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

FIRST DAY-Morning Session.

The several churches composing the Union Association of Baptists met with Evening Shade Church, Stone Cousty Arkansas, September 11, 1891.

Introductory sermon preached by Eld. O. A. Copeland, from Romanus 1-15: 16.

The Moderator and Clerk being absent, Bld. E. Keeling was elected moderator protem, and W. T. Passmore, clerk protem.

· Letters were called for and messengers names enrolled.

On motion the body adjourned until 2 o'clock. Prayer by A. R. Brannum.

EVENING BESSION,

The Association met in order. Prayer by Rld. T. G. Delk, and A. Brethren W. O. Kendric and H. P. Wadrins were appointed reading clerks. The letters from the different churches was read and deligates names enrolled.

On motion, brethren from Big Spring Church was received without a letter.

The body went into permanent ognization by electing Eld. Jacob King, moderator; W. T. Pasemore, clerk; O. Wadkins. Treasurer.

Called for correspondence. Which call was accepted by Pec-Dec Association, through her messengers, Eld. J. M. Beavers, B. R. Tubbs, II. F. Wadkins and E. M. Guffey; who were welcomed and received the hand of fellowship.

On motion the Moderator proceeded-to appoint the following committees:

Called for the reading of the Constitution, Rules of Decoram and Articles of Faith.

Resolution No. 2 .- Received, that no member of this body shall spruk longer than 10 minutes at any time on any one subject.

Adopted.

Resolution No. 3. - Resolved, that this Association, on the acsount of the great love she has for Pleasant Hill Church, appoint Elders: O. A. Copeland, J. J. Goodman, Jacob Tarwater and Jacob King to meet with her, on Friday before the second Sunday in August, '92, to hold a protracted meeting.

Resolutson No. 4 .- Resolved, that we tender our sincere thanks to the members of Evening Shade Church, and vicinity surrounding it, for the kind hospitality shown us during our stay with them.

MINUTES.

Resolution No.5.—Resolved, that we appoint two brethren to the work on home missios, in the bounds of this Association, beginning the first Sunday in July; '92, and work until the next meeting of this body.

On ration and second the Trees were was ordered to turn over the minute and to the clerk, and take his receipt for the same

On motion the clerk was ordered to have \$10, 50 worth of minutes printed, and retain, ballance on hand for his service.

On motion, the clerk was ordered to have the Constitution, Rules of Decorum and Articles of Fairly, published in the minutes.

On ma ion and second, the missi forcy fund was drawn out of the treasury and paid to the Home Missionaries, first, in payment for their past labore, and the remainder reserved for the ensuing year.

On motion and second, the Home Missionaries was elected by ballot, which resulted in the election of Elders, E. Keeling and Jacob King.

By order, those who contributes to the Missionaries, will deposit their produce at Shady Grove Church, No. 2, in the Western district, and at Eld. J. J. Goodman's, Alco, in the Eastern district.

By motion and second, the corresponding messengers, to sister Associatings/was allowed to write their own letter.

By motion and second, our Missionaries are to be paid \$1.50 per day for their labors, beginning the first of July '92, and working until the next meeting of this body.

By motion and second, the clerk was ordered to make all necessary corrections in the minutes.

By mo ion and second, the body was adjourded to meet at time and place herein mentioned.

- 1. We believe in the one, only true and living God, the Father, the Word and the Holy Ghost.
- 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are of Divine authority, and the only infallible rule of faith and practice.
 - 3. We believe in original sin.
- 4. We believe that man cannot, by his own free will or ability, recover himself from the Gallen state which he is in by nature.
- 5 We believe the doctrine of election according to the fore-knowledge of God, through sanctification unto obedience of the spirit and sprinkling of the blood of Christ.
- 6. We believe the saints will preserve in grace, and never finally fall away.
- 7 We believe that Baptism and the Lord's supper, are ordinances of the church of Christ; that baptism by Immersion is the only Apostolic mode that true believers are the only proper subjects and that washing the saints feet is a duty.
- 8. We believe in resurcction of the dead, and a general Judg-ment.
- 9. We believe that the joys of the raints and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
- 10. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances except those who have been regularly bapticed, and called of God and come under the imposition of bands by a presbytery.
- 11. We believe it to be our indispensible duty to do all we can for the advancement of our Redcemer's kingdom, and for the spread of the Gospel.

