## MORNING SESSION.

The Carroll County (Ark) Association of Missionary Baptists met with White Elm Church, on Wednesday before the first Sunday in October, 1897. The house was called to order by the moderator, Eld. Q. C. Pennington. The audience then joined in singing No. 63, in Harvest Bells, after which the 6th chapter of Matthew was read. Prayer was then offered by Eld. Isaac Standlee.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Eld. Q. C. Pennington from the 7th chapter of Matthew. At the close of the sermon, Eld. W. B. Collins led in prayer.

On motion, the body adjourned till 2 o'clock, p. m. After singing from Harvest Bells, No. 58, Eld. J. G. Burgess offered prayer.

## AFTERNOON SESSION.

After the reading of the letters and the enrollment of ministers and messengers, the Association at once proceeded to go into a permanent organization by the election of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer. The Chair appointed as tellers of the election, Eld. W. B. Collins and Bro. A. J. Edmondson.

While the count was being made, the body entered into a Song and Prayer Service, in which several songs were sung and prayer offered by Bro. D. R. Smith.

The count of the votes showed the election of Eld. W. B. Collins, as Moderator; G. R. McCall, Clerk. A motion prevailed that Bro. A. J. Edmondson be elected Treasurer by acclamation.

Petitionary letters were called for, whereupon the Eureka Springs Immanuel Church presented her letter for membership. which was received, and the hand of fellowship extended by the Moderator to the messengers.

On motion, the first article of the Constitution was set aside and Eld. J. G. Burgess, pastor of the Eureka Springs Immanuel Church, was elected a member of the body.

A motion prevailed that the chair appoint a committee on the arrangement of business, which resulted in the appointment of Elds. Q. C. Pennington and D. R. Kittrell.

The Chair appointed the pastor and messengers of White Elm Church as a Committee on Divine Service.

On motion, the Association adjourned till the following morning at 8:30 o'clock. Closing prayer by Eld. Beauchamp.

The Committee on Divine Service reported that Eld. Harvey Beauchamp would fill the pulpit at 7:30 in the evening, and Eld. Isaac Standlee the following morning at 11 o'clock.

## EVENING SESSION,

7:30 P. M.—After singing, "Tell Me More About Jesus," the first chapter of Acts was read, after which the congregation was led in prayer by Eld. Standlee. Eld, H. Beauchamp preached on "Foreign Missions," taking for a text. Acts 1:8, at the close of which Eld, M. M. Munger led in prayer. #### MORNING SESSION.

The Association was called to order by singing No. 165, in Harvest Bells. Prayer was offered by Bro. D. R. Smith.

On motion, Bro. D. R. Smith, from Upper Piney Church, was made a member of this body.

'A motion prevailed that the Committees on Resolutions and Nominations be dropped from the roll of committees.

The Committee on Foreign Missions reported as follows:

The Scriptures are very plain in regard to the duty of Christians toward the world. It is a fact that we who are enlightened should send the light of the glorious Gospel to all who are in darkness and death, and our obligations are increased in proportion to our opportunities, time and means. Nearly the whole world is open to our missionaries and the cry is, "Come over and help us." Shall we who have the Gospel say, "No; we will not hear the cry to answer it," and refuse to obey the great command of Him who suffered and died for us, and said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature?" We have suffered loss, and will suffer, as long as we continue in this state of disobedience. We would, therefore, recommend that the Churches arouse themselves and give this important work their immediate attention.

On motion, Dr. W. A. Clark, editor of the Arkansas Baptist, was admitted to a seat in council.

On motion, Eld. D. R. Kittrell was excused from the body. The Committee on Divine Service announced that it had

substituted Eld, W. A. Clark to preach the 11 o'clock sermon. instead of Eld. Isaac Standlee, who was changed to the next day.

A motion prevailed that the Association now adjourn for preaching service, to convene at 2:30 p. m. Singing from Harvest Bells, No. 63, followed by prayer, led by Eld. I. A. Murphy.

II A. M.—The congregation joined in singing No. 162 in Harvest Bells, after which Eld. J. G. Burgess led in prayer. Dr. W. A. Clark then preached a good sermon from the subject, "Am I Saved?" At the close of this sermon the congregation entered into a Christian hand-shaking.

