems. Helping to resolve parent-child conflicts and marital difficulties deserves our best efforts. Our professionally trained counselors combine their skills with their Christian caring to bring about healing in these broken relationships. These of fices averaged 90 case interviews each month. A major responsibility of these offices is to conduct intake evaluations on children who need care in one of our residential services. Consultation to churches and agencies relating to problems with children and families is available through these offices.

Foster Care-Group Home. Fifteen were cared for in our approved foster homes, and ten boys received care living in our Group Home for Boys in Jonesboro. Our social workers supervise these placements and provide help to both child and foster parents.

Emergency Receiving Home. Responding to a pressing need for children in the Little Rock area, our agency opened an Emergency Receiving Home for Children November 15, 1977. This home is to provide emergency care for battered, abused, neglected, and dependent children. For $6 \frac{1}{2}$ months of this reporting period, we cared for 106 children, ages birth through 12 years of age. This home, staffed by Christian houseparents, and available to accept children on a 24 -hour basis, provides a safe, secure place for children to live until a more permanent plan of care can be worked out for each of them. We are grateful for the Lord's blessings on this ministry.

Finances. Direct gifts from the churches to our child care ministry increased $4.7 \%$ over 1976 , with a total received of $\$ 200,096.36$. These gifts, plus money received from the Cooperative Program, provided $68 \%$ of our total expenditures. The remainder of our operating funds came from individuals, family and child care support, and purchase of care agreement from Arkansas Social Services. We have a working relationship with Arkansas Social Services in meeting the needs of children under their custody. Children for whom they are legally responsible and who are in need of services we provide can be helped through this relationship. After determining that our program is appropriate to meet the child's needs, we can bring the child into care and Arkansas Social Services can purchase these needed services for the child. This represents a spirit of cooperation in providing quality Christian care for troubled children and their families.

Arkansas Baptist Family and Child Care Services endorses and is involved in the great Bold Missions thrust in our Sou thern Baptist Convention. It has to do with sharing the good news of Jesus Christ with every person in our world. Nothing is more vital than this endeavor. To see those, because of neglect, abuse or abandonment, come to have new hope, is exceedingly rewarding. To supply good food, clothing, shelter, medical care and social acceptance is wonderful, but to give eternal hope through the Christian experience is beyond description. Many agencies can provide the basic necessities of life, but only Christians can provide the joy of abundant life through their witness of our Lord.

We appreciate the privilege of being your witness to many hurting youth and their families. You are making it possible. This is Bold Missions in our own state.

ARKANSAS BAPTIST FOUNDATION

Harry D. Trulove, President/Treasurer

Cast a stone on the water and the effect can be seen as the ripples reach out to the shore. This report is an excellent study of the ripple effect.

The 1948 Convention approved the recommendation to establish the Foundation. The next twenty-seven years was used primarily for seed sowing and cultivation. Today the harvest is being reached. In February, 1975, the assets managed by the Foundation reached $\$ 1,000,000$. The second million was passed in 1977, and at the present rate of growth, the third million should be passed by late ' 78 or early ' 79 .

This report and the twenty-nine previous ones dealt with facts and figures. (A complete financial statement taken from the Foundation's annual audit appears each year in the Convention's annual. The 1977 report is on Pages 289-90.) In a real sense these reports should be considered more than statistics. They reflect the actions of Christian stewards who desired to continue the pattern of financial support beyond their life time.

The following are some highlights that have taken place since last we met. During 1978 the ministry of the Foundation was promoted under the theme, "The Church Reaching Out In Bold Missions." Over two hundred families requested and received personal guidance in estate planning. This was due, in a large measure, to the increased number of pastors who used bulletin inserts and other estate planning programs sponsored by the Foundation.

From June 30, 1977, to June 30, 1978, the assets managed by the Foundation increased by forty-six percent. New accounts are up by sixty-seven percent, and income from investments is expected to exceed $\$ 153,000$. This compares to an investment income of $\$ 24,809.000$ just five years ago.

During 1978, the Foundation Board explored new investment techniques. The goal - to provide maximum return with safety and where possible, to keep money working in Arkansas. This was accomplished through the use of Mortgage Participation Plan.

Specific guidelines were adopted to provide limits of participation, assure the quality of the mortgage, and determine the percentage of investment money to be used in this section. As a result, an agreement was signed with an Arkansas savings and loan institution, paying a return of $9 \%$ on insured mortgages. Thus, the endowment managed by your Foundation generates income for the Lord's work and may enable you or one of your neighbors to buy or remodel a home.

All of this was possible because the messengers attending the 1948 Convention recognized the importance of estate stewardship - the proper management and final distribution of accumulated possessions - and established the Foundation as a way for this action to be carried out. The Board of Directors and Staff say, "Thank you, Arkansas Baptists, for providing a way for us to serve God by serving people. To God be the glory!"

Our humanity causes us to rejoice in these accomplishments, but we are constantly reminded of the admonition in the scripture that says, "... to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but to think soberly, according as God has dealt every man the measure of faith. For we have many members in one body and all members have not the same office: so we being many, are one body in Christ, and everyone members one of another." (Romans 12:3-5)

The Foundation Board is composed of persons recommended by the Convention's Nominating Committee and elected by the Convention in annual session. The current board is composed of the following:

The Charter and By-laws of the Foundation provide that if a donor does not select an income beneficiary the gift shall be classified as undesignated and the Convention each year is to select the income recipient. Currently the income from Undesignated Receipts is approximately $\$ 800.00$.

This past summer when Dr. Ben Elrod, Senior Vice-President of Ouachita Baptist University resigned to go to Georgetown College as President, the Administration and Trustees of the University established the Ben Elrod Scholarship Fund as an expression of appreciation for his years of service with the University. The Board of Directors of the Foundation joins the Administration and Trustees in this recognition and brings the following recommendation:

It is recommended that in 1979 the income earned from Undesignated Receipts be distributed to the Ben Elrod Scholarship Fund.

CHARTER

STATE OF ARKANSAS,

## KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, the undersigned citizens of Arkansas, under and by virtue of the laws of this state, do hereby form and incorporate ourselves into a voluntary association under the terms and conditions hereinafter set out, as follows:

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION<br>OF THE<br>ARKANSAS BAPTIST FOUNDATION

I.

The name of this corporation is "Arkansas Baptist Foundation."
II.

The purpose for which it is formed is to serve any benevolent, charitable, educational or missionary undertaking, institution or agency, fostered by, or having the official sanction of, The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, such conjoined purposes to be executed simultaneously in the futherance and development of benevolent, charitable, educational and missionary, activities in, and for the benefit of, schools, hospitals, orphanages, and other enterprises operated under the supervision of, or supported by, The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, and to such end may receive by bequest, devise, gift, purchase or lease, either absolutely or in trust, any property, real personal or mixed; and to administer such property, to convey such property, to invest and reinvest the same, or the proceeds thereof, in such manner as in the judgement of the Directors will best promote such objects. Where a substantial portion is for the benefit of Baptist causes, the corporation may also receive and administer any property for any benevolent, charitable, educational or missionary undertaking, institution, or agency, provided the undertaking institution or agency is organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational purposes, and qualifies as a publicly supported organization as defined in the Internal Revenue Code and the regulations thereunder, and is compatible with the purpose of the corporation.

## III.

In the absence of specific directions by the donor, grantor or testator, gifts, bequests, and donations shall be known as "Undesignated Funds" and a distribution of the principal or income of such funds or property shall only be made upon approval of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

In every case where specific instructions shall have been given the Directors by the donor, grantor or testator, the trust shall be known as a "Designated Gift" and the instructions shall be binding upon this corporation and shall be faithfully carried out; provided, however, if the object or purpose to which such designated gift was made shall cease to exist, and if in the opinion of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention no similar agency or institution can be found to exist, then such designated gift shall become and be a part of the undesignated funds or property of the corporation.

## IV.

The corporation shall not have the right to mortgage, hypothecate or otherwise pledge either the real, personal or mixed property under the ownership or control of the corporation, except that it may refinance or renew any indebtedness that may exist at the time that the ownership or management of the said properties passed to the Foundation, provided that in any such refinancing the property securing such loan shall be the sole security thereof.
V.

The place where the business of the corporation is to be transacted is within the State of Arkansas, at such time and place as may be determined by the Directors. The principal office and place of business shall be located in the City of Little Rock, County of Pulaski, Arkansas. The Directors shall have authority to adopt such By-Laws as they may deem advisable and not inconsistent with the provisions of this charter or policies of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.
VI.

The period of duration of this incorporation shall be perpetual.

## VII.

The number of Directors shall be a minimum of fifteen (15) and they shall be elected by The Arkansas Baptist State Convention at its annual meeting. One-third ( $1 / 3$ ) shall be elected by the State Convention at each annual session. In the event there should be a vacancy on the Board of Directors by reason of death, resignation or otherwise, the remaining Directors shall fill such vacancy until the annual meeting of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

The corporation is without capital stock and no shares of stock are issued. The members thereof shall be the accredited messengers of The Arkansas Baptist $S$ tate Convention, and shall at all times include the Directors of the corporation, each of whom shall be a faithful member of a Baptist Church which is in active cooperation with the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. No Director of this corporation shall receive, or be lawfully entitled to receive, any salary or remuneration for services connected with the administration of the affairs of this corporation. Actual expenses incurred by such person may be refunded when authorized by the Directors.

BYLAWS<br>OF<br>ARKANSAS BAPTIST FOUNDATION

## ARTICLE I <br> Membership

Members of the corporation shall consist of fifteen (15) or more directors; the members of the Executive Board of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention; and accredited messengers to the annual meeting of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, such membership to continue until their successors are elected.

## ARTICLE II <br> Annual Meeting

This corporation shall, at the annual meeting of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, elect board members, receive reports and act on recommendations from the Board of Directors.

## ARTICLE III Board of Directors

The affairs of the corporation shall be administere by the Board of Directors. At least two-thirds (2/3) of the Directors shall be laypersons.

Section 1 - Qualifications: Each Director shall be an active member of a Baptist Church cooperating with The Arkansas Baptist State Convention. In light of the purpose of the Foundation, this person should be one with proven business ability. Diversification is esired in such professional fields as accounting, estate planning, business, management, finance, legal, investment, real estate, and similar fields.

Section 2 - Method of Election and Term of Office: One-third (1/3) shall be elected annually by The Arkansas Baptist State Convention to hold office for three (3) years. No person shall serve more than two (2) consecutive terms. One (1) year must elapse before being eligible for re-election.

The Executive Secretary of the Executive Board of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention shall be an ex-officio member with full voting privileges.

The President of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention and the President of the Executive Board of the Convention shall be advisor members.

Any member who misses all of the board and committee meetings for a perio of one (1) year shall be dropped from membership on this Board.

With the exception of the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, no person shall be a member of this Board who is an employee of any board or institution of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, or who is receiving financial aid from the State Convention.

Section 3 - Vacancies: Vacancies shall be filled as provided in the Charter of the corporation, "In the event there should be a vacancy on the Board of Directors by reason of death, resignation, or otherwise, the remaining Directors shall fill such vacancy until the annual meeting of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention."

## Section 4 - Duties:

(1) Investments - It shall be the duty of the Directors to invest and reinvest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devise, bequests, or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment. The Investment Committee acts on behalf of the full Board in matters relating to buying and selling of securities.
(2) Distribution - The Board of Directors shall allocate all designated income that is available for distribution at least once each three months. This distribution is made only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise such distribution shall be made as provided in the Charter of the corporation, namely upon the approval and with the authority of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention.
(3) Reports - The Directors shall make an annual report of the affairs of the corporation to The Arkansas Baptist State Convention and upon request furnish any interested institution information concerning the investment of funds for such institution. The books of the corporation shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant recommended by the Executive Committee and approved by the Board of Directors. This report shall be published in The Arkansas Baptist State Convention Annual.
(4) Depository - The Board of Directors shall see that a safe deposit box is maintained for the safekeeping of all legal papers, stocks, bonds, and other appropriate assets of the corporation. This box shall be entrusted to the President of the corporation and shall be entered only when he is accompanied by a member of the Board of Directors, or the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention or another bonded employee. The location of this depository shall be determined by the Board of Directors or its Executive Committee. The Directorsmay authorize some other financial institution to hold in safekeeping certain assets of the corporation.

Section 5 - Extent of Authority: The Directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment, and administration of the principal and undistributed income of all funds and property of the corporation. Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation, with specific conditions as to the administration of the fund or the distribution of income, said Directors shall have full authority to carry out those directions. All investments shall comply with the Arkansas Statutes, Section 58-302, being prudent man rule for investments.

With the consent of the Board of Directors, the Chairman of the Board and the Secretary shall have the authority to execute necessary instruments to accomplish the foregoing transactions.

The Board of Directors shall be empowered to employ as they deem necessary an adequate staff for the effective and efficient management of this corporation.

## ARTICLE IV Officers and Duties

Section 1 - Officers: The officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairman of the Board/Vice-President, Vice-Chairman, President, one or more VicePresidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and such other officers as the Board of Directors may select. Each officer shall hold office for one year provided that the term of salaried employees and officers shall be fixed by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer may also be the chief executive officer of the corporation.

## Section 2 - Duties:

(1) Chairman of the Board/Vice-President - The Chairman of the Board shall preside over all meetings of the Directors, shall be their official spokesman, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
(2) Vice-Chairman - In the absence of the Chairman of the Board the ViceChairman is to preside over all meetings of the Directors. He shall also serve as Chairman of the Budget Planning Committee.
(3) Secretary - The Secretary shall cause to be kept a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and to perform such other duties as are usually incident to the of fice of secretary.
(4) President - The President shall be the chief executive officer of the corporation, and shall perform such duties as the Directors may from time to time direct.
(5) Treasurer - The Treasurer shall have custody of the funds, securities, and property of the corporation, subject to the provisions hereof and to such regulations as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors. Funds belonging to the corporation shall be deposited in such bank, banks, or trust companies as may be designated by the Board of Directors or its Executive Committee. Such funds may be withdrawn by check or draft as executed by the Treasurer, the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention, or by such persons as may be designated by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer shall cause to be published at least quarterly, a financial statement of the corporation. The Treasurer and such other persons entrusted with the handling of funds, securities, and other property shall be bonded in such sum as may be fixed by the Directors; the expense of this bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

## ARTICLE V Meetings

Section 1 - Regular Meetings: The Board of Directors shall meet at least four times each year and one of these meetings shall be in conjunction with the annual meeting of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

Section 2 - Called Meetings: Called meetings may be held upon the request of the Chairman of the Board and any three members of the Board of Directors. The Chairman of the Board or the President shall give sufficeint notice of the time and place thereof to enable the Directors to attend.

Section 3 - Quorum: A majority of the board members shall constitute a quorum and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

## ARTICLE VI <br> Committees

Section 1 - Appointment: Unless otherwise specified, the Chairman of the Board shall cause such committee or committees to be appointed as the Directors may specify. The Directors shall delegate such authority as may be deemed advisable so long. as the same shall be within the limits of their own authority and discretion.

Section 2 - Committee Responsibility: Each committee is to discharge their responsibilities as outlined in the Policy Manual of the Foundation.

## ARTICLE VII Distributees

All funds received and administered by the corporation and distributed as herein provided, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of charitable institutions or agencies as defined in the Internal Revenue Code and the regulations thereunder. The principal agencies being Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Arkansas, and of causes, agencies, and institutions fostered by and having the official sanction of THE ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION or THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION, except where a trust shall provide for training in a professional school not operated by an Arkansas Baptist School; in such case the income may be directed to an institution selected by the Board of Directors with the approval of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention or its Executive Board, and for no other purpose.