Rules of Decorum

- I This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A moderator and clerk shall be chosen by the sufferage of the members present, and a majority of votes cast shall cleet.
- 3 The Moderator shall be considered a judge of order, and shall have the right to call to order at any time.

- 4. Any member, not satisfied with the ruling of the moderator, may appeal to the body, on the same day but not afterwards.
- 5. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise to his feet and address the Moderator.
- 6. The Moderator, when addressed by a member for permission to speak, shall signify the same by calling the speaker by name.
- 7. No speaker shall be interrupted while speaking unless he de part from the subject; or, unless words of personal reflection are used

Every motion, made and seconded, must come under the cosider ation of the body, unless withdrawn by the mover.

- 8. Every case taken up by this body, shall be decided or with drawn before another can be offered.
- 9. When a question has been taken up, after allowing time for debate, the Moderotor shall take the voice of the body on the subject, and these voting in the affirmative shall signify the same by rising to their teet; the negative, by like sign.
- 10. The Moderator shall pronounce the decision before the standers to some their reats.
- 11. Any member withing to retire shall obtain permission of the Moderator.
- 12. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without permission of the body, nor more than once before every member, that wishes to speak, shall have spoken.
- 13. The appellution of brother shall be used in the association by members in addressing one another.
- 14. The names of the members shall be called as often as the association may direct.
- 15. No member shall be tolerated in any practice which tends to interrupt public speaking.
- 16. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilage of speaking as any other member, provided he appoint another to his seat during the time; but he shall not vote on any question unless the association be equally divided.
- 17. Any member violating these rules, may be reproved by the Moderator at his discretion; but only on the day that the breach is made.



Constitution of the Union Association of Baptists.

- 1. This union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the name "The Union Association of the Beptists"
- 2. This association shall be composed of deligates from churches in union; each church shall be entitled to three deligates, who shall be required to furnish (satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their several churcles, before they take their seats.
- 3. The deligate & when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberative body by the appointment of a moderator and clerk, who shall be chosen by a ballot of the members of the body, at each annual session, and shall continue in office motif their successors are chosen.
- 4. The Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which she is composed. It shall regard them as represely bodies, is all matters of internal government, and shall act only as an advisory council, assuming to authority except what is expressly diligated to it by the churches or is evidently implied by the very nature of the compact. It, however, claims authority over its members, the deligates from the churches, and inclusive must have power to withdraw from, and disown all churches that depart from the principles of this compact, by becoming Heterodoxy in faith or disorderly in practice. It shall therefore regard all, united under this constitution, with a vigilant eye for good. Its principal business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God, by extending the kingdom of Grace on earth, through the medium of preaching the Gospel and to cultivate union and fedowship with all the churches of Christ, and especially those united under this constitution.
- 5. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from offer associations of the same faith and order may be admitted into the union on sending three deligates to any annual macing of this Association with a petition for admission, and by their deligates agreeing to the abstract of principles herein.
- 6. The churches composing the Union Association, shall transmit to every annual meeting a written communication, specifying the names of their deligates, their number in fellowship, the number haptised, recived by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excitated, deceased; number of heentifies and ordained ministers holding mem-

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bership with them, and such other information as they may deem necessary, which will be read and minuted accordingly.

7 This Association may have a fund, supplied by the voluntary contirbution of the churches; and all the money contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the committee of fluance to the Trensurer, who shall be elected by ballot, and shall hold his office during the pleasure of the association. He shall retain and manage funds according to the orders of the Association, and seed present annually, for insertion in the minutes, a clear and succiner statement of all the receipts and expenditures.

8. This Association shall turn the churches with the minutes of every session.

9. This Association shall take cognizance of no querry sent them by the churches, unless they have endeavored to solve them and failed; nor of any difficulty between churches, noless they have pursued the directions given in the XVIII chapter of Mathew, and failed to settle them; then the association shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them at its discretion.

10. It shall be the duty of the clerk of this Association to keep a regular file of the printed minutes of each session of this body, and to deliver the same to his successor in office.

11. This constitution may be altered or amended at any regular meeting of this Association, by a concurring voice of two thirds of the members present, provided such alteration or amendment be approved by the churches composing her.
