MINUTES.

THURSDAY, OCT. 7, 1897.

The Fayetteville Baptist Association of Washington county, Arkansas, met with Mt. Pisgah Church on the date above, and the brethren that were to preach the Introductory sermon not being present, Elder A. H. Autry, of Springdale, by the request of the Messengers present, delivered an excellent discourse from the 14th verse of the 3rd chapter of 1st John, towit: "We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren." After which prayer was offered by Eider M. H. Spyres.

On motion, the Association was then called to order by the former moderator, and the letters of the churches called for and

read by F. G. Kimbrough and W. E. Kimbrough.

An election was then taken and Elder H. C. Winstead reelected Moderator and H. P. Greene Clerk.

The Association took a recess until 2:30 o'clock.

2 o'clock P. M.

The Association convened again for business, with prayer by Elder J. A. Stone.

Petionary letters were called for and received one from the Mt. Zion church, and finding her sound in the faith; the hand of Fellowship was extended her Messengers, who were invited to seats.

Called for visiting ministers and members, and received Elders S. J. Odom, of the Cherokee Baptist Association; R. A. Tuel, of Vineyard church; E. Moss, of Wedington, and Bro. C. C. Randel, of Springdale.

Correspondence then called for, and received a Letter from Madison county Association, and Elder J. S. Spyres from Benton

County Association.

The following committees were then appointed by the Moderator:

Committee on Divine Service—C. O. Farmer, and the Pastor and Deacons of Mt. Pisgah church.

Committee on Foreign Missions-Elder A. H. Antry and M. D. Lewis.

Committee on Home Missions—M. H. Spyres and J. Sharp.
Committee on State Missions—W. E. Kimbrough and J. F.
Dunegan.

Committee on Associational Missions-F. G. Kimbrough and

E. Webb.

Committee on Finance—A. M. Kennon and W. R. Whitaker. Committee on Sunday Schools—J. A. Stone and F. B. Killerease. Committee on Publications - G. M. Jameson and Wm. Lichtlyter.

Committee on Obituaries -J. R. Peters and J. W. Whitehead, Committee on Temperance- A. H. Autry and J. S. Hale.

Committee on Ministerial and Denominational Education -

C. C. Randel and H. B. Borders.

The following Resolution was adopted: Resolved, That we will meet at 8:30 a.m., adjourn at 11; meet at 1 p m., adjourn at 4:30; meet at 7:30 and adjourn at will.

On motion, the report of the Committee on Associational

Missions is set for the hour of 9:30 a.m. tomorrow

The Fifth Sunday Ministers' and Members' Meeting was recommended, and H. P. Greene, C. O. Farmer and W. E. Kimbrough were appointed a Committee on Program, and that the 5th Sunday in October be held with Island Chapel Church.

The Association then adjourned. Prayer by Eld. H. B. Borders, FRIDAY MORNING, 8:30 O'CLOCK.

The Association met according to adjournment, and after devotion, and prayer by Elder H. B. Borders, was called to order for business by the Moderator.

Minutes of vesterday read and approved.

Wm Lichlyter was granted leave of absence on account of sickness.

Report of the Committee on Associational Missions read, and discussed by F. G. Kimbrough, England, Spyres, Autry and others, and then adopted.

Resolution in regard to Dr. W. H. Whitsitt was then read by

Eld. A. H. Autry, and unanimously adopted, to wit:

RESOLUTION,

Whereas, Dr. W. H. Whitsitt has pursued a course as to alienate the great mass of the denomination; and

Whereas, His teaching is contrary to sound doctrine, and

at variance with well known historical facts; and

Whereas, It is the firm determination of Fayetteville Association to withhold any cooperation or support so long as he is retained as the President of the Seminary and Proffessor of Church History;

Therefore be it resolved, That we heartily endorse the action of the General Association of Kentucky at its recent session at Georgetown in which it demanded his removal from the Presidency of the Institution and the chair of Church History.