## ARTICLE VIII <br> Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form, and with the name, "Arkansas Baptist Foundation" around the outside border, and the word, "Corporate Seal" in the center.

## ARTICLE IX <br> Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of members present and voting at any annual meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall be voted on until the same has first been presented at a meeting of the Board of Directors for their consideration and examination before being submitted to the general meeting.

Your Historical Commission reports several important accessions in books this year which will help in research for coming generations. Some of our older ministers have given their autobiographies covering the past 75 years. We have also received books authored by former Arkansans. We have been encouraging these two things and will continue to do so. We hope to stimulate others to write memoirs and to give us copies of whatever other writings they may do.

Your Director spoke at the Associational Missionaries retreat at Fairfield Bay in March on preserving and writing history. He spoke on a similar subject at Harmony Association in July.

A history workshop will be conducted at Ouachita University, November 28-29, 1978, under the direction of A. Ronald Tonks, assistant executive director of the Historical Commission, Southern Baptist Convention. Oral history will be emphasized at this meeting. Anyone interested in Arkansas Baptist history is invited to attend.

The Operating Committee at the past July meeting gave our Commission money to operate on this year. With the anticipation that the Commission's work may be placed in the budget for the future. We are grateful for this consideration and believe such will put us on solid foundation for an enlarged work.

We regret to report that we were unable to get materials assembled for the publication of a new Arkansas Baptist history this year but are working on it and will publish it as quickly as possible.

The earliest beginning of the Baptist Book Store in Little Rock dates back to 1901. The purpose of the store is to provide merchandise easily available to all people in our area. The store is located at 4418 South University, having moved to this location in May, 1972. During the 1977-78 fiscal year, the Brotherhood Commission emphasized mission education, mission commitment, evangelism and leader training.

While enrollment of men and boys in Brotherhood units dropped by 1.2 percent to 473,309 at the start of the year, the number of churches with Brotherhood work increased by 52 to a total of 15,359 .

Churches with Baptist Men's work increased by 408 and those with Brotherhood directors by 316.

In the area of mission education, a long-range plan to provide every Southern Baptist church with mission information and opportunity for involvement in missions progressed on schedule.

The Commission is working with Woman's Missonary Union, Foreign Mission Board, Home Mission Board, and Sunday School Board through a Mission Education Council to complete this project.

The project calls for researching and developing a correlated program design and missions curriculum, a convention-wide plan for mission education, and a national merchandising plan for mission education materials.

The project is designed to help implement Bold Mission Thrust, the effort of Southern Baptists to communicate the gospel to every person in the world by the year 2000 .

Working with WMU, the Commission helped sponsor a Bold Mission Leadership Conference at Glorieta Baptist Conference Center which attracted 2039, an increase of almost 25 percent over a similar conference a year before.

An emphasis on the involvement of lay people in denominational activities and vocational witnessing drew 8,500 to Atlanta for 15 vocational breakfasts and a bold mission rally featuring President Jimmy Carter, a leading Southern Baptist layman.

At the same time, the Commission led in arranging world missions conferences attended by more than one million Southern Baptists.

In the area of mission commitment, the Commission strongly encouraged Southern Baptists to become involved in missions as short-term volunteers, particularly through the Mission Service Corps.

The agency also developed new ministries and supporting materials in the areas of lay-led revivals, prison ministries, Bible distribution and retirees in missions.

Besides involving about 5,000 persons in renewal events, the Commission conducted research in 20 churches on the best ways to communicate the theology of the laity. In another new venture, 50 couples were trained to conduct mission and ministry weekends in their churches.

The Commission continued to bolster its corps of trained leaders, preparing about 600 specialists to help 33 state Baptist conventions train church and associational Brotherhood officers.

Among the specialists were persons equipped to help churches organize Brotherhood units for men and boys who speak Spanish, Chinese, and Korean.

Southern Baptists' allocation through the Cooperative Program for these endeavors was $\$ 522,500$.

# THE CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION OF A RKANSAS, INC. 1007 Donaghey Building - Little Rock, Arkansas 72201

In order to provide the latest information on the activities of the Christian Civic Foundation for the Convention Yearbook, this report covers the twelvemonth period from September 1, 1977, to September 1, 1978, instead of the fiscal year of the Christian Civic Foundation, which coincides with the calendar year. The program of the Foundation is led by a three-member fulltime staff, composed of the Executive Director, Rev. Edward W. Harris, the Educational Assistant, Mr. Ronnie P. Sparks, and the Office Secretary, Mrs. Beverly B. Williams.

The Alcohol-Narcotics Education Program is a program of Preventive Education that is carried on in the Public Schools of Arkansas. The 1978-79 year will be the seventeenth year that the Christian Civic Foundation has presented this program. Our report covers the 1977-78 school year, plus a statement of the prospects for the $1978-79$ year.

In preparation for the 1977-78 school year, more than four hundred personal letters were written to Superintendents and Principals of schools, involving contacts with one hundred seventy schools. We received responses from 130 , or $76 \%$. Of these, 90 accepted engagements, or $53 \%$. Only 40 declined, or $23 \%$. Only 25 , or $15 \%$ did not respond before the suggested date for an appointment. Winter weather caused cancellation in 15 schools, involving 17 days. We were able to reschedule all but 5 of these. These were included in the early fall schedule for 1978 . Of the 90 schools originally scheduled, 84 were served during the $1977-78$ school year. Of the 90 schools scheduled, 3 were for 3 days, and 2 were for 2 days each. 33 schools requested assemblies, or $37 \%$. 55 requested classroom sessions, or $63 \%$. Requests from Elementary Schools numbered 39, or $43 \%$, the largest number of Elementary schools in the history of our program. There were 7 Junior High requests, or $8 \%$, and 44 High Schools, or 49\%. Clearly, the Drug Abuse Arena has shifted from High Schools and Junior High Schools, to the Elementary Grades.

The total number of schools actually served by our Educational Assistant during the 1977-78 school year, was 84 . The total number of days involved was 87 . On 3 days, he reached 2 schools on the same day. 4 of the 84 schools used a total of 10 days, 2 using 2 days and 2 using 3 days. One of those who used 2 days has requested that he return this year, 1978-79, for 2 days. In addition to the schools served, our Educational Assistant participated in 9 church worship services, 7 other church activities, youth, Sunday School, etc., 2 civic clubs, 1 Adult Education Class, 1 Sorority, Summer Camp Programs, including 6 at Siloam Assembly, and 2 National Baptist Youth, at Camp Paron.

During the 1977-78 School year, our Educational Assistant, Mr. Ronnie P. Sparks, attended night school at UALR 2 nights a week during the regular term, and enrolled for full daily classes at UALR for the summer tern. For this reason, Mr. Sparks was freed of all summer scheduling, except for the 8 camp engagements mentioned above. He also attended a Drug Abuse Workshop at Berkeley, California, during the second week of May, 1978.

For the $1978-79$ school year, we have contacted 163 schools, $75 \%$ elementary, and $25 \%$ Junior and Senior High Schools. Of these, to date, we have only 5 rejections. Confirmations are coming in each day. Mr. Sparks will begin his schedule the second week of September in Southeast Arkansas.

We believe that the high number of responses to our letters in the 1977-78 School year was due, in part, to a new feature which we included in our first letter, providing a list of neighboring Superintendents or Principals who were familiar with our program, and suggesting that they visit with them, and get their evaluation of our approach. We believe also that the high percentage of acceptance was due, in large part, to the high quality of work done by our Educational Assistant. All evaluations of Mr. Sparks' work received from Teachers, Principals, and students have been uniformly strong and positive in their appreciation of his ability to communicate with all age groups, his knowledge of the subject, and his dedication to the Program of Preventive Education. His informal style of speech and dress has contributed to the establishment of a sense of credibility with a highly critical audience.

Thusfar, our plan to finance this program with a vouchered Expense Account, to cover mileage, food, and lodging has been successful. Weekly vouchers are completed for actual expenses incurred. We do not charge schools or churches for these services. We do accept contributions to the Christian Civic Foundation, when they are offered. We do not solicit funds. As long as our supporting churches and friends continue to give liberally to the support of our budget, we hope to be able to continue to serve the schools of our State without cost to them.
The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board is an important State Agency which regulates all liquor, beer, and wine outlets, and issues all permits for their operation. At the 1977 session of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, the members passed a resolution opposing the issuance of an on-premise Beer permit for a theatre located at Fourth and Main, in Little Rock. On the day the resolution was passed unanimously, the applicant, Mr. James Skillern Porter, Jr., withdrew the application. We have assisted every local group that requested our aid in opposing the granting of any type of alcoholic beverage permit in any community.

Following the reversal of the Harrison Private Club suit by the Arkansas Supreme Court, the ABC Board was freed to issue private club permits again. Almost immediately, a flood of applications for Private Club permits in Dry Counties came before the ABC Board. The Caddo Creek Country Club, at Bismarck, applied twice and was denied twice by the ABC Board and Director. In April, 1978, the same Club tried to get a hearing on a "new" application, and a hearing was first set for April 19th. The fine young attorney, Mr. John B. Robbins, of Hot Springs, called the Director's attention to Section 1.29 of the ABC Regulations, which forbids any "new" application within a year after an application has been denied. The hearing was cancelled, and nothing further has been heard from this permit. The Johnson County Yacht Club, later called the Johnson Social Club, applied, was denied by the ABC Director, and appealed her decision to the full Board. The day before the hearing, they requested a postponement, which was granted. The Little Club, at the Sheraton Motel, at Hope, in Hempstead County, applied, was denied by the Director, and her decision was upheld by the Board. Also denied were three others, one at Mountain Home, and two at Rogers. One of the Rogers denials was appealed to the full Board, reversed, and appealed to the Circuit Court.

In view of the amount of time, energy, and attention required of the Executive Director in opposing Private Club Permits in Dry counties in the General Assembly, in the Courts, and before the ABC Board, the Executive Director asked the Executive Committee, in their meeting of November 22, 1977, whether they thought we ought to continue the opposition at each of these levels. By their unanimous vote, such a program of opposition by the Director was endorsed. In our opinion, to withdraw from these areas would mean that the resort areas and Dry Counties would be flooded with Private Club outlets.
Local Option Elections. Since November 7, 1978, is the date of the General Elections for Arkansas, several Counties and Precincts will also hold what is called "Local Option Elections" by placing on the printed ballots the Ballot Title giving voters the choice to vote "For the Manufacture or Sale of Intoxicating Liquors", or "Against the Manufacture or Sale of Intoxicating Liquors." As of September 13, the deadline for this report, the list of precincts and counties that will hold Local Option elections is incomplete.

To assist "Dry" forces facing possible challenges, we have prepared and distributed to those who requested them the following: (1) A completely revised "Handbook" on Local Option Elections; (2) A Digest of Arkansas Statutes covering the Preparation and Filing of Local Option Petitions, with pertinent Supreme Court Rulings, and references to Arkansas Statutes that relate to Local Option Elections; (3) Sample Copies of Local Option Petitions that meet the legal requirements in Arkansas; (4) Mimeographed copies of Directions for Local Option Petition Canvassers. In addition, we devoted the entire summer issue of our quarterly newsletter, "The Christian Citizen", to the subject of Local Option Elections in Arkansas.

The results of the Local Option Elections on November 7, the opening day of the Convention, should be available before the Convention closes on November 10. We earnestly pray for the results to be "another victory for the Dry Forces."
The Christian Citizen, our quarterly newsletter, is in its fourth year of continuous publication. The Spring Issue of 1978 was devoted to Questions and Answers concerning the Christian Civic Foundation, and the program of Civic Righteousness the Foundation promotes in representing the Christian Churches of Arkansas. As previously mentioned, the Summer Issue was devoted to Local Option Elections. The Autumn issue will carry the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the Seventy-second General Assembly of Arkansas, both the Senate and the House, including their officers. This issue also will carry a list of proposed legislation which we believe will be of great concern to Christian church members of Arkansas.

The Legislative Front. No meeting of the General Assembly has taken place since the Convention met in November of 1977. The Seventy-first General Assembly remained in official "recess", until a skeletal crew met August 14, 1978, for a brief session, and adjourned sine die. The Seventy-second General Assembly will meet in January of 1979, and will probably be in session for at least ninety days. It will be mid-November before we will be able to present a reliable list of legislative concerns. The Executive Director will again be registered as a "Lobbyist", and the areas of concern will be Alcohol, Narcotics, Gambling, Obscenity. He will attend every session, and will be available at all times for counsel and for information needed on any issues of interest to Baptists. We feel a responsibility for making known the attitudes of our supporters on special legislation to the members of the General Assembly, and formaking known the attitudes of members of the General Assembly to the church members and citizens. The citizen and church member can then make known their support or opposition to the legislator in person, by letter, or by telcphone call. This is the most effective way to influence legislation and promote civic righteousness. We like to think of our ministry in the legislative area as that of promoting communication on vital issues between citizens and legislators.
Our Twentieth Birthday. When we next report to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, in 1979, we will have completed our twentieth year of history. It was on March 30, 1959, that a Constitution was adopted for the Christian Civic Foundation. April 3, 1959, was the date on which Incorporation Papers were filed with the Pulaski Circuit Court. On April 20, 1959, the first Officers of the new organization were elected, including a President, Judge Tom Digby, a fine Baptist layman. At the annual meeting of The Board of Directors, on March 20, 1978, the Board voted unanimously that the 1979 Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors feature the twentieth birthday of The Christian Civic Foundation. We would welcome suggestions from members of The Arkansas Baptist State Convention as to the most appropriate way to celebrate twenty years of history, a celebration, we trust, that would include adequate challenges for the third decade of service to the State of Arkansas.

In closing, I would remind our Baptist friends that all of our policies, programs, and means of support come from the hearts and minds of Arkansans. We are not affiliated with any National organization. We are listed in the Directory of the American Council on Alcohol Problems as a "Concerned Organization", sharing their concern for temperance, but not as an affiliate or member of the organization. Policy, Program, and means of support for the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, Inc., depend annually upon the actions of the official bodies of the Methodist and Baptist churches, and other churches, and upon the voluntary support of each local church. This is both a source of strength and weakness. If, during any given twelve-month period, the joint effort of these churches should suffer from lack of interest or support, it would be fatal to our organization. Like the branches of a tree, which draw their strength from the trunk and roots, our organization draws its strength from the life of the church. We believe that two decades of history have proven the wisdom of this approach. As we submit this report to the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, we do so with a deep sense of gratitude for your support of the program of civic righteousness and with an earnest plea that you continue your support by your personal participation, by your gifts, and by your prayers, so that we may be and remain thoroughly Christian in nature and in lifestyle, and continue to be an effective servant of the churches in promoting civic righteousness in the State of Arkansas.

# OUACHITA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Ouachita Baptist University's report to Arkansas Baptists is a strong and heartfelt "Thank you" for the support that has made possible unprecedented growth and improvement in Christian education at Ouachita during the past few years. The progress summarized in the report that follows would have been impossible without the generous and sacrificial support of our churches, rooted in a dedication to the importance of providing our young people an education that is Christ-centered. Among the 46 Baptist senior colleges in the Southern Baptist Convention, Ouachita ranked sixth in annual dollar support from the convention. Only Baylor, Samford, Louisiana College, Carson-Newman, and Oklahoma Baptist University received more from their state convention than Arkansas Baptists provide Ouachita. This is an excellent record of support and Arkansas Baptists have a right to be proud of it.

