CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

1. NAME

The name of this association shall be the North Pulaski Baptist Association, co-operating with the Ark. Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

2. PURPOSE

The purpose of this association shall be to promote Christian fellowship and

co-operation among the churches affiliated with the association: to uphold the doctrines and principles of our Baptist faith and to encourage the churches to be loyal to and practice these doctrines and principles; to promote the preaching and teaching of God's Word, the enlisting and training of all Christians for service; to promote missions, benevolence, stewardship, Christian education, and the winning of all men to Christ to the ends of the earth. To co-operate with the Ark. Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in a world mission program.

3. MEMBERSHIP

This body shall be composed of messengers elected from the churches and missions affiliated with the body. When such messengers are approved by the association they shall be seated and entitled to participate in the affairs of the body. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers for the first fifty members, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first fifty, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

4. ARTICLES OF FAITH

The Articles of faith set forth in New Hampshire Confession as the doctrinal beliefs of the churches shall be the doctrines adopted by this body.

5. OFFICERS

The officers of the association shall be moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, and historian. These officers shall be nominated and elected by the association, preferably before the last session of the annual meeting. They shall serve until the close of the following annual session of the association or until their successors shall be elected and installed. Election shall be by secret ballot unless another plan is adopted by unanimous consent. The moderator and vice-moderator shall be limited to not more than 2 successive years of service. The duties of these officers shall be those usually incumbent upon such officers.

If the association employs a superintendent of missions and/or an educational director, these workers shall be considered as officers of the association. Such additional officers shall be elected as the association shall deem necessary to its most effective work.

6. AUTHORITY

The association is an autonomous body and therefore reserves the right to determine its own policies and direct its own business; it may refuse to seat messengers who are not in fellowship or doctrinal agreement with the body, or whose churches are not. However, this body shall never exercise any authority over, or give direction to, any church or churches which are affiliated with it or which may have been affiliated with it; but the association will stand ready to lend any assistance or counsel to any church making request for such help.

7. ORGANIZATIONS

This body shall encourage and promote such associational organizations as Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, music, library, and other organizations which are in keeping with the purpose of the association, with their full staffs of officers and programs necessary for the promotion of the work. The chief officer of each organization shall be elected, or approved, by the association and shall function as an officer of the association.

8. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

The association shall have an executive committee consisting of the pastor of each church (where he is a member of the church) and one lay member from each church. Nominations for membership in the executive committee may be made by the church, but members must be elected by the association. The officers of the association, namely moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, and historian, shall be ex officio members of the executive committee and should

serve as respective officers of the committee, unless the association directs otherwise. All other officers and chairmen of standing committees are to become ex officio members of the executive committee. Ex officio members will not have the right to vote unless they are also members of the executive committee elected

as representatives of their respective churches.

The executive committee shall attend to all matters of the association between sessions; promote all progress authorized by the association; and carry out all directives given by the association. It shall make an annual report to the association of all work carried on and all finances handled. The executive committee shall not have the power to create or initiate any new work or project not contained in the reports and recommendations of the previous meeting of the association.

The executive committee shall hold regular monthly or quarterly meetings. The executive committee shall not have power to entitle a church to affiliation with the association or have representation on the executive committee, but may invite a church to sit with it in counsel without vote, pending the seating of the messengers of that church by the association.

9. MEETINGS

The association shall hold annual meetings of the body at such time and place as it may determine. The executive committee may have power to change the stated time and/or place of the annual meeting in case of emergency or necessity. The association may hold such quarterly meetings as are deemed wise for the promotion of its work. It shall promote such regular meetings of its workers' council, its promotional organizations, and its standing committees as shall prove most effective for carrying out the total purpose of the association. 10. COMMITTEES

The association shall have the following standing committees named by the moderator and his officers before the close of the annual session to serve until the close of the next annual session, namely, program committee, nominating committee, credentials committee, budget committee, and such additional standing committees as seen needed. All organizations of the association shall name their own committees.

11. AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any regular annual session of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present, provided notice of such change has been given at the previous annual meeting and provided it is read in the first session of the annual meeting and voted on before the last session.

BY-LAWS

 In parliamentary procedure the body shall be governed by ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER or Kerfoot's PARLIAMENTARY LAW.

