REPORTS.

Education.

Reports of standing committees were called for, whereupon the Committee on Education made the following report: Your committee to whom was referred the subject of education, reports: Education means enlightment, proper education is very beneficial, the most serviceable and effective factors in educating are good schools available to all, and educated teachers, and preachers. To make good schools available to all necessitates a free system. We therefore recommend that our people encourage and sustain free schools as far as they can, to have educated teachers and preachers. It is needful that there be schools of a system of thorough instruction, the advantages of which they may enjoy. It is a matter of congratulation that we have a Baptist school of this character at Arkadelphia, (Ouachita College) and we recommend that a committee on Ouachita College be appointed to draw up a report to be made the order of, business for 10 A. M. Monday. We further recommend that our Churches demand of their preachers that they give themselves more fully to the study of God's word that they may be educated in scriptural teaching and that the churches sustain them in their worthy work.
