Single-performance events during the Showcase include presentations by the Ouachi-Tones, the Singing Men and the Ouachita Singers at 3:30 p.m. in the Mabee Fine Arts Center (MFAC) Recital Hall; music of the "Swing Era" by the Ouachita Jazz Band at 4 p.m., MFAC; free analysis of well water at 3:45 p.m. in the Moses-Provine Science Center; "Why Would Anyone Pay \$1,000,000 for a Milk Cow?" at 4 p.m., MPSC; a shaped-note singing demonstration and public Sacred Harp singing at 4:15 p.m., Berry Chapel; scenes from the Ouachita theater production of "Aesop's Fables" at 4:45 p.m. in the Verser Drama Center; a student/faculty recital at 4:45 p.m., MFAC; and a rappelling demonstration off Lile Hall by the ROTC at 5:30 p.m.

Continuous events during the Showcase include a Chemistry Magic Show at 3:30 and 4:30 p.m., MPSB 108; nature walk and tree identification at 3:30 and 5 p.m., MPSC; a display of the McClellan Collection until 5 p.m.; firing of weapons by the public, seven persons at a time, 3:30 p.m., ROTC rifle range; and a three-part presentation by the religion department of "The Word of the World" at 3:30 p.m. Berry Bible Building.

Showcase events will also include a reception by the English department honoring emeritus faculty; poetry readings in the Formal Lounge of Evans Student Center by Susan Wink (3:45 p.m.) and John Wink (4:45 p.m.); readings from Mark Twain by

Herman Sandford (4:15 and 5:15 p.m.); a Kodaly-Orff demonstration by Mary Worthen, and a display of instruments and presentations of the Kodaly method of music education at 3:45 p.m., MFAC 308; a mini-lecture and slide presentation of Pakistan by Fran Coulter at 3:45 and 4:45 p.m. in Fleniken Memorial; and "3-D Images," a presentation of holograms produced by lasers at 4 p.m., MPSC.

Other events will include a demonstration of how animals in Ouachita's "I.Q. Zoo" are trained for television ads and circuses, 4:45 p.m., McClellan Hall; and jewelry-making demonstrations by Betty Berry at 4:15 and 5:15 p.m., MFAC. Also scheduled are physical education demonstrations including swimming exhibitions, racquetball and aerobic exercises at 5 p.m., Physical Education Center; the use of computers in editing business documents, 5 p.m., Lile Hall; and a computer science demonstration at 5:15 p.m., Lile Hall 209.

Additional presentations will include demonstrations and exhibits concerning political science, modern foreign languages, communications, history, sociology, education, the Maddox Public Affairs Center, home economics, philosophy, physiology and psychology.

An autograph party during which Michael E. Arrington will sign copies of his newly published book, "Ouachita Baptist University: The First 100 Years," will be from 3:30 until 6 p.m. in the lobby of Evans Student Center.

FACTS IN BRIEF

Family Income Outpaces Inflation

- Median family income increased 5 percent between 1982 and 1983, from \$23,430 to \$24,580; this gain was greater than the rate of inflation, which increased 3 percent during this period.

- The median income of families headed by college educated adults was almost twice as much as the income of householders with only a high school education (\$40,520 versus \$24,510).

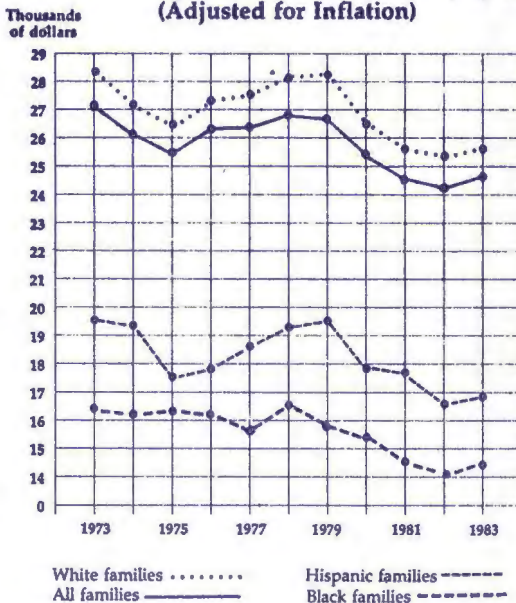
- In 1983, female-headed households had the lowest median income of all groups (\$11,790). Between 1982 and 1983, this family type experienced a one percent decline in real income.

- Median family incomes in 1983 varied widely according to race. White families had an income of \$25,757, Hispanic families had an income of \$16,956, and black families had a median income of \$14,506.

- Between 1980 and 1983, the real income of all families increased by 17 percent, from \$21,023 to \$24,580. However, when adjusted for inflation, family income declined 3 percent during this period.