## ENROLLMENT STRENGTH IN QUANTITY AND QUALITY

Resident students living in Ouachita dormitories and eating in the dining hall continued to break enrollment records in the fall of 1978. Commuter and part-time student enrollments show signs of levelling off. Total fall enrollment reached 1614 , with a non-duplicating enrollment for the 12 months' period of 2,054 , and increase of 112 over the previous year. The breakdown of the fall enrollment was 463 freshmen, 389 sophomores, 276 juniors, 310 seniors, 136 graduate and postgraduate students, and 40 special students. They came from 35 different states, 22 foreign countries, and from 70 of Arkansas' 75 counties. Pulaski County has the largest number of students with 208, followed by Clark with 160, Jefferson with 82, Ouachita with 81 , Garland with 66, Hempstead with 48 , White with 41 , Hot Springs with 40 , Sebastian and Saline with 29, and Union with 26 . Housing of Ouachita students in the dormitories reached 1229, an all-time high. National experts predict enrollment declines in coming years so very few colleges are building additional dormitories, but Ouachita is committed to meeting the needs of our Baptist young people, and will continue to do whatever is necessary to provide a Christian education for those who seek it.

## STRENGTH IN CHRISTIAN TRAINING

Students preparing for church-related vocations at Ouachita number 320, almost one-fifth of the student enrollment, including 111 ministerial students, 77 church music students, 58 in religious education, 30 mission volunteers, 32 for ministry of youth and recreation, and 12 others. The In-Service Guidance Program for ministerial students, in cooperation with the Home Mission Board and the State Missions Department, continues to grow in effectiveness. Ouachita continues to require chapel, two semesters of study of the Old Testament and New Testament, and continues to have rules and regulations designed to support standards of Christian morality in dormitory and campus life, increasingly abandoned in many colleges and universities in the United States. The program of religious activities directed by Elmer Goble is a truly outstanding one, and continues to grow stronger each year. A fall retreat attended by close to three hundred students, helped to launch a comprehensive program involving 18 committees in charge of such programs as Christian Focus Week, Big Brothers and Big Sisters, Churchmanship, Bible Study, Married Students Ministry, Creative Arts, a Jail Ministry, Noonday Devotions, Spring

Break Missions, and Summer Missions. Twenty students were chosen for summer missions in 1978, in addition to six other students serving on O.B.U. CONTACT Teams. Dr. and Mrs. Orlynn Evans, furloughing missionaries from Monrovia, Liberia, served as missionaries-in-residence on the Ouachita campus during the spring semester, and have been succeeded by Dr. and Mrs. Bill Bullington, Foreign Mission Board Field Representative for West Africa. Among the outstanding Christian personalities and guest speakers at Ouachita during the year were: David Meece, Wayne Ward, Jack McGorman, Russell Dilday, the Jesse Dixon Singers, Randy Gallaway, Charles Baker, Randy and Gay Hongo, Dan McBride, Roger Copeland, Bobby Walker, Larry Baker, Milt Hughes, Malvi Giles, Roger Murchison, Doug Manning, Jeanette Clift George, Ed Seabough, Bob Burroughs, Bill Reynolds, Andrew MacRae, and the Jeremiah People.

## SPECIAL SERVICE TO ARKANSAS BAPTISTS

In recent years Ouachita Baptist University has come to be an increasingly valuable and unique resouice to Arkansas Baptists because of certain special services performed. The campus has almost become a year-round conference center for denominational meetings at the state, association, and local church level. Added to the already long list of conferences such as the music camps for all ages, a Statewide Pastors' Bible Conference was inaugurated in May of 1978, and it gives every evidence of becoming a popular annual occasion. Conference Director Gene Petty has already scheduled the 1979 meeting for April 30-May 2, with Dr. Wayne Ward as Bible teacher, and Dr. Jimmy Allen as conference preacher. Ouachita's Annual Recognition Banquet for Directors of Association Missions, in November, has come to be one to the highlights of the year. A unique project was launched on the campus by Bob Parrish of the State Missions Department staff, when he offered to teach a course for Ouachita students in sign language. We were amazed when 67 students enrolled and took the course, and everyone discovered new open doors for Christian ministry and witnessing. Christian music groups from Ouachita have always served the churches well with their testimony in song, but the quantity and quality of dedicated musicians have undoubtedly reached an all-time high at Ouachita. Added to the distinguished traditional names of the O.B.U. Choir, the Ouachita Singers, the Ouachi-Tones, the Singing Men, and the Chamber Singers, are such newer names as J.C.P.\&L Co., Reconciliation, The Psalms, Revised Edition, Under Construction, and Metochai, to name just a few. In addition, Verbatim and The Ouachita Players perform a unique ministry through the medium of speech choir and religious drama. The Ouachi-Tones traveled to Hawaii on invitation of the Hawaii Baptist Convention last year to sing at their evangelism conference and churches on the islands. The Psalms have been invited by the Foreign Mission Board to sing for churches in Recife, Brazil, during three weeks of their Christmas holidays at the end of 1978. All of this and many other examples that could be given, add up to an increasingly outstanding record of denominational service for Ouachita, even without mentioning the special scholarships and/or discounts to children of missionaries, international students recommended by Southern Baptist missionaries, and children of full-time pastors and professional staff members of churches.

## ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Ouachita students and faculty had an excellent year in academic achievements, with Ouachita continuing to rank in the top three universities and colleges in the state in number of students who are National Merit Scholars and National Achievement Scholars. Six Ouachita students were chosen for medical school admission, and a generous number of others were admitted to dental school, graduate school, and seminary. Several new faculty members have been employed after an extensive search for persons who combine the qualities of outstanding professional competence and genuine Christian commitment. Ouachita's Student Senate chose one of these new faculty members, Dr. Gene Petty of the Bible Department, as outstanding teacher of the year. New faculty strength was provided in several other departments, particularly in Business and Economics. The percentage of teachers with doctoral degrees reached an all-time high of 43 percent in 1977-78. The Ouachita-Japan Exchange Program contributes a great deal to the educational experience of not only the three students who go to Japan each year, but all of the others who benefit from the sharing of experiences and insights. The Water Chemistry Research Program continues to grow in importance and reputation, and provides unusual benefits for both students and faculty. Mr. Birkett Williams, long-time friend and benefactor of Ouachita, made a gift which is being used to endow the Birkett Williams Lecture Series. The year saw the strengthening of such organizations and programs as the Joint Educational Consortium with Henderson State University, the Ohio College Library Consortium, the Maddox Public Affairs Center and its Washington Seminar, the Honors Program, Academic Skills Development Program, the Academic Enrichment Program, the Upward Bound Program, the Teacher Corps, and the Arkansas Technical Assistance and Consultative Center.

## NEW AND IMPROVED BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

One of the most tangible highlights of the 1977-78 year was the dedication of McClellan Hall, a classroom and office building for five departments, the Maddox Public Affairs Center, and the official papers and memorabilia of Senator John McClellan. This beautiful building completes the construction of the four-building Ouachita "megastructure" and was financed from three principal sources: a gift of one-half million dollars from the Mabee Foundation of Tulsa, Oklahoma, matching pledges of one-half million dollars by Baptist churches and individuals in response to the "second-mile" effort, and a halfmillion dollars raised by friends of the late Senator John McClellan. The collection is of historic national importance, and it is an honor to Arkansas Baptists and to Ouachita to have this outstanding resource. During the year a beautiful new president's home was given to Ouachita by anonymous donors. It will provide a great deal more space for official entertaining and should serve Ouachita well for many years to come. In the summer of 1978 the long overdue project of replacing the wooden seats in A. U. Williams Stadium with aluminum seats and decking, plus a 1,000 seat addition and new press box on the south stands, was completed. The Maintenance Department continued its improvement of campus buildings and grounds, with added benefit for both utility and beauty.

## ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

The 1977-1978 year proved to be one of the most successful years for Ouachita Tiger athletic teams in history, under the able direction of Coach Bill Vining. For the first time Ouachita won the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference All-Sports Trophy, with championships in basketball, golf, tennis, and track. These teams represented the conference well in national N.A.I.A. meets, and Ouachita ranked tenth in the nation in N.A.I.A. All-Sports Trophy competition. Ouachita also had the outstanding soccer team in the state last year, winning the Arkansas Cup competition even though it is only a "club sport" at Ouachita and not officially intercollegiate.

## NEEDS FOR OUACHITA'S CONTINUED PROGRESS

Just as the progress outlined above is the result of countless numbers of people responding to needs voiced in earlier years, so we must face the needs for continuing Ouachita's progress in the days ahead. Some of our greatest needs are: (1) a new auditorium large enough to seat our entire student body, which now must be divided for two separate chapel services; (2) a new building to house classes and activities in health, physical education, recreation, and military science; (3) further improvement of Moses-Provine Science Center and expansion to provide space and facilities for the growing Water Resources Research Program; (4) continued renovation and improvement of ConeBottoms Dormitory for women (the oldest building on campus); (5) an operating reserve fund adequate to sustain Ouachita's minimum operating needs for a reasonable time in the event of unanticipated financial adversity; (6) the capacity to hold the line against the tuition gap between Ouachita and the state colleges, and (7) more churches who encourage young people to attend Ouachita, and who teach and preach that Christian education is worth the cost. As we work and pray together to meet these and other pressing needs, we should have growing confidence that Ouachita's Centennial Year of 1986 will be a time of genuine thanksgiving for our partnership in the cause of Christian education.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST COLLEGE<br>Walnut Ridge, Arkansas<br>D. Jack Nicholas, President

The gracious blessings of the Lord and the sacrificial generosity of Arkansas Baptists have contributed to the growing strength of Southern Baptist College.

Perhaps unprejudiced observers can say it best:
"The financial position of Southern Baptist College has improved significantly. Current fund indebtedness has remained relevantly constant, capital fund indebtedness has decreased from $\$ 424,580$ to $\$ 310,715$, and balanced budgets have been achieved in each of the past three years. The net worth of the college has increased from approximately $\$ 4.7$ million to $\$ 5,545,841$. The cash on hand balance is $\$ 406,492$, an increase from $\$ 283,919$, which has established a good cash flow position for the institution."
The preceding quotation is taken from page 13 of the "Report of A Visit to Southern Baptist College" by the North Central Association Evaluation Team who examined the college on April 3-5, 1978.

Other external sources have also demonstrated the progress in the financial strength of Southern Baptist College. The much-heralded McGrath Study of Southern Bap tist Colleges and universities analyzed financial data provided by 46 Southern Baptist colleges and universities. From the data provided, the institutions were ranked on the basis of financial position and financial progress. In 1974 Southern Baptist was tied for fortieth in financial position among 46 institutions, but was fourth among the 46 in financial progress from 1974-75. In 1975 Southern Baptist College was ranked thirty-fourth among 46 institutions in financial position and first among the 46 in financial progress.

Frugal budgeting, prudent control of expenditures, and an expanding base of individual support are in part responsible for the financial improvement of the institution, but even more significant is the increased support from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. On this point, the North Central Committee's report commented as follows: "Increasing support from the Arkansas Baptist State Convention has been a significant factor in the improving financial health of Southern Baptist college."

## SLOW, STABLE GROWTH IN ENROLLMENT

The North Central Committee characterized the enrollment situation of Southern Baptist College as "stable". Actually, however, a look at the fall oncampus headcount enrollment over a five year period reflects growth from 287 in 1978 to 373 in 1977. Our on-campus, non-duplicating enrollment for 197778 was 485 with 373 students enrolled for the fall of 1977, 76 new students for the spring of 1978 and 36 new students for the summer of 1978. The 485 non-duplicating enrollment for 1977-78 compares with 471 non-duplicating on-campus enrollment for 1976-77, or a $3 \%$ increase. We are confident of a similar increase for the coming academic year.

The graduation class of 1978 was the largest in over five years. Ninety-nine students earned either diplomas or certificates.

## BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS LOOK BETTER THAN EVER

The editorial column of the Walnut Ridge "Times Dispatch" on June 8, 1978, described the improvements of the physical facilities of Southern Baptist College as follows:
"The campus of Southern Baptist College is looking better than it ever has. The lawns and shrubbery are well kept. The two newest buildings on campus, the Mabee Student Center and the Maddox Fine Arts Center, besides having a functional use, also beautify the campus landscape.

A fountain monument has been erected at the entrance of the college. It has a plaque which tells the history of the college and the air base at College City.

Southern Baptist College is growing and striving to become a high quality school. The citizens of Walnut Ridge and surrounding area should be proud of this institution and realize that it is one of our greatest assets."

At the present time, a new president's home is under construction and should be completed by the Fall, 1978. The Board of Trustees of the college has undertaken an internal fund-raising effort aimed at underwriting the cost of the new home to assure that no Cooperative Program or other Convention funds are used for this purpose.

The architectural firm used by the college has drawn preliminary plans for a new athletic/recreation/convocation facility. Construction of this structure will begin as soon as the results of a capital campaign provide assurance that it can be adequately funded.

## PLANNING FOR EVEN GREATER SERVICE

The college embarked a few months ago upon a comprehensive long-range planning process aimed at examining the internal/external factors bearing upon the institution and determining what needs the college should be answering, and what programs it should be offering in 1980, 1990, and the year 2000. Out of this effort will come a relatively carefully conceived five-year plan and a more general and more tentative plan for the next ten to twenty years. The college is persuaded that, in order to serve our constituencies in general and, the Arkansas Baptist Convention in particular, to its fullest, it must continually re-examine its purpose in the light of contemporary needs and respond to existing needs, where possible, with programs appropriate to them.

Another activity with a forward look is the new development program recently launched by Southern Baptist College. The Bold Advancement Plan which was conceptualized by the Development Council of Southern Baptist College and approved by the Board of Trustees is a ten-year plan to raise $\$ 5,100,000$. Two million six hundred thousand dollars of that amount is to be designated endowment. Of that amount, the Scholarship Club will account for $\$ 1,500,000$, the Century Club for $\$ 1,000,000$ and deferred gifts for $\$ 100,000$.

One million dollars will be raised for operations and will aid the general budget of the college. The President's Club is expected to produce $\$ 500,000$, on-going projects are expected to produce $\$ 250,000$, and Partnership Dinners are expected to produce $\$ 250,000$.

The college will endeavor to raise $\$ 1,500,000$ for capital expenditures for the construction of a multi-purpose athletic/recreation/convocation facility and for the renovation of existing structures.

It will seem to many that SBC is unrealistically ambitious to launch a $\$ 5,100,000$ campaign; however, ten years hence the $\$ 5,100,000$ goal will quite likely seem to have been insufficiently challenging. We are confident that these funds can be raised to support the developing programs of the institution.

The concluding paragraph in the summary of the North Central Committee report states: "There is no doubt that Southern Baptist College is a much improved and stronger institution..." Of course, we are deeply gratified by that very positive evaluation and by the North Central Association's reaffirmation of accreditation, but we see much that remains to be done to improve programs, facilities, and outcomes, and we are busily engaged in the task of making the needed improvements.

In the midst of the progress occurring in the life of Southern Baptist College, we acknowledge the gracious blessings and the sustaining grace of our loving Heavenly Father and seek His leadership as we endeavor to make Southern Baptist College just what He wants it to be.

BAPTIST MEMORIAL HOSPITAL Memphis, Tennessee<br>Frank S. Groner, President

In an effort to present more current information, this Associational Report will cover the period from January 1977 through May 1978. The statistical portion of the report will cover the calendar year 1977 .

In a continuing effort to provide the best possible patient care program, a number of new services were added during the reporting period.

A new linear accelerator replaced the Betatron in the Department of Radiation Therapy. This piece of equipment produces high energy X-ray which is useful in treating deep-seated tumors. It enables the radiation therapists to treat the patient with a high dosage of radiation while exposing surrounding tissue to much lesser doses.

A computer axial tomographic body unit, better known as a whole body scanner, was installed in the diagnostic section of the Department of Radiology. The scanner displays body organs and demonstrates their relations to one another. The computer X-ray data enables, for the first time, the radiologic demonstration of tissue abnormalities throughout the body. The cost of this highly sophisticated equipment was $\$ 600,000$.

