ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe that the Holy Bible was divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God far its author, salvation for its end and truth without any mixture of error for its matter, that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union and

the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and opinions should be tried.

II, We believe that there is one, and only one, living and true God, an infinite, intelligent Spirit, whose name is Jehovah the Maker and Supreme Ruler of heaven and earth; inexpressibly glorious in holiness and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the unity of Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son and the the Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

III. We believe that man was created in hollness, under the law of his Maker, but by vol-untary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint, but choice; being by nature unterly void of that hollness re-quired by the law of God, positively inclined to evil, and therefore under just condemnation to

eternal ruin, without defense or excuse

IV. We believe that the salvation of sinners is holy of grace; through the mediatorial offices of the son of God, who by the appointment of the Pather, freely took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience, by his death made a full atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead he is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderfat person the tenderest spinpathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all sufficient Savior,

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in him is lustification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin and the promise of elecual life on principles of righeousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righeousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood; by virtue of which faith his perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God, that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity

VI. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial, peritent and obedient faith, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greacest sinner on earth but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel, which rejection involves him in an aggrevated condemna-

VII. We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated or born again: that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a maner above our comprehenson by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with divine truth, so as to se cure our voluntary obedience to the gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy

VIII. We believe that repentance and faith are sacred duties and also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby, being deeply convicted of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to Cod with unfeigned contrition, confession and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on him alone as the only

and all-sufficient Savior.

1X. we believe that election is the eternal purpose of Cod, according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners, that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of Gods sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, whe, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes bossting and promotes love, humility, prayer, prayer, trust in God and active imitation of his free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree, that it may be ascertained by its effect in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance, and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves, demands, and deserves the utmost diligence.

X. We believe that sanctification is the process by which, according to the will of God, we are made partakers of holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is beguin regeneration, and that it is carried on in the heart of believers by the presence and power of the oly Spirit the scaler and Comforter, in the continued use of the appointed means, especially the Word of

God. Self examination, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

XI. We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors that a special providence watches over their welfare; and that they are kept by the power of God

through faith unto salvation.

XII. We believe that the law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of his moral government; that it is holy, just and good; and that the inabilities which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its piecepts arise entirely from their love of a n, to deliver them from which and to restore them through a mediator to a unfeigned obedience to the holy law; is one great end of the Gospel, and of the meaus of grace connected with the establishment of the visible church.

XIII We believe that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers. as sociated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gosrel, observing the ordinances of Christ: governed by His laws, and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His word; that its only spiritural officers are bishops, or pastors and deacons, whose qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the epistles of Timothy and Titus.

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, unto the name of the Pather, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Savior, with its effect in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation, and to the Lord's Supper in which the members of the church, by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by solemn self-examination.

XV. We believe that the first day of the week is the Litt's Day, or Christian Sabbath, and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recre-

ations by the devout observance of all the means of grace, both private and public, and by pre-paration for that rest that remained for the people of God. A XVI. We believe that civil government is of divine appointment, for the interest and good

XVI. We believe that civil government is of divine appointment, for the interest and good order of human society; and that magnistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously bonored and obeyed, except only in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Frince of the kings of the earth.

XVII. We believe that there is a radical essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name Lord Jesus and sanctified by the Spirit of our God, are truly righteous in his esteem; while all such as continue in impentance and unbelief are in His sight wicked and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

among men both in and after death.

XVIII. We believe that the end of this world as approaching, that the last day Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a soltenn separation will then take place that 'he wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteons to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. This Association shall be composed of messengers, who shall be members of the churches they represent (except such as may be invited to a seat by consent of the body,) and shall be styled. "The Benton thoughty Baptist Association."

Agricus II This Association shall meet annually on Thursday before the second Sabbath in September, at the place previously appointed; and after pupile worship, reading the letters from the churches and acting upon those soliciting membership, a modelstor and clerk shall be chosen from the messengers by bailot, both of whom shall hold their effects until others shall be elected.

Auticus III It shall be the duty of the clerk to make an occurate record of the preceedings of each meeting of the Association, in a book provided for the purpose. He shall also act as

ARTICLE IV Each church of fifty members or less, may send two messer gers, and one member for each fractional part of fifty over. The members shall present letters certifying their appointment and briefly expressing the state of the churches, their increase and decrease, aggregate number. Each church shall send with the letter money for printing the minutes.

ARTICLE V Churches wishing to unite with this Association may apply by letters and messengers, and giving satisfactory information of their being sound in dectrine and correct in practice, they may be received by a unanimous vote, in token of which the mederator shall give to their messengers the hand of fellowship in behalf of the Association. Churches may be dismissed upon application.

ARTICLE VI We acknowledge the independence of the particular churches and that no authority or jurisdiction is to be exercised over them by this Association, nor will the Association decide in any controversy that may arise in any church. Ne veithele sthey deem it their duty to discountany church belonging to this body which may have essentially departed from the

faith.

ARTICLE VII When a church shall neglect making any communication to the Association for three years successively, it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped from the minutes of the Association, unless at least two members request their continuance, who shall begge to inquire into their standing and report at the next meeting of the Association,

ARTICLE VIII This Association shall have the right to open and hold correspondence with other associations, as may be expedient.

ARTICLE IX It shall be the duty of the Association, from time to time, to suggest to the several churches such measures as may be wise and proper to promote the interest of the Messiah's kingdom, and spread the Gospel throughout the world.

ARTICLE X This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Arrectation

The Benton County Baptist Association met with the Baptist Church at New Prospect, at ten o'clock a. m., on Thursday, September 7, 1905.

In the absence of the moderator Elder W. F. Green the house was called to order by Bro. J. L. Barton acting

We, your committee on fereign missions, report as follows: The General Association of the United States has two missionames in the foreign field, viz: Elders I. N. Yohanon, of Persia, and Said M. Jurcidini, of Syria. Then there are the gospei missionaries, of China, and A. J. Diaz, of Cuba—in all about 20 missionaries. All of them are worthy of our support. We recommend that all of the churches contribute of their means for the support of these missionaries, and that the money be sent to M. W. Izard, England, Ark., who will forward the same without cost, to the missionaries. We recommend that this association cooperate with the General Association of Baptist Churches of the United States, and that the churches send a messenger to that association, which meets at Texarkana, Texas, Nov. 22, 1905. Each church is entitled to one messenger.

The following is a summary of my work as missionary of the Benton County Association for the past year: Days labored, 175; sermons preached, 136; exhortations delivered 42; prayer meetings held, 25; religious visits, 45: collected on the field in pledges and contributions altogether, \$77.19; received by the hand of Chastian, treasurer of the board, \$101.31; miles traveled, 1,010; conducted family worship by invitation in 17 homes, including night and morning service Have baptized no one. I have only nine converts to report in meetings in which I was engaged. My work at my home church began December 17, 1904 and ended Jan. 2, 1905. Labored 15 days, preached 8 sermons; made 3 exhortations; held 3 prayer meetings; made 2 religious visits; paid out to Bro. Dennis Carl for help at Dug Hill, \$2; to Bro. W. I. Casey for same, \$1.50.

Sunday Schools.

We, your committee on Sunday Schools, submit the following: By referring to the letters sent up from the churches, we find only fourteen schools reported, with ninety-four officers and teachers, and an average attendance of 405. Seven churches have reported no Sunday school. One school uses union literature. Thirteen schools use literature of American Baptist Publication Society. This declension in Sunday School work is to be regretted, and we therefore recommend that a man be appointed whose duty it shall be to promote the interest of Sunday Schools in the churches of this body, and to organize and hold a Baptist Sunday School convention somewhere in our bounds, and report to this body at its next session.
