MINUTES.

The second session of the Concord Association of Wesrn Arkansas, was held with the Greenwood Baptist hurch of Sebastian County, commencing on Saturday, tober 5th, 1872.

The Introductory sermon was preached by the appointer of the former session, Elder F. L. Kregel, Eph. 1: 1 to Subject—Grace, as displayed, in its subjects, in its agent and results, and in the purpose of its manifestation.

After a recess of an hour, the delegates met for the transaction of business. The Moderator of the last session, Bro. E. L. Compere, called the Association to order, and after singing, prayer was offered by Elder S. J. Fuller.

The Clerk of the Association being absent, Bro. F. L. Kregel, was elected clerk *pro tem*, and Bro. L. Collins re-

quested to act as clerk in his absence.

The Pastor and Deacons of Greenwood Church, with Bre'n. W. W. Pettus and E. M. Pettigrew, were appointed a committee on preaching.

The letters from the Churches were called for and read

Report of the Executive Board read.

We feel that the work entrusted to us has not been in vain. Something has been done towards the establishment of District meetings. Three of the four appointed last session were held.

We secured the services of Elder E. L. Compere, as Mis-

sionary for six weeks, at the rate of \$800 per annum.

For a portion of his time we could not im—the funds subscribed not being paid to us.

We could only authorize him a ray

ed ourselves as individuals to help him in said collection; but as a Committee we became responsible for nothing beyond the funds on hand.

The greater part of the Missionary work has been done in and around the town of Boonville—a very important

section of our bounds.

Results of the six weeks labor 31—sermons preached and 8 churches visited. 1 church (Boonville) reorganized—275

miles traveled.

Your committee has found the destitution very great and the work very encouraging. Hence we hope increased efforts will be made by every church to carry forward this great work.

We therefore urge the brethren to ask themselves are we withholding the gospel from the halt, the blind, the poor through our selfishness; and after such self-exami-

nation to act in the fear of God.

Association to meet with them in its next session.

Your committee recommend the appointment of a special committee to which shall be referred the queries from the churches.

only the Bible and other Baptist books.

Where a Union School is the only chance, use the Bible, and exclude every book that teaches error. We regard the Sabbath School where truth is taught, as a glorious means in advancing the cause of Christ. But when error is taught, it becomes equally potent in retarding the same glorious and precious cause. Respectfully submitted.

Report of Committee on Duty of Churches to their Pas-Collins.

Your Committee regard the subject as one of

tayk to the churches.

The Pastor's office was instituted by the authority of Jesus Christ, and Pastors are numbered by the Holy Spirit among the Gifts of God to the churches, for the perfecting of the Saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ."

Paul, therfore, instructs Tymothy to ordain Elders in

every church.

Hence, every church should provide for herself a Bishop, who may "oversee the flock of God," and failing to do so, must rob herself of the ends for which, as a gift of God, he is bestowed.

The duty of the church to the Pastor begins with his election, and is here as in 'all its bearings, only another form of her duty to herself, inasmuch as they are partakers of his grace.

First then, the church should know and love their Pastor. "We beseach you, brethren, know those who labor among you and are over you in the Lord, and admonished you, and to esteem them very highly in love for their works sake."

We cannot love the unknown, nor can we truely know the unloved.

Hence any church who may elect for her Pastor, one whom she does not know, does both herself and him seriinjustice. She does herself injustice because the hearty co-operation necessary for the "works sake," cannot exist where the workman is unknown and unloved.

The Pastor is alike injured, because robbed of the cordial sympathy and hearty co-operation which springs from an affection founded on a knowledge of his character. Let every Church then have a Pastor-Iet him be one whom she knows and loves, and then by a manifested affection strengthen his hands "unto very good word and work."

Again, Obey them in the Gospel! "Obey them that have the rule over you and submit yourselves, for they watch

for your souls as they that must give account."

Practical hearing is the great duty of believers.

sheep hear my voice and they follow me."

"Receive with meekness the ingrafted word, which is able to save your souls; and be ye doers of the word, and hearers only, deceiving your own selves."

To transform our lives by the word; in pur affections, in controling our passions, and ir

the conduct of our lives; is to realize "the will of God concerning us, even our sanctification, and to secure the end of the gospel ministry, even the "edifying of the body of Christ."