One of only 16 Sleep Disorders Centers in the United States was opened in the hospital's Neurophysiology Lab. Through an array of sophisticated monitoring equipment the Center is designed to diagnose medical disorders which may influence the disruption of sleep or awake states.

Two new specialized units have been established as a part of the program at the hospital's Lamar Rehabilitation Unit. A pain unit has been established to treat patients who have irretractable pain. A Pulmonary Rehabilitation Unit was also established to treat patients who have chronic pulmonary disease.

A 21-bed Cardiovascular-Thoracic Intensive Care Unit was established to serve the hospital's growing cardiac service. The unit is equipped with the latest computerized monitoring equipment and is located so that patients can be transferred directly from surgery to the unit, bypassing the recovery room.

Progress continues on BMH-East, a 400-bed satellite community hospital which is located approximately 12 miles east of the medical center hospital. The project is on schedule and plans are to admit patients in January of 1979. The hospital's entire obstetrical service will be located at the hospital. An equal number of beds in the original hospital building (1912-1938) will be phased out of service as beds are opened in the new hospital. The net bed capacity of the hospital will not change. The elimination of inpatients in the older buildings is necessary due to the requirements of modern fire and building codes. Construction is under way on a six-story physicians office building which will connect the new satellite hospital by a tunnel. Completion is anticipated in August 1979.
All supervisors participated in a supervisory development program that covered such topics as communication, decision-making, resolving conflicts and listening. The program included a three-hour session every other week for a six-month period.

A formal problem-solving procedure was established to provide means of appeal to any employee who might feel that he has been treated unfairly regarding hospital policy, who feels he has been discriminated against or unfairly disciplined. Employees have always been encouraged to settle problems as quickly as possible and in a fair and equitable manner. However, it was felt that a more formalized procedure was necessary to guarantee all employees that their views could be heard at all levels of management and a decision reached.

As part of an ongoing patient concern program an "Action Line" was instituted to encourage patients to let the hospital staff know if they had any problems or questions. A notice is placed in each patient room indicating that the action line is answered 24 hours a day. Patient representatives receive action line calls and give top priority to getting the patient an answer as quickly as possible. An audio visual program is currently being developed as part of an employee inservice training program designed to make each employee sensitive to the patient as an individual and the small things that each employee can do to make a hospital stay pleasant.

The hospital committed itself to a voluntary cost containment effort being coordinated by the American Hospital Association. One of the major aims of this voluntary effort is to reduce the annual ratio of increase in hospital expenditures by two percentage points each year during 1978 and 1979.

Again, according to the most recent statistics published by the American Hospital Association, Baptist Memorial Hospital has the lowest cost per patient day of all hospitals in the United States averaging 1,000 or more patients per day. Baptist Memorial Hospital maintained its position as the largest nongovernmental hospital in the country and maintained the highest inpatient average census of all hospitals, including governmental.

Hospital personnel and medical staff received a number of noteworthy recognitions. Included among them are the following:

Elected chairman of the Board for 1978 was Ralph R. Lawler, state trial judge from Trenton, Tennessee.

Dr. William Satterfield, medical director of the Lamar Rehabilitation Unit, received the Tennessee Medical Association's distinguished service award for 1977.

Dr. Rocco Calandruccio, chairman of the department of orthopedic surgery, was elected president of the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons.

Dr. Frank S. Groner, hospital president, was awarded the L. M. Graves Memorial Health Award by the Mid-South Medical Center Council as the individual who contributed most significantly to health care in the community during 1977. Dr. Groner was also recognized by the Memphis Civitan Club as the Outstanding Citizen of the Year.

Stephen C. Reynolds, assistant vice president, was elected president of the Memphis Hospital Council for the 1977-78 term.

Joseph H. Powell, executive vice president and administrator of the hospital, was elected to serve as the American College of Hospital Administrator's Regent for Tennessee. The ACHA is a professional management society for administrators of health care facilities in the United States and Canada.

Charles R. Baker, vice president, was elected to a second two-year term on the Board of Trustees of the American Protestants Hospital Association. Mr. Baker also served as chairman of the Laymen's Committee, one of four committees responsible for the planning of the Memphis Billy Graham Crusade.

Maurice W. Elliott, vice president, was designated as the administrative officer for Baptist Memorial Hospital-East. Al B. King, administrative assistant, was appointed to fill the number two administrative post at the new hospital.

The department of religion experienced a very successful year with two interns, William C. Day and Ed Lemmond. The religious ministry to the intensive care units has been intensified. Three full-time hostesses have been added to provide coverage from 7:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. The chaplains are involved as backup to the spiritual ministry of the hostesses as well as to the members of the intensive care teams. The chaplains have been involved in seminars with the coronary care and intensive care units on meeting the spiritual and emotional needs of patients and their family members. The emergency department has also added hostesses to provide coverage from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 a.m.

During 1977 the hostesses (which now total 19) made 81,187 patient contacts and fulfilled 12,748 special requests.

The hospital's Women's Auxiliary is made up of representatives of various Baptist churches in the Memphis area. The greatest concentration of their work is centered around the service patients and their families, particularly those on the pediatric unit. The auxiliary furnished white testaments for new mothers and these Bibles are distributed by the hostesses.

The following statistics for 1977 give some idea of the hospital service ministry:

1977 was the year in which more people were reached with God's Word than ever before in Bible Society history.

Millions of people around the world will recall 1977 as the year in which they were first introduced to God's Word - the year in which they discovered Jesus Christ -- and for many of them the year in which they accepted Christ as their own personal Lord and Savior.

Since its founding in 1816, the only goal of the American Bible Society has been to translate, produce, and distribute the Scriptures to people everywhere in a language they can understand and at a price they can afford. In this effort to "Let the Word Speak" to all people, the ABS, and its partners in the United Bible Societies, distributed for the first time in a single year over $400,000,000$ Scriptures in 150 countries!

In 1946 the American Bible Society published its first Scripture Selection, the Sermon on the Mount. In that year Dr. Gilbert Darlington, then ABS treasurer, wrote in the Bible Society Record, "More space is given in the four Gospels to the parable of the Sower than to any other parable ... to see God's Word enter a human life and completely transform it is a modern miracle of the highest order. To share in sowing, planting, watering, tending, and harvesting the seed is an unforgettable experience."

Scripture Selections soon afterwards became the "seeds" of the Society. Because of their relatively low cost they could be shared more widely than New Testaments or Bibles. Once planted in the heart of the reader, the seed could then grow through Portions, the New Testament, and eventually, the complete Bible.

## PROGRAM REPORT

## The Program of Distribution in Latin America

Although the distribution of complete Bibles grew by more than 10 per cent throughout the Americas in 1977, significantly greater increases were achieved in New Testament distribution. The Christians of Bolivia, together with the Bible Society, helped to share 108,083 New Testaments with the people of that country in comparison with 40,845 the previous year. Mexico reached a distribution of more than 220,000 New Testaments as compared with 90,000 in 1976. The distribution of New Testaments throughout all of Latin America increased 56.8 per cent. For the first time in many years the Cuban government granted the churches of Cuba permission to import 2,500 Bibles and 2,500 New Testaments. These were immediately supplied as a gift from the United Bible Societies.

## The Program of Distribution in Africa

In Ethiopia the distribution of complete Bibles jumped from 28,369 in 1976 to 71,397 in 1977. In Sierra Leone, Bible distribution was up 180 per cent. And in Uganda a 156 per cent increase was achieved in the circulation of complete Bibles.

The increase in distribution of New Testaments was also up in many of the countries in Africa. Ethiopia again led the list with 104 per cent increase. Malawi almost doubled its distribution from 10,384 New Testaments to 20,008. Liberia increased from a distribution of 2,610 Bibles in 1976 to 15,330 in 1977. Total distribution throughout all of Africa increased approximately 37 per cent.

## The Program of Distribution in Asia

In Muslim countries of Iran, Iraq, and Jordan, where Christian witness is so difficult, more than 19,000 Bibles were distributed in 1977 as compared to less than 3,000 the previous year. Parts of southeast Asia experienced similar success, with the distribution of complete Bibles in Micronesia up 403 per cent; in Singapore up 138 per cent and in Papua New Guinea nearly double. In India, where the Bible Society had launched massive Scripture distribution campaigns in 1977, 30 per cent more Bibles were distributed than in the previous year, and total Scripture distribution rose almost 50 per cent. Distribution throughout all of Asia increased from 120,333,729 Scriptures in 1976 to 170,876,269 in 1977.

## The Program of Distribution in Europe

Although overall Scripture distribution throughout Europe was down slightly in 1977, Yugoslavia achieved an increase in the distribution of complete Bibles from 6,251 in 1976 to 23,136 in 1977, and the number of New Testaments distributed rose from 1,067 to 10,599 . Another significant increase occurred in Italy where the introduction of the interconfessional common language Italian New Testament resulted in a distribution increase from 10,911 copies in 1976 to 140,090 in 1977. Spain showed an overall increase of 86 per cent in total Scripture distribution throughout 1977.

## The Program of Distribution in the USA

Distribution of complete Bibles in the United States followed the pattern set by the rest of the world, increasing in one year from $1,142,842$ in 1976 to $2,601,198$ in 1977. Much of this success was due to the appearance in December 1976 of the Good News Bible, which in less than one year reached a world-wide circulation of five million copies. Total Scripture distribution $(114,283,716)$ throughout the United States was down slightly from 1976.

Major denominations in North Carolina participated in a "Good News North Carolina" campaign which culminated on Sunday, November 27, 1977 - a day designated as "Good News Sunday." The purpose of the campaign was to involve churches across North Carolina in a celebration of the Bible, to promote awareness of the new Today's English Version translation of the Bible entitled the Good News Bible, and to encourage the statewide distribution of the Scriptures. More than one million church bulletin inserts and 10,000 posters helped to promote the program.

## The Program of Distribution for GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS

Distribution opportunities for complete Bibles and New Testaments are limited in many areas of the world because the level of literacy is so low. The Bible Society's answer to this problem is the GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READ. ERS program, where those just beginning to read can discover God's Word through a graded series of Scripture Selections in a language and format they can easily read and understand.

By the end of 1977 New Reader translations of the Scriptures had been undertaken in 328 languages, an increase of 42 languages over 1976. Sixteen of these languages now have New Reader Scriptures available in four of the graded series (A, B, C, and D), an increase of 11 languages during 1977. Series A was published in 46 additional languages, Series B in 29, and Series C in 26.

During the year three new countries - Greece, Liberia, and Senegal - were added to the list of nations in which New Reader programs have been started.

By the time the new reader has completed a full series in his language, it is anticipated he will be at a reading level which will make reading a common language New Testament possible.

## Translations

An average of nearly once every two weeks during 1977, somewhere in the world a group of people who had never before had the Word of God in their own language, received a Portion of Scripture for the first time. By the end of the year, at least one book of the Bible had been published in a total of 1,631 languages, an increase of 28 during the year.

Some of the languages in which complete New Testaments appeared for the first time include Bawm, Kok Borok, Lumasaaba, Ma'di, Muyuw, Penan, Quechua: Imbabura, Yagaria, and Yipunu. For the people of Ecuador who speak Quechua: Imbabura, this is the first publication of any part of Scripture in their own language.

## ABS Volunteers

Much of the success achieved for the Bible cause in 1977 was due to the untiring efforts of more than 30,000 ABS volunteers who carried out local distribution programs in hospitals, schools, jails, missions, and places of business; presented the need of the Bible cause to churches; gave radio interviews; and recruited members for the Bible-a-Month Club. These volunteers were operating almost 2,000 Scripture Courtesy Centers across the country by the end of 1977, an increase of nearly 500 over 1976. Also included in this army of volunteers were more than 12,000 Church Representatives who act as special links between the congregations and the ABS. Nearly 15 per cent of these people represent the ABS in Southern Baptist churches across the U. S.

## FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Total income of the ABS from all sources in 1977 was $\$ 29,871,640$. Income from the churches totaled $\$ 1,545,634$. The churches of the Southern Baptist Convention contributed $\$ 251,908$ or approximately $\$ .022$ per member. This was a decrease of $\$ 23,723$ from 1976 . Since 1966 contributions from the churches and agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention have been as follows:

In April of 1977 a National Advisory Council was held in New York. Carolyn Weatherford and Porter Routh represented the SBC. One of the resolutions adopted by the Advisory Council supported the United Bible Societies goal of at least doubling income from local contributions by 1980. If the $12,733,124$ members of the SBC were to raise their level of annual support to $\$ .04$ per member, total giving to the Bible cause would reach $\$ 509,000$ and help reach the UBS goal. This would help make certain that the Bible Society will be able to provide the Scriptures needed by the Southern Baptist Convention in its global ministry.

The Bible Society asks for your continued prayers so that together with the churches of the Southern Baptist Convention and all willing Christians everywhere, our combined efforts to bring His Word to all those who are in desperate need of it will be blessed by God.

A "time of contrasts" is a phrase used by Dr. Darold H. Morgan, Annuity Board president, to describe the denominational insurance and pension planning organization's financial state of affairs in recent times.
"Even though we have been able to count many blessings which have resulted from strong growth in new retirement accounts," Dr. Morgan explains, "the contrasts have resulted mainly from an erratic stock market performance - an occurrence that has influenced investment strategy strongly."

At the end of the second quarter of 1978, total assets administered by the Annuity Board stood at $\$ 539,242,775$. The Board marked a milestone in its 60 -year history during the first quarter when assets surpassed a half billion dollars.

Premium and dues through the first two quarters of 1978 reached a record $\$ 25,305,031$. Through June this year, the Board distributed $\$ 7,211,220$ to 13,662 annuitants.

Churches entering the retirement program since January 1,1978 numbered 154. In 1977, a record total of 545 new churches enrolled in the basic retirement plan.

By mid-summer, the number of members joining the new Southern Baptist Retirement Program totaled more than 5,000. The program was officially inaugurated on January 1.

A total of 21,176 churches and associations are participating currently with 24,613 employees in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program. In this state convention, the number of new members enrolled in the program during the first six months of 1978 is 43 . The following Baptist agencies participate in the retirement program.

Founded 40 years ago as Baptists' visible presence and witnessin the nation's capital, the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs sought during 1977 to serve as a channel for communicating Baptist concerns in matters of public policy and to share with Baptists news and trends of such matters as they affect Baptists. In pursuit of this dual objective, efforts were made to strengthen the visibility of the Baptist Joint Committee both in Washington and throughout our Baptist constituency.

Although the day-to-day task of the agency is carried out by a competent staff of ten under the direction of Executive Director James E. Wood, Jr., actual policy decisions are made by of ficial representatives of the nine member bodies, including the Southern Baptist Convention. During 1977, official statements were adopted commending President Carter's emphasis on human rights and commitment to nuclear disarmament and calling on signatory nations to the 1975 Helsinki accord to "seek to show in every way possible respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms, including the freedom of thought, conscience, religion or belief."

Other official actions taken during the year included reiterating opposition to tuition tax credits for nonpublic schools, expressing alarm at the prospect of the calling of a constitutional convention, naming a special committee to seek ways of combatting the Internal Revenue Service's regulation concerning "integrated auxiliaries," and joining a friend-of-the-court brief at the U. S. Supreme Court on behalf of a Baptist minister from Tennessee whose right to run for public office was challenged under that state's constitutional ban against ministers' seeking public office.

In October, the Baptist Joint Committee sponsored its Sixteenth Religious Liberty Conference under the theme, "Taxation and the Free Exercise of Religion." Some 150 participants from all eight U. S. Baptist bodies participated. One visible outcome of the Conference was the publication of a volume on the proceedings of this timely gathering.