The fiscal year for the association shall be from the first day of Jan. to the last day of Dec. inclusive. Annual reports to the association shall cover this period.

3. The annual meeting of the association shall be in the month of Oct. The exact days and place shall be recommended by the nominating committee, or other committee authorized by the association, and approved by the body. The executive committee may be authorized to make such adjustment in the time and place of the annual meeting as may become necessary because of circumstances which develop after the close of the annual meeting of the whole body.

4. All officers of the association must be members of churches within the association, in good standing, and recognized for their knowledge of and loyalty to Sonthern Baptist doctrines and programs.

5. Duties of the officers shall be as follows:

The MODERATOR shall call to order and preside over the meetings of the association and the executive committee, and direct the affairs of the association in an orderly manner and Christian spirit. (He may for good reason ask other officers or members of the body to preside at times.)

The VICE-MODERATOR may, if the moderator so directs, preside over the sessions of the associational council. He shall preside over other meetings in the absence of the moderator and shall assist the moderator in such ways as he may

The CLERK shall keep a full and accurate record of all business of the association and the executive committee, and of all recommendations of the associational council. At each meeting he shall be prepared to read all minutes of the previous meeting. All records for at least one year shall be on hand at each meeting. They

shall be kept in a fireproof safe between meetings.

The TREASURER shall receive all funds of and for the association, not otherwise designated, shall disburse all funds in accordance with the adopted associational budget or the specific instructions of the association and npon receipt of a bill or voucher properly anthorized. He shall keep accurate records of all monies received, with sources and designations of same. He shall make reports to the regular meetings of the executive committee and annual meeting of the association and have the same approved. The executive committee shall have the treasurer's reports audited at the close of the fiscal year, and reports the same to the annual association, for approval.

The HISTORIAN shall write in orderly form the events of the association, beginning with its organization. The association should request the churches and individuals who may possess historical information about the association to make it accessible to the historian. He shall make record of current events of each fiscal year and read his annual chapter to the annual meeting of the association for adop-

tion. These records shall be kept in a fireproof safe or vault.

6. The following associational organizations shall be maintained and promoted by the association for the benefit of the work in the churches; associational Sunday School organization, associational Training Union, associational Woman's Missionary Union, associational Brotherhood, associational music organization, associational Church Library Council, and such other as may be deemed wise for the attainment of the objectives of the association. All officers of these organizations shall be members of churches affiliated with the association and in good standing.

Unless the association shall direct otherwise, the chief officers of the organizations shall be chosen by their respective organizations, submitted to the nominating committee of the association, and elected or approved by the association. Their duties shall be understood to be in line with the functions set forth in the promotional literature for their respective organizations, as produced or approved by the state or

Convention-wide agencies functioning in a like area.

7. The following committees, other than the standing and special committees, shall be maintained by the association as needed for promotion of its work among the churches: committee on evangelism, missions committee, and such other committees as may be needed. The chairmen of these committees shall be elected or appointed by the association, and other committee members shall be chosen in number and manner designated by the association and in accord with the needs of

the work. The qualifications required for members of such committees shall be the same as for all other officers, and their duties shall be as prescribed by the association.

8. All associational organizations and regular committees shall make reports to the regular meetings of the executive committee and/or to the association. The executive committee shall exercise authority over these organizations and committees only to the extent of determining whether they are working within the bounds of the organizational programs as approved by the association.

9. A place shall be made on the order of business of the association for mis-

cellaneous business at each session of the association.

10. A sermon on doctrines and one on missions shall be provided for at each annual meeting. Addresses on assigned topics relating to phases of our Baptist

work shall be provided for by the program committee.

11. Messengers to the association shall be accorded equal rights and privileges of the floor, provided each messenger who desires to speak shall rise, address the moderator, and be recognized before he begins to speak. No messenger shall be entitled to speak on any one subject more than twice until other messengers desiring to speak have been heard. Upon request of a messenger, or by consent of the body, the moderator may invite a visitor to speak during a discussion.

12. The bylaws may be amended at any regular session of the association by a majority vote of messengers present, provided such amendment has been read to the body not later than the second session, and is voted on before the last session.