Your duty to your Pastor is then unmet, when your own soul does not profit by the "word preached."

To pray for the success of his labors, to co-operate with him in every good word and work and to provide for him an adequate support become easy and pleasant duties, when knowing and loving him and profiting by his word, you yourselves grow in grace and in the knowledge of God.

But, inasmuch as it is God's law "that those who preach the gospel should live by the gospel—your committee do not hesitate to say, that, that church which has the ability to sustain her Pastor, and yet, forces him to seek the store or the farm, or the workshop, or the school-room for a support, cannot enjoy the blessing which comes from the presence and approbation of God, unless God can approve of conscious disobedience and dwell with willful sin.

That church, however, which does what it can, may rest assured of his presence and blessing, and rejoice in the promise—"to him that hath, shall be given more abun-

dantly.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the Con-

cord Association of Western Arkansas.

Art. 2. It shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist churches known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less, shall be entitled to three messengers. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to one additional messenger.

Art. 3. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by the ballot, at each annual session, and shall continue in office till their succession.

Art. 4—Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to ide over the body according to parliamentary usag.

2. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the pra-

ceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the Minutes, keep a regular file of the printed Minutes of the sessions of the body, and deliver the same to his successor in office.

Sec. 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, holding them subject to an order from the Association or its Executive Committee, and render an account of the same to the annual session of this body.

Art. 5. The objects of this Association shall be, to promote fellowship among the churches; to secure unanimit of faith; to encourage concert in operation, and especially to cultivate the piety of the churches, and to aid in the last object, some portion of every day during each session shall be spent in devotional exercises.

Art. 6—Sec. 1. This Association shall in no case, interfere with the internal regulations of the churches, but will act as an advisory council whenever it shall be necessary

Sec. 2. It, however, claims authority over its own members, the Messengers from the churches; and will withdrafrom and disown all churches that depart from the principles of this compact, by becoming heterodox in faith disorderly in practice.

Art. 7. Newly organized churches, or churches dismissed from other Associations, may be admitted into this body upon application by letter and messengers, at our annual meetings, and by their messengers agreeing to the

abstract of principles herewith published.

Art. 8. Churches may be dismissed from this Assocition upon application at an annual meeting, for the purpose of joining any body we recognize, or for the purpose forming a new Association; but any church departing from us without being regularly dismissed, shall be regarded as disorderly.

Art. 9. There shall be an executive committee consisting of one member from each church, and the officers of the Association shall be ex officio officers of this committee shall have direction of the Missionary erations of the Association, subject to its control, at make an annual report of its proceedings at each session of the Association. Beside the special objects entrust to the committee, it shall also have authority to represent the Association in all matters requiring attention while the Association is not in session. This committee shall regular meetings on the Saturday preceeding each session.

We believe that Election is the sovereign exercise of Eternal love, by which God hath, according to his inwisdom, chosen his people in Christ before the world and hath predestinated them unto the adoption of ten, through sanctification of the Spirit, and belief of tuth, and doth keep them by his power through faith salvation.

We believe that man was created holy, but by a wildation of the law of his Maker, he fell into a state fulness, and brought death upon his race, who being patural descent in the unholy image of Adam, are child wrath by nature, and without natural or spiritual to live a holy life or attain to a happy state.

5. We believe that sinners are saved by grace, through

faith in Jesus Christ, and in no other way.

6. We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration is effected by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with divine truth and the proper evidences thereof, are repentance, faith and obedience unto Christ.

7. We believe that such only are true believers as endure unto the end in holiness of life, and they are kept by

the power of God through faith unto salvation.

8. We believe the Scriptures teach that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God.

9. A Christian church is a congregation of immersed believers, who meet statedly, and have covenanted together to maintain the ordinances of Christ, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges in the New Testament appertaining to the Church of Jesus Christ,

10. The only proper officers of a Christian church are

Bishops or Pastors, and Deacons.

11. Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit by a regular-

ly ordained Baptist minister in good order.

12. The Lord's Supper is a positive and commemorative ordinance of Jesus Christ, to be observed in the church as such, in remembrance of Christ, and to show forth his death till he come.

13. The first day of the week is the Lord's day, and should be observed as a day of rest from common labor and all worldly business, and devoted to religious duties

14. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment; and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