The staff of the Baptist Joint Committee continued during 1977 its ongoing effort to inform Baptists throughout the United States of developments in Washington which affect the life of the churches by means of two news services, Baptist Press (BP) and Baptist Public Affairs (BPA), as well as through its own monthly publication, Report from the Capital. In addition, staff members contributed articles to several other denominational publications.

During the year numerous services were provide by staff members to the various conventions and conferences supporting the Baptist Joint Committee. The Executive Director participated on the programs of annual meetings of some member bodies and various staff members participated in or led conferences and seminars at the state and local levels.

Among organizations with which staff members worked during the year in efforts to voice Baptist concerns in public affairs were the National Council on Religion and Public Education; the National Coalition on Public Education and Religious Liberty; the Baptist World Alliance Commission on Freedom, Justice and Peace; the Washington Council of UN Representatives; the NCC International Affairs Work Group on Human Rights; and the Washington Interreligious Staff Council.

Dur ing the past year there have been a number of encouraging developments on the moral scene: large numbers of Christians have become more highly sensitized to the increasing level of immorality which is beamed into their homes by television; new initiatives have been made to deal with world hunger; renewe attention has been given to human rights; the importance of doing the gospel in daily life has been more widely accepted in the churches; and the place of Christian morality as the natural outgrowth of Christian conversion has come to be more generally subscribed to among the people of God. There have been enough discouraging developments on the moral scene, however, to keep Christians humble: hunger and poverty persist; racial problems go unresolve ; gambling and alcohol interests keep on finding new victims; the arms race continues its malignant growth; the energy crisis keeps building; health care costs continue to rise; and both inflation and unemployment trouble multitudes of people at home and abroad.

The Christian Life Commission has responded with all its might to these moral challenges. Through conferences, literature, organizational activities, speeches, sermons, books, and the mass media, the Commission has assisted Baptists working to bring God's righteousness to a sinful world.

Renewed attention has been devote to the problem of hunger and the terrible toll it extracts from human beings who have been denied their right to eat. The Christian Life Commission worked with several other agencies to lead Southern Baptists in the first observance of World Hunger Day on August 2. This fall a Convention-wide Convocation on Hunger is being sponsored by a group of Southern Baptist agencies chaired by the Christian Life Commission. This Convocation is intended to raise consciousness about hunger and suggest effective ways through which Christians can combat worl hunger.

Following last year's battle over "Soap," the struggle against immoral television programing also has continued. The Christian Life Commission's "Help for Television Viewers" packet, distributed as a Cooperative Program-funded project to nearly 50,000 church leaders last year, has received wide publicity and use. The ABC Evening News as well as Newsweek magazine, The New York Times, The Washington Post, and the Los Angeles Examiner gave attention to the packet and to the Christian Life Commission's work in the area of television morality.

The Commission has continued to help God's changed people in their task of changing the world. A number of regional conferences have been conducted in 1978 to assist pastors and laypersons in applying the gospel to daily life. A national seminar held in Nashville, Tennessee, considere current lifestyle issues in Christian perspective. Two consultations were held to aid Southern Baptists in their efforts to deal with moral problems related to alcohol and family life. A specialized conference helped church leaders come to grips with their moral responsibility in the energy crisis. Again the Christian Life Commission provided posters and literature to the many Southern Baptist churches choosing to observe Race Relations Sunday and Christian Citizenship Sunday.

The task is not complete. In this imperfect world, new moral challenges are constantly arising. Yet Christians have a sense of genuine satisfaction in knowing that during the past year God's people have been faithful as His salt and light in the world, a people truly on Bold Mission, doing the gospel of God in Christ. The Christian Life Commission, in accordance with its mandate from God and from Southern Baptists, continues in its commitment to help Southern Baptists work faithfully in the whole field of applied Christianity.

## EDUCATION COMMISSION

## INTRODUCTION

Several significant accomplishments have been made by the Education Commission during the past fiscal year. The McGrath Study of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools, part of the National Colloquium follow-up, has been widely acclaimed by educational leaders throughout the country. According to Dr. McGrath, Baptist colleges and schools on the whole have remaine closer to their denomination than any other major group of church-related colleges. Dr. McGrath believes that the greatest single factor contributing to the comparative healthy condition of Southern Baptist colleges is that they have kept strong ties with the denomination. During the past ten years Baptist colleges have increase their enrollment by more than 30 percent which is far above the national average. During this same period Baptist colleges, although experiencing some financial difficulties, stand high above the national average in sound fiscal management and solvency. More significantly, Baptist colleges are now beginning to apply individually the results of this study and further strengthening their denominational ties and academic programs.

During this past year, the Education Commission continued to implement the Mission Support program adopted by the Commission and the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools in 1971. National meetings have been held between Baptist college presidents, the Foreign Mission Board, the Home Mission Board, and Woman's Missionary Union. The goal for all our Baptist colleges has been to make missions a matter of total institutional policy. Baptist colleges and schools are giving enthusiastic backing to Bold Mission Thrust.

A special study committee consisting of college presidents and deans came to Nashville for a two-day meeting for upgrading and improving our teacherplacement service. Securing dedicated Baptist teachers must continue to be given a high priority both at the local and national levels.

Calls continue to increase for assistance in trustee orientation both from the individual institutions and state secretaries. The Commission has given leadership and guidance for a number of workshops and is currently engaged in updating trustee orientation materials.

One of the most exciting things that has happened this year is developing capabilities for taking advantage of channeling materials to Baptist Sunday School Board publications, both curriculum and noncurriculum. This means that we have the possibility of feature stories and units of study concerning Southern Baptist colleges and schools in appropriate Baptist Sunday School Board publications and other agencies' publications.

Student recruitment. Continues to be a major emphasis. The sixth annual admissions workshop was held in Nashville with a record-breaking attendance. Included in this recruitment program is a special concern for the vocational Christian worker.

Sometimes the most significant accomplishments are the most difficult to articulate, but we believe that the National Colloquium in Williamsburg, Virginia, marked the turning point for Southern Baptist colleges and schools. With few, if any exceptions, Baptist colleges and schools seem more than at any other time in their recent history to be genuinely concerned for Christian values, character development, and supporting the work of our denomination.

Institutional Changes. - John A. Fincher retired July 31, 1977, as president of Carson-Newman College; Cordell Maddox was elected to succeed him. William R. Hintze, president of Grand Canyon College, died of heart attack November 17, 1977. Dillard Whitis was named acting president. Jesse C. Fletcher was elected president of Hardin-Simmons University. E. Eugene Hall assumed the presidency of Oklahoma Baptist University. Pope A. Duncan was elected to the presidency of Stetson University. George R. Borders, chief administrative officer at Stetson, was named president of Palm Beach Atlantic College, succeeding Warner Earle Fusselle who had resigned. Ray P. Rust was elected to the presidency of Anderson College succeeding Cordell Maddox. W. Lowrey Compere, Clarke College, retired as president and was succeeded by S. L. Harris. Golden Gate Seminary presidency was filled by William M. Pinson, Jr. Russell H. Dilday, Jr. was named president-elect of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, and will assume the presidency August 1, 1978. Donald M. Anthony succeeded Woodson Armes as secretary of the Texas Christian Education Commission. Joseph P. DuBose, Jr., assumed the presidency of Baptist Bible Insitute.

Support. - The state conventions and Southern Baptist Convention increased their 1977 support to the schools by $\$ 4,615,202$ for a total of $\$ 40,299,281$. In addition to operations and capital needs support, $\$ 580,467$ was given as addition to endowment funds. Donations, gifts, and grants totaled $\$ 43,360,869$ for an increase of $\$ 5,789,343$. Endowment funds amounted to $\$ 391,599,485$; property was valued at $\$ 764,840,835$, making assets a total of $\$ 1,156,440,320$. This is an increase of $\$ 98,151,316$ over last year.

Church Vocation Volunteers. - Church vocation volunteers increased to 21,676 for 1977-1978.

## The Program of Christian Education, Leadership, and Coordination Program Accomplishments, 1976-77

1. Coordinated the development of a Bold Mission strategy and emphasis by Baptist schools.
(1) Continued preparation for National Missions Conference for Southern Baptist Educators.
(2) Developed pilot models on several campuses.
(3) Established missions coordinators on Baptist college campuses.
2. Completed cooperative work with Dr. Earl McGrath and the Program in Liberal Studies in an extensive study of 49 Southern Baptist colleges. The results of the study were published and distributed.
3. Provided consultative services to the officers and committees (including the Program Committee) of the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools.
4. Developed plans for Colloquium follow-up including seminars, regional Colloquium-type meetings.
5. Worked with Vocational Guidance Section of the Baptist Sunday School Board in a general recruitment and training program of the vocational Christian worker.
6. Developed plans for a new program with the Home Mission Board in relation to the recruitment of ethnics.
7. Continued to work with college directors of extension and the Seminary Extension Department regarding adult education and continuing education.
8. Continued to work with the Home Mission Board in developing inservice training programs on Baptist college campuses.
9. Continued to work with National Student Ministries of the Baptist Sunday School Board in developing more effective programs on Baptist college campuses.
10. Served as liaison with national education organizations: American Association of Colleges, National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, Association of Governing Board for Universities and Colleges, Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges, National Council of Independent Colleges, American College Public Relations Association, U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welf are, House Ways and Means Committee.
11. Met with other national leaders of Christian higher education for a conference on the role of church-related colleges in American education.
12. Assisted in the formation of new organization of executives of boards of higher-education.
13. Continued to assist prospective students, parents, and church leaders in supplying information regarding our Baptist schools (e.g. location, subjects offered, accreditation, etc.).

## The Program of College Studies and Services

Program Accomplishments, 1976-77

1. Developed campus models for implementing Bold Mission strategies in cooperation with the Foreign Mission Board and the Home Mission Board.
2. Conducted faculty workshops.
3. Continued to assist Baptist colleges and schools in maintaining their accreditation by offering special helps prior to and following self-studies required by the regional accrediting agencies.
4. Conducted surveys: course offerings in Baptist colleges, comparative percentage distribution of Cooperative Program funds to Baptist schools of total funds contributed and also of Cooperative Program funds kept within the state.
5. Attended and provided assistance for American Baptist Theological Seminary Commission meetings, American Baptist Theological Seminary Executive Committee meetings, American Baptist Theological Holding Board meetings, and American Baptist Theological Seminary Board of Trustees meetings.
6. Continued to give direct assistance to schools in management, curriculum development, denominational relations, public relations, student recruitment, development, and alumni organization.
7. Administered scholarship-loan programs: the Opdyke Fund the Farmer-Robertson scholarship program.
8. Conducted sixth annual workshop for state education committee/ commission chairmen.

## The Program of Teacher-Personnel Placement Services <br> Program Ac complishments, 1976-77

1. Conducted a two-day workshop with representative presidents and deans for the purpose of upgrading placement service.
2. Set up new procedure for visiting graduate schools particularly in the South and Southwest in order to identify qualified Baptist personnel.
3. Visited thirty schools, making contact with 300 faculty members and 1,500 students in personal interviews or by letter. New registrants increased 43 percent and the number of positions filled increased 33 percent over the previous year.
4. Monitored government regulations in order to counsel college personnel in recruitment of faculty.

## The Program of Student Recruitment <br> Program A ccomplishments, 1976-77

1. Held sixth Admissions Workshop with 45 junior and senior colleges represented, 1 Bible school, and 1 academy.
2. Encouraged admissions directors to promote Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day in each state.
3. Assisted schools in securing names of church-related vocational volunteers.
4. Produced special materials on Christian education and Baptist schools for assemblies, conferences, workshops, conventions, and churches.
5. Prepared materials for use in Southern Baptist publications.
6. Continued to furnish church libraries materials on Christian education and Bible schools.
7. Improved utilization of Baptist state papers as a channel for communicating news and information about Christian educations to churches.

## The Program of Convention Relations <br> Program Accomplishments, 1976-77

1. Planned and promoted Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day emphasis.
(1) Prepared and distributed materials for promoting and supporting Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day in the churches February 20, 1977.
(2) Assisted and encouraged state conventions and school leaders in their support of Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day.
2. Prepared promotional and informational materials.
(1) Prepared and distributed materials showing the purpose, programs, and benefits of Baptist schools (Christian education).
(2) Assisted schools in their development and improvement of promotional and informational materials.
3. Conducted annual workshop for chairmen of state education committees/commissions.
(1) Assisted the chairmen in securing counsel and assistance for meetings of the state education committee in each state convention.
(2) Evaluated and improved materials and methods used in promoting and supporting Baptist Seminary, College, and School Day.
(3) Began a study of the state convention's role in providing, evaluating, and upgrading trustee orientation.
(4) Continued a review of denominational relations and ways of improving relations of schools with churches, associations, and state conventions.
4. Prepared statistical tables for the SBC Annual of all Southern Baptist colleges and schools.
5. Continued follow-through with previously adopted goals of THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST EDUCATOR which included developing a clearer understanding of the work of our denomination by Baptist school faculties, administrators, and trustees.
6. Gave special assistance to state executive secretaries, state education committees, SBC agencies, and individual colleges and schools on request.
7. Continued to work with the Denominational Relations Committee of the Education Commission with special emphasis on better communications with Baptist pastors and denominational leaders.
8. Worked with the program committee within the Education Commission membership to study present and future goals and programs.
9. Prepared statistical summaries for annual report to convention including enrollment, number of ministerial students, home and foreign mission volunteers, church music and minister of education volunteers and a number of other church-related volunteers, endowment, property valuc, ctc.
10. Served as director for United College Board (black colleges).

## MISSIONARY SUPPORT

The sending out and maintaining of missionaries is primary in Southern Baptist overseas missions through the channel of the Foreign Mission Board. The appointment of 279 missionaries in all categories of service during 1977 exceeded the record of all previous years. Much prayer and missionary education in the churches are reflected in this response to Christ's calling.

As of January 1, 1978, Southern Baptists were at work in 90 countries, with a missionary staff of 2,776 (including 2,365 career missionaries, 217 associates, 183 journeymen, and 11 special project workers). The new appointees included 127 career missionaries, 18 reappointments, 31 missionary associates, 94 missionary journeymen, and 9 special project workers. One person from the home office staff was appointed to missionary service, and one to journeyman service. The 1977 appointments bring the total appointed since 1845 to 6,147.

There was thrilling response to the Bold Mission Thrust, with the Mission Service Corps and volunteers in missions programs. A total of 2,413 people in addition to the missionary staff went overseas in 1977 for periods of auxiliary service ranging from 2 weeks to 1 year.

Increase in missionary personnel automatically means the assumption by the Foreign Mission Board of responsibility for support for the new missionaries. Southern Baptists, committed to the task of making Christ known to all the world during the remainder of this century, continued to provide undergirding for this vast outreach through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

At the end of 1977, Southern Baptist foreign missionaries were assigned to 90 countries and territories.* Madagascar and Mozambique were removed from the list. New fields of missionary assignment added during 1977 included Sri Lanka, Scotland, Cayman Islands, Martinique, South Africa, the South African homeland of Bophuthatswana, Rwanda, and Seychelles.

(Work in Libya, Greece, and Turkey is with an Englishlanguage Baptist church in each country.)

## EVANGELISM AND CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

Evangelism and church development are central to the objectives of missions: making disciples, maturing disciples in the fellowship of local churches, and developing churches into a cooperative effort for a continued outreach. Churches overseas are stimulated by the Foreign Mission Board and its missionaries, but rather than being extensions of our churches, they stand in fraternal relationship with the Southern Baptist Convention. Accomplishments are largely those of national churches, leaders, and conventions, with the assistance of missionary co-workers and resources from Southern Baptists.

In 1977, membership of Baptist churches in conventions to which Southern Baptist missionaries relate exceeded $1,000,000$ for the first time. More than 500 new churches were organized during the year, and there were 98,715 baptisms.

