

The pattern used was McCalls 3738. It is royal blue with beige trim. I added a strip of beige velour to the sleeve for trim.







The pattern used was McCalls 3738. It is cranberry with beige trim. I made one addition to the pattern. I added a strip of beige velour to the sleeve for trim.







The Velour Dress

This dress was made from left-over material from the two velour robes made for my father and father-in-law. I made it for my sister.

It was created from Butterick's pattern 3634. The dress is kneelength, but I changed it to floor length by sewing strips of beige and cranberry colored velour to the beige dress. Bias strips of cranberry velour were sewn to the neck and arm holes.