First Annual Meeting North Pulaski Baptist Association

Meeting With First Baptist Church Jacksonville, Arkansas October 15-16th, 1962

FIRST SESSION - 6:55 PM October 15th., R.H. Dorris, Moderator, Presiding

The First Annual Session of the North Pulaski Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. R.H. Dorris, 6:55 PM, Monday, October 15, 1962.

Max Alexander led the congregation in singing "At Calvary" and "There is A Name I Love to Hear."

Rev. Jesse S. Reed, Director of Evangelism, Arkansas Baptist State Convention, recognized and introduced as representative from the Baptist State Convention, spoke briefly on the proposed 1963 Budget for our State Convention.

Mrs. R.H. Dorris, Associational WMU President, introduced and presented the

annual W.M.U. Report.

The Associational Treasurer's report presented by Rev. W. Harry Hunt, who reported that all our churches but one had made contribution to our work during the year, including the two new churches jnst accepted into the Association. He further stated that an audit of the treasurer's records had been completed by Mr. Harley Marshall, an auditor and a deacon in the Levy Baptist Church, without charge to the Association. Mr. Norman Roberts, Administrator, Memorial Hospital, North Little Rock, was introduced and spoke briefly concerning the new Memorial Hospital in North Little Rock and its mission and work in this area.

Mr. Billy Patterson, Assistant Administrator, Arkansas Baptist Hospital, Little Rock, was introduced and spoke in behalf of the work of our Baptist Hospital in Little Rock and Memorial Hospital, Memphis, and discussed the needs of the Arkansas Baptist Hospital in Little Rock. His report can be found in Book of Reports.

At suggestion of the Moderator, motion was made that this Session be closed with prayer following the annual sermon, Carried,

Max Alexander led the group in singing "Down At The Cross."

Moderator Dorris reported an attendance of two hundred for this first session; with 148 registered messengers, 47 visitors and five children.

Special Music was presented by a men's group composed of Charles Hill, Bob Shannon, Bob Hall, Max Alexander, Donald Crosby, M.O. Kelley and Darrell Wood, who sang "My Jesns I Love Thee."

Dr. C. Gordon Bayless, pastor. Central Baptist Church, North Little Rock, brought the Annual Sermon "If A Man Die, Will He Live Again?" using as his scripture I Corinthians 15:1-8. Following his message Dr. Bayless asked the congregation to join in singing "Rock Of Ages," after which he dismissed the session with prayer. Meeting adjourned.

SECOND SESSION - 6:55 PM October 16th R.H. Dorris, Moderator, Presiding

EXECUTIVE BOARD

The North Pulaski Association of Southern Baptist Churches was organized in the First Baptist Church of Sylvan Hills, on October 17, 1961. Twenty-eight churches were represented in the organization, a budget of \$17,040,00 was adopted, and the following officers elected:

On April 23rd the Executive Committee met to hear report from the Missions Committee regarding four acres of property in Indian Hills, which could be purchased for \$35,000.00, with down payment of \$3,000 and balance over five years at 5 1/2% with monthly payment of approximately \$618.66.

In the Executive Board meeting of May 21st., the Board voted to pay off the Association's part of the debt on the B.S.U. Center at the Little Rock University, a total of \$3,332.13, which would retire our obligation with the Pulaski Baptist Association.

ASSOCIATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

We held two Associational Sunday School meetings during the year, with excellent attendance at each; age group conferences being the main emphasis.

The meetings are held the first Monday night after the third Sunday in the first month of each quarter. The Sunday School Bulletin was followed as our program guide. Nineteen churches were represented and we now have 11,652 enrolled in our Sunday Schools. Special emphasis for the year included:

A vacation Bible School Clinic at Park Hill with an attendance of 250 with 16 churches and 2 missions represented. This clinic was under supervision of Bob Hall, our VBS Superintendent. Our latest report indicates 16 churches and 2 missions reported VBS.

Previous to the VBS Clinic, our Association participated in the State VBS Clinic with all our leaders attending.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

We have thirty churches and five missions in our Association; thirty-one

reported having Training Unions, with an enrolment of 4,856.

'M' Night was observed December 5, 1961 with 28 churches and 22 pastors, total attendance 708. 'M' Night this year will be held at First Baptist Church, North Little Rock, December 3, 1962 with an anticipated attendance of 1,000.