There were significant special evangelistic campaigns in many countries including Antigua, Grenada, Trinidad, Venezuela, Paraguay, Liberia, Ghana, Upper Volta, Zambia, Tanzania, and Thailand. In some cases, teams of evangelists and lay witnesses from the United States participated. In other situations, persons from neighboring countries or local evangelists provided leadership.

A pilot project in Major City Evangelization reached a climax in South Brazil. The program is well under way in Hong Kong and is being considered in Argentina and Mexico. Plans were developing in Korea and an ambitious program was set in motion in Brazil, looking toward the 100th anniversary of Baptist work there. Comprehensive urban evangelistic strategy was being implemented in Singapore and Bangkok.

The program of evangelism and church development includes many activities such as radio and television, religious education promotion, lay leadership training, stewardship, camps and conferences, women's work, men's work, youth work, and music.

In 1977 a major new broadcasting effort was projected to cover the entire Arab world. New broadcasts for Africa were begun from Seychelles. There was an important mass media planning conference in Nairobi, Kenya. Committees to plan broadcasting work were set up for the Francophone countries of West Africa and for Nigeria. New broadcasting studios were dedicated in Panama and Uruguay.

Approximately 2,500 persons enrolled in Bible correspondence courses offered as follow-up to broadcasting in Ecuador. There was a similar response in Benin and increased enrollment in Ivory Coast. Lay training programs, especially those using WIN materials, continued in many countries. Volunteer evangelistic teams from the United States (of ten combined with medical or construction projects) helped in a number of countries.

Maturing national Baptist bodies played a significant part in the evangelistic progress. Baptists of Ecuador sent out their first home missionaries, as did a church in East Malaysia. Jordanian Baptists sent preaching missions to Yemen, the Persian Gulf region, and Syria. Mexican work is now open in every state. Brazilian Baptists sent missionaries to Venezuela and to France. Venezuelan Baptists began 10 new preaching points along the Pan American Highway.

## SCHOOLS AND STUDENT WORK

Strong indigenous churches must have capable and well-trained leadership from among their people. Educational institutions under Baptist auspices in various lands may include all levels from kindergarten through university. Baptists also sponsor theological schools and Bible institutes to prepare men and women for church and denominational leadership.

The Baptist Theological College for the Caribbean opened on Barbados in 1977. New seminary property was dedicated in Portugal. Responsibility for the Mexico seminary was assumed by the Mexico convention; national presidents were installed in seminaries in Korea, Thailand, and Malaysia. Record seminary enrollments were reported in Argentina, Brazil, and Thailand.

Theological Education by Extension was expanding during the year, with notable developments in Portugal, Ecuador, Venezuela, and Colombia.

A new student center opened in Lomé, Togo, and new student work programs were underway in Beirut, Lebanon, and in Ghana. Student ministry in Mexico developed into a national organization. Christian students at the main university in Bangkok, Thailand, distributed 20,000 Bibles.

## PUBLICATION WORK

Adequate supplies of all kinds of Christian literature are needed for the developing of vigorous churches; therefore, publication ministries are an integral part of Southern Baptist overseas missions. There are formal publishing centers in 21 countries and informal literature production programs in a number of other lands.

The major development in Baptist publishing work in 1977 was the installation of Aldo Broda, an Argentine Baptist leader, as director of Baptist Spanish Publishing House. The publishing house added three regional sales representatives for Latin America, opened new book deposits in Brazil, and published several new Bible editions.

Arabic publicationwork based in Lebanon was transferred in 1977 to national responsibility and leadership. The Brazil Baptist Sunday School Board inaugurated a new administration and editorial building.

In Morocco responsibility for the Christian bookstore in Fez (the only one in the country) was assumed by Southern Baptist missionaries. A translation of the New Testament in modern Hebrew was released; Southern Baptist missionary Robert Lindsey had shared translation responsibility. A book fair was held in San José, Costa Rica. One million New Testaments were donated for use in religion classes in the public schools of the Rio de Janeiro area of Brazil.

## HOSPITALS AND MEDICAL CARE

Medical work serves the physical needs of thousands of people who would otherwise be neglected and of ten opens strategic doors for evangelism. In cooperation with national medical personnel, this witness is expressed by Southern Baptists through hospitals, dental clinics, dispensaries and day clinics, nursing schools, and other health care ministries overseas.

The Shaki Baptist Hospital in Nigeria celebrated its 25 th anniversary in 1977. Both Shaki and Ogbomosho hospitals became teaching branches of the University College Hospital in Ibadan. The Baptist hospital in Korea opened the sixth floor, adding 60 beds.

There were new mobile medical vehicles in Mexico and Malawi. A dental clinic was opened in the Ivory Coast. Lay volunteers held medical and dental clinics at several places in the Caribbean.

A new building and equipment to replace fire losses at the Yemen Baptist hospital were almost ready at year end. The Baptist hospital in Paraguay completed a new laboratory wing. A physical therapy department was opened at the hospital in Tanzania.

## BENEVOLENT MINISTRIES

Social service ministries are closely related in motivation and results to medical work. Such ministries include agricultural programs, good will and community centers, orphans' homes, and direct relief. Direct relief work is not handled as a budget item, but allocations are made for emergency and recurring relief needs mainly from relief funds contributed by Southern Baptists for such purposes.

Developments in connection with benevolent ministries were the adding of agricultural missionaries in several fields; expanded prison ministries in the Caribbean and in Thailand; planning for an old people's home in Mexico; the assigning of a social ministries missionary to Honduras; and ministries to persons with leprosy, to invalids, or to the blind in various countries.

## CONTRIBUTIONS

In 1977, Southern Baptists' contributions for foreign missions totaled $\$ 57,918,817$. The 1977 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering goal was $\$ 34$ million - an increase over the $\$ 28,763,809$ contributed (as of May 31,1976 ) through the 1976 offering.

Approximately 50 percent of the Southern Baptist Convention Cooperative Program funds is made available annually for for eign missions. This is the basis upon which Bold Mission Thrust can be built. Still urgently needed on overseas fields are land, buildings, and equipment, amounting to several million dollars` worth.

## BOLD MISSION THRUST

Bold Mission Thrust - the Southern Baptist Convention's plan to reach the nation for Christ - occupied a top spot in the attention of staff, missionary personnel and directors of the Southern Baptist Home Board during 1977. In cooperation with state conventions, the HMB devoted considerable attention and effort to working with both state and associational leadership in the implementation of Bold Mission Thrust plans. The staff of the HMB also was engaged in consultations with state leaders to select key cities and key underevangelized counties for special BMT assistance. The agency provided special staff consultants to work with local forces in planning strategy and coordinating the use of resources. In 1977, Phase One of the concentrated effort gave attention to six metropolitan areas and some 60 counties.

## MISSION SERVICE CORPS

As a result of action by messengers to the 1977 SBC annual meeting in Kansas City, Mo., the HMB is now deeply involved in developing procedures and recruiting volunteers for the Mission Service Corps. MSC has a goal of enlisting 5,000 volunteers to serve for one or two years, either in the United States or abroad, in an effort to reach the objectives of Bold Mission Thrust. The time-line for the recruitment is 1982. In order to better fulfill the action, David Bunch was elected in December to coordinate the entire MSC program for the HMB. By year's end, five persons were serving on the field, and 1,100 places of service had been identified and catalogued.

## A NOTE OF SADNESS AND VICTORY

This year brought notes of sadness, but also notes of victory as two great leaders died. Courts B. Redford, executive secretary-treasurer of the HMB from Jan. 1, 1954, to Dec. 31, 1964, died April 11, 1977, and Arthur B. Rutledge, executive director-treasurer from Jan. 1, 1965, until Dec. 31, 1976, died Nov. 23, 1977. Dr. Rutledge's wife, Vesta, preceded him in death on Oct. 3, 1977. Redford and Rutledge shaped and molded the direction of the HMB for more than two decades. Under their leadership, the HMB and the SBC moved into every state in the union and grew to more than 13 -million members in 35,000 -plus churches across our nation.

## STAFF AND MISSIONARIES

At the year's end, the Home Mission Board staff reached 102. In the past decade, 29 positions have been added to the staff. During 1977, three new positions were added: assistant director of the language missions department, assistant director of church extension, and director of Mission Service Corps coordination. During the year, the missionary force increased 338, growing to 2,830 persons under appointment. The increase came about through inclusion of the wives of those receiving Church Pastoral Assistance and new positions.

## FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Again, during 1977, financial support of the work of the HMB was outstanding. Cooperative Program gifts increased 15 percent and contributions to the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions gained 11.58 percent. The HMB received $\$ 9.4$ million in the basic CP allocation, plus $\$ 431,507$ from the challenge section. The AAEO provided $\$ 10,745,968$.

## PROGRAM-BY-PROGRAM SUMMARY

During the year, the 14 program areas and six support sectors performed a number of functions. Here is a program-by-program summary:

Evangelism Development - This program works with and assists churches, associations, state conventions and Southern Baptist Convention agencies in interpreting, promoting, and properly relating the message, methods, motivation and spirit of New Testament evangelism. During 1977, the churches of the convention reported 345,000 baptisms, the lowest total in several years. Church membership, however, was up 1.1 percent. The program targeted six key cities - New York, Baltimore, Washington, D.C., Cleveland, Chicago and Detroit - for prime concern, developing with local evangelism and mission leaders a comprehensive strategy for evangelism. Evangelistic Bible study was provided to some 8,000 persons through the Correspondence Bible Course. The department also provided expertise, resources and staff assistance to 17 state conventions in equipping chairmen of evangelism.

Personal Evangelism - This program works with churches, associations and state conventions in motivating, equipping and involving persons for a lifestyle of personal witnessing and training of others for such a lifestyle. Personal evangelism was recognized as a program of the HMB in 1975. During 1977, testing and validation of the "TELL Witness Training" process was completed; 251 churches were involved in production and validation. The program also plans a renewed emphasis on the Lay Evangelism School and creation of new material. Some 172 laypersons were involved in national evangelism training events and 1,100 laypersons were trained to respond to needs in all areas of personal evangelism in their churches and associations.

Mass Evangelism - This program works with churches, associations and state conventions in all types of mass evangelism ministries and projects, including local church revivals, ethnic crusades, area crusades, simultaneous revivals and other specialized types of mass evangelism. During 1977, a media campaign featured television spots for state conventions, associations and other interested Baptist groups. Also, the first national conference on evangelism in small churches was planned and conducted with an attendance of 215 persons. A seminar for professional evangelists drew 185 persons. Also, 10 area crusades received assistance; 15 professional evangelists were trained to serve as field consultants, and material for planning and conducting lay-led revivals was prepared.

Chaplaincy - This program provides endorsement for ministers serving in chaplaincy positions, a support ministry to chaplains and their families on the field and a promotional relationship to churches, associations and state conventions. During 1977, some 245 chaplains were granted denominational endorsement, bringing the total number of full-time and active duty chaplains to 799 . Another 485 persons serve in part-time and volunteer chaplain positions. During the year, Carl Hart was named director of the chaplaincy division.

Church Loans - This program works with and assists associations, state conventions and churches by providing counsel on church loans and financing for church building construction and church site purchases. During the year, the nine staff members gave counsel on church finance to some 1,500 churches, and assisted a number of these churches in obtaining local financing. Where local financing was not available, loan applications from 321 churches were processed and/or approved on long-term commitments totaling $\$ 17,450,000$. During the year, the works with assets to $\$ 51,118,860$. Some 2,000 churches are served by the program.

Associational Administration Service - This program works with and assists associations, state conventions and SBC agencies toward achieving effective administration in the associations. It relates to 1,190 associations with about 20,000 elected officials and 800 employed workers, of which 245 are HMB employees. Associational Emphasis Week appeared on the denominational calendar for the first time in 1977, and this program has the promotional responsibility. Some 50 new directors of missions participated in a five-day Basic Leadership Seminar. Materials produced included 10 issues of Associational Administration Bulletin, and a filmstrip packet - "Volunteers in Bold Mission Thrust" - for use by pastors and directors of missions.

Metropolitan Missions - This program works with churches, associations and state conventions in identifying priority needs, discovering available resources and recommending effective strategies and techniques of Southern Baptist work in associations related to metropolitan communities, including central city, suburban and metropolitan fringe areas. It relates to directors of associational missions, other associational staff members, pastors and leaders in 240 areas, assisting in the support of 148 missionaries. Also, the program conducted 20 Urban Training Cooperative events, special urban training seminars in conjunction with Southern Baptists seminaries; 24 PACT (Project Assistance to Churches in Transition) consultations and three regional consultations. The program also carried the management role for the BMT key cities emphasis, entailing supervision of HMB consultants for 15 key cities.

Rural-Urban Missions - This program relates to directors of associational missions, pastors and leaders in more than 600 rural-urbanassociations. It assists in the support of 178 missionaries. The program assisted in 14 state convention and regional rural and small church conferences, involving 1,545 persons. It assisted 20 associations in strategy planning and led in Bold Mission Thrust conferences in use of volunteers for more than 300 directors of associational missions. The in-service guidance this year involved 60 persons representing 40 institutions and 15 state conventions. The department also emphasized a new thrust of work with the bi-vocational minister. The program also carried the management role for the Bold Mission Thrust Key Counties emphasis, entailing supervision of HMB consultants in 60 under-evangelized county clusters.

Christian Social Ministries - This program works with and assists churches, associations and state conventions in expressing Christian love and witness through special ministries. During the year, the department assisted in support of 337 missionary personnel. During the year, nine associational directors of Christian social ministries were appointed and four other persons - a center director to serve in Las Vegas, an area missionary with emphasis on ministry to the aging in Arizona, a national consultant on ministries to the blind and migrants, and a national consultant on Baptist center and weekday ministries

- were appointed. A number of major conferences were held on such topics as youth and family services, evangelism through ministries, aging, church growth, techniques of ministry, criminal justice, literacy and ministering in transitional communities. The department also provided $\$ 116,434$ to 16 state conventions for disaster relief, and worked with one state convention to establish a convention-wide disaster relief program.

Church Extension - This program works with and assists churches, associations and state conventions in establishing and bringing new churches and missions to self-support. It assisted 649 congregations with church pastoral aid and other financial assistance. Of them, 206 were new situations and 46 congregations achieved self-support. A total of 373 new churches and 756 new church-type missions were reported on annual church letters for a net gain of 182 churches. Currently, 1,856 church-type missions are in operation. During the year, 10 church extension missionaries and four US-2 missionaries were appointed. The department has continued to expand the Church Extension Summer Seminar, using 85 seminary students in teams to start 42 new works during the summer. The department continues to promote the church missions committee as a vehicle for implementing Bold Mission Thrust.

Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists - This program assists National and Southern Baptist churches, associations, state conventions in their attempts to effect reconciling and cooperative relationship. It also attempts to respond to particular needs of black Southern Baptist churches. In 1977, the department hosted the C. C. Hubert Religious Institute in cooperation with the Morehouse School of Religion, drawing more than 800 churchmen from across the nation. Some 210 persons attended the first annual conference on the racially transitional church; some 1,200 black collegians attended the National Baptist Student Retreat, and 5,000 persons heard a production of "The Roots and Fruits of Black Church Music," written and produced by the department. Scholarship assistance was provided to 246 students preparing for full-time Christian vocations. Publications include "Partners in Ministry," a magazine on cooperative ministry; "Baptists Talk," a manual for interracial dialogue, and "About Black Americans," a scriptograph.

Interfaith Witness -- This program works with and assists churches, associations and state conventions in witnessing to people of other religious groups. The promotion is done through a research and resource staff of four persons and four regional directors based in different parts of tire country. A record 180 awareness conferences were held in 29 states and Canada; 14 training conferences for volunteer associates were conducted in 13 states with total attendance of 14,557 . The department also held its first national dialogue with the Orthodox Church in America. A record 206,000 pamphlets were distributed and 7,900 copies of B.O.O.K. (Beliefs of Other Kinds) were sold.