The body was called to order for business, and prayer by

On motion, an Executive Board was then appointed by the Moderator; F. G. Kimbrough, chairman, C. O. Farmer. M. D. Lewis, E. Webb and C. C. Randel, and on motion, the Moderator and Clerk of the Association were added to the same.

Report of the Committee on Publications read, and very ably discussed by several of the brethren, the same was amended and

adouted.

The Report on Obituaries was read and adopted.

Report on Home Missions read, and more or less discussion on the subject, showing much interest in the same, and was adopted.

The report on State Missions read and strongly advocated by

W. E. Kimbrough, Autry, Odom and others, and adopted.

Leave of absence was extended to Bro. F. G. Kimbrough.

The following was then adopted: Resolved, That the time of meeting of this Association be and is hereby changed from Thursday to Saturday at 11 o'clock, a. m. before the 2d Sunday in October of each year.

On motion, Resolved, That we recommend that our churches discourage the organization of "societies," so far as these societies may become hurtful to said churches who may have them in hand,

The same was well endorsed.

The Association then adjourned. Prayer by Bro. W. E. Kimbrough.

SATURDAY MORNING, 8:30 O'CLOCK.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment, with prayer by Elder J. A. Stone, and was called to order for business by the Moderator.

Minutes of the day before read and approved.

On motion a committee of three was appointed on Ministerial Support. J. Sharp, Joseph Lee and A. C. Dees were appointed on said committee.

The Association then took a recess until 1:30 o'clock p. m.

1:30 o'CLOCK P. M.

The Association was convened for business, and prayer by Elder J. R. Peters,

Leave of absence was granted Brothers C. T. Clayton and W. A. Jack.

Report on Ministerial and Denominational Education read

and adopted.

Report on Foreign Missions read, and strongly encouraged by Elder A. H. Autry, England and the Moderator, and unanimously adopted, with \$10 laid on the table for the same.

Report of the Committee on Sunday Schools read, endorsed by J. A. Stone, W. E. Kimbrough and F. B. Killerease, and adopted

The Association then elected Elder W. E. Kimbrough as a delegate to the State Convention at Pine Bluff and \$3.00 collected for his expenses, Prairie Grove church pledged to pay the balance

Leave to return home was then granted Bro. E. Webb.

Report on Ministerial Support read and adopted.

On motion, it was agreed that the next Association meet with Liberty Church at Dutch Mills, and that Elder H. C. Winstead preach the Introductory sermon, with Elder M. H. Spyres as his alternate.

Correspondence was continued with Benton and Madison counties, and Cherokee Associations, and any member of this Association that shall visit them, and carry one of these minutes, is an authorized Messenger of this body.

Elder A. H. Autry, of Springdale, was then elected a Delegate

to the Southern Baptist Convention which meets at

Five hundred copies of these minutes were ordered printed, the Clerk to superintend and distribute the same, and receive \$10 for his work.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association is hereby most heartily extended to the brethren and sisters of Mt. Pisgah church and friends around, for the kinduess and hospitality extended to the Messengers.

HOME MISSIONS.

Your committee on Home Missions make the following report: During the past conventional year the number of missionaries in the employ of the Home Board has been three hundred and seventytwo. Baptisms four thousand seven hundred and nine. Received by letter four thousand seven hundred and forty-six. Total additions nine thousand four hundred and forty-five. Churches constituted one hundred and thirty-nine. Houses of worship built, fifty-seven. The work needs to be increased among the Negroes all over the South, the foreign population in Missouri, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Texas, and other states, in the Indian Territory, in the mountain region, in Cuba, on the frontier, indeed everywhere. To do this we must have increased resources. J. SHARK.

According to previous reports the organized mission work in Arkansas hegas in 1876 when there were but 22,000 Baptists in the state. Mission work in the majority of the Associations has been aided, churches organized and many souls saved. We rejoice

greatly at the success of the chapel car work.

By this means new churches are built up and new houses of worship erected. Enlarged contributions and hearty co operation

by the churches will make the state mission work a complete success.