In addition to our annual "M" Night Rally, we had two other associational

Training Union rallies.

This year onr Association had entrants in each of the State Tournaments. Our Sword Drill representative was Anne Fleming of the Levy Church; our Speaker was Ruth Daniel of Park Hill Church, Junior Memory-Sword Drill winners were Diane Odorn, Highway. Fredrick Fleming, Levy and Randolph Adams, Baring Cross.

Seven of our churches reported Youth Week: Baring Cross, Jacksonville First,

Nine of our churches received Honor Church Diplomas, while three, Amboy, Baring Cross and Sixteenth Street received one or more seals.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

Our organizational meeting was held at Pike Avenue Church on May 21, 1962. The Nominating Committee submitted nominations for Brotherhood Officers and motion made, and carried, they be elected by acclamation.

Mr. George Schroeder, Executive Secretary of the Brotherhood Commission, Memphis, was the speaker for the occasion, and brought a most inspiring message on the purposes of the Brotherhood. We had 104 in attendance, representing fourteen churches in our Association.

Our next meeting was held at Burns Park, pavilion #7, North Little Rock, August 20, 1962 at which meeting our R.A. Baseball teams were honored with a watermelon supper. First place award went to Amboy Baptist Church, with the Sportsmanship award being given to the Highway Baptist Church. Our R.A. Leader, Tommy Bridges, reported plans were being made for a Training Course for R.A. Leaders. Our Christian Witness Leader, Bob Craftou, is working on a lay revival team from our Brotherhood Association. Attendance was 156.

1962 ASSOCIATIONAL WMU REPORT

Mrs. R. H. Dorris

The year 1961-62 is significant for Woman's Missionary Union because of its accomplishments and because of special preparation for observance of the 75th

Anniversary of the organization.

The last 75 days of 1961-62 were set aside as a special period of prayer to launch the 75th Anniversary. Directives designed to reach every member included; daily individual prayer participation....season of prayer in every WMU meeting.... prayer retreat. Retreats have been engaged in by many associational and local organizations. Members went apart to think on His Word, to discuss and to pray about problems, and just to "be still and know." Billy Graham recently said, "In a very glorious way the Holy Spirit is beginning to move quietly all across America. Prayer groups......are springing up throughout the nation.....In my opinion there is taking place in the United States a deep spiritual revival of which many are unaware." Groups participating in this special 75-day period of prayer are a part of that chain of which he spoke and are undergirding spiritual revival in many places.

To keep step with the Jubilee Advance emphasis for 1961-62 on church extension, Woman's Missionary Union set as a major emphasis in community missions the assisting in the organization of churches and missions. Along with this emphasis on extension was another on enlistment. Interest and increases were noted in each.

The organization's stewardship program is geared to lead members to practice tithing.....to pledge the tithe to the church budget and through it to support world missions through the Cooperative Program.....to give over-and-above gifts through the Dixie Jackson Offering for State Missions, the Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions and the Lottie Moon Offering for Foreign Missions. The Jubilee goal concerning these special offerings was a 14% increase over the previous year's totals. In Arkansas we went over the goal with an 18% increase in the Lottie Moon Offering, but fell short with only 12 1/2% increase in the Annie Armstrong and Dixie Jackson Offerings.

The increase in organizations is steady, but all too slow. Wherever there are women and young people, there is need and a place for missionary organizations that will enlist and educate them for missions through a progam of missionary endeavor centering in the local church, but including associational, state, home and

foreign missions.

At the beginning of the year 786 women from 24 churches and two missions were enrolled in missionary societies in North Pulaski Baptist Association. In addition, there were 112 Sunbeam, Girl's Auxiliary and Young Woman's Auxiliary organizations.

Quarterly rallies were held with conferences for local officers. In addition to these opportunities a Mission Study Institute was held with our State Mission

Study Chairman as guest leader.

Day of Instruction was held for new 1962-63 leadership, and the Leadership

Course was taught by our State WMU workers.

On the eve of the 75th Anniversary of Woman's Missionary Union when emphasis will be on World Missions, it is well to recall the following statement made by Miss Alma Hunt, executive secretary WMU, SBC: "The challenging past was never more inviting than the compelling present. Today Woman's Missionary Union stands on the shoulders of a noble heritage. From this vantage point its members can see the fruits of the labors of other years and can walk into the future with confidence in its purpose and enthusiasm for its program."