Language Missions - This program works with and assists churches, associations and state conventions in their efforts to bring persons identified with ethnic groups, other than English, into a right relationship with God; to establish language culture congregations and to lead them to self-support. During 1977, it assisted with the support of 832 appointed personnel and 322 field personnel, for a total of 1,154 persons serving among 33 ethnic groups. During the year, 225 new congregations were started: 65 Spanish, 47 deaf, 20 Chinese, 18 Korean, 15 American Indian, 8 Haitian, 6 Vietnamese, 5 Eskimo, 5 Japanese, 4 Laotian, 4 Arab, 3 international, 3 seamen, 2 Polish, 1 Filipino, 1 German, 1 Greek, 1 Hungarian, 1 Portuguese, 1 Thai, and 14 others. Also, it
led 60 congregations to use lay leadership to establish new units, encouraged 50 churches to minister to language-culture persons in their communities, and provided leadership for ministries at 30 ports. Some 307 persons were granted scholarships to equip ethnic and deaf persons to serve in church related vocations.

Pioneer Missions - This program relates primarily to areas where Southern Baptist work has been initiated since 1940. It is implemented through other programs of the HMB and does not have its own staff unit. Last year the various programs of the board provided full or partial support to 1,462 missionaries and contributed $\$ 10,340,530$ in mission support direct grants and services to the work in pioneer areas.

Special Mission Ministries - The department has two major areas of concern: recruitment and assignment of volunteers and resort ministries. Last year, some 16,500 volunteers were assigned. Included were 1,332 student summer missionaries; 17 semester missionaries; 535 persons involved in special projects; 350 mission youth groups, involving 14,000 persons; 521 Christian Service Corps workers and 43 Sojourners. In resort ministries, US-2 missionaries were assigned this year and detailed plans were made for a National Resort Conference, planned for 1978.

Planning Section - This section coordinates both the planning and budgeting processes of the HMB and coordinates with state conventions. In 1977, it initiated a process of planning for the development of objectives and goals for 1979-1986, and for 1979-2000.

Services Section - The function of the entire section has been carried out in providing foundational services to missionaries and staff personnel. Of special concern is the support of Bold Mission Thrust, Volunteer involvement in Missions and Mission Service Corps. It is composed of three divisions: Business Services, Communication and Personnel. Business Services manages the business needs of the board, its program and personnel. Communication is composed of art services, audiovisuals, editorial services, and promotion. Personnel includes missionary personnel, personnel development services and personnel employment services. Missionary personnel processed and recommended for approval 722 candidates, including 76 missionaries, 55 missionary associates, 435 mission pastors, 97 language pastors and 59 US-2 missionaries. Some 164 candidates were appointed and 325 mission and language pastors were approved for support.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD<br>Southern Baptist Convention<br>Nashville, Tennessee<br>Grady C. Cothen, President

NASHVILLE - The Sunday School Board set a record receipt total of $\$ 75$ million last year but was hampered somewhat by skyrocketing energy and postal costs and bad winter weather.

In presenting the annual report to the Sunday School Board trustees, President Grady C. Cothen said the Board is in excellent financial shape as "we go about fulf illing our mission - the mission of ministry."

Four priorities continued to receive major attention.
More than 7,000 churches and 224 associations conducted ACTION enrollment campaigns and 567 new Sunday Schools were started in efforts to reach more persons for Bible study.

The Bible Book Series for youth and adults in Sunday School and the RadioTV Bible Correspondence program are scheduled to begin October 1, 1978.

The "Equipping Center" concept, short-term training for adults, continued to be tested with plans to release the first materials April 1, 1979.

Family life conferences which reached 33,000 persons and Home Life with an average monthly circulation of 838,000 were the primary resources for supporting and enriching family life.

Career Assessment and Development Consultations were undertaken to aid and encourage pastors and church staff members.

Glorieta and Ridgecrest Baptist Conference Centers registered 85,384 guests who stayed a total of 382,178 days. As a result of the work of a special task force on conference center operations, several changes in registration procedures have been approved for 1979.

Baptist Book Stores opened three regional mail order centers in Nashville, St. Louis and Arlington, Texas. Two more will be opened in 1978 in Memphis and Atlanta.

Broadman Press introduced 633 new products during the year. The first book of the 24 -volume Layman's Bible Book Commentary will be released in October 1978.

Reorganization $\dot{w}$ as completed of the Church Services and Materials Division into three divisions - Bible Teaching, Christian Development and Church and Staff Support. Total Church Study Course credits requested for the year were 308,407 .

In the program of Sunday School development, increased visibility was given to associational work and ministry with ethnic groups and to blind and deaf persons.

Enrollment in church music programs increased 1.3 percent over the previous year. Sales of all editions of the Baptist Hymnal are now over 2.5 million.

The Church Program Training Center, housed in the church administration department, sponsored 117 events attended by 2,542 persons.

Baptist student ministries now reach 1,084 campuses with 673 others identified as needing a ministry. National Student Ministries will sponsor a nationwide missions conference in Nashville in December 1979.

The National Association of Senior Adults, sponsored by the family ministry department, set a goal of 50,000 members by 1985. A monthly magazine for single adults will begin publication in April 1979.

Under the convention-approved formula, $\$ 1.6$ million was transferred to assist state conventions in promoting Sunday School Board-related programs.

## INTRODUCTION

The year 1977 was the best year the Commission has ever had in all respects. There were more professions of faith, mail response was excellent, and more public service time ( $\$ 11.1$ million dollars worth) was given by the stations and networks than ever before. The year's statistics provided an outstanding basis for observing the agency's fortieth anniversary in 1978. God's hand of blessing is on this work.

During 1977 your Radio and Television Commission again worked hard to "give the winds a mighty voice as the Bold Mission concept became reality." Dr. Billy Graham, speaking at the 1978 Abe Lincoln Awards program for broadcasters said religious radio and television "are among the greatest factors in the resurgence of religion in this country" and cited the Commission as a pioneer in the creative use of the media.

A series of 30 -second spots featuring Southern Baptist leaders telling "What Baptists Believe" is one of the latest efforts in the denomination's Bold Mission Thrust to evangelize the world by the end of the century.

The spots were produced by the Radio and Television Commission for use on radio and television. They present the Baptist viewpoints about God, the Holy Spirit, the Bible, salvation, baptism, sin, the church, the Lord's Supper and the Lord's Day.

The first 11 Joint Venture Bible Study programs will be produced in the Commission's videotape studio during the week of August 14. The Baptist Sunday School Board is underwriting and sponsoring the series, which will be placed on television beginning in October. Subsequent production dates for the series are set for November and March, 1979. In addition to the TV programs, the Commission has been asked to produce a radio program series utilizing much of the same material.
"The Baptist Hour," flagship program of the Commission entered its 37th year on radio with a drastic change in format. Still a half-hour program, it is offered in stereo and the format is much more informal than it used to be.Dr. Frank Pollard, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Jackson, Mississippi, is the current speaker on "The Baptist Hour." The entire series for 1978 was produced in Israel.

The Commission's radio programs are now well established, have stable growing audiences, and hold the promise of reaching many, many people with the gospel of Christ in the future.

At the end of 1977 , some 2,885 stations were carrying Commission broadcasts, a significant gain of $10 \%$ for the year. There is every evidence that 1978 will top that. "Country Crossroads" can now be heard on 687 stations, "MasterControl"* is on 756 stations, and "Powerline" stations rose 10924 during the year and will doubtless reach the 1.000 station mark in 1978 - the first syndicated program in the history of broadeasting to reach that level.

Onc new program, "Streams in the Desert," was introduce in 1977. With only minimal efforts, the station list rose to 94 by year's end. A nationwide potential of more than 500 stations is possible for this inspirational new program.

The Commission launched two new series of television programs early last year -.. "Listen" and "The Athletes." Response from the audiences has been highly favorable and the evangelistic impact excellent. New episodes of both these new quarter-hour series are currently in production and will be shown throughout this year.

Plans continue to be refine for major steps the Commission anticipates in the use of telcvision for presenting the message of Christ. The new television production complex offers opportunities for expanding the agency's ministry in the area of TV.
"One Sunday morning while listening to your program, I let Jesus enter my heart and be my Savior." That sort of testimony from an increasing number of people is "living proof" that the Commission's programs are hitting the mark.

While it isn't known just how many are in the Commission audience from week to week, the figure is staggering. The agency receives cach year a glimpse of the rich spiritual harvest which takes place when God's Word is effectively presented.

Above 184.000 friends wrote last ycar for the first time to express appreciation for the programs and to request further information and help. An incredible 14,332 of these wrote to receive spiritual counsel -- double the number who wrote in 1976.

More than 2.000 wrote to say they had accepted Christ as Savior. or renewed their commitment to follow Him in discipleship. These friends are followed up extensively, of course, to provide the kind of help and guidance necessary for them to become productive, growing Christians.

If the world is to hear the good news, radio and television will have to be involved. There are too many worldy barriers, border restrictions, and nations at cold or hot war with one another to expect it to happen any other way. We continually thank God for the tools placed in our hands, and seek to use them prayerfully and skillfully to reach the maximum number of people for Christ.

GOLDEN GATE BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Mill Valley, California<br>Harold K. Graves, President

Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary continued to report record growth for the 1977-78 school year. Enrollment increased 18 percent in the fall semester for a new high. New housing units were completed and financial contributions to the Seminary rose to the highest total in its history.

Dr. William M. Pinson, Jr. was elected the fourth president and began his service August 1, 1977. During the year new faculty members were elected: Ronald Bostic in church music, David Roberts in church history, Jerry Stubblefield in religious education, and William L. Hendricks in theology and Christian philosophy; Samuel Tang was named adjunct professor of Old Testament; Harold Jones was added as a contract teacher in church music; and Richard and Carolyn Plampin served as missionaries in residence.

In addition to work at the Southern California Center, the Seminary offered courses in Phoenix this year and plans for a branch in the Northwest Convention have been projected. A number of special conferences were held on campus including the first Church Growth Dynamics Institute.

President Pinson led the Trustees to approve the Baker James Cauthen Chair of World Missions in conjunction with the newly approved World Missions Center. The basic endowment has been received for the E. Hermond Westmoreland Chair of Evangelism.

Tichenor Village, a student housing village consisting of 24 one-bedroom units, was completed during the year and dedicated. These units were built with Cooperative Program Funds. Golden Gate continues to be grateful to Southern Baptists for their financial support and for their prayers.

The approval of a grant of $\$ 4,297,046$ in capital funds by the Executive Committee of the S.B.C. insures growth of campus facilities through 1983. Grants of $\$ 2,985,000$ for a library, $\$ 1,110,646$ for student housing and $\$ 201,400$ for a child care building will help to meet the needs of the rapidly growing school.

Four special reports were completed. The Long Range Planning Committee completed a three-year study. Task forces were recommended for the World Mission Center, the Family Life Enrichment Center and the Continuing Education/Conference Center.

A record 521 students enrolled in degree and diploma programs. Of these, 371 were enrolled in theology, 123 in religious education, and 27 in church music. This is the largest enrollment in the history of the Seminary.

There were 16 students enrolled at Golden Gate from Arkansas.

"God Looks with Continued Favor on NOBTS"
NEW ORLEANS - The increasing enrollment continued to dominate interest at the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary with 1,344 students enrolled through the end of the Summer session in July, 1977. At the close of the year the Seminary had experienced an eighteen percent increase in student enrollment over the previous academic year, enabling NOBTS to maintain its position as the third largest of the six Southern Baptist seminaries, Most of these students were enrolled in the Master of Divinity program, NOBTS officials said.

The increase brought additional faculty members to the Seminary. Six new faculty members began duties during the year. They included Dr. Fred Moseley, Director of the School of Christian Training and one of its instructors; Dr. Jerry Breazeale and Dr. Charles Graham, both as instructors in the School of Christian Training; Dr. Harold Bryson, as Associate Professor of Preaching; Dr. Carlton Winbery, Assistant Professor of New Testament and Greek; and Mr. Leroy Yarbrough, Assistant Professor of Choral Conducting.

The budget for the 1976-77 academic year was $\$ 2,627,300$, of which 67.28 percent, or $\$ 1,767,761$, was provided by the Southern Baptist Convention through the Cooperative Program.

During the year the School of Christian Training (SCT) completed its first year of operation, experiencing a 45 percent increase in enrollment. The SCT moved into its new building on campus, one which had been remodeled to meet the specific needs of that division of the Seminary.

Other building improvements included the refurbishing of Carey Hall, the women's dormitory; renovation of the Preschool Education Center; and renovation of several classrooms.

Four tennis courts were completed during the year. These are fenced in and lighted and, together with some major changes and additions to the gymnasium, contributed substantially to the Seminary's recreation program.

There were two other faculty changes during the year. Dr. James Mosteller died January 1, 1977, and Dr. Genter Stephens retired from the faculty. The Seminary's Board of Trustees voted Dr. Stephens the title of Professor Emeritus.

SOUTHEASTERN SEMINARY<br>Wake Forest, North Carolina

Wake Forest, N. C. - Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary here has just completed its twenty-seventh year. When the Seminary awarded degrees to 261 students recently, the alumni total climbed to more than 3600, or an average of 144 for each of the school's 25 graduating classes.

Enrollment for the 1976-77 academic year totaled 1191 in the Associate of Divinity, Master of Divinity, Master of Religious Education, Master of Theology, Doctor of Ministry and evening programs. The enrollment has steadily increase since 1970. From 520 in the fall of 1970 to 1009 in September 1977.

The 1977 enrollment included yet another increase in the number of women, with 134 enrolled. Southeastern students came from 182 colleges and universities in 28 states and 8 overseas countries. Seventy-six per cent of the students are married. Because all of the Seminary's housing units are full, 110 families lived in Raleigh, N. C. apartment complexes during 1977-78. The Seminary is presently developing plans to build an additional 100 townhouse apartments on the campus.

To meet the increased enrollment, the Seminary has moved to expand the faculty. Dr. Furman Hewitt, Associate Professor of Christian Ethics, Dr. Robert Dale, Associate Professor of Pastoral Leadership and Church Ministries, and Dr. Bruce Powers, Associate Professor of Religious Education, joined the faculty this year.

New faculty members to be added in 1978-79 include Dr. Thomas Halbrooks, Assistant Professor of Church History, Dr. James Good, Professor of Music, and Dr. John Tresch, Associate Professor of Evangelism. Dr. Charles Dorman will assume the position of Director of Student-Field Ministries in the summer of 1978. Mr. W. Robert Spinks joined the staff as Director of Financial Development on May 1.

Three members of the faculty will retire at the end of the current year. They are Dr. Leo Green, Distinguished Professor of Old Testament, Dr. Garland Hencli icks, Professor of Church Community Relations, and Dr. Theodore F. Adams, Visiting Professor of Preaching. Green was a member of the original faculty of Southeastem Scminary in 1951.

During the current fiscal year a major long-range process came to fruition with the adoption of a Long Range Plan of Action containing 20 objectives for every phase of the Seminary's work. A Master Campus Plan was adopted outlining capital needs for the next $10-1.5$ years.

A Development Council of 30 business and community leaders along the eastern seaboard has been cnlisted. Dur ing the Spring of 1978, Council members joine alumni and trustees in hosting meetings for Baptist leaders along the eastern coast of the nation.

During the 1977-78 year, the faculty of Southeastern published the first volume of Southeastern Studies, dealing with emerging directions in Christian ministry.

Southeastern Seminary enjoys candidate status in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Full accreditation is expected to be granted during the summer of 1978. Accreditation by the Association of Theological Schools has been maintained throughout the 27-year history of Southeastern.

