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
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



FACTS IN BRIEF

Most Freshmen Report Adequate Preparation for College

Most first-time full-time freshmen in 1986 completed recommended years of high school study in basic academic areas, except for biological science. The percentage of prepared students varied from one subject area to another.

• At least 88 percent of freshmen met or exceeded the recommended years of study in English (4 years), mathematics (3 years), and history/American government (1 year).


Seventy-one percent of freshmen completed the recommended levels of study in foreign languages (2 years).
At least half the freshmen said they

 At least half the freshmen said they completed recommended levels of study in art or music (1 year), computer science (½ year), and physical science (2 years).

 Only about one-third of freshmen said they completed the recommended number of years in biological science (2 years).

• Since 1984, student levels of preparation have increased slightly in most areas. The greatest increases were in foreign languages and in computer science.