The Committee on Divine Service reported that Eld, W. B. Collins would fill the pulpit at 7:30 p. m., and Eld. Isaac Standlee at 11 a, m, the next morning. Benediction by Eld. T. I. Ballard.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Moderator called the house to order at 2:30, and the audience joined in singing No. 145 in Harvest Bells. was then offered by Eld. O. C. Pennington.

The following resolution, offered by Eld. H. Beauchamp, and discussed by Dr. W. A. Clark, Elds. J. G. Burgess, Isaac Standlee and others, was adopted by a rising vote:

Whereas, Dr. W. H. Whitsitt, president of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, has delivered utterances which are opposed to Scripture statements and contrary to the faith of Baptists, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we ask the trustees to remove him unless he at once resigns; and that we ask of all the faculty a statement of their views on alien baptism, Church perpetuity and the status of the sects.

Resolved, also, That our delegates to our State Convention be instructed to vote as a unit on all Seminary reports in accordance with the sentiment of this resolution.

The Committee on Home Missions made their report as follows, which was adopted:

By Home Missions we mean not that done in our Association, or by our State Board, but that done by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention located at Atlanta, Ga, Its work is in destitute places in the Southern and Southwestern States, and in Cuba and Mexico. work in Mexico is very prosperous. That in Cuba, though temporarily checked by the war in that Island, is the most marvelous exhibition of God's blessing on the mission work in modern times. While in the United States there are only two State Capitals in all the South in which the work was not started by this Board. A very large number of our large and prosperous Churches in the South have been started or helped in their weak days by this Board. We again urge upon Churches the importance of contributing to this work, that destitute regions may have the pure Gospel. Our denomination will reap largely in years to come from our contributions to this work.

The Committee on Associational Missions made the following report:

In view of the fact that there is great destitution within our bounds, and that not for the want of knowledge, but for the want of more zeal and Christian courage, this destitution has been greatly neglected, and the cause of Christ has suffered and is now suffering; we, therefore, recommend that this body appoint, or elect, an Executive Board, and that this board be authorized to employ and keep in the field a missionary at least three months, and longer if possible, this year. This Board to be constituted of one member from each Church—selected at first by the messengers present, and afterward elected by the Churches—and that this board be requested to meet before they leave this meeting place and on Saturday before each fifth Sunday this year.

"And this is life eternal that they might know Thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent." The sermon was followed by a short talk by Eld. Wm. Kerns on the same subject.

At the close of this service there was a collection of \$4.16 and five bushels of wheat taken for Bro. R. Emmitt, after which the congregation sung, "There'll Be Resting By and By." At the close of this song, Eld. M. M. Munger led in prayer.

## .. FRIDAY. ..

#### MORNING SESSION.

The body was called to order by the Moderator at the appointed time and No. 330 in Harvest Bells sung. Eld Wm. Kerns led the congregation in prayer.

Corresponding messengers from sister Associations were called for, whereupon Bros. H. Williams and Ben Southerland responded from Madison County, and Eld. Wm. Kerns from Taney County Associations and were by motion seated in council.

The report of the Committee on State Missions was called for, and the following after being discussed by Eld. J. G. Burgess, Bro. H. Williams and others, was adopted:

We find, by reference to the missionary directory as published in our State papers, that there is great destitution in the State, and it should be one of the great interests of this body to look after and aid in relieving such destitution. We cannot specify, as we are not personally acquainted in the State. We understand that Berryville is a mission and that the State Board fosters it, and we think this body should do all it possibly can for the State Mission fund. The State Board is in great need for money to carry on this

great work of the State. Let each member of each Church give as the Lord has prospered him; then this work will move gradually and successfully.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2:00 p. m., the Moderator called the house to order for the purpose of organizing the Missionary Board of Carroll County Association of Missionary Baptists, provided for in the report of the Committee on Associational Missions. Following is the business transacted:

And we recommend, also, that the denominational literature, such as the State papers and others of our denomination, together with Sunday-school literature, be considered a source of education, and as far as possible be kept in the home, and that the Churches of Carroll County Association do not neglect the first step in Christian education, which should begin at home, almost in infancy, and be continued all through life, remembering that we are continually educating by example, and shall be held responsible for results.