The Cooperative Program is the life-line of the Seminary's financial support, providing $76 \%$ of the $1977-78$ operating funds, or $\$ 1,763.80$ for each student. Students presently pay $\$ 100$ per semester matriculation fees. This will be increased to $\$ 150$ per semester in the fall of 1978 , along with a new surcharge of $\$ 150$ for non-Southern Baptist students.

Salaries for faculty and staff have received substantial increases in the past three years. In addition, all personnel were granted a 2\% "Cooperative Program Performance Check" made possible by Cooperative Program Challenge funds.

During Commencement activities in May 1978, Ms. Sue Fitzgerald, Director of the Center for Christian Education Ministries at Mars HillCollege, Mars Hill, N. C. was awarded the Seminary's first Citation for Excellence in Christian Ministries.

Beginning in the fall of 1978, Southeastern Seminary will offer an emphasis in Church Music within the school's existing Master of Divinity degree. The three-year program will be the only one of its kind offered by a seminary on the east coast.

Southern Baptists have committed themselves to Bold Mission Thrust, an effort to reach our nation with the good news of Jesus Christ by 1985, and to share the gospel with all the world by the end of this century.

That is a monumental task, and one that can be carried out only as we are equipped by the power of God.

Your church is even now preparing to carry out the concept of Bold Mission in your community, your city, your state. Perhaps your people have already caught the vision of what God can do in us and through us as we surrender ourselves to Him in Bold Mission.

Southern Seminary is also a part of Bold Mission Thrust, an integral part. Southern Seminary is committed to equipping God-called ministers to share the good news of Christ across America and "unto the uttermost part of the earth."

Our location on the doorstep of the Midwest and Northeast, areas of concentrated Bold Mission Thrust effort, gives Southern Seminary a strategic place in the mission emphasis of Southern Baptists. Many students, through their pioneering mission work in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and other states, are already in the vanguard of the denomination's missions effort.

For example, through a program sponsored jointly by Southern Seminary and the Baptist State Convention of Michigan, six students board a van each Friday for a weekend trip to Michigan where they serve a number of churches and missions, providing vital trained leadership that might otherwise be unavailable. A similar program will be underway this coming year in Indiana as well.

Another strategic move in Bold Mission Thrust is the establishment this year of a third off-campus Boyce Bible School Center in Springfield, Ill. Boyce Bible School, now in its fourth year, providesmuch-neededtraining for pastors and church staff members without college degrees and seminary training. Two earlier off-campus centers, in Little Rock, Ark., and Columbus, Ohio, are already bringing the resources of ministerial training to many who are in places of service in those areas.

This year Southern Seminary became the first Southern Baptist school, and perhaps the first accredited seminary in the nation, to offer the Doctor of Philosophy degree in evangelism, assuring the highest calibre of preparation for those who will lead in reaching our world for Christ.

This commitment to evangelism and missions is nothing new; the Louisville seminary has the oldest endowed chairs of evangelism and missions in the world: the Billy Graham Chair of Evangelism and the W. O. Carver Chair of Christian Missions. Five full-time faculty members provide practical expertise and solid Biblical foundations in this area.

Add to that the emphasis of the Billy Graham Center of Evangelism at Southern Seminary which includes, in addition to the Graham teaching post, student evangelism teams, outreach efforts to the Louisville community, and the Billy Graham Research collection, which contains records of the Graham ministry and of other famous evangelists. The Graham Center, with its ever increasing holdings, is becoming a national focal point for study in the area of evangelism.

Southern Seminary's commitment to Bold Mission Thrust, reflected by the presence on our campus of students from more than 20 nations who will return to assume leadership positions in their own lands, is also seen in our "branch campus" in Ogbomosho, Nigeria. In fact, Southern is the only American seminary with a branch campus on the African continent.

Other exciting developments have occurred within the past year as well, including:

- Faculty additions in preaching, religious education, and other areas, and the naming of James Sullivan, former SBC president and Sunday School Board head, as visiting professor;
- Leadership by our professors of national groups in evangelism, preaching and other areas;
- Attainment of $\$ 4$ million in cash and pledges in the seminary's $\$ 10$ million endowment-capital needs campaign, an effort to insure that the seminary has "Resources for Excellence" in the coming years;
- Our one-hundredth anniversary in Louisville, Kentucky, where the seminary moved in 1877 from Greenville, S. C., where it was founded in 1859.

It is an exciting time to be a Southern Baptist, and an exciting time to be at Southern Seminary. Something special is happening here . . . there's a new spirit of expectancy, of God's activity among us.

If you were to state our purpose in one phrase, it would be this: we're out to change the world. We're out to change the world because it desperately needs the transforming touch of Jesus Christ. And as Southern Baptists move out boldly to communicate the gospel to all men everywhere, Southern Seminary will continue to be an integral part of that divinely-commissioned task.

# SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY Fort Worth, Texas

The academic year, 1977-78, at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary has been a year of celebration and a year of dynamic response to the challenge of Bold Mission. The celebration concerns the 70th year in the life of the institution and the 20th year of the leadership of retiring President Robert E. Naylor, the fif th president of the seminary.

The trustees named Russell Hooper Dilday, Jr., of Atlanta, Georgia presidentelect effective January 1, 1978. He becomes the sixth president on August 1, 1978.

For the first time in its history, Southwestern Seminary presented degrees and diplomas to more than 800 people in a single year. Included were 688 men and 126 women; 58 doctors degrees were conferred. These figures represent the basic contribution of the seminary to Southern Baptist life and leadership.

Enrollment for the year continued to set new records. In the academic year 4,136 students registered. There were 2,420 in the School of Theology; 1,345 in the School of Religious Education, and 366 in the School of Church Music.

New faculty personnel added during the year include C. L. Bass, associate professor of music theory and composition; Tommy L. Bridges, assistant professor of educational administration; Paula Breoks, instructor in communication arts; Michael Malek, instructor in church music education and Albert L. Travis, associate professor of organ.

Responding to a request of the San Antonio Baptist Association of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, the seminary began offering degree-level work in San Antonio, Texas in the fall of 1977. Operating under the same guidelines as the off-campus centers in Houston, Texas and in Shawnee, Oklahoma, the response has been excellent with 263 enrolled in the three centers.

The seminary constructed 48 additional apartments for married students. The physical fitness center is under construction with an anticipated completion date in the fall. The Cooperative Program provided $57 \%$ of the operating budget of the seminary. This has made possible enlargement of the faculty to match the record enrollment. There has been a reduction in the teacher-student ratio.

Several pressing capital needs projects have been adopted by the trustees. Heading the list is a Learning Resource and Research Center. Space vacated by the current library will require a complete renovation into a world mission center, offices and classrooms.

Other planned projects are restructuring of Cowden Hall, the School of Church Music building; and the construction of 72 additional housing units for married students.

NOTE 1: SUMMARYY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES
THE EXECUTIVE BOARD MAINTAINS ITS RECORDS ON THE BASIS OF CASH RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS; CONSEQUENTLY, CERTAIN REVENUE AND RELATED ASSETS ARE RECOGNIZEO WHEN RECEIVED RATHER THAN WHEN EARNED, AND CERTAIN DISBURSEIMENTS ARE RECOGNIZED WHEN PAID RATHER THAN WHEN THE OBLIGATION IS INCURRED.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH ACCOUNTING PRACTICES FOLLOWED BY NON-PROFIT DENOMINATIONAL ORGANIZATION, NO PROVISION HAS BEEN MADE IN THE ACCOMPANYING FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR DEPRECIATION OF PROPERTIES.

NOTE 2: FUND OVERDRAFTS
THE ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION IN ITS NOVEMBER, 1967 MEETING, APPROVED THE BORROWING FROM OUTSIDE SOURCES OF UP TO \(\$ 900,000\) FOR THE PURCHASE OF A BAPTIST BUILDING SITE WITH THE INDEBTEDNESS TO BE LIQUIDATED FROM THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM BUDGET. AT DECEMBER 31, 1978, THE BALANCE OF THE FUND OVERDRAFT RESULTING FROM THESE BORROWINGS WAS \$262,331.

THE EXECUTIVE BOARD, ARKANSAS BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION, IN ITS AUGUST, 1976 ANNUAL MEETING, APPROVED THE OPERATIONS OF THE THIRD CENTURY ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN WITH FUNDING TO BE OBTAINED FROM FUTURE CONTRIBUTIONS. AT DECEMBER 31, 1978, THE FUND OVERDRAFT RESULTING FROM OPERATIONS WAS \(\$ 33,908\).

NOTE 3: FUNDS HELD IN ESCROW
THE EXECUTIVE BOARD'S POLICY IS TO HOLD ALL OFFERINGS FOR LOTTIE MOON FOREIGN MISSIONS WHICH ARE RECEIVED SUBSEQUENT TO OCTOBER IN ESCROW UNTIL THE FOLLOWING YEAR. FUNDS HELD IN ESCROW AMOUNTED TO \(\$ 33,784\) AND \(\$ 149,276\) AT DECEMBER 31, 1978 AND 1977, RESPECTIVELY.

NOTE 1: SUHPMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES
PROPERTIES AT MAY 31, 1960 WERE APPRAISED BY GLEN B. ESPY, APPRAISER, LITTLE ROCK, ARKANSAS AND THE APPRAISED VALUES WERE RECORDED BY THE UNIVERSITY. SUBSEQUENT ACQUISITIONS ARE RECORDED AT COST. IN ACCORDANCE WITH PRACTICES FOLLOWED BY NON-PROFIT EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, NO PROVISION HAS BEEN MADE FOR DEPRECIATION OF PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT.

FUNDS RECEIVED DURING THE YEAR BY THE RESTRICTED FUNDS ARE NOT RECORDED AS INCOME OF THE UNIVERSITY. WHEN THESE FUNDS ARE DISBURSED FOR CAPITAL OR OPERATING PURPOSES OF THE UNIVERSITY, THEY ARE RECORDED AS GIFTS AND GRANTS ON THE CURRENT INCOME AND EXPENDITURES STATEMENT.

INVESTMENTS PURCHASED BY THE RESTRICTED AND PLANT FUNDS ARE RECORDED AT COST; INVESTMENTS RECEIVED BY GIFT ARE RECORDED AT FAIR market value on the date of acquisition.

THE UNIVERSITY ELECTED AN EARLY APPLICATION OF FINANCIAL ACCOUNTING STANDARD NO. 13, "ACCOUNTING FOR LEASES" AND HAS RECORDED AS CAPITAL LEASES IN THE ACCOMPANYING BALANCE SHEET ALL LEASES MEETING THE APPROPRIATE CRITERIA. THIS RESULTED IN AN INCREASE IN THE FUND BALANCE OF THE INVESTMENT IN PLANT FUND OF \$549,756.46 AT JUNE 1, 1977 AND AN INCREASE IN NET INCOME FROM AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES OF \$65,359.16 FOR THE YEAR ENDED MAY 31, 1978.

BONDS PAYABLE, SECURED BY A TRUST INDENTURE COVERING CERTAIN BUILDINGS WITH A CARRYING VALUE OF \$1,754,124.16, THE NET REVENUES FROM THE OPERATION OF THESE BUILDINGS AND A PLEDGE OF $\$ 42,000.00$ ANNUALLY OF CERTAIN OTHER REVENUES, ARE DUE IN ANNUAL INSTALLMENTS OF $\$ 43,000.00$ TO $\$ 73,000.00$ WITH INTEREST RATES RANGING FROM $23 / 4 \%$ TO $33 / 8 \%$. THE FINAL INSTALLMENT IS DUE IN 2006.

NOTE 2: BOND AND INTEREST SINKING FUND REQUIREMENTS
THE UNIVERSITY IS REQUIRED TO DEPOSIT APPROXIMATELY $\$ 88,000.00$ dURING THE NEXT YEAR IN THE BOND AND INTEREST SINKING FUND.

NOTE .3: CAPITAL LEASES
THE UNIVERSITY LEASES TWO DORMITORY FACILITIES UNDER CAPITAL LEASES WHICH EXPIRE IN 1991 AND 1992. GENERALLY, THESE LEASES CALL

NOTE 3: CAPITAL LEASES (CONT.)

ACCORDINGLY, IHE ACCOMPANYING FINANCIAL STATEMENTS ARE NOT INTENDED TO PRESENT FINANCIAL POSITION AND RESULTS OF OPERATIONS IN CONGORIMITY WITH GENERALLY ACCEPTED ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLE.

The Board of Directors is composed of fifteen persons. Five are nominated each year by the convention's nominating committee and elected at the annual session. The by-laws require that at least tro-thirds of these be laymen. Investments are made through a committee after careful evaluation of recommendations from investment counsel.

There are no fees or commissions charged by the foundation. The operational budget is provided by the Arkansas Baptist State Convention. Thus, gross income generated from investment is distributed to the designated beneficiary.

The Hospital 1 s exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Inventories are priced at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out method) or market.

At the advice of the American Hospital Association, the Hospital obtained independent appraisals of its property and equipment in 1962 and 1964. The appraisals are reflected in the accompanying statements by showing a net increase of \(\$ 9,224,607.25\) in the assets. Depreciation is computed on the appraised values.

The buildings and equipment are depreciated principally under the straightline method. Accelerated depreciation on historical cost has been used for Medicare purposes. The additional reimbursement resulting from accelerated depreciation has been deferred.

Interest cost related to specific projects is capitalized during the period of construction.

Revenues received under cost reimbursement agreements are subject to audit and retroactive adjustment by third-party payors. No provisions for retroactive adjustment have been made. An estimate of cost reimbursement for the current years is included in accounts receivable.

Certain reclassifications have been made in the 1977 financial statements to conform to the classifications used in 1978.

INVESTMENTS - ENDOWMENT FUND
The Hospital's interest in its wholly-owned subsidiary, American Industrial Development Corporation (AIDC) is accounted for by the equity method. The Hospital received rent from a wholly-owned subsidiary of AIDC of \(\$ 340,606.06\) during 1978 and purchased approximately \(\$ 3,000,000\) of medical supplies from the subsidiary under normal trade terms.

The Hospital regards its investments as part of a long range investment policy. In accordance with financial Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 12, marketable securities which are classified as noncurrent assets are carried at the lower of aggregate cost or market. The amount by which the market value is less than cost is accounted for as an allowance for valuation of marketable equity securities. Changes in the allowance are made directly to the fund balance account.

NOTE 5
PENSION PLAN
The Hospital has a pension plan which covers all electing employees who have completed one year of service. The plan requires employee contributions of five percent of compensation. During the first twenty years of service the Hospital matches the employee contribution. At the end of twenty years the Hospital contributes an amount sufficient to bring its total payments to the participants' accounts to ten percent per year. After twenty-five years, the participant is guaranteed an amount based on his last seven years average compensation. The fair market value of the plan assets is adequate to cover the actuarily computed vested benefits of the participants. Contributions to the plan aggregated \(\$ 2,197,351.94\) for 1978 . The Deposit-Annuity Board shown in Current Assets is unrestricted and is available to fund any unexpected deficiency in the plan assets.

NOTE 6 - PROVISION FOR SELF-INSURANCE

The Hospital has a self-insurance trust fund for essentially all of its professional and general liability. Contributions and year end liability levels are actuarily computed.

NOTE \(7-\) COMMITMENTS
The Hospital has entered a contract in the amount of \(\$ 29,294,734.00\) for construction of Baptist Memorial Hospital East. Estimated completion date of the facility is during the first quarter of 1979 . Construction and permanent financing has been negotiated in an amount not to exceed \(\$ 36,000,000.00\) of which \(\$ 27,000,000.00\) has been drawn. A contract has been entered for an office building adjacent to the East unit at a total cost of \(\$ 4,215,000\) with completion on August 1, 1979.