MUSIC REPORT

BAPTIST STUDENT WORK IN LITTLE ROCK

Linda Day

Darrel Coleman served as BSU Director during the school term of 1961-62. In September, 1962, Linda Day came to work with the students at the University of Arkansas Medical School, Little Rock University, and to a limited degree with the students at Philander Smith College and Arkansas Baptist College.

During the school term of 1961-62 there were approximately 350 Baptist Students enrolled at Little Rock University and about 200 at the University of Arkansas Medical School. A daily devotional service was held at 12 Noon Monday through Friday at Little Rock University, and at 12:40 Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at the Medical School. Dr. Andrew Hall, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Fayetteville, spoke one week in April at L. R. U., and it was one of the most challenging weeks of the year. There was an average of one social each month for each school. The students at the Medical School gave \$35 for BSU Summer Missions. Students from both schools attended the State BSU Convention, State Spring Planning Conference, and the International Student Retreat, meetings sponsored by the Student Department of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

The Baptist Student Center at 323 South Elm was dedicated February 25, 1962. Little Rock student work receives a monthly allotment of \$50 for support of the program from the North Pulaski Ceunty Association. Not only is this financial support appreciated, but the encouragement which you as pastors, parents, and interested adults give your young people to be active in the Baptist Student Union as they

attend college is welcome.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Billy Patterson

The Arkansas Baptist Hospital Board of Trustees, has, after careful study come to the firm conclusion that this institution should take immediate steps to construct additional facilities, and has declared the situation to be an emergency.

Our studies have brought us to the conclusion that, due to increasing resistance toward beds in the original building, people are going elsewhere. The hospital now has 400 beds, 260 of which are in the old building, and 140 in the new building. This means that many patients leave the hospital with a bad taste, since their request for beds in the new section could not be honored. Meanwhile, new hospitals are being constructed around us which adds to the problem.

The old section has few beds with bathroom facilities adjacent to the room, and in most instances, patients must go down the hall to a common bath with tub, layatory and commode and, due to the many two bath homes, patients think

it ridiculous to be expected to leave their room for a bath in the hospital.

Two floors of patient rooms can be added to the surgical pavilion that was finished two years ago at a cost of approximately \$800,000, and would give us 40 semi-private rooms with 80 beds and 56 private rooms in the new building. We could then shut down beds in the old section for remodeling and remove a wing of the hospital at a time in order that pipe chases may be run from the 1st floor all the way up to the fifth. Equipment for this additional space would cost approximately \$95,000. It would cost an additional \$200,000 to provide a new laboratory which we must build, and about \$70,000 to equip the laboratory. Our present laboratory is over-crowded and many years old. We also need to build and equip a laundry, which would cost another \$200,000.

This gives a total cost of the project, \$1.364,351.28. The Equitable Life Assurance Society has indicated they would make such loan, making a second mortgage on the property to run concurrently with the \$1,800,000.00 that we now owe. We have approximately \$200,000 in our Building Fund which would give us ade-

quate money for this project.

We feel, after careful studies, that our financial situation would actually be bettered with this program as we would net an additional income of approximately \$14,107 per month over our present income with the additional new sections, and our loan payments would increase by approximately \$11,712.00 per month.

REPORT OF THE RELIEFAND ANNUITY COMMITTEE Robert A. Hall

The name of The Relief and Annuity Board has been changed by dropping the word

"Relief". It is now known as the "Annuity Board" of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Third Quarter Report of the Arkansas Office of the Annuity Board reveals that 15 out of 27 churches in the North Pulaski Association are in one of the three retirement plans of the Southern Baptist Convention.

There are 14 Pastors and 7 other staff members from four churches making a total of 21 people in the retirement program in our association. There are 56% of our pastors in the program and 51.8% of our churches.

Every church should help provide for the retirement of their staff so we hope to

see a good increase in these percentages in the coming year.

Bro. T. K. Rucker, Annuity Board Field Representative for Arkansas, or your associational Annuity Board Committee will be glad to assist any church or pastor who may be interested in this program.
